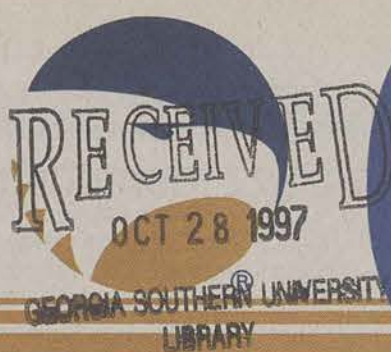

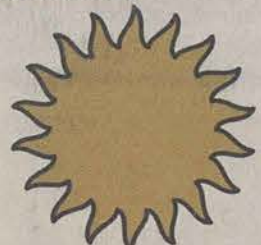

## Academic Freedom Statement being revised

Since last spring quarter a faculty committee has been revising the Academic Freedom Statement, which lays down guidelines for the behavior of professors and protects their rights, for the approval of the Faculty Senate.

The revised statement was expected to be discussed at the recent Faculty Senate meeting, but senate officials considered the wording too vague in

tion members have expressed concerns about the wording of the statement.

"The first version was not in the best interest of students," said Clint Murphy, SGA vice president of academic affairs. "The version I read takes away the power to ever say that a non-tenured professor is out of line."

Debra Sabia, the professor chairing the faculty revision committee, said she sees no reason for the controversy surrounding the statement.

"Academic freedom means that teachers need to seek truth and give students the right to seek truth," Sabia said.

"The statement protects both a professor's right to state his or her views and a student's right to express differing views. Students should in no way feel threatened by this statement. It is really very innocuous."

Although Murphy said SGA is following the issue closely, he declined to make an official statement on the matter.

"I do not feel comfortable giving an official stance when the statement is still in committee and we haven't seen the final version yet," Murphy said.

According to Sabia, only a few changes have been made to the statement.

A sentence prohibiting faculty from discussing certain "controversial matters" has been struck out, and there has been talk of adding in a segment detailing the specific rights and responsibilities of students, Sabia said.

some points and sent the statement back to committee for clarification.

After a few more minor changes in wording are made the statement will be placed on the Faculty Senate's agenda for discussion and a vote, possibly at the senate's next meeting on Nov. 19.

The statement, which was originally designed by the American Association of United Professors in 1940 and last revised in 1970, allows professors to freely express their opinions and initiate class discussions of controversial topics as they relate to material taught in class.

The committee is reviewing and altering the statement in order to bring it up to date.

## Condom recall has GSU officials advising caution

Ansell Personal Products has recalled some 57 million condoms from batches of its Lifestyles, Prime, and Contempo brands after discovering that some could deteriorate before their expiration dates.

GSU health officials have said there is no cause for alarm but

So in order to be safe, the company recalled every variety in question, Snider said.

The FDA urged consumers to check their condoms to make sure they had not already bought the recalled brands.

The agency also urged users to check the expiration dates on all condoms, because using any

they are advising students to be cautious nonetheless.

"The majority of the condoms that we have given out at the Health Center do not fall into these categories, even though some are of the same brand," Sara Oswald of the Health Education Office said.

According to Oswald, the amount of affected condoms dispensed at GSU was minimal, and the Health Center has so far received no reports of breakage or other deterioration.

"The important thing is to look at the expiration date, to make sure that your condoms aren't from any of the recalled batches," Oswald said.

Ansell discovered the problem after receiving several consumer complaints about breakage, and the Food and Drug Administration announced the recall on Oct. 21.

"This doesn't mean there are 57 million bad condoms," emphasized FDA spokeswoman Sharon Snider.

But when Ansell learned of the problem, it couldn't predict exactly which brands were at risk.

expired brand poses the risk that the user may not be adequately protected against pregnancy or sexually transmitted diseases.

All of the batches in question were spermicidally lubricated, a fact which greatly reduced the chance of students receiving them at the Health Center as most of the condoms dispensed there were without spermicide, Oswald said.

According to Oswald, the Health Center is required to purchase the Lifestyles brand because of a state contract, and studies have shown that spermicidally lubricated Lifestyles condoms tend to break more often than the regular Lifestyles.

Any student who needs to acquire condoms or learn about their proper usage is encouraged to contact the Health Education Office, Oswald said.

Exact figures of condoms recalled from local retailers are not yet available, but Ansell is advising consumers to return the bad condoms to the place of purchase or contact their Consumer Relations Dept. at 1-800-883-3434.

## University of Massachusetts students vote against an alcohol ban on campus

AMHERST, Mass. — University of Massachusetts students have voted overwhelmingly against banning alcohol on campus, according to a tally released Friday.

University officials said the unofficial results show that 2,222 or 92 percent — voted "no," and 197 — or 8 percent — voted "yes." There are about 18,000 undergraduates at the Amherst campus.

The question read simply: "Should the university ban alcohol on campus?" The Student

Government Association sponsored the referendum Wednesday.

Lia Wong, SGA president, said the question was meant to determine whether students favor a total ban on campus drinking for people of any age.

She said she views the results as a vote for choice. She said students "want the right to be responsible for themselves."

The vote is non-binding on the university. It becomes the policy position of the student government.

## Gunman critically wounds WVU student, then kills himself in dorm room shooting

MORGANTOWN, W.Va. — A jilted boyfriend showed up at a West Virginia University dorm room and opened fire, critically wounding his ex-girlfriend's new love and then killing himself. The woman watched and was unhurt.

Investigators said the gunman opened fire the instant the other young man answered the door, but the first reaction by nearly everyone who saw those first shots late Thursday was that it was a Halloween prank.

Even the victim, who was shot in the chest, stomach and leg, told police he initially believed

his attacker wielded a paintball gun and he was soaked with fake blood.

"One of the things in everyone's statement was they thought it was a prank or a hoax," state Trooper Dennis Johnson said Friday. "They could not tell it was real until he turned the gun on himself."

The gunman, 20-year-old Andrew Willis of Wellsburg, died in the hospital early Friday after shooting himself in the head. His victim, Nicholas Thompson, 19, of Matewan, remained hospitalized in critical condition. The unhurt 18-year-old woman was

## Student hospitalized after 'Cop-a-Buzz' demonstration

AKRON, Ohio — A college student who volunteered to take part in a demonstration on the dangers of getting a little tipsy overdid it and wound up in the hospital.

David Reynolds, a 24-year-old civil engineering major at the University of Akron, had too much vodka as part of the "Cop-a-Buzz" demonstration.

He was taken to Akron City Hospital in serious condition and released. His parents took him home for the weekend, and the school wouldn't say where they lived.

"It is obvious that some liberties were taken with the execution of the program," said David Stephen, university director of residence life and housing.

No one was able to say how much Reynolds drank. Police didn't check his blood-alcohol level before he went to the hospital and the hospital wouldn't discuss his treatment. The school said there was no reason to believe any other medical ailment might have contributed to his condition that night.

The Alcohol Awareness Week demonstration was intended to show how even small amounts of alcohol can hamper motor skills.

Reynolds and two other student volunteers were supposed to drink just enough to hit a .08

percent blood alcohol level, slightly below the .10 percent limit for driving in Ohio.

In past years, one volunteer

drank liquor, another beer and the third wine in front of an audience of students and university police chaperones. After the volunteers finished their drinks, they performed a sobriety test—

touching their noses, walking a straight line, reciting the alphabet.

This year, however, organizers decided to get the volunteers drinking two hours before the demonstration.

By the time police arrived, Reynolds was slumped and having trouble walking. Police and organizers took him to the hospital.

Reynolds had participated in the program last year without incident.

Some of the school's 24,000 students said the whole idea of the program was silly.

"It's pointless," said Dave Wehner, a sophomore who said he doesn't drink. "College students know what their limits are."

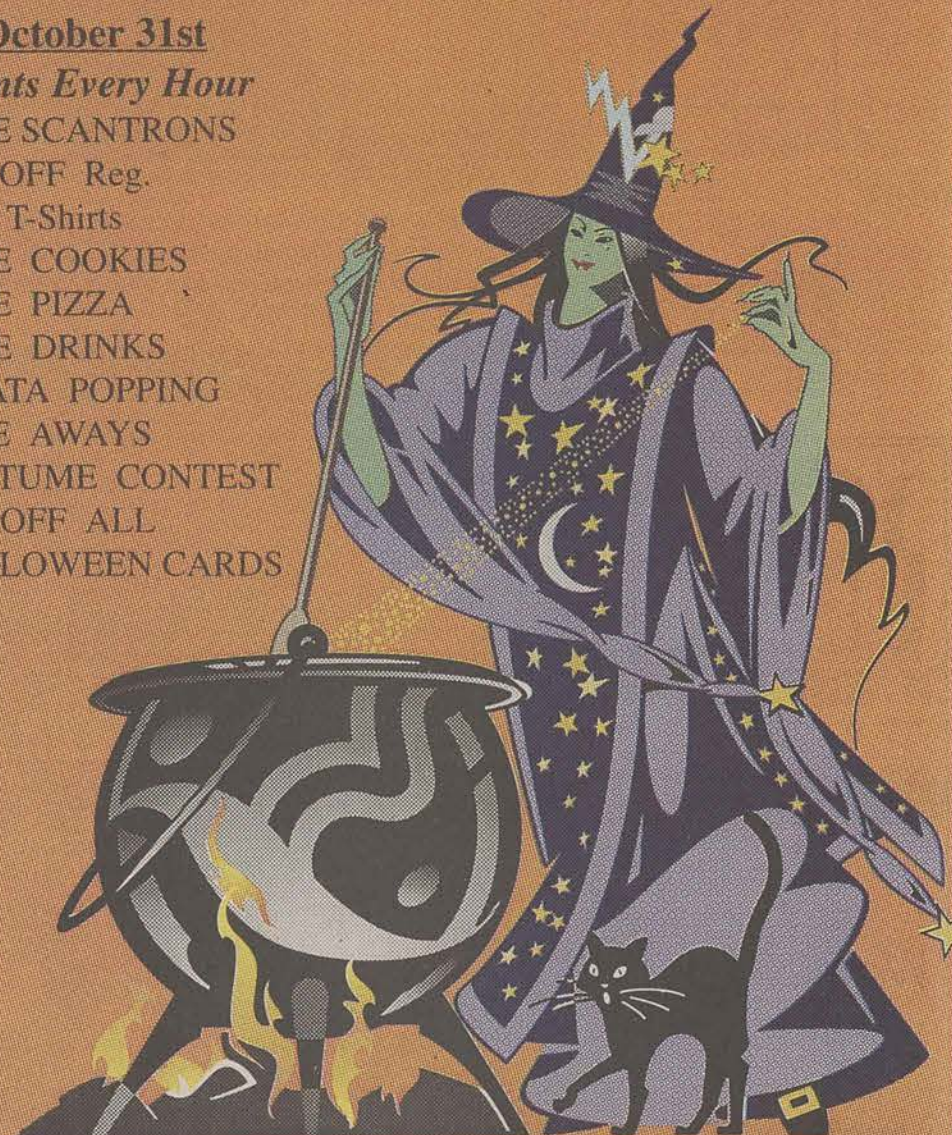

1 California  
Inmate sues over  
tortilla chips

VISTA — A Vista jail inmate is trying to put money where his mouth was.

He's filed a claim against the county because a bag of tortilla chips he bought at the jail's commissary did not have what he considers proper nutritional information printed on the package.

Joseph Paul Becker, 36, said he purchased a package of Snacker's Delight Tortilla Chips on Sept. 19 "that did not contain the Food and Drug Administration's regulation that stipulates that nutrition facts must be contained on package."

As a result, Becker said in the claim, he "suffered health problems directly related to not being aware of the nutrition information."

Precisely what those problems were was not spelled out in the claim, which was filed Oct. 1. He is seeking \$100,000 in damages.

Becker is awaiting trial on several charges including second degree burglary, petty theft

with a prior conviction, possession of burglary tools and possession of tear gas by a convicted felon.

County authorities would not comment about the claim.

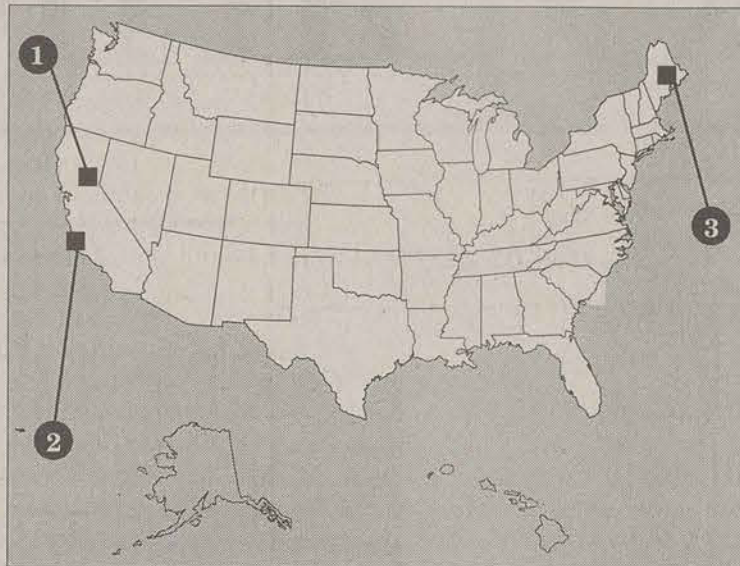
LOS ANGELES — A beeping pager gave away two men hiding in a crawl space after police interrupted a holdup.

Three men tried to rob Harold and Belle's Restaurant about 5:30 a.m., said police spokesman Mike Partain. The robbers took a maintenance worker and a woman standing outside hostage, but the male worker got away, Partain said.

Police arrested Marcotulio Garcia, 21, outside the eatery, but the other alleged robbers were gone when a SWAT team went inside, Partain said.

The officers found a passageway to a flower shop next door and followed it.

"While searching the flower shop, one of the suspect's pager went off — beep, beep," Partain said. "This immediately led officers to the two suspects who



had secreted themselves in a crawl space."

3 Maine

Mrs. Randall declined to identify her daughter, but said she received the parcel containing moldy bread and biscuits, a towel, and a \$20 check.

"Stephen King writes about these things. He could probably make a story of this," she said.

When the package never arrived for Christmas, "our post office put a tracer on it, but nothing came of it," Mrs. Randall said.

The Randalls said they are glad the Christmas package finally made it. After all, it's the thought that counts.

Man tries to hire state trooper as a hitman

BOSTON — When David Smith went looking for a killer-for-hire, he looked in the wrong place.

The 35-year-old married Somerville postal worker ended up asking an undercover state trooper to murder his pregnant ex-girlfriend. He pleaded guilty to solicitation to commit murder and was sentenced by Suffolk

Superior Court Judge Carol S. Ball to 2 1/2 years in prison.

Last May, police got a tip that Smith was trying to hire someone to kill his ex-girlfriend Phyllis Gello, 35, of Revere, who was pregnant with his child. Police said Smith didn't want his wife and family to find out about Gello and the baby. Police arrested Smith after he gave the investigator a \$400 down payment.

Man accused of strangling wife during sex

MOUNT HOLLY, N.J. — A man accused of strangling his wife after she mocked his sexual prowess wants to serve as his own attorney at his upcoming murder trial.

Superior Court Judge Donald P. Gaydos urged Donald Peterson to reconsider his decision to represent himself. Peterson fired his public defender last month.

Peterson is charged with killing his wife, Lola Austin, 31, after she mocked his performance while the couple was having sex in May 1994.

He contends, however, that his wife committed suicide by hanging herself. He says the couple were engaged in a sexual position that prevented him raising his arms to her neck.

Prosecutors allege that after killing his wife, Peterson dressed her and slept with the corpse. He

eventually fled to Florida and later surrendered to authorities.

When the trial begins, defense attorney John L. Call Jr., dismissed by Peterson, is expected to be on standby. Call can sit in the courtroom, but will not join Peterson at the defense table.

The judge instructed Peterson on legal procedure at a pre-trial hearing, asking him if he understood. He also warned Peterson not to try to use his opening state-

ment as a means to testify before the jury.

"I really feel you would be better served if you would reconsider," Gaydos said. "I'm truly concerned, truly concerned, that you may be making a decision which could come back to haunt you."

If convicted of murder, Peterson would face a mandatory life sentence and would be ineligible for parole for 30 years.

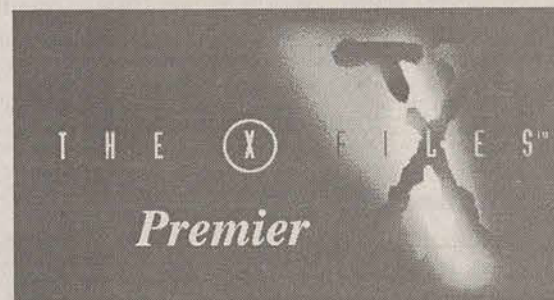

And, if students do decide to drink, hopefully they will be aware enough of the dangers to moderate their consumption and realize that there is no fun or glory in drinking yourself sick.

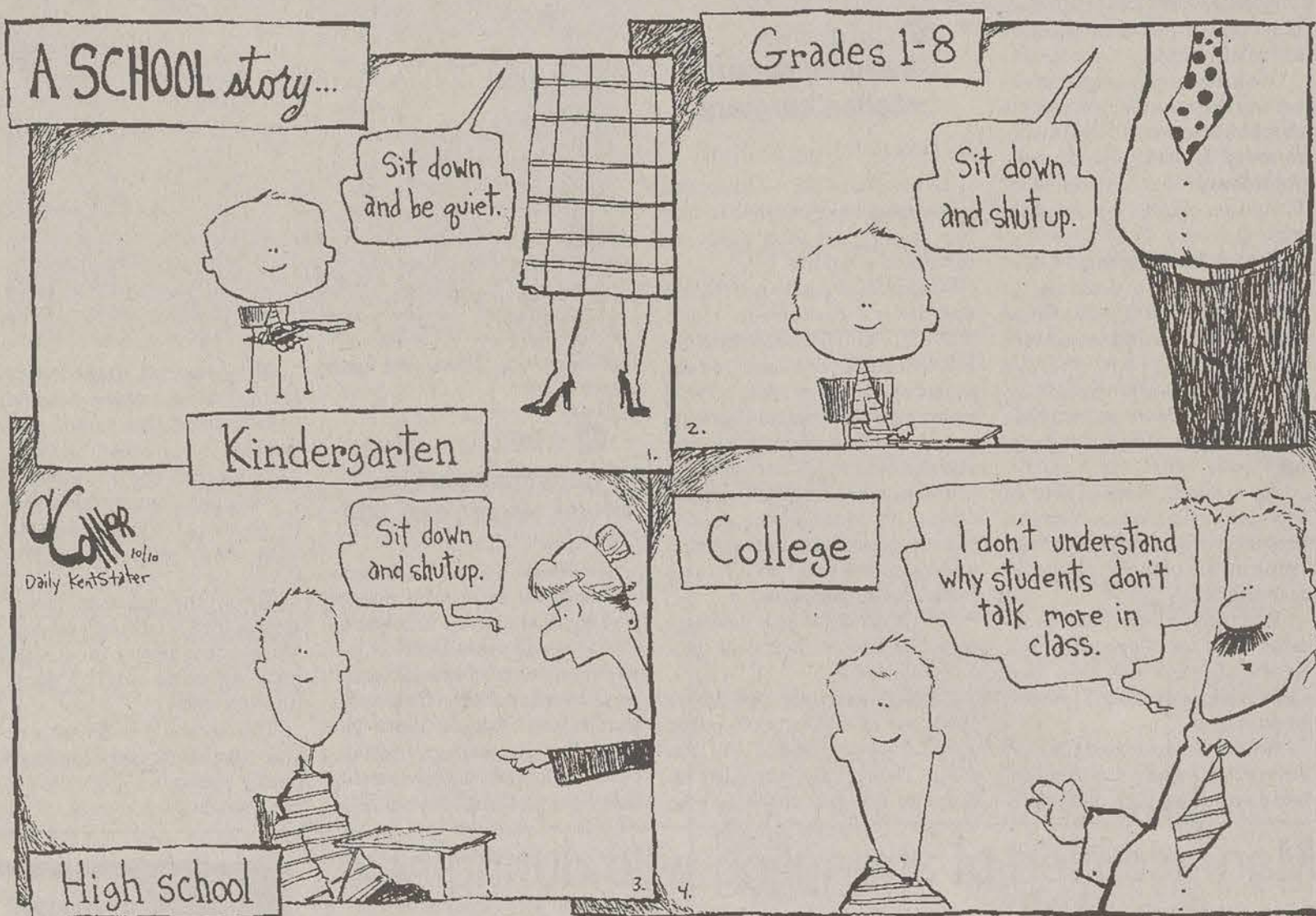

The next incident included a Phi Gamma Delta freshman from Massachusetts Institute of Technology who spent three days in a coma before succumbing to the inevitable.

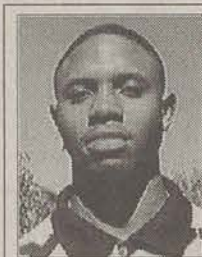

Although these incidents of binge drinking are very news worthy, members of Greek organizations feel they are being viewed as scapegoats due to a few isolated incidents.

I feel they have a valid argument to the recent stereotype that has been placed on Greeks.

Luckily, there hasn't been any reported binge drinking problems at GSU.

What we, here at GSU, haven't noticed is that a lot of

Student Handicap, which funds projects and programs for the disabled.

Push America is a non-profit organization and is the national outreach project of Pi Kappa Phi which raised \$35,000 for PUSH for the Roses Week at GSU last fall.

Every year, fraternities and sororities play a huge role in the sponsoring Black Awareness Month events. Without their help, speakers such as NAACP President Kweisi Mfume would never grace the GSU campus.

What about the national recognition Greek organizations receive each year?

A large majority of GSU students never hear about the events

Superior Chapter at the fraternity's annual meeting earlier this year.

GSU's Delta Nu Alpha transportation fraternity received the 1997 Student Chapter of the Year.

Who? What? I know those were a few, of probably many, questions readers would ask themselves.

The fraternity's goal is to promote transportation, develop students, and interact with the transportation community.

For the records, I'm not part of any Greek organization, but I sympathize for the bad reputation some of these organizations are receiving.

# Russell, Hill and 'D' down Dogs

As GSU fullback Roderick Russell

slowly walked out of Paulson Stadium Saturday afternoon with his family, he left behind the chants of "Russell, Russell, Russell" ringing through the afternoon air.

The reverberations of "Russell" were coming from local group of youngsters who were joyously chanting the senior fullback's name for good reason.

They had just witnessed him prance for 166 total yards on the ground and score three touchdowns — one of those a 63-yard touchdown reception — to help his Eagles to a 49-7 rout of The Citadel in front of a season-high 14,731 in attendance.

They also saw the Eagles, behind the inaugural start of quarterback Greg Hill, manage 496 yards of total offense in racking up the whopping 49 points, which now makes them the highest scoring Eagle team after eight games since the 1986 national championship winning GSU squad.

"The coaches really did a great job of simplifying the offense," Russell said after his gem of a performance. "They put in a new package this week just for The Citadel."

"The whole team did a great job today. As for the offense, we had a lot of confidence in Greg (Hill). He came out and did a great job and showed a lot of

leadership today."

Hill also did his usual by scampering for 64 yards and one touchdown and completed 6-of-14 with two passing touchdowns and no interceptions.

Aside from his 63-yard scoring pass to Russell, Corey Joyner caught the other scoring hurl.

"I thought Greg played an excellent football game," head coach Paul Johnson said. "We talked all week that he didn't have to go out there and win or lose the football game. All he had to do was play quarterback and execute, and he went out and did it. He's got so much

ability that if he goes out there and does that, he's going to make some big plays."

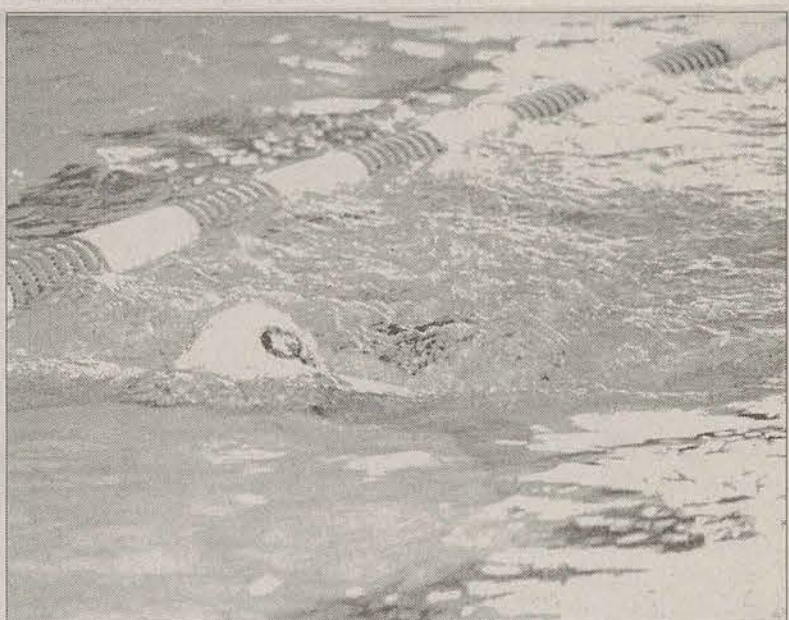
But Hill didn't run the show solo, and in fact, it was his supporting cast that ultimately made his first flight smoother.

Russell's 56-yard run to the endzone on the Eagles' opening

drive was a load off Hill's shoulders right at the beginning.

Hill then helped his own cause by running it in from seven yards out early in the second quarter, which saw two more Russell touchdowns and an Eric Meng 21-yard field goal before the half.

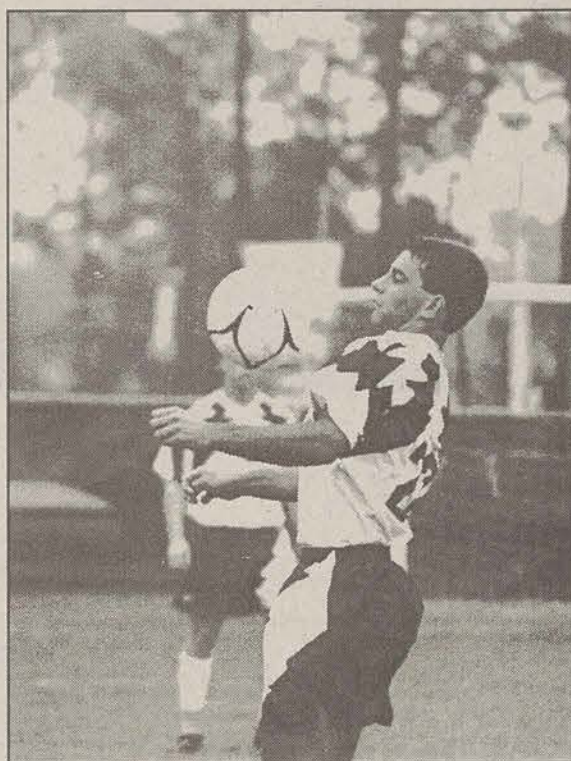

# ETSU hands GSU another SoCon defeat on season

The GSU Lady Eagle volleyball team was swept 15-13, 15-11, and 15-6 by East Tennessee State Saturday evening at Hanner Fieldhouse.

GSU (2-22, 0-11 SoCon) raced out to a 12-4 lead in the first game of the match. But ETSU (5-18, 3-7) then reeled off nine unanswered points, to take the lead, the game and eventually, the rest of the match.

Getting off to a good start in the first game of their matches has been a consistent pattern for the Lady Eagles.

However, the inability to sustain their momentum has plagued the Lady Eagles all year.

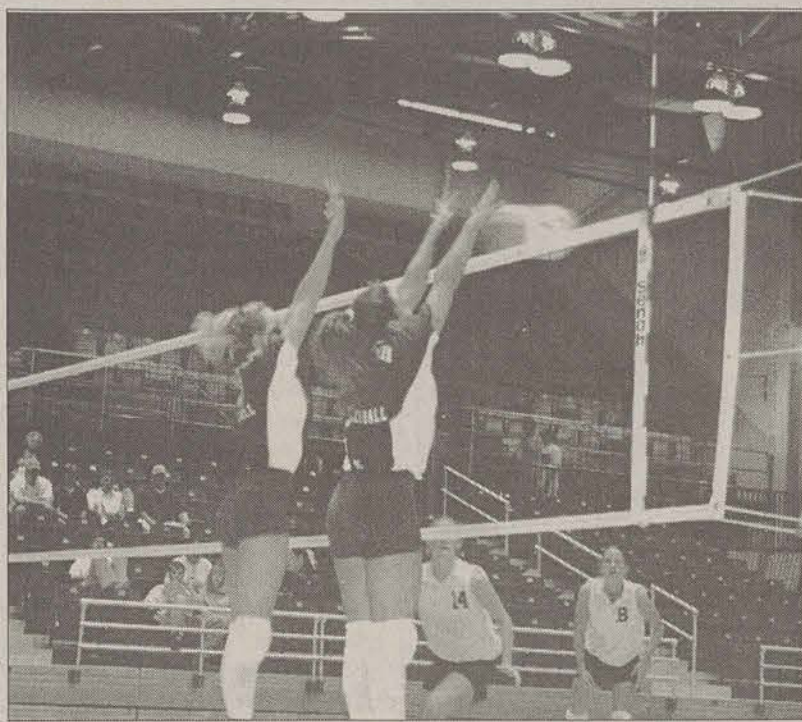
"Losing that early lead like we did in game one was a big setback for us," said GSU coach Eddie Matthews. "Our team-confidence kind of went out the window."

The loss extended the Lady Eagles' losing streak to six games.

GSU is currently ninth in the Southern Conference standings. They trail eighth-place Wofford by one game.

GSU needs to move past Wofford in order to play themselves into the Southern Conference tournament, which will be held at Hanner Fieldhouse on Nov. 21-23.

"We have to move up (in the standings)," said Matthews. "Only the top eight teams go to

the conference. We have to, at the very least, beat Wofford when we play them here to have a chance to go to the tournament."

Junior outside hitter April Rhodes, one of the few upperclassmen on the team, said this game, as well as the season, has been a very educational experience.

"I take it as a learning period for us," said Rhodes. "We have so many freshmen. It's definitely a learning experience, but I think we're taking each game and learning from our mistakes."

"We have our work cut out for

us," said Matthews on his views of his team qualifying for tournament play. "When you have a young team with that much pressure on them, you're hoping that they are going to respond in a positive way."

Despite the losing season, Matthews still feels confident in his team.

"I still feel that we can compete with any team in the conference," he said. "It's just a matter of matching up and taking that confidence that we have at the beginning of the first game, all the way through the match."

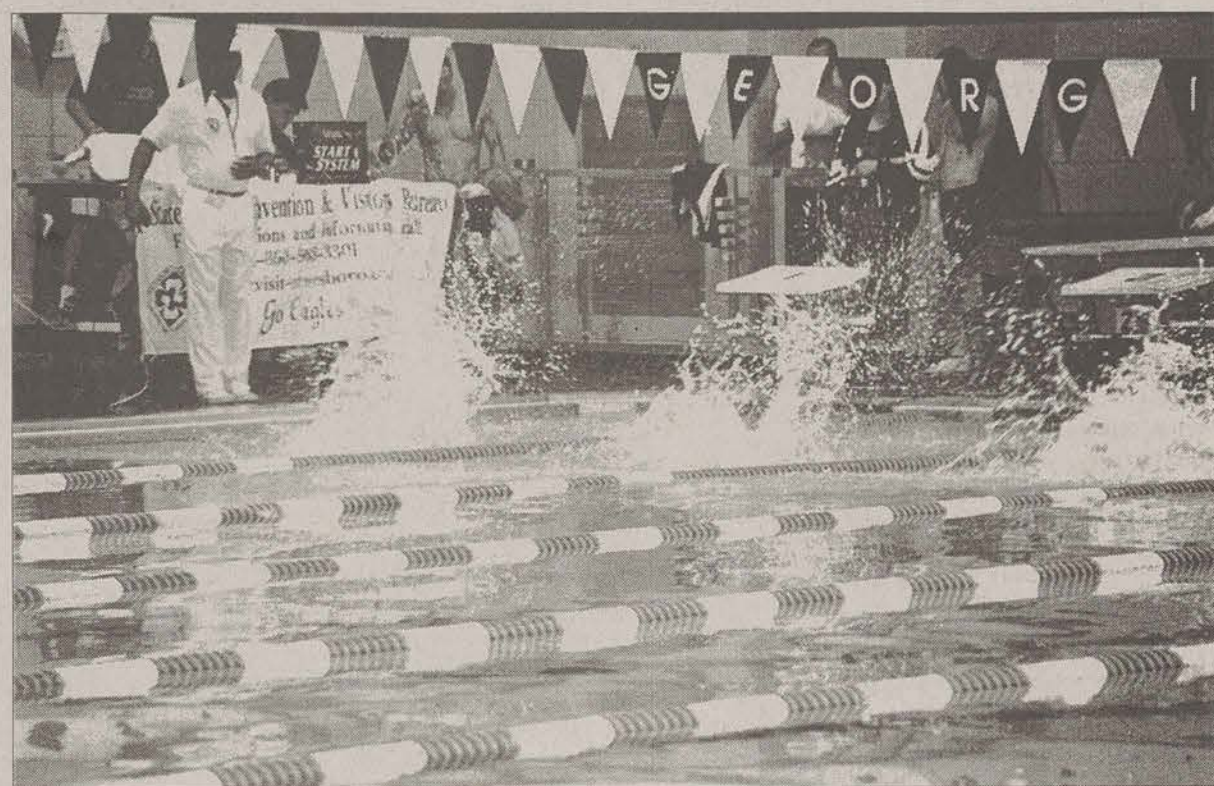
Other first-place finishes for the Lady Eagles included freshman Kelly Frost in the 200 individual medley (2:12.94) and

time horn sounded.

The Citadel scored their only points of the game in the second quarter, when quarterback Stanley Myers hit George Hampton after a fake running play on fourth and two.

Meng added a field goal of 38 yards in the third quarter. Tobias Stevenson took the option pitch and ran in a seven-yarder. And Joyner caught his 22-yard touchdown pass from Hill with 4:05 remaining in the third period.

The only scoring in the fourth quarter came when backup kicker Chris Chambers booted a 42-yard field goal with 7:14 remaining in the game.

Defensively, the Eagles had their way.

GSU recovered three fumbles and picked off two interceptions — both by Andrea Rogers — to put Hill and the offense in great field position all day.

"I thought they played great," Johnson said. "They put the offense in good position all day with turnovers and just stopping them. We wanted to try to stop them from running the ball going in, and what they finish with, 63 yards rushing? If you hold a running team under 100 yards rushing, you're usually going to win."

Georgia transfer Benjy Harris recovered two of the fumbles, with one of those recoveries coming after he batted down an option pitch by Myers and fell on the loose ball.

"Everybody on defense was just in the right place all day," Harris said. "It's hard to beat a team that is as solid as we were today. I didn't see many glitches in our armor today."

James Dickerson had six tackles to lead the Blue Bandit defense. Eric Davis, Ryan Hadden and Kiwaukee Thomas had five apiece. Voncellies Allen led the Eagles in the sacks category with two for a loss of 14 yards.

"Last year we spent hours trying to make it as creative as possible," Scott Vinson, a former worker, said. "There are so many details that have to be perfect."

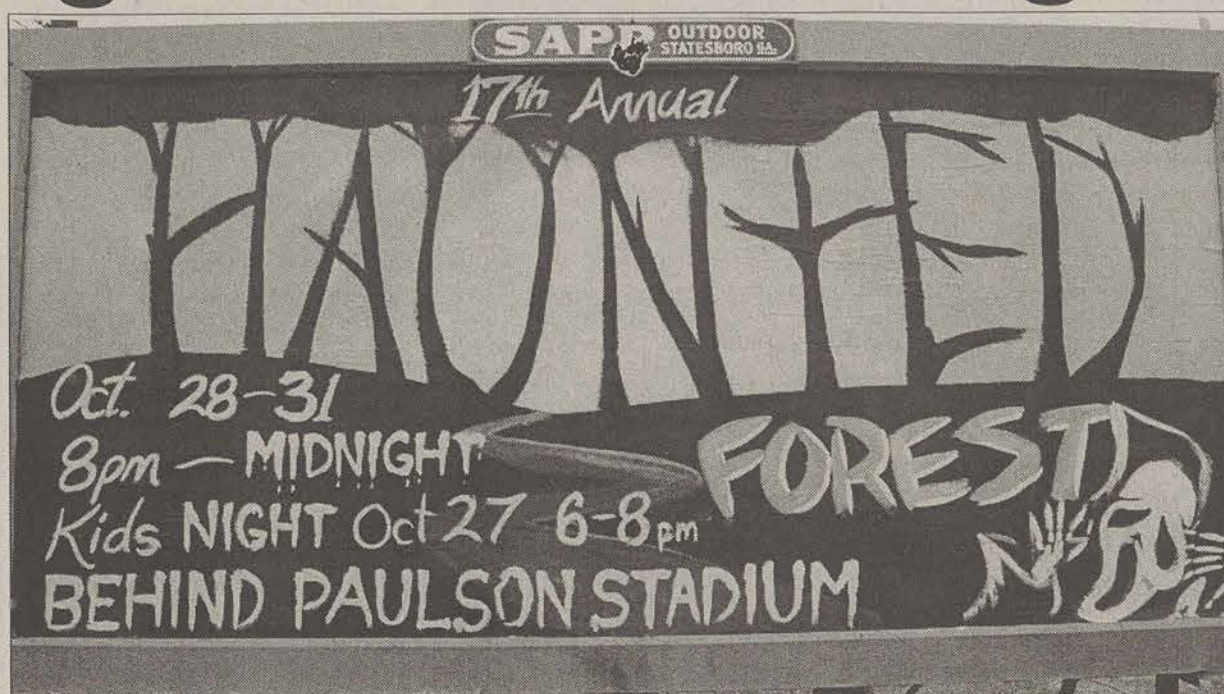
Due to the popularity of the Haunted Forest, be prepared to wait in line. Don't worry, the anticipation makes it all the more fun.

# Skate your way into the Winner's Circle

Racers start your engines...ready...set...skate! The racers make their way to the finish line and the winner is...is...Statesboro? Or as the owners of Winner's Circle skating center like to call it, 'Skatesboro.'

Dennis and Tina Hinton, originally from Tampa, have far-reaching plans for the newly-opened super-entertainment center. Winner's Circle Skateway, located at 5 College Plaza, offers the Statesboro community the opportunity to race into the fast lane and enjoy a new twist on the old notion of roller skating. But beyond the high-performance game areas and the colorful racing illustration, lay the legacy of a father's dream.

Before his father's passing over a year and a half ago, Dennis decided to continue the legacy of his father's dream and race for the gold in the roller skating industry, but this time doing it his way. After growing up on skates and competing professionally, Dennis knew a lot about the industry.

"My dad was the driving force behind my dreams and the most influential person in my life," Dennis said. "He had owned and operated a skating rink in the Tampa area for more than 20 years. My dad was getting older and more set in his ways. He didn't really want to change with the times. He thought skating would carry itself by itself. What you see is a frustrated son who never really got the chance to expand ideas the way I wanted."

In January, Dennis decided to close his late father's rink and search for a more unsaturated market. The market he was looking for ended up being Statesboro.

"I never take anything by chance; being a

Christian person, I feel that God directed our life," Dennis said.

He and his wife had been looking over possible places for a rink in New Port, Tenn. around Thanksgiving and came through Statesboro on their way to Metter. They stopped at the Chick-Fil-A and he asked one of the mothers at the restaurant if there was a skating rink in Statesboro. She said no, but she thought someone was building one in the old Rose's building.

"I was like 'No, someone had beaten me to it,'" he said. "So I drove around and sure enough, there was a sign in the window saying future skating rink. I looked in the window and, at that point, could tell that whoever owned the building was dead in the water. I contacted the person who owned the building; did some wheeling and dealing, and the rest is history."

One difference between Winner's Circle and other skating centers is its design. As you enter the rink, images of NASCAR, dragsters, and the winner's cup, add to the impression that you have just strapped on a pair of skates and taken your place at the starting line in hopes of taking home the gold.

Yet, the atmosphere doesn't just stop at the race track. If sensations of hunger enter your mind, you will need to pull in for a pit stop at the "Fuel Station," where you will have your choice of Hungry Howie's pizza and Subway sandwiches.

The racing theme was chosen because of concerns about how kid-oriented the rink could be with a college right next door.

"We wanted to be kid-friendly," Dennis said. "But not so hokey that the college crowd would think of us as a bubble gum place. So we did design out theme with both groups in mind and it is working out fantastic."

Dennis's strong belief in his lord has influenced the way in which his business is operated.

"There is much witness without having a lot of church symbols everywhere," he said. "For instance, you will never see any beer or cigarette sponsored racing cars here. You won't notice it at first, but you would notice it if you stayed in here long enough."

The Winner's Circle opened its doors to skaters from all walks of life. Skaters are permitted to bring their in-line skates.

"You won't see any extremely violent video games here either," he said.

Dennis said that one of the best compliments that he gets is when someone walks in and asks "Where do you skate?"

"We didn't want to look like a rink," he said. "We wanted to look like an entertainment center. We didn't want to be considered the local Mom and Pop skating rink. So we transformed it into something brand new."

The rink is circular with a pit stop area in the middle which includes pool tables and air hockey.

Though the Hintons do not have the rights to use the trademark NASCAR name, they have wooed many of NASCAR's sponsors to serve as Winner's Circle Supporters. Winner's Circle of Statesboro has become like NASCAR, also.

They offer local businesses the opportunity to promote their businesses at cost.

"We are just like a NASCAR car," Dennis said. "We have plans to load this rink with popular and well recognized images, which adds to the franchisability of the rink."

The Hintons' long term plans are to have nationwide Winner's Circle chains, which they hope will be picked up by a major racing company, further adding to the authenticity of their racing image.

"I will feel successful as a business man if this thing gets past three," Dennis said. "I'll say 'Hey, this thing can definitely work' and my father's dream will have finally been realized."

Let's suppose your parents only had two kids. Would you choose to be the oldest or the youngest? What if you had no other choice but to be the same age as your sibling?

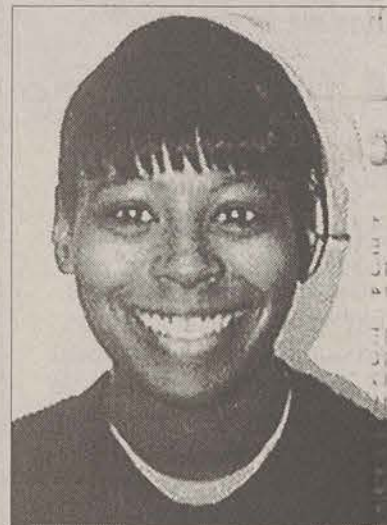

"Being a twin is just like having any another sibling," Harold said. "It's just that no one has control over the other because of age."

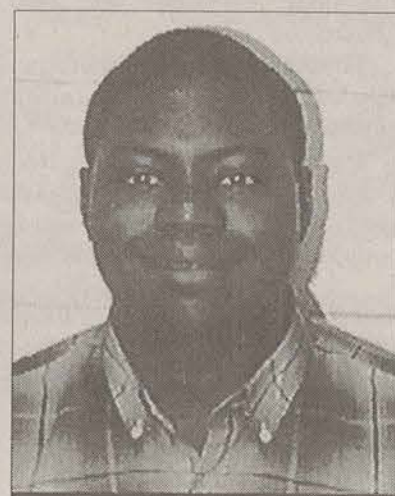
Nichole said she felt special to have a sibling her same age. "It's a gift from God," she said.

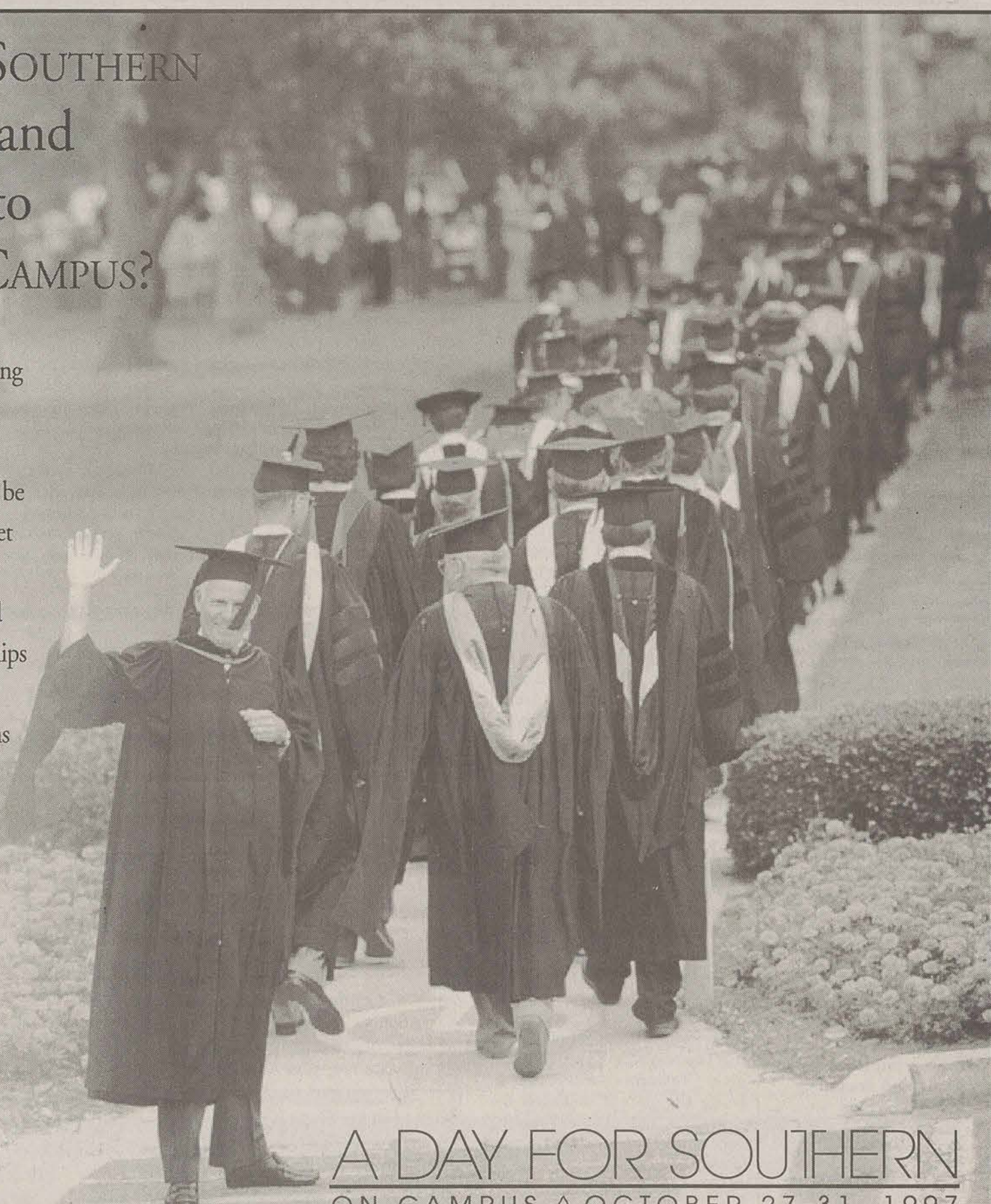

# Two former Citadel cadets respond to charges in a lawsuit filed by former female cadets

COLUMBIA, S.C. — Two former Citadel cadets accused of hazing and harassing female cadets say they never meant to hurt anyone.

Jimmy Saleeby and Justus Anderson broke their silence this week in court papers responding to Jeanie Mentavlos' lawsuit against them and the Charleston military college.

Saleeby of Charlotte, N.C. was dismissed from The Citadel for ordering another cadet to set fire to Mentavlos' sweat shirt a year ago.

He said only the sweat shirt's tag was lit "but it was not set maliciously, nor was it intended to cause harm."

He said Mentavlos also of Charlotte, N.C. "laughed about the incident and appeared not the least disturbed by it."

Saleeby said he kicked the fire

out with his tennis shoe so as not to touch Mentavlos with his hands "for fear of being accused of sexual harassment."

The other former cadet, Ander-

son of Wilmington, N.C. who resigned from the college last December with campus charges pending, responded to Mentavlos' accusations that he ordered her into an empty room and pushed a stack of stiff cardboard against her chin, forcing her head back against a bunk.

Anderson said he ordered Mentavlos three times to stop giggling, then called her aside

ing — assuming the exaggerated position of attention required of Citadel freshmen.

Mentavlos was not injured, Anderson said.

The two cadets and the college filed their responses Thursday in federal court in Columbia.

Kim Messer of Clover, the other female cadet who quit The Citadel in January claiming she had been driven out by hazing,

has filed a separate lawsuit in state Circuit Court in Charleston against Saleeby, Anderson and four other present and former cadets.

Mace and Lovetinska have said they were not hazed, and have contradicted some of the other two women's allegations.

In its response to Mentavlos' lawsuit, The Citadel admitted that she and Messer were hazed and said the cadets responsible were punished.

College officials denied they either knew of the hazing and intentionally failed to stop it, or they were negligent.

"Regrettably, these instances of misconduct were ... exacerbated if not encouraged by the conduct of the plaintiff" in not reporting them earlier, the school's response said.

The sweat shirt incident happened in mid-October, but school officials said Mentavlos did not report it until Dec. 12, when she told her brother, Mike, a Citadel senior.

After investigating the

women's charges, Citadel officials dismissed Saleeby and punished nine others. Three cadets, including Anderson, resigned rather than face a campus disciplinary board.

Anderson had already been punished for the cardboard incident by being demoted to the rank of private and given 10 hourlong "tours" of marching with a rifle.

Mentavlos said Anderson's punishment was too light and "gave a signal to the student body that the new female cadets were fair game for abusive treatment."

Anderson said the situation was just the opposite. He said, "It gave the male cadets every reason to believe that (Mentavlos) would 'tattle' without just cause and even about insignificant events, all the while embellishing and exaggerating."

not identified.

Willis, who attended another college and was despondent after his girlfriend broke up with him, drove 70 miles from his northern Panhandle home to the university's Evansdale campus. He first went to the woman's room before being told she was in Thompson's room in another dormitory, police said.

Two resident assistants and others who heard the gunshots gathered outside the open door as Willis put the handgun to his head.

"I thought I left this stuff in Philly. This is scary," said Mike Harrington, a freshman physi-

cal education major who lives one floor below the shooting scene.

University officials said they will review security and visitation policies in light of the shooting.

Several students thought security could be tighter.

A few suggested metal detectors.

Amanda Van Pletsen, a business major from Exton, Pa., said the university focuses so much attention on keeping alcohol out of the dorms that someone could easily walk in with a weapon.

"It's easier to bring a gun in here than beer," she said.
