Search for GSU president narrowed to five candidates

The presidential search and advisory committee has finished their role in GSU's search for the next president.

"The committee has done their duty, it is completely out of their hands," committee member, Jennifer Washburn said. "Right now it is under the control of the chancellor."

The presidential selection process moved into the final stages this week, as a list of five unranked names was submitted to the Chancellor's office by the search and advisory committee.

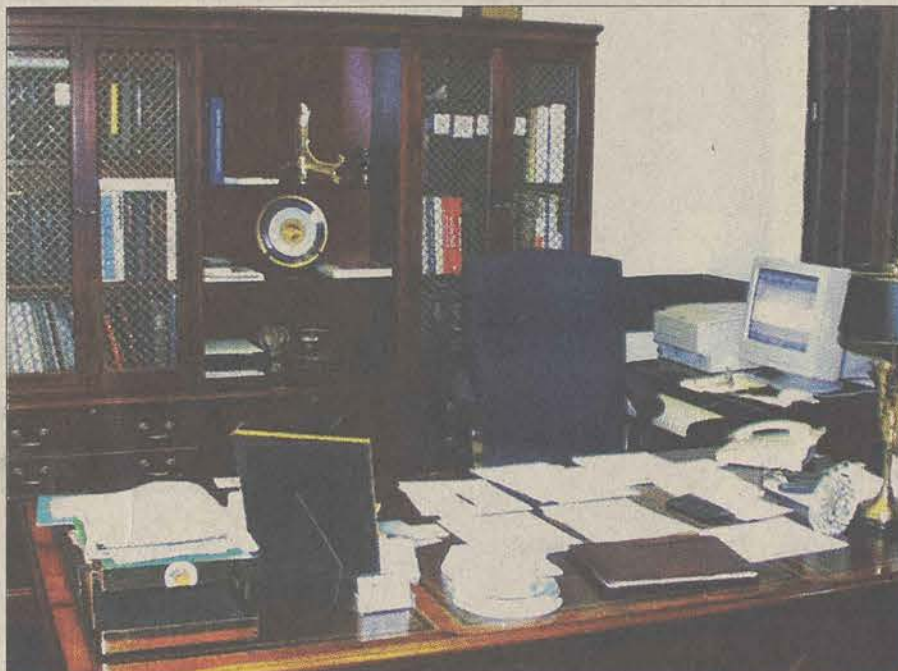
"The list has been sent," Trey Denton, chairman of the search and advisory committee said. "Our work is done."

According to Denton, now that the committee has submitted the list of five names to the Chancellor, the Chancellor in cooperation with the Special Regents' Committee and the Board of Regents will make the final selection.

"The committee has been directed by the Chancellor not to reveal the names of the five," he said. "The next communication, which will announce the three finalists 14 days prior to the meeting at which final action will be taken, will originate in the Chancellor's office."

This means that although the process has been narrowed down, there is still a ways to go until the next president of GSU is selected.

Denton said that the Chancellor might re-interview some of the candidates, do more background checking, or in some instances it is not uncommon for the Chancellor to visit the candidate on their home turf. Over the last few weeks, as the seven candidates toured campus, met with faculty, staff and student organizations across the

community, the search and advisory board was taking copious notes on the strengths and weaknesses of those seven candidates.

"The committee gathered evaluations of the candidates from faculty, staff, students, senior administrators and community representatives. The committee used these evaluations to help guide the selection of the five acceptable candidates," Denton said.

The committee, met this past weekend to determine the list of five names.

"It took time to review all the evaluations," Denton said. "But the candidates separated themselves."

Denton also said that getting to know the candidates on a more personal level, and even meeting with spouses made the decision a little tougher.

"In a short period of time we had a very intense

relationship," he said.

According to Denton the committee explored each candidates strengths and weaknesses.

"I feel confident that the committee came as close as possible to finding the ideal president," he said.

"Everyone was qualified," Washburn said. "There is no doubt about that. We just needed to find if a certain individual was a better fit for GSU."

The process worked well according to Washburn. She particularly liked the diversity of the committee.

"The diverse members helped to present all the different views that each member had," she said.

"Every committee member was looking for their own niche," Washburn said. "For example, the community member was looking for an individual who would be able to raise money in the community."

Washburn said that she had a different perspective.

"I represented the students, so I wanted to ensure that the next president would be available to them," she said. "As a student, I was looking for the candidate who had a student centered vision. Someone who had involvement with students on campus."

Denton is still proud of the quality of the candidates that appeared on campus, and he was also impressed with the way the events transpired.

"I was most proud that all the candidates left campus more excited about the opportunity than when they arrived," he said.

Both Washburn and Denton felt positive about the forums that were held in the Union.

"I was surprised at how many students came out [to the forums]," she said. "Students tended to be somewhat apathetic, but a lot of them came to the forums."

She said there was a good response from students, but she also said there would likely be more interest once the actual president is selected.

Denton said he was proud the committee decided to hold the forums in the Union.

"It was a place where all groups come together," he said. "This type of openness is part of who we are."

Denton said he was looking forward to going back to being a regular faculty member.

GSU student fees applied to useable campus services

Many students do not use all of the services and activities offered on campus, even though all students have to pay \$312 in student fees for each semester.

These services and activities are provided on campus strictly for student use, although some may question the benefit.

GSU charges several fees to fund student services and activities.

Students who are taking four or more hours a semester must pay health, activities, athletic, Recreation Activity Center (RAC) and technology fees. Those students who are taking less than four hours only have to pay the technology and RAC fee, according to the Office of Student Fees. Students do not have the option to refuse to pay these fees.

The \$37.50 technology fee allows students to use the computing, E-mail and Internet services on campus; the \$30 RAC fee helps pay back the money it cost to build the RAC; the \$114 athletic fee helps fund student's free admission to games and also helps support the teams and the cheerlead-

ers; the \$64 health fee gives students access to a doctor and nurse practitioners at the Health Services Center; and the \$64 activities fee helps support several clubs and activities on campus such as concerts and lectures, according to the *Eagle Eye Handbook*.

The athletic, health and activities fees are reviewed annually by boards made up of students, faculty and staff. The board's recommendations goes before the SGA, the Faculty Senate, and the president, according to Jack Nolen, vice president of student affairs.

The technology fee has been set on an experimental basis for three years with no increase by the Board of Regents. The regents sent monitors this year to evaluate the fee.

"They will make a recommendation to the Board of Regents whether we will be allowed to continue our technology fee and other institutions be able to add it," Nolen said.

These services and activities contribute to the reputation of the university, benefitting the student, according to Nolen.

"This level of activities, health and athletics is what helps make Georgia Southern what it is, therefore every student is going to benefit," Nolen said. "The reputation of Georgia Southern is tied in with what we do in things other than academics. Academics is obviously the key, but these other things help create the image and reputation of Georgia Southern."

Erin Helbling, a 1998 SOAR leader from Acworth, Ga., agrees that fees are essential to providing GSU with a good reputation.

"Most campuses focus on academics only, but our student fees give our school a more well-rounded education where we can experience things we can't normally experience," Helbling said.

John Crowe, a freshman from Alamo, Ga., admits that he has not taken advantage of most of the services or activities on campus but thinks paying fees for them is still necessary.

Crowe compares paying student fees to paying taxes. Someone may be upset they have to pay

them, but they are necessary to run a community.

The University of Georgia home page shows that UGA students pay fees for health, activities, athletics, transportation and the Ramsey Center (their equivalent of the RAC) totaling \$310 a semester.

Valdosta State University, a regional university like GSU, pays a \$236 student fee for health, athletics and activities according to their home page.

Nolen, however, believes it is hard to compare GSU's fees to those

of other schools because the services vary.

"We're not the highest, but we are at the higher end of fees," Nolen said.

Mitch Rogers, a sophomore from Claxton, Ga., believes that GSU students should be receiving more services because of the high fees they pay.

"I don't think we're getting our money's worth," Rogers said. "If we're one of the few schools paying forty bucks for technology, it seems ridiculous that we can't even register over the computer like most of the other schools in Georgia."

Helbling points out that many students are unaware of what student fees provide them.

"I think our campus should do more to tell students about these fees and activities and get students to use them," she said.

Nolen also believes that students should make use of the services and activities these fees provide.

"I encourage students to get involved in activities," he said. "That's why we have them here, because we think they are an important part of their education."

Students react to presidential impeachment proceedings

For the first time in over one hundred and thirty years, the nation is witnessing the trial of an American president. Brought up on charges of perjury, obstruction of justice and abuse of power, President Bill Clinton is facing Trent Lott and the Senate. Yet despite what many Republicans in the congress see as a clear cut case, many people on the GSU campus feel that Clinton should be let off the hypothetical hook.

According to Lois Duke-Whitaker, chair of the political science department said the majority of people feel that the job that he is doing outweighs any transgression that he may have committed behind closed doors.

"The job he has done is exemplary. Seventy percent of the nation agrees that the country is on the right track. We have a good economy and he's dealing with all the important domestic issues like health care, social security and education," she said.

Duke-Whitaker also said that not only is Clinton "politically astute," but that he is "attuned to the pulse of the nation."

The student body seems to feel the same way.

Several students have feelings of disdain about the entire procedure.

They feel that, as far as they are concerned, the country is in wonderful shape.

"Let him do a good job," Belynda Bidges, a GSU student, said. "Stop paying attention to the other stuff."

The sentiment seems to be common among the student body.

One student compared what is going on in the government to the infamous Salem witch hunts. In other words, she was referring to the fact that Clinton's political enemies dug up the allegations merely because they could not stick anything else to him.

"It's a witch hunt," Denise Childres, a GSU student said. "They can't find anything else better to get him with. Leave him be, he's doing a good job."

Janet Harvey said that the impeachment process should not have ever occurred.

"He shouldn't have been impeached for something that every politician has done," Harvey said. "Larry Flynt found that almost everyone of them has had extramarital affairs."

According to Harvey, Clinton is the best president this

country has had during her generation.

Harvey's latter point is a common one cited among the students as well.

They feel that he has reached out to their age group more than any other politician, especially president, ever has before.

It seems that many individuals at the student level find it easier to identify with Clinton and the work he is doing and has done as president.

"He's young. He's in tune with us. He doesn't try and pretend to be our peer. In a lot of ways, he is," Matt Simino, a GSU student, said.

Though the majority are behind Clinton, there remain some that are either totally against Clinton or indifferent all together.

"I really don't care," Cass Brannen said.

Nancy Holt is just tired of the entire situation. According to Holt, someone just needs to make a decision so that the rest of the country can get back on track.

Chakeva Harris described the matter as "crazy," and that society should just "leave it alone," she said.

And then there were Clinton's staunch adversaries.

According to Boehm, "it is important for college presidents to appeal to the students. GSU's students are the center of the universe," he said.

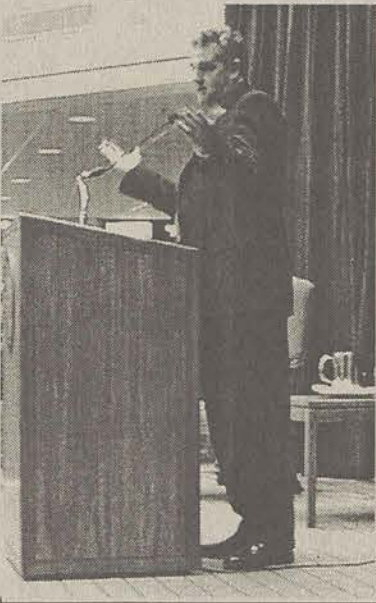
Boehm said that as president of GSU he would have daily interaction with students. He also said that students are at the center of his job.

Richard H. Wells brought the open question and answer forum to a more personal level on Jan. 19 when he said in order for a university to run smoothly the various individual relationships on campus must be maintained.

"I conceptualize the university as sets of relationships," Wells said. "The most important is faculty and student relationships. Many institutions are faculty centered, and they need to be more centered on relationships between faculty and the student." According to Wells, "the second most important relationship is the faculty/faculty and student/student relationship."

"Leadership should be viewed as much more of a group than individual phenomenon," he said. "In an academic community, an effective leader must understand and be committed to a shared governance structure that joins the core internal and external stakeholder groups."

He said that interaction between the student and the teacher, also the students and the fields of study are important to the vision of the university and his philosophy. "Knowledge is the fundamental material of the university," he said.

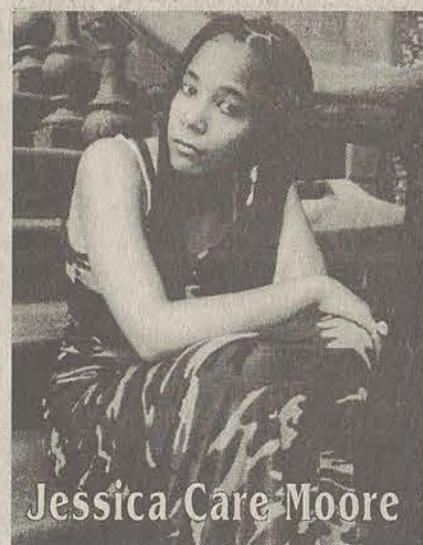
But quality of the university is just as significant to the presidential hopeful.

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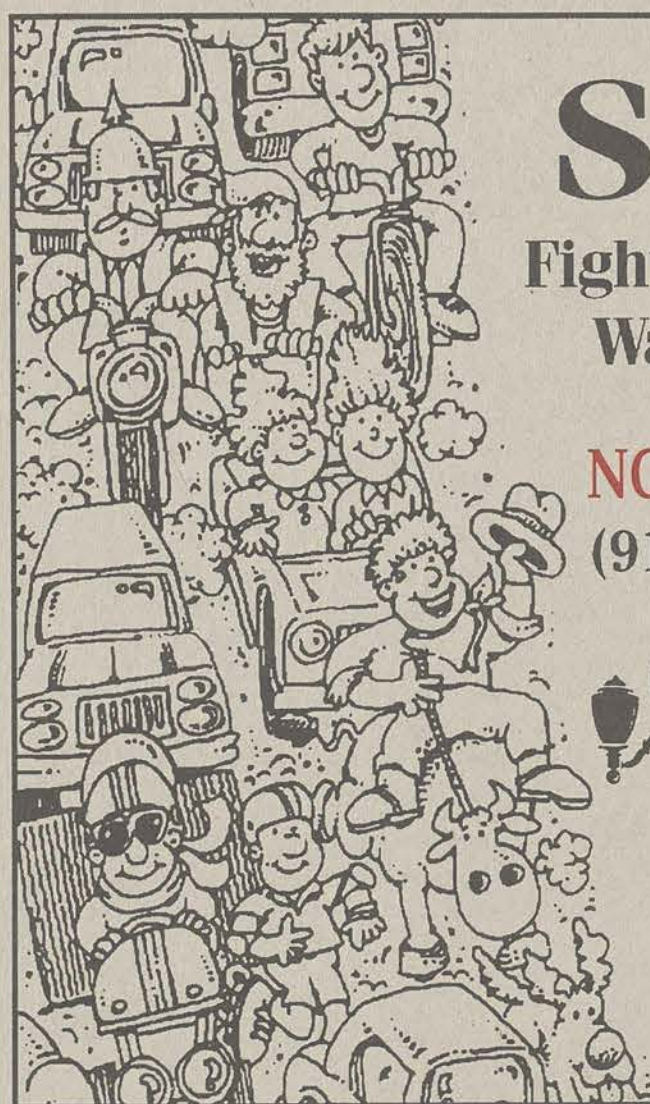

"In order to achieve the goal of a regional university, the wagons and the train all need to be pointing in the same direction," Poteat said. "All the wagons are certainly pointing in the same direction at GSU but at this juncture, it is obvious that strong leadership is required."

According to Poteat, she has what it takes to get the wagons in motion and then to keep them moving. Poteat is presently on a sabbatical, but she said that her interest in the European Enlightenment and the skills that she has attained in her area of expertise are useful to the presidential position.

Poteat said her resumé is not a typical resumé for a university president. But she said that she has a good record of leadership and working with diverse staff to support a curriculum. She said that she has what it takes to be an excellent teacher.

"Visions are compelling pictures of where we want to be, not where we are," he said. "They require lots of other people to be involved and require people to say yes, lets go for it."

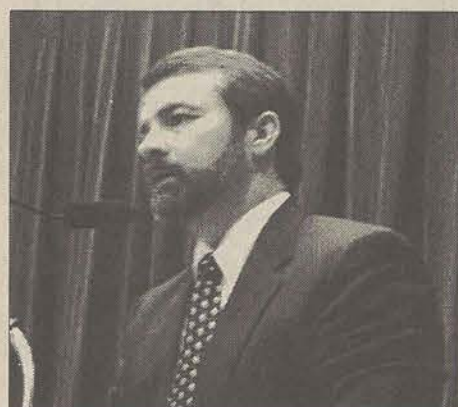

that it is time you seek some help."

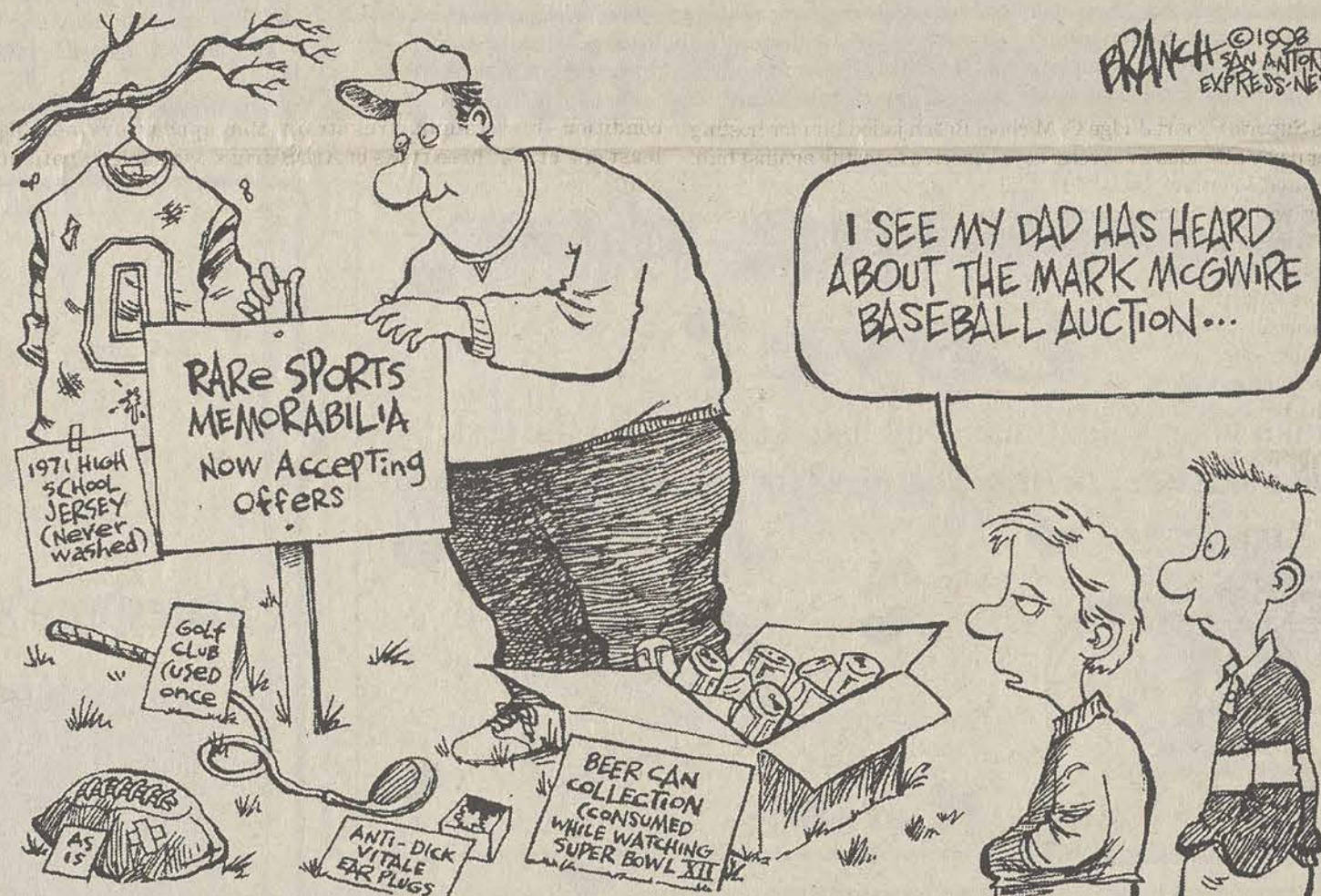

Turtles make more nests on Hilton Head Island

HILTON HEAD ISLAND, S.C. (AP) — Loggerhead sea turtles have made 49 more nests on Hilton Head Island in 1998 than they did a year earlier.

Officials at the island's Sea Turtle Protection Project said they found 141 nests this past year. For 1999, they are not expecting major changes.

Nourishment projects at South Beach and on Daufuskie Island could give the turtles more room for nesting, said Ed Drane, director of the island's Sea Turtle Protection Project. Daufuskie Island had 10 nests last year. Reasons for another strong nesting season include this year's mild temperature, Drane said.

Female loggerheads build about four nests a season and lay about 120 eggs every two weeks. The incubation period for the turtles is about 60 days.

Boy jailed for breaking terms of release in beating case

CANTON, Ga. (AP) — A Cherokee County teen-ager charged with murder in the beating of a 13-year-old neighbor at a school bus stop has been ordered back to jail for violating terms of his pretrial release.

Jonathan Miller, 15, broke down in tears and called out for his mother Friday as Superior Court Judge C. Michael Roach jailed him for hosting a slumber party attended by several boys expected to testify against him. Roach granted Jonathan a \$50,000 bond Dec. 3 and ordered him to "avoid all contact with the witnesses in this case." The Etowah High School sophomore is charged in the fatal Nov. 2 beating of Josh Belluardo, who was attacked near his home. Jonathan could face life in prison if convicted. Prosecutors said the three witnesses were among friends who visited Jonathan and his parents at their new home in Rome in late December and early January. Jonathan has been on house arrest since Roach approved his release. One condition was that Jonathan lived 15 miles from the cul-de-sac where he and Josh were neighbors.

AIDS virus gaining resistance to potent drug cocktails

DALLAS — The AIDS virus is quickly developing an ability to outmaneuver the potent drug cocktails that have helped many patients return to their daily routines, evidence from Dallas and four other cities suggests.

According to the research, about one in every 100 people who becomes infected with the human immunodeficiency virus will contract a disease that may defy all types of known medicines. The research represents the first broad tests of the spread of resistant infection in the United States.

People who contract these mutant HIV strains may not benefit from dramatic recent gains in AIDS treatment. They may also amplify the problem by passing this armored virus to others. And, given that drug resistance seems only to worsen once it gets a foothold, these less treatable forms of AIDS will probably be diagnosed in more and more patients.

"You put everything together, it's all very concerning," said Dr. Susan Little of the University of California, San Diego, who presented the data last Thursday in Chicago during the Sixth Conference on Retroviruses and Opportunistic Infections. The annual gathering is one of the country's premier AIDS research meetings.

Little's study also found that about 4 percent of people infected within the last year - and who have not taken anything for their condition - have caught virus strains that appear invulnerable to at least one of the three types of AIDS drugs available to patients. An additional 20 percent harbor viruses with a dulled sensitivity to treatment.

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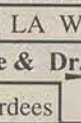
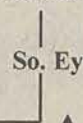
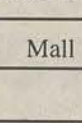

GSU Eagle slotback Corey Joyner now has an opportunity to realize his dream of playing professional football. The twenty-two year old Albany, Ga. native has signed a one-year contract with the Montreal Alouettes of the Canadian Football League.

"It feels pretty good right now," Joyner said. "I have a long way to go as far as getting a position on the team. I have to stay in good physical shape. Right now I just want to be humble and wait to see what happens."

Joyner will join the Montreal roster for the upcoming

Alouettes' team training camp. He will be following an ever-growing list of former Eagle football greats, such as Tracy Ham, Dexter Dawson and Chris Wright, who have played for the Montreal organization in the past.

The Alouettes are going to look at Joyner for one of their wide receiver positions. Throughout his collegiate career at GSU Joyner played slotback, which is essentially a combination of both the running back and wide receiver positions.

"It will be a great opportunity for Corey," GSU football head coach Paul Johnson said. "I'm real excited for him, and I'm sure he's going to make the best out of this opportunity. He's a very

talented individual."

Joyner has compiled a total of 532 rushing yards and three touchdowns off 88 carries during his collegiate career. As a receiver, he has accumulated 1,332 yards and ten touchdowns off 71 receptions.

During his senior year, Joyner was a key component of the I-AA National Champion runner-up Eagles. He was GSU's leading receiver, catching 24 passes for a total of 494 yards and three touchdowns during the regular season. He also gained 104 yards on the ground off 11 carries.

In the I-AA playoffs, Joyner had a breakout game in the semifinals against Western Il-

linois, catching three TD passes and piling up a total of 130 receiving yards.

Joyner's family is very excited about him turning pro.

"My family is pretty happy about it," he said. "They want to tell everybody. I told them not to, because I want to get established first."

Johnson said he has a lot of confidence in Joyner's abilities as a professional football player.

"He's blessed with a lot of ability," Johnson said. "He's an outstanding football player. Corey's got a lot of football smarts; he understands the game. Hopefully, he'll have a great career."

Young Eagles look for improvement in '99

After a trying '98 season from a very young team, the GSU Eagle baseball squad is gearing up for a much stronger '99 campaign. Still very young, the Eagles focused on almost every physical and mental aspect in the baseball textbook during the off-season.

GSU will return almost every position player from last year including standout catcher Michael Holder who received a medical redshirt last season. Holder will be one of only two seniors on the entire Eagles squad. Together the Eagles will suit up seven juniors and 18 freshmen and sophomores combined. "We feel pretty good," said Head Coach Jack Stallings about his young team. "We have had a lot of freshmen and we have played a lot of freshmen. Now they're a year older."

Pitching is usually the main focus for any team, and the Eagles will be no different. GSU lost two quality starters in Brian Hall and Clint Sauls. Coach Stallings has produced 11 talented, yet untested young pitchers that are all waiting to showcase their skills

starting with 21st ranked Georgia Tech at 1:30 p.m. Saturday afternoon. Junior Danny Washburn is the most experienced on the pitching staff under Stallings' coaching. Transfers Phillip Roland, a junior and Marty Jones, the only other senior, will also bring some leadership ability to the team.

"We brought in several freshmen pitchers and had a number of freshmen last year; so we feel that we have done a good job replacing them (the two seniors)." Six true freshmen were added to the pitching staff to create more depth to the starting rotation and bullpen.

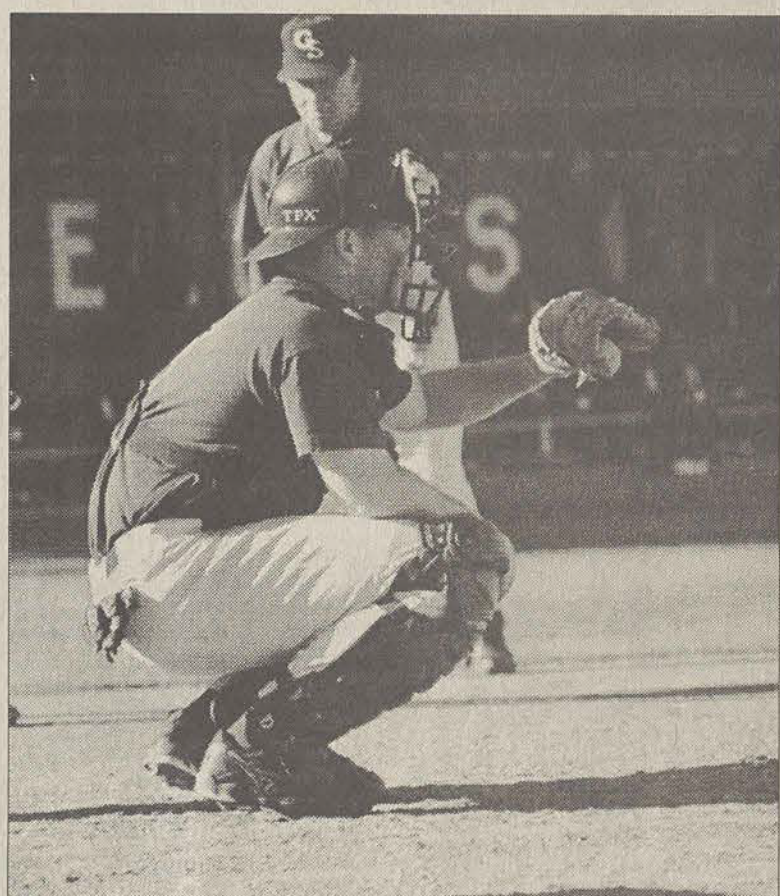
The youthful arms of GSU will need someone experienced behind the plate and they have received those someones in senior Michael Holder, junior Jimmy Alexander and junior Brett Griffin. Holder, who was a senior last year, was cleared to receive another shot at his senior season after being injured most of last season. Alexander took over much of the catching duties in '98. His leadership will be a key in the upcoming schedule. Griffin is a junior college transfer from

Middle Georgia and should be ready whenever called upon.

The Eagles return their entire starting infield from a year ago. Junior Jody Pollock heads a much improving Eagle defense.

"Our defense was a little shaky last year...we've grown a lot stronger defensively," said Stallings. Sophomores Dustin Langley, Scott Henley, and Matt Easterday are the most experienced of the infielders and are also very eager to get back in the swing of things. Scott Burks, who is also a sophomore, joins junior Ryan Petersen and redshirt freshman Josh Hinson to round out the Eagles talented infield.

The outfield will be another test for the Eagles on Saturday. GSU lost three outfielders from last year's squad due to personal reasons and will return the same amount. The '99 squad did manage to add transfer Jason Hinely and freshmen Chris Walker and J.R. Revere to increase the depth of the outfield. Junior Joe Dawson, a former UGA transfer, will return with sophomore Ryan Hadden and Brook Hoover brings a very big bat to any lineup.

Freshmen look to contribute to baseball team

If you ask GSU baseball coach Jack Stallings about the Eagle's freshman class this year, he'll tell you that to truly judge a class, you have to wait for two years to see how they progress. However, he is looking forward to this year's freshmen.

Stallings said, "We've got some guys who could make solid contributions to the success of the team."

Adam Dolak is a walk on, right-handed pitcher out of Douglasville, Ga. He led Lithia Springs High School to a 22-8 record his senior year, while firing two no-hitters. Stallings was very impressed with Dolak during fall tryouts and said he is coming along very well.

Another right-handed pitcher on this year's squad is Jason Cadenhead, who is out of Sprayberry High School in Marietta, Ga., where his father was the head coach. He posted a 7-4 mark his senior year while helping Sprayberry to the state title game. He also hit .376 with three homeruns and 38 RBIs that year.

"He was well trained in high school," Stallings said, "He has got a chance to pitch a lot this year."

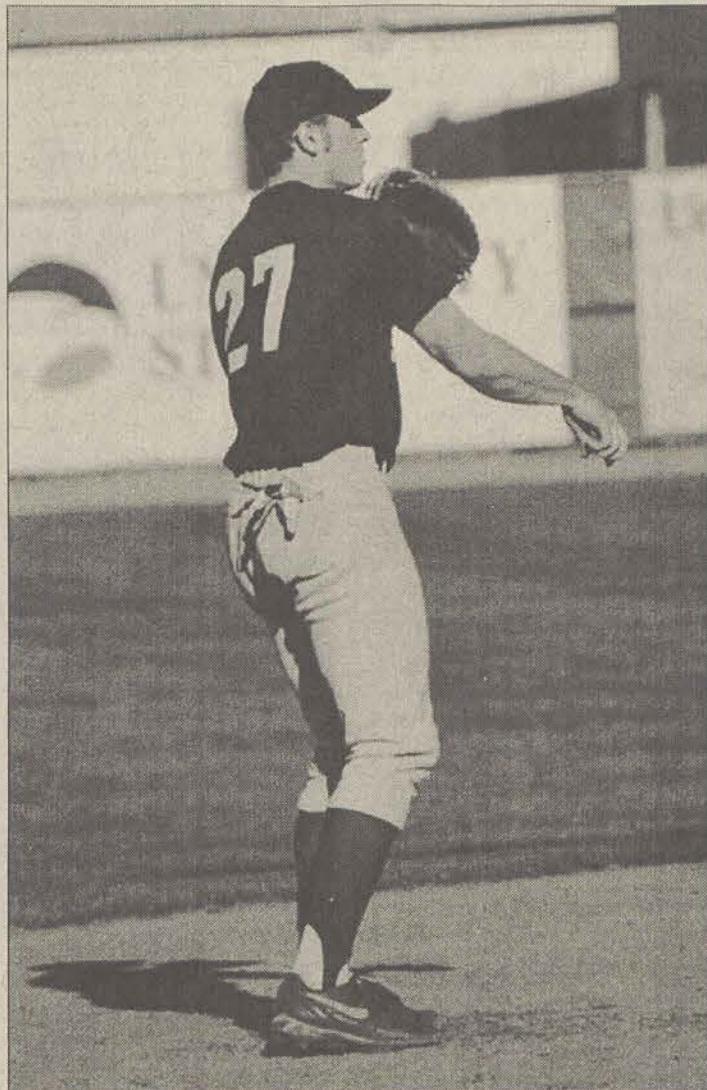
Dan Rothem is not your typical freshman. Out of Tel Aviv, Israel, Rothem was required to perform military service before continuing his education. "He's more mature, more disciplined than the average freshman" Stallings said. "He's the top pitcher for the Israeli National Team and was introduced to GSU through various camps and clinics held in Statesboro. He is a little behind because he has been in the military for three years ... but what he brings to our team is immeasurable."

Out of Jonesboro, Ga. is Brett Lewis, another right-handed pitcher. He was 22-9 in high school, compiling a perfect 8-0 record his sophomore year. He earned all-county and all-area honors all four years. Stallings believes that he could see a lot of action this year.

In the outfield, Chris Walker is out of Alpharetta, Ga. As a senior, he batted .350 with two homeruns, 17 RBIs and 10 stolen bases. "He's very fast, a very good base runner," Stallings said.

Jason Hinely is a sophomore transfer student from South Georgia Junior College, originally from nearby Effingham County High School. This outfielder hit .310 for SGJC with 3 homeruns and 18 RBIs his freshman season. He is a walk-on and the coaching staff said they are very pleased with how well he's done.

Another new face on the pitching staff this year is David Ray out of Conyers Ga. He posted a career mark of 26-6, while never having an ERA over 2.14 for a single season. He averaged more

than 80 strikeouts per season. Ray is another pitcher that Coach Stallings expects to see a lot of time on the mound.

A familiar face on the football field that's now going to try his hand at baseball is J. R. Revere. He was recruited with the understanding that he would be able to play baseball after his freshman year. Stallings is very impressed with his reaction time, especially since he took a year off to concentrate on football. Revere is expected to play outfielder this year for the Eagles.

Phillip Roland is a right-handed pitcher who transferred to GSU from Middle Georgia College.

"He was a fine pitcher there, and he'll be a fine pitcher at GSU," said Stallings said. "He knows what he's doing and will likely see a lot of action."

Marty Jones is a senior transfer from South Carolina. Because he transferred to another Division I school, he had to sit out a year, but this year he is expected to be the closer for GSU. Coach Stallings said he didn't know how USC let him get away.

Another transfer from Middle Georgia is junior catcher Brett Griffin. Stallings had high praise for his abilities behind the plate, but said he needs to work on his hitting, which he is working very hard to improve.

Josh Hinson is a redshirt freshman outfielder out of Mitchell, S. D. His high school didn't field a baseball team, so he played summer baseball, where he posted an 11-3 mark with a 2.77 ERA and seven saves. He batted .497 with five homeruns and 63 RBIs.

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Davidson turns back Eagle comeback

Despite a late second half rally by the Eagle men's basketball team the Davidson Wildcats, defending Southern Conference champions, held off GSU 77-73 last Monday night at Hanner Fieldhouse.

The loss extended the Eagle's losing streak to six games, and also negated an outstanding effort by GSU's back court tandem of Fernando Daniel and Quentin Martin, who both scored 21 points.

Davidson (15-8, 10-3 SoCon) entered the contest on a hot streak, winning eight out of their last nine games, including a 101-69 whipping of UNC Greensboro a couple nights before.

The Wildcats took advantage of early Eagle turnovers and cashed in with dunks off fast break opportunities.

In Davidson's halfcourt game, they used their excellent spacing on offense to score both inside and around the perimeter.

"They're beautiful to watch," GSU head coach Gregg Polinsky said. "But not fun to play. Everybody would have to play a little better than they played all year in order for us to win."

GSU (8-15, 4-9 SoCon) never led in the contest, and early in the second half, the Wildcats looked to bury the Eagles permanently.

Wildcat center Stephen Marshall's three pointer gave Davidson their biggest lead, 49-31 with more than 15 minutes left in the game.

But GSU reeled off five straight points off a three-pointer by Martin and a putback by Hamp Jones.

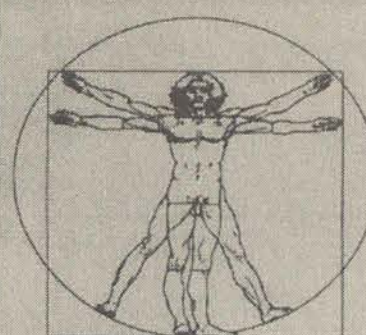

British Tea Room romantic, perfect for dates

The British Tea Room is a perfect place to take a date, the atmosphere and food are perfect for intimate conversation, and it is a change of pace from the local bar and grill.

I arrived Friday around 2:30 p.m. thinking the lunch crowd would be gone and I would be able to get seated easily. When I walked through the door, I was startled by the emptiness of the house. An older lady excused herself as she walked out the door carrying several bags. Immediately after she left, Carolyn Hiltten, owner of the Tea Room, came to the door and greeted me with an "oh dear," when she learned I was there for lunch.

"I just sent the rest of the food off with that lady for a sick friend." She went on to explain that lunch was only served from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. So, I asked if there was any room for their Friday night dinner. "Normally we require that reservations be made by noon," she explained with a sweet smile, "but since we only have two reservations tonight I can make an exception this once." Dinner was to begin at six and guests were

seated by Hiltten's husband. My date and I were given a table near a large marble fireplace complete with mantle and mirror.

I turned my attention to the dining rooms. They were decorated in an eclectic manner, with an abundance of antiques from varying eras. The entire restaurant was a mis-matched assemblage of furnishings and decorations. One table had three completely different chairs. Although the restaurant used nice silverware, no two pieces were from the same set. The overall effect of the place was homey and, at the same time, elegant.

The service was very fast; after

sitting only ten minutes we were already enjoying our salads. Soon after, we were given two fried shrimp cocktails along with tartar sauces.

Next, we were served a thick and hearty vegetable soup with fresh tomato, and not in too small a portion. Then we were presented with our entrees.

My mouth dropped in shock as Mr. Hiltten placed the steaming plate in front of me. I had ordered the chicken cordon bleu and it rose up from my plate like a great steaming mountain. There had to have been at least a pound of meat on my plate. Next to the chicken was a helping of seasoned mashed potatoes and a pear salad. The pear salad was half a pear nestled in a leaf of lettuce with a cream sauce, cheese, and cherry on top.

The chicken was juicy and delicious, stuffed full of ham and cheese sauce. The mashed potatoes, though clearly homemade, had no lumps and were coated with a fresh, hot gravy. The pear salad was interesting, sweet and tangy. The entire meal was splendid, just a little too much food for one person to eat at one sitting. I couldn't even eat half the chicken and took home enough food to constitute a full meal.

For desert I choose the apple pie, which turned out really to be peach pie. I didn't mind the difference, though, because the pie was so good. Unfortunately, I was so full from the rest of the meal I could only eat two bites before that too went in a box to take home.

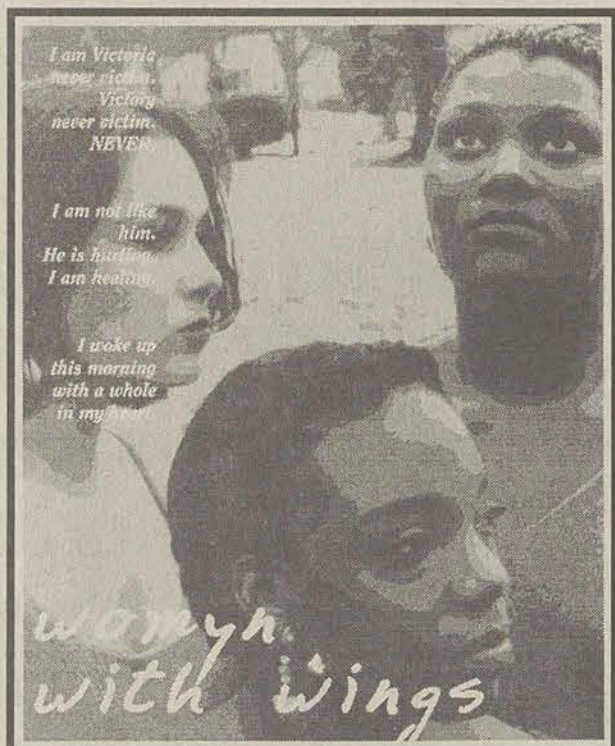
The British Tea Room serves dinner on Thursday and Friday evenings by reservation only. The menu is very limited. With dinner you get a drink, tossed salad, soup, along with the choice of one of three entrees, two of four sides, and one of five desserts all for \$10 plus tax. This might seem a little bit expensive, but you have to realize you are getting a lot of great food.

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Woodstock '99 to be in New York

Rome, N.Y.—It used to be home to bomb-toting Cold War B-52s. This summer, the former Griffiss Air Force Base will be the scene for three days of peace, love and music: A concert celebrating the 30th anniversary of Woodstock is coming to town.

Promoters are planning for as many as 250,000 people at Woodstock '99, which will be staged July 23-25. Local officials and concert organizers signed a preliminary agreement Thursday, signing the papers inside a chapel at the decommissioned air base.

No acts have been lined up yet for the event. Michael Lang of Woodstock Ventures said he hopes to have most acts in place by April. He said ticket prices would be comparable to the last Woodstock five years ago, around \$135.

While some residents were skeptical about turning their city into a supersized party, Mayor Joe Griffo heralded the economic benefits and said he was confident law enforcement and traffic officials would make Woodstock '99 work.

Griffo said organizers have guaranteed the city and county at least \$1 million. He added that the three-day show would double the population of Oneida County and could inject as much

as \$30 million into the local economy.

Since the original Woodstock in 1969, there have been several revivals of the concert, which riveted the attention of the country and became the symbol of a generation.

Woodstock '99 would be similar to the 25th anniversary concert in 1994 that attracted 350,000 people to Saugerties, N.Y., near the original site of the landmark concert, Lang said. Among the groups that played in Saugerties were Green Day, Aerosmith, Nine Inch Nails, Melissa Etheridge and Crosby, Stills and Nash.

Woodstock Ventures had been interested in returning to Saugerties, but when the crowds left, the 25th anniversary concert left the little town with a pot of money, a pile of garbage and some lingering resentment.

This year, residents threatened to sue to stop the show, and after the town asked for \$150,000 in permit fees, concert organizers decided to look for another location.

Shifting locations, after all, is a Woodstock tradition. Promoters of the original 1969 concert tried to bring it to several locales before finally getting permission to have the Who, Jimi Hendrix and dozens of other artists perform on Max Yasgur's farm in

Bethel, N.Y.

When Griffiss closed five years ago, it robbed the local community of more than 5,000 jobs and left a gaping hole in the economy. The base is now called Griffiss Business and Technology Park. It has about 40 tenants, including one of the Air Force's super research laboratories.

Lang said the base, about 40 miles east of Syracuse, made the perfect concert location. It has roads, water, sewer lines and the sprawling runways to provide enough room for parking, camping and the main stage.

While the concert was being promoted as an economic god-send, some Rome residents weren't happy to be hosting it.

Nancy Graves, whose home borders the airstrip, wondered about security. She also questioned whether teen-age concertgoers will spend much money in Rome.

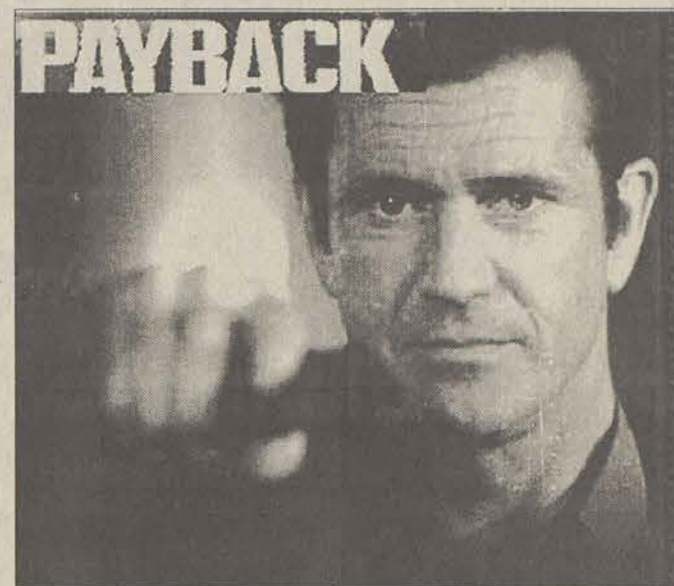
"They're lucky if they can afford the price of the ticket, a hot dog and a sleeping bag," she said.

Frank Discenza was another critic who wished Rome officials had learned something from the Saugerties experience.

"It's just absolutely crazy, to invite drug abuse, alcohol abuse and insanity into your community," he said. "I can't think of any good that could possibly come of it."

Bank on 'Payback' as good action flick

After his partner cheated him out of his share of loot and his wife shot him in the back and left him for dead, Porter (played by Mel Gibson) wants his money back, and he wants revenge. Porter's wife, it turns out, dies of a heroin overdose. But his sadist ex-partner Val has disappeared in New York City, and Porter goes on a bust-and-bruise tour of the underworld to locate Val and retrieve his money (a mere \$70,000).

Porter is a street-wise crook, amoral and despicable, but Gibson adds some charm to the character and comes across to the audience as a somewhat likable guy. At the beginning of the movie, Porter steals money from a homeless, crippled veteran to pay for breakfast, setting the tone for his character's indifference. However, the scene—Porter stops at the man's filthy feet and stoops over to take all his bills—is humorous instead of malicious, because the crippled man is really a charlatan, and Porter is simply stealing money that has already been "stolen." Throughout the course of the movie, Porter steals wallets, smokes hundreds of cigarettes, and kills many men (but he never physically harms any women; this lends a tiny touch of admirability to his character).

When Porter finally finds Val, he is living in a hotel operated by the Outfit, an organized crime syndicate. But Porter is not discouraged: Val proves to be an easy target, although he has no money with which to pay Porter back. After killing Val, Porter knows that the Outfit will seek

vengeance, so he wages war against the leading bosses of the syndicate in order to retrieve his money.

"Payback" is an extra-violent, sadistic shoot-em-up based—like John Boorman's neo-noir "Point Blank," starring Lee Marvin—on the novel "The Hunter" by Richard Stark. Partially shot on location in New York City, the lighting and the cinematography capture the cold, bleak blues and grays of the city streets.

Adding to the sordid atmosphere is a quirky jazz score that seems to make commentary upon the fickleness of the crooks and their indifference toward human life (the body count, while not Woo-worthy, is quite high). Vicious and unscrupulous, Gibson's character is nonetheless clever and charming. "Payback" is a well-paced actioner, and audiences will enjoy cheering Gibson on as he seeks revenge and gets his money.

Minister finds calling in music

Brookhaven, Miss.—Through the stacks and piles of sheet music and poems around his house, Thomas A. Moak Jr. still cannot grasp how 50 years have flown by since he devoted his life to being a minister of music.

"The years have crept up on me ... whew, time has flown by," Moak said, remembering the years.

Moak, a native of Bogue Chitto, started in the ministry in 1949. Though he has not always ministered in Brookhaven, he has always had ties to the area. He even married a Bogue Chitto

girl, the former Willa Jean Montgomery. They have been together 44 years.

Moak holds two degrees from New Orleans Baptist Theological Seminary. He is an ordained Baptist minister and has served churches in Louisiana, Tennessee and Mississippi for the past 48 years as Minister of Music and Minister of Education and Youth.

Over the years, Moak has been involved in every aspect of the church.

"I've been a minister of education, a minister of music, a secretary ... I've done it all," he said.

He said his double major in music and education during his eight years in seminary helped prepare him for all the responsibilities.

"The Lord has used it all, and I'm thankful for that."

However, he always knew his primary calling was in music.

"I've always been a musician," Moak said. "The Lord led me into it."

He began his music ministry as one of the pioneers in this area.

"People thought when you were called, you were called to preach," he said.

City tears down 13-year old junk art

Detroit, Mich.—Detroit has started tearing down a junk artist's symbols of a decaying city—polka-dotted piles of old shoes, discarded toys and car parts that have been a sore point with city officials for years.

Tyree Guyton's Heidelberg Project, named for the street it is on, stretches across abandoned buildings, vacant lots and occupied homes, including that of his mother.

The project has drawn thousands of viewers and is admired as "outsider art" by many. "City Council calls this an eyesore. All around here are abandoned structures," the street artist said. "My next project is the whole city. I'm going to polka dot the city." But neighbors complained it was causing a health hazard and drawing more traffic than the street was intended to accommodate. In

August, the Detroit City Council voted to dismantle it.

"This is one piece of blight the residents have wanted down for a long time," said Anthony Neely, spokesman for Detroit Mayor Dennis Archer. Part of it had been razed in 1991 during an earlier court challenge.

Crews on Friday continued the dismantling that began Thursday, despite a judge's criticism that the city had acted hastily when it began work with a court order that had not been signed. Judge Amy Hathaway set a hearing for Monday.

Some of the so-called junk art will remain because the demolition order only covers city-owned land.

Visitors from 75 countries have come to the 13-year-old project, where 200,000 signatures fill guest books.

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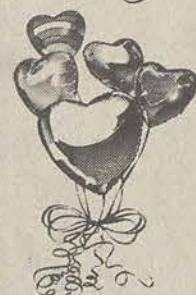
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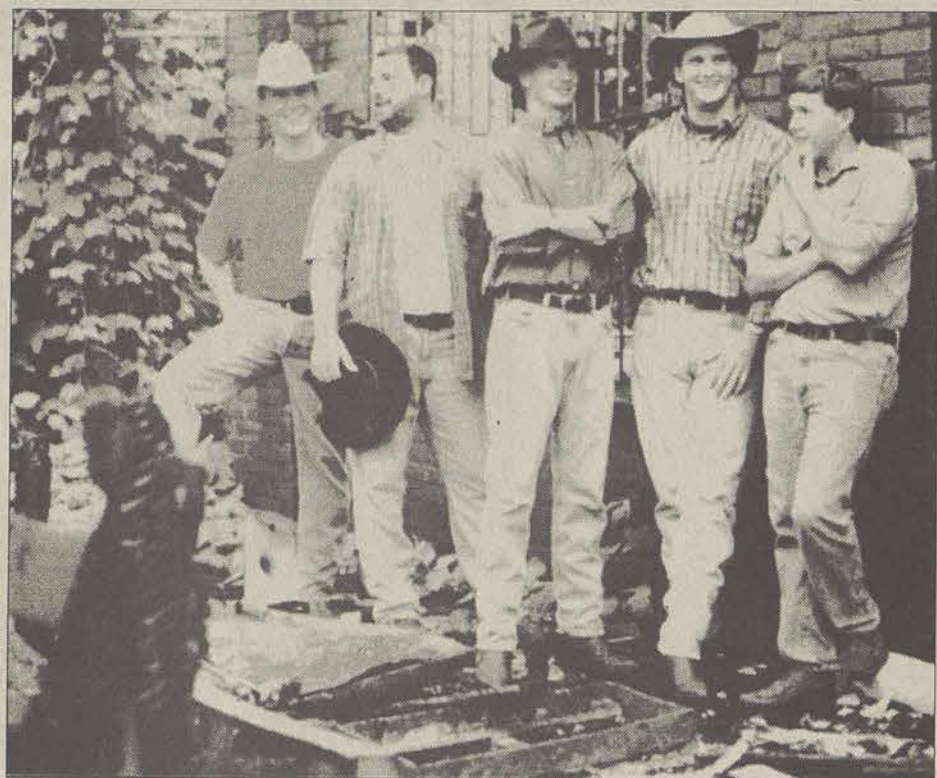

Surfers beware: 'Free' internet music

Mass.--Lycos' new Web site allowing users to search for any of a half-million online recordings may prove a boon to Internet-savvy music aficionados, but it also highlights the recording industry's problems with online bootleggers.

The proliferation of music in audio files on the Net is a growing corporate headache, as many of the songs are illegal copies made by those who are selling or giving them away online—without the companies taking a cut.

Lycos' new search engine looks up titles on the Internet that use a technology called MP3, a method of encoding music that allows computer users to download an entire album in about two hours and listen to it on a computer or a Walkman-like player.

"It has become associated with piracy because it's a simple and free way to distribute music," said

Nicholas DiGiacomo, a vice president of Scient Corporation, a consulting firm that has worked with the Recording Industry Association of America. "You look out there and there is a generation of people that think wrongly that music is free."

On Monday afternoon, hours after the new Lycos site was launched, the Recording Industry Association of America released a statement pledging to work with Lycos to fight copyright infringement.

"They have committed to work with us to develop procedures to eliminate infringing sites from their directory," the statement read, adding that federal law requires Lycos to "take appropriate action whenever they become aware of an infringing musical recording."

A Lycos representative said the company had no way to deter-

mine the copyright status of any music that its search engines discover, but would cooperate with the recording industry.

"We have agreed to work together on this and we will do what we are required to do," said spokesman Brian Payea, adding that the company wouldn't go out of its way to find offending links. "If somebody brings us information we can act, but we aren't going to launch our own investigation."

Illustrating the high demand for digital music, Lycos said the characters "MP3" are among the five most frequent search phrases requested on the company's search engines.

Lycos' new service differs from traditional searching in that it looks only for MP3 files and the database of those files is updated every hour to take in new titles and eliminate defunct Web sites.

Snooky's: A taste of home in the 'Boro

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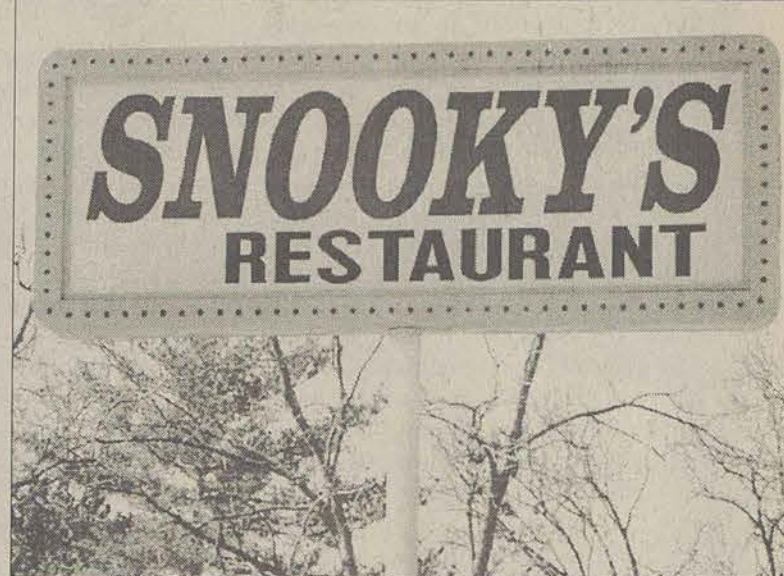

I'm in my third year at GSU, and I'd never been to Snooky's. This was largely due to the name. For some reason, Snooky's just doesn't sound like a name of a restaurant that I would like to eat at. Call me crazy.

For those of you who have never been to Snooky's, or didn't even know that it existed, here are some tips for you before you go. Finding Snooky's is pretty easy: It's officially located on E. Kennedy St., but a more useful description of their location is across from the practice fields and the soccer fields just on the other side of Main Street.

Second of all, Snooky's operates on a seat yourself ba-

sis, so don't stand in the doorway for ten minutes looking like a complete fool, like my friends and I did. Go inside and find yourself a seat. You do have a choice between smoking and non-smoking, but people will look at you funny if you start to smoke. Even though it is allowed, most people do not appreciate it when you light up.

Third, and probably most important is money. Bring cash or a check because that is all Snooky's accepts for payment.

Snooky's has a very relaxed, laid-back style, and the fact that you can choose your

own table makes it even more comfortable. They have tables for up to six people, but most seating is four person booths. The atmosphere isn't much to rave about. There are some cheesy decorations on the walls, but other than that there isn't much to speak of. Most of the people that I saw at Snooky's were older, however there were some GSU students there as well.

The food served there is all country-style cooking. It reminds me of Mama's back in Kennesaw, (those of you from around that are know what I'm talking about). It is a very relaxed dining location. No offense intended, but it's a "Good ol' boy" restaurant.

Now for the food. Snooky's doesn't offer the widest array of choices, but they do serve breakfast, lunch and dinner.

The breakfast menu consists of the usual items: eggs, pancakes, ham, french toast, and my personal favorite, steak and eggs. The average price you can expect to pay for your breakfast meal is \$4, but the menu items do range from \$2.95 to \$5.25.

The lunch menu offers sandwiches and burgers which range from \$2.05 to \$5.20. The average price you can expect to pay for your lunch menu is \$4.25. Snooky's offers burgers and sandwiches like mushroom & swiss, BLT, ham & cheese, and bacon cheeseburgers.

There aren't many things on the dinner menu that aren't on the lunch menu except a couple of choices like chicken and a sirloin steak. The dinner menu prices range from \$3.79 to \$6.59, with an average meal price costing \$5.

Snooky's also has a buffet plate you can get, but it's not an all-you-can-eat type of arrangement. The price is based upon what you get from the buffet. The choices available are chicken & dumplings, country fried steak and fried chicken. Buffet meals come with a serving of vegetables like corn, peas or green beans.

All the food I saw, including my meal, looked very good. Since I was only able to eat what I ordered, I can't speak for everyone else's food. Be aware that on the cheaper priced sandwiches fries are considered a side item, so don't let yourself be fooled into thinking you're saving a buck by downsizing. Though I'm not really sure fries are worth it, because the portion of fries you get is so small. However, everything was cooked properly and presented in a suitable manner.

One thing I liked best is that the server left the pitcher of sweet tea for us. That turned out to be a good thing since we only saw her two more times after she took our order; to bring us our food and give us the check.

Snooky's may sound like an unusual name for a restaurant, but don't let it fool you. I'll tell you right now, thought they may not serve up the most wonderful food you've ever had, what you pay for the meals they offer leave little room for complaints. Though I don't think I would eat there on a regular basis, Snooky's is a nice change of pace from the places I'm used to dining at.
