Southern warms up to Grube

New GSU President Bruce Grube is enjoying the warmth and southern hospitality of Statesboro. But he wasn't prepared to cut watermelons in his first public appearance.

"I'm not sure that it was cutting watermelons as much as it was chopping watermelons," Grube said. "I still have watermelon on my shirt. Next time I'm going to wear a wet suit."

Grube chopped the first of the summer melons with his wife Kathryn Grube and GSU employee Curtis Frink Tuesday morning. The cutting of the melons is a 51-year-old tradition of GSU that doubled as Grube's first public appearance as president.

Despite his lack of culinary abilities, Grube is ready to take the helm as the eleventh president of GSU. He was named president last March by the Board of Regents after an extensive search. Formerly Grube was president of St. Cloud State University in St. Cloud, Minn. A nationwide search was conducted to replace former GSU president Nick Henry resigned in April 1998.

Grube said that he had heard of GSU because of the acclaim of some academic programs, some distinguished faculty and athletic endeavors.

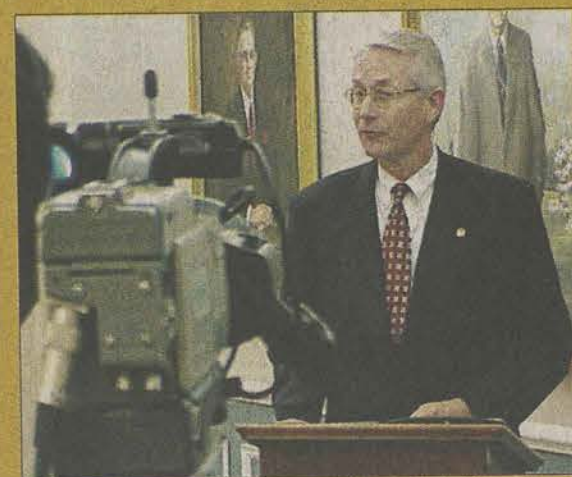
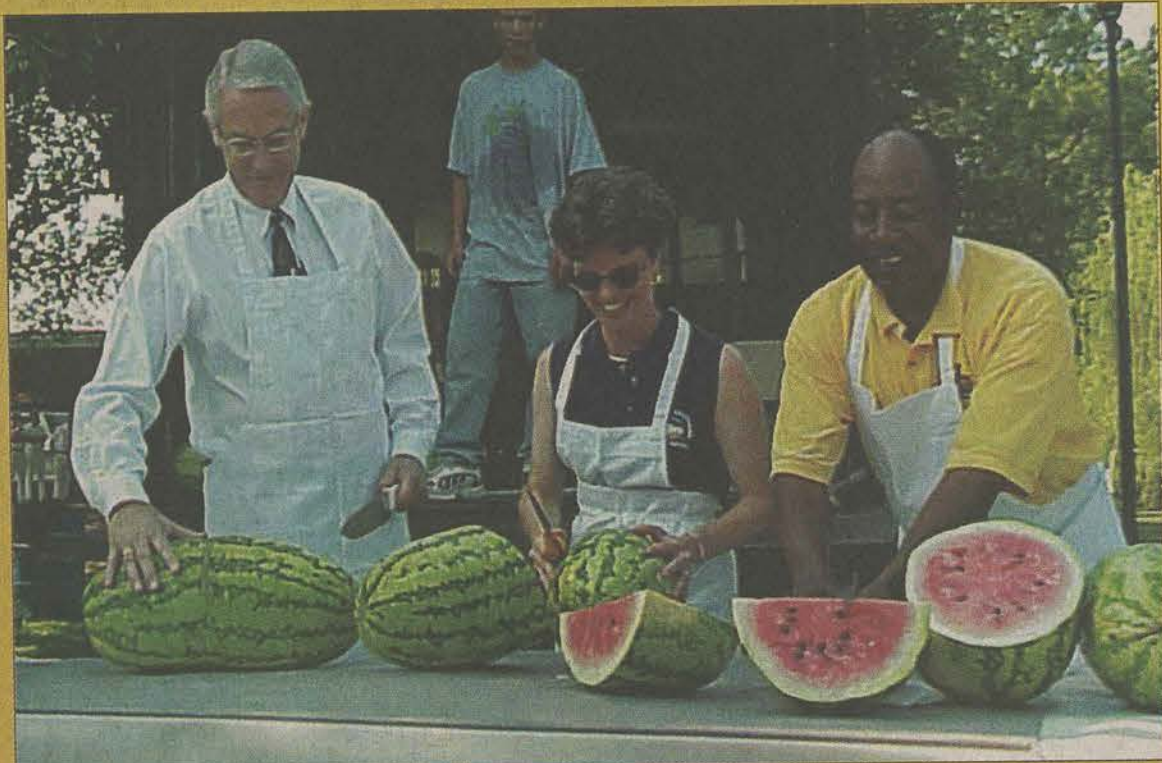
"I've been working at universities long enough to know where the better comprehensive universities are," he said. "Some of Georgia Southern's academic programs are nationally known. We have some faculty who are nationally known. Also, some of Georgia Southern's athletic achievements have gotten national publicity, too."

Credit should be given to Grube's wife Kathryn for encouraging him to actively pursue the position.

"Kathryn decided we should come to Georgia Southern before I decided," Grube said. "On our way back to Minnesota [from a visit to Statesboro], she lobbied me very heavily to see if I couldn't get this job."

Grube said the GSU got two-for-one when they hired him because his wife has always been very active in the community and the university. He said that he has lost track of everything his wife does, but she has been active in the United Way, the Girl Scouts and various symphonies.

"Kathryn is a very energetic and very genuine person," he said. "She's not only my wife; she is the very best friend I have."

President Grube got a kick out of the annual watermelon cutting Tuesday (above). He held his first formal press conference Wednesday (left and right).

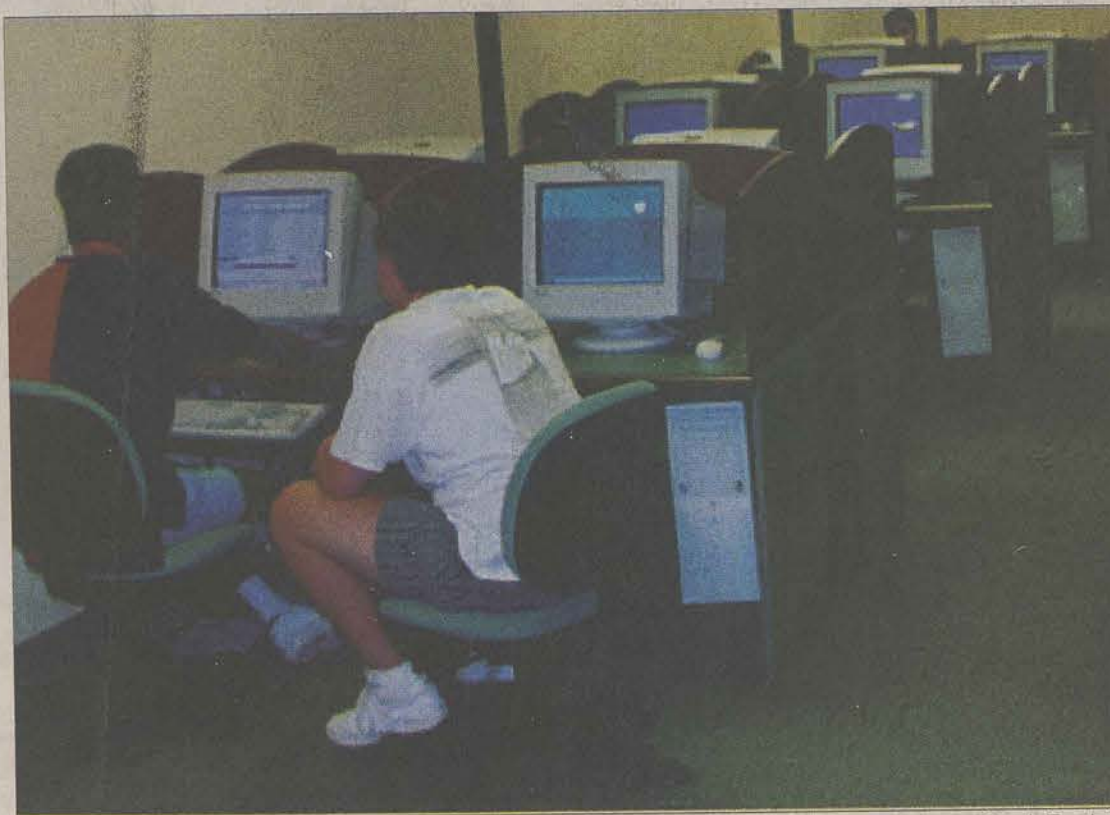


Grube spent part of his earlier years in Texas and said that he is glad to be back below the Mason-Dixon line. "Both Kathryn (his wife) and I felt that Statesboro and Georgia Southern kind of fit like a glove," he said.

He was born in small town Fort Huachuca, Ariz., and has lived in many small towns as well as large cities.

"I grew up in small towns," Grube said. "I like towns

Newest of computer labs opens at Landrum

A new computer lab in Landrum, which contains 24 computers and a single network printer connected to each unit opened June 15.

Matt Nichols, lab manager for computer services and technical support, said the lab is the result of more than eight months of planning. This includes purchasing the computers, setting them up, hiring assistants and lab construction.

The computers and related equipment were purchased using student technical fees.

Nichols, who is in charge of 12 other on-campus labs, said all the hard work to get the lab up and running was for the students.

"We want to give the students more options where they can work," Nichols said. "This is for

direct student support. We want to be a really wired campus; one of the most wired in Georgia. That's what we're shooting for."

The benefits of the new lab have already been felt among the students.

"I think it's convenient," J.J. Boudoin said. "I like it," Neeson Hollis said. "But I don't like the hours."

Nichols explained that the short hours were due to the shortened hours at Landrum during the summer session. He said there would be more hours available during fall semester.

Even as this lab opens, plans are underway for more. Another computer lab will soon be coming to the Union where Snackers was previously located. Nichols said this lab could be ready in 90 days.

Local long distance company unable to offer 10-10-321

Some Georgia Southern University students express frustration over the few long distance choices offered in Statesboro by Frontier Communications of Georgia.

Several new long distance savings choices, known as long distance dial-around numbers, have become available for use by the general public.

These dial-around numbers, 10-10-321 for example, allow callers to bypass their local phone

company when calling long distance.

GSU students, however, do not have the option to use dial-around services since Frontier Communications of Georgia, Statesboro's local phone service provider, does not participate in the recent dial-

around trend.

"Long distance rates are already high enough in Statesboro," GSU freshman Ellen Carter said. "It only seems fair that our phone company should comply with all the local rules and standards set up by the main company."

Richard Howard, the general manager of the local branch of Frontier Communications of Georgia said, "The phone company is complying with all the local rules and standards set up by the main company."

Shooting suspect known in school, community for racial leaflets

CHICAGO— One day last November, a crowd of 500 residents and students in Bloomington, Ind., marched through town in opposition to a campaign of racist leafletting during the previous months. As it snaked its way down the college town's main boulevard, the group faced a lone protester who was carrying a placard that read, "No hate speech means no free speech."

The bearer of the placard was

Benjamin Nathaniel Smith. Then a sophomore at Indiana University, Smith acknowledged he was responsible for the pamphlets, according to people who knew of him on campus.

On Sunday, Smith, who also was alleged to have distributed racist literature earlier this year in Wilmette, Ill., the town where he grew up, emerged again: He was charged in an arrest warrant with the shooting death of a student in Bloomington, and police say that incident is linked to a three-day

string of shootings in two states that appear to be racially motivated.

Late Sunday, federal and Chicago authorities said the search for Smith ended with his death in downstate Salem, Ill.

While it remains unclear why a student from the North Shore turned to the white power movement, a paper trail over the past two years and interviews with people who knew him indicate that he was committed to the cause.

Long distance providers like 10-10-321 are separate companies and local companies like Frontier do not simply have the option to participate, Howard said.

In order to participate, the long distance provider has to come to Frontier and request that we carry their service, Howard said.

Large companies like the one operating the 10-10-321 program

look for large areas like Atlanta to operate in at first. Statesboro is too small for many large long distance companies to notice. It will take time for us to be noticed, Howard said.

"Unfortunately," Howard said, "students do not have the power to request a service like 10-10-321. However, if a long distance provider, like 10-10-321, requests that we carry

their service we can't refuse."

Students and residents alike do not understand this process, Howard said.

Though Frontier does not offer 10-10-321 and similar dial-around options the company does offer some discounts that come in the form of savings plans that can be selected when purchasing phone service, said Howard.

"We need to make sure others understand the excellence of the programs and the people," Grube said.

Grube said that he will be found all over campus. He said he enjoys attending plays, musical

events, lectures and sporting events.

He said that he enjoys interaction with faculty and students and will strive to be accessible to both facets of the university community.

"I enjoy people a great deal," he said. "The people who are working hard to make Georgia Southern a better place are the people I want to meet."

Grube said that he wants GSU to be student-centered with an environment where students are comfortable and are learning. He said that this includes everything from hiring and supporting a strong staff and faculty to maintaining good student services.

"Being student-centered should be part of the university's strategic plan," Grube said. "We need to continue working to improve upon what we are doing. We will never get it perfect, but we are doing well."

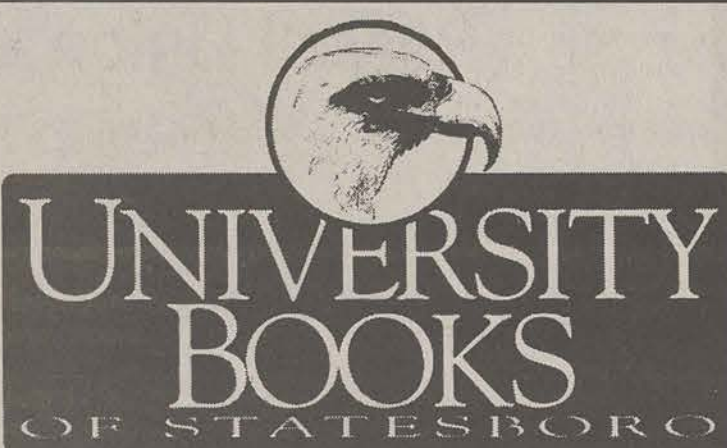
Part of this vision will include being accessible to students, Grube said. He said he hopes to hold a student forum once a term to hear what students are saying.

"I need to hear pretty directly from students," he said. "[I want] a student to leave this campus as a cultured, educated person. That is the most important gift a university can give to a student."

He said he enjoys interacting with students and has their best interests at heart. He added that students are fun to be with.

"Being with a group of students and talking about university life can be a whole lot more interesting than sitting through any number of dull meetings," he said.

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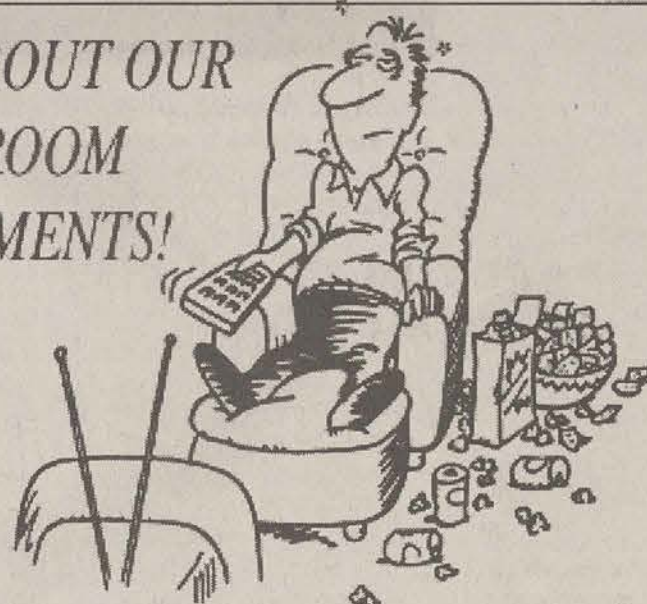

Curse of pink flamingos raising money for library

RICHMOND—Residents in Richmond are running around cursing one another.

They're not using swear words. They're laying curses on one another's lawns.

The "curses" are actually pink lawn flamingos, and whether having them in one's yard is actually a curse is more a matter of individual taste.

The gawky plastic waterfowl are being planted in yards with messages that read "The curse of the pink flamingo has landed on your lawn."

All it takes to get rid of the feathered curse is a donation to the privately run, nonprofit Umberhine Library. Then the curser can become the curser and plant the flamingo on someone else's lawn.

The faux birds themselves came from a former library board member who had a bag of them in her barn, leftover from a theme wedding.

The dozen or so pink ornaments have brought in donations ranging from \$1 to \$100. The library already has made \$1,000 this summer, library officials said. The money will be used for an expansion.

"I think we'll keep it going all summer. By then it should have hit everybody in town," said Joyce McKenney, president

of the library board. "They usually show up on your lawn overnight, or sometimes while you're at work."

The planting of the pink flamingos has garnered only one negative response, she said.

"Most people think it's great; they're having a lot of fun with it," McKenney said. "The other day the police department got cursed."

Others have made a game out of it.

"One was put on someone's lawn for a birthday. The flamingo was boxed up, like a present, with a ribbon, with only the legs sticking out of the box. I think that one still has the ribbon on it," she said.

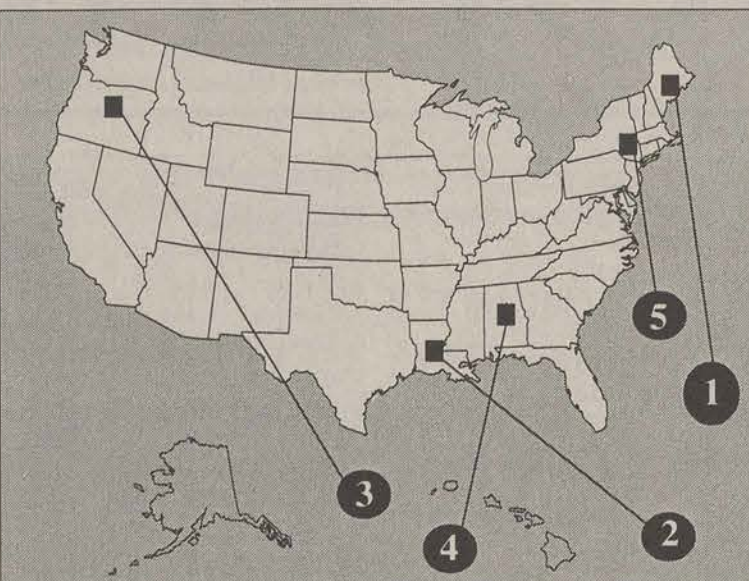
Man sues after back tattooed in Chinese

GRETNA— Jeremy Van Camp prefers to keep his back against the wall these days.

A tattoo artist commissioned to inscribe Van Camp's first name in Chinese on his back instead inked six Chinese characters whose meaning isn't even close, Van Camp says in a lawsuit.

"'Kung Po karate, martial arts expert, and Shaolin fifth.' That's what it says on my back," said Van Camp, 23. Shaolin is a form of kung fu.

According to the lawsuit filed this week, Van Camp saw a poster at Brad's Westbank Tattoo labeled as the Chinese al-



phabet. So he decided to have his name tattooed, and a tattoo artist inscribed the characters listed as "J," "E," "R," and so on, on the poster.

Trouble is, the English and Chinese languages are vastly different, and letters in English have no direct counterparts in Chinese.

Van Camp is demanding the tattoo company pay for laser surgery to remove the tattoo and to compensate him for his embarrassment and for the pain and suffering of tattoo removal.

Brad Fox, owner of Brad's Westbank Tattoo, did not return calls. An employee there said the character sheet was sold by a tattoo supply company in Voorheesville, N.Y., which referred calls to J.D. Crowe of Ancient Art Tattoo Studio of Yorktown, Va.

Crowe said he couldn't recall if the design in question was his.

KFC mystery: where's Colonel Sanders?

ASTORIA— It's a Kentucky Fried mystery: Where's Colonel Sanders? Ever since the plastic statue of the white-goateed Southern gentleman turned up missing from one of the chicken restaurants two weeks ago, police have found it as elusive as the secret recipe of 11 herbs and spices.

The crispiest lead yet turned out soggy last Thursday when police searched a house across the street from the restaurant where the statue was stolen. Another empty bucket.

"We came up with no Colonel. We found no pieces of the Colonel," said Sgt. Brad Johnston.

Someone unbolted the colonel from his perch on a bench at the

front door of the restaurant and made off with him, breaking one ankle in the process.

One shiny black loafer is all that's left of the plastic colonel. The real one, KFC patriarch Harland Sanders, died in 1980 at the age of 90.

Johnston said investigators had pretty good information the statue had been seen at the house, but they have also heard rumors it was tossed off the Astoria Bridge into the Columbia River.

Back at the restaurant, manager Todd Gibbons said someone called demanding \$10,000 ransom for the statue, but Gibbons told them it was worth only \$1,500. He's offering a \$200 reward for its return.

"We have people walk in singing 'I Ain't Got No Body,'" he joked.

Birmingham ranks near top of itchy city list

BIRMINGHAM — Folks in Birmingham might feel a bit uncomfortable this summer. Scientists have rated the city one of the itchiest in the nation.

The scientific index is based on summer pests, such as mosquitoes and poison ivy. Last year's index ranked Birmingham No. 10 out of 400 cities.

It's too soon to tell how much scratching will go on this year. The index, updated by University of Delaware climatologists for Lanacane skin care products,

won't calculate Birmingham's ranking for 1999 until September.

"They look at three things, and we have all three: plants, sunlight and mosquitoes," said Dr. Patricia Mercado, assistant professor of dermatology at the University of Alabama at Birmingham.

Birmingham wasn't the only Southern city with a high-itch factor. Eight of the top ten cities were either in a Southern state or bordered one. Knoxville, Tenn., and Nashville, Tenn., came in first and second respectively. Pocatello, Idaho, was ranked the least scratchy city.

Hot dog trophy comes back to U.S.

NEW YORK— Every dog has its day. And on Coney Island, that day was last Sunday, when a 317-pound man from southern New Jersey beat out the reigning hot dog eating champ from Japan to become top dog in the annual July Fourth contest at Nathan's Famous.

Steve Keiner, 50, of Egg Harbor Township, N.J., ate 20 and one-quarter hot dogs in 12 minutes, buns and all. He beat 134-pound Hirofumi Nakajima of Japan, who'd won the contest the past two years.

"I took the Zen approach," Keiner said, acknowledging his competitor's cultural influence. "I went down a path that the hot dog was one with me, and I was one with the universe. Could I get some french fries now?"

SPAM: not just a cultural icon — it's a lunch meat, too

Over the years, a variety of exotic recipes have elevated Spam to haute cuisine. Some recipes for the adventurous gourmand found in "SPAM: A Biography":

SPAM 'SCARGOT

1 (12-ounce) can Spam; 1/2-pound butter, softened; 2 tablespoons chopped shallots; 2 tablespoons chopped green onions; 1 teaspoon garlic salt; 5-6 tablespoons chopped parsley; 12 super-clean escargot shells; 1/2 cup bread crumbs.

Cut Spam into cubes or shape into balls and lightly brown in a bit of butter. Cream together softened butter, shallots, green onions, garlic salt and parsley. Place shells in an escargot pan. Put some of the butter and shallot mixture in the shells. Put a Spam cube or ball in each shell. Top with remaining butter mixture and bread crumbs. Bake at 450 degrees until butter sizzles, about 10 to 20 minutes. Yields 12 appetizers.

SPAM CHEESECAKE

Crust — 3/4 cup seasoned bread crumbs; 1/4 cup ground toasted almonds or pine nuts; 1/4 teaspoon ground nutmeg; butter.

Filling — 2 (8-ounce) containers garden-vegetable-flavored cream cheese; 3 eggs; 1/2 cup crumbled tomato-basil-flavored

feta cheese; cup blue cheese; 1/4 cup chopped black olives; 1 tablespoon all-purpose flour; 1 teaspoon

Italian seasoning; 1 tablespoon brandy or 1/2 teaspoon brandy extract; 1 (12-ounce) can Spam, grated.

Topping — 1 cup sour cream; 2 teaspoons sugar; 1 (10-ounce) jar Patak's Major Grey chutney, pureed; 1/3 cup toasted slivered almonds or pine nuts.

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In small bowl, combine all crust ingredients. Gently press into bottom of 10-inch springform pan or pie plate. Bake 8 to 10 minutes. Set aside to cool. Reduce oven temperature to 300 degrees.

In large bowl, beat cream cheese until light and fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well after each addition. Stir in next six filling ingredients. Gently fold in Spam. Pour into prepared crust and bake 50 to 60 minutes or until center is almost set.

In small bowl combine sour cream and sugar. Spread over cheesecake and bake 10 more minutes. Cool to room temperature. Refrigerate several hours or overnight. Spread chutney over cheesecake and sprinkle toasted nuts around outside edge. Serves 24.

Australian vending machines blocking emergency calls

SYDNEY, Australia — A bizarre computer glitch has left soft drink machines calling for help, literally.

The faulty machines may have placed hundreds of phone calls to police, ambulance and fire service emergency phone lines, blocking true emergency calls, *The Daily Telegraph* reported this week.

Thousands of the machines around Sydney are programmed to automatically call a number at a distribution company when they are near empty.

However, some of the machines dialed a default 000 number, the emergency number, instead of the distribution company

number, Adam Redman, spokesman for the National telecommunications company Telstra Corp., was quoted as saying.

Telstra began investigating to find how many of the about 1 million hoax or mistake calls a year received by the emergency number were made by the machines, the newspaper said.

Penny Farrer, a spokeswoman for the emergency service, said the problem of vending machines dialing 000 was getting worse and spreading to other electronic devices.

Ian Brown, a spokesman for Coca-Cola Co., said the problem had occurred in the past, but had been rectified.

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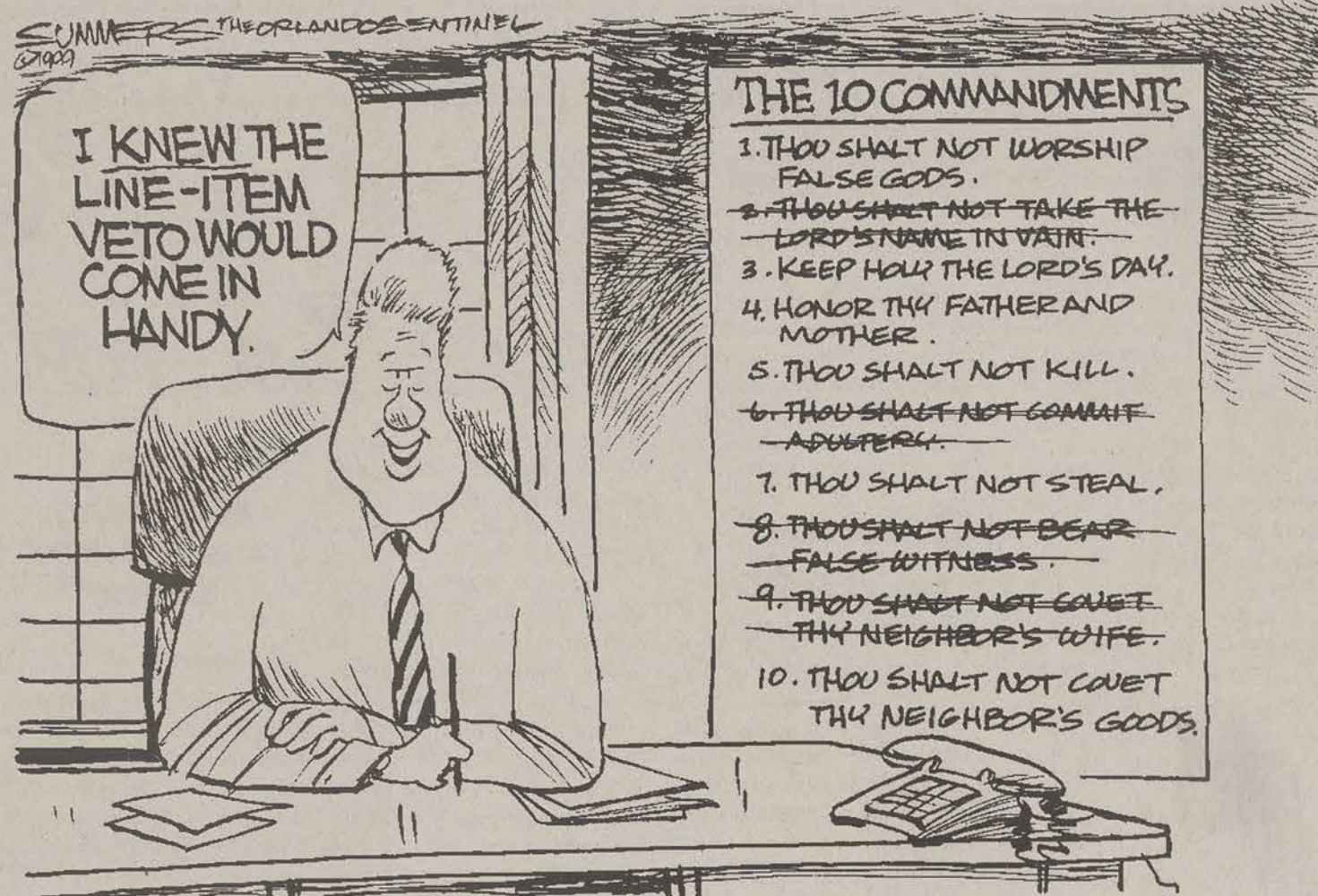
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Don't blame me; it's the testosterone

'South Park' is not for the easily offended

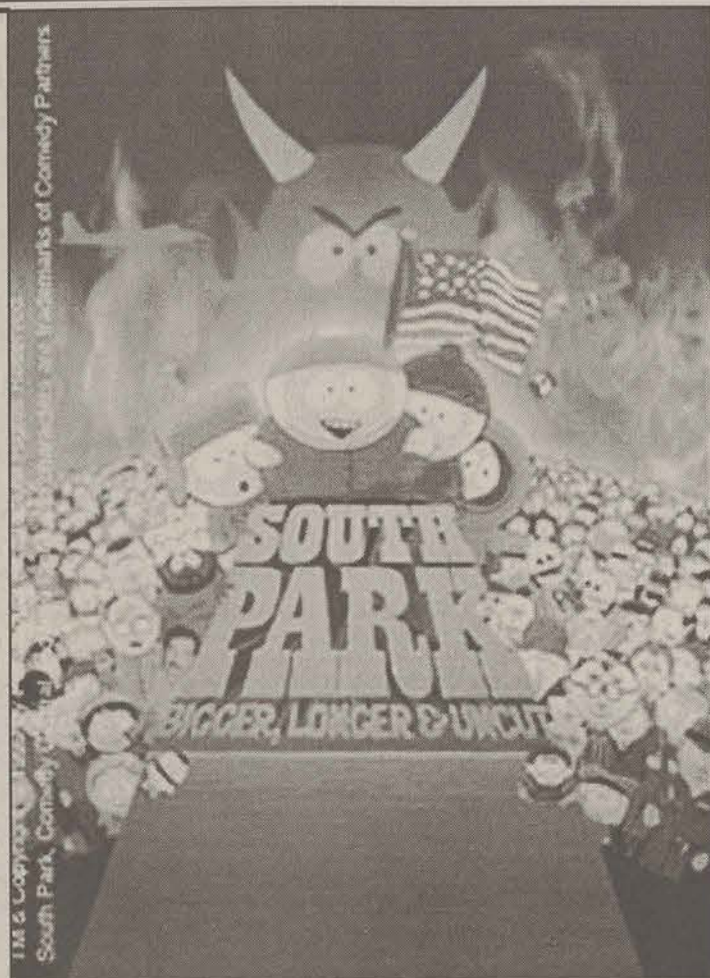

This was a disturbing movie more than anything. It was violent, vulgar and disgusting—in fact, it was exactly what one would expect from a South Park movie. Parts were riotously funny, in fact most of the movie is hilarious. It makes fun of everything and anything that you could think of, and is bound to offend anyone with a brain in one part or another.

The thing that has to be remembered when watching is that it makes more fun of mainstream America than any other specific group that it targets, and because we are trained to be sensitive to the specific targets, we miss the fact that the characters that make racist, misogynistic, anti-semitic and anti-gay remarks are being more beaten than anyone. 'Big Daddy' is both touching and funny

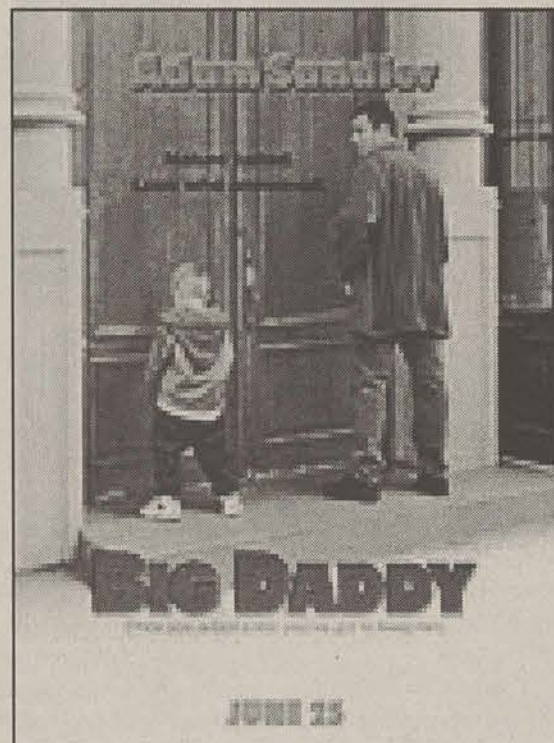

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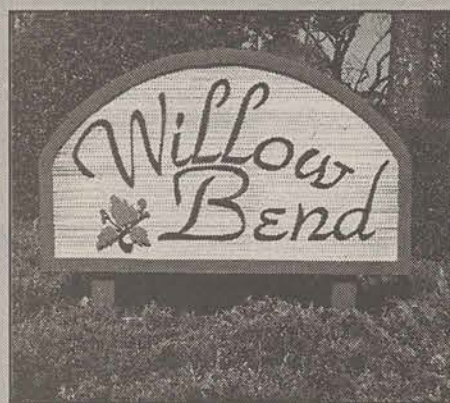
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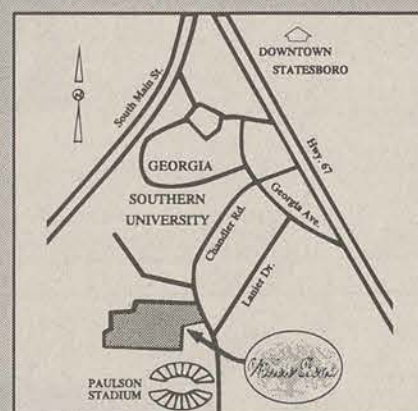
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NCAA tournament teams highlight men's basketball schedule

As many as six NCAA tournament teams from the 1999 season, including a contest with Oklahoma, highlight the Georgia Southern Eagles' 1999-2000 schedule, announced Friday by GSU first-year head coach Jeff Price.

After exhibition matchups with VASDA and Global Tours, Price will make his GSU head coaching debut Saturday, Nov. 20 when the Eagles tip off the season in Hanner Fieldhouse against Ohio Valley Conference member Tennessee Tech.

GSU's non-conference home schedule includes meetings with defending Big South Conference champions Winthrop, Mercer and North Georgia. Southern's matchup with Mercer will bet he first with the Bears since 1997. The non-conference road slate includes a visit to Tennessee Tech to complete the home-and-home series, as well as trips to Jacksonville University, NCAA participant Alabama-Birmingham (UAB) and Jacksonville State.

"This is probably the most competitive schedule Georgia Southern has played in the past few years," Price said. "We decided that we had to go that direction to change the mentality of the program. We had to create bigger challenges for our team."

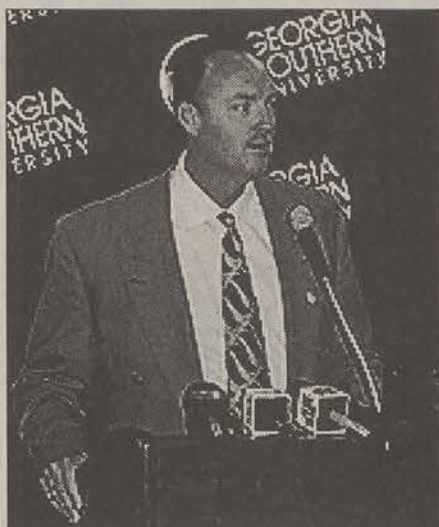
Three football players receive preseason honors

Record-setting Georgia Southern fullback Adrian Peterson and a pair of Eagle seniors, right guard Mark Williams and nose tackle Voncellies Allen, have been named to the 1999 Sports Network I-AA Preseason All-America first team, according to a release by the agency.

In addition, sophomore safety Arkee Thompson was an honorable mention defensive selection.

Peterson (5-10, 207 lbs.), entering his sophomore season, established 45 GSU, Southern Conference and NCAA records in 1998 while amassing 2,606 rushing yards and 34 touchdowns as the Eagles advanced to the I-AA national championship game in

The Eagles round out their non-conference slate Saturday, Dec. 18 with a trip to Norman, Okla. to battle Big 12-member Oklahoma. The Sooners advanced to the Sweet Sixteen last season, GSU will take part in the Capital City Classic in Tallahassee, Fla. on Dec. 28-29. The Eagles will take on Florida A&M, with Weber State and Stetson meeting for the right to

advance to the championship game. The Eagles open their 160 game SoCon schedule on Monday, Jan. 3 at Hanner Fieldhouse against Furman. GSU hosts regular-season and tournament champion College of Charleston on Monday, Jan. 17 and travels to Charleston to take on the Cougars Monday, Feb. 14.

In addition, tip off for all Georgia Southern home games during the 1999-2000 season will be moved back one-half hour to 7:30 p.m., with the exception of the Dec. 8th contest with Mercer, which is slated for 7 p.m. Previously, all home games began at 7 p.m.

Peterson rushed for over 100 yards in all 15 contests for the Eagles, including six games of 200 or more rushing yards. He claimed the Southern Conference Player-of-the-Year award as well as SoCon Freshman-of-the-Year honors.

Williams (6-1, 312 lbs.), returning for his fourth season as a fixture on the Eagle offensive line, is a two-time winner of the Southern Conference's Jacobs Blocking Trophy, symbolic of the league's top offensive linemen.

He anchored an Eagle offensive line that led GSU to the number-two ranked rushing offense and total offense in 1998 helped pave the way for a pair of 1,000-

yard runners in Peterson and quarterback Greg Hill.

Allen (6-0, 286 lbs.), who has started 30 games in his GSU career, was a first-team all-Southern Conference selection on the defensive line in 1998. He recorded 80 tackles (50 unassisted) and was second on the squad with 18 tackles for a loss of 81 yards.

He recorded eight sacks, blocked two kicks and recovered a fumble for a unit that led the league in sacks and forced 32 turnovers in 1998.

The Eagles kick off the 1999 season when they host Fayetteville State Saturday, Sept. 4 at 7 p.m. at Allen E. Paulson Stadium.

Hennon named to succeed Stallings as baseball coach

Rodney Hennon has been appointed head baseball coach at GSU, director of athletics Sam Baker announced last Tuesday at an 11 a.m. press conference at the Russell Union Building.

Hennon, a native of Dalton, Ga., will end a two-year stay as head baseball coach at Western Carolina University after leading the Catamounts to an overall 81-38-1 (.679) record and a Southern Conference mark of 38-16 (.704).

He succeeds former head coach Jack Stallings, who announced his retirement May 24 after 29 overall seasons as a collegiate head coach and 24 seasons heading the Eagle program. Hennon will be GSU's eighth head baseball coach since the start of the program in 1933 and first since 1976.

"We are certainly delighted to have an energetic individual of high character who already possesses a successful head coaching background such as Rodney Hennon to guide our baseball program into a new era," Baker said. "His return to the state of Georgia, knowledge of the Southern Conference and enthusiasm are clearly attractive qualities which should translate into success for Georgia Southern and excitement for all constituencies."

After accepting an offer to guide the Western Carolina program in July 1997, Hennon quickly added his own distinctive chapters to one of the winningest programs in the Southern Conference which has captured eight league tournament titles and made nine NCAA Regional appearances since 1985. Most recently, the Catamounts have advanced to national post-season play in 1992, 1993, 1994 and 1997.

During his inaugural campaign as head coach, Hennon led the Catamounts to a 45-15 overall record and a 20-6 SoCon mark, tying the school mark for most victories in a single year and ranking sixth among all NCAA Division I members in winning per-

centage. His player claimed both the Southern Conference's pitcher and player of-the-year award while seven signed professional contracts at the conclusion of the season.

In addition, the 1998 WCU squad led the nation in stolen bases with 153, which shattered a 33-year-old school record and a 16-year-old conference mark. He directed a pitching staff which also enjoyed an outstanding season, turning in a 4.01 earned run average to rank 11th nationally, while finishing ninth among all Division I institutions with 499 strikeouts.

Hennon followed up his record-setting initial season with a 36-23-1 mark last spring, which included a third-place league standing at 18-10. The Catamounts easily distinguished themselves as the SoCon's top offensive squad with conference bests in average (.328), on-base percentage (.423), slugging percentage (.523), runs (502), hits (684), homeruns (82) and runs batted in (445) while finishing second in triples (20) and third in stolen bases (123).

Hennon guided one of the league's youngest pitching staffs to a 5.70 earned run average - rating third among all conference teams.

Prior to taking over the WCU head coaching duties, Hennon served as a full-time assistant coach for his alma mater for three seasons and was a two-time all-conference second baseman for the Catamounts in the early 1990s.

Golf transfer commits to GSU

Campbell University freshman Justin Kolumber is transferring to Georgia Southern to continue his collegiate golf career, Eagle head coach John Laird announced June 23. He is the third player to commit to GSU this year, joining fall signee Travis Mobley and spring signee Brian Wainwright.

Kolumber did not play any matches for the Camels in 1998-99. He tied for seventh place in the 1997 Gunby-Jordan Intercollegiate, shooting 72-75-69, and also placed in the Top 20 at both the UT-Chattanooga Fall Invitational and the Old Dominion Seaside Collegiate. He averaged

74.60 strokes through seven events. Kolumber was named academic All-Trans-America Athletic Conference following his freshman year.

Last summer, Kolumber shot 73-73=146 at the U.S. Amateur and 70-71=141 at the U.S. Public Links Championship. In high school, he won the Rutgers Junior Open, shooting 10-under 278 (73-68-72-65) to establish a new tournament record for the margin of victory. A three-time first-team all-conference selection, Kolumber claimed the 1996 Eastern Penn Conference individual title and the Pennsylvania state championship.

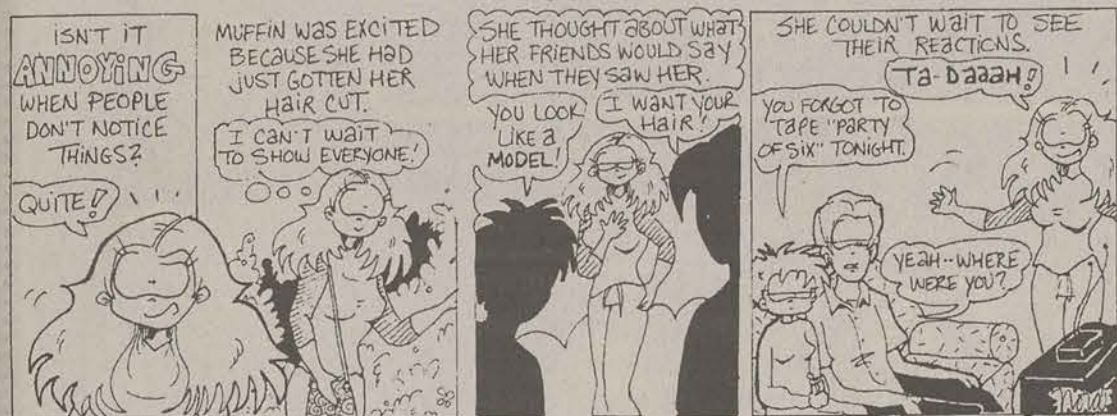

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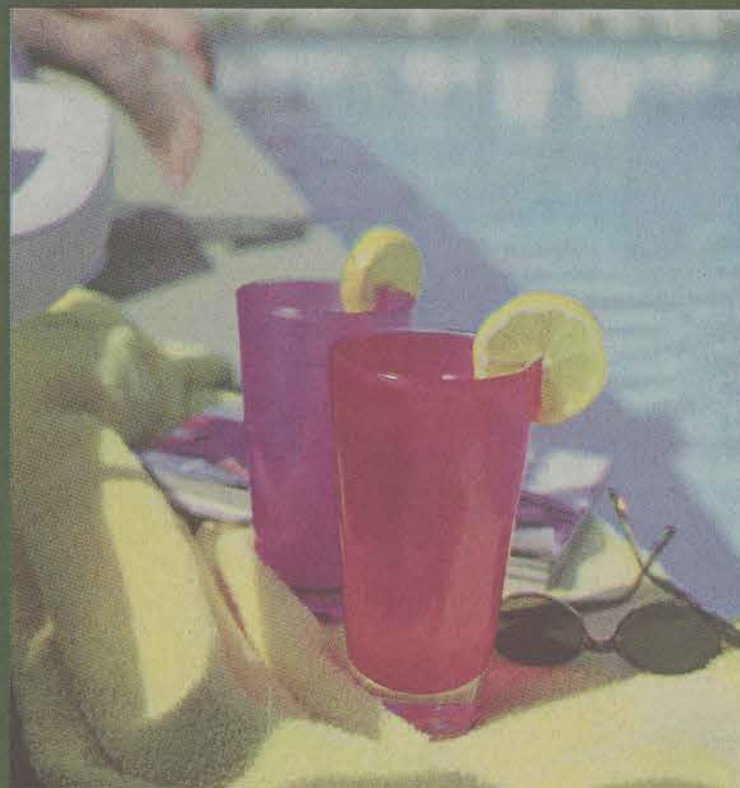
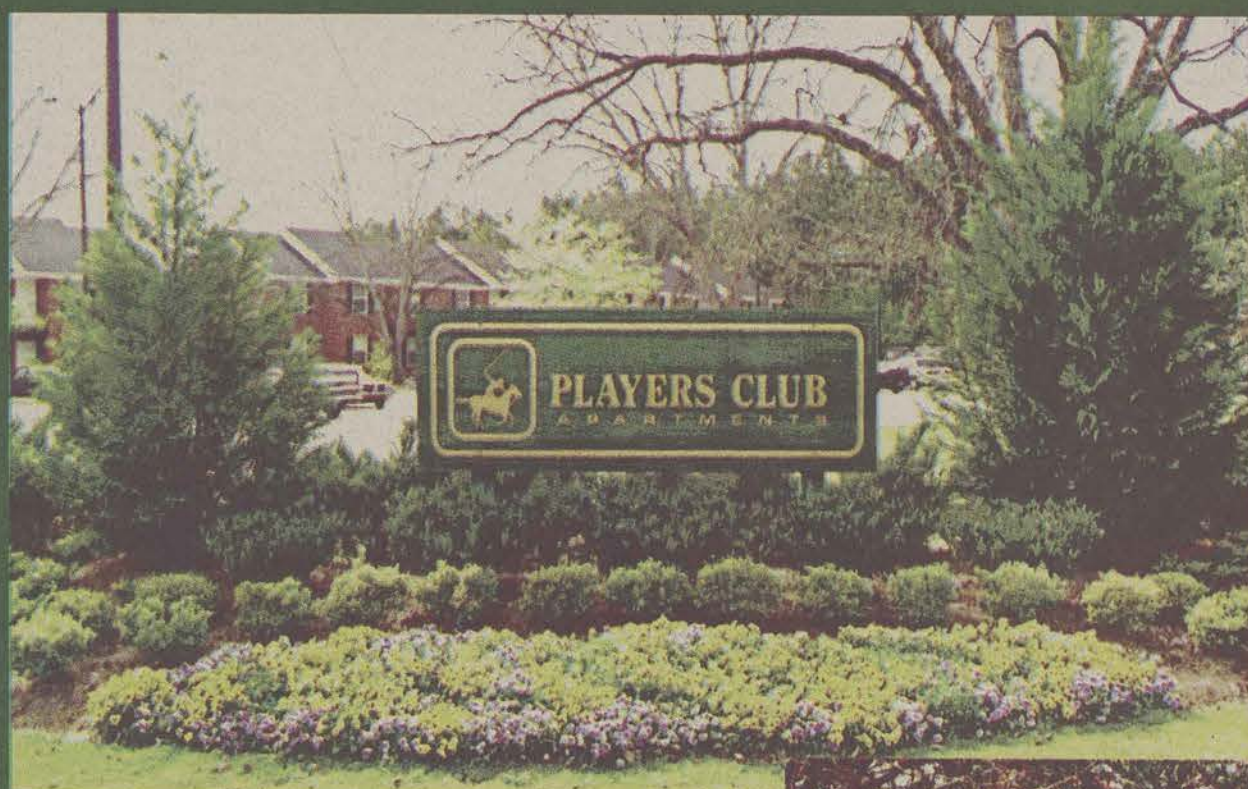
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
