# Alcohol Education

Speaker Mike Green gives GSU students the lowdown on college and drinking

"How many of you guys have an alcohol problem?" The question was posed by Collegiate Consultants On Drug and Alcohol speaker Mike Green to a packed Russell Union Theater on Thursday night, Sept. 30. Green's audience included members of GSU fraternities, sororities, freshmen orientation classes and students of all ages and walks of life. Hardly any hands were raised in response to Green's inquiry.

"You don't have to be an alcoholic to have an alcohol problem," he said. "How many of you have been so drunk that you got sick? That you missed class the day after? Or you couldn't even remember the night before?"

The crowd sheepishly raised their hands, giggling at the all-too familiar scenes that Green, also known as "Greeny," described throughout the evening. It seemed everyone had experienced a U.P.I. (unidentified party injury) or had come down with the dreaded morning after disease (we'll call it "awshucks disease," although that wasn't Green's terminology). The speaker was a hit by not mincing any words or situations—it was very clear he was talking to a group of college students, not their parents. Although his no-holds-barred style kept the audience laughing, his message was serious: if you're going to drink, do it responsibly.

"I'd rather be honest and save somebody's life than be politically correct," he said.

Green shared his experience with alcohol in college and how it had changed his life forever.

"My seven-year-old son asked me why an old acquaintance calls me

"The Naked Man," he said.

What you do in your young and crazy years will definitely come back to haunt you, he said, so be careful—image is everything.

He also told the crowd that it was their responsibility to look after friends during a night of partying. A fraternity member during his college days, he reminded the Greeks that they were to be their "brother's keeper."

"No one should have to prove their brotherhood or sisterhood by drinking," he said. "We prove that by spirit and friendship."

"Alcohol problems" seem to start more at college than anywhere else, and most offenses caused by students involve alcohol. GSU is certainly no exception—in a series of stories on alcohol in the "The George-Anne" last April, judicial officer Edward Bayens said that he deals with alcohol-related incidents all the time, most of which involve undergraduates.

"College students drink alcohol," he said. "There are a lot of activities that center around alcohol. It's been that way since Harvard opened in 1636."

Like a cool and open-minded parent, Green knows that college and drinking go hand-in-hand and provides students with advice on how to be safe. That includes advice such as "Don't have any more than three shots in any one given night," "don't drink any alcohol stronger than 90 proof," and "stay away from mixed drinks with two or more shots." He also advises not to "stand by the keg all night like it's your date."

Green's message hit home with many students.

"It was like he was speaking directly to me," Kirk Farkus, a member of Pi Kappa Alpha, said. "He had me thinking in the middle of the speech."

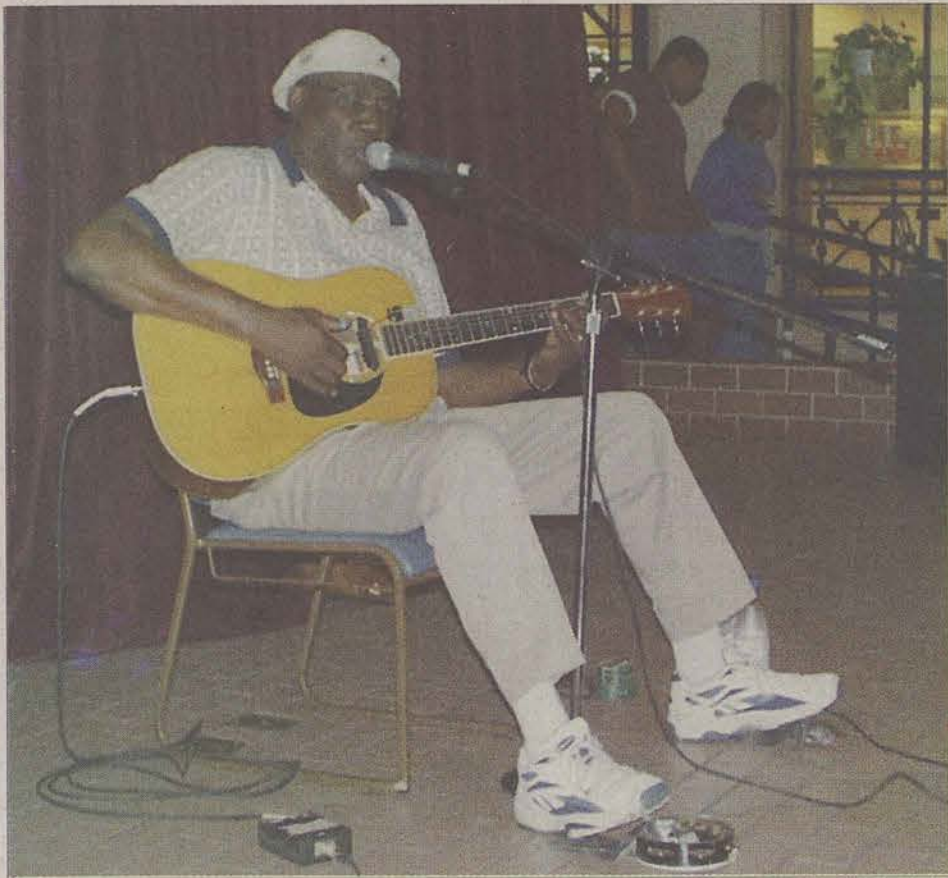
Erin Heibling, a member of Zeta Tau Alpha, was also impressed.

"I thought he was realistic. While some people are set in their ways, he probably helped a lot of people and saved a lot of lives," she said.

## 'Sauce Boss' comes to the 'Boro

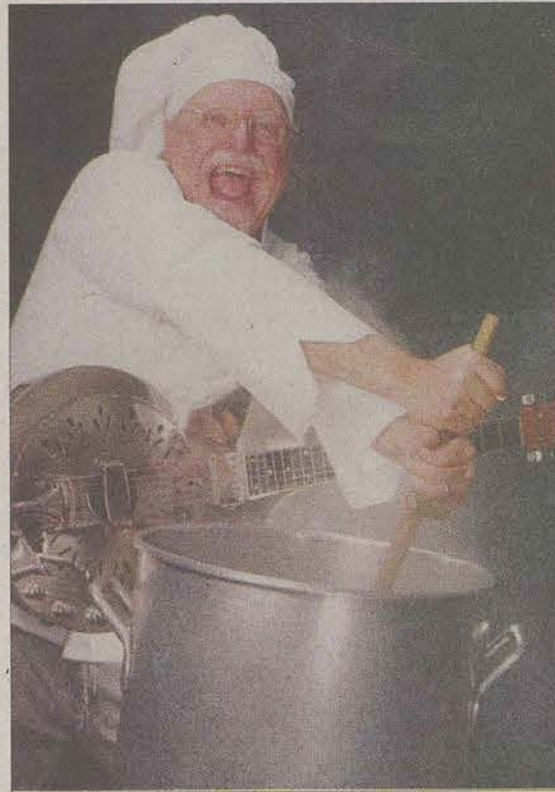

## SGA radio show suspended due to campaign plugging

The SGA radio show was suspended on WVGS 91.9 student radio yesterday for an undetermined amount of time, according to radio sources.

The show, which airs from 11 a.m. to 12 p.m. on Thursdays, is directed by SGA senator Lemuel Moore. During last Thursday's program, Moore violated WVGS rules by providing a forum for SGA President Nicely to discuss his run for the District 4 city council seat against Joe Brannen, station manager Joseph Mahaney said.

"The show has been suspended temporarily because

we'd have to give equal time to both candidates," Mahaney said. "The FCC fairness doctrine states that each candidate has to be given equal time, and no one researched that before the [SGA] show Thursday. Now we have to go back and offer Joe Brannen time for rebuttal."

Moore was unavailable for comment as of press time.

The show was also suspended because of inappropriate comments, which remain undisclosed, over the air, Mahaney said.

"Also during last Thursday's show there was an incident over the air where Lem was talking about the

election," Mahaney said, "and in some instances it sounded like a black/white issue."

Bill Neville, faculty advisor for WVGS, agrees with the management's decision to suspend the show.

"I think the station manager did the right thing under the circumstances," Neville said.

The station is governed by the equal time provision regulations of the FCC, which means that all candidates have to be treated equally on the air, Neville said.

"Any coverage or open forum given to Aaron Nicely has to be matched for Joe Brannen," Neville said. "Since Nicely is interwoven with SGA, any time given to an

SGA radio show would have to be matched minute for minute with time offered to Brannen."

Moore will get his show back pending Nicely's resignation from SGA or at the conclusion of the city council elections in November, Mahaney said.

"I would also like to urge the president of SGA to participate in the show because there has been a severe lack of participation so far by Nicely," Mahaney said. "That should be his responsibility [as SGA president] as well."

Even if Nicely resigns and Moore is reissued his

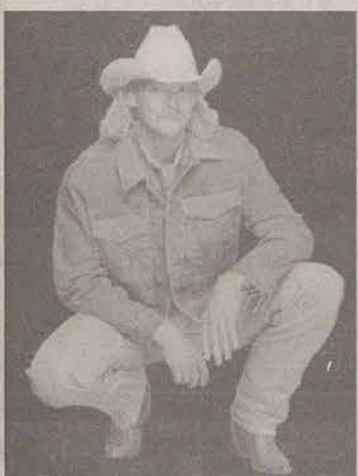

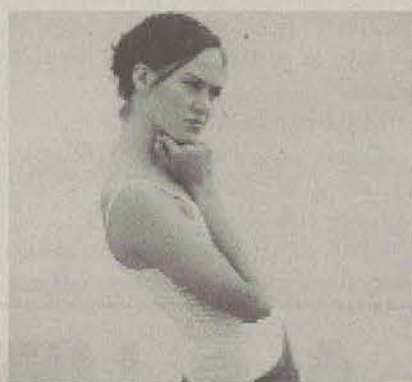

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# 'The Bone Collector' is DOA

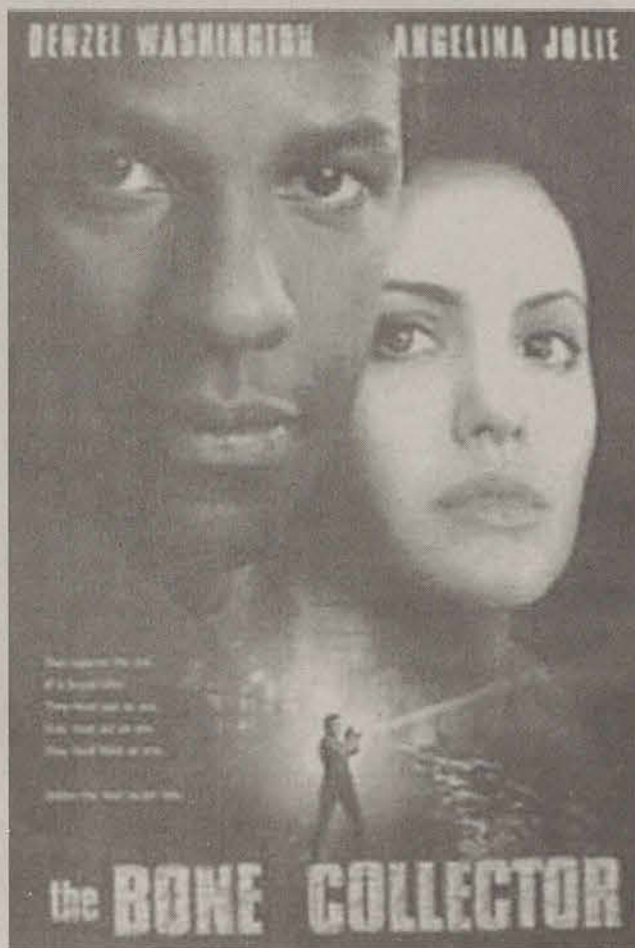
Rhymes is the brains and Donaghy is the body and they got to work together to stop the killer from killing again. Sound familiar? It should.

suspect every five seconds.

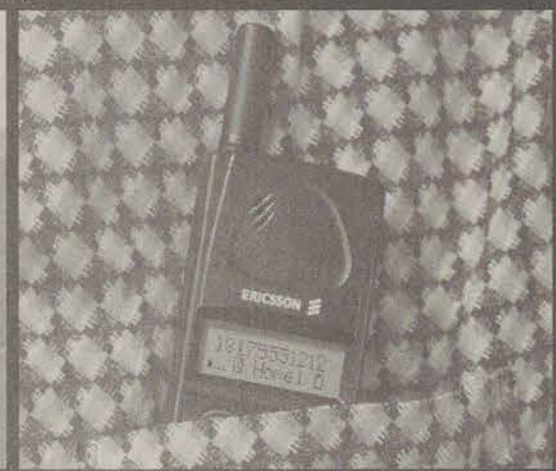
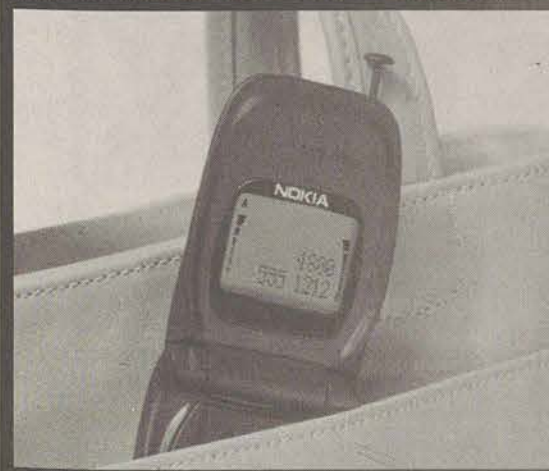
Another good thing: the movie, surprisingly, followed the book! I congratulate the director for making a movie that actually followed the book.

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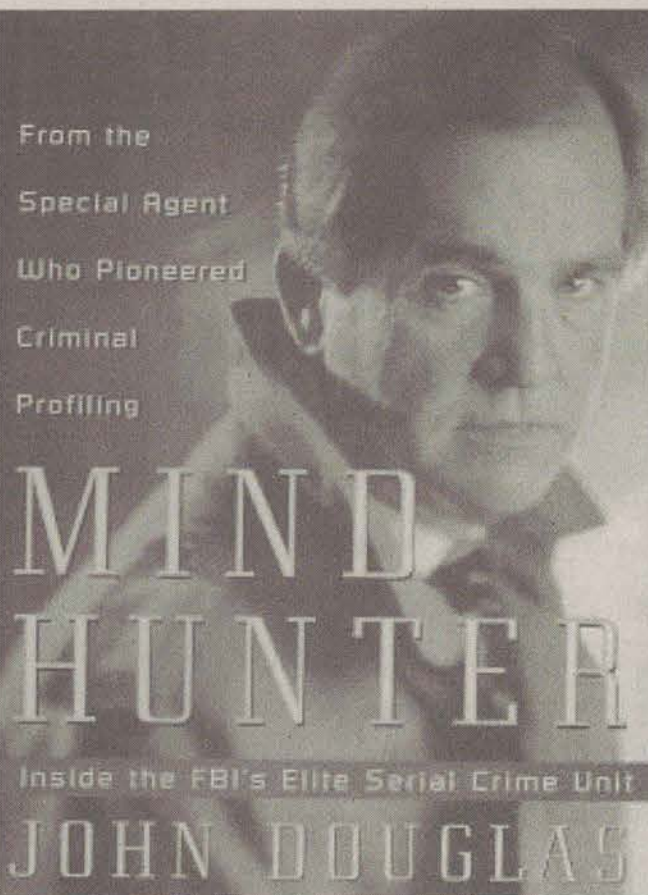

Finally, a record label that is devoted to the true success of the bands they sponsor rather than the money that those bands are going to bring in. Knot Known Records out of Tempe, Ariz. is an independent record label designed specifically for the distribution of college bands' music.

"The only way to be known is Knot Known," the record label claims, and they certainly seem to have a great business running. Knot Known Records provides bands that would otherwise be unheard of except for on campus, with record production, music publishing, and album distribution.

Bands in college all over the nation are living out their dreams, having their music heard on a national level and purchased on a national scale. Knot Known Records sells their bands' CDs, T-shirts, and other accessories via the internet and small record stores on college campuses. In this way, colleges and universities are able to rival over who has the best bands.

Though Knot Known is currently in the growth stage, some bands have already cashed in on the excellent deal this business offers. One in fact, whom many of you have heard of and seen live, Wallace Green, consists of students here at GSU. Knot Known's web site, [www.knotknown.com](http://www.knotknown.com), features in-depth information on Wallace Green and GSU as a school. So, who are some other bands that Knot Known have gotten their hands on?

Illinois State students Brian Goff and Edward Anderson have formed a very impressive rock band along with bassist Joseph Kennedy and keyboardist, Steve Guyer. Interestingly named Brother Jed, the band presents a sound that has writers digging through their thesauruses, trying to find the right adjectives to describe the band's interesting sound.

While it is basically just good rock music, the music on the band's third disc, *Days Turn to Months* has an original sound that is difficult to pinpoint, most likely due to the diversity of songs on the disc. The lead singer's voice sounds similar to Anthony Kiedis' of the Red Hot Chili Peppers, or Chris Cornell, formerly of Soundgarden. At times, the band sounds like Creed, Candlebox, or Everlast minus the rap stuff, on tracks such as the

beautiful "Until You Find Yourself" and the title track.

The biggest change of sound, and a very pleasant surprise is found on the eighth track, "Ol' Silver." Written about a pet dog, the song swings away from anything else on the album. Resembling the Allman Brothers "Ramblin' Man" and many of the country numbers forked out by Charlie Daniels, "Ol' Silver" may not flow well with the main theme of the album, but it sure does sound good, and reveals the talent that the band possesses.

While all of these combinations may sound weird, they're true and make *Days Turn to Months* an interesting CD that definitely deserves a listen.

Another band that has been graced by the great people at Knot Known Records is Knee Jerk Reaction, a band that formed at Colorado State University in 1997. The pop/punk rock power exerted from the men in this band is rarely matched by groups around today. Though the band sounds a bit like Green Day and Nerf Herder, it is easily heard that the influences on Knee Jerk Reaction go back a lot further than that. The Ramones, Social Distortion, the Replacements and Bad Religion may be credited for the sounds that Knee Jerk Reaction lets loose.

The hook-driven tunes and typical punk/rock sassy vocal delivery resembles the band NOFX and may scare a few people off, but the songs on the band's latest album, *Modern Pop Rockets*, really have depth. "Crush Me" and the album closer, "Minutes" are excellently assembled tunes as well and reveal that punk rock is much more complex than the stereotypical theory that the music is simply alternating the progressions of three power chords.

*Modern Pop Rockets* is a good disc from a band that has been around for a few years. The band members have had plenty of experience in other groups, but Knee Jerk Reaction sounds like they are comfortable with each other and may expand to higher levels.

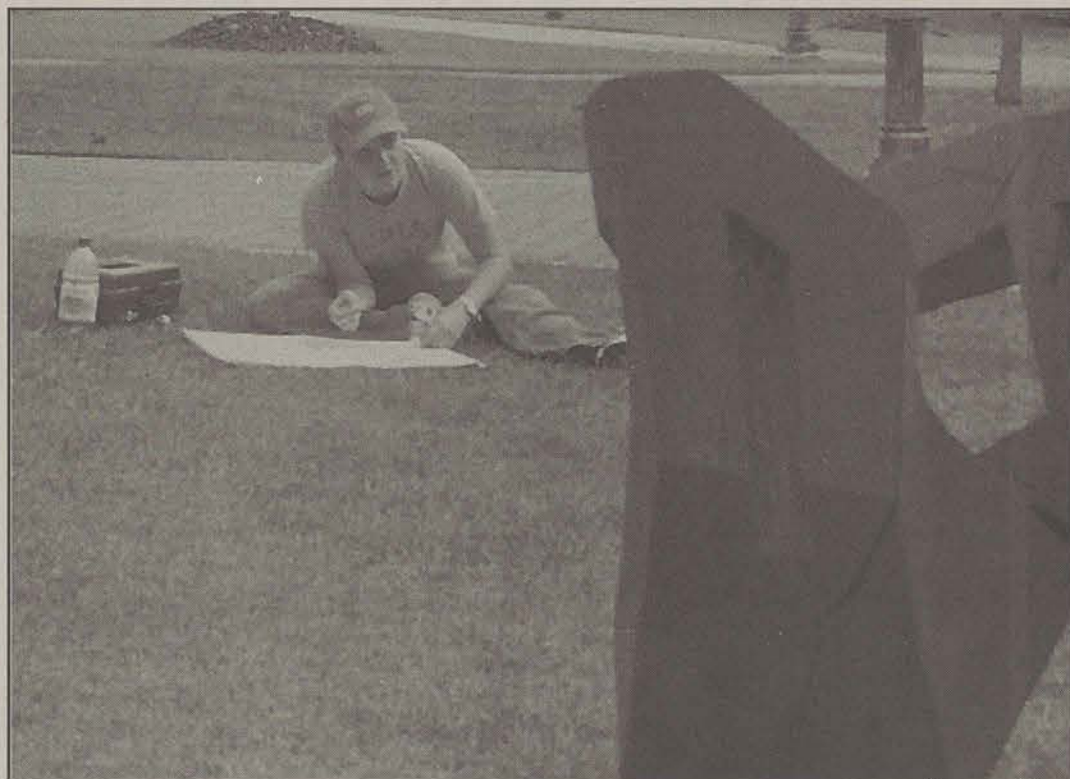

love and respect to men that actually treat females with dignity and love.

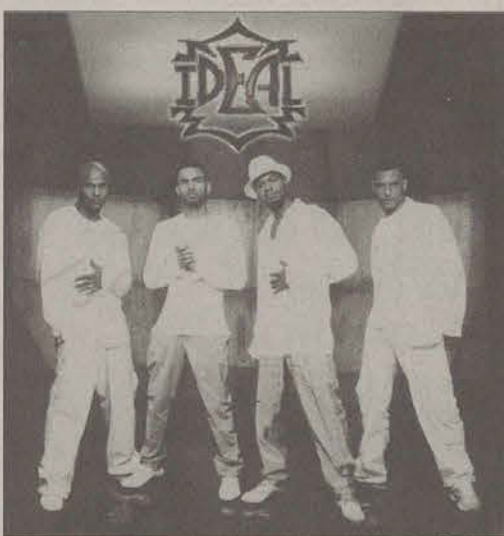

## Music department dazzles students once again

The GSU department of music has pulled off a dazzling recital with the theme "Celebrate the Century." It was held at the Carol A. Carter Recital Hall in the Foy Fine Arts Building Tuesday.

The program was focused on the twentieth century's works of musical art based on poetry, which was reset and composed into music. Some of these works were performed by vocalists Kyle and Sarah Hancock, assisted by the always impressive Michael Braz on piano and the talented Carl Prude on viola.

Kyle was the main vocalist of the night, who along with Braz, performed fifteen selections of varied lengths and styles. Hancock used his magnificent tenor voice that sent shivers down the spine. The first two selections were from the Romantic period and were composed by Gustav Mahler from "Des Knaben Wunderhorn" (The Youth's Magic Horn), a

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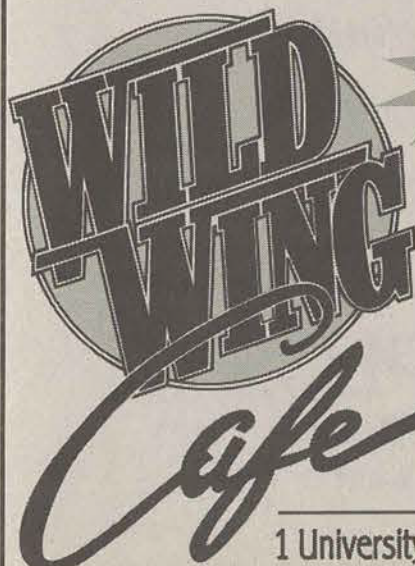
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# GSU Volleyball ...

The Eagles (2-13, 1-7 SoCon) hit the road this weekend, taking on Furman Saturday night at 7 p.m. and Wofford Sunday at 2 p.m.

# GSU to face Western Carolina

This weekend the GSU football team will take on the Catamounts of Western Carolina in their fourth Southern Conference game of the season.

Following up a 62-0 win against VMI last week in Lexington, Va., the Eagles will look to avoid complacency and run their Southern Conference winning streak to 15 games and advance their

winning streak at Paulson Stadium to 18.

Adrian Peterson is sure to be in the spotlight of this weekend's game, as he attempts to break the I-AA record for most consecutive games with at least 100 rushing yards.

The record stands at 20, set by Nevada's Frank Hawkins in 1979-80. Peterson has not failed to reach 100 yards in any of his collegiate starts.

"I'm ready to go out there and play the game and come out on top," Peterson said. "If I break the record, that will just add something extra."

Peterson also looks to get closer to setting another mark this weekend.

With a 200-yard performance, Adrian Peterson could take one more step towards the I-AA record for most 200 yard performances in a career, a record currently

held by New Hampshire's Jerry Azumah (1995-98).

Azumah's record stands at 10, Peterson has 8 games with 200 or more yards.

Defensively, GSU will hope to duplicate the results of last weekend, when they held VMI to just 90 yards in a scoreless contest.

Senior NT Vonceillies Allen said he knows that GSU will have to play well to do just that.

"We have to play the best game we can play to hold them to zero," Allen said.

"They have a great running back, a great quarterback and their offensive line is really good. We just have to get after the running back, force them to pass and then get after the quarterback."

As for the possibility of complacency, Allen says no chance.

"That championship game [vs. Massachusetts] still sticks in the back of a lot of players minds," Allen said.

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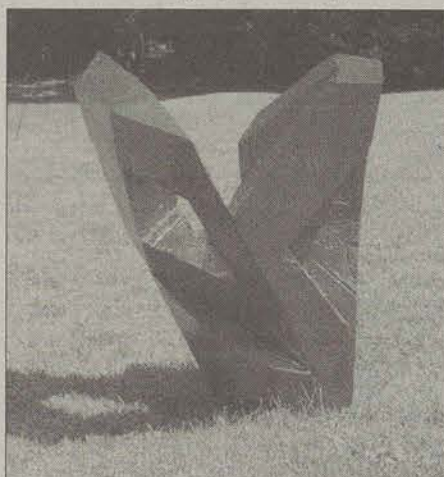


## Gallery 303 exhibit to wow campus

Friday, October 8, GSU's Gallery 303 will be holding the second exhibit of they year. From 7 to 9 p.m., the gallery will have its opening where students Linda Whitt Smith and Linda Bobinger will be displaying their graduate thesis work. Smith's crystalline pottery and Bobinger's sculptures have been the focus of their masters work.

Bobinger's sculptures are hand molded figures. The majority of the pieces portray women and the multiple roles they symbolize. The figures emit a powerful presence of tranquility and happiness. Arched necks, laughing faces and contorted bodies are among the forms.

Babies cling to a woman, grasping her breasts which portray woman in her most essential role: motherhood. Bobinger finds art to be a "healing experience." Many of her sculptures spring from her childhood experiences. The statues' joyful appearances signify several aspects of life.

Some "were created to laugh about fond memories . . . others . . . to laugh at appalling truths."

Linda Smith creates in a completely different genre of ceramics. The pottery wheel aids her in developing the crystalline pots, vases and dishes she envisions. Her porcelain glass wear is both ornamental and functional. An array of colors beam out from her symmetrical creations. The crystalline part of her ceramics come from the reaction between the glaze she uses and zinc particles in the clay. Some of the crystals sprout like dandelions, while others from a sand dollar's shape. Crystalline work is fairly uncommon, and has an extremely dazzling effect on common pottery.

While both women work with ceramics, the contrast between their finished products is startling. Gallery 303 is located in the Betty Foy building. Both

## New CDs hit the shelves this week

•"The Fragile," Nine Inch Nails (Nothing/Interscope): Come on, admit it. You saw how Trent Reznor trimmed his locks and thought, "Yikes — he looks like a guy from Abercrombie & Fitch." And then you saw him play that slow and tentative song on MTV's music awards, and you really got fidgety.

Well, never fear. His pretty hate machine still fires on all cylinders throughout the two-disc "The Fragile," the first Nine Inch Nails disc in five years. Lyrically, it's just the usual teen-alienation stuff ("Tried to save myself but myself keeps slipping away.") But Reznor's really perfected his sound here.

While there are a few effectively brooding and atmospheric tracks, mostly "The Fragile" just roars — yet you've likely never heard anything this loud and abrasive that still manages to sound this melodic.

Among many outstanding moments, the showstopper is the slow-building title song, with its defiant mantra of "I won't let you fall apart."

Sure, Reznor could have trimmed a song or two here or there, but the old saw about double discs carrying a disc's worth of fat truly doesn't apply here.

•Sure, the once-groundbreaking comedy has been unbearably lame for years, but "Saturday Night Live" usually has managed to pull in at least a few noteworthy musical guests each year.

Roughly 30 of them are rounded up in the two volumes of "SNL: The Musical Performances," with the first set focusing on old-schoolers like Paul Simon, Tom Petty and Eric Clapton, and the second taking on modern rock and R&B acts like Beck, Oasis and Mary J. Blige.

You get Elvis Costello's infamous blast through "Radio Radio" and impassioned tracks from Nirvana and Hole, but the lineup disappointingly bypasses the show's original eclectic booking policy (where's Ornette Coleman?) for a very basic all-star approach.

•A much better execution of the same concept can be found on "The FolkScene Collection, Vol. Two" (Red House), a compilation of performances from the LA-based folk radio show.

Big-names like Tom Waits, Lucinda Williams and Vince Gill share space with not-yet household names like Peter Case and Jim Lauderdale. High quality stuff throughout, if occasionally just a tad wan.

show, there are concerns that Moore might continue to provide an open forum and vocalize his support for the Nicely campaign over the air.

"We've expressed to Moore in a meeting on Wednesday that he is not to discuss Nicely's campaign on the air if he gets his show back," Mahaney said. "There's really nothing we can do to stop him if he tries to do it again—we can't sew his lips shut."

Mahaney went on to say that if Moore expressed views about the election over the air that don't coincide with those of WVGS, further disciplinary action against Moore will be taken.

"I think that Moore's actions on Thursday were entirely unprofessional and unwarranted," Mahaney said. "It puts WVGS up for liability with the FCC, and it's not good for the station. Our job is to take an unbiased and neutral view on any issue."

Mahaney has since resigned from his position as station manager for academic reasons.

surely overheats the kitchen night after night. With music influenced by the sounds of B.B. King, Wharton's voice is full of bass and energy. The band's music is no exception, mixing various sounds of guitar, piano, organ, accordion, harmonica, bass, conga drums, and percussion.

Using humor as another attraction to the already delicious music, Wharton uses song titles such as "She's A Monkey" and "Your Maytag Done Broke Down." This is certainly not your old man in the rocking chair on the front-porch type blues music. In fact, Wild Wing should serve as a nice venue for the dance party that should erupt when the Sauce Boss and his Ingredients begin to simmer on stage.

"I'm barbecuing the blues," Wharton says on the back cover of the new album *Recipes*. 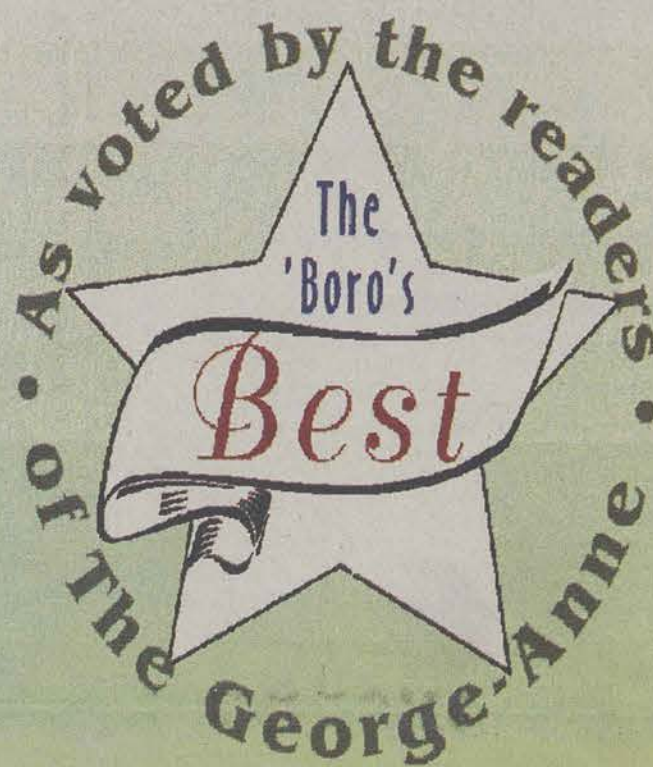
