During the first half of Saturday's showdown for the Southern Conference championship, it seemed that all the hype built up for the GSU-Furman game was just that—hype. Up 31-7 midway through the third quarter, GSU had a deciding hold on a game that would give them an unprecedented third consecutive SoCon championship, but blew it, giving up 31 second half points, including 21 in the fourth quarter alone. Luckily for GSU, they were able to pull it out for the 41-38 win in front of a season-high crowd of 18,636 at Paulson Stadium.

"We knew that [Furman] was a team that was capable of coming back from any deficit," said senior defensive tackle Voncellies Allen.

In the second half, they got their running game going a little which opened up their passing game. They caught us a little off guard. We played a sloppy second half and gave them a lot of chances and we didn't keep

them out of the endzone," said senior defensive tackle Voncellies Allen.

After Furman's quarterback Justin Hill found wide receiver Bryant Huguley up the right sideline for a 34-yard touchdown pass and the tying score, GSU set up at their 24-yard line with 1:43 remaining.

That's when senior quarterback Greg Hill, whose two second half interceptions helped bring the Paladins back, took over. Running three consecutive quarterback draws for gains of 20, 14, and 9 yards respectively, Hill again called his own number, this time audibling to a quarterback sweep to the right gaining 13 yards and putting the Eagles in field goal territory.

"Coach [Johnson] kept sending in the draw play for me, so every time I dropped back and saw a hole, I took off and ran to the best of my ability," said Hill who had his most productive rushing day of the season, gaining 219 yards and scoring a second quarter touchdown.

After a nine-yard gain and a run to set the ball up in the middle of the field, GSU kicker Chris Chambers came on and kicked the 28 yard field goal as time expired.

Chambers, the pre-season Southern Conference first team kicker, has struggled this season connecting on just 4 of 9 field goals coming into the Furman game. Having already missed two kicks in the game, Chambers had an up-and-down day.

"I love the fact that I made [the game-winning kick]," Chambers said. "But the two that I missed is what I'm really worried about."

Hill also had a good day passing, completing six of eight passes for 142 yards and a TD. The two incompletions being the two interceptions Hill threw in the second half leading to ten Furman points.

"I thought Greg played out-

standing in the first half," said head coach Paul Johnson after the victory. "He made two poor decisions that hurt us. When we turned the ball over, it gave Furman the momentum. Overall, I think Greg played pretty good."

"[The turnover] almost cost us," agreed Hill. "Fortunately, we didn't have to pay the price."

Adrian Peterson had another great game, rushing for 197 yards and three touchdowns, including a 66-yard burst up the middle of the Paladin defense on GSU's first possession. With his three rushing scores, Peterson tied the I-AA mark for touchdowns in a season with 28. He also broke his GSU mark for most rushing touchdowns in a season that he set last year.

"This team has a lot of heart and we overcame a lot of adversity out there today," said Voncellies Allen. "A win is a win. We did something that not many teams have done with the three [consecutive SoCon] championships. Right now, we're on a high." Allen finished with two tackles, one for a loss.

The emotions that Coach Johnson was feeling were not quite as ecstatic.

"I don't know what I feel," he said after the game that saw GSU have at least two touchdowns called back because of penalties. "I'm happy, I'm mad...I'm frustrated. It's hard to describe how I feel. I'm happy for our players because they've worked awfully hard. I am frustrated that we can't do a better job of making our kids understand that you can't make 15 penalties in a game and expect to win."

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Questions still unanswered in alleged Greek Row rape

A week after the alleged rape occurred on Olympic Boulevard, the GSU Police Department has not released any new information on the incident.

Lt. John Miles of the GSU police department said that it is not uncommon in a case like this to hold information until investigators have talked to all the witnesses involved.

"We felt in this case that we didn't have a rapist jumping out of the bushes here," Miles said. "If we did, we would have handled this case differently."

Miles went on to say that the safety

of the citizens and the students is important, and the case is being handled accordingly. Certain information in the incident report will be released tomorrow following a meeting to discuss what can be released due to the sensitivity of the issue, Miles said.

Additionally, coordinator of Greek Life Jane Campaigne said she had no knowledge of which house the rape occurred in, and said that she has received no phone calls from parents of students living on Greek Row about the incident.

"If the alleged rape proves to be true then it's obviously a criminal matter that will be handled by the university police," Campaigne said.

In the meantime, letters have been distributed to all members of fraternities and sororities informing them of the incident and reminding them of safety precautions, Campaigne said.

"[The letter] lets [Greeks] know all that we can tell them about the incident, which is basically what was in [The George-Anne]," Campaigne said.

As of press time, no information is available about the age of the victim, which house the crime occurred in, whether or not there were weapons involved, whether there are any suspects in the case and whether it was an acquaintance rape.

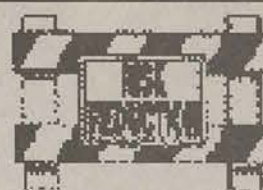

'The price of independence' GSU students help out Kosovo children

Lynn Fredericksson, the Washington representative for the East Timor Action Network, delivered a speech entitled "The Price of Freedom," Wednesday in the Russell Ballroom concerning the crimes against humanity that have been committed in the Indonesian island of East Timor. The many GSU students in attendance listed and watched intently as Fredericksson recounted the story of the 24 year battle the East Timorese have been fighting for independence.

Parts of the speech included heart wrenching excerpts from the life of a 17 year old student named Maria Guarate, who was arrested and tortured by Indonesian intelligence for giving information to the East Timorese resistance.

Live footage of the Santa Cruz massacre, in which 270 nonviolent protesters were killed, was also included in the presentation.

After the Indonesian invasion in 1975, East Timor was cut off from the rest of the international community so there was virtually no media coverage. The journalist had to smuggle the

tape of the massacre out of the country in a casket.

Since there has been virtually no media coverage until recently, many students are hearing about these savage human right violations and massacres for the first time. Most students were shocked by what they heard, but even more shocked by the fact that their own government had knowledge of these events and not only did nothing to intervene, but also assisted in the occupation by selling Indonesia weapons.

Fredericksson has been an activist organizer and service provider in Washington D.C., Baltimore and the San Francisco Bay area for the past 12 years. Among many other human rights activities, Fredericksson has worked for disarmament human rights in the former Soviet Union, Israel and East Timor. Fredericksson says her

strong human rights background and her involvement with the plowshare's disarmament action prompted her involvement in ETAN.

The Center for International Studies invited Fredericksson to speak because it hopes to broaden GSU's horizons a little with a focus on Asia.

What started out as an e-mail from an Army captain stationed in Kosovo has turned into a campus-wide community service project. Marc Kutter, a liaison officer, sent e-mails to his friends and family informing them about the low number of school supplies that the children have over there. According to Kutter's letter, the kids in Kosovo want to go to school but they have little money and most of the schools are overcrowded.

The letter found its way into the hands of Vickie Hawkins, the director of university housing, in September, who took the opportunity to turn it into a project for the residence halls on campus.

Barb Dyer, the area director of Chandler Heights, and Krista Robinson, the resident director or Oliff Hall, complied ten residential advisors to help along with the project.

"We decided to incorporate all halls together," Robinson said. "It's a cause for which we consider is worth while."

Donation boxes have been placed in residence halls for the students to turn in school supplies, such as paper, pens, pencils, chalk and crayons. Even supplies that are used, such as calculators and rulers, have been accepted. Most of the supplies are intended for children in elementary and middle schools.

"We take for granted that most of the kids in America have all the

things that they need to go to school," Dyer said.

Aside from just taking school supply donations, many of the hall actions teams, such as the ones from Stratford and Johnson, have allocated money for supplies to be bought and sent.

Even though they have received a lot of supplies so far, housing is still taking donations throughout the week. They will be accepting donations up until school lets out for Thanksgiving break. Currently Kutter has not heard of the project that the school has done.

Donations can be turned in at the Housing office located in Watson Hall.

"I'm looking forward to sending a huge box to Kosovo," Hawkins said.

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

Officials should be talking about alleged rape

There is a great concern among GSU students about the alleged rape that occurred on Greek Row last weekend. Many are wondering how the rape occurred; if there was any one person responsible for the alleged crime or if more than one person was to blame for this atrocity. We don't even know if the perpetrator of the alleged rape is a GSU student.

As we the public look to the GSU Police Department and the GSU Greek Life organization for an explanation, we get little to no information about the incident. The head of the Greek Life office claims not to know what house the alleged rape occurred in. Is it really that difficult to find out? Any organization, if it were operating in the best interest of its members, would demand to know exactly what, when and where the alleged crime occurred in order to prevent such an incident from happening again.

The police aren't talking, either. We don't know if it was an acquaintance rape, if the victim was drugged with rophinolol or one of the many other date rape drugs that are available, if there were weapons involved in the assault or any other details. We don't know if there's a suspect in the case yet, nor do we know if there should be cause for concern that there may be a rapist on the loose. How could releasing information such as the victim's age or what house the alleged crime occurred in be construed as detrimental to an investigation? It couldn't.

Yet the GSU police claim to be working in the public's best interest.

Would it not be in the public's best interest to release more facts about the case? It is understood to be a sensitive issue, and rightly so, but rather than perpetuate rumors by keeping the public in the dark wouldn't it be better to dispel rumors through presentation of the facts? Apparently not. At least, not yet.

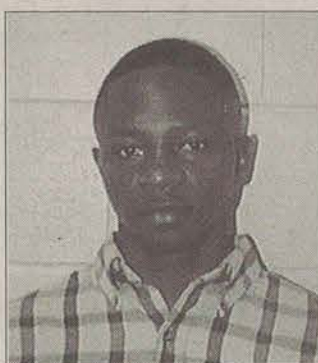
I was thirteen years-old when my father first took me to see "Vertigo." Eight years after we repeated the tradition as the renewed edition came out.

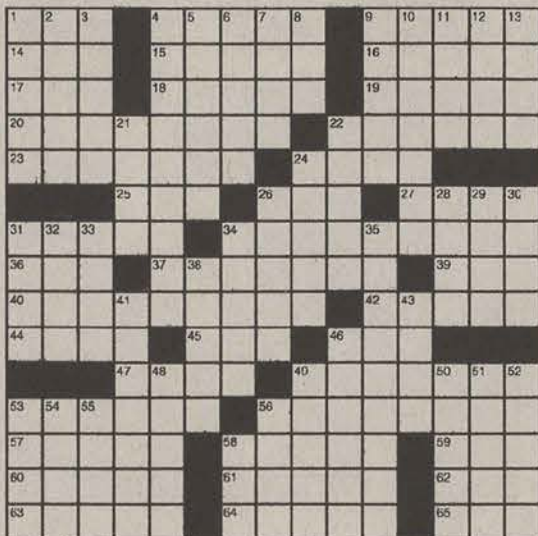

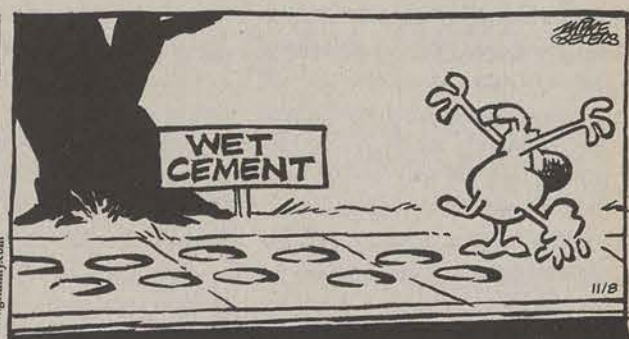

The officials certainly weren't doing the Eagles any favors as they single-handedly took at least 17 GSU points off the board on dubious penalty calls.

Even in the fourth quarter, GSU had a 38-17 lead and it appeared we would make it out of this one. Then, WHAM, before you knew it Furman had scored 21 unanswered points and tied the game at 38. The

fans felt the game slipping away. The conference title, the playoffs, another trip to Chattanooga seemed to hang in the balance.

Enter Greg Hill. 1:43 remained on the clock and the ball sat at the 24-yard line as GSU took over for what is sure to be remembered as "The Drive."

Can you imagine what must have been going on in the mind of Greg Hill at this point? He steps onto the field knowing that this could possibly be the last drive he will make during a regular season home game in his career. On top of that, GSU has struggled offensively in the second half and Furman appears to have the hot arm of Justin Hill waiting to pounce on the opportunity to beat the Eagles.

Hill also knows that he's been in a couple of close games this year against App. St. and Rose Bowl contender Oregon State where the Eagles couldn't get it done.

Even with all these thoughts sure to have been running through his mind, Hill does the unbelievable. He takes three quarterback draws up the field eating up huge chunks of yardage. Taking the Eagle offense on his shoulders, he was determined to make sure this game would not go the way of the others.

He successfully moves the team down to the 11-yard line, setting up a 28-yard field goal attempt for Chris Chambers with :04 on the clock.

Furman tried to ice him with one of their blockers jumping the line of scrimmage and forcing what should have been an encroachment penalty. But, the officials, in all their infinite wisdom, tried even harder to ice him as they held a meeting only to decide there was no penalty on the play.

Davidson ends soccer seasons

• **Jeremy McClure ends his GSU career with two goals as Davidson wins 3-2 in overtime**

The No. 6 seed GSU men's soccer team went on a frenzied rally to tie Davidson in the waning seconds of the game but fell in overtime to the favored Wildcats, 3-2, in the first round of the Southern Conference Tournament. Lawrence Cann scored the game-winner for Davidson off an assist from Paul Watson at the 100:35 mark. The Eagles end their 1999 campaign with a 5-12-1 record overall.

Down 2-0 in the second half, GSU's all-time leading scorer and 1999 all-conference choice Jeremy McClure put the Eagles on the board with a goal at the 54:24 mark off an assist from junior David Fisk.

The Eagles then had several close shot attempts that would have tied the game - one by Fisk, whose shot sailed just past the goal, and the other by freshman Martin Cunningham, whose shot deflected off the crossbar. But at the end of regulation, it

was McClure who would provide the heroics with a goal at the 89:56 mark - just four seconds remaining - off an assist from junior Tony Brown.

In overtime, Davidson scored the game-winner off a corner kick that was fed into the box to Cann from Watson, advancing Davidson into the semifinals round of the tournament.

The Wildcats provided all the scoring in the first half. They jumped on the board at the 8:10 mark of the contest when Hart Roper scored an unassisted goal. The Wildcats made the score 2-0 when Chris Norbet took a feed from Dane Erickson and scored in the 22nd minute.

This marks the second consecutive year the Eagles have lost a Southern Conference Tournament first-round match in overtime. Appalachian State beat the Eagles 1-0 in overtime a year ago at Eagle Field.

Davidson advanced to the finals of the Southern Conference Tournament for the first time since 1996 with a 4-1 victory over GSU Saturday at UNC-Greensboro.

The Wildcats will meet Furman, a 4-1 winner over Wofford, in the final Sunday at 2 p.m. The winner receives an automatic bid to the NCAA Tournament.

Four different players scored for the Wildcats, now 11-7-2, with Lauren Dennis's goal at the 84:27 mark putting the game out of reach for the Eagles. A pass by Carolyn Stumpf bounced off Dennis's back and into the goal to give Davidson a 3-1 lead.

The goal broke the momentum that GSU had gained when Southern Conference player-of-the-year Tara Chaisson scored on a rebound on the end line at the 71:12 mark to cut the Davidson lead to 2-1.

Tara Maloney opened the scoring for Davidson at the 1:49 mark when she slotted a ball to the lower right corner after taking Eagles goalkeeper Vanessa Bales one-on-one. Stumpf gave the Wildcats a 2-0 lead at the 9:39 mark with a flick over Bales that hit the bottom of the crossbar and went into the net.

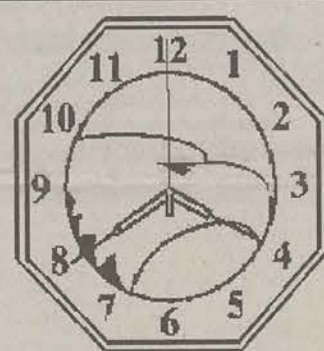
Heather Maloney rounded out the scoring for the Wildcats with a penalty kick at the 86:14 mark.

Davidson outshot GSU 18-8 and took seven corner kicks to the Eagles' two. Bales had four saves, while Wildcat goalie Winnie Corrigan made six stops.

The Wildcats made three straight appearances in the tournament final from 1994-96 and did not allow a goal in those games. Sunday's final will be a rematch of the 1995 final, which Davidson won 3-0.

GSU finishes the season at 10-9-1.

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GSU swimming defeats NC A&T at home, 107-58

GSU swimming and diving won their first home meet against North Carolina A&T Saturday morning at Hanner Natatorium, 107-58, bringing their current record up to 3-7.

GSU grabbed an early lead on North Carolina A&T as the 200-yard medley relay consisting of Melanie Deal, Annie Burton, Brooke Frederick, and Kelly Frost, cruised into first place with a time of 1:58.49.

The GSU swimming and diving team displayed their force as they captured first place in eight of the 11 events with sophomore Jennifer Martin and freshman Brooke Frederick capturing two first place finishes each.

Martin won the 100-yard Butterfly with a season best time of 1:00.97,

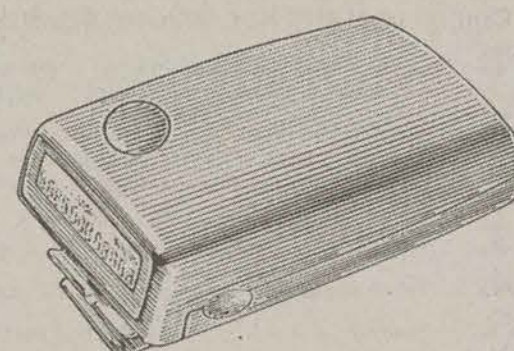
and also earned first place in the 100-yard backstroke with a time of 1:03.47.
