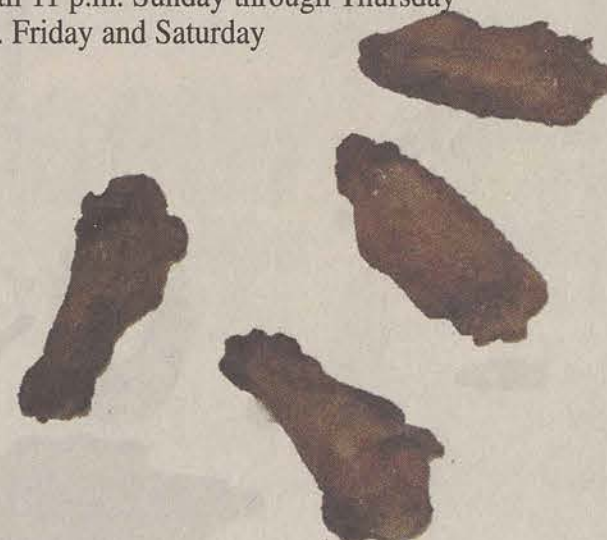

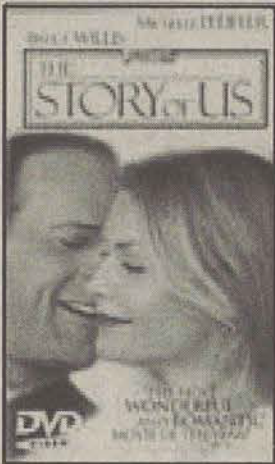

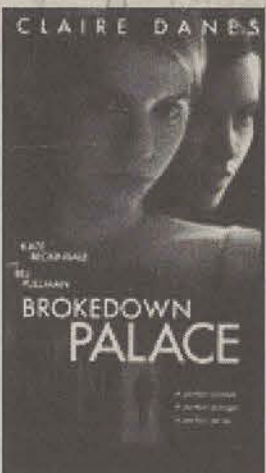

ing on Broadway, to share her wonderful voice and beautiful spirit. I'm so happy to share her with the GSU community."

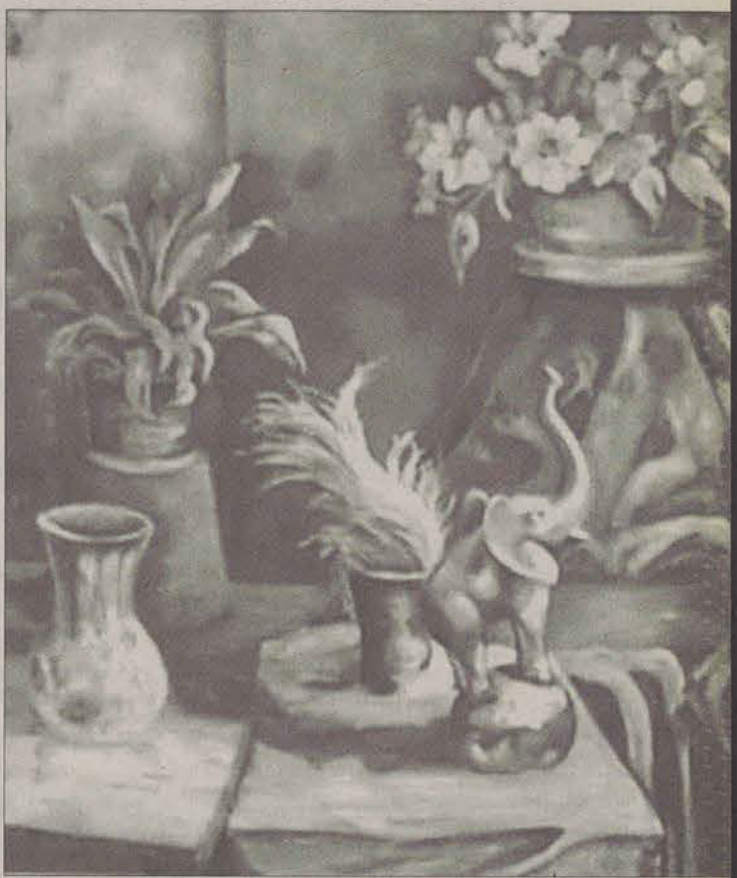

The opening is tonight from 7 to 9 p.m.

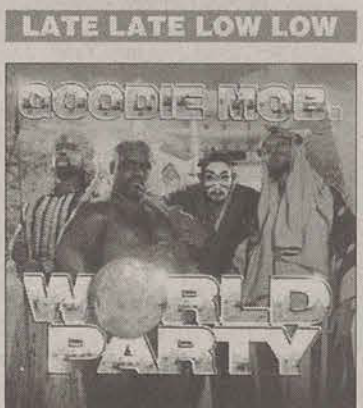

Seth is running a profitable but illegal casino in his New York apartment when he is approached with a deal he can't refuse: the opportunity to make millions of dollars quickly without a degree.

Pressured by his father (Ron Rifkin) to shut down his gambling operation, Seth redeems himself by becoming a stockbroker with an obscure firm run by fast-talking white boys who spew ebonics, drive flashy cars, and own prime real estate. At least, that's the idea.

As Seth unwittingly learns more than he bargained for about the stock market and taking people's money, he realizes he is caught in a web that offers no easy escape.

The concept is interesting. Ben Affleck, as the agency's recruiter, vividly portrays the passion of overnight riches. Chris Varik (Vin Diesel) is the sharp-talking

nice guy who helps Seth acclimate to his new environment. The remaining actors play their roles adequately, although the audience laughed at Ribisi's outburst in

what was intended to be an emotional scene that evolved more like an overdone charade. Other funny moments were more intentional and successful.

"Boiler Room's" weaknesses detracted from the film's potential. Token characters and a poor voice-track nullify the movie's strengths.

A few Jewish guys, an Italian, and one black female comprised the main roles. The Jews had the bucks; the Italian had the heart. Nia Long plays the beautiful secretary who

has dated Seth's supervisor and is called a "whore" until she falls in love with Seth. Then she betrays him unforgivably.

Lengthy driving scenes reminiscent of O.J. Simpson's low-speed chase (minus the police) will give viewers a chance to run to the bathroom without missing a thing. No dialog. No purpose. No kidding. Great if you go to the movies for the snack bar, not much fun when you're trying to

enjoy yourself.

Produced for a college-age crowd, the film succeeds in providing more belches than bubble. "Boiler Room" might be acceptable for mindless entertainment on the television, but save your money 'til it gets there. It shouldn't take long.

"She's willing to carry other teammates if they need help"

•Senior Tondra Warren brings leadership to women's basketball

Senior sensation Tondra Warren has had an exceptional career as a GSU Lady Eagle.

Relying mainly on experience and her strong spiritual background, this Summerville, S.C. native plays a major leadership role on the basketball court.

"I have a leadership image about me," says Warren. "I've grown up to be so independent by myself and so outgoing, that I brought it to the team." Warren displays leadership on the court through her aggressiveness. "Tondra is willing to take the ball to the hole in a strong manner," said senior Sharon Mitchell. "She is also willing to carry other teammates if they need help."

Injuries slowed down Warren during her freshman campaign, but through hard work and dedication, she was able to overcome those injuries to put up solid numbers during the remainder of her career.

"I think I learned from being out a year. I was able to watch everything that was going on around me and that gave me the opportunity to take everything I have and put it on the court."

As a junior, Warren averaged a solid 13 points and 5.4 rebounds per game. A year later, Warren has slightly increased her rebounding figures and has averaged 11.5 points per game thus far.

"Tondra's game has definitely improved since her initial years," said Mitchell. "Her game time has increased because she's willing to get the ball more and score. Where as, when she first got here, she played more of a quiet role... she just rebounded."

Head coach Rusty Cram has greatly influenced Warren in her successful career. His laid-back coaching style was one that she initially wasn't used to.

"I feel that he's a very good coach," said Warren. "He's very lenient in some areas and that wasn't something that I was used to. I was used to a more strict and stern coach. And now looking back, I think we needed him to be a little tougher on us... that's discipline."

As a senior, Warren continues to display her experience along with her athleticism.

"Tondra brings to the team a lot of returning experience against very high-caliber competition," said Cram. "She's a perennial scorer and her athleticism goes along way for us."

Warren, a full-time student, athlete and mother, has learned time management skills and has managed to maintain her GPA as well as student teach.

"I have learned that my academics are more important than sports," said Warren. "Since my freshman year, I've handled things a lot differently. Now I get my studying done before practice because I know that when I get home I'll be tired. Time management is the most important key."

Upon graduation, Warren plans to continue her basketball career either in the states or overseas.

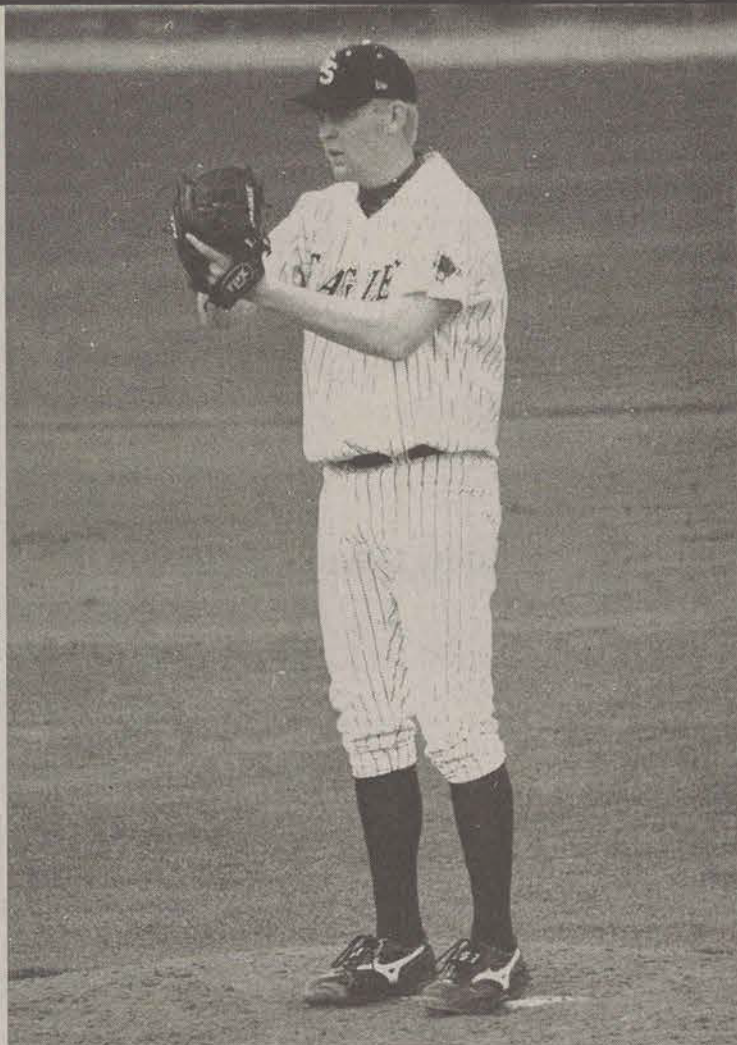
"I'm going to try out for the professionals in March and if that doesn't work out, my AAU coach is going to help me to get overseas if I can't get anything in the states," said Warren. "I'll have my degree in Special Education, so I can get a job at anytime. I've gotten several job offers already, so I should be okay."

So what advice would Warren leave to her teammates?

"Whatever trials and tribulations you go through, go through it with the feeling that there will be another day. Also, carry the Lord with you at all times and everything will be okay."

Eagle baseball chalks up first win of the season

JACKSONVILLE, Fla. — Jacksonville dropped to 4-2 on the season with a 3-1 loss at the hands of GSU (1-2) on Wednesday afternoon at Alexander Brest Field. The win by the Eagles, in the 100th meeting between the two schools in baseball, snapped a nine-game losing streak to the Dolphins in Jacksonville, dating back to the 1987 season.

Jacksonville junior Marcus Bell and GSU junior Mike Standridge hooked up for a classic pitchers-duel, Bell carrying a no-hitter into the sixth inning. JU pushed across their only run of the game in the second after sophomore Chad Oliva singled with one out. Oliva stole second and advanced to third on a throwing error by the GSU catcher Ryan Flemming. After Standridge struck out the next Dolphin batter for the inning's second out, Oliva scored on a passed ball, Flemming's first of the season. Bell struggled with his control throughout the game, walking seven and hitting one, but he didn't allow a hit until Matt Herring laced a single to right to drive in John Durik who had walked to open the inning for the Eagles. After a Durik stolen base, Brian Rhinehart singled to center for GSU's second hit of the game, but Durik was thrown out at the plate by Jacksonville sophomore Troy Veleber to end the inning with no more damage done.

With the game tied at 1-1, JU put runners at first and third after getting an inning-opening walk by junior Phil Nover and a two out single by Oliva. GSU first-year head coach Rodney Hennon countered by bringing in sophomore Brett Lewis

(Jonesboro, Ga.) to face Jacksonville senior Grant Conyers. Lewis ended the Dolphin threat by striking out Conyers on a called third strike.

Bell and Lewis battled into the ninth inning with the game still tied at 1-1, both pitchers facing the minimum in the seventh and eighth. After retiring the first batter in the ninth, Bell's control problems finally came back to hurt him when a walk to Herring was followed by a Rhinehart double down the rightfield line. With runners at second and third, Bell intentionally walked the next GSU batter to load the bases. Eagle junior Dustin Langley made the Dolphins pay with a single to left that scored Herring and left the bases still full of Eagles. GSU picked up an insurance run on a fielder's choice, before Bell induced a comebacker to end the inning.

With a 3-1 lead in hand, Lewis struckout former Eagle Brook Hoover (Jacksonville, Fla.) to open the bottom of the ninth before Oliva ripped a single to left. After JU inserted a pinch-runner for Oliva, Lewis recorded a strikeout and a ground ball to second to end the game. Lewis (1-0) picked up the victory for GSU, while Bell (2-1) took the hard-luck loss in a complete game effort. The victory was the first at GSU for Hennon, who took over the Georgia Southern program after long-time head coach Jack Stallings retired following the 1999 season.

In a game featuring great pitching, Oliva (3-4) was the only Dolphin to record multiple hits as the team collected just four against the duo of Standridge and Lewis. Meanwhile, Rhinehart (2-2) was the only Eagle to muster multiple hits versus Bell who allowed just four hits and struck out seven.

MACON- The GSU tennis teams split with in-state rival Mercer on Wednesday. The Eagle men won all nine matches for a 7-0 victory while the women's team dropped a heartbreaking 5-4 decision.

The men (2-5) picked up their fourth doubles point in seven matches this season, winning all three matches on Wednesday. Kendall Swartz and Ryan O'Keefe picked up their fourth win of the season, winning 8-2 at the number one position. Darren Clark teamed up with Florian Sheidat for an 8-3 victory in the second slot, and Wojciech Nowak and Jesper Andersson continued their torrid pace this season, defeating the Bears' third doubles team, 8-5.

In singles play, two GSU players achieved their first wins of the season. Junior Ryan O'Keefe had little trouble with Mercer's Felipe Echeverri to earn his first win of the year at number two singles, winning 6-0, 6-4. Freshman Uli Ebensparger, playing in his first match, also picked up his first victory, defeating Jeff Moore 6-4, 3-6, 6-3.

On the women's side, despite receiving dual wins from both Isabella Kling and Martha Barrett, the Eagles were unable to win the match. Kling defeated Mercer's Lia Fabiano 6-1, 6-0 at first singles and then teamed up with Brooke McNamee for an 8-0 victory in doubles play. Barrett claimed victory over the Bears' Beth Bolton in singles play 7-5, 3-6, 6-3, and also paired up with Jennifer Rummion for an 8-4 doubles victory.

Both GSU teams are back in action on Saturday. The men host Radford at 1 p.m. and the women will travel to nationally-ranked South Florida for an 11 a.m. start.

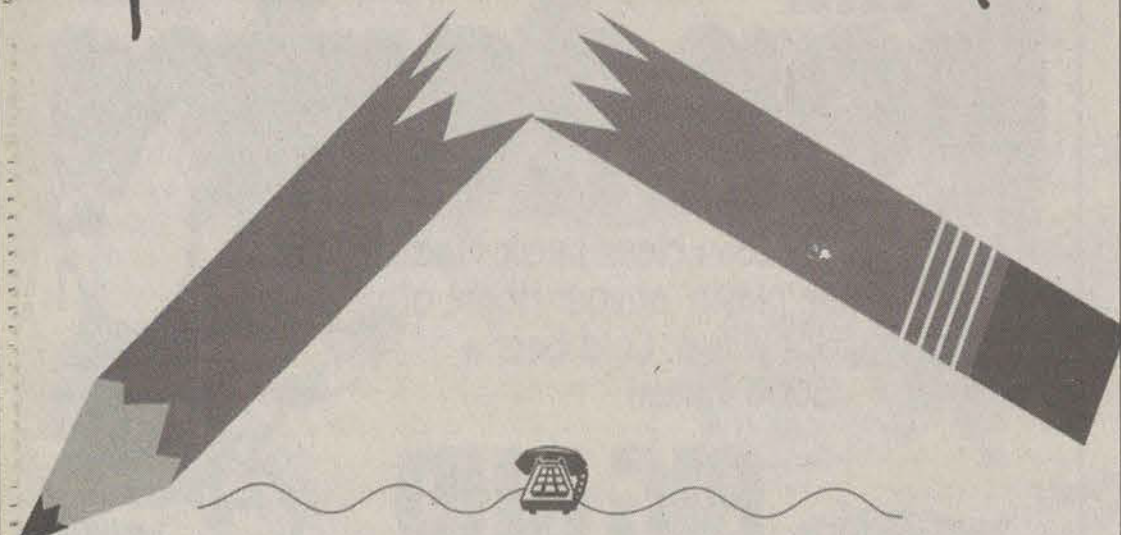
Last weekend was the 11th Annual Black Rose tournament. The tournament was played in single elimination.

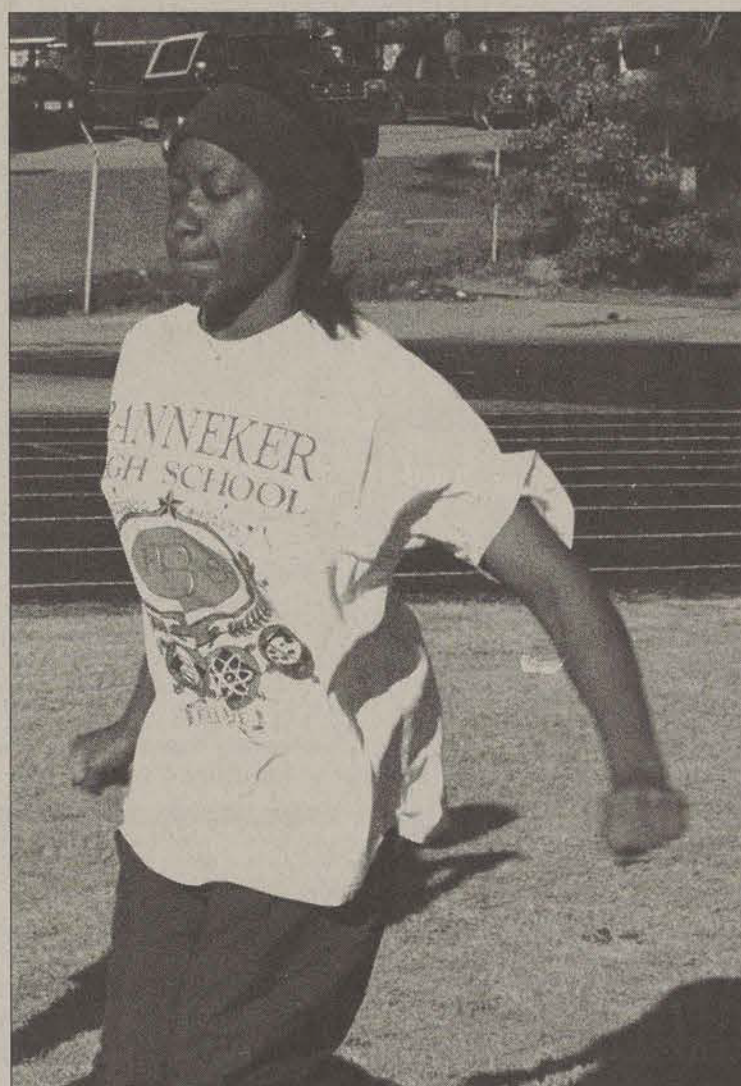

The GSU women's basketball team will play its final home game of the 1999-2000 season this Saturday when it hosts the Western Carolina Catamounts in Southern Conference action. The game is scheduled to begin at 7 p.m.

GSU will recognize its two seniors, Tondra Warren and Nikita Whatley prior to the game. Warren, a forward from Summerville, S.C., is the team's second-leading scorer and currently leads the team in rebounding. She is currently averaging 11.5 points and 6.7 rebounds per game. Warren has started 20 of 24 games for the Lady Eagles this year.

Whatley, a guard from Decatur, Ga., is currently averaging 5.8 points and 2.3 rebounds per game for GSU. She has started 16 of the 24 Lady Eagle games.

The GSU men's basketball squad (14-10, 8-5) will be looking for its seventh win in its last nine games when they travel to Furman Friday night in a key Southern Conference South Division matchup. GSU, tied with Wofford for second place in the SoCon South, is coming off of a 83-67 loss to the College of Charleston Monday. Senior guard DeMarlo Slocum led Southern with 16 points off the bench, while Hamp Jones posted his sixth double-double of the season, tallying 11 points and 11 rebounds.

Furman, losers of three straight and six of their last seven, enter the contest in last place of the South Division with a 2-10 record in league play, 9-17 overall. The Paladins are led by freshman forward Karim Souchu, who leads the squad in scoring and rebounding with 15.7 points and 7.7 rebounds per game.

In their previous meeting this season, GSU claimed its biggest win ever against Furman, posting an 89-77 victory on January 3. Freshman Julius Jenkins led all scorers with 23 while Kashien Latham added a double-double with 20 points and 10 boards.
