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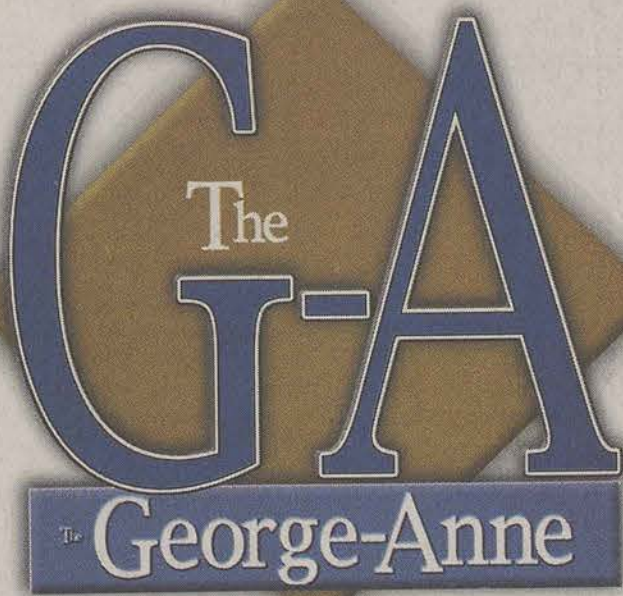

Inappropriate GSU fan behavior subject of NCAA reprimand

GSU was reprimanded on March 20 by the NCAA Division I-AA Football Committee which cited "inappropriate behavior by its fans" during quarterfinal and semifinal playoff contests held at Paulson Stadium in December of 1999.

The reprimand was formulated, composed and disseminated by the eight-member committee, which consists of nationally-appointed Division I-AA athletics directors and conference commissioners.

In a statement released the same day, GSU Athletics Director Sam Baker expressed his regret that such a decision was necessary.

"We fully understand and respect the concern the NCAA I-AA Football Committee has expressed in regards to the reports it has received about the actions of a limited number of fans at our playoff games last season," Baker said. "While we believe the overwhelming majority of our supporters are outstanding individuals and fans, unfortunately there were a few who overstepped the bounds of good sportsmanship in a few isolated incidents. We sincerely regret that even the least of these occurred."

According to Baker, the inquiry was initiated by letters and emails from fans who traveled to the game in Statesboro from the University of Massachusetts and Illinois State University. No problems were reported from the first playoff game against Northern Arizona University.

Baker and his game management staff were asked to appear before the committee and discuss circumstances surrounding the reported incidents during a January 26 meeting.

GSU was not held responsible for any infractions that occurred during the I-AA championship game in

Chattanooga because GSU was not responsible for managing that event.

"We were not responsible for game management in Chattanooga, so no penalty was assessed against GSU," Baker said. "That game was organized by the Chattanooga committee."

The report cited the use of "abusive language" by GSU fans that was aimed at visiting fans from both UMass and Illinois State. While not mentioned specifically by the reprimand, there were also complaints rendered by Illinois State fans citing

Three leave baseball for varying reasons

Three more players have quit the GSU baseball team, but only one cites the hazing incident as his reason to leave. With the three gone, the Eagles have lost at least eight players this season for various reasons.

Head coach Rodney Hennon said that while he has not experienced such turnover before, that it does happen when a new coach takes over.

"I haven't tried to run any guys off or anything," he said.

Junior right-handed pitcher Bill Stewart left the team on March 13 after an away series against Davidson. He said that he left the team because he felt the team had been ruined by the dismissal of four players in January for hazing.

Stewart, who had an ERA of 6.23, said that he left because he did not like the new coaching staff, the way they handled the hazing investigation, or the way the team was being handled.

"It's been killing me being out there," Stewart said. "This coach ruined our team. He kicked some guys off [while] other guys are still out there playing [who did the same thing]. It finally got to me."

Hennon said that he has not spoken with Stewart about his departure.

"He never came to see me," Hennon said. "He talked to [pitching] Coach [Sean] Teague and cleaned out his locker. I have not spoken to him."

Stewart said that with the loss of starters Ryan Petersen and Jody Pollock, who were dismissed,

and Jimmy Alexander, who quit, the team has not been the same emotionally or physically.

"The team is terrible now, a bunch of scrubs out there," Stewart said. "I can't stand playing for a bunch of losers when I know we'd be winning with the guys we had."

He said that because Petersen, Pollock, Scott Burks and Rhett Roberts were dismissed the team has no leadership or drive.

"[The coaches] acted like it was no big deal [captains were kicked off the team]," Stewart said. "You can't do that. You have no drive out there anymore."

He said now that so many players are gone that the team has no chemistry to win.

"The coaches even said 'you guys aren't our players, we'll go get our players next year,'" Stewart said.

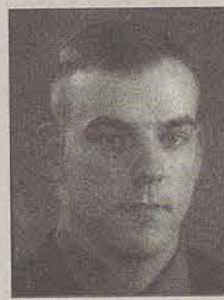
Hennon said that this is not the attitude of the coaches.

"The kids that are with us I care about," Hennon said. "We are going to continue to work hard and get better. I like the kids; they put forth a good effort."

Fellow pitcher Mike Stanridge, also a junior and a right-handed pitcher, left the team for personal reasons. He said he never fully recovered from arm surgery last summer and he felt he did

not have a professional future in baseball. His wife also gave birth on March 11, two days before Stanridge quit, after a complicated pregnancy. He admitted to not agreeing with the way the investigation was handled, but said it was a minor factor in why he quit.

"It's more a combination of things," Stanridge said. "I recently had a baby, and I didn't fully realize until she was born the impact that has on somebody's life and that is a full-time job. Also my elbow just never came back to what it used to be, and I'm not going to have a professional career at this sport. That pulled the rug out from under me."

He did agree with Stewart saying he felt the team would have been more successful if the original team was still in place.

"The results of the hazing might have taken some of the enjoyment away," Stanridge said. "The talent was so enormous, including those

guys who were either removed from the team or

Three qualify to run for 2000-01 SGA president

Three GSU students have qualified to run for the position of SGA President in elections to be held next Wednesday and Thursday on the GSU campus.

Joyce Estrada, Zach Rushing and Brett O'Rand filed the necessary paperwork and met the guidelines for placement on the ballot. Estrada and Rushing were interviewed by the *George-Anne*. O'Rand agreed to an interview but failed to appear. Subsequent calls to his home went unanswered.

Joyce Estrada, who is currently the SGA Executive Vice President, has formed a five-member executive board ticket whose campaign slogan is "moving forward, making changes."

She says she was encouraged to run by fellow students and senators. "I was encouraged by fellow students and senators to continue and implement the progress that should have been implemented this year," Estrada said.

Estrada said she fully believes that SGA's reputation has suffered under the current administration and said she will make it her first priority to repair that damage. She further said she doesn't believe her connection to the current SGA will hinder her ability to connect with student voters.

"When I first ran with Nicely, I did take pride in that," Estrada said. "But my slogan 'moving forward, making changes' is put forward to show that we are going to correct the problems of the past year. In addition, I have my own personal identity that allows people to see me separate from just SGA and I have developed a level of respect that comes from that identity."

The one thing she said she wishes SGA had accomplished this year - and what the main focus of her campaign will now be - was to continue the strong rapport that previously existed with students, administrators and the Statesboro community.

"I hoped we could have maintained a good working relationship with the city, students and administrators," Estrada said. "SGA's image is one of the most important things we will work on."

Aside from the issue of SGA's image, Estrada's ticket will focus on several other objectives. They include a focus on online registration and development of a transit system at GSU.

Zach Rushing, the second candidate for SGA President, says he will make SGA election reform and repairing the image of SGA his top priorities.

"I'm looking for SGA campaign election reform," Rushing said. "Nicely spent more than the cost of a semester's tuition to win last year and that's way too much. There needs to be a cap of \$300 on campaigns."

Rushing hopes to repair the damage done to SGA's image by providing positive, unifying leadership.

"We need to improve campus unity," Rushing said. "I see a division among students that must be addressed - a division that has become even more evident with the current SGA administration's lack of action. This 'us vs. them' mentality must come to an end."

Rushing, like Estrada, also feels that the GSU students' image is suffering in the community due to a lack of leadership.

"GSU brings in large amounts of money to the local economy," Rushing said. "Yet we are not respected in the community. This is because we lack leadership from students and apathy has taken hold."

Rushing also wants to see SGA begin to report via press release all happenings to local news agencies to improve coverage by media outlets.

In his interview, Rushing took a much harsher view of the Nicely Administration's problems and charged that Joyce Estrada will only be a continuation of the same.

"I find a lot of the proposals on Estrada's ticket are already being worked on," Rushing said. "They aren't proposing bold initiatives, only programs that sound good on paper - much like what Nicely did last year. These are passive promises that have no vision."

Estrada does not agree with that assessment, saying her ticket aimed to set an agenda that wouldn't be impossible to complete.

"We didn't want to make lofty promises we couldn't keep," Estrada said.

Only 2,000 tickets for GSU vs. UGA game available to students

Attention all GSU football fans. It is very important for you to know the late breaking news concerning the GSU versus UGA football game. GSU purchased 10,000 tickets from UGA and of those only 2,000 tickets will be sold to students. The other 8,000 will be sold to season ticket

holders, alumni, and other fans.

"By contract we were able to get 10,000 tickets from the University of Georgia and we [the athletic department] sat down and tried to decide how to divide the tickets up for use," Sam Baker, GSU athletic director, said. "We decided to pull 20 percent of the tickets for the students."

"We felt that by holding out 20

percent of the tickets we will be taking care of the interest from our student body," Baker said.

"After we came up with this plan, we took it to Ron Core, vice president of business and finance, and he approved of it."

According to Baker, all 10,000 of the tickets will be sold. If any of the 8,000 are remaining, they will be

available for the students to purchase.

Since this is the second time GSU has ever played UGA, it will be a game of great interest. In 1992 UGA won 34-7 in Athens. Many GSU fans would like to see the Eagles make this game competitive.

In 1992 the GSU versus UGA game had a 85,434 crowd turnout. UGA is expecting another "sell out"

stadium this year, according to GSU media relations.

Tickets will go on sale in August at the Cowart Building, which is the new ticket office currently being built by the stadium. Each ticket is \$27. More information such as the exact day of tickets sales, will be released before the semester is out.

SGA UPDATE

Students complain about SGA application deadline

The deadline for applying for the SGA elections arrived this week causing frustration from many students due to apparent lack of notice to the deadline.

The announcement of the deadline was the week before spring break and it should have been made well before then because many students have complained they did not know of the deadline, President of SGA Aaron Nicely said.

"[SGA] knew of this deadline in January so we should have announced it well before now," Nicely said. "I know all this is water under the bridge now, but we need to start publicizing earlier next time."

There is no need for us to spend money to get people to run for office, SGA officer Myron Jones said.

"Leaders should come in and show the initiative," Jones said. "They

should know when the deadline is if they want to run."

The following is a synopsis of the SGA events during the meetings of March 22 and March 8:

A preliminary meeting of the House of Representatives was held after a long delay.

The purpose of the house is to give students more of a voice, Senator Sam Tucker said.

"The president of each organization chooses a representative [from the organization] to come to one meeting [of the House] every two weeks," Tucker explained.

The House of Representatives would fix anything broken in the Senate, Nicely said.

"The House allows students to work together and bridge gaps of diversity," Nicely said. "The organizations will be able to talk to one another about issues concerning

them."

Some students are unsure about the institution of a House of Representatives.

"I need to know if we are going to get something done [in order to come back]," College Republicans President Brian Dart said. "If a lot of different organizations attend the first meeting, it will work and the students will come back."

The following organizations received fund requests of \$750: Habitat for Humanity, Pi Sigma Epsilon, ReVision, and Vision Ministries. Other organizations receiving \$500 were UMOJA and Eagle Sports Medicine Association. The NAACP fund request was tabled and told to return at a later date.

The Inauguration of Bruce P. Grube will be Sunday, April 2 at 3 p.m. on Sweetheart Circle.

the fact that GSU fans stormed the field with 19 seconds remaining at the close of the semifinal matchup. Even prior to the reprimand, Baker said GSU was already formulating new game management policy to ensure that such violations would not take place in the future.

"In truth, we had already begun addressing several of these issues before we were contacted by the NCAA," Baker said. "While we certainly appreciated the opportunity to have been able to answer and discuss those questions directly with members of the committee, we had actually already made some adjustments to our procedures for the playoffs. While we recognize the seriousness of these reports... some changes were routinely discussed and implemented without fanfare."

Baker said GSU will implement several new measures to enhance game management efforts. They include prominently displaying the Southern Conference Code of Conduct on stadium concourses and having it read over the PA system prior

to the start of each football game, creating a task force appointed by the vice-president of student affairs that will be charged with soliciting involvement from diverse, influential student groups on campus, developing an educational campaign titled "Championship Fans for a Championship Team" to promote good sportsmanship to GSU students and fans, discontinuing passes-out to stop fans from leaving at half-time to tailgate, and allocating additional funding in the 2000-01 budget to allow for the hiring of a professional ushering group to provide game management assistance.

The termination of passes-out will perhaps be the most contentious of the changes, since many fans do leave at halftime to tailgate and drink, something they cannot do inside the stadium. However, Sam Baker said it is a necessary change.

"People won't be allowed to go out and have more drinks. One of the charges was that our fans were going out and 're-charging' for the second half, making them more raucous."

quit. My expectations for the team this year were off the charts. Had those guys been here I think the team would have been more successful."

While Stanridge said he did not agree with the way the investigation was handled, he does not think that it affected his decision to quit.

"This is honestly a personal decision I made about me, my new family and my arm," he said.

Hennon said he has talked to Stanridge and understands his decision.

"He did come by and told me he felt like he needed to put his family first," Hennon said. "That

is what is most important to him right now, and it should be."

Despite losing four pitchers in one season to a variety of reasons, Hennon said he feels like the Eagles can be still be successful.

"[Losing Stanridge] means we have one less pitcher," he said. "But I feel like we have played pretty good baseball even without them. Life is about fighting through adversity; we're going to work through it."

Outfielder Patrick Jones said he quit the team a few weeks ago because he was not having any fun.

"It was a little bit of every-

thing," Jones said. "It sucked what happened [with the hazing situation], but I wasn't having any fun."

Stanridge said he agreed that the fun of GSU baseball was fading.

"To me, it was getting old," he said. "The fun was fading fast."

Hennon, who did speak with Jones, said that he has no problems with his decision to leave.

"Patrick came by and said he wasn't into it," Hennon said. "He said he wasn't in it 100 percent and felt that he would be cheating the team if he stayed. I have no problem with that; he is a good kid."

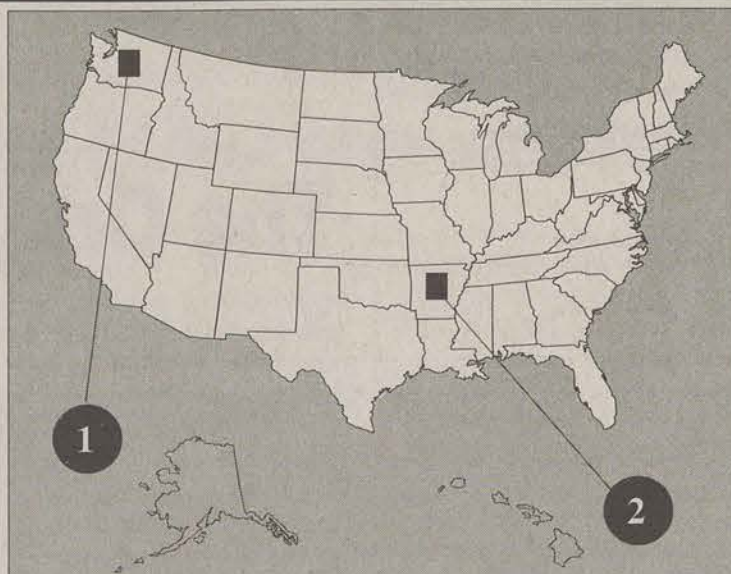
MARYSVILLE—At least one parent is raising a stink over the suspension of three seventh-grade boys who wore cologne in the classroom of a teacher with severe allergies.

Liz Bethel, whose son was suspended for wearing cologne, said Bartlett should be transferred to a grade school where she wouldn't have to deal with fragrances.

to look and smell good, Bethel said.

"They all wear too much makeup," she said. "My son wears too much hair gel."

Yes, the blood pressure was definitely rising, yet I forged on. This was golf!

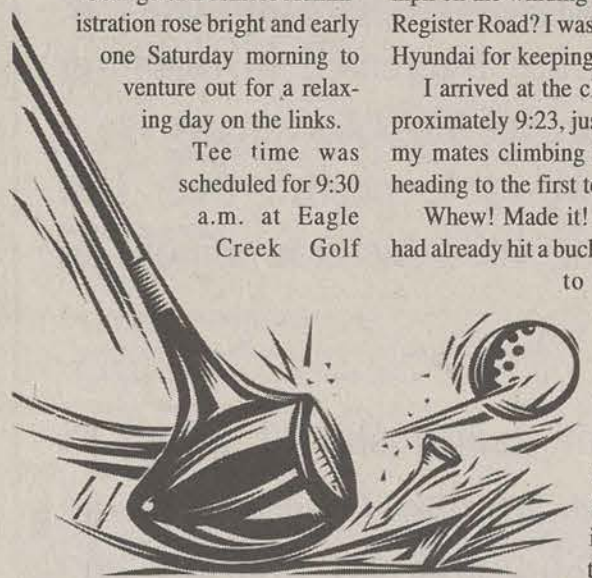
Hole after hole, the same things happened: slice, hook, duff, plug, 3-putt, scuff, and so on, and so on.

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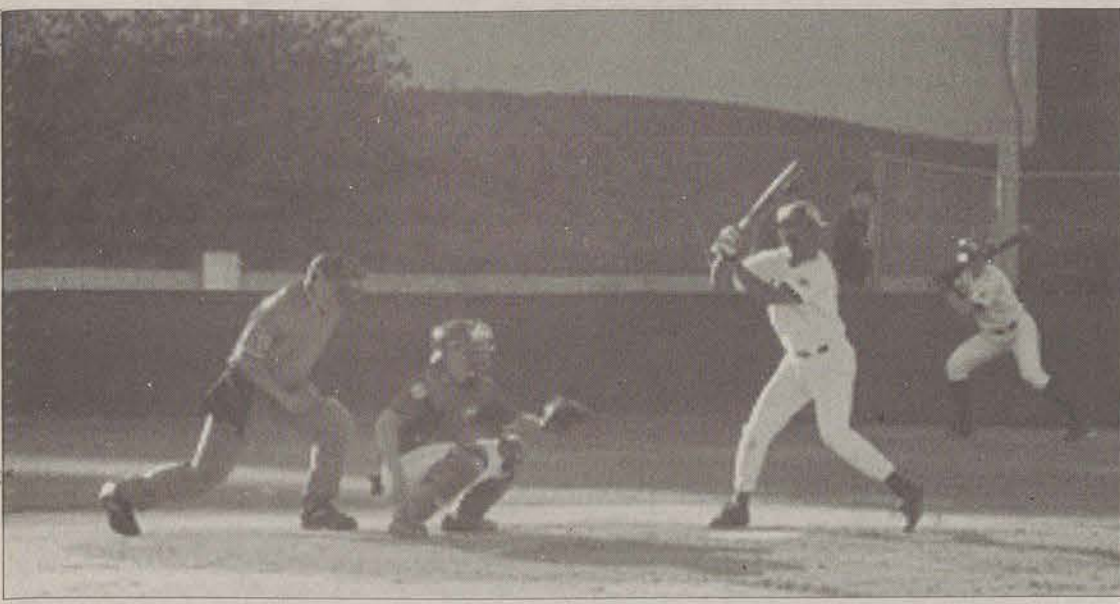

Eagles stomp FAMU over weekend

Junior first baseman Scott Henley keyed a three-run sixth inning with a two-run double to lift GSU to a 10-8 non-conference win over Florida A&M Thursday afternoon and a sweep in the two-game series at J.I. Clements Stadium. GSU scored the most runs by an Eagles team since 1955 in a 29-3 victory the night before.

The Rattlers (9-20), who scored just three runs in the loss to the Eagles Wednesday night, jumped out to an early 3-1 lead. After the two teams traded runs in the first inning, Florida A&M manufactured two runs in the top of the second with the speed of Dwaine Bacon and Alex Smith.

Bacon, who reached base on a walk, stole second and third and eventually scored on a single by Smith. Smith followed by stealing second before scoring on a single by Reggie Griggs.

GSU (11-11) struck back in the bottom of the third to re-take a 4-3 lead. The first four Eagle batters reached base in the inning while the fifth, Brian Rinehart, drove in a run with a sacrifice fly.

The Eagles extended their lead to 6-4 before the Rattlers eventually chased GSU freshman starter Sammy Watson in the sixth. Watson, who struck out a

career-high nine batters, allowed Bacon to reach on a single and walked Smith before being replaced by fellow freshman Ernie Austin. Austin proceeded to hit the first batter he faced and gave up a two-run single to Griggs. The Rattlers added one more run on a Rinehart error before Austin retired Kenta Carter on a groundout to end the threat.

The Eagles took the lead for good in the bottom of the sixth, scoring twice off Florida A&M starter and loser Cesar Jackson (0-1) and tallying a solo run against Rattler reliever Juan Castillo. Walker and John Durik opened the frame with back-to-back singles off Jackson before Scott Henley greeted Castillo with a two-run double which gave GSU an 8-7 lead. After an error by FAMU shortstop Earnest Hardy moved Henley to third, Matt Herringdrove in Henley with a sacrifice fly to push the Eagle margin to two.

Austin (1-0), who surrendered a pair of hits, earned his first career win.

In the first game of the series on Wednesday, GSU scored in every inning except for the second as the game was called after the Rattlers batted in the top of the eighth. The Eagles tallied four runs in the first, nine in the third, two in the fourth, four in the fifth, three in the sixth, and seven in the seventh.

GSU golf receives endowment

The Morris family has been a great supporter of GSU athletics and, in particular, this gift signifies Phil's great interest in our golf program."

Morris, a member of the founding family of the T.J. Morris Company, also owned Morris Aviation. An avid supporter of Eagle Athletics, Morris served on the Executive Board of Directors of Southern Boosters and was a member of the 1906 Society.

Morris was also very influential in the rebirth of the Schenkel E-Z-GO Invitational. He hosted the first meeting to discuss the resurrection of the tournament and was a member of the Schenkel Committee.

GSU golf takes on the Schenkel E-Z-GO Invitational

The GSU golf program will get a major challenge as they host 14 of the top 50 collegiate golf teams in the country this weekend during Statesboro's Schenkel E-Z-GO Invitational.

Led by the 1999 Schenkel team champion Clemson, the 2000 Schenkel E-Z-GO Invitational will feature many of the nation's elite, including four of the top ten golf programs in America.

Clemson, Northwestern, Georgia and Duke are joined with other top 30 programs South Carolina, Augusta State, Florida and North Carolina State to help make the Schenkel tournament one of the toughest in the nation. Other top 50 teams include North Carolina, Texas Christian, Tennessee, LSU, Ohio State and East Tennessee State.

"We think that the competition is the best in the country," said GSU head coach John Laird. "We're excited about getting to compete with the nation's elite."

GSU comes into the tournament fresh off a tenth place finish last week in Greenville, North Carolina. "Christian Newton is playing very well right now," said Laird. "He just finished tied for tenth in the last tournament, shooting a 71, 73. Matt Stroud, our senior, is also playing well as is Justin Kolumber."

Stroud and Kolumber are coming off rounds of 71, 78 and 74, 73 respectively at the Pepsi Invitational at Bradford Creek which saw GSU finish at +14, 19 shots off the pace of Virginia-Commonwealth and Virginia Tech.

"If we concentrate on ourselves and play the course, and not worry about all the other teams, then we should be okay," said Laird.

- A student seeking a position on an editorial or broadcast board must have a **CUMULATIVE GRADE POINT AVERAGE of at least 2.0 and must not be on scholastic or disciplinary probation**. If at any time a board member drops below these standards, that member must relinquish the position.

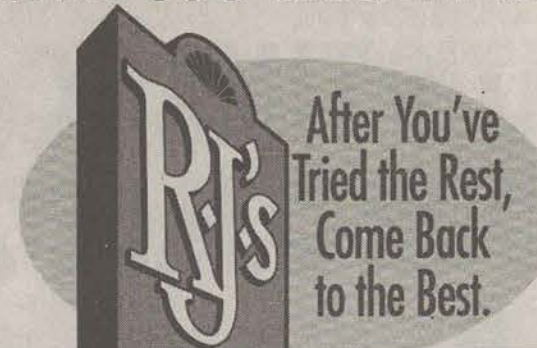

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Shannan Hoobin brings strength and speed to Eagle softball squad

GSU softball player Shannan Hoobin has strength and speed, and she got it the hard

way, by playing baseball with the boys. "I started by playing baseball as a kid because that was all that was there when I was growing up," Hoobin said.

Only after her family moved to a new area did Hoobin get introduced to fastpitch softball. But she wouldn't trade the days with the guys.

"When I played with the guys I gained a lot of strength," she said.

But it was the switch to softball that changed Hoobin's future and her attitude.

"When I moved into fastpitch I gained more knowledge for the game," she said. "I used to have a real bad attitude, though. But just being around the girls and learning everything that they've gone through, just made me focus more on what I was there for."

And the junior's focus is on being part of a team and not focusing on her own accomplishments and goals.

"I feel that everybody as a team adds something [to the team]," Hoobin said. "Nothing stands out about me that helps the team out more. I'm just out here just like everybody else, playing."

While she may not mention it, Hoobin does contribute something extra to the team with her speed. She has stolen 11 bases in 12 attempts and has scored 16 runs, second only to lead-off hitter Stacie Cooper.

"I didn't realize she was as quick as what she was until she got here which is definitely a benefit and a plus for us," head coach Kelley Kirkland said. "We like players who can run the bases as well as she can."

Kirkland said that Hoobin's speed has given the Eagles the opportunity to be more aggressive.

"It allows us the chance to maybe not give up outs on bunting situations," she said. "You can let a hitter hit and take the chance of stealing her."

While professing to not be a stand out, Hoobin's performance versus the University of Maryland proved her wrong; in that game she did stand out. In the March 18 contest, Hoobin hit her first homerun of the season going 1-for-2, scored four runs, got two RBI, was walked twice and stole two bases in GSU's 7-6 victory.

She said her explosion was a result of having nothing to lose.

Lately she had been tense, but some advice from another player and a pep talk from the coach helped her relax at the plate.

"Jen Miller basically told me I needed to start seeing the seams of the ball and start finding them," Hoobin said. "Coach had given us a talk on the bus and there wasn't anything I could do worse than I'd already done and there wasn't any more excuses. I stepped up."

Hoobin wants to contribute to more wins for the team, but said that being a team is more important than being champions.

"I want to see us go to regionals," she said. "I want us to win the conference. But I want us all to stick together, nobody to break out apart from us."

Hoobin transferred from Manatee Community College where she played under a former GSU softball player who introduced her to the Eagle program. She said the atmosphere here clinched the deal for her.

"I liked the school," she said. "When I came here everyone on the softball team was really nice, and I liked the atmosphere."

The biggest transition for Hoobin has been the on-team competition for positions on the field.

"I called my position was set," she said. "We only had one catcher and that's what I came in to do. I didn't really have anyone to battle me."

She said that having to fight for a starting position was challenging, but worth it.

"Here I came in and there were already two catchers," Hoobin said. "I knew that if I was going to play, I was going to have to earn my position at third base, which I had never played before."

She did earn that position and has started all 38 games at third.

"I knew if I didn't give it all I had at third base, I wasn't going to start," Hoobin said. "I wanted to contribute and I wanted to be out there."

Kirkland feels that adding Hoobin to third base has improved the left side of the field.

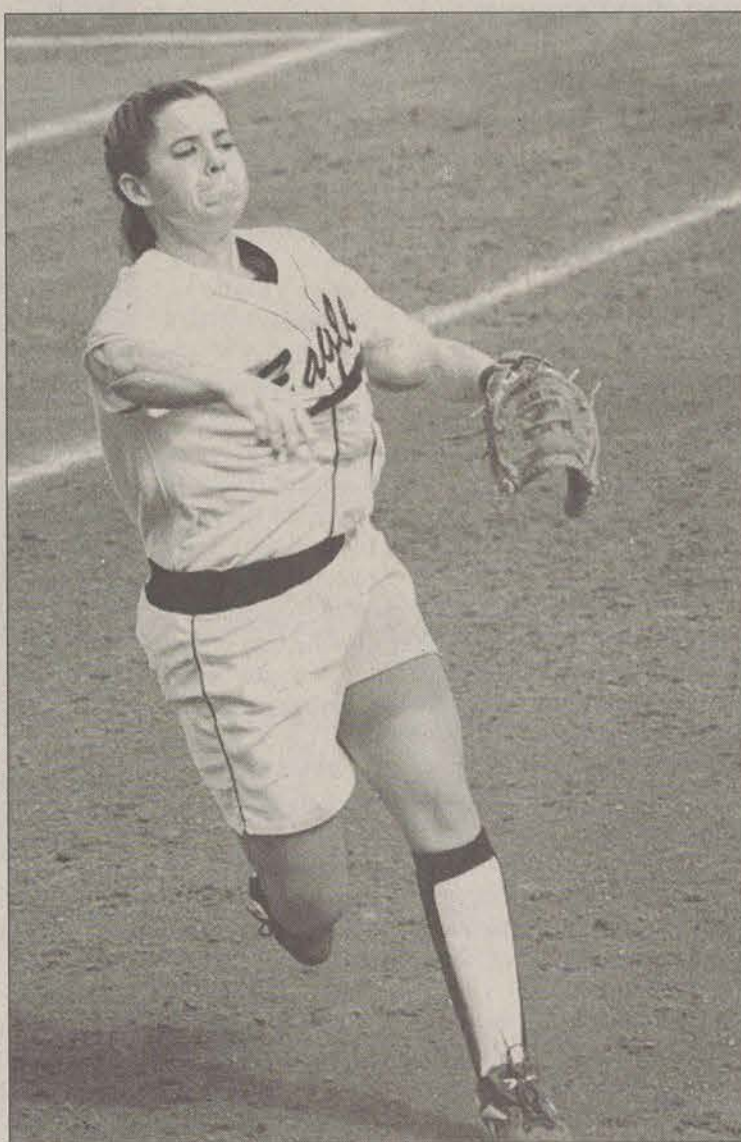
"We haven't had the real aggressive third baseman that she is and [she's] been good for us," Kirkland said. "She's not really shy of anything that comes over there, so that's been real important."

Kirkland said that while Hoobin contributes on both sides of the plate, her biggest contribution is her work ethic.

"Offensively she's strong enough that she can give us the base hit or the home run," Kirkland said. "She's just a good all around ball player. One of her biggest assets is the work ethic she puts in on the field and that's a big plus."

Hoobin said that now she is glad she made the transition to softball because she loves being on a team and that she can't even think of a downside to her experience as an athlete.

"I love softball, and that's what I'm here for."

The GSU women's track and field team started off their Spring Break series of meets in Savannah at the Savannah State University Squad meet. Competing against the Eagles were, University of Dayton, Paine College, Savannah State University and Citadel. The women collected a number of first place finishes and set several personal records this past Tuesday.

Kelia Thomas, a Freshman long jumper placed first and marked a personal best at 18'04.50. Finishing behind her was Monica Lockett (17'08.50) in second place and Star Lingo (15'10.0) in sixth place. "I thought it [my jump] was bad until they called out 18' then I was excited and glad" Thomas said.

Other first place finishes include 400-meter hurdles sensation, Pearl Griggs, who placed first in a time of 1:04.61. "I felt pleased with my time, but I feel I can do better" Griggs said. Finishing behind Griggs for the Eagles were Easter Huggins in fourth places with a time of 1:13.69 and in fifth was Nuwana Waters (1:13.73). Agreeing the 400-meter hurdles is tough was Waters, "It is a tough race, one of the hardest races in track. It is a lot of concentration."

Whitney Nelson, a sophomore transfer student claimed two first place finishes in the high jump (5'04) and in the 800-meter run (2:21.0). "I got more out of it than I expected, I really liked the 800," Nelson said.

In the 400-meter dash Ebonie Ogletree headed to finish for another first place for the Eagles in a time of 1:00.86. Behind Ogletree in fourth place was Shawnae Allen (1:02.73) and Candice Amos (1:06.09) in sixth place.

Continuing to add yet another first place finish for the Eagles was Javonne Blackley in the 200-meter dash. Crossing the finish line in a time of 25.09.

The 4 X 100 meter-dash relay team also placed first for the Eagles at the Savannah meet. "Everybody did pretty good today. I'm really proud of our team" said Nelson.

The women's track and field team gave up their Spring Break to compete in Savannah this past Tuesday and continued to the University of Florida this past weekend.

"I feel like I'm not missing out [on Spring Break] or anything, but I've missed out in things for as long as I can remember doing track, I'm used to it" Allen said.

The women's track and field team will continue their outdoor competition this weekend at the Florida Relays in Gainesville.

The Men's next match will be Saturday at 1:30 p.m. when they host Chattanooga.

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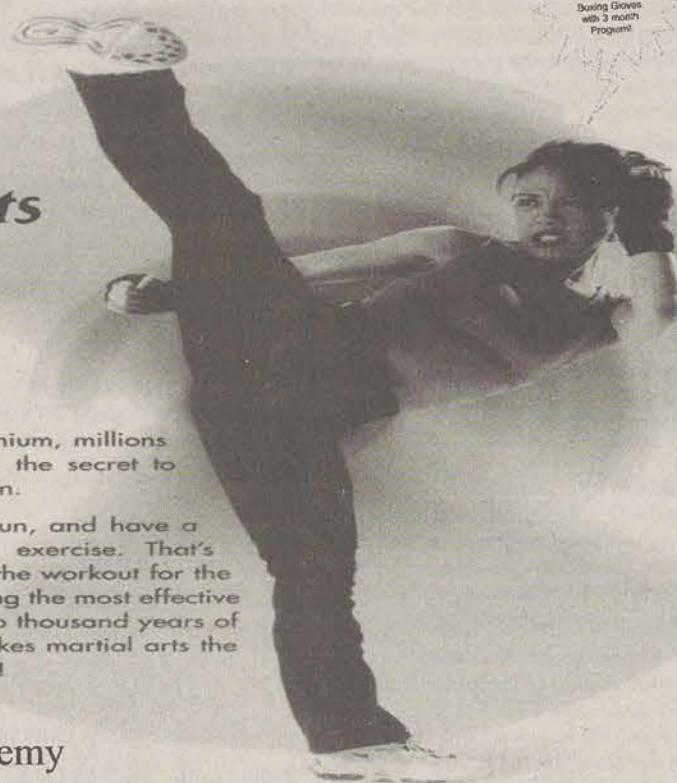
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Richard III is simply evil

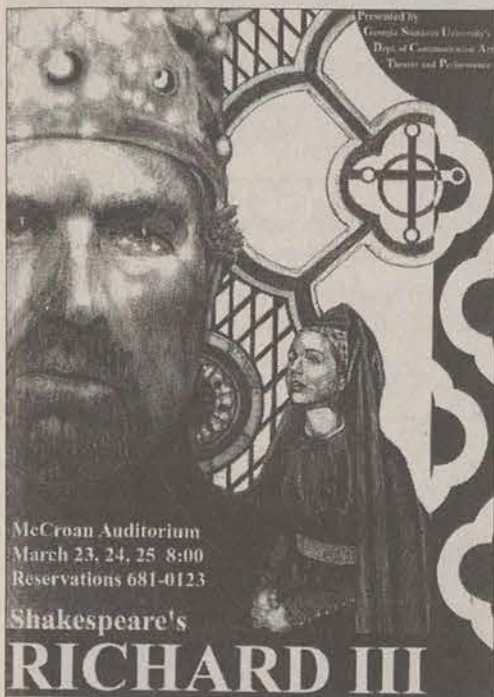
obvious that they knew their roles inside and out, and understood their lines (which, in Shakespeare, can be more important than the acting itself).

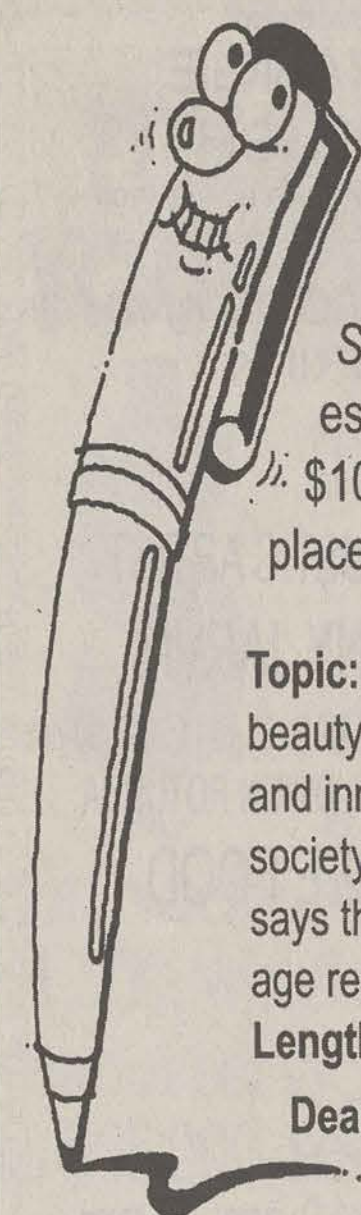
GSU handball club team places fourth in nation
