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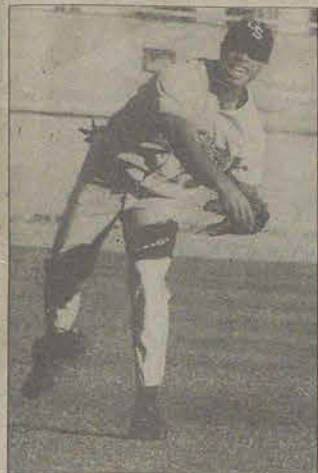
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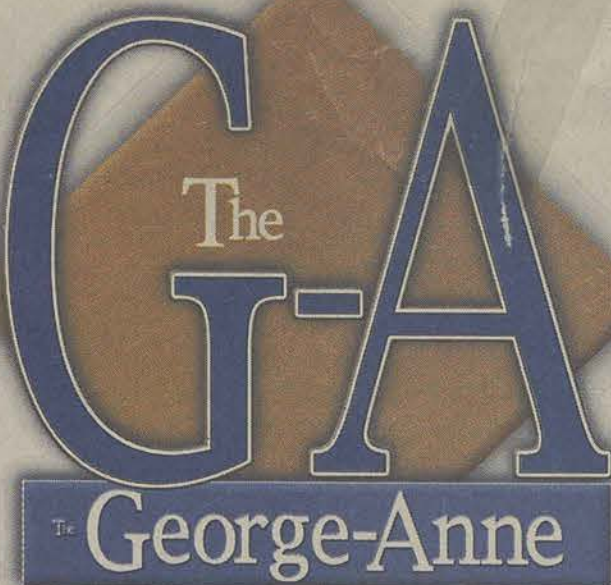

# Baseball adds four to fill out roster

Due to the loss of at least eight players this season, GSU baseball was looking for a few good men to fill the empty spots on the roster. And it looks like they found some.

Because of NCAA rules and regulations, the new players will not be able to receive scholarships this season, but several GSU students are still willing to don the cleats and take the field.

"Turnout was really good for this week's tryouts," head coach Ronnie Herndon said. "I think we have narrowed the field to some quality players that will add a lot to the roster, especially with pitching duties."

One of the new players is junior Randolph Cobian, who played baseball in high school for Butts County.

A right-handed pitcher, Cobian is not new to the demands of being a student-athlete at GSU. His first three years in college, he swam freestyle for the men's swim team.

"I look forward to putting back on a GSU uniform," Cobian said. "I'm just thankful that this one will be a little bit more of me."

Sophomore Jon Milton, a left-handed pitcher, will be relied on to start as soon as next week. A former breast stroke swimmer for GSU, Milton is expected to fit easily into the pitching rotation.

"Jon is a good kid," Herndon said. "I am glad that there is an

opportunity for him to continue competing for the Eagles."

Milton said he looks forward to contributing to the team.

"I'm not happy with why there are openings, or why I am able to compete," Milton said. "But I am glad that when my parents come to see me compete, I won't be practically naked."

Another new player is former cross country runner Andy Price, who will likely see some time at second base.

"I understand that I'm not starting," Price said. "But I am glad to be physically active again."

Herndon said that Price's speed will cause him to be relied on as a pinch runner.

"Andy's been running even after the [cross country] team was dropped," he said. "He may not feel like he is in the best shape, but he's still fast."

Also new to the infield will be Michael Swan, a former diver for the Eagles. Herndon said that with his graceful background, he may see some action on first base.

"He is very flexible," Herndon said. "I suspect he will be able to keep one foot on the plate while twisting to catch the ball."

Swan said he is not so sure that he will see playing time any time soon.

"I'm not very good at catching the ball yet," he said. "I plan to practice pretty hard, but coach thinks I will be able to pick it up pretty quickly."

# UGA backs out of season opener

The much anticipated season opener that paired GSU against UGA has been canceled due to the inappropriate GSU fan behavior during the NCAA I-AA playoffs.

UGA officials announced that due to fear of further inappropriate fan behavior they will not host the Sept. 2 game at Sanford Stadium in Athens.

"If GSU fans are willing to storm fields and tear down goalposts, both at home and at the Chattanooga field, what is to say that such behavior will not be exhibited in Athens," UGA Athletic Director Vince Dooley questioned.

Sanford Stadium, which holds approximately 75,000 people, is famous for meticulously kept hedges that surround the football field itself. According to Dooley, there have been several messages posted on the UGA message board from GSU fans threatening to either trample, tear down or spray paint the hedges.

"Our hedges are part of an honored tradition," Dooley said. "I would hate to see anything happen to them. The spray paint causes great damage to the plants and would be hard to cover up."

GSU Athletics Director Sam Baker expressed disappointment in the decision to cancel the game.

"I respect the decision that UGA made, but I am extremely disappointed that GSU will not be able to compete against one of the nation's best

teams," Baker said. "I truly thought that our football program had an opportunity to show how far we have come by playing UGA."

Head Coach Paul Johnson expressed dissatisfaction as well.

"Ever since won the NCAA I-AA championship the returning players and the newcomers have been looking forward to playing UGA," Johnson said. "My heart goes out to all the players that were determined to put the GSU football program back in the national spotlight."

Not only is coach Johnson disappointed with UGA's decision but the faculty and students that found out about the late cancellation were distraught.

Dr. Simon Attle, an assistant professor in the department of recreation and sport management, has expressed thoughts of shock and denial.

"I was really looking forward to traveling up to UGA to watch the Eagles compete against the Bulldogs," Attle said. "I had canceled several important meetings at a sport management conference in Jacksonville, but now I guess I can make the conference."

Attle also added, "I think there was more to the

decision to cancel the game than what the UGA officials are telling the public."

Several students expressed their opinions about the season opener getting canceled too.

"I think that UGA was scared to get a dose of the man we all like to call A.P.," said sophomore nursing major Jeff Mettke.

"I know a lot of people in A-town and there were telling me that UGA did not have what it took to stop the triple option offense."

Chad Gentry, a teaching

assistant in the botany department, said, "I would have loved to see GSU play UGA. Since I moved here from Topeka I have been looking forward to getting a taste of big time college football, but now I guess I will have to wait for another day to see Sanford Stadium."

Now GSU is left to find another opponent to fill the September 2 slot that has abruptly become available. No word yet on what team GSU can play, but several NCAA I-A teams have contacted Baker.



# Spring graduation ceremonies canceled

This year's spring graduation ceremony has been postponed until December due to the ongoing construction near Paulson Stadium, where commencement had been planned.

Students who are scheduled to participate in spring graduation will automatically be rescheduled for winter graduation.

According to Linda Bleiken, vice president of academic affairs, the Cowart Building, which was scheduled to be completed last month, will

not be finished until August. This would create a problem with equipment being in the way during the ceremony, along with the typical loud noises associated with large machinery.

Traditionally, graduation has been held in Hanner Fieldhouse, but because accommodating the large number of graduates and their families has become increasingly difficult, a mass graduation ceremony was planned for Paulson Stadium this spring, allowing for more space. Students who are completing degree requirements

during summer semester had been given the choice to walk this spring, or wait until the fall graduation ceremony. However, after a meeting with builders Wednesday, university officials announced that mass graduation would be held for spring, summer and winter graduates on December 17.

"We hate to keep moving graduation dates, but it is necessary due to the situation at hand," Bleiken said. "This construction is very important and calling it off for one whole day would put the completion date even

further behind."

Those students who anticipate to graduate in December have until Monday, April 2 to pay the \$50 graduation fee. If the graduation fee is not paid, students will not be eligible to participate in commencement exercises.

"We're going to have so many more students graduating in this single ceremony, so we need to go ahead and get their money now just so we'll know how many to expect," Geraldine Jernigan, graduation counselor, said. "There will be no excuses for non-payment."

# Grube proposes smoke-free campus

President Grube announced that GSU is considering either to enact anti-smoking regulations on campus. He made the announcement during an address to the student organization leaders who gathered in Russell Union Ballroom for a reception Tuesday evening.

"Non-smoking areas are becoming the standard for many enterprises. Restaurants, homes, and hotels are erecting non-smoking from contamination of their lungs with carcinogens," he told the audience during his welcome speech.

If adopted, the new policy would force students who want to smoke to leave campus entirely. A \$15 fine will be issued to any students or faculty caught smoking anywhere on campus, including dorms and outdoors. Even people smoking in their cars could face penalties for non-compliance. Currently, GSU does not allow smoking in any of its instructional buildings, administrative offices or food service establishments. However, students, faculty, and visitors are allowed to smoke outdoors anywhere on campus.

While the motion has not passed yet, it immediately received considerable support. "When I accepted this position, I expected that students and faculty would contribute suggestions for a comprehensive strategic plan to outline the university's goals for the coming years. Since that time, this suggestion has been received by a number of students and faculty alike."

Robert Wilson, a non-smoking junior, said he was happy to hear about the measure. "It will help smokers realize that

their habits do affect other people, and maybe that will help them stop."

Freshman Alicia Williams agreed.

"I smoke, and the first thing I do when I walk out of class is light up," she said. "Even though I will have a hard time adjusting to it, I think it will be better for me in the long run." Grube described the reasons for the measure.

"The university has a responsibility to its students to promote healthy lifestyles as well as education," he said. "This proposal is consistent with two of the platforms I presented during the State of the University address last fall."

He is referring to his dedication to provide a "student-centered" campus and to focus on the university's physical environment.

Besides promoting good health, he said, the policy will have other benefits.

"Revenue (that GSU receives) from fines will be earmarked to establish a new parking lot." In addition, he claimed, it will beautify the campus by decreasing litter.

Some people, however, are angry that the issue is being considered.

"It's bad enough having to go outside when the weather's bad, but now we have to go all the way off campus. I don't even drive," said Denise Taylor, a sophomore.

Ryan Thompson has another reason to feel angry.

"I should at least be able to smoke in my room. I pay rent just like people who live off-campus," he said. "It's a matter of my right to privacy."

## Estrada wins SGA presidency with low voter turnout

#### Rare Syberian tick multiplies 5,000 times in 24 hours

When Dr. Jekyll walked into the U.S. National Tick Collection on campus Wednesday morning, he got a big surprise. With an estimated 5,000 Syberian ticks on the loose, Jekyll could barely take a step inside the doorway without crushing them beneath his feet.

The ticks, which were discovered only weeks ago in a remote area of Syberia, have yet to be given a name, but researchers are already nick-naming them "hump bugs."

Apparently, these ticks have 500 times the normal sex drive as any other tick, baffling researchers as to how they could have gone undiscovered for this long.

"I just don't understand it," Jekyll said. "We had two shipped in on Tuesday morning, but we left about 15 minutes after getting them situated into their container. When I got back in on Wednesday morning, the little suckers were all over the place!"

Tick clean-up is not an easy task, as it took university workers, fully clad in rubber suits to avoid being bitten, over 16 hours to located all the ticks in the museum.

"We were just happy that the ticks seem to multiply every other

week, otherwise, we would have had a much more nasty situation on our hands," he said.

For now, the recovered ticks are being stored in several metal bins outside the museum awaiting pick up from the Smithsonian Museum of Natural History in Washington D.C.

"I will be glad to see them be picked up," Jekyll said. "I have never in my life imagined something so freakish. I certainly hope I never come across something of this magnitude again."

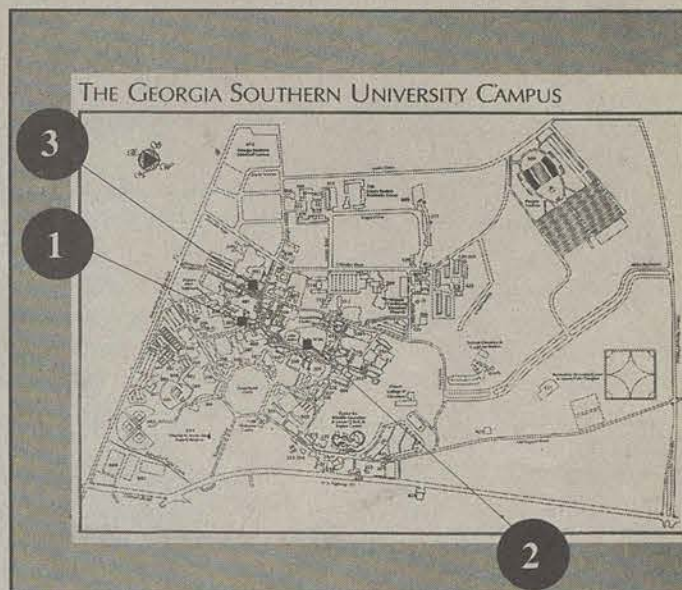
### 2 GSU Lakes

"It is art," he said. "I will not give into a few narrow students who say they don't

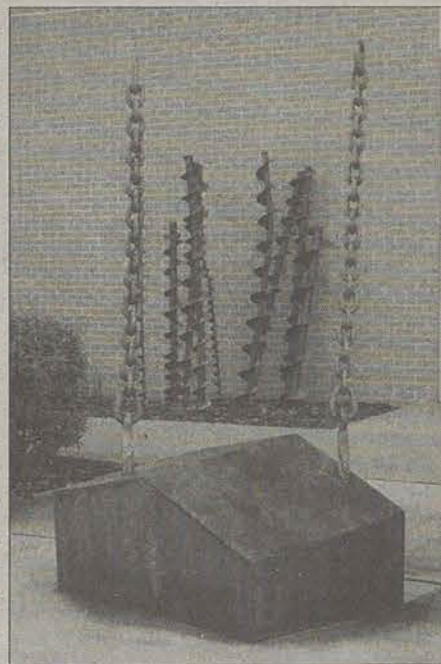
A larger than expected turnout, three students came to the forum to voice their opinions. They barraged the faculty with complaints, and their only answer was, "you try to get someone to take it down."

## Crackdown scheduled for Widespread Panic concert

The Widespread Panic concert, which sold out only a few days after tickets became available, is imposing strict regulations on their concert.

"There will be no disorderly conduct in the Hanner Fieldhouse," said Mandy Tintern, an Eagle Entertainment representative. "We will have drug dogs waiting at the door, and there will be a breathalyzer for anyone who appears intoxicated."

This is in response to a problem that the band recently had at a concert in Boise, Idaho. According to reports, last month's concert was raided due to the heavy drug activity going on in the concert.

"We will never go through that again," said Tim Pantalier, band member. "The police just came in and stopped the concert. I don't know why it didn't make the national news, but somehow it slipped by. It was a very bad experience for us and, we can assure you, it won't happen again."

Drug and alcohol use of any kind is already banned on campus, and according to the university police, there will be harsh penalties for anyone who does not comply. Fines and suspension are among the penalties for violations.

"We are not going to give warn-

ings," said Officer Donald Samson. "People know what they should be doing and when. All they have to do is follow the law and there will be no problem."

Many students are very unhappy about the lack of trust.

"Maybe if they left us alone, there wouldn't be as many problems,"

said a senior who wished to be anonymous. "They're constantly dogging us about what they think we are doing, and they never actually listen to what we want and need."

Unfortunately, the actions are necessary.

"We have had more DUI and drug possession arrests than any other time in the history of our town," said officer Samson. "We have to start cracking down, or our campus is going to turn into a drug ring."

Campus religious groups are pleased with the enforcement. There are several groups that have offered

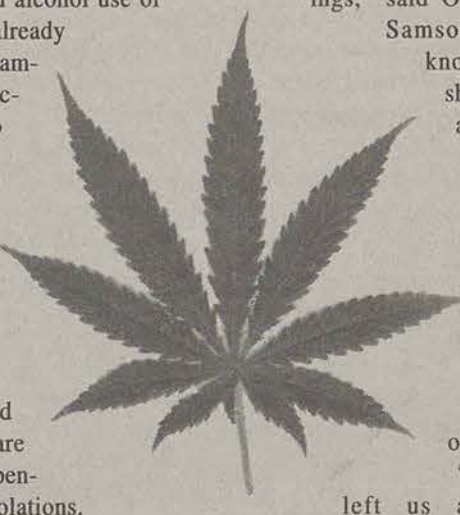
to help with the enforcement.

"We plan to have people out there to help the police cart the heathens away," said Rev. John Hancock. "The delirium has to come to an end. Don't these people understand that in order to rise in the rapture, you have to be clean?"

The campus police are pleased with the groups' enthusiasm, but they do not really need the help.

"They can pray for the lost souls if they want," said Samson, "but they need to leave the arresting to the professionals."

This is a simple warning: don't plan on doing anything illegal without getting caught.

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### Announcement – Student Media Positions Selection 2000-2001

The Student Media Advisory Board of Georgia Southern University announces its selection process to choose student editors and managers of the 2000-2001 broadcast and editorial boards of the university's official student media (The George-Anne, Miscellany Magazine, Southern Reflector Magazine, and WVGS/FM). Students interested in applying for an elected position will be expected to present (1) a **resumé**, (2) a **letter of application** explaining the candidate's qualifications and their plans or objectives for the media position sought; and (3) a **signed waiver** (included with this advertisement) which gives permission to the chairperson of the Student Media Advisory Board to validate the candidate's academic standing. Students may indicate the position(s) sought either in their letter of application or on the waiver form. However, a separate application packet (a **resumé**, a **letter of application** and a **signed waiver**) should be submitted for each medium, if a student wishes to apply for more than one.

**SELECTION AND TERM:** The editorial and broadcast boards will be selected by members of the committee based on a majority of those voting, according to committee by-laws. The term of office for the editorial and broadcast boards shall extend through the end of the next spring semester.

**QUALIFICATIONS:** Specific qualifications for persons holding board positions are listed below. Prior experience may be considered in lieu of stated qualifications. The board positions for each medium are listed in ranking order.

#### THE GEORGE-ANNE

**Editor in Chief** — The editor should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. An editor should have served on the staff one year and should display capabilities required for the position. The editor is responsible for the preparation of a commentary section for each edition. The editor serves as the chief executive officer of the newspaper and is ultimately responsible for the total editorial content of each edition. (Pay: \$1,600 per full semester)

**Managing Editor** — The managing editor should have completed at least one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester on the staff. The managing editor should be familiar with basic journalistic practices such as layout, copy editing, and news and feature writing. The managing editor will be responsible for coordinating the editorial content in all sections of the newspaper, such as news, sports and features. The managing editor (with the assistance of the news editor) will be responsible for the preparation of the front page. (Pay: \$1,500 per full semester)

**News Editor** — The news editor should know basic news writing and should be familiar with news sources on campus. The news editor should demonstrate news judgment and should have served at least one semester on the staff of the paper. The news editor will be responsible for all news gathering operations of the newspaper. The news editor assists the managing editor in the preparation of the front page. (Pay: \$1,400 per full semester)

#### MISCELLANY

**Editor** — The editor should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. The editor should demonstrate both the interest and the talent to create a quality publication which showcases the arts — literary, visual, and, to the extent practicable, performance arts — on behalf of the university's students, and to promote the arts in the university community through the staging of various arts-oriented events. The editor, in cooperation with an assistant editor, will conduct a joint selection of contributors for the magazine. The editor will be responsible for the total editorial content of the magazine. (Pay: \$600 per full semester)

#### SOUTHERN REFLECTOR

**Editor** — The editor should have completed two years of university work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. The editor should have served at least one year on the Reflector staff and should be familiar with magazine copy writing, magazine photojournalism, layout and design of pages, and staff management. The editor is responsible for the all editorial operations for each edition. The editor serves as the chief executive officer of the magazine and is ultimately responsible for the total content of each edition. (Pay: \$1,000 per full semester)

**Art Director** — The Art Director should have served at least one year on the Southern Reflector staff and should be knowledgeable in all aspects of magazine production, including but not limited to layout and design, computer graphics, and all photographic processes used by the Reflector. The Art Director will be responsible for the management of photographic assignments and photographic production work. In addition to these duties, the Art Director shall perform other duties as assigned by the current Editor. (Pay: \$1,000 per full semester)

**Managing Editor** — The managing editor should have completed one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester on the staff. The managing editor should be familiar with magazine production and university business procedures. The managing editor is responsible for promotional activities in support of the magazine, advertising operations, routine office management, and financial review, and distribution of the magazine. In addition to these duties, the Managing Editor shall perform other duties as assigned by the current Editor. (Pay: \$900 per full semester)

#### WVGS/FM

**Station Manager** — The station manager should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern, and should have served at least one year on the staff of the station. The manager should display leadership qualities and should have a basic knowledge of Federal Communications Commission (FCC) rules and regulations, broadcast equipment, and budgetary matters. (Pay: \$1,200 per full semester)

**Program Director** — The program director should have completed at least one year of college work and should have served at least one semester on the staff of the station. The program director is responsible for reporting playlists to trade journals, maintaining telephone and mail contacts with music companies, entering information about CDs into the station's database, and developing and implementing other programs. (Pay: \$1,000 per full semester)

**Operations Manager** — The operations manager should have completed at least one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester as a DJ (disc jockey) at the station. The operations manager is responsible for keeping WVGS in compliance with all Federal Communications Commission rules for noncommercial radio stations, producing PSAs (public service announcements), and producing quarterly issues lists. The individual who applies for this position should be well organized, skilled at using station facilities to produce CDs, and able to interact with other people effectively when enforcing compliance with FCC and station regulations. (Pay: \$1,000 per full semester)

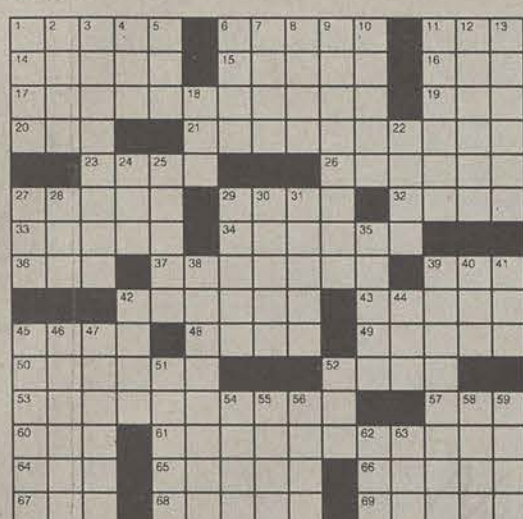

Next Spring the GSU baseball program will be swinging their bats at MLB competition. The Atlanta Braves
