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
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

Peterson named to football preseason All-America team

SOUTHAMPTON, PA-Georgia Southern running back Adrian Peterson headlines astellar list of five Southern Conference studentathletes who have been named to the 2000 Preseason All-America team as announced by The Sports Network on Tuesday (June 27).

Peterson, who won the 1999 Walter Payton Award as the top player in I-AA, rushed for 2,704yards and 40 touchdowns in * the Eagles' National Championship season of '99, including 897 yardsand 12 scores during the play-· offs. Peterson was joined on the first-team by fellow running backMarcel Shipp of Massachusetts, who has rushed for 4,388 in hiscareer.

Joining Peterson on the offensive first team is offensive tackle Josh Moore of Furman. Moore, from Cross Hill, S.C., played a key role in a Paladin offense that averaged 36.0 points and424.3 yards per game a year ago. Sansbury, a product of Lilburn, Ga., caught eight passes for 78 yards and a touchdown while also earning high marks as a blocker in 1999. Greenville native andtwo-year starter Will Bouton, meanwhile, racked up 130 tackles last year in helping Furman into the NCAA I-AA playoffs.

Nash, a 6-foot-3, 270-pound junior from Sharpsburg, GA, earned second-team All-SoCon honorslast season. He had 137 knockdown yards and caught over 100 passes blocks while earning Wofford Offensive Player of the Weekaccolades in games against The Citadel and Furman. He had 18 knockdowns in the Terriers' 47ton and a season-high 22 knockdowns against the Paladins. knockdowns in eight of 11 games.

Nash is also a Dean's List stuto the GTE Academic AllAcademic All-Star Team.

The Big Sky Conference led all I-AA leagues by placing 18 players on The Sports Network's 2000Division I-AA pre-season All-America Teams. Montana quarterback Drew Miller, guard ThatcherSzalay, and safety Vince Huntsberger garnered first-team praise, as did fellow Big Sky players inCal State Sacramento center Terrence Wagner and linebacker Anthony Daisley.

Miller was a second-team All-

American in 1999, when the BYU transfer completed 65 percent of his passes (240-368) along with 32 touchdown strikes in leading the Grizzlies to a league title andseventh straight I-AA playoff bid. Szalay, just a junior, was a key to that success, helping Miller tothrow for 350 yards per game and also helping spring a 1,277-yard YohanceHumphrey. Huntsberger was the Big Sky Defensive Player of the Year after making 90 tackles andintercepting four passes for the league's top-rated defense. Wagner, also a junior this season, helped running back and second-team All-American Charles Roberts become

AA Athletic Directors Association history to rush for over 2,000 yards in consecutive seasons. Daisley, his teammate, led the Big Sky with 12 sacks last season and also had 25 tackles for loss for the 6-5 Hornets.

The first-team wide receivers both came from the non-scholarship ranks, as Brown's StephenCampbell and Towson's Jamal White garnered top honors. Campbell set an Ivy League record with89 catches last season, while White led the nation with 1,322 receiving yards.

Joining Montana's Szalay and Cal-State Sacramento's Wagner on the first-team offensive line wereMike Rodbro (Illinois State), Wes Hines (McNeese State), and Furman's combination of tight endTrent Sansbury and tackle Josh Moore. Kicker Brett Sterba (William & Mary) and return specialist Delvin Joyce (James Madison) rounded out the first-team offense.

The first-team defense was highlighted by three players who earned conference player of the yearhonors last season. Huntsberger, James Madison defensive end Chris Morant (Atlantic 10), and Western Illinois linebacker Edgerton hartwell (Gateway), headed a group which also contained Patriot

Students with outstanding loans could save bundles of cash by refinancing their loans. Unfortunately, many of them aren't aware of the opportunity.

On July 1, the interest rate on student loans increased by 1.25 percentage points. Due to increases in interest rates set by the Federal Reserve Board over the past year, the rate that borrowers must pay is going to increase to

8.25 percent, the maximum rate that most borrowers are responsible for paying under federal student-loan

law. This new rate hike will affect almost all borrowers in repayment, as federal

student loans have variable interest rates that are adjusted annually, no matter how long ago the loan was taken out. Education Department officials, however, say that borrowers can take advantage of the current lower rates for the duration of their loans if they consolidate them before July 1

By consolidating multiple loans into one, borrowers can receive a fixed interest rate that is based on the weighted average of the rates on the underlying loans. Since rates have been at a historic low, department officials say, refinancing could save borrowers with \$20,000 in debt about \$1,500 in interest charges over the lives of their loans.

MIAMI - Seven months and three days after Elian Gonzalez arrived in the United States, a frightened castaway who would become an ideological symbol on both sides of the Florida Straits, the little boy went home to Cuba.

After months of arguments before some of the nation's highest courts, the 6-year-old "miracle child" made a playful exit from Washington, D.C.At 4:20 p.m. Wednesday, a smiling Elian held his father's hand and walked up a flight of stairs to a waiting jet at Dulles International Airport. The boy

After that, he will enjoy a week's holiday before returning to Cardenas on the northern coast, about two hours east of Havana. Elian's return to Cuba was made possible just before noon, when the U.S. Supreme Court rejected an appeal filed Monday by attorneys for the boys' Miami relatives.

The attorneys asked Associate Justice Anthony Kennedy, who handles emergency matters in Florida, to stay a ruling by the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta or extend an injunction barring anyone from taking Elian out of the country. They also asked the high court to review the appeals court's ruling that Attorney General Janet Reno and Doris Meissner, commissioner of the Immigration and Naturalization Service, had the authority to determine. that only the boy's father speaks for his

The attorneys for Lazaro Gonzalez, the great-uncle who wanted to keep Elian in the United States, had hoped that the Supreme Court would over-2 turn the Atlanta court's longstanding position that immigrants not legally in the country do not have a constitutional right to apply for asylum.

For the Supreme Court to consider that question, however, four of nine. justices would have had to agree to

hear the case. That didn't occur, and Kennedy denied the application for an injunction.Lazaro Gonzalez, his daughter Marisleysis and brother Delfin, who cared for Elian until federal. agents removed the boy from their Little Havana home in an April 22 raid, were stunned by the decision.


They did not speak publicly, but appeared devastated by their loss."This is a very rough time

for all of us, but we must obey the law and the rule of law," family spokesman Armando Gutierrez said. "Lazaro Gonzalez wants everyone to know that* his family will still fight for Elian to be free."Lawyers for the Miami relatives also were struck by the weight of the court's decision. But they vowed to continue their fight to protect refugee children."Our hearts are very heavy at this hour," lead attorney Kendall Coffey said in a late afternoon press conference.


"We remain very committed to the cause of this child and to the rights of so many other refugee children."At the Justice Department, officials said the boy's departure was a bittersweet victory, one that achieved the government's goal of allowing Juan Miguel Gonzalez to make decisions for his son, but that went against the hopes of many that he would choose to stay in the United States.

It was a blow to the "First Family of Spit."



Lessard and Krause went mouth to mouth, competing in the annual International Cherry Pit Spitting Championships at the Tree-Mendus Fruit Farm in Eau Claire, Mich.

Although the 46-year-old Krause didn't want to make excuses for his performance Saturday, he said the wind started blowing harder as he stepped into the

"They say never spit into the wind," he said. "But what was I supposed to do? I took my best shot. I just couldn't get the range this year.'

But, the veteran warned, "I'll be back."

Pennsylvania Man hijacks icecream truck, police

Say NORRISTOWN—A Norristown man is accused of hijacking an icecream truck as the driver sold ice cream to a customer, then speeding through town at 80 mph with the driver aboard.

Driver Mohamed Osman, who was at the rear of the truck, hopped out of the customer window when the thief stopped at a red light. He was apparently unharmed.

Cornell Williams, 41, was charged early Tuesday with robbery, theft and unauthorized use of a motor vehicle. A preliminary hearing is set for July 7.

According to Norristown police, Osman was selling a woman ice cream at about 11 p.m. Monday when a man jumped into the Jack and Jill

truck and said, "Give me all of your money."

The intruder grabbed the wheel and started driving. He drove at high speed through a series of stop signs before stopping at a light, giving Osman the chance to flee and call police.

At about 12:15 a.m. Tuesday, a Cheltenham Township police officer stopped the driver for running a red light, and learned he had no license or registration. The officer noticed Osman's name on paperwork in the window, and called Norristown police to see if the truck was stolen. When he learned it was, Williams was arrested.

Osman later picked Williams out of a lineup, police said. Police said they did not immediately know if anything was stolen from the truck.



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

Sosa wants to be wanted in Chicago

MILWAUKEE (AP) - With trade rumors still swirling and his agents' talks with the Chicago Cubs apparently going nowhere, it appears Sammy Sosa just wants someone to want him.

Sosa took a little extra time stripping off his uniform in the cramped visitors' clubhouse at County Stadium on Sunday, and his famous smile was nowhere to be seen. He didn't speak to reporters after the Cubs blew a one-run lead in the eighth inning of their 4-2 loss to the Brew-

The weight of trade rumors and a slump at the plate are taking their toll on Sosa. On Saturday, he said if the Cubs fail to offer him a contract extension, it's a sign they don't want him around anymore.

"If they don't show me a contract, it's telling me I'm not going to be here," Sosa said. "It's as simple as that. It hurts my feelings because I think I deserve a little bit more than that. But this is business, and I understand that. I just got to sit back, relax and wait."

A trade between the Cubs and New York Yankees involving Sosa fell apart last week when the Yankees decided the prospects they would be forced to sacrifice were worth more than Chicago's slugger. New York then swung a deal for Cleveland outfielder David Justice.

Now, Sosa said, it's time for the Cubs to come to him. Though the near-deal with the Yankees last week had him talking about his time in Chicago in the past tense, he said he has never given up on the idea of staying with the Cubs.

"My people were looking for [an offer]. We haven't had an answer yet," he said. "They know that they can talk to me. They know I'm here. It's up to them to come talk to me.'

The Cubs could still trade him before the July 31 deadline, but Sosa said he is not willing to accept a trade without a contract extension from the new team. There are only a handful of teams with the financial wherewithal to pay Sosa the money he likely seeks, and most of those teams aren't interested.

"I don't want to come into next year thinking about it," Sosa said. "Wherever I am next year, I want to come and not go through all the [garbage] - that I got to do more because I'm going into free agency. Take care of me now, let me play my

Sosa said he and manager Don Baylor have put their differences behind them. The two hugged and exchanged small talk on Friday before the Cubs' series in Milwaukee started, and Baylor spoke highly of Sosa's focus through the distractions.

"He'd like to win and have a person like me that will go out and play every day and take care of business,' Sosa said. "I don't think the whole situation is Don and I, because we
