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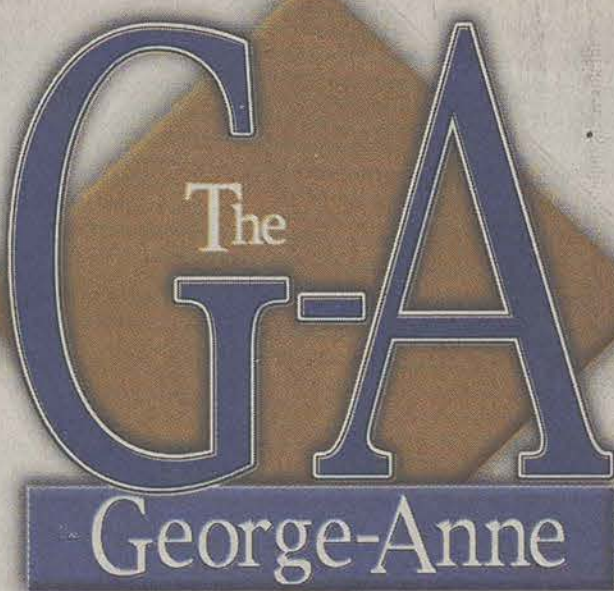

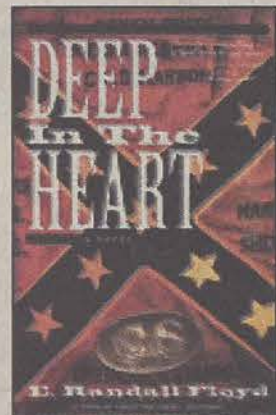

GSU crushes Johnson C. Smith 57-12

•The Eagles win their first home game, but feel the burn of record high penalties

Normally, when a team outgains their opponent by more than 350 yards and scores touchdowns on seven of their first nine possessions on their way to a 57-12 victory, there's cause for celebration. But the feelings surrounding the GSU locker room after Saturday's victory over Johnson C. Smith were of disappointment and frustration.

In front of a home-opening record crowd of 16,684 fans, GSU set a new benchmark that they're not proud of: 19 penalties for 179 yards, the most for any Eagle team in its 19 year history.

"This was disappointing," GSU coach Paul Johnson said of his team's mistakes. "I've never been a part of a team that had that many penalties. I think it's positive when you win 57-12 but the standards here are very high and we don't need to drop the standards. The standards need to remain the same. I'm not going to drop my standards and be happy when we play like that."

The penalties weren't the only thing that drew Johnson's ire. GSU also turned the ball over twice inside the ten, once on a J.R. Revere fumble on the opening drive and then a Revere interception in the third quarter. The Eagles also missed two extra points.

Despite the inability to avoid the

officials' wrath, GSU put up good numbers offensively, rushing for 529 yards and completing another five passes for 84 more yards.

Leading the charge was Adrian Peterson who rushed for a game high 162 yards and three scores, all in the first half, while surpassing former Eagle great Gerald Harris for first place all-time in touchdowns (56) and scoring (348). The junior fullback also became the 30th player in I-AA history to rush for over 4,000 yards in their career.

First year starting quarterback J.R. Revere added 54 yards and two touchdowns while Anthony Williams scored on an 84-yard run and Zzream Walden added 106 yards off the bench. Revere was also 4 of 10 passing for 72 yards with a 14-yard touchdown to Chris Johnson and an interception. Backup quarterback Melvin Cox added a 12-yard touchdown pass to Eric Irby in the fourth quarter.

GSU emptied their bench in the second half resulting in the brunt of the penalties due to inexperienced players. But the Eagles know that if it was a Southern Conference team they were playing Saturday night rather than a Division II program, things would have been different.

"We made a lot of mistakes," senior offensive tackle Mike Anderson said. "If we would have played a good team today, we wouldn't have beaten them."

"You're not going to beat the better teams in our conference - like App St. and Furman - when you have 19 penalties for nearly 200 yards," Ryan Hadden, GSU's senior safety who had two tackles on the day, said.

Defensively GSU played fairly well, giving up a pair of third quarter touchdowns, one on a 60-yard reception by Jahmad Woods from a scrambling Desmond Brown and then a 15-yard run from Dewight Bacon. "[Johnson C. Smith's] quarterback is tough and he throws the ball well. I went and talked to him after the game," an impressed Chris Johnson said.

GSU still managed to hold the Golden Bulls to 45 yards rushing while Brown completed 17 of 32 passes for 197 yards. Sophomore linebacker Joe Scott led

the Eagles in tackles with six while Freddy Pesquiera and Phillip Mouzon added five apiece. Pesquiera also posted two sacks.

"I had the chance to be in the right place at the right time and

got the opportunity to make some plays," Pesquiera said.

GSU will work to eliminate those errors this week before taking on SoCon foe Wofford this Saturday at Paulson Stadium.

"We're going to have to cor-

rect our mistakes," Revere said. "We have to realize that you just don't have to play hard [to win] but you have to play smart as well. We need to [minimize mistakes] now before it really hurts us."

Cowart building dedication held

GSU officially opened the Troy A. and Mozelle Cowart Building on Saturday, before the GSU football game. The Cowart building, which is located adjacent to Paulson Stadium, is now the official home for the school

ticket office and the offices of Southern Boosters.

The funding of the building came from a posthumous gift from Troy Cowart to the Southern Boosters. John Mulherin, president of Southern Boosters said that the Cowart Building is the second of three trusts given

to the Southern Boosters.

"The third trust will come to us in 2006 and, all totaled, he will have given more than \$1.3 million to Southern Boosters. That would make him one of the largest contributors in the history of Georgia Southern athletics," said Mulherin.

The ceremony began with comments by Dr. Ron Core, vice president for business and finance. Dr. Core welcomed everyone and stressed how deeply honored GSU was for having received such a substantial gift from the Cowart family.

Sam Baker, director of athletics spoke next and emphasized how the building will be beneficial for student athletics at GSU. Baker believes that the building allows the Southern Boosters and the GSU ticket office more accessibility to those who want to buy tickets or join the Southern Boosters. Baker also mentioned that the ticket office was going to sell tickets to all events on campus, not just athletic events.

"Having the new facility like this makes it easier for us to meet needs for not only our athletic clientele but also individuals who want to buy tickets to culture events at GSU," said Baker.

Mulherin spoke after Baker and also emphasized how the new building was going to make Southern Boosters and tickets for events more accessible.

"When we were in the Hanner field house, you couldn't find us and there was no parking," said Mulherin. "Also, the ticket office and the boosters office have always been closely related, and this building finally brings the two together."

Tory A. Moore, the grandson of Mr. and Mrs. Cowart, cut the ribbon with GSU president Dr. Grube. Moore expressed his family's deepest appreciation and said that his family was very proud of the building.

"I think that my grandfather would be very proud of it, I know everyone here is proud of it," said Moore.

Clinton marches in NYC's belated labor day parade and blasts Lazio

NEW YORK, N.Y. - Democratic Senate candidate Hillary Rodham Clinton criticized Republican Rep. Rick Lazio's record on labor issues before marching in the city's belated Labor Day parade on Saturday.

Lazio was not at the parade, although Grand Marshal Edward Malloy - president of the New York Building & Construction Trades Council - said he had been invited by a local affiliate.

Lazio insisted Malloy was wrong. "We did not get any invitation."

At a pre-parade breakfast, Clinton said Lazio had a poor record of voting on pro-labor and pro-family issues. Quoting an AFL-CIO rating, she said Lazio's lifelong pro-labor voting record was 33 percent and that "last year he outdid himself" with only a 25 percent rating.

"He keeps telling people they should vote for him because of where he was born, where he grew up, where he clammed, where he went to school," Clinton said, as the friendly crowd hooted in approval. "Well, apparently he didn't learn very much about the history and tradition of the progressive labor movement in his state."

Lazio disputed the charges, saying, "I have a good labor record."

"I've voted for the Family and Medical Leave (Act) in my first term in office. I voted for a ban on striker replacements. I voted for prevailing wage and I've been a strong supporter of ensuring that New York has gotten its fair share on transportation

formulas," he said. "In construction, we put thousands of Long Islanders back to work on projects that I delivered back for the district, so I'm proud of my labor record."

Clinton marched in the Fifth Avenue parade - which could probably win hands down honors for being the quietest in the city. She was neither booed nor cheered but received several shouts of "Yeah, Hillary," and some polite applause along the 25-block route.

The Labor Day parade has traditionally been a showcase for political wannabes looking for exposure. It was not surprising that most Republicans were missing since the New York City Central Labor Council, the local AFL-CIO affiliate, has already endorsed Clinton for the U.S. Senate and the Al Gore/Joe Lieberman ticket for president.

While Clinton campaigned in Manhattan, Lazio spent the day greeting Queens shoppers in Howard Beach and attending a park fair in the Richmond Hill section where he was endorsed by maverick Democratic Assemblyman Tony Semerino.

Semerino, who has ruffled party feathers before by endorsing non-Democrats, did not give specific reasons for endorsing Lazio but said he did it "wholeheartedly."

The Republican candidate also went to Commack, Long Island where volunteers began handing out the first of 1 million pieces of campaign flyers and newsletters to be distributed statewide.

Republican Mayor Rudolph Giuliani also did not attend the parade, although a bevy of Democratic officials

WWI veteran honored by French Government

SYLVANIA, Ga. - Donald Cooper was 22 when he left the United States to fight in World War I. Eighty-two years later, the French government is thanking Cooper by giving him the nation's highest award.

Just shy of his 104th birthday, Cooper has been named a Chevalier of the National Order of the Legion of Honor - a coveted distinction given only to those who have performed extraordinary services.

Jean-Paul Monchau, France's consul general to the Southeastern United States, pinned his nation's highest award to the World War I veteran's lapel during a ceremony at Augusta's Old Government House.

"Mr. Donald Cooper, 80 years ago you came for us, and today I come for you," Monchau said. "We remember the sacrifice of the American soldiers who fought for freedom alongside the sons of France."

Cooper, a soft-spoken man who is one of about 3,200 living U.S. World War I veterans, greeted well-wishers at the

ceremony. "I feel pretty good," he said.

Serena Gaines, one of Cooper's granddaughters, watched as her grandfather was given the award. Cooper's family learned of the honor last year.

"It's a real honor," Gaines said. "He's been looking forward to it. I really am truly happy that he's still around to get this award."

About 50 people attended the ceremony, including friends, family and politicians.

"Donald Cooper, you made good on the promises of America to France and Lafayette," said Rep. Charlie Norwood, R-Ga. "By your valor and service, you have proven that the promise of America is golden."

Cooper, who was born Sept. 14, 1896, served as an infantryman in Company D of the 327th Labor Battalion from April 30, 1918, to July 14, 1919. His award is part of a campaign started by French President Jacques Chirac to honor surviving U.S. veterans of World War I.

15 year-old boy buys car over Internet

PORT CHARLOTTE — Police investigating how a 15-year-old boy bought a \$15,000 car think he may have used the Internet to send an electronic check from a State of Florida account.

Terrance Lloyd, who has not been charged with any crimes, bought the Plymouth Neon last month from a Seminole Chrysler dealer, negotiating the deal through e-mails and telephone calls, the Sarasota

Herald-Tribune reported Saturday.

He paid for the car using CheckFree, a service that allows customers to send checks electronically, court records show. The account the check was drawn on belongs to the State of Florida Disbursement Unit, which issues child support payments, records show.

CheckFree told deputies Lloyd sent out an additional \$105,000 in checks to other retailers, but only the auto dealer delivered merchandise, court records show. When the check later bounced, it reported the car stolen.

The day after receiving the car, Lloyd — who is too young to get a driver's license — crashed through a fence and ran over a stop sign, officials said.

His left front tire flattened, Lloyd drove home on the rim, leaving a 10-mile trail on the road that deputies followed. He was cited for driving without a license and the investigation of the car's purchase began.

The boy's mother denies that her son illegally purchased the car. "If Terrance was such a criminal mastermind, I guarantee you he wouldn't have brought home no car," Karen Lloyd said. "He would have brought home clothes."

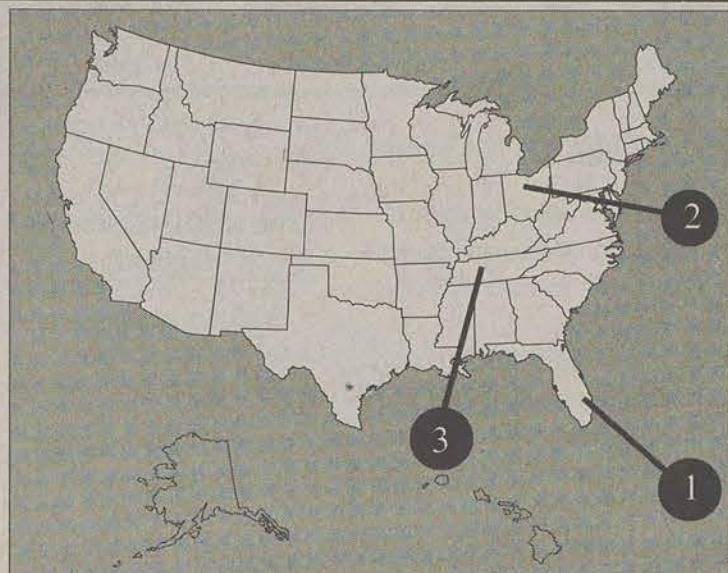
UGA sorority suspended for race discrimination

The University of Georgia placed the local chapter of the Alpha Gamma Delta on interim suspension pending an investigation into allegations that the sorority racially discriminated against a student during recent fall recruitment efforts.

The suspension comes after a member of the sorority stepped forward with information that a black student was denied membership based on her race, said Vice President of Student Affairs Richard Mullendore.

"The member making the allegation provided specific information regarding comments made in a chapter meeting and elsewhere about the candidate's race and the effect her membership would have on the sorority," Mullendore said.

The sophomore student was living in the sorority house when she heard the alleged conversations about the black student. She contacted the university after



CINCINNATI — A woman who assumed her dead sister's identity used identification cards bearing the dead woman's name to cash fake checks at several banks, authorities said.

Shannon Grier, 31, of Cincinnati, asked for her sister Tanya Grier's California driver's license and photograph after her sister's death in 1995, police said.

Shannon Grier then used the license and photo to apply for Ohio identification cards bearing Tanya Grier's name and used the cards to cash at least 20 fake checks, prosecutors said Friday.

"It's morally reprehensible," said Hamilton County Prosecutor Mike Allen. "It never ceases to amaze me what people will do."

He said Shannon Grier's deception was so thorough that a county grand jury indicted Tanya Grier in the case.

When sheriff's deputies tried to find Tanya Grier to arrest her, the women's mother told them that her older daughter was dead. The mother identified a photo of the suspect from a bank surveillance camera as her other daughter Shannon, prosecutors said.

Allen said his office dismissed the indictment against Tanya Grier, and the grand jury indicted Shannon Grier on Friday. She is charged with nine counts of forgery, two counts of theft and one count of tampering with records.

Shannon Grier is accused of cashing fake child support checks totaling nearly \$10,000.

Allen said Tanya Grier was killed in 1995. Her slaying remains unsolved.

Man claims God ordered his daughters execution

LEBANON — A Wilson County man who claimed God told him to sacrifice his 13-month-old daughter was convicted Friday of murder.

A jury convicted Brian Kelley of first-degree murder and felony first-degree murder by child abuse of his daughter Erin on Aug. 14 of last year.

Judge John Wooten, Jr., sentenced Kelly to life in prison with the possibility of parole.

No one disputed the facts of the case. According to police reports at the time of Kelley's arrest, Kelley believed Jesus was to return to Earth on Sunday, Aug. 15, and he killed his daughter Erin around midnight on Aug. 14.

"I smothered my daughter because God told me to," police reports of the arrest cite Kelley as saying. "God told me she was perfect and innocent and told me to sacrifice her, for Jesus was coming very soon."

Relatives of Kelley said they had thought the jury would find Brian innocent by reason of insanity.

"There just must have been a bunch of people up there who didn't know anything about mental illness. To me it was cut and dry. It was insanity. Bryan was out of his mind," Robert Wright, Kelley's cousin, told WTVF-TV.

After the verdict was read, Kelley was hugged by his father, Val Kelly, the former executive of Wilson County.

allegedly discriminated against was unaware of the situation.

"We spoke with the woman and she was unaware that that any of this was happening," Mullendore said. "She had gone through the first round of the rush, and had already made the decision that she did not want to be a part of the sorority. She never stopped by the sorority house to see if she had made the second round."

Nude table tennis is this year's can't miss olympic event

I don't know about you, but I expect to be literally glued to my TV set from the start of the opening ceremonies until the dramatic moment, three weeks later, when the opening ceremonies finally end, and the first actual athletic event (the women's 300-kilometer balloon toss) gets under way. I don't want to miss a single second of the competition! Unless, of course, the competition is won by a foreigner.

I frankly wonder why foreigners are even allowed to compete in the Olympics. They're always messing up the drama for American TV viewers. Like, NBC will broadcast a heartwarming, sentimental, in-depth profile of an American athlete, showing how, through grit and determination, he overcame a disadvantage that would have stymied a

lesser person, such as being born without a head. So the American viewers are naturally expecting to see this person win a gold medal — and then he gets beat by some athlete from some dirtball vowel-impaired nation with a name like "Gzkmzksrygyztan" that doesn't even HAVE McDonald's!

I hate it when that happens, and so do the people at NBC. That's what led to that memorable moment during the 1996 Atlanta games, when the American favorite in the men's 1,500-meter hurdles was nearly defeated by a foreigner, who lost only because he had to run the final 250 meters with Bob Costas clinging to his leg.

In the modern Olympics, of course, the athletes wear clothes, except in table tennis, which is why this sport is never shown on television. Another difference between old and new is that the modern Olympics are strictly governed by the International Olympic Committee, whose members insure the integrity of the games by relentlessly accepting lavish hospitality and gifts from people seeking favors. Unfortunately, in recent years the IOC has been tainted by allegations of bribery, especially after it voted to award the 2004 summer Olympics to a man identified only as "Big Tony," who plans to use them as entertainment at his daughter's wedding.

But this is no time to think of

scandal. This is the time to focus on the games now going on in Australia, which is popularly known, because of its location at the bottom of the globe, as "the Emerald Isle." This is an odd place to hold the summer Olympics, because Australia is, believe it or not, just getting out of winter!

This exotic locale is the site of the 2000 Olympics, which officially began with the Lighting of the Eternal Olympic Flame. The flame traveled all the way from Atlanta via a torch relay: Runners took turns carrying it across the United States to California, where it was handed to a plucky young amateur swimmer named Timmy, who, as an enthusiastic crowd cheered him on, plunged into the surf and began his epic journey, making it nearly to the end of the Santa Monica pier before the sharks got him, only 7,500 miles short of his goal. 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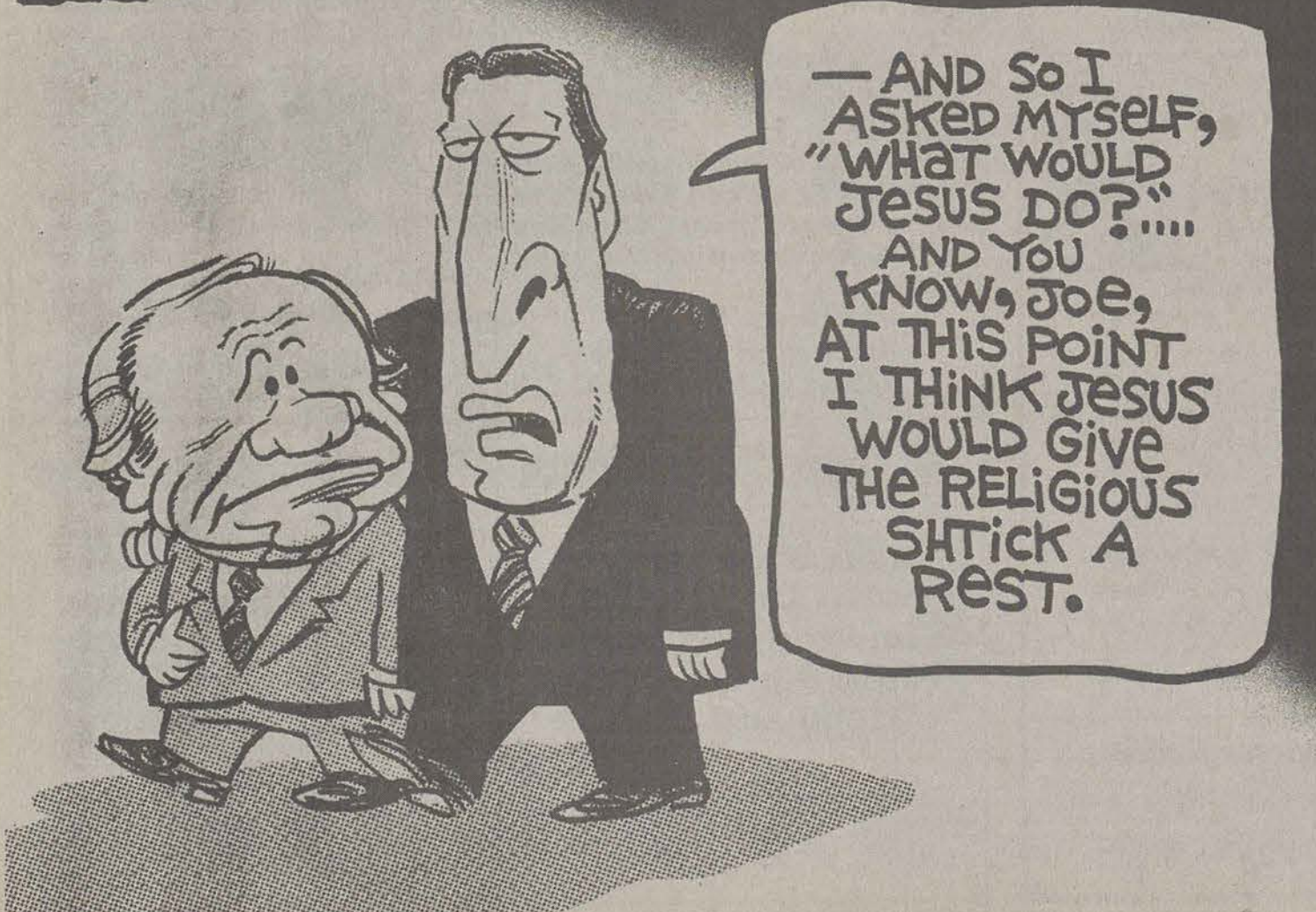

Expanded Services: Experiential Education:

Job Shadowing: Career Services' experiential education opportunities have now expanded to include job shadowing and internships in addition to the already established Co-op program. Job shadowing, primarily geared to Freshmen and Sophomores, enables students to experience a profession of their choice by observing a person within the occupation they choose for a day or half day. Opportunities are available for students during holidays and spring break. Job shadowing enables the student to try a career before committing, improve education plans, define career goals, and make professional contacts.

Internship: An internship is a way to gain on-the-job experience while still in school. The experience is temporary, usually lasting one semester. Students may obtain academic credit upon approval from their faculty member. It may or may not include pay, but the student gets the opportunity to experience the working world first hand, acquiring a realistic perspective of job duties, demands, and expectations.

New Initiative...Parallel Co-op Plan: Requires that a student work part-time 4 or more consecutive semesters while attending school full-time. The student will work a minimum of 16 hours per week and a maximum of 30 hours per week. With the Faculty Advisor permission, the minimum number of courses related hours are 9. The maximum number of courses related hours are 15.

The GSU men's soccer team ended its weekend trek through Virginia with a 3-1 win over Virginia Tech on Sunday. At 3-1 overall, the Eagles are off to their best start since 1990. The Hokies fell to 0-3 with the loss.

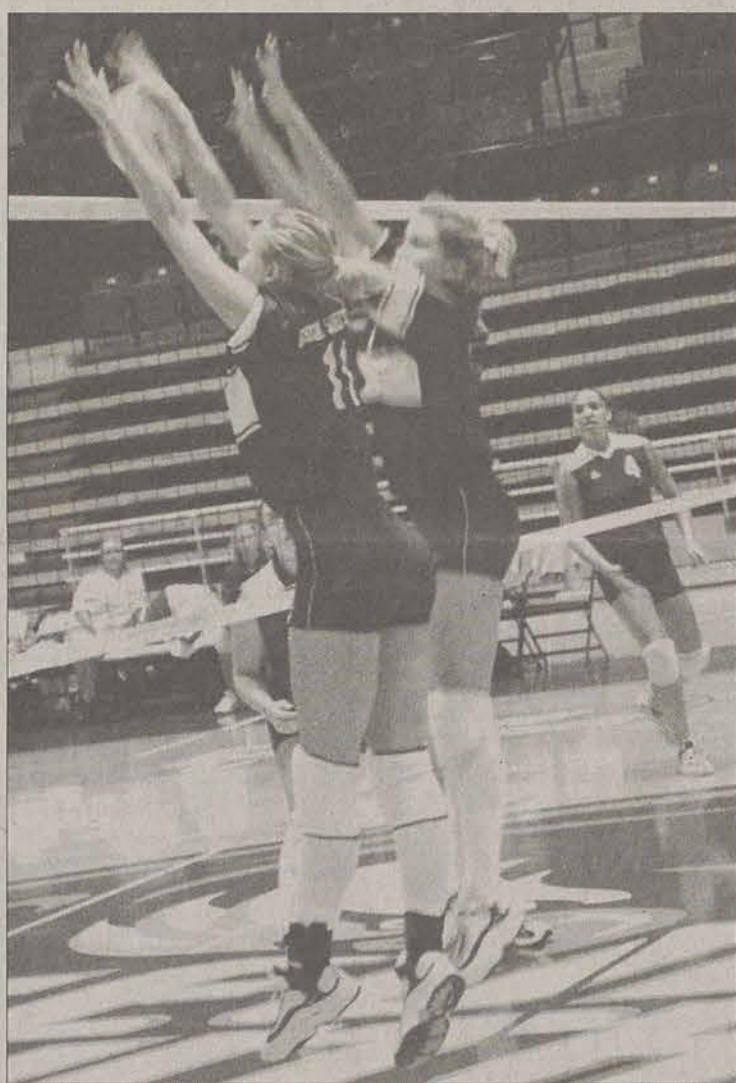

In the third match of the day, Georgia Southern blew a 2-0 lead as Duquesne rallied for a 3-2 victory. Sarah Brown racked up 56 assists for the Dukes, while Lauren McClain contributed 18 kills for the Eagles.

Lastly, Cornell made it two wins in a row with a 3-1 victory over Stetson. The Big Red's Jennifer McHarg compiled 14 kills and 10 digs. The Hatters were again led by Ford who posted 16 kills, 10 digs and seven blocks.

Atlanta Thrashers still continuing to build on heels of new season

DULUTH, Ga. — Atlanta general manager Don Waddell has a message for those Thrashers fans who last season set a home attendance record for a first-year NHL franchise.

"We started on the ground floor and now we're at level two," Waddell said as the Thrashers opened training camp Saturday at the IceForum. "As long as the elevator keeps going up and doesn't pause on a floor for long or certainly doesn't go down, we're headed in the right direction."

And what exactly is level two? Does that mean a team that last year finished with an NHL-low 14 victories — winning only three of its final 40 games — is preparing to fight for a playoff spot?

"No. Oh, no. Not at all," he said. "Certainly as we sit here today our goal is to make the playoffs. I would never want to give ourselves a hook. Everything's got to fit right for us, but I have to look at things realistically. We can't fast-forward what we're doing for that sake."

The bottom line is that Waddell and coach Curt Fraser expect their players to be aggressive, smart and creative. But Waddell's business plan, since day one, has called for a franchise to be built through the amateur draft and, at least for the first five years, look to the future.

"What we've been able to add to the organization is depth," he said. "We can put people in the right places. Last year we were asking some people to do too much. When you have depth like that in training camp, you also have a lot of competition for jobs, and that's really

good. More guys come in here and push out other guys, that means we're better."

As the Thrashers prepare for their first preseason game Sept. 26 against Nashville, only one of their first-round picks is present. Dany Heatley, considered the best amateur forward in North America, returned for another year at the University of Wisconsin.

The 19-year-old Heatley, whose rights belong to Atlanta for the next three years, had 27 goals and 23 assists in 34 games for the Badgers last season.

Center Patrik Stefan, the overall No. 1 pick last year, returns for what he and the Thrashers hope will be a breakout season. The Czech Republic native, who turns 20 on Saturday, finished his rookie year with 25 points — only five

of which were goals.

The most positive aspect for Stefan was playing an entire season without sustaining a concussion. Head injuries plagued his last two years of junior hockey.

"I feel good," Stefan said. "I'm ready to go. We should all be better this year. No one, though, is expecting me to produce more than I am."

Nothing harmed the Thrashers more than goaltending last season. Damian Rhodes, the team's No. 1 netminder, sprained his right ankle in a Nov. 17 game against Tampa Bay and missed the next 45 games. His primary backup, Norm Maracle, struggled with rebounds and finished 4-19-2 with a 3.48 goals-against average.

Waddell was desperate enough that he and Fraser brought in Scott Fankhouser, who began the season in the East Coast Hockey League.

After returning March 10, Rhodes started 15 of the final 17 games but finished with a 5-18-3 record and 3.88 GAA. In seven previous seasons, Rhodes' average had never been above 2.79. Rhodes had a career-high 48 saves against Montreal but also was pulled from three games.

"The great thing is that Damian finished the season, but more importantly went over (to Russia) and played the World Championships in St. Petersburg and almost took the USA team to a medal," Waddell said. "We went out this summer and signed Milan Hnilek, who we thought was the best goalie not playing in the NHL last year."

"Between him and Norm Maracle and Scott Langkow and Scott Fankhouser they're going to be competing for that second position."

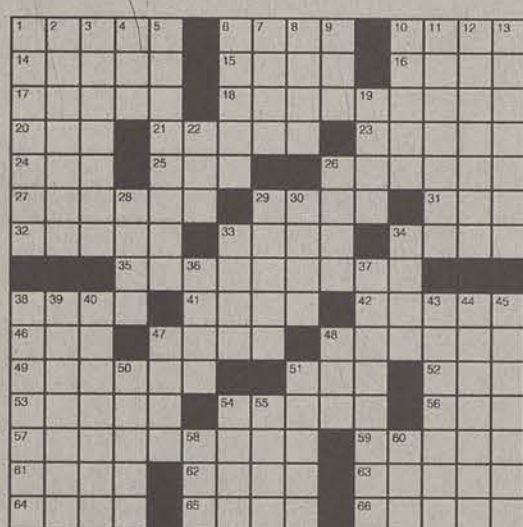

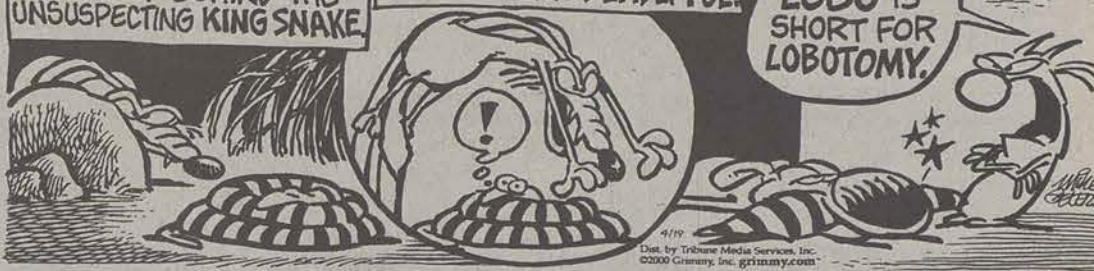

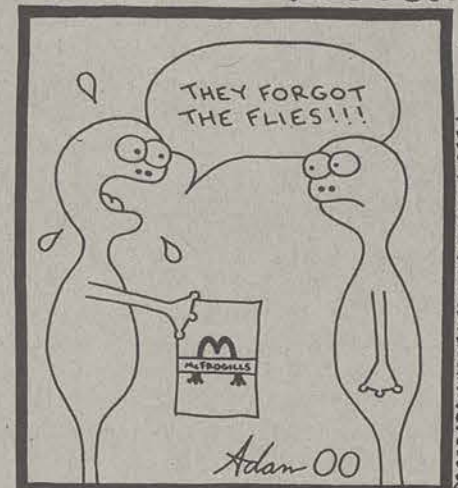

Southern writer to speak at GSU library

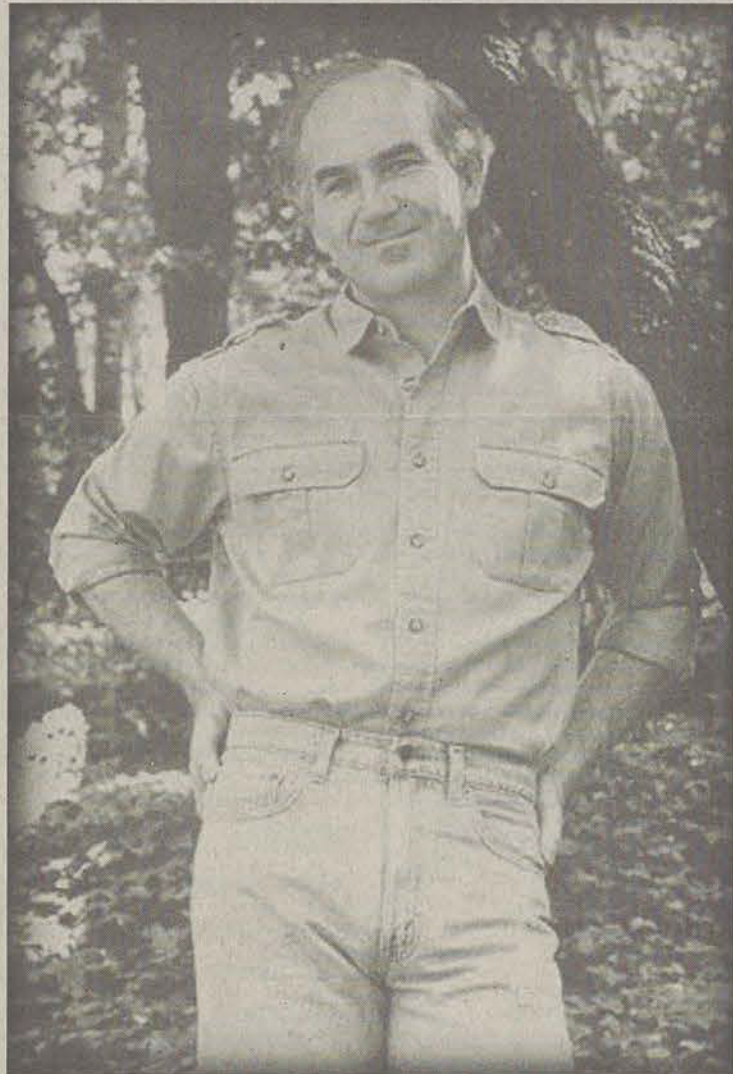
Augusta author E. Randall Floyd will be the featured speaker at a dinner Thursday, Sept. 21 held at the Statesboro Inn and sponsored by the Friends of the Zach S. Henderson Library.

This event is part of the celebration of GALILEO Day and includes a presentation and book-signing by Floyd. GALILEO is the University System of Georgia's research and information web site, which was created in 1995.

Randall Floyd's 12th book, to be released in the spring of 2001, is "High Moon on the Marsh," based on a true story about an enterprising young slave who goes off to war with his master, a Confederate captain from Retreat Plantation on St. Simons Island. Previous works include the historical novel "Deep in the Heart," also set during the Civil War and based on the unsent letters from soldier Wiley Nessmith to his wife, which are now stored in Henderson Library's Special Collections. The author also writes a syndicated column that is carried in 45 newspapers including the Statesboro Herald. E. Randall Floyd is a native of Baxley, and taught journalism at GSU and history at Augusta State University before becoming a full-time writer.

Floyd's talk will focus on the Civil War and his two novels set in that era. He will describe his research for "High Moon on the Marsh," and contrast the book with his best-selling "Deep in the Heart," as they tell the story of the war from two separate angles: "Deep in the Heart" from the common soldier's point of view, and "High Moon on the Marsh" told from the planter aristocrat's experience.
