# GSU rocks Western Carolina 42-24

After going up 20-0 early in the second quarter against Western Carolina Saturday night, the GSU football team had a major letdown but survived the scare versus a tough Catamount squad, 42-24. GSU's win puts the Eagles at 5-1, 4-0 and sets up a showdown for the Southern Conference lead next week against Appalachian State, 18-17 winners against Furman. Western Carolina falls to 2-4 overall, 1-3 in the SoCon.

"I thought it was disappointing the way we played," said GSU head coach Paul Johnson. "We had some penalties, fumbles, and give [West-

ern Carolina] credit, they came in prepared and it looks like we have never been coached."

Although the Eagle offense gained 373 yards on the ground and 530 total, GSU fumbled twice, committed 14 penalties for 121 yards and the defense gave up 379 yards and 24 points to a team that doesn't remind anyone of Appalachian State or Furman.

"We made too many mistakes tonight," said wide receiver Chris Johnson. "We can't do that against better teams."

GSU struck first after quarterback J.R. Revere scored from four yards out to cap a 14 play, 74-yard drive. After forcing a Catamount

fumble, Revere hit Chris Johnson on a 34-yard screen pass that upped the GSU lead to 13-0. Scott Shelton's extra point was blocked. The Eagle's third score came courtesy of slotback Andre Weathers, as he took a Revere pitch 15 yards for the score.

"It's important to jump out ahead early against teams at their place," said Revere. "We were up early and the real positive is that we kept that distance. But you have to give Western Carolina credit, they played hard."

After the first quarter, GSU had outgained Western Carolina 161-29 but struggled both offensively and defensively the rest of the game.

"[GSU is] a good team," said Catamount head coach Bill Bliel. "I thought we played really well for three quarters. We really felt like the defense cranked it up and did some nice things. It was a disappointing loss but take away two fumbles in the first quarter and we are right in the middle of it."

Western Carolina got on the board after David Rivers found receiver Michael Banks open in the endzone from seven yards out. The score cut the GSU lead to 20-7, but the Eagles answered with an Adrian Peterson one-yard run to push the margin back up to 26-7. GSU's Scott Shelton added a 32-yard field goal to put the Eagles up to 29-7. A Josh Jones 39-yard field goal as the first half expired brought WCU to within 29-10.

The Catamounts made a game of it after they took the opening possession of the second half 80 yards for the score. The drive culminated with a 26-yard touchdown catch from Rivers.

But GSU put the game away on a controversial play early in the third quarter when Revere hit Johnson on a 70-yard pass on a broken play. Revere, flushed from the pocket by the Catamount defense, rolled right before firing on the run to Johnson. Many thought that Revere was over the line of scrimmage when he let go of the ball, something Revere was called for earlier this season that negated an Eagle touchdown. "That was

the play of the ballgame, when J.R. made the play to Chris and their guy mistimed his jump and it went over his head," said Coach Johnson. "It was a big play, but it certainly wasn't the way it was drawn up."

WCU's Fred Boateng scored from 16-yards out to cut the Eagle lead to 35-24 with five minutes left in the game. Revere scored on an 11-yard keeper with 1:35 left that capped the scoring.

For GSU, Adrian Peterson gained 181 yards on 29 carries while Revere added 120 yards on 19 attempts and Andre Weathers chipped in with 59 yards. Revere also added 165 yards passing and two touchdowns on five-of-13 passing. Chris Johnson had his biggest game of the season, hauling in four catches for 127 yards and the two touchdowns.

Defensively, GSU was without leading tackler Jason Neese and it

showed Saturday as the Eagle defense played their first poor game since the season-opener at Georgia. "We made a lot of mistakes on defense," said defensive tackle Freddy Pesquiera. "There's no way we should have given up that many yards and points."

WCU freshman running back Fred Boateng rushed for a career-high 213 yards on 24 carries. "[Boateng] has talent, give him a crease and he's going to go. He's a very talented runningback. He has good speed."

Rivers completed 14-of-32 passes for 151 yards with two touchdowns and one interception. "I think that [River's] a really good football player," said Coach Johnson. "He has good awareness and understands what's going on out there. As far as that's concerned, he's probably the best we've played against this year."

## SGA House of Representatives holds first meeting of school term

The Student Government Association's House of Representatives had its first meeting of 2000-2001 last Wednesday.

The way student activity fees are spent was a hot issue at the event. SGA President Aaron Nicely, who presided over the House, suggested that the body review where the money is going at the next meeting.

"Me myself, and the rest of that board that votes on this, will sit here with you. If you want things gone, tell us. If you want things added, tell us," he said.

"We will go into the activity budget meeting with an agenda. We'll walk across the way with the voices of students in our hands, and that's exactly what should have been taking place a long time ago."

The House also discussed ways to increase student interest in Eagle football. Some representatives felt that new pro-Eagle chants and changes to the Southern Pride marching band's musical selections could help.

Nicely informed the body that the athletic department holds sway over the band's choices.

"It's more of this 'community relations' thing that we have going on in this area," he said.

Representatives also suggested a public address system for GSU's cheerleading squad, better publicity for future Eagle pep rallies, measures to encourage students to wear team colors Fridays before games and free giveaways for students at games.

Nicely recommended that the House look at parking and transportation, as well. "Faculty and staff lots continue to grow, your fellow students are parking on the grass out here. It's easy to do that stuff when nobody's going to say anything about it," he said.

The way SGA handles organizations' fund requests was also explained to the representatives.

SGA sent invitations to all student organizations to attend the meeting, and representatives from over 15 attended. Attendance was bolstered later in the meeting by members of the SGA's Southeastern Leadership Conference Committee.

SGA attempted to have a viable House last year, but found parliamentary procedures too constricting for the body, according to Aaron Nicely, SGA president.

This year's body is much more free-form, operating as an open forum for representatives to air grievances, ask questions, and make their voices heard to SGA.

"That's the purpose of the House of Representatives: short, sweet, without any kind of loopholes," Nicely said.

"All kinds of constitutional writings of this body have been taken out. This body here to us is about sitting around, handshakes, Coke, cookies, and ideas."

SGA Senator Zach Rushing explained that the House was a distinctly different animal than the Senate.

"This is more of an informal meeting. Unlike SGA, we're not going to sit around and do a bunch

of Robert's Rules of Order, we're not going to do a bunch of debate," he said. "What we will do is talk about the issues that concern you."

According to Nicely, the House's most important role will be serving in an advisory capacity to the Senate, and in making sure that the Senate's decisions accurately reflect the feelings of the student body.

"It's kind of hard for 39 senators and five executive officers to go in a meeting and come up with a logical vote that represents 16,000 people if they never got a chance to speak of any of them," he said.

"You're who we represent, so you're who we want to talk to at the beginning of every month. That's why we have to have this body here, so that we know, as the Student Government Association, when we vote to pass something, you will stand behind it."

The way student activity fees are spent was a hot topic at the meeting.

Future meetings will include discussions with GSU administrators, Senate committees and other members of the Senate, Rushing said. The next House will convene Wednesday, Nov. 1 at 6:00 in the Russell Student Union.

Nicely hopes attendance at the House will grow for future meetings.

"If we have to take our meeting to Paulson Stadium, hopefully we'll get a microphone and megaphone big enough for y'all to hear the ideas from other student organizations and other students," he said.

## Rape reported on GSU property recanted

A woman who said she had been raped on the GSU campus Sunday recanted that story this afternoon, according to Ken Brown, director of GSU Public Safety.

The incident was initially reported to the Statesboro Police Department and it was later determined that the possible location of the alleged rape was on GSU property - in the area of Southern Splash, a recreational facility, Brown said.

Investigative work by the University Police Criminal Investigation Division found numerous inconsistencies in the woman's story - and when faced with facts that contradicted her story, the woman withdrew her claim of rape this afternoon, Brown said.

"Georgia Southern University Police take all such claims of assault very seriously, but it soon became clear that there was no evidence of rape as this woman reported," Brown

said. "The false report of a crime is something else we take seriously, so this case is not closed," Brown added.

Brown commended the investigative work of his officers, and said that the incident will now be forwarded to the district attorney's office for review.

The woman alleging rape was not a GSU student. Further details of the case will be released when and if charges are filed.

# Man Buries Wife in Garden

BRUNSWICK, Ga. — The Georgia Bureau of Investigation completed an autopsy Friday on Yukie Tatrow, who police say was shot by her husband and buried in the couple's front yard, the same day friends remembered and mourned her.

"She was a just the sweetest person. A very gentle soul," said Pam Kesegi, a friend and executive director of Amity House domestic violence shelter where Tatrow had served as a volunteer.

"Yukie was always smiling. She was a devout Buddhist and always had this sense of peace and serenity about her," Kesegi said. "For someone like her who lived by the Buddhist principles of love and peace to die so violently seems as inconceivable as it is horrible."

Tatrow, 53, died of a gunshot to the back of the head. Her death has been ruled a homicide based on the autopsy done at the state crime laboratory, Glynn County Coroner Jimmy Durden said.

Her body was found Thursday, buried in a makeshift grave in the carefully landscaped garden at the couple's home in an upscale marshfront Glynn County subdivision.

Her husband of 29 years, William David Tatrow, has been charged with malice murder in her death.

Police went to the couple's home Wednesday to follow-up on a missing persons report William David Tatrow had filed. After seeing blood spatters on a golf cart in the garage, police said, they questioned Tatrow, and he admitted he accidentally shot his wife Sept. 30 while showing her a .9mm pistol.

Police said Tatrow told them he panicked several hours later and buried her, digging the grave with a backhoe in the pre-dawn hours Oct. 1. He then allegedly drove his wife's car to a nearby shopping center and left it there.

Capt. Jack Hopper said detectives arrested Tatrow because they found evidence that is not consistent with his explanation.

"We have not pinpointed a motive, but we are exploring several possibilities," Hopper said.

Tatrow, 52, remained jailed without bond Friday at the Glynn County Detention Center. His attorney, Bob Crowe of Brunswick, also was unavailable for comment.

Known as Dave to friends and business associates, Tatrow had been a longtime project manager for the Brunswick architectural firm of John A. Tuten and Associates.

Some who know him expressed shock at his arrest.

"Dave is a very easygoing and mild-mannered guy. I've never even heard him raise his voice. I'd

trust him with my life," said Dwight Strickland of Jacksonville, Fla., who has known Tatrow for 10 years. Strickland said he had never met Yukie Tatrow.

The couple, who have two grown children, had lived for about a year in an estimated \$300,000 house at the end of a cul-de-sac in the Serenoa Cove Estates subdivision, neighbors said.

The couple's home is carefully landscaped with flowers, shrubs and a thick carpet of grass. A bird feeder hangs from the limbs of a shade tree about 150 yards from where police unearthed Yukie Tatrow's body.

"She loved the serenity of her garden," Kesegi said.

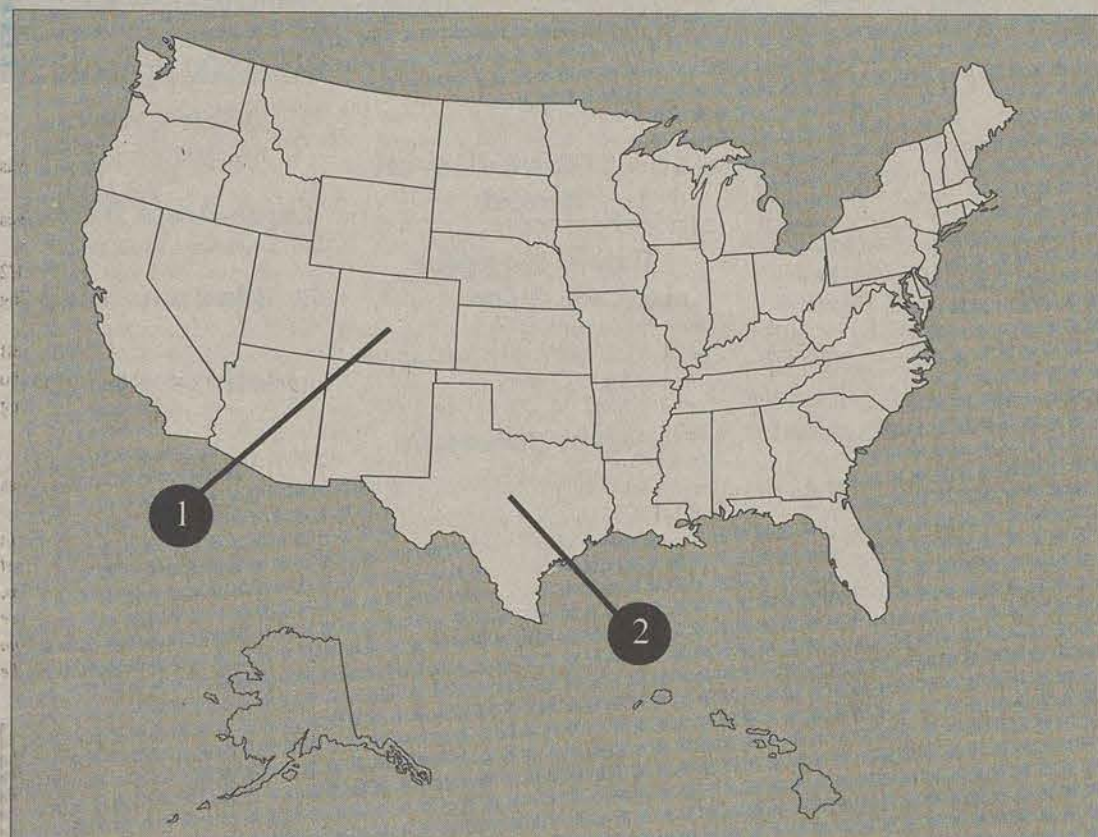

## Man who posed as cheerleader in trouble again

COLORADO SPRINGS—A man who once joined an all-girl high school cheerleading squad is now accused of bilking a woman out of \$15,000 by posing as a female supermodel and inviting her son to a photo shoot in Tahiti.

Storme Aerison, who legally changed his name from Charles Daugherty, faces charges of theft, fraud and bond violations. He is due in El Paso County District court in December, when a judge will determine whether there is enough evidence to try him.

The 36-year-old Aerison, who has also used the names Shannon Fox, Shannon Ocasis Trump Ireland and Shannon Ireland Trump, has claimed to

be the sister of supermodel Kathy Ireland and has posed in a swimsuit on his own Web site.

In 1990, Aerison was arrested after enrolling at Coronado High School and joining the female cheerleading squad. Unmasked a few weeks later, he was eventually placed on two years' probation for felony impersonation and ordered to receive psychiatric treatment.

In the latest case, authorities in court records say Aerison met Joshua Hurd of Watkins when the teen was browsing through personal ads on a Web site this summer. They say Aerison was posing as a 20-year-old Christian female supermodel.

Prosecutors allege that on May 15, he charged \$15,000 to credit cards belonging to Joshua's mother, Marjorie Hurd, for film and for plane tickets to Tahiti.

Aerison promised to return the money in 15 days and give Hurd's son a job on the set of a "photo shoot" on the island. He allegedly

paid the woman back with a fake check, then took off in early June to Tahiti for three weeks with the woman's teen-age son and one of his friends.

While the group was in Tahiti, authorities said, Hurd's family heard about the schemes Aerison has been accused of in the past and called police.

Aerison allegedly bilked Hurd while free on bond for a case last year in which he was accused of stealing about \$29,000 from a credit union. He has yet to be tried in that case.

He is free on \$165,000 bail for his latest arrest.

## Wife sues husband over motorcycle accident

BRYAN—Wathene Adams puzzled over how to get her insurance company to pay her medical bills after she was injured in a 1997 traffic accident.

Her answer, finally, was to sue the man driving the Harley Davidson on which she was a passenger.

That was her husband, to whom she is happily married.

After a four-day trial that ended late Thursday, a Brazos County jury decided the Progressive Insurance Co. owed Mrs. Adams about \$22,000, slightly more than the \$20,000 policy her husband owned, the Bryan-Col-

lege Station Eagle reported in its Saturday editions.

Initially, Wathene Adams received \$2,500 from the insurance company for her injuries. That wasn't enough to pay her \$6,000 in medical bills, and she had no health insurance to make up the difference.

"We couldn't resolve this case through mediation because the company did not make any offers. Instead, they said they'd require her to sue her husband in order to establish legal responsibility under the contract," said her attorney, Steven Steele.

The 49-year-old Navasota woman, who cares for senior citizens in their homes, was reluctant at first.

"Mrs. Adams loves this guy. It's her husband of many, many years," Steele said. "But the company gave us no choice."

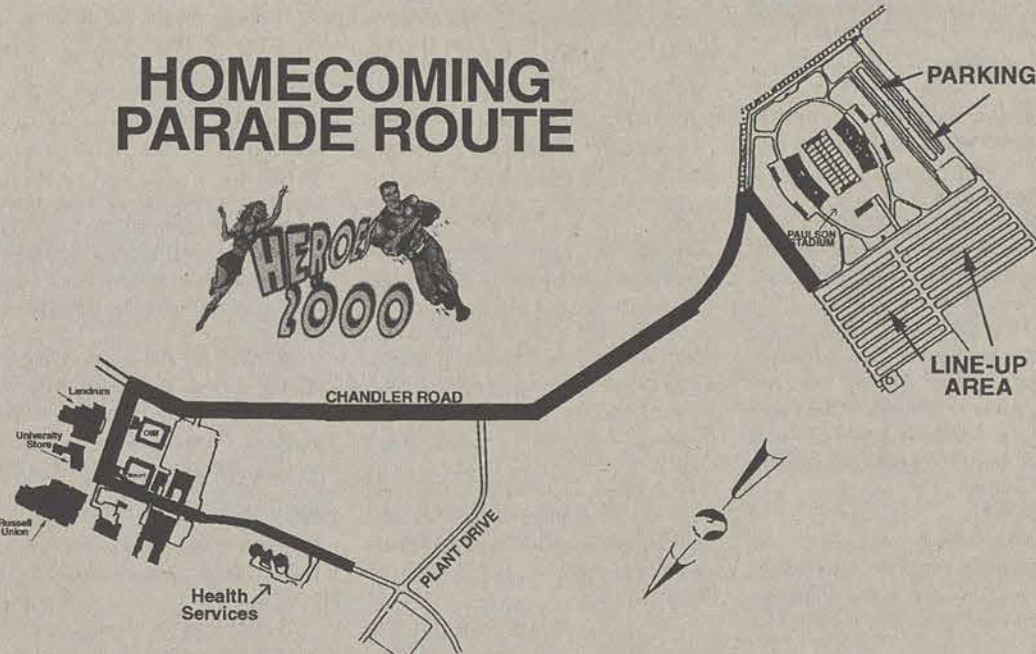
Her husband, Steven, understood the legal strategy and thought it was the right thing to do, Steele said.

Steven Adams told jurors that the accident was his fault because he was traveling too fast along congested Texas Avenue in College Station.

Court testimony showed he was driving between 10 to 20 mph when he struck the truck in front of him, sending his wife to the emergency room where she was treated and released for injuries to her shoulder, back and neck. Steven Adams was issued a citation for failing to control speed.

Attorneys for the company unsuccessfully argued during the trial that Wathene Adams injuries stemmed from a previous accident.

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## RAPE IS A SERIOUS ALLEGATION AND IS NOT MEANT FOR FRIVOLOUS CLAIMS

This past week, GSU was the site of yet another report of rape for the third time in six months. And, just like the others, the result was a recanting of those allegations by the female victim. This raises the interesting question: "Why are these reports occurring?"

### Our Opinion

Perhaps the women who were involved in these alleged rapes were attempting to get back at the alleged perpetrators for other reasons. Perhaps they were reporting legitimate cases of rape, but were unable to substantiate the charges. Whatever the underlying story behind these cases, the very fact that three unsubstantiated allegations have taken place is disturbing.

The charge of rape is a SERIOUS allegation. A woman who makes such a charge must not be malicious in their intentions and needs to be able to substantiate it. Frivolous claims are not to be taken lightly. This

is not to be insensitive to those who have indeed been victims of rape and been unable to prove that to law enforcement officials. Rape is, unfortunately, very real and occurs every day.

But, when you have three cases where the female victim has been forced to recant her story based on the evidence gathered by the police, the reality that maybe these charges are being brought forth to damage the reputations of the alleged males involved begins to set in.

When women make false charges of rape, they damage the credibility of women who do come forward with legitimate claims. In a society that is already going to be critical of women who make such claims, they do not need any others running around making skeptics.

It is a shame that three women in the past six months have damaged the reputations of three males who, according to the evidence, did not engage in anything other than consensual sex. One can only hope that in the future, women on this campus (and in the community) will not make such charges in order to damage the reputation of someone who did nothing wrong and will stop making it harder for other women who are the victims of rape to make believers out of the police.

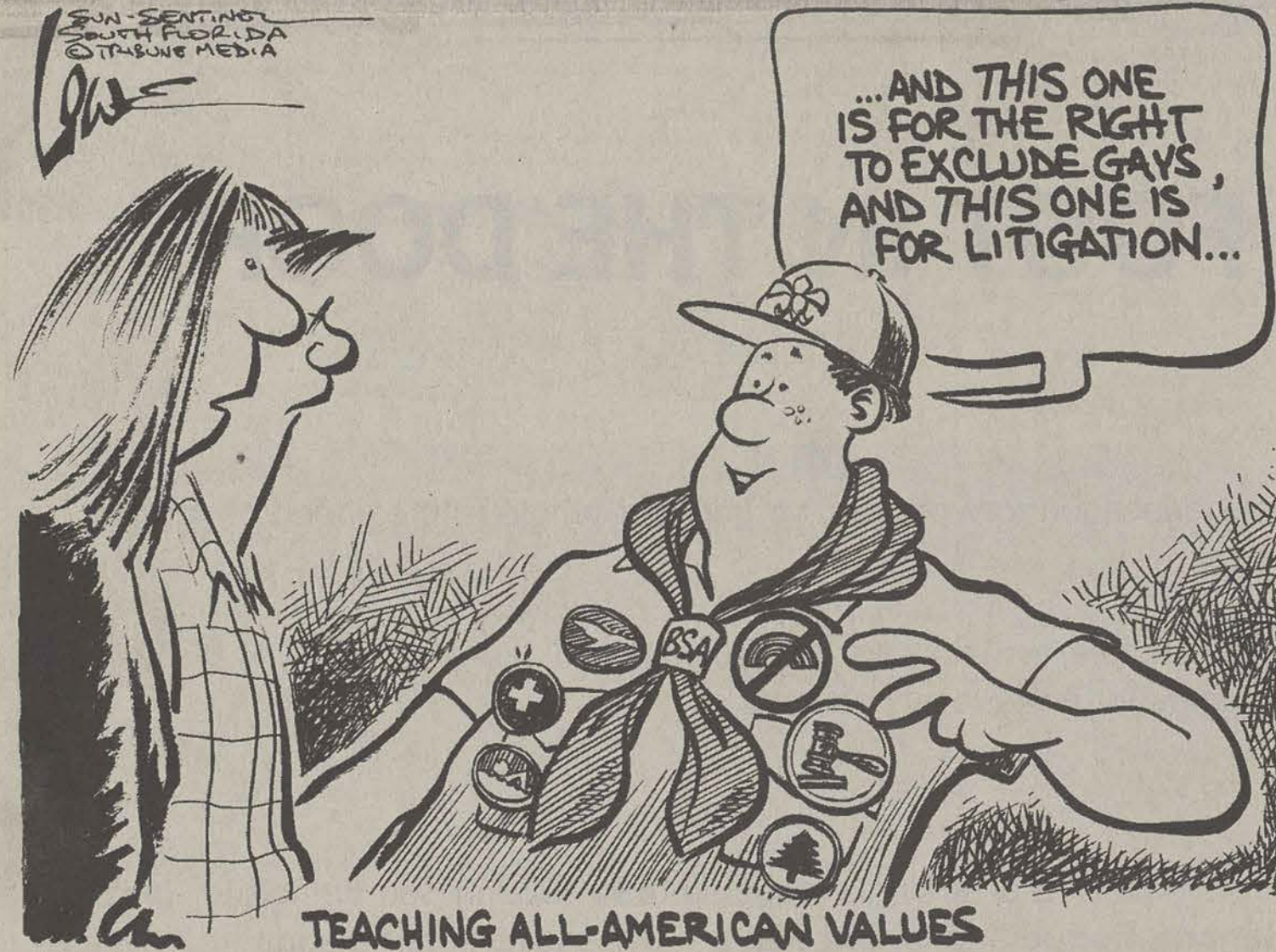
I can be altruistic. Loving, even. Don't be fooled, though. You may get more than me out of something, but you can be sure that I'll at least be getting something.

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# College crime reporting still cloudy across the country

Under the old rules of campus crime reporting, Brook Baker's murder didn't count. The Vincennes University student was killed in 1997 in an apartment across the street from the Indiana community college, so Vincennes officials were free to exclude the incident from their annual report on campus crime.

The new rules—which make their debut in this year's reports and were released this week—were supposed to force the nation's colleges to provide more information to help students and their parents assess campus safety. Schools are now required to report more offenses that don't lead to arrests, for example, and to give a more detailed breakdown of violent crimes.

But the most significant change—a requirement that schools report crimes that happen on public property adjacent to their campuses—is subject to such wide interpretation that it is virtually meaningless, safety activists complain.

"I count the near sidewalk [bordering the campus], the street and the far sidewalk," said Dolores Stafford, a board member of the International Association of Campus Law Enforcement Administrators and police director at George Washington University in Washington. "Where I wouldn't be required to count is a building on the other side of the street that the university doesn't own."

In other words, Baker's murder still wouldn't be counted, according to the association.

A check of schools in the region showed varying interpretations. At Northwestern University, officials count crimes in areas that extend more than a half-mile from campus in some directions, encompassing many private businesses and residences. But at the University of Illinois at Chicago, officials adopted the narrow association definition, except for some added territory at commonly used train stops.

Vincennes officials wouldn't comment on whether they would

report a crime like the Baker murder now.

Officials at the U.S. Department of Education, which wrote the rules, declined to give specific guidelines, saying the schools can be relied on to make those judgments. "The overall thrust of the legislation is to try to get some information to students and their parents about the relative safety of schools," said Dan Madzelen, chief of forecasting and policy analysis in the Education Department's Office of Postsecondary Education.

But in drawing the boundaries, "I think the institution has to make the determination as to what they consider the nearby public property to be," he said. "We don't spell it out in any more detail than that."

That answer doesn't satisfy campus safety activists. "The schools are [the Education Department's] clients, and they know the schools don't really want this," said Howard Clery III of Security on Campus, a Pennsylvania-based group that has

pushed for better campus crime reporting for 14 years. "I think there's purposely a lot of wiggle room."

Campus crime reporting began in 1990, when Congress passed the Crime Awareness and Campus Security Act. Congress amended the law in 1998 in an attempt to strengthen it; the Education Department's new rules, issued last year, were meant to clarify those amendments.

On some counts, the new numbers are clearly more complete. Schools are now required to report violations of alcohol, drug and weapon laws they handle through internal discipline systems. In the past, schools reported those offenses only if police made arrests.

As a result, DePaul University's new report shows 70 liquor law violations in 1999, compared with none reported in 1998. Northwestern tallied 56 liquor law arrests in 1998; with the disciplinary referrals included in 1999, the number of liquor violations rose to 122.

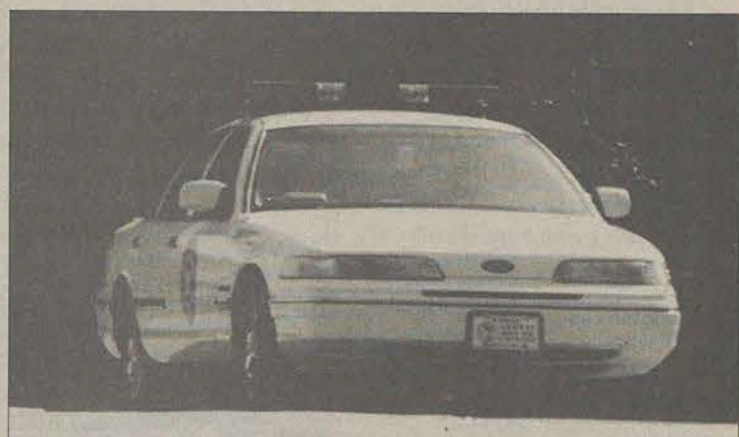
The new rules also require schools to break down crimes into more categories and increase the number of school officials who have a duty to report crimes they learn about.

But on the fundamental question of what areas to include when reporting off-campus crime, the results are less clear. "This is a can of worms because [the Education Department] never really said what public property is," said Bill Curtin, Loyola's public

safety director. "The numbers are going to be all over the place."

Stafford, of the campus law enforcement association, said excluding crimes at private businesses is only fair because the university has no power to make those places safer.

Clery, the campus safety activist, countered that the purpose of the data is not to assess blame but to inform students about how safe or unsafe they may be.

## U.N. passes resolution calling for end to mideast violence

**UNITED NATIONS** — With the United States abstaining, the Security Council approved a resolution condemning the "excessive use of force" that has left over 80 Palestinians dead.

In the bitterly fought-over resolution demanded by the Palestinians, the council called Saturday for an immediate resumption of Israeli-Palestinian peace talks and backed "a speedy and objective inquiry" into the fighting.

The council also said it deplores the "provocation" at Jerusalem's holiest shrine on Sept. 28 and the violence that followed, a clear reference to the visit to the site by right-wing Israeli politician Ariel Sharon.

The Palestinians say Sharon's visit, which is holy to both Muslims and Jews, sparked the violence that has injured

over 1,900 people, mainly Palestinians. Israel says Sharon had a right to visit the compound—known to Jews as the Temple Mount and Muslims as Haram as-Sharif—and blames the Palestinians for the wave of violence.

The resolution called for an immediate cessation of violence and steps to be taken to ensure "that further provocative action is avoided."

U.S. negotiators and supporters of the Palestinians reached agreement on the text after three days of marathon negotiations and the personal intervention of U.S. President Bill Clinton.

When council president Martin Andjaba of Namibia called for the vote and asked those in favor to raise their hands, U.S. Ambassador Richard Holbrooke mistakenly put his hand up briefly, to laughter from other ambassa-

dors in the Security Council chamber. Holbrooke, who was up all night negotiating, smiled and seconds later raised his hand to abstain, making the final vote 14-0-1.

Clinton asked for a delay in the vote early Saturday after a draft resolution was offered that the United States said it had little choice but to veto.

Holbrooke said the "tough decision" to abstain was taken at the highest levels because the Clinton administration believes it will be better able to serve U.S. national interests and deal with the "great dangers that exist in the region of the Middle East today."

One of the most important factors against casting a veto, he said, was the expectation that the United States will continue to play a role in trying to achieve peace in the Middle East.

Nonetheless, the United States still has a "clear distaste" for the resolution, Holbrooke stressed. "It was one-sided. It did not reflect the fact that Israelis have been killed and wounded, that this is not spontaneous."

Israel's U.N. Ambassador Yehuda Lancy echoed Holbrooke's assessment, calling it "the final product of a series of draft resolutions which were more unbalanced and more one-sided."

There is no Israeli military machine fighting unarmed Palestinian civilians, the Israeli envoy said. "We are defending ourselves against armed Palestinian policemen and against armed militia. This is the reality."

But the Palestinian U.N. observer, Nasser Al-Kidwa, said the resolution contains "extremely important elements," including the condemnation of violence and

the implicit references to Israel's excessive use of force and Sharon's provocation.

"I hope that it will have a positive impact on the actual situation on the ground, and I hope that it will be positive also for the peace process as a whole," he said. "We only hope that the occupying power will heed all the calls in the resolution."

The United States initially tried to head off the resolution, arguing that any council action would only jeopardize delicate peace negotiations to try to end the bloodshed and salvage the peace process.

Washington has traditionally tried to keep Mideast issues outside of the council domain.

But the Palestinians persisted, and on Thursday the council began negotiating a draft resolution submitted by Malaysia on behalf of the Non-Aligned Movement of

developing nations.

Over the course of three days, the United States negotiated changes to the draft that removed an explicit condemnation of Israeli security forces. The Palestinian demand for an international inquiry was also dropped.

Holbrooke said the resolution was the most difficult the council had dealt with since he arrived 14 months ago, and negotiations were made even more difficult by the explosive situation on the ground, including Saturday's seizure of three Israeli soldiers by Lebanese Hezbollah guerrillas.

The council also issued a press statement expressing "grave concern over the escalating tensions and acts of violence" on the Lebanese border "and asked all parties to exercise the utmost restraint."

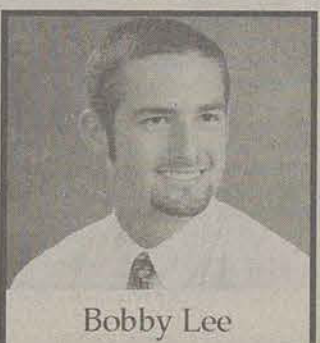
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# Volleyball splits weekend matches

The GSU women's volleyball team broke their 8-8 record against Furman on Friday at the Hanner Fieldhouse. The team played a close battle throughout all five matches. The first game was lost 13-15, the second game tied, and the final game the Lady Eagles lost 13-15.

"It was a tough loss," said Amanda Brooks after she played an intense game with 6 kills, 17 digs, 54 sets, and only one error.

The first game GSU started off with a fast two-point lead. Both teams grappled for the ball and the first match ended with a score of 13-15.

In the second game, Lauren McClain made 2 blocks and a kill within the first two

minutes. The Eagles were far ahead until Abby Simon, a sophomore from South Carolina made a nice block for Furman and the teams were tied 8-8. "We just didn't do what we needed to do," said Coach

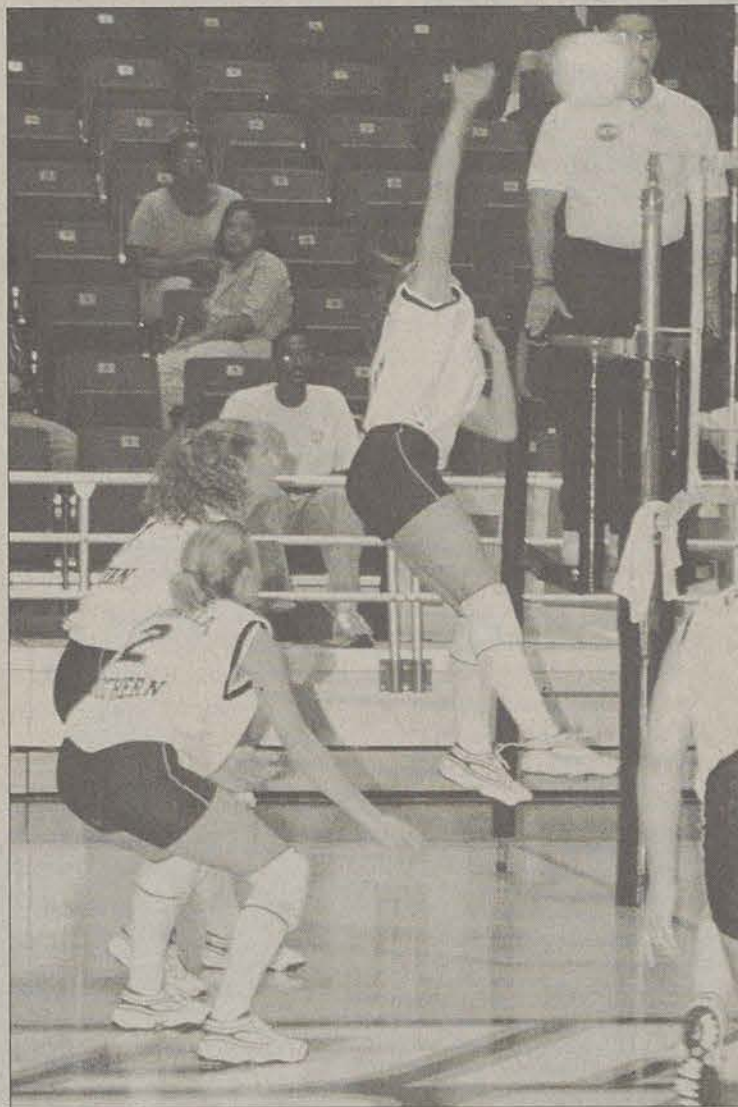

Tracy Ljone, head coach of the Lady Eagles swim team, has high expectations for this season. "Although we have a tough schedule and we travel a lot, the ladies will have to step it up and be more competitive at the dual meets this season. The traveling is easier than last season though."

After last year's season, the team suffered some major losses. Not only did they lose their only senior, they also lost lead sprinter Jennifer Martin, lead distance swimmer Hannah Goddard, one of the top Individual Medley competitors Kelly Frost, and diver Jacky Briscoe. This depth will help the team be a strong contender in dual meets, as well as Southern Conference. "The swimmers need to focus on not only top 16, but also top 8, and taking what we did last year and moving it a step further," said Ljone.

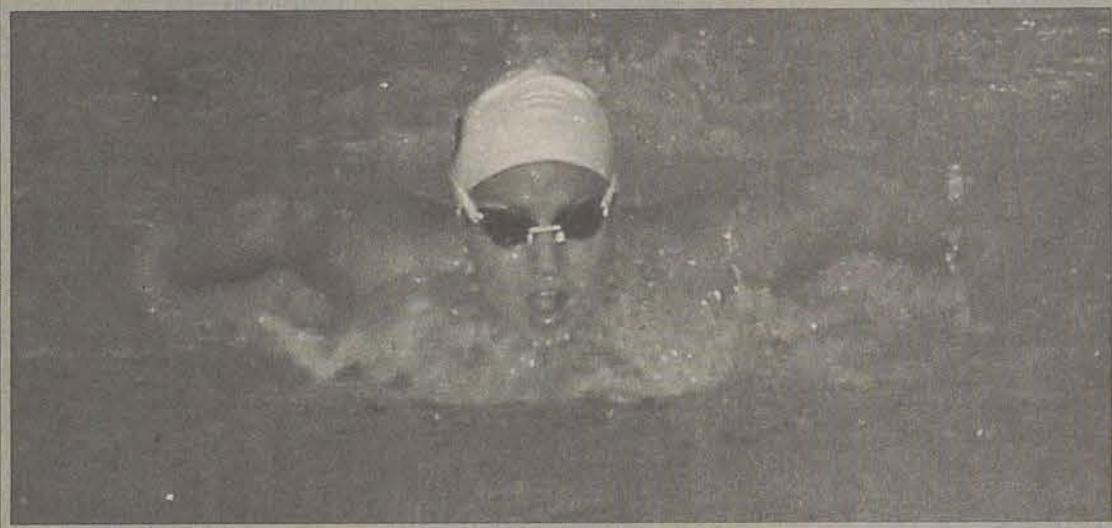
"Many of the freshman last year placed top 16, and I'm looking for them to move up to top 8," Coach Ljone said. "Jennifer Williams will

"There are a lot of new freshman that will help the team and the schedule is much better than last year, which means the team will be more pumped up and ready to swim fast," said Williams.

GSU had an opportunity to make the score 3-1 on a penalty kick, but Szeghalmi's shot sailed over the goal. Wofford had a couple opportunities, but the Eagle defense was too tough to crack.

The Eagles then traveled to Greenville, SC to take on Furman in a close match.

Two goals by freshman forward Emily Turgeon paved

the way for the 17th ranked Furman women's soccer team Sunday afternoon against conference opponent GSU.

After falling behind in the 24th minute on a Robin Thirsk goal, Furman forward Melissa Turner knocked in her team leading 17th goal of the season to tie the match. Turgeon knocked in her first goal of the match off a Turner assist to give the Lady Paladins a 2-1 lead going into halftime. GSU tied the match at the 70:10 mark on a goal by Andrea Pfeiffer, but the Lady Paladins answered back less than three minutes later as Turgeon connected for her second goal of the match.

GSU falls to 11-3 on the season and 2-2 in the conference.

Led by freshman Melissa Charron and sophomore Mary Rebok, the Georgia Southern cross country team finished 15th out of 22 teams at the Auburn Bank Cross Country Invitational Saturday.

Charron covered the 5,000-meter course in 19:54.58, good for 90th place out of the 179 runners participating. Rebok finished right behind her teammate in 91st with a time of 19:57.36.

The University of New

Orleans won the event with 54 points, followed by Auburn (86), Kentucky (129), Tulane (133), and Georgia (146).

Hannah Goddard was Georgia Southern's third-fastest runner with her time of 20:16.62 (101st). Stephanie McFadden finished in 114th with a finish of 20:37.34. Sarah Malone (20:51.40, 124th) and Melissa Reyes (21:27.32, 134th) also finished for the Eagles.

Georgia Southern assistant

coach Turena Johnson Lane, who was running as an unattached runner, finished third overall with a time of 16:39.95, only 10 seconds behind winner Marjo Venalainen of Kennesaw State.

Georgia Southern will compete again next Friday when it travels to Greenville, S.C. for the Furman Invitational. It will be the final event of the regular season, as the Eagles will compete at the Southern Conference Championships on October 28.

## Men's soccer ends seven-game winless streak

Freshman Tony Moffat scored a pair of goals, including the game winner in the 37th minute, to lead GSU to a 5-1 Southern Conference win over visiting Virginia Military Institute Saturday afternoon at Eagle Field.

The win was the Eagle's first in league play this season, as they improve to 4-6-2 overall and 1-2-1 in the SoCon, and it also snapped a seven-game winless streak. The Keydets have now lost their last five games as they fall to 3-7-0 overall and 1-2-0 in conference action.

VMI took a 1-0 lead at the 7:57 mark when Daniel Whitehall rose above a crowd of players in front of the net and headed in a loose ball just beneath the crossbar. But in the 32nd minute, the hosts tied the game when freshman Tim Brown fed a perfect ball off a corner kick to freshman John Dunning, who scored from six yards out to register his first career goal.

Dunning wasn't finished. Approximately five minutes later, he sent a deep pass up the middle to Moffat, who beat the defender to the ball and fired a shot past keeper Morgan Harris to give the Eagles a 2-1 lead at halftime.

The Eagles registered three goals in the second half to break away, starting with Moffat's second score of the afternoon off assists from sophomore Jeff Russell and senior Alan Pate. Tim Brown scored an unassisted goal at the 6:04 mark when his shot from 15 yards out sailed over the outstretched hands of

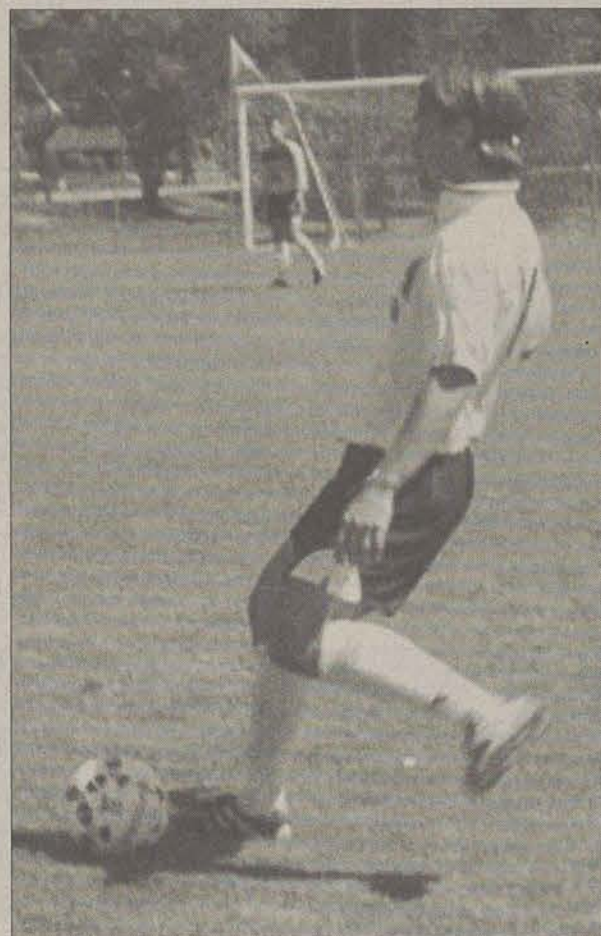
Harris into the top center net. Russell added the Eagle's fifth and final goal off assists from Freshman Ben Freakley and senior Tony Brown.

GSU goalkeeper Garret Lazenby earned the win in front of the net after allowing only one goal and recording six saves. His second save of the game may have been his biggest, as Zach Johnson's shot to the top right corner of the goal had every indication of giving VMI a 2-0 lead, but a diving Lazenby thwarted the effort by pushing the rifled

ball just over the crossbar to keep GSU at a one goal deficit. It was only nine minutes later that GSU tied the game with Dunning's score.

GSU has now come from behind in three of its four wins this season, with the one exception being the 1-0 shutout of Liberty on Sept. 8.

The Eagles will now hit the road for a pair of conference games, the first to be played on Tuesday at College of Charleston (7pm) and the second next Saturday at Davidson (3:30 pm)

# Olympic track star receives e-mail death threats

The FBI is investigating whether a college student e-mailed death threats to track star Marion Jones during the Sydney Olympics.

It was unclear whether Jones ever saw the e-mail, said her agent, Lewis Kay.

Jones is competing at the IAAF Grand Prix final in Qatar and did not return a call left at her hotel room on Wednesday.

An 18-year-old man, whose name is being withheld, has been suspended from Fredonia State, and a decision on whether to file criminal charges could be made within a few weeks, according to First Assistant U.S. Attorney Kathleen Mehlretter.

The e-mail threatened Jones; her husband, world champion shot putter C.J. Hunter; and at least one other family member.

Investigators declined to say whether more than one e-mail had been sent.

"We've determined that the threat is not a viable threat, there's no danger to Ms. Jones," Mehlretter said. "We are doing our

routine investigation to determine who sent the threat and their level of culpability."

Jones became the first woman to win five track medals at one Olympics. The threats were sent after reports surfaced that her husband had tested positive for a banned substance.

Fredonia State spokeswoman Christine Davis Mantai said the school suspended the student last week.

"The college assisted in tracing the origin of the e-mail," said Davis Mantai, who said the mail was sent from a private computer in a dorm room.

All dorms are wired with high-speed Internet access and students automatically receive an e-mail account when they arrive on campus. The student admitted to being the sender, Davis Mantai said.

A spokeswoman at U.S. Olympic Committee

headquarters in Colorado Springs, Colo., did not comment.

Mehlretter said the student could face felony charges of sending threatening messages over interstate wire connections.

The student told the FBI he had no real intent to harm anyone and apologized for what he had done, college sources said. He faces indefinite suspension until a college board conducts a hearing.

FBI spokesman Paul Moskal said people who send electronic threats often mistakenly think they cannot be traced.

"They think it provides some anonymity in that you threaten from a distance through a screen or a keyboard that are inanimate objects," Moskal said. "The good news for law enforcement is to some degree there is a fingerprint or paper trail left behind that allows them to track that."

# Braves booted in first round

The St. Louis Cardinals dealt Atlanta another postseason disappointment, sweeping the Braves out of the opening round of the U.S. Major League Baseball playoffs with shocking ease.

Jim Edmonds and Fernando Vina drove in three runs apiece as the Cardinals completed a three-game blitz with a 7-1 victory Saturday, putting St. Louis in the National League Championship Series for the first time since 1996.

That year, the Cardinals squandered a 3-1 lead over Atlanta, which won the final three games by a combined score of 32-1.

St. Louis got payback in this year's rematch, blowing out the Braves by an aggregate of 24-10. Atlanta got just three hits in the

finale, and the biggest cheers were for Mark McGwire, who grounded out as a pinch-hitter in the eighth.

Atlanta, making a ninth straight playoff appearance, will miss the NLCS for the first time since 1990. The Cardinals open Wednesday night, either at San Francisco or at home against New York.

St. Louis set the tone for the series by scoring six runs in the first inning of Game 1, going on to a 7-5 victory over four-time Cy Young winner Greg Maddux.

The Cardinals followed with a 10-4 rout Thursday, handing 21-game winner Tom Glavine his shortest outing in seven years.

In Game 3, St. Louis struck another stunning blow on the second pitch from Kevin Millwood — a high fastball that Vina lined into

the first row of the right-field stands.

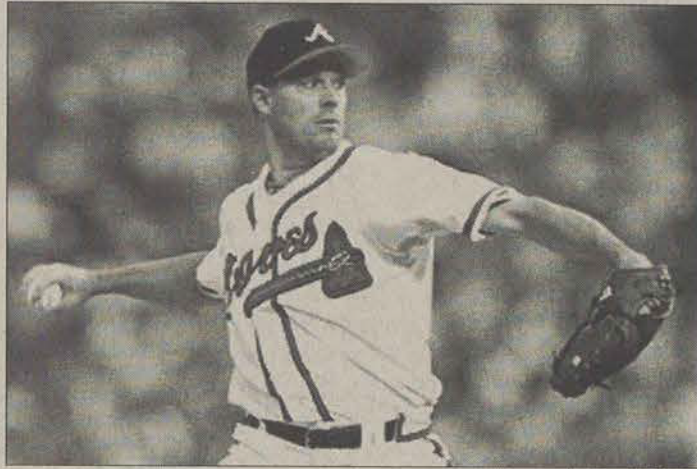
During the regular season, the Cardinals second baseman hit only four homers.

Then, with the score tied at 1, Edmonds went to work to chants of "M-V-P! M-V-P!," from thousands of red-clad Cardinals fans who filled out the less-than-sellout crowd at Turner Field.

In the third, he pounced on a 2-0 fastball from Millwood for a two-run homer.

Edmonds knocked out Millwood with a two-out, run-scoring double in the fifth that was misplayed by left fielder Reggie Sanders. For the series, the Cardinals outfielder was 8-of-14 (.571) and set a division series record with four doubles.

The Braves were buried when St. Louis scored three more in the sixth, prompting a serenade of boos before fans began clogging the exits. Vina had a two-run single against Mike Remlinger.

"Gizmodgery," the band's fourth album, was recorded entirely on toy instruments.

As best told by Mahaffey, "I went through painstaking efforts, not to mention several toy stores,

to bring you, the listener, a truly authentic album performed entirely on toy instruments," he said. "Expounding upon an idea established by Pianosaurs in 1986, I felt it was time for an updated twist. So, we 'mic'd-up' the Schoenhut piano, Student bass, and Muppet kit, ripped the voice boxes out of stuffed animals, pulled out the baby rattles, plugged in the 1/8-inch Jack guitar, made melodies from beeping bubble gum containers, and covered 'What a Fool Believes' by the Doobie Brothers."

football. That's what I thought," he said. "The only rule of recording: no cheating by using anything that would be considered a 'real' instrument."

"Gizmodgery" brings to mind the sound and feel of SELF's first two albums "Subliminal Plastic Motives" and "Half-Baked Serenade." The music ranges from the hip-hop/noise-pop of "Chameleon," to the rawk guitar-led "9 Lives," to the spacey 50's doo-wop of "ILOvetoLoveYourLove."

Whether it's psychological, emotional, or physical, many women wind up in abusive relationships and often wonder how they got there.

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## Silent Decree to play at Emack and Bolio's

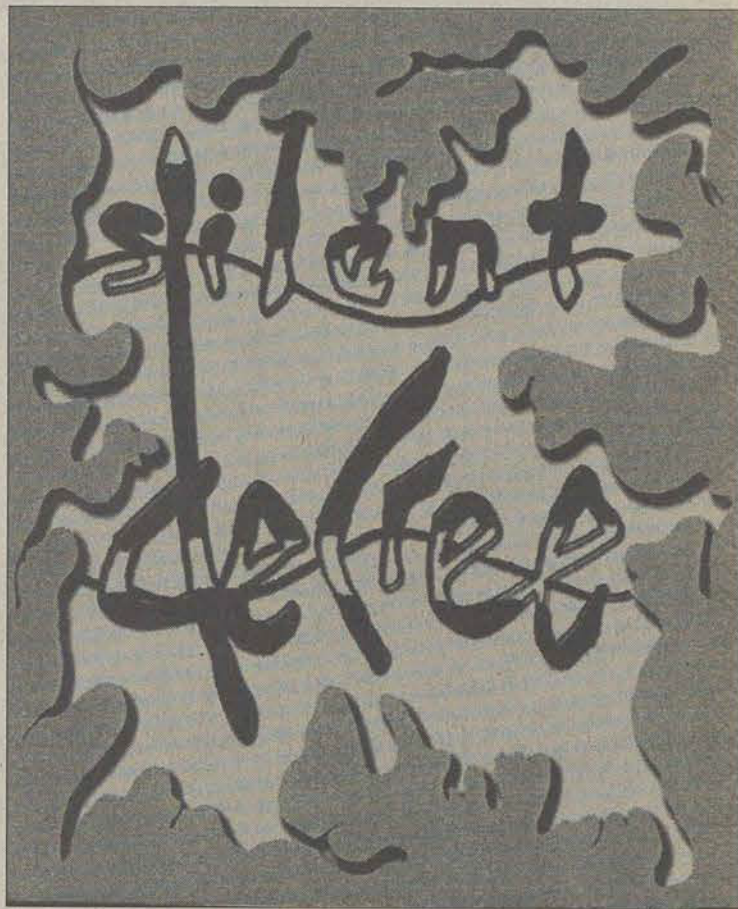
