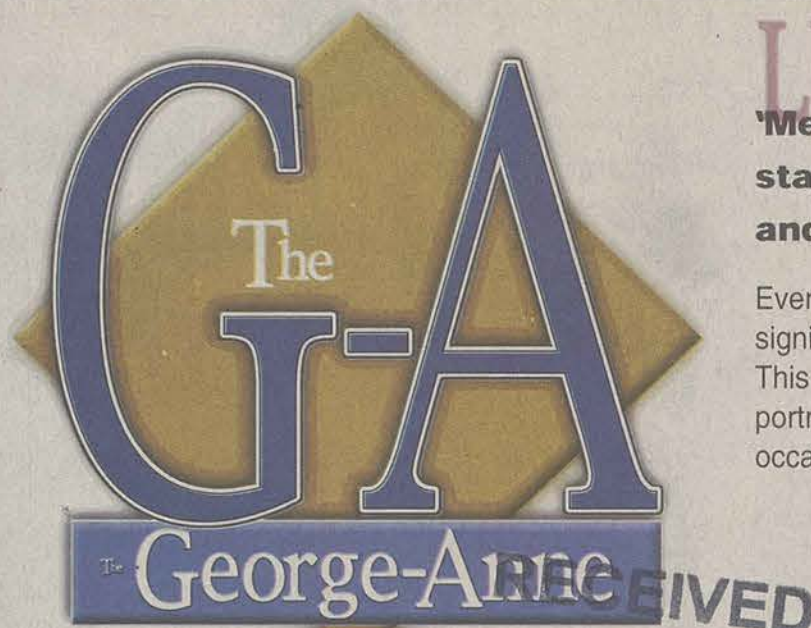

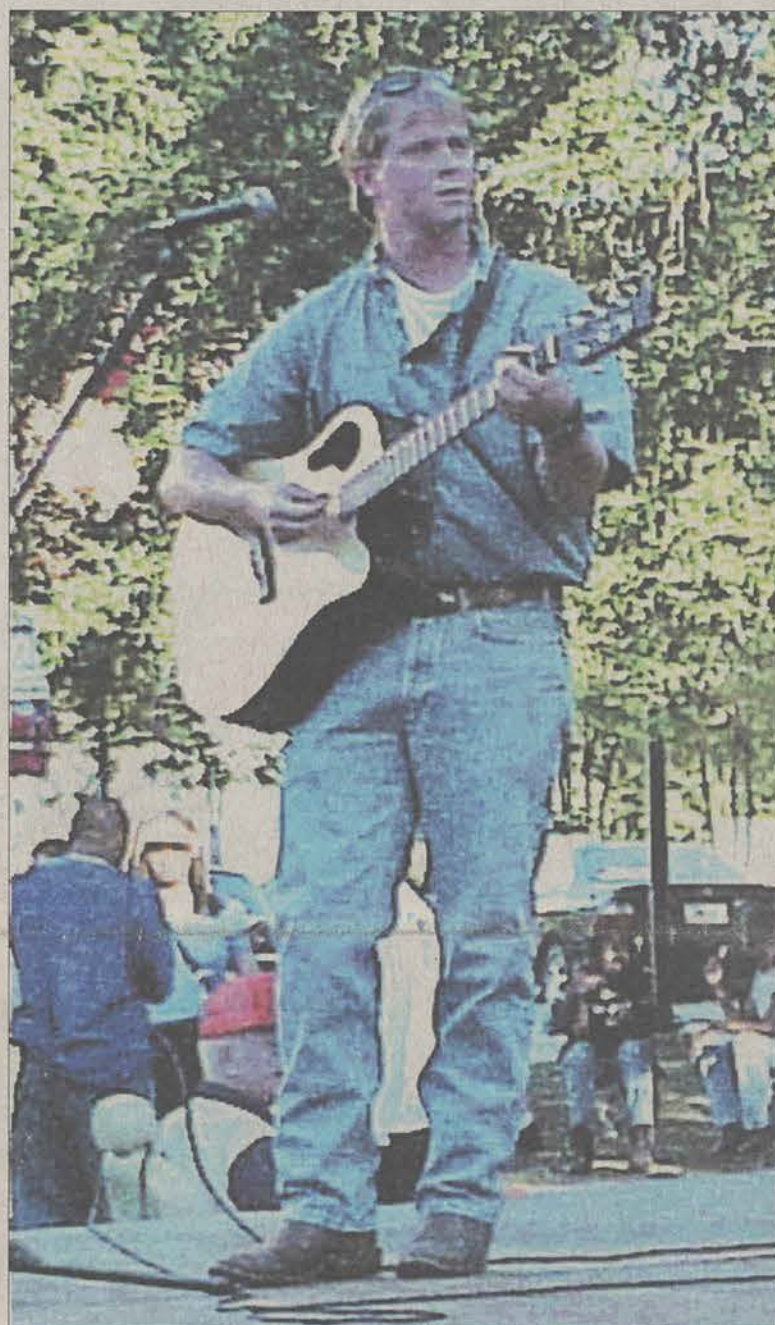
If you missed last night's fun, you have a chance to redeem yourself by attending today's Home-

"Seeing all these different people united in school spirit to show their support not only for football players, but their school in general, as well as each other, is one benefit of coordinating these events," Bugarin said.

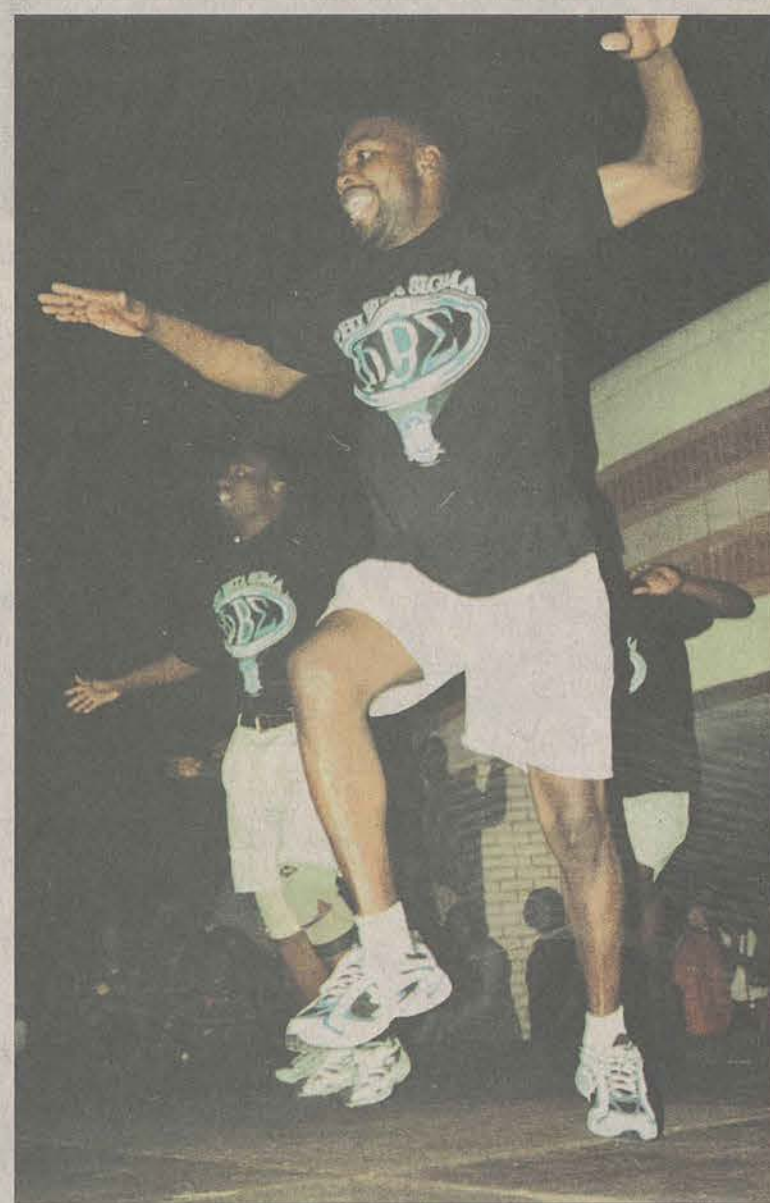

From the Pros at WVGS



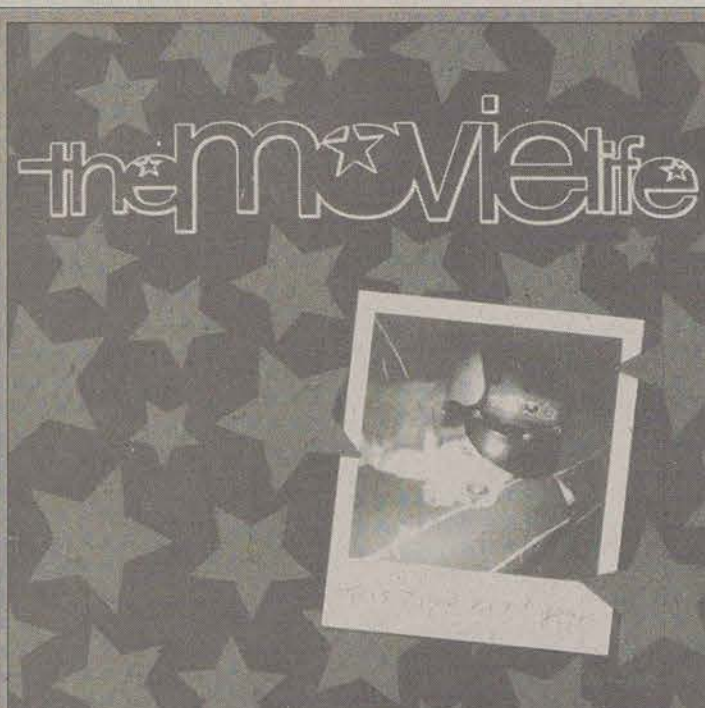

When talking about dance music, one name keeps coming up in the conversation: Paul Oakenfold. Listed in the Guinness Book of Records as the "most successful DJ in the world" Oakenfold, or Oakey, has played in front of millions of people across the globe. While very popular in northern Europe and club friendly places like Ibiza, Spain and Goa, India, Oakenfold did not receive his big break until approached by U2. Asked to open up their shows on their Zooropa Tour, Oakenfold agreed and played in front of scores of packed stadiums and festivals. His newest album, "Perfecto Presents Paul Oakenfold: Another World," checks in a whopping 24 songs and spans two discs. "Another World" is a step away from the dreamy beats of older Oakey albums.

Featuring a wider selection of songs than anything previous, "Another World" begins with a Dead Can Dance song, "Host of the Seraphim". This is odd for Oakenfold, as he tends to stay away from anything gothic sounding, preferring to stay with light and happy sounding tunes. Oakenfold does return

to his happier roots on the following two tracks, but on the fourth song, he experiments again, throwing in a Led Zeppelin song. While the Dead Can Dance song is a stretch—however a plausible one, the Zeppelin song, "Babe, I'm Gonna Leave You," simply has to be heard to be believed. He is able to take an old-school rock song and blend it seamlessly into the thick of mix album. The rest of the first disc is filled with other surprises as he works in another Dead Can Dance song, as well as a Vangelis song. Sounding almost like a score from a movie, complete with mood music of suspense and climatic action, the first disc is one to put on when you are seeking something to zone out to. Oakey's remix of Delerium's "Silence" is the highlight of both discs. Recorded with Sarah McLachlan doing the vocals, Oakenfold reworks the song and makes her words even more beautiful, if that is at all possible.

With a breadth and width that is astounding even for an Oakenfold album, "Another World" is another stab at perfection. With this release, it is easy to see how Paul Oakenfold has been named DJ of the year for 3 straight years. "Another World" does not sound so much as a movie score, but sounds more like a score for life itself.



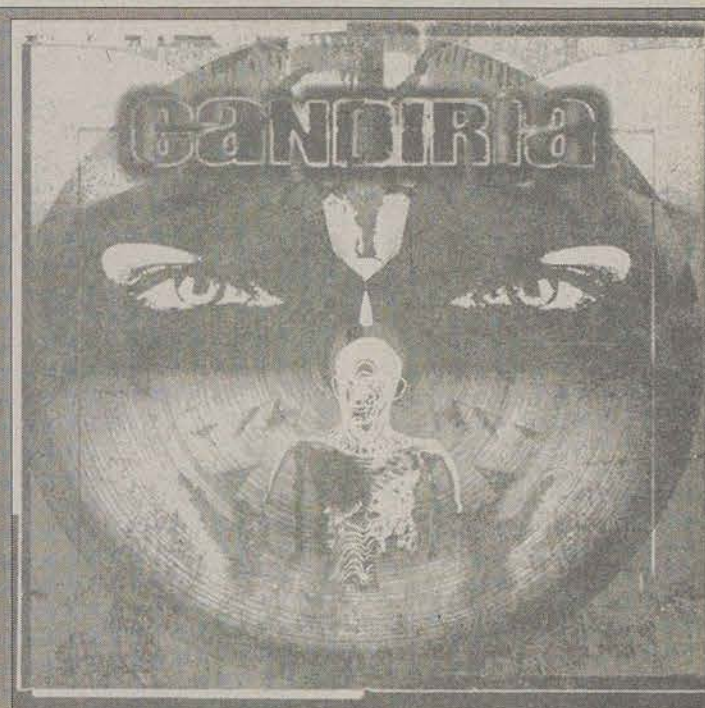

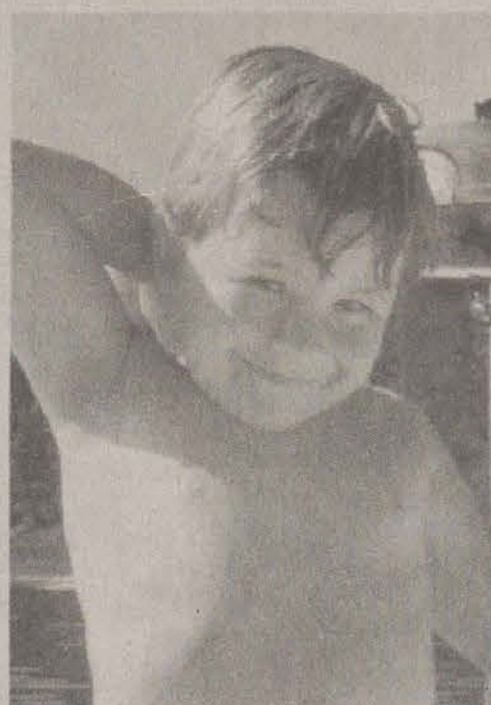

DeNiro and Stiller shine in new film Latino Outreach aims to assist youth in reaching their highest potential

Focker is in love with Pam Byrnes (played by Teri Polo), a kindergarten teacher who he hopes to marry. However, there's one big problem: her father, Jack (played by Robert DeNiro). Jack's conservative WASP-like views don't match up with Greg's political stance whatsoever.

When Pam's sister gets married, Greg goes with her to upstate New York for the wedding. Greg sees it as the perfect chance to get in good with her parents before popping the big question.

However, Greg's plans go awry from the start, leading to some of the best slapstick gags and low-brow humor in years.

Many of the highlights from the film include Stiller's hilarious attempt at saying the pre-dinner "Grace." His version seems to be influenced heavily by Dr. Suess, rather than the normal religious appreciation speech. Also, Stiller has a nice spastic scene in an airport that is reminiscent of some early Tom Hanks performances.

Stiller's performance is immaculate, but it is DeNiro who really stands out. DeNiro is no veteran when it comes to comedy, but when he lets his humor shine through, the result is outstanding.

As a fatherly man with that famous sheepish grin, DeNiro seems to be spoofing all the menacing psychos he's played in the past. This may very well be DeNiro's best comedic performance ever.

DeNiro and Stiller's chemistry in acting out the scenes where they appear together is what makes "Meet the Parents" one of the best comedies of the year.

Unfortunately, these performances are the nearly the only ones that add color to the film. Teri Polo does little, except for playing the medium in the tug-of-war match between Jack and Greg. Neither does Blythe Danner as Pam's mother.

Only Owen Wilson manages to hold his own as Pam's ex-fiancé who is now a buddy of Jack's.

This style of movie has been done over and over for years in such films as "Father of the Bride" and "Son-in-Law." Naturally, it is a given that the protective father is going to cool off eventually and accept his daughter's independence, along with his daughter's boyfriend, allowing the boyfriend to become part of the family.

By the way, the ending will leave you laughing all the way into the parking lot, as the final scene is as funny as anything else in the entire movie.

So, go "Meet the Parents" for a few laughs of both silly and intelligent comedy quality.

The Center for Latino Outreach and Research Services located on the campus of Georgia Southern is an organization dedicated to providing Latinos in the Bulloch County area with youth mentorship and other services.

The Center has been established to help serve the needs of Bulloch County's Hispanic population, which has increased rapidly in recent years.

Nationwide, the need and advantages of a Latino Outreach Program have been discussed and encouraged by community leaders and politicians.

In 1998, the White House held the "White House Initiative on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans."

The Executive Board of the President's Advisory Commission on Educational Excellence for Hispanic Americans brought together leaders from various public sector agencies to discuss the educational needs and set goals for our nation's fastest growing segment of the population.

The commission recommended, among other things, the immense responsibility and need for outreach programs in order to reach a segment of the population, which is often thought to be difficult to reach due to language and cultural barriers. These barriers can sometimes present another barrier to information and

education.

In Bulloch County, Latino students have a 50 percent drop out rate. The Center has initiated the mentoring program to bring together school-age children with college students who can serve as positive role models to teach and encourage Latino students to succeed in the classroom and in the community.

The organization currently has 30 Georgia Southern students who visit area schools to help Latino students develop skills they need to succeed in school and beyond. They help students with Reading, Writing, and perhaps most importantly, English speaking skills.

The mentors can also provide their students with extracurricular activities at the parent's discretion in order to further develop the skills they

learn in the classroom.

As a volunteer, people have the ability to tailor the student they will be mentoring to their own individual strengths and weaknesses. Volunteers can select the gender and educational level of the student they will be working with, and this can greatly increase the success of the mentor/student relationship.

There are students in the program from Kindergarten through 12th grade.

The Center is still in need of 35 mentors who are willing to mentor at least twice a week at their assigned student's school, and who are committed to the education success of Bulloch County's Latino students.

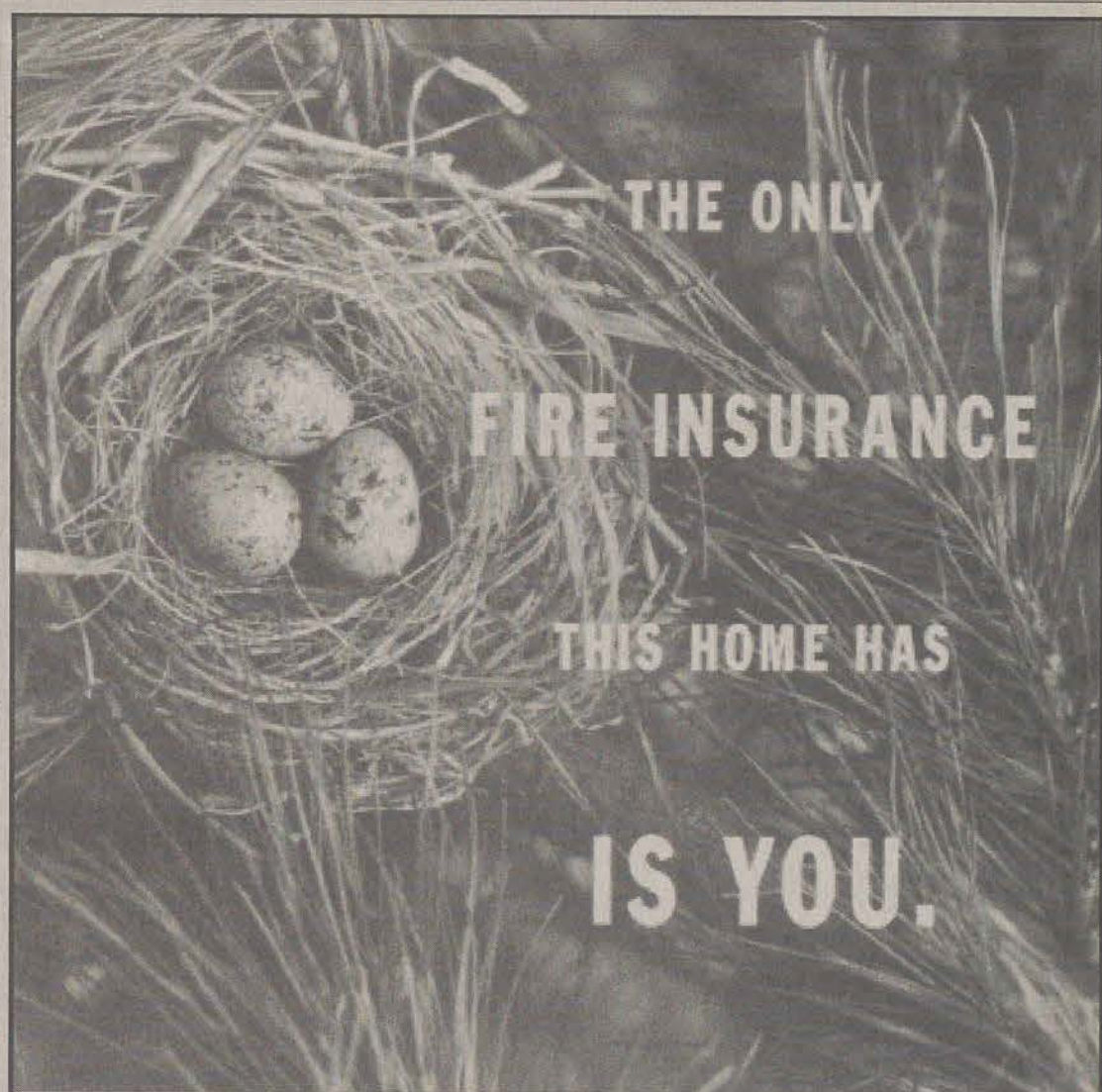

Welcome to 'Our House'

Not many things went wrong for the GSU football program in 1999 as they marched to a 13-2 record and were crowned as national champions of I-AA football. But the only blemishes on an otherwise perfect season were a close loss to I-A Oregon State and an even narrower loss to arch rival Appalachian State.

While the loss to the eventual bowl-bound Beavers hurt, it had no bearing on the Eagles national title hopes and the GSU players got over it. But the mid-season loss to the Mountaineers nearly derailed the Eagle's train to Chattanooga last season and it forced GSU to eventually settle for a share of the Southern Conference championship. Last year's 17-16 defeat is still on the minds of those in the GSU program, and for a good reason. App. State comes to town in the same capacity as the past couple of seasons these two teams have met: nationally ranked and GSU's closest competition for a conference title.

"Those guys gave us a loss last year and that's been one of the things that has haunted us since last season," said GSU's leading receiver Chris Johnson. "They've got to come to our house. It's tough [for an opposing team] to beat us [at Paulson Stadium]. We can't wait."

While some of the players have changed since last year's meeting the circumstances haven't. Both teams are the elite of the Southern Conference and the nation. GSU comes into Saturday's 3:30 p.m. contest as the top ranked team while

the Mountaineers are ranked fifth, but high national rankings are commonplace in this storied series that App. State leads 8-5-1. GSU was also ranked first in '99 when the Mountaineers pulled off the upset, prompting ASU fans to storm the field and tear down the goalposts. The 1998 game in Statesboro was also a classic as the second-

ranked Eagles held on for 37-24 victory over the third-ranked Mountaineers.

This season's game will also help determine the SoCon's champion as App. State enters the contest at 4-1 overall and 3-0 in SoCon play and fresh off of an 18-17 victory at home against Furman. GSU stands at 5-1 and 4-0 and will face their first stiff test since the season-opening loss at Georgia.

"It's going to be a big game,"

said offensive lineman James McCoy. "We went up there last year and that was probably the worst game that we ever played. They came out on top by a point but they're coming to our house next weekend... so, we're really looking forward to that."

"We don't like them and they don't like us," said GSU head coach Paul Johnson after last weekend's game at Western Carolina. "It ought to be a helluva game."

The Mountaineer's come-from-behind win against the Paladins at home was led by a surprising choice at quarterback in Joe Burchette. The sophomore made his first career start a memorable one as he passed for 290 yards and led ASU on an 80-yard drive with less than four minutes remaining for the win over previously unbeaten Furman. Senior David Reaves, a part-time starter for three seasons in Boone, had started each contest this season for App. State but was pulled midway through the East Tennessee State game two weeks ago because of ineffectiveness. Burchette entered the game against the Bucs in the second quarter and led ASU to the 30-13 win.

Reaves, who passed for 302 yards against GSU in '98's game, had completed 60 percent of his passes for 640 yards and three touchdowns and led the Mountaineers to a season-opening win against I-A Wake Forest. Reaves, who had shared the quarterbacking duty with Daniel Jeremiah last year, appeared to have the job to himself after Jeremiah was hurt in ASU's loss to Troy State. But

now it appears it is Burchette's job to lose after posting 604 yards passing and three touchdowns in his four appearances under center.

Behind Burchette is Karim Razzak, the only I-AA player to outperform GSU's Adrian Peterson last season. Razzak, who rushed for nearly a 1,000 yards last season, ran for 137 yards on 23 carries last year against the Eagles. But this season Razzak has seen his carries per game cut from nearly 15 a game in '99 to just over 11 times per outing this season. The junior has rushed 57 times for 311 yards and has scored three touchdowns, but has made up for it in the receiving department catching 18 balls out of the backfield this season.

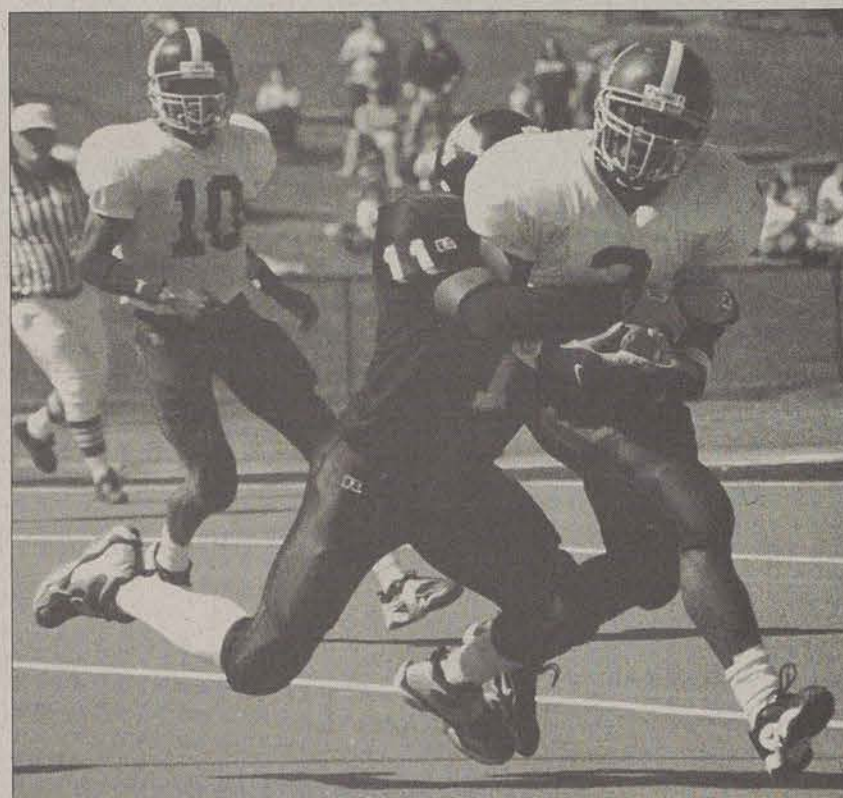
Whether it's Burchette or Reaves under center, the ASU quarterback will have plenty of targets to pass to in Daniel Wilcox (21 catches for 290 yards and 2 td), Joey Gibson (19 for 272 and 1 td), Troy Albea (18 for 368 2 td) Razzak (18 for 163), and Rashad Slade (12 for 161 1 td).

Stopping GSU's triple-option attack will be difficult for the Mountaineers 4-3 defensive attack. But stopping a great back is something they've done once already this season in last week's win against Furman. Paladin tailback Louis Ivory entered the contest as the leading rusher in I-AA football but left Boone with his pride hurt, gaining only 58 yards on 19 carries.

Defensively the Mountaineers boast many potential All-American and All-Conference candidates. Leading the way for ASU are linebackers Joe Best and Justin Seaverns with 54 and 52 tackles respectively. Defen-

sive backs Remi Awolowo and Corey Hall are two of the nation's best with Awolowo third on the team in tackles with

Freddy Pesquiera said. "We're going to have to be at the top of our game to beat them. We're definitely going to have to fix

30 while Hall has 24. Linemen Jason Sowell and Jamie Lovern lead the squad up front with Sowell posting five sacks. Cornerback Du'Shon Martin paces the team with three interceptions.

Offensively, GSU counters with the best rushing offense in I-AA, averaging nearly 370 yards per game. Adrian Peterson has picked up the pace behind a rebuilt offensive line in the past few weeks and is now the sixth leading rusher in I-AA with 963 yards and 11 touchdowns. Quarterback J.R. Revere has also improved too, and has tied a passing record held by former Eagle great Tracy Ham. Revere has tossed a touchdown pass in five consecutive games. In fact, Revere has thrown for eight touchdowns on the season to go along with 618 yards through the air and 381 on the ground. "The off-season stuff is starting to click now," said senior Chris Johnson, Revere's main threat in the passing game with 13 catches for 304 yards and five touchdowns. "It seems like second nature now with the passing game."

On defense, the Eagles welcome back leading tackler Jason Neese, who missed last week's game against Western Carolina with an injury. Last week GSU gave up 24 points and over 200 yards rushing to a below-average Catamount squad, something that they know can't be duplicated this week. "App. State is a really good football team" defensive lineman

the mistakes that we made defensively [against Western Carolina]."

Neese's return will help bolster a defense that will be missing two guys up front in Carlton Oglesby and Robert LeBlanc. Neese (35 tackles) and Pesquiera, last week's SoCon defensive player-of-the-week, Joe Scott (28 tckl) and defensive backs Ryan Hadden (25 tckl) and Lavar Rainey (30 tckl, 4 ints.) lead the GSU defense.

In a game that is too close to call, GSU's home dominance will be a main factor in this Southern Conference showdown. Expecting more than 20,000 fans for the Homecoming game, GSU expects a win at Paulson Stadium, a place where they are 106-11 all-time including winners of 26 straight.

"It will help not having to play up there [in Boone]," said GSU offensive coordinator Mike Sewak earlier this season. "But App. State is tough wherever you play them. Even when we played them in here two years ago. We had the twelfth man and we were a good football team but on the same token there was no way I thought they could beat us because the fans wouldn't let us."

"When you practice in this weather, when you work out in this weather, you think you have an advantage," Sewak continued. "When other teams come down here and they're sweating the gnats they get distracted by that. There's no doubt it's an advantage."

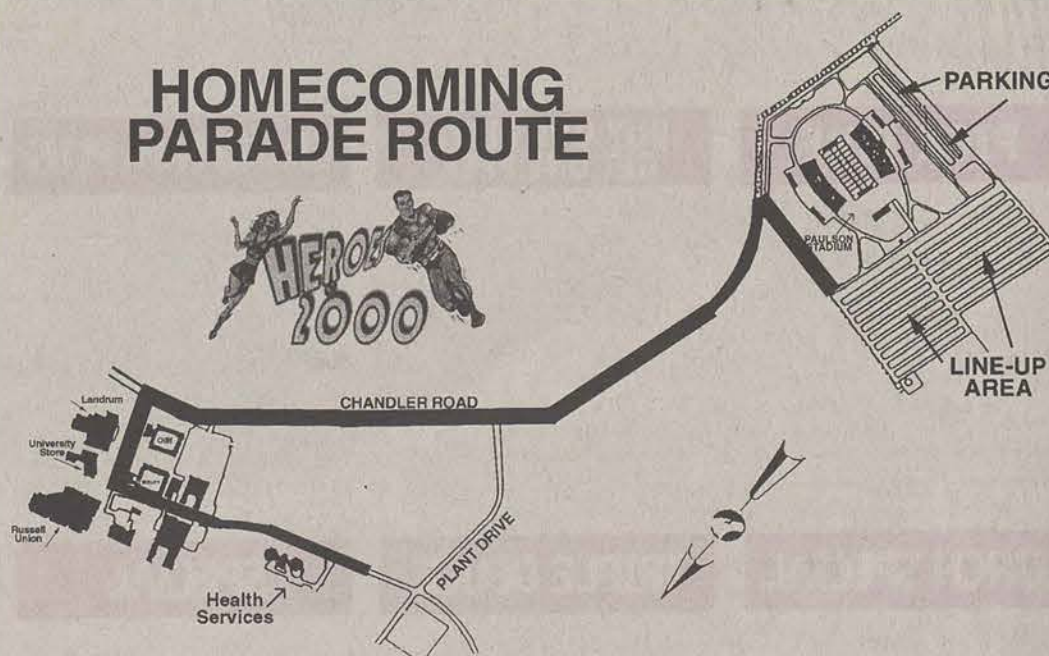

Basketball season begins with Midnight Mania on Friday

After making its debut for fans at Midnight Mania Friday night at midnight, the Georgia Southern men's basketball team will officially get its season underway Saturday night at 7:30 pm when head coach Jeff Price puts the Eagles trough their first workout of the 2000-01 campaign.

Price, who earned SoCon Coach-of-the-Year honors in just his first

season at the helm of the Eagles, will lead seven veterans and eight newcomers through their initial practice of the season, a two-and-a-half hour workout scheduled to conclude around 10 pm.

"We're certainly excited to get started, especially the way we ended last season," Price said. "We've got a good core of returning players and some very talented newcomers that we'll add to the mix. We've worked hard in the weight room and in our pre-season conditioning and now we're anxious to see how everyone is going to fit in on the court."

The Eagles return three starters and seven letterman from last season's 16-12 squad that won its most games in seven years and posted its highest SoCon finish-2nd in the South Division-since joining the league. GSU tips off its regular season Saturday, Nov. 18, in Hanner

Fieldhouse against North Georgia at 7:30 pm.

The Georgia Southern women's basketball program will officially kick off the 2000-01 season with its first practice Saturday, October 14, the first day the NCAA allows Division I teams to practice, according to head coach Rusty Cram.

The Lady Eagles, who return seven players from last year's 10-18 team, will hold their first practice at 9:00 am Saturday in Hanner Fieldhouse.

"We are very excited and look forward to getting the year started," Cram said. "The team has worked very hard during the off-season to be prepared for this year. All of us, from the coaches to the freshman, are ready to hit the floor and go to work."

The Lady Eagles' top returner will be junior guard Danna Simpson

who led the team with 12.8 points and 4.7 assists per game during the 1999-00 season. GSU will also once again have the services of senior Sharon Mitchell, a two-time all SoCon selection who missed last season due to a knee injury. Mitchell led the Lady Eagles with 15.7 points and 7.1 rebounds a game in 1998-99.

Two seniors, four juniors, and a sophomore compromise the remaining returners. In addition, Cram will welcome five newcomers, including one junior college transfer, to fall workouts.

GSU begins play November 11 when it hosts the NWBL All-Stars in an exhibition game. The regular season opens November 17 when the Lady Eagles travel to Mercer. The SoCon portion of the Lady Eagles' schedule begins December 21 with a road date at Wofford in Spartanburg, SC.

In order to alleviate and minimize potential traffic conflicts associated with Saturday's game and the annual Kiwanis-Ogeechee Fair, fans leaving Paulson Stadium will not be allowed access to the Veteran's Memorial Parkway (Statesboro By-Pass)

between Lanier Drive and Highway 67. In addition, access to Highway 67 and all points south off Gentilly Road will also be forbidden.

The GS Department of Public Safety recommends all fans who desire travel in a southerly or easterly direction from Paulson Stadium area, to follow the re-routing options listed below. For residents of Savannah and other cities located in the south-eastern portion of the Coastal Empire, U.S. Highway 301 South (to Interstate 16) and U.S. Highway 80 East are all alternative routes.

LANIER DRIVE (heading north):

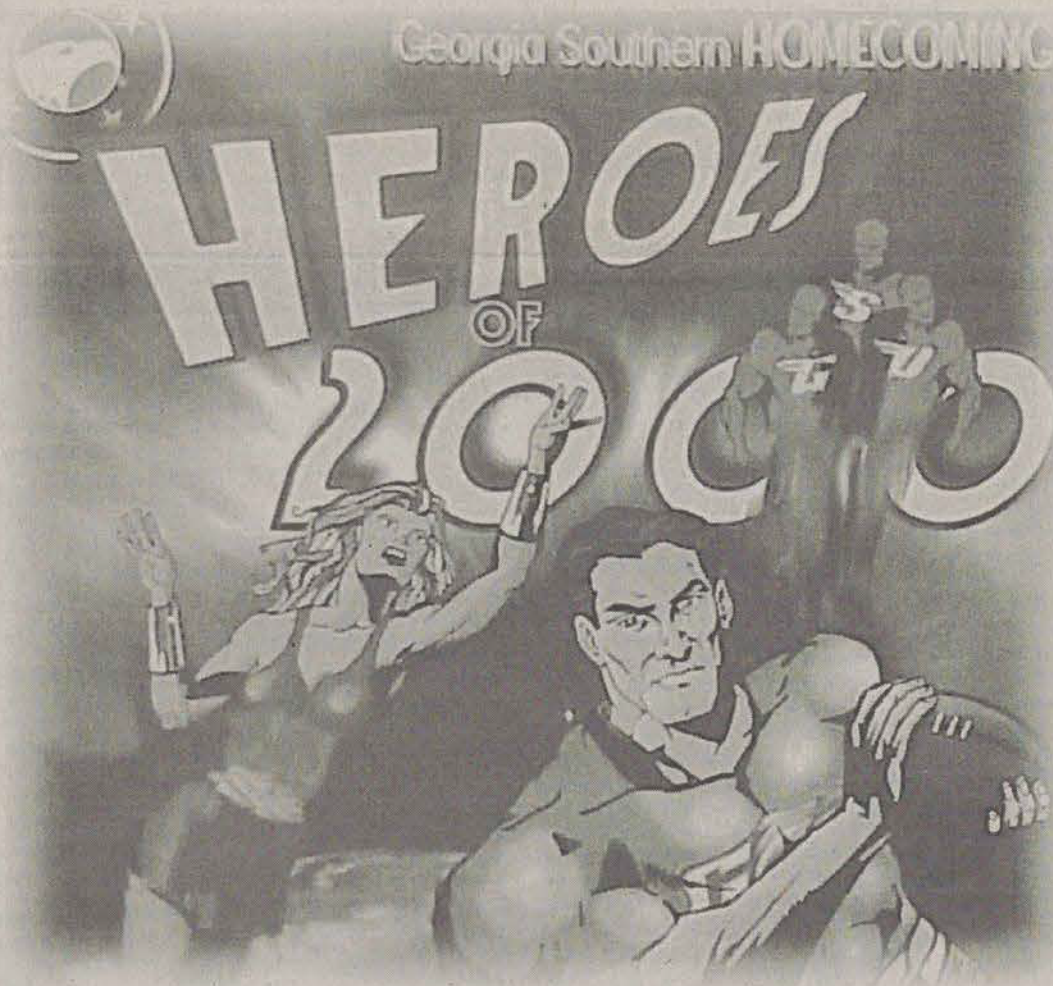
