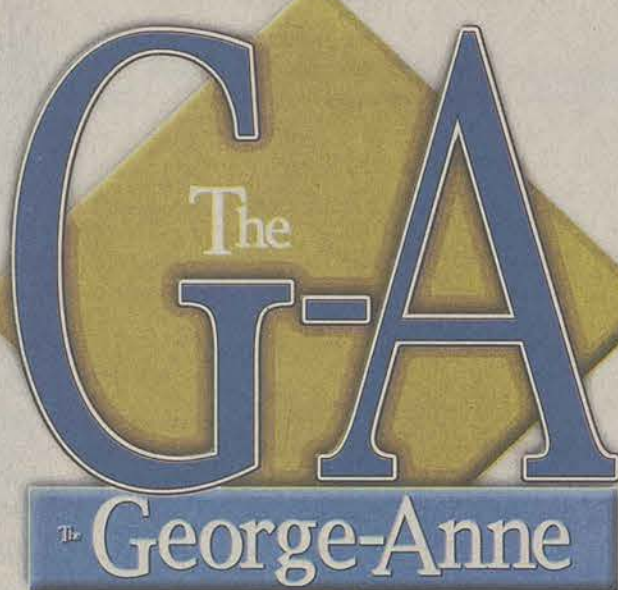

# Proposal to raise GPA requirements for members of the body divides SGA senators

Student Government Association senators were divided at last Wednesday's meeting over a proposal to raise GPA requirements for members of the body.

The proposal, which would take effect as part of SGA's new proposed constitution, would raise the current GPA requirement for SGA members from 2.0 to a minimum of a 2.25. Dr. Douglas Lange, GSU's vice president of student affairs, attended the meeting to voice his support for the proposal.

"A 2.0 says you've met the minimum requirements. Yes, you graduate, you have your degree, but it's minimum," Lange said. "I'm asking you to think beyond minimum, to raise the bar. As to what that bar may be, only you as students leaders can think that through."

"I hope you think about what is good about being a student government leader, and are willing to share that pride."

Lange pointed out that several other student organizations have GPA minimums above 2.0, the minimum average a student needs to remain in good standing at GSU.

Senator Matt Boone, head of the SGA's constitutional review committee, was grilled by his fellow student legislators about the changes.

"He [Lange] wanted a 2.5 or a 2.7, and I said it wouldn't cross the floor," Boone said. "It was kind of a compromise between Dr. Lange and myself."

SGA President Francys Johnson was in favor of the move. "It goes in line with the whole university approach to raising the standards. Before

we as a student body and a student government can expect more from the university ... we must demand more from ourselves," he said.

"Certainly it's not the end, but it's a foundation. We're trying to attract a higher-caliber student so we can have a better and more effective student government association."

Senator James Dixon disagreed, and equivocated the GPA change to moves made by the Statesboro City Council to exclude students from its ranks.

"This proposed amendment would limit students' ability to sit on the governing body, their one voice on the campus. I think that is wrong. As long as you meet the Georgia Southern requirements you should be able to sit on this body," he said.

"Students that have over a 2.0 are charged activity fees, which this organization operates off of. To be willing to give someone a degree, but not let them serve on SGA? If you're going to give somebody a degree, you should at least give them a voice."

Dixon's comments were met with applause from several senators.

Senator John Bryson countered Dixon's arguments, stating the need to have students with a "serious academic commitment" in SGA.

"I think that people who have less than a 2.25 ... those guys probably need to be working on their GPA. The people we're going to be bringing in will be able to be focused, rather than worrying about their academics," he added.

Boone called for a middle ground. "This is not final. I would welcome any ideas on compromises," he said. SGA Vice President of Finance

Francesca Evans suggested that the 2.0 requirement be kept for senators, and the SGA Executive Board be held to a higher GPA standard.

Senator Cecilio Gibbs questioned using a GPA requirement to enhance the stature of SGA. "If with this change, we're trying to create an image, why don't you raise the GPA requirement to a 4.0? I'm not going to look up to someone who has a 2.25," he said. "Besides, from my own experience, I don't believe that having a better GPA than someone else makes you a better leader."

The Senate made no decision on the GPA requirement, and Boone welcomed any comments or ideas from members of the body.

The SGA's efforts to create an on-line faculty ratings guide is also meeting with resistance, according to Jerry Rice, SGA vice president of academic affairs. "The faculty ratings, posting them on the Internet, is not a very popular thing with the faculty," he said. SGA has been forced to look for an outside Web developer to create the site.

The Senate also gave certificates of recognition to organizations that assisted with the SGA United Way fund drive Wednesday. In the body itself, very few senators have fulfilled their \$10 pledges to the United Way passed at a meeting last year, and Johnson exhorted individuals to bring their money in.

In other Senate business, the body approved a \$500 fund request from Alpha Phi Omega fraternity, and passed resolutions recognizing the tenth anniversary of Office of Educational Opportunity Programs' Educational Talent Search and supporting the university's efforts towards more housing. Five new senators were also sworn in at Wednesday's meeting.

## Mellow Mushroom and Pizza Inn now accepting Eagle Express

More restaurants around Georgia Southern's campus are now accepting Eagle Express.

Mellow Mushroom in the University Plaza and Pizza Inn on South Main St. are among the most recent restaurants accepting Eagle Express.

Tom Palfy, Director of food services, is very excited about the new additions to eagle express.

"I have a list of at least 15 different businesses that want to install the Eagle Express system," said Palfy.

Among those on the waiting list is Food Lion. They want to have a separate check out line for Eagle Express.

Some others interested in accepting Eagle Express are Buffalo's Cafe, Time Saver convenience store, Waffle King, Domino's Pizza, Western Sizzler, and Krystal. Each of these locations will allow students to use Eagle Express strictly for food purchases only, no alcohol will be allowed to be purchased on the system.

"Within the next week or two Buffalo's Cafe will be accepting Eagle Express. They have signed their contract and I have to install their system," added Palfy.

This plan has taken off beyond anybody's initial thought. Arby's is on top for highest sales, averaging \$600 to \$1000 a week solely on Eagle Express. At the end of every month, after all Eagle Express sales are comprised, each restaurant or business receives a check from the GSU food services department.

"There have been very few complaints about the system. It has worked remarkable," stated Palfy.

Students should keep their eyes and ears opened for the new up coming locations to use their Eagle Express.

## Dr. Sharon Tracy reflects on her latest book, 'Youth Gangs in American Society'

"Youth Gangs in American Society" is the name of the new book by Criminal Justice Professor, Dr. Sharon Tracy. The book was released in August 2000.

In the book, Dr. Tracy talks about what people are joining gangs and why. She has her own definition of what a gang is.

"A gang is any group of young people that are hanging out and engaging in illegal activities," she said.

She spent two years working on "Youth Gangs in American Society," which is actually the second edition of a book she released in 1996. Dr. Tracy said that one of the reasons she wrote the book was because most books on gangs were about activities in specific areas and readers needed more general information.

"People need a bigger picture and a general understanding of gangs," she said.

Before coming to GSU, Dr. Tracy received her Ph.D. from the University of Southern California in Public Administration focusing on Criminal Justice Administration. It was during this time that she began to be interested in gangs.

After obtaining her degree, she worked as a liaison for the governor's office in Nevada and found out more about gang activity in society there.

Dr. Tracy has been at GSU for the past twelve years where she teaches classes like "Gangs, Drugs and Criminal

Justice" and "Juvenile Justice." According to Dr. Tracy, the city of Los Angeles has one of the highest levels of gang activity in the country.

"In the inner city of L.A., there are over 350 gangs and over 200,000 gang members," said Dr. Tracy.

"Those are only the ones that are reported through police records," she added.

Gang activity is also high in the inner city, such as low-income areas of Chicago, New York and Atlanta.

Dr. Tracy said that most gang

members tend to be between the ages of 12 and 24. However, there are exceptions like members in that are in their mid-forties.

Dr. Tracy enjoys teaching at GSU because she gets to make students more aware of gang related activity and even learn some things herself.

"There are a lot of things that people don't know, so everyone learns something," she said.

"My students teach me too." Dr. Tracy is currently working on a new book about gangs in rural areas.

## Georgia House passes new flag, bill moves to Senate

ATLANTA — Timing is everything in politics, so Gov. Roy Barnes and Democratic House leaders struck quickly Wednesday to change the state flag, catching almost everyone by surprise, especially radio talk show hosts and e-mail senders who had little time to fan the flames of the already emotional issue.

"Win or lose, but strike quickly," said University of Georgia political science professor Charles Bullock. "The longer it hangs about, the more passions get inflamed, the harder it is to keep Democrats together for the battle over redistricting, where the stakes are so much higher."

"This had to be a surprise," said a senior Barnes staffer. "Just the emotions get too great on both sides."

The measure passed the House 94-82 after a debate that was remarkably short for an issue that has long divided the Legislature. But as House Democratic Leader Larry Walker of Peris said: "Every member of the House of Representatives understands the issue. We've been talking about it for a long time. It's time to fish or cut bait."

There was little warning, but word began spreading quickly Wednesday morning as the House Rules Committee met to take up the issue.

"I'm shocked we held it (secret) for so long," said the Barnes staffer, who added that the governor and Democratic leaders had been quietly negotiating the issue for weeks. In an effort to ensure secrecy, the staffer said, "there was only one copy of the (proposed new) flag, and we never let it out."

Bullock said the flag that emerged was a basic compromise. "It has a little bit of something for everybody. For the preservationists, you still have the old historic flag. For the change people, it is a new flag which downplays what they find to be the offensive part of the current flag."

The proposed new flag shrinks the Confederate fighting banner, which currently occupies two-thirds of the state flag, to miniature size as one of five small replicas of flags that have flown over Georgia. The five flags occupy a banner beneath a gold state seal on a blue field.

For those advocating a change in the flag, the House vote had been a long time coming. The chamber never voted on the issue in 1993, when then-Gov. Zell Miller made the last serious attempt to change the flag.

Miller's bill won Senate passage after it was amended to include a requirement for a public referendum. But facing a certain loss in the House, Miller withdrew the measure.

Why did Barnes succeed where Miller failed? Many lawmakers said it was simply changing times. Georgia is rapidly gaining population, and many of the newcomers have little allegiance to the Old South.

"Timing is so important here," said Walker, the House Democratic leader, but he confessed that before the vote he wasn't sure the measure would pass. "We got it out of

Rules and then we were flying by the seat of our pants. Before lunch, I thought we were 20 votes short."

If so, Barnes may have turned the tide.

Aides said he met with dozens of lawmakers in the late morning and early afternoon, warning them, as one aide put it, "If we don't vote or if we vote it down, it's always going to be an issue in your campaigns."

He promised re-election aid from himself and from the state Democratic Party for those fearing a vote to change the flag would hurt them politically.

As Miller had done in 1993, Barnes also addressed the Legislature before the vote, and made many of the same points. Their speeches were remarkably similar.

But Miller, who failed in his attempt, did something Barnes did not: he announced just before the legislative elections of 1992 that he would attempt to change the flag in 1993. It became an issue in that year's legislative elections, and lawmakers already were polarized when it came time to vote.

Barnes soft-pedaled talk of the flag until after last year's elections.

Miller "tried to lead from the top down," said one senior Democratic lawmaker. Barnes let lawmakers struggle for a solution until they found a compromise. "It came from the bottom up," the legislator said.

Said Bullock: "When Zell came forward with his idea, he caught legislative leaders flat-footed. Here, I presume the Democratic leadership has helped shape the compromise so they've got a dog in the fight. Before, I expect the leadership didn't feel a lot of obligation to help Miller."

### Coast Guard changes procedure after flawed lightning strike

SAVANNAH — The Coast Guard will change rescue procedures after an investigation into an aborted effort to save six people struck by lightning on a coastal river island.

A Richmond Hill nurse died three days after the July 23 lightning strike on an island in the Jericho River. Local rescuers who responded to the accident repeatedly requested a Coast Guard helicopter while they tried to revive the victims.

The helicopter, which was a 10-minute flight away, never arrived. Instead, it took Bryan County authorities two hours to get victims to the hospital, twice the standard for trauma cases.

A Coast Guard investigative report released Tuesday, said the agency could have been more aggressive in responding to the lightning strike and said three regional policies have been changed to improve rescue efforts.

From now on, Coast Guard helicopters will launch as soon as they get basic information about an emergency and victims, according to the report.

The agency also has streamlined communication procedures to speed

up launches, and ordered staff to improve relations with local emergency agencies.

Bryan County Deputy Dale McGowan, who responded to the lightning strike and was frustrated by the Coast Guard response, thought the changes were significant.

"Any improvement would be excellent," he said.

Coast Guard officials initially blamed a miscommunication that led them to believe the victims were on a golf course.

The Savannah Morning News filed Freedom of Information requests to obtain copies of Coast Guard logs and tape recordings, and reviewed Richmond Hill 911 logs and tapes.

The newspaper reported that the Coast Guard was given the correct location of the emergency but opted to believe a conflicting report that victims were on the golf course.

Although the golf course information wasn't confirmed, the Coast Guard declared the emergency a non-case.

By the time the mistake was realized, rescuers at the scene no longer needed the helicopter.

Inquiries by U.S. Rep. Jack

Kingston, R-Savannah, prompted the Coast Guard's Seventh District headquarters in Miami to begin its investigation in September.

Kingston credited the Coast Guard for streamlining search and rescue missions in the Southeast.

"Hopefully this new procedure will help save lives," he said.

The report indicated staff properly followed policies and procedures, and said there were no findings of negligence that required discipline.

But the report acknowledged flawed policies.

While the Group Charleston duty officer correctly followed established procedures, he could have been more aggressive and requested a launch, then back filled specific information as it became available, Rear Admiral Thad Allen, commander of Coast Guard District 7, said in a news release.

The Coast Guard also changed the way staff handles emergency calls. Instead of Station Tybee calling Station Charleston, who in turn must call headquarters in Miami for helicopter launch approval, an immediate conference call will involve all parties whenever an aircraft is needed.

## Woman predicts quakes with bodyaches

SALEM — Charlotte King hears sounds in her head and feels pain in her ribs, back and head. She calls it the seismic flu, and says the symptoms are a sign that an earthquake or volcano is coming.

Changes in the earth's frequencies cause physical symptoms that help her predict quakes 12 to 72 hours in advance, she said. Other signs, like a cat getting sick or ants coming to the top of the soil because of movement in the earth, also help her foresee seismic events.

King said such signs helped her accurately predict the 1980 eruption of Mount St. Helens, the 1985 Mexico City quake and others almost every day.

Most people never noticed the slight earthquake near Suver, 16 miles southwest of Salem, that measured just 2.7 magnitude late last month.

King says she suffered a pain in the back of her neck, foggy vision, a foghorn sound flooding her head and a beating headache in the days preceding the quake. "It was very small," she said, "but big enough for me to feel."

And there was no mistaking the signs before the 7.6-magnitude El Salvador quake on Jan. 13 that killed more than 700 people.

"It sounded like a real insistent car horn," she said. "That's the particular signature of that location."

The sounds began in 1976 when she was 30. Over the next few years, she noticed changes in their pitch and rhythm. She also developed migraines and other ailments that sometimes leave her in excruciating pain.

King began correlating the changing sounds and pains with earthquakes of various magnitudes in different locations.

In 1980, she said she predicted the Mount St. Helens eruption within 12 minutes.

That same year, she resigned from her job as a receptionist at the Salem YMCA. She has been on disability ever since.

At first, John Elegant was skeptical of King's predictions, but he no longer doubts her. The city's former building director, Elegant would regularly take calls from King, who would make quake predictions in the area and around the world.

"Her prediction capabilities are uncanny, to say the least," Elegant said. "A heck of a lot of them, definitely more than chance, when she called me, there was something to it."

Elegant said he was so convinced of her accuracy that if King were to make a large quake prediction for Salem, he would immediately contact his superiors to urge precautionary measures.

Others aren't completely sold. James Roddey, Oregon Department of Geology community education coordinator, said to date, nobody has proved they can accurately predict earthquakes. "I would be incredibly skeptical," Roddey said.

Oregon geology officials, meantime, said that even if accurate, King's predictions are useless because they usually cover large areas, often ones that have earthquakes daily.

To predict seismic activity in the Pacific Northwest or other quake-heavy areas is not that difficult, Roddey said.

## Workers tear down wrong house

TEXARKANA — Apparently, there were two tree-covered houses on Oats Street and now the wrong one is still standing.

A city-hired demolition company sent to tear down a house

on Oats Street called the public works department to make certain workers were at the right address.

"We were sitting on the street and we made a call to City Hall," said Johnny Mack Richardson, spokesman for Richardson Environmental and Excavation Services. "We asked them if we were at the right house. They asked us if there were trees that were covering it up and we said yes. They said, 'Then you're at the right place.'"

That's when the company tore the house down.

Later, the city realized the wrong house had been torn down.

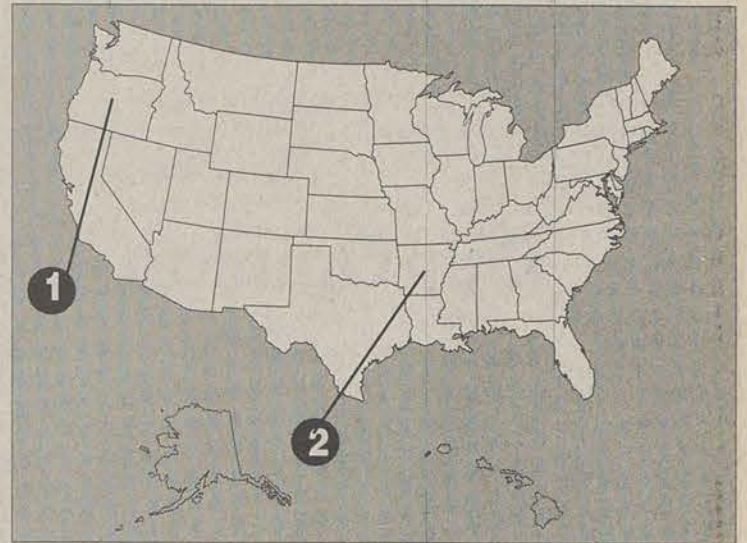
"Evidently there were two houses that were covered by trees," Richardson said.

"The people that the city employed tore down the wrong house," said Texarkana city attorney Ned Stewart.

He said officials notified the owner of the house, who lives in California. Carl Conley, the city's public works director, said Friday the house was demolished in July and the city is still working with the owner.

"We've been in contact with the owner and are trying to work something out," Conley said, adding that the owner has not taken any legal action against the city.

Stewart said he is certain the owner will make some kind of insurance claim. The city says the contractor's insurance should pay for the claim.

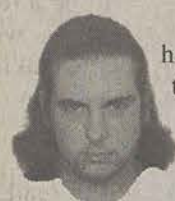

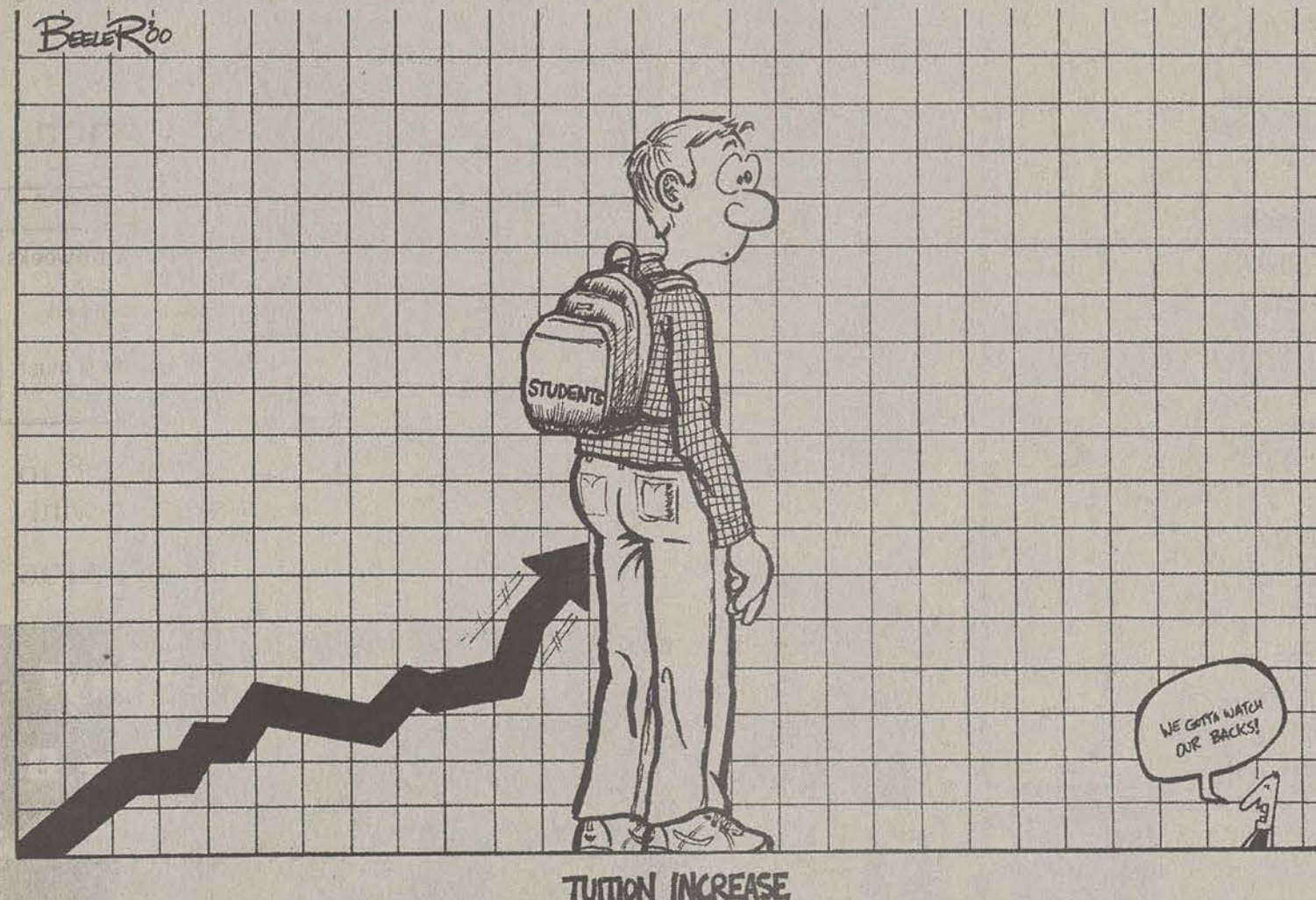

And, at 63, Jack Nicholson is returning to movies for the first time in three years—since winning the third of his Oscars for the romantic comedy "As Good As It Gets."

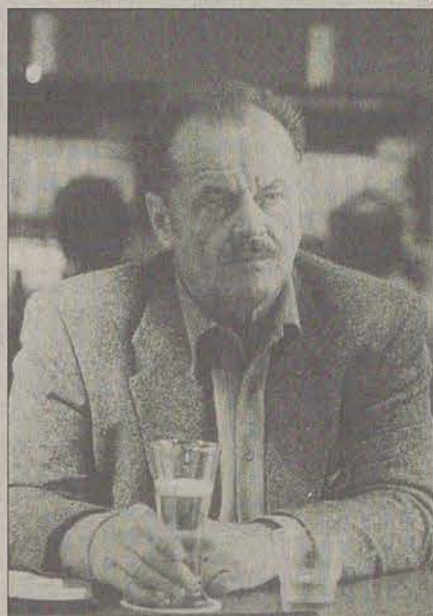
"I only work when I find something

## Post Players "put up" as Wofford "shuts up!"

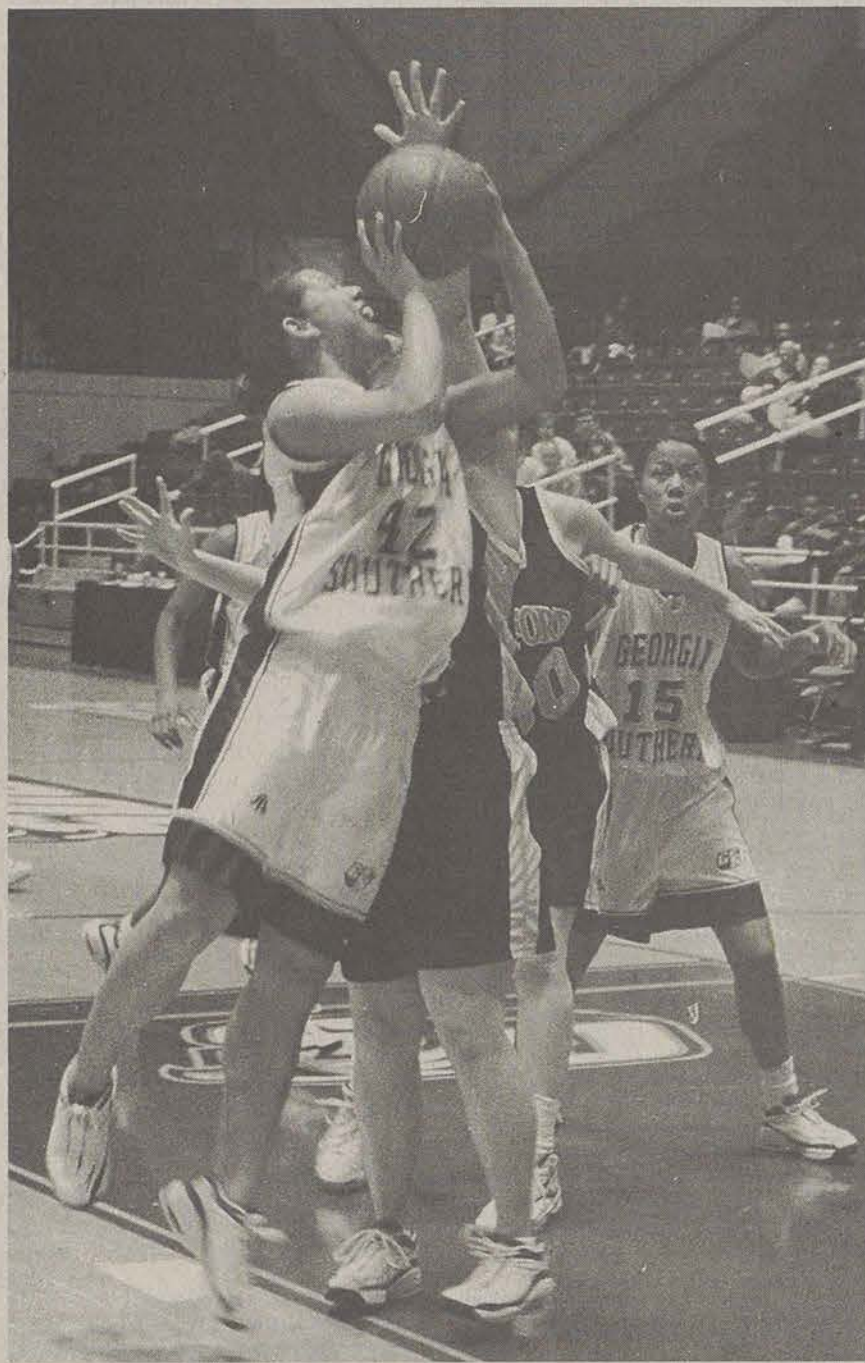
The GSU Lady Eagles Basketball Team showed why they are dangerous this year. Big play defense, especially in the post gave them a 72-63 victory over the Wofford Lady Terriers (8-11 overall, 4-6 Southern Conference) on Saturday. The "Lady Eagle Big Girls" held Lucy Hines and Nancy Dubuison to 13 points total. Offensively,

Sharon Mitchell's eight points and eight rebounds, along with the "Lisa Leslie" of Georgia Southern Women's Basketball Sharon Mitchell with 12 points and eight rebounds dominated down low. Shawnica Hill added nine rebounds as well for the Lady Eagles. "The reason why we are better this year, is because we are playing with a lot of heart and desire," Sarah McCary said, "We are going to make some minor adjustments for the Chattanooga game."

Chattanooga is the team to beat in the Southern Conference. They compose a 15-3 overall record. They have not lost a Southern Conference game this season (9-0). Coach Cram said, "I am proud of my team's performance. I will have one day to prepare for the Lady Mocs."

The post players of Mitchell, McCary, Hill and Jessica Everett are shooting 74.9% for the season. Mitchell individually is fourth in scoring, 13<sup>th</sup> in rebounding, fifth in field goal percentage, sixth in free throw percentage, and eighth in steals in the Southern Conference.

Hill is fifth in free throw percentage in the Southern Conference. The Lady Eagle backcourt also had a solid

game. Alie Rousseau came off the bench with 11 points. Danna Simpson had seven points and four assists. She was at the free throw line four times making three foul shots. She converted 16-16 against them earlier in the year, which is a school and Southern Conference record. She was four shy of the NCAA record.

After going 6-13 overall and 5-5 in the conference play around this time this season, The Lady Eagles did the "Kurt Warner" impression (13-6, 7-3 SoCon) and they are currently in third place behind Chattanooga and North Carolina-Greensboro.

The Lady Eagles open the game with a 15-2 run thanks to the combination of Mitchell and McCary with eight points and five rebounds. Wofford responded with a 9-0 run.

Natalie Walsh scored five during that run. She led all scorers with 16 points. The rest of the first half was a battle of two heavyweight fighters that resulted in a 33-25 GSU halftime lead. The key stats were second chance points as "what the Lady Eagles wanted was what they needed". They outscored the Lady Terriers 23-7, including 13-2 in the first half because of the offensive rebounds. The Lady Eagles won that battle 23-14 (13-4 in the first half). Wofford started the second half with a 8-4 surge thanks to a combination of Hines and Dubuison. Jenny Nett "blew up" in the second half with 12 of her 15 points. However, GSU's 21 rebounds (10 of those offensive) and 15-21 from the free throw line proved to be too much for the Lady Terriers.

## Eagles edge out Cougars 68-63

A week after suffering perhaps their most embarrassing loss during the Jeff Price era, the GSU men's basketball team made up for it Saturday night, stunning the Southern Conference leading College of Charleston 68-63 at home before a season-high 2,556 fans.

"That's the first forty minute game we've played, no doubt," said sophomore guard Julius Jenkins. "I feel good about it. We knew we had to come out and play well after the loss at Western [Carolina]. [The Catamounts] weren't a really good team but we kept our heads up at practice this week and worked hard. I feel we grew up a lot this week."

The win, the first GSU has registered against the College of Charleston since the Cougars joined the Southern Conference, upped the Eagles record to 8-11 overall, 4-4 in the conference. Charleston dropped to 17-3, 8-1. The victory avenged an 86-65 loss the Eagles suffered at Charleston January 6<sup>th</sup>.

GSU jumped on Charleston early, racing to a 39-25 halftime advantage behind a stingy defense which limited the Cougars to just 32 percent shooting in the first half. "Our defense was outstanding," Price said after the game. "It was just a really good man-to-man defensive game. We didn't press one time in this game."

In the first half GSU shot 46% thanks largely to the play of forward Kashien Latham. The junior shot five-of-seven from the field in the first half to lead the Eagles with 10 points. Latham and Jenkins ended up leading GSU in scoring with 14 and 16 points respectively despite Latham fouling out after playing just 21 minutes.

"I thought Kashien played well," said Price. "We knew he would be key for us tonight. He was there for us offensively in the first half and played tremendous defense throughout."

"Coach [Price]

had told me to step up because I hadn't been demanding the ball," said Latham who has seen his scoring average drop in the last month. "He got me hyped up for the game and I was ready to play."

Latham also played a key role in limiting Charleston's Jody Lumpkin, holding the center to 16 points. "He's the best big man, if not the best player in the conference," Latham said. "I'm just happy we could keep him in check. In the first half we held him to two or three shots but after I got into foul trouble I knew they would try to go to him more and they did in the second half. But we held on and did a good job."

In the second half Charleston shot better, including starting the half hitting eight-of-ten shots, on their way to outscoring the Eagles 38-29. "We knew that as good of a team as they are we were not going to be able to hold them down all game," said Latham. "When they made their runs we just had to stick our chests out and take it."

"We had some lapses in the second half but we tried to keep them to a minimum," Jenkins said. "We figured they would come back

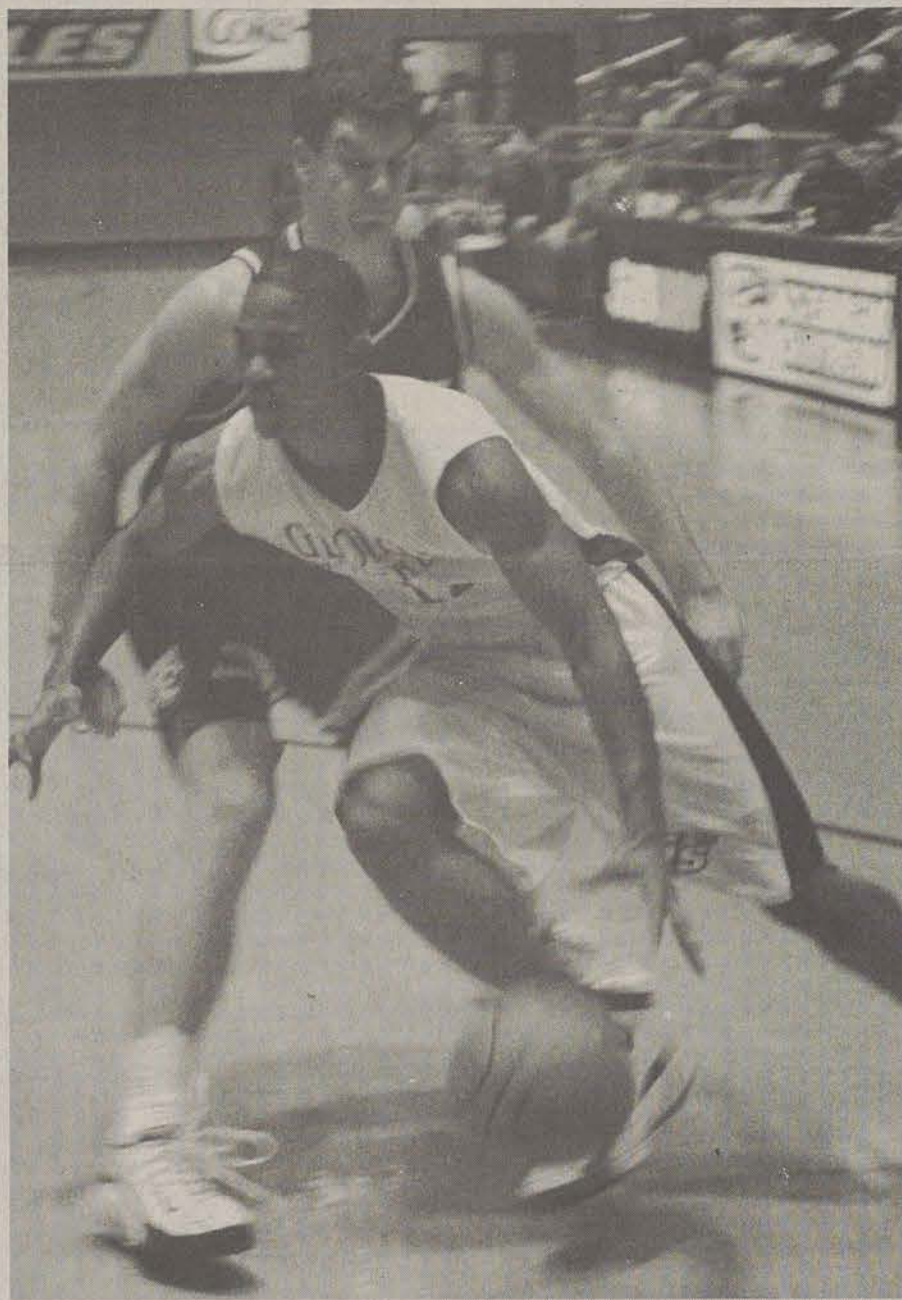
in the second half but we stuck with it and played hard."

But GSU continued to shoot efficiently in the final 20 minutes, hitting 12-of-23 shots, to pull off what reserve Marcus Byams called "the biggest win in two years for this program."

"It just shows that on any night anything can happen in this league," Coach Price said, alluding to the results of the Western Carolina and Charleston games. "With a game like this we've showed that we can beat anybody in the league."

The game, shown regionally on Comcast Sports, produced a season-high crowd of 2,556, which wasn't overlooked by the GSU program. "The crowd support was the key to this game," said Price. "I've been saying that all along. This is a game where the crowd really helped us get over the hump to win a basketball game."

"The crowd was really big," Jenkins said of the largest Hanner attendance figure since last February when GSU defeated Wofford in front of 3,193 fans. "They got into everything and made it more energetic out there for us. It helped a lot."

## NFL protest new Pepsi commercial touting copyright infringement

PepsiCo Inc.'s soft drink unit has made changes in a commercial for Pepsi One after the National Football League complained that the ad unlawfully displayed the trademarks of the Chicago Bears team.

The ad began running in early January and features Kim Cattrall of the TV series "Sex and the City" visiting a football locker room.

In a takeoff on the children's story of the Three Bears, the actress samples a Coca-Cola Classic and a Diet Coke before finding she likes the Pepsi One best. Several players return to the locker room to find someone has been drinking their sodas.

Earlier this month, attorneys for the NFL and its licensing arm, National Football League Properties

Inc., sent PepsiCo a letter demanding that the company quit running the ad because they felt it blatantly and unlawfully infringed on the trademarks of the Chicago Bears.

Pepsi-Cola division spokesman Dave Dececco said Wednesday that Pepsi One's admakers have added the word "Utah" above a sign in the ad that said "Bears Locker Room," darkened the colors and added a disclaimer that says the low-calorie drink hasn't been endorsed by the NFL or the Chicago team.

He said the revised ad has been running since Sunday, and that the Purchase, N.Y.-based company's lawyers continue to discuss the issue with the NFL.

A call to a spokesman for the NFL was not immediately returned.
