Due to constant complaints from Communication Arts students and faculty, the University has demanded the College of Information Technology to be moved to the Comm. Arts trailer.

University officials believe Comm. Arts students deserve a visually pleasing environment to learn in. They feel IT students should have to suffer and see what it feels like to learn in a double wide. They will also be forced to use the tiny computer lab there that boasts about 12 computers.

University official Mike Ballbuster said they were tired of Comm. Arts ranting and raving about the trailer. "We guess, Comm. Arts will be satisfied with this facility. I mean, look what they are moving from."

Comm. Arts will begin the move into the building as soon as IT vacates the building. This may be the biggest obstacle, considering IT is against the move.

"We've been denied a facility for so long, I can't wait to be in a classroom with technology, a dry erase board even. Having a computer lab steps away from my classroom is a luxury I've never had. I just can't imagine having a place to sit and study that isn't the wooden plank porch at the Comm. Arts building," said Valoria Pettiford, Journalism major.

Natasha Hartry, also a Journalism major, said she can't believe this is happening. "The trailer is so depressing. The roof leaks when it rains. It's just not conducive to learning. There is no inspiration for writing there. At the IT

building, I just know stories and ideas will flow from within me."

Comm. Arts professor Dr. Justhere Togetacheck said she's elated this is finally happening. "The years I've been here, I wouldn't have thought this would be the way we received new facilities. Teaching in the environment of a decaying building severely depresses me, so much that I am late, cancel classes, or meet less than I should with my classes. Sometimes during my office hours I lock the door and just cry."

Teresa Southern, journalism major, said, "I don't know why Comm. Arts wasn't on the priority list for a new building. I feel I have been deprived. Having to hike across campus, just to print out one my journalistic masterpieces, is just too much to handle. For four years I've been deprived of having a computer aided reporting class or an internet research class due to the fact the computer lab holds 10 students."

The projected building switch should be completed by Fall Semester 2004.

Howard Dean wins SGA Election

One of the biggest surprises and upsets in SGA and Georgia Southern history happened Wednesday night as Howard Dean was elected SGA President.

In an strange computer malfunction, Dean's name was placed on the ballot. And oddly enough, students chose him.

"It must have been his name recognition," said Charisse Perkins, one of the other candidates for SGA President. She was shocked to hear the news, as Dean never seemed to be a threat. "I just never expected to lose to Dean," she said.

Chris Haseltine, another candidate for SGA President, said that he too was surprised by the weird turn of events. "I was looking forward to an exciting race, but I'll be darned. I didn't expect this," he said while taking down his "Who is Chris Haseltine?" campaign posters.

"There must have been some glitch, sending the deleted information to GSU's voting system." Although he admits that Dean's addition to the ballot is strange, he said that he won and will be taking on the position.

"He received over half of the votes cast, and since that is what the SGA constitution specifies for one to win the office, we had to go with it."

Dean was ecstatic when he heard the news. "I thought my political career was over" he said. "But now, I'm back in business."

Although Dean isn't a student at GSU, a loophole in the election rules says that he can serve as

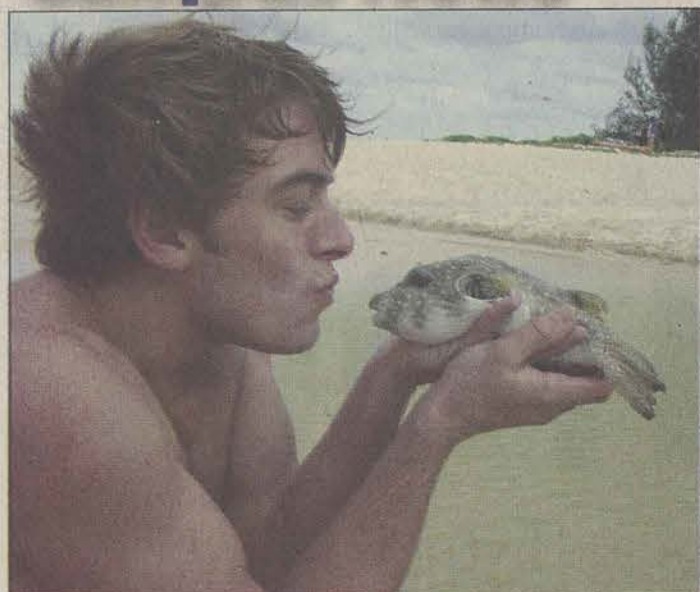

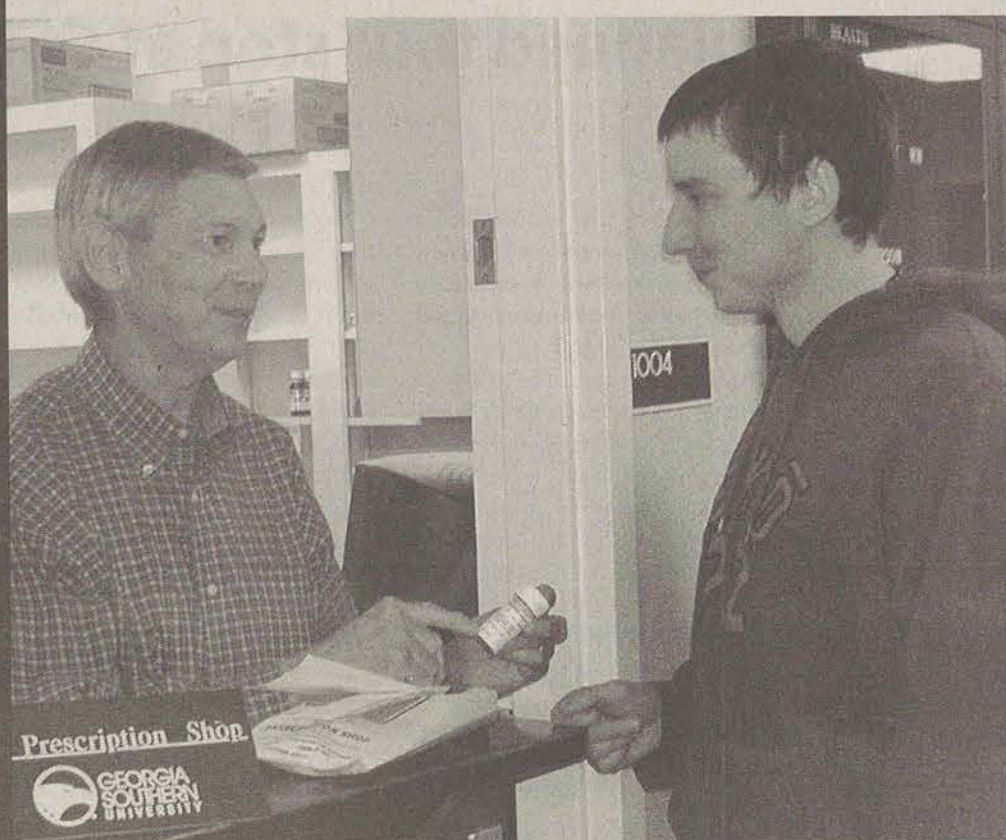

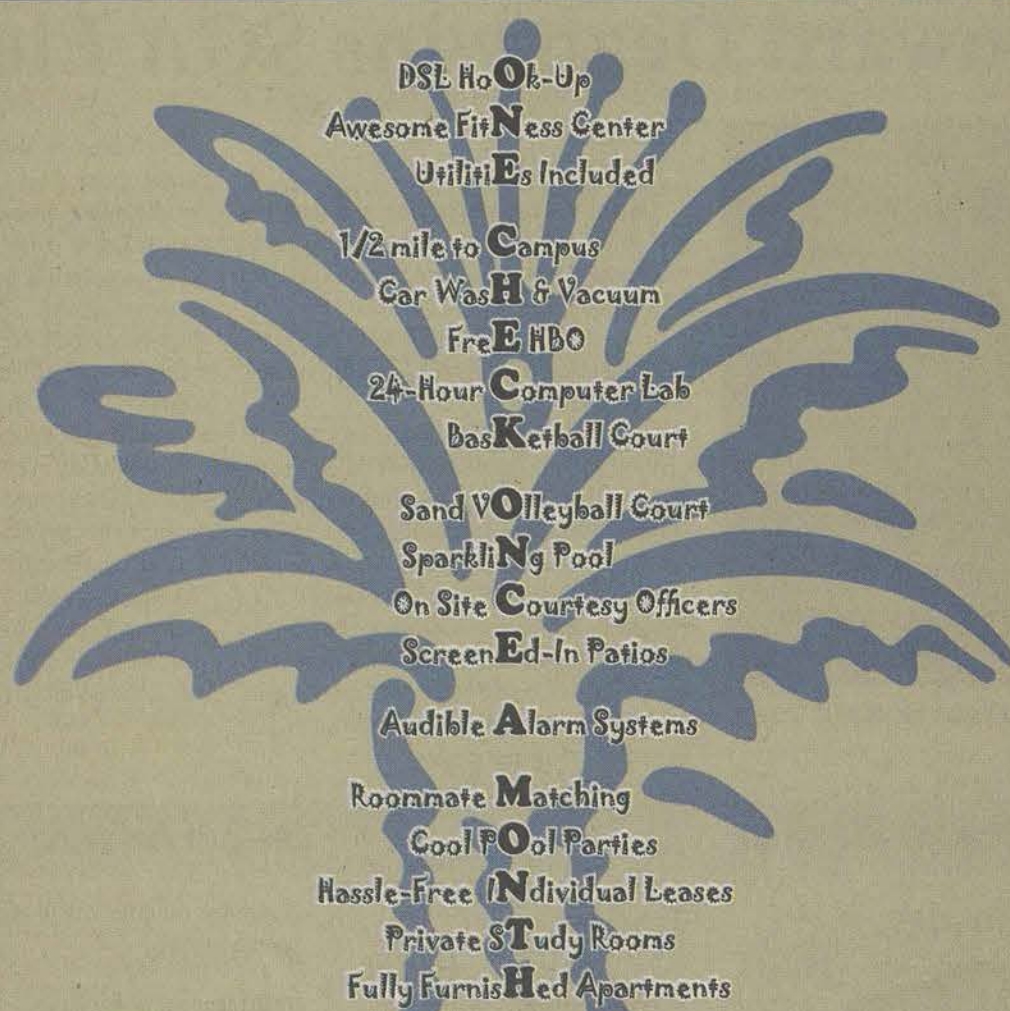

Rice will testify publicly, under oath before 9/11 commission

WASHINGTON – President Bush succumbed to political pressure Tuesday and agreed to let National Security Adviser Condoleezza Rice respond in public and under oath to allegations that he failed to confront the threat of terrorism before the Sept. 11 attacks.

In an abrupt reversal, Bush dropped his insistence that Rice meet behind closed doors with the commission that's investigating the attacks. In another turnabout, he agreed that he and Vice President Dick Cheney would meet privately with all 10 panel members, not just the commission's chairman and vice chairman.

The White House retreat reflected concern among Bush's advisers about the political impact of criticism leveled against the president by former counterterrorism adviser Richard Clarke. Clarke, who served as Bush's top adviser on terrorism, told the commission last week that the president failed to heed his warnings about the possibility of a catastrophic terrorist attack.

Clarke's allegations, aired in an interview March 21 on CBS's "60 Minutes," called into question Bush's performance in the war on terrorism and attacked the central theme of the president's re-election campaign. Aides said Bush decided over the weekend that he had no choice but to let Rice respond in public.

"The circumstances of this case are unique because the circumstances of Sept. 11, 2001, were unique," the president said in a hastily arranged visit to the White House briefing room

Tuesday afternoon.

Commission members declined to predict when Bush, Cheney and Rice would appear before the panel.

In a chain of events that underscored how badly Clarke has rattled the tightly knit Bush team, Rice reiterated her refusal to testify in an interview with "60 Minutes" that aired the night before White House counsel Alberto Gonzales jettisoned that policy. Rice had taped the interview earlier in the day.

While she was on national television repeating the official White House view that public testimony would undermine the president's ability to get confidential advice, Bush was working on other options from the seclusion of his Texas ranch.

In the end, political imperatives trumped concerns about confidentiality. A host of top Republicans, including veterans from the first Bush administration, urged the president to reconsider his opposition to public testimony. Karen Hughes, one of Bush's closest confidantes, was among those who felt that the president should change course.

One senior administration official, who insisted on anonymity, said the strongest opposition to letting Rice testify publicly came from Cheney's office.

After negotiating the outlines of a deal for Rice's public testimony Monday night, Gonzales solidified the arrangement in a follow-up letter to the Sept. 11 commission Tuesday morning.

In another concession, the White House lawyer declared Bush's willing-

ness to meet privately, together with Cheney, before the entire panel.

As part of the deal, the commission agreed in writing that Rice's testimony wouldn't set a precedent for further testimony from her or any other White House adviser. House Speaker Dennis Hastert, R-Ill., and Senate Majority Leader Bill Frist, R-Tenn., offered similar assurances.

Gonzales said Bush relented because of the "extraordinary and unique circumstances" of the Sept. 11 attacks and because the commission's assurances "limit harm to the ability of future presidents to receive candid advice."

Bush, who initially had said he would meet only with former Gov. Tom Kean, a Republican and the commission's chairman, and former Rep. Lee Hamilton, a Democrat and the vice chairman, for about an hour, didn't suggest any time limit for his joint appearance with Cheney.

Kean praised the president's decision to meet with the entire panel and said he wouldn't pressure Bush to testify in public or under oath.

"It's very unusual for presidents to appear before a commission," he said, noting that President Lyndon Johnson refused to appear before the Warren Commission, which was investigating the assassination of President Kennedy. "We'll be able to ask him some questions," Kean said of Bush. "Without the answers, we wouldn't be able to do the job and the report we want to do."

Although Rice's public testimony is sure to be a moment of high drama in Washington, it isn't likely to resolve

the fierce debate over Bush's efforts to protect Americans from terrorist attacks. She's already answered questions from the panel in a closed session Feb. 7 that lasted four hours.

In a series of recent interviews, Rice has said Bush was well aware of the threat from al-Qaida and took steps to deal with it before Sept. 11.

Whether he took it seriously enough is largely a matter of interpretation.

Panel members said they would press Rice to explain discrepancies between her recollections and Clarke's account of the White House's response to terrorism.

She also will get a chance to defend her performance as Bush's closest foreign policy adviser.

"We want to understand the nature of the decision-making at the highest levels of government," Kean said. "We've got to try to clear up those discrepancies as best we can."

Clarke's defenders may use Rice's appearance to settle scores for some of the attacks on his credibility that have turned out to be off the mark.

For example, administration officials initially suggested that a conversation that Clarke recalled having with Bush never occurred. The former National Security Council staff member said the president, in a testy encounter the day after the Sept. 11 attacks, demanded more effort from aides to determine whether Iraq was involved.

Administration officials later acknowledged that the conversation took place, but said Bush's probing on Iraq wasn't unusual.

Fulbright Scholar spends semester at GSU

Georgia Southern is one of the lucky universities to host Belen Calingacion, a Fulbright Scholar from the Philippines.

Calingacion was chosen as one of approximately 800 exceptional foreign faculty and professionals in the Fulbright Scholar Program to come to the United States to teach.

The U.S. Department of States Bureau of Educational and Cultural Affairs sponsor the program. Calingacion is the first Fulbright Scholar to come to Georgia Southern's Communication Arts Department.

Calingacion is a Scholar-in-Residence, which, as stated on the Fulbright Scholar website, brings visiting scholars and professionals from abroad to lecture at U.S. colleges and universities for one semester or one academic year. Under the Scholar-in-Residence (SIR) Program, interested institutions submit proposals to invite scholars to teach one or more courses and to be in residence for

a semester or an academic year

"I think that [the Scholar-in-Residence Program] is a very unique scholarship because it brings scholars to universities," Calingacion said.

Calingacion came from the University of the Philippines to teach at Kennesaw State University for the fall semester and here at GSU for the spring semester.

"I'm doing a team teaching on street theater, it's new and is a testing ground. I am also doing advanced performance studies," said Calingacion. "I am also going to lecture in a gender class and an international studies class next week," she said.

Calingacion is also involved in two productions that will be held on campus.

There will be a performance April 21-24 at 8 p.m. in the Black Box Theater that she directing. The work came out of the advanced studies class. "We are putting together a script and it's all about shoes! It's called Soled Out," Calingacion proudly explained.

There is also another performance that she is coordinating

GSU organizes volunteer project

Many majors at GSU require that students complete volunteer hours in order to graduate.

For most students, this is the only time they choose to volunteer in the community.

The Project for Civic Engagement and Social Transformation (PCEST), a new project on campus, would like for students to volunteer more, just to help improve the community and help those in need.

The founders of the project saw a need in the community and wanted to motivate GSU students to help fill this need. The mission of the project is to bring GSU students, faculty, staff and community members together to work towards building long-term relationships and projects.

One of the first programs in the project is a special needs workshop for local K-12 students with special needs. The project would place these students with Georgia Southern Psychology and Education majors. GSU students would serve as men-

tors for these children. The children would get a chance to follow GSU students and see what college life is like. This program would give GSU students majoring in Psychology and Education a chance for hands-on experience for course credit and also expose children to college at a young age and hopefully motivate these children to want to attend college.

Other programs that have been discussed are a mobile health unit operated by nursing majors that would go out in the community and provide medical services to those in need, and a Spanish program run by Spanish majors that would help teach immigrants how to speak English.

Georgia Southern already has several volunteer organizations and a countless number of students who volunteer but there was no program to link all of them together.

"We have so many good things in place, with so much talent, energy, and drive, but we did not have a coherent, unified way to integrate students' academic and community work. The Project for Civic Engage-

ment and Social Transformation fills this gap," said Lori Amy, one of the founders of the PCEST.

The project was developed last fall and is making tremendous progress. The project's web site has been created, both faculty and student forums have been held, an advisory board has been formed, and a fall symposium is already in the works. They are also in the process of applying for grants for financial support. Students and faculty have given a positive response to the project and it is coming along well.

"So many [students] out there only volunteer for service hours for course, and we want to make people more civic minded. The students would be not only be bettering themselves but helping people who would not help themselves," said Sarah Taylor, one of the students on the PCEST advisory board.

New traffic lights to be installed

Traffic congestion and road rage on Lanier Drive will soon be a thing of the past as the traffic light installation at Lanier and Georgia Avenue and at Lanier and Chandler Road will soon be completed.

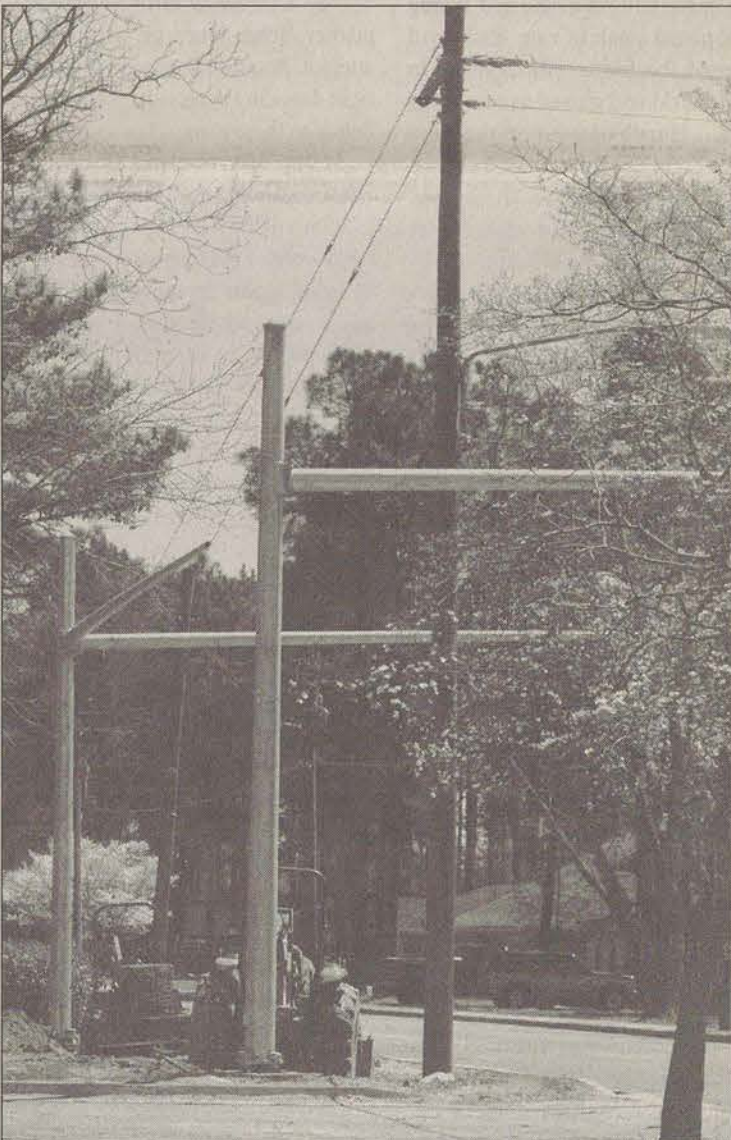
According to Mazhar Elhaj, assistant engineer for the City of Statesboro, the lights will be up and running within three to four weeks. "We hope to have the project completed by the end of April," he said.

Elhaj said that once the construction is completed, both lights will be turned on at the same time. He also explained that for the first two days that the lights are turned on they will only flash caution lights to make drivers aware of their presence, but that after the two days, the signals will begin full function.

While the final stages of construction are underway, both intersections will remain open. "We will not close the intersections [during the construction]," Elhaj said, "and while we may have to close a lane temporarily, the whole road will not be closed."

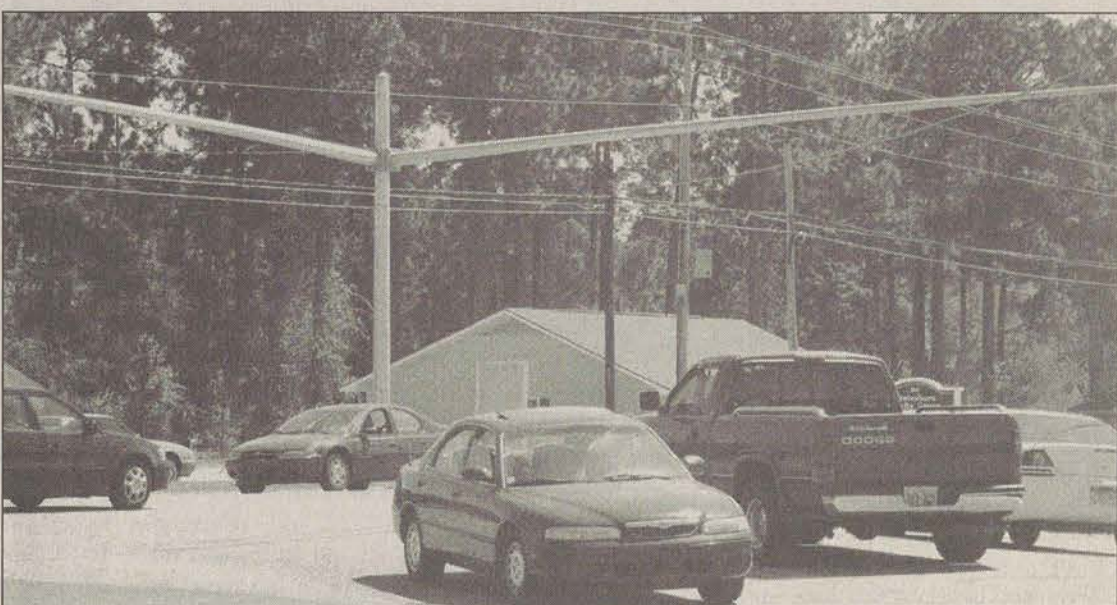
According to Elhaj, much of the construction will take place on the weekends and during later afternoon hours as not to interfere with the peak travel times of GSU students.

Although Lanier Drive was closed temporarily yesterday, according to City Hall it was due to work by the water department, and not due to any construction affiliated with the installation of the traffic lights.

Defense brings back familiar faces for spring

Georgia Southern started spring practice after spring break with a hope of rejuvenating a porous defense that allowed 350 yards per game last season.

The tall task of restructuring the defense will fall on new defensive coordinator, Joe Tresey. Tresey comes to the Eagles from the University of Akron. Last season as the defensive coordinator for Akron, Tresey's defense was ranked in the top 20 of Division I-A colleges in turnover margin at 0.58 turnovers per game.

Joining Tresey is another newcomer, Andre Curtis, who joined the Eagle coaching staff in February. Curtis comes to Georgia Southern from the Virginia Military Institute, where he served as the linebackers coach. His duty this season will be coaching the defensive ends.

The two new coaches will welcome a very experienced Eagle defense. Nine of the 11 starters from last year's defense are returning this season. Leading the way upfront will be the usual four of Eric McIntire, Victor Cabral, Eric Hadley and Shaheen Solomon.

Hadley led the defensive line

last season with 66 total tackles and looks to improve on that total this season.

The secondary will welcome a familiar site in senior safety James Young. Young ranked fourth on the team in tackles last season with 49.

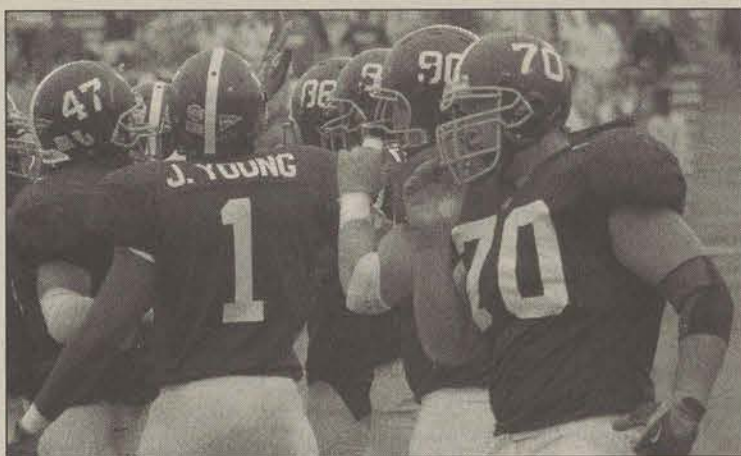
One Eagle that won't be returning next season is Aaron Whitaker. Whitaker totaled 43 tackles and one interception a year ago. He had to leave the team for personal reasons.

Linebackers will still be strong point for Georgia Southern again this season. Derrick Butler will be the leader on the linebacker corps. Butler led the team last season with 77 total tackles.

There will be one familiar face gone from last year's linebackers, James Burchette. Filling in for Burchette will be Jason Earwood.

With a familiar cast of stars, Coach Tresey will have to work hard to teach his new system to the

Freshman Aurora Johnson hit a bomb over the scoreboard in the third to cut the Panthers lead to one.

In the fifth, Courtney Jones slid into home off a passed ball to tie the game at 2-2.

State put two on quickly in the seventh with only an out. A base hit to left brought a play at the plate but the tag stuck and out two was made. Candace Jones broke the tie with two outs sneaking a two-run single up the middle.

The Eagles last chance came in the bottom of the seventh. With one out, Kim Griffin hit a one-run double to cut the lead to one. Maria Laurato got beamed and walked to first before base hit by Sam Steiner loaded the bases with still only one out.

Mercer gets revenge win over Eagle baseball

MACON - Mercer used a two-run first inning and a three-run fifth to claim a 5-2 win over Georgia Southern in non-conference baseball action at Claude Smith Field Tuesday evening.

Mercer (13-21) opened the scoring in the bottom of the first inning as it plated a pair of runs. Rick Byrd opened the frame with a single to center field and moved to second on Daniel Hurst's base hit off the glove of Georgia Southern third baseman Travis Adkinson. Josh Thompson's double to center field scored both base runners for a 2-0 Bear lead.

Georgia Southern (14-16) struck back for a run in the top of the third as Jason Hurst homered just inside the foul pole down the left field line, his fourth round-tripper of the season, cutting the Eagle deficit to 2-1.

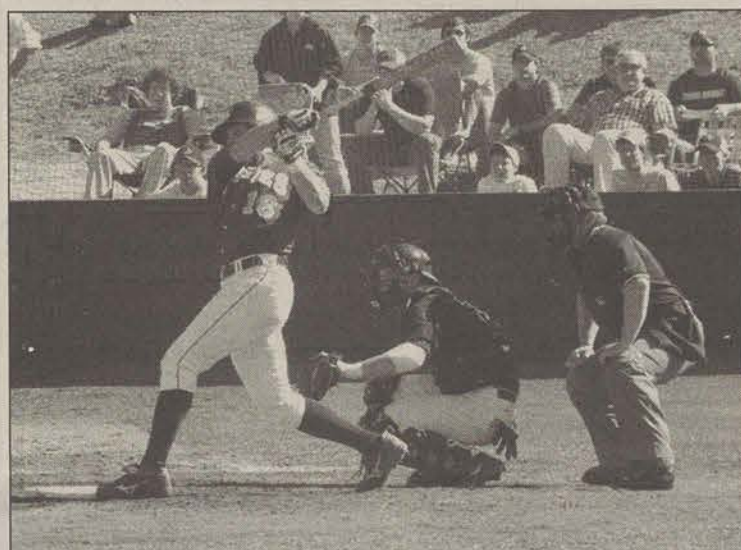
The Bears scored three more runs in the bottom of the fifth to increase their lead to 5-1. With one out, Ty Megahee was hit by a pitch and moved to second on Chase Swanson's base

hit to right. Byrd followed with a double to right-center, scoring both base runners, and then scored on a Hurst single to left to give Mercer a four-run cushion.

The Eagles took advantage of a hit batter in the sixth to cut their deficit to 5-2. James Payne was hit by a pitch to open the inning and moved to second on a throwing error by Mercer pitcher Brian Jones on a pick off attempt. Brandon Burned's single to right drove in Payne, cutting the GSU deficit to three runs.

Phillip Morrison picked up the win for Mercer, improving to 3-7, as he allowed just two hits and one run while striking out four in four innings of work. Jones surrendered two hits and a run in four innings while Paul Harp picked up his second save of the season by not allowing a hit in the ninth. Thompson led the Bears at the plate, collecting three hits in four plate appearances while Byrd was 2-of-4 and Hurst 2-of-3.

Jared Comstock took the loss for Georgia Southern, falling to 1-1, as he allowed five runs on seven hits in five

Deng comes from war-torn homeland to guide Duke

ATLANTA - Duke freshman Luol Deng will soon have all the luxuries in life. As the second-most celebrated high school senior last year behind LeBron James, it's just a matter of time before Deng takes his freaky athletic ability - at 6-8, he can play point guard or center - to the NBA.

And he figures he will always be uncomfortable with success. Working harder than anyone else is all Deng knows because he's from a country - Sudan - mired in civil war. Success in his family has never been measured in dollars. It's been measured in survival and appreciation for each day.

"Here I am being interviewed for having a good season," said Deng, who will lead his team against Connecticut in the Final Four on Saturday in San Antonio. "I could have been in a situation where I would have to fight a war. I know how fortunate I am to be here."

Deng is a member of the Dinka tribe in Sudan, the same tribe that produced 7-foot-7 NBA player Manute Bol. Deng left Sudan with his family when he was five to avoid being exiled. As the prime minister of transportation for a government no longer in power, Deng's father, Aldo, was on the run.

Deng, his three brothers and five sisters lived in Alexandria, Egypt, in near poverty for three years before moving to London in 1993.

"Lou's a warrior," Duke teammate J.J. Redick said. "A lot of that comes from his background, how he grew up. He's seen a lot for a freshman in college. Relatives dead from genocide in civil war. You can see it's all affected him because he's got such a big heart and cares about people."

Teammates have forgotten that Deng is a freshman because he's so mature on and off the court. So when senior Chris Duhon openly criticized Deng in the locker room at halftime Sunday - with Duke trailing Xavier, 30-28 - for playing poorly in the first half, Deng began to cry. Then his pride took over, and he stood up and passionately addressed his teammates, saying everyone "needed to play

outside ourselves."

"Luol got very emotional," Duke coach Mike Krzyzewski said. "For a freshman to do that, I think had a tremendous impact on our team. We needed something extraordinary from our guys, and Luol gave us that."

Deng was phenomenal against Xavier in the second half, hitting 6-of-7 shots after making only 1-of-6 in the first half. He hit a key 3-pointer to tie the score with 5:11 to play. He desperately tracked down an offensive rebound and found Redick for a 3-pointer that gave Duke the lead, and then, with four fouls, somehow got positioning among three Xavier players for what Krzyzewski called a "Shane Battier-like tip-in" that gave Duke a five-point lead. The three plays happened in a span of three-plus minutes and were the keys to victory.

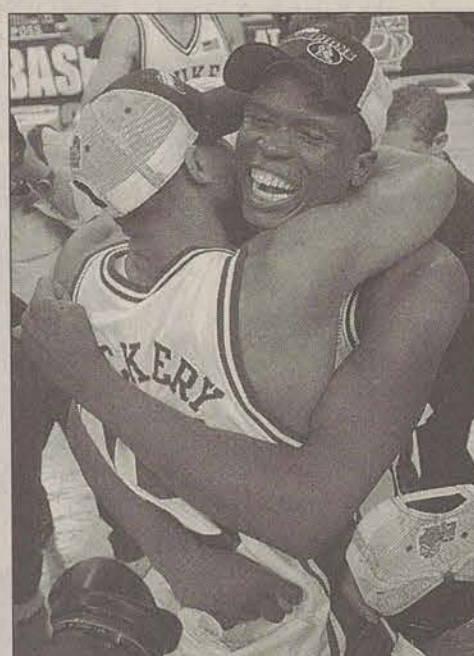
"The tip-in basket was one of the greatest plays we've had all year," said Duhon, adding that he knew Deng would respond to his words because Deng is so strong mentally.

Deng learned basketball from his older brothers, who were taught the game by Bol when the Deng family was living in Egypt. Deng's older brother, Ajou, played at Connecticut and Fairfield. At age 14, Deng and his sister, Arek, left the family in London to attend Blair Academy in New Jersey.

There, Deng was assigned a mentor on the basketball team named Royal Ivey, who was attending one year of prep school before going to the University of Texas.

"Royal and his family were my family away from home," Deng said. "Royal was great to me, and we still talk all the time."

Deng became a Parade and McDonald's All-American at Blair and took visits to Missouri, Indiana, Virginia and Duke before deciding to become a Blue Devil, in part, because education is so important to his family. His father is currently in law school as the Dengs continue to rebuild their lives in England. Also because Luol, who speaks Dinka, Arabic and English, loved watching Grant Hill growing up and tried to pattern his game after Hill's.

Statesboro gets the smackdown laid down on them as WrestleMania hits Hanner

STAMFORD, Conn. — Are you ready to rumble Statesboro?

In a surprise announcement, Linda McMahon, chief executive operator of World Wrestling Entertainment, announced that WrestleMania XXI will be held at Georgia Southern's Hanner Fieldhouse on Sunday, March 20 of next year.

WrestleMania, the marquee event of WWE, is generally held in large arenas and stadiums — WrestleMania XX was recently held at Madison Square Garden in New York. However, with profits diminishing in today's lagging economy, McMahon decided on a change of philosophy for next year's event.

"Wrestling's heyday came in the small arenas and venues of America," said McMahon in an announcement from the WWE offices in Stamford, Conn. "With the popularity our industry enjoys in the south, we felt it was only natural to reach back to our roots in a fine location such as Statesboro."

With the success of a recent taping of "SmackDown!" at the Savannah Civic Center, officials from WWE, Georgia Southern University, the city of Statesboro and Bulloch County, were quick to capitalize on the potential of holding the next WrestleMania on campus.

"Having the chance to host such an extraordinary event at Georgia Southern will only help to continue the growth in exposure that the university has received among young adults," said Georgia Southern president Bruce Grube.

Due to the smaller size of Hanner Fieldhouse, some changes will be made to the set-up around the wrestling ring to adapt to the surroundings. Due to regulations set by the Bulloch County fire marshal, fireworks and pyrotechnics cannot be set off inside the facility, so the WWE will instead concentrate on using lights and lasers suspended from the building's rafters.



Some Old Stuff We Just Dug Up

Hanner Fieldhouse, normally saved for the Georgia Southern volleyball and basketball teams, will play host to a much larger event next March when WrestleMania XXI is held in Statesboro.

The wrestlers will dress in the existing locker rooms used by the Georgia Southern basketball teams, as well as in various other rooms throughout the lower level of the Hanner complex. The wrestlers will enter the arena from the west side of the arena.

In addition to the 4,378 seats scattered through the arena, approximately 500 to 600 seats will be placed on the floor surrounding the ring. According to Roger Inman, facilities manager for the GSU department of athletics, if there is a large enough overflow crowd, a closed-circuit feed of the event will be shown on the Paulson Stadium video board.

Though the pay-per-view spectacular will be the highlight of the festivities, the WWE will be holding related events around the campus and town in the days leading to WrestleMania. Events tentatively scheduled include: the annual WWE Hall of Fame inductions at the Performing Arts Center; a wrestler call-in show hosted by WVGS radio show "Tranquil Aggression," and a wrestlers' exercise session open to the public at the RAC.

Ticket prices have yet to be announced for the preceding events, but are set for WrestleMania itself. Prices will stagger from \$125 for ringside seats, \$80 for floor level seats, \$50 for

the lower bowl and \$25 for seats in the upper bowl as well as the end zones. Tickets, which will be made available in early May, may be purchased by cash, credit card or by EAGLEXPRESS.

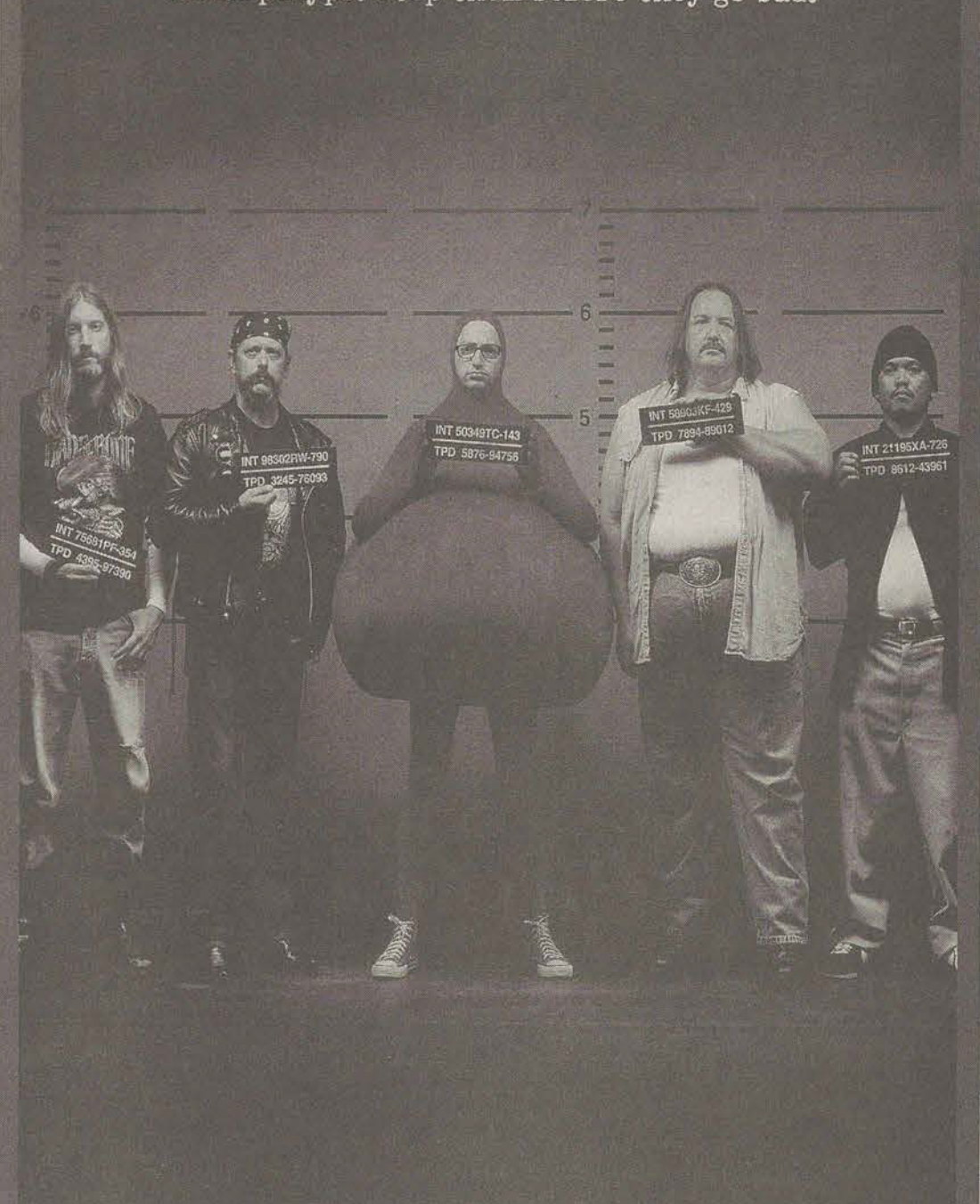

Same-sex marriage allowed in Statesboro

Early Wednesday Morning Judge Hugh Jazz of Statesboro Municipal Court signed an order allowing same-sex marriage in Statesboro.

Georgia Southern students have an entirely different view of Judge Hugh Jazz's ruling.

Shaqinika Perkins, a third year freshman, feels same-sex marriage should be allowed. "If dey wanna be gay and be together that's dey business, if I was gay I wouldn't waste no time getting downtown to the courthouse."

Jack Con Servitive, a senior business major said, "Gays should be banned from the earth. What kind of city allows this to be allowed? Marriage is beautiful thing only to be enjoyed by a man and woman. I plan to picket the courthouse, directly after my Young Republicans meeting."

When asked why he allowed gay marriage to be performed in Statesboro, Judge Hugh Jazz replied, "Why the heck not? We could use the money in the budget; we need more than the funds we get from fleeing Georgia Southern students. Statesboro needs a stir. What's a little gay marriage in the mix to get the old geysers in this community riled up?"

In a turn of events that rivals Bush stealing the elections at the last minute in 2000, CBS and MTV have joined forces to apologize to Janet Jackson for her "wardrobe malfunction," which they intensely scrutinized her for earlier this year.

Ms. Jackson was under an intense investigation from the FCC for what is being hailed as "boob-gate," that allegedly happened February 1, 2004 at this year's Super Bowl.

The singer came under harsh criticism for allegedly exposing her right breast on national television during prime time.

Once billed as the beginning of FCC harsher regulations, and what prompted Howard Stern to get dropped by many of his affiliates, Janet's "wardrobe malfunction," was discovered to be nothing more than a ruse by the state of Texas.

There are happy endings after all. Jackson is without the stain of an FCC investigation, and Timberlake is now watching over his shoulder constantly for his newly appointed stalker Texas Secretary of State Eugenia Robinson.

SANTA BARBARA, California—At a press conference outside of the Santa Barbara County sheriff's office, District Attorney Tom Sneddon released a statement saying, "This is the break we've been waiting for in the case against Mr. Jackson."

An undisclosed source has revealed to Santa Barbara's police department undeniable proof of Jackson's guilt of child molestation.

Sneddon reportedly stated at the press conference, "At this time, the name, as well as the information will not be revealed either to the media or the public. We are, however, extremely confident that this information will be admissible as evidence during the course of the trial against Mr. Jackson."

This new evidence coincides with the grand jury, who recently began hearing evidence against the accused King of Pop.

If the grand jury decides to indict Jackson on the charges, he could face a minimum of three years and a maximum of eight years in prison

"I never believed the old saying," he said, excitedly, "but now I believe that when one door closes, another opens."

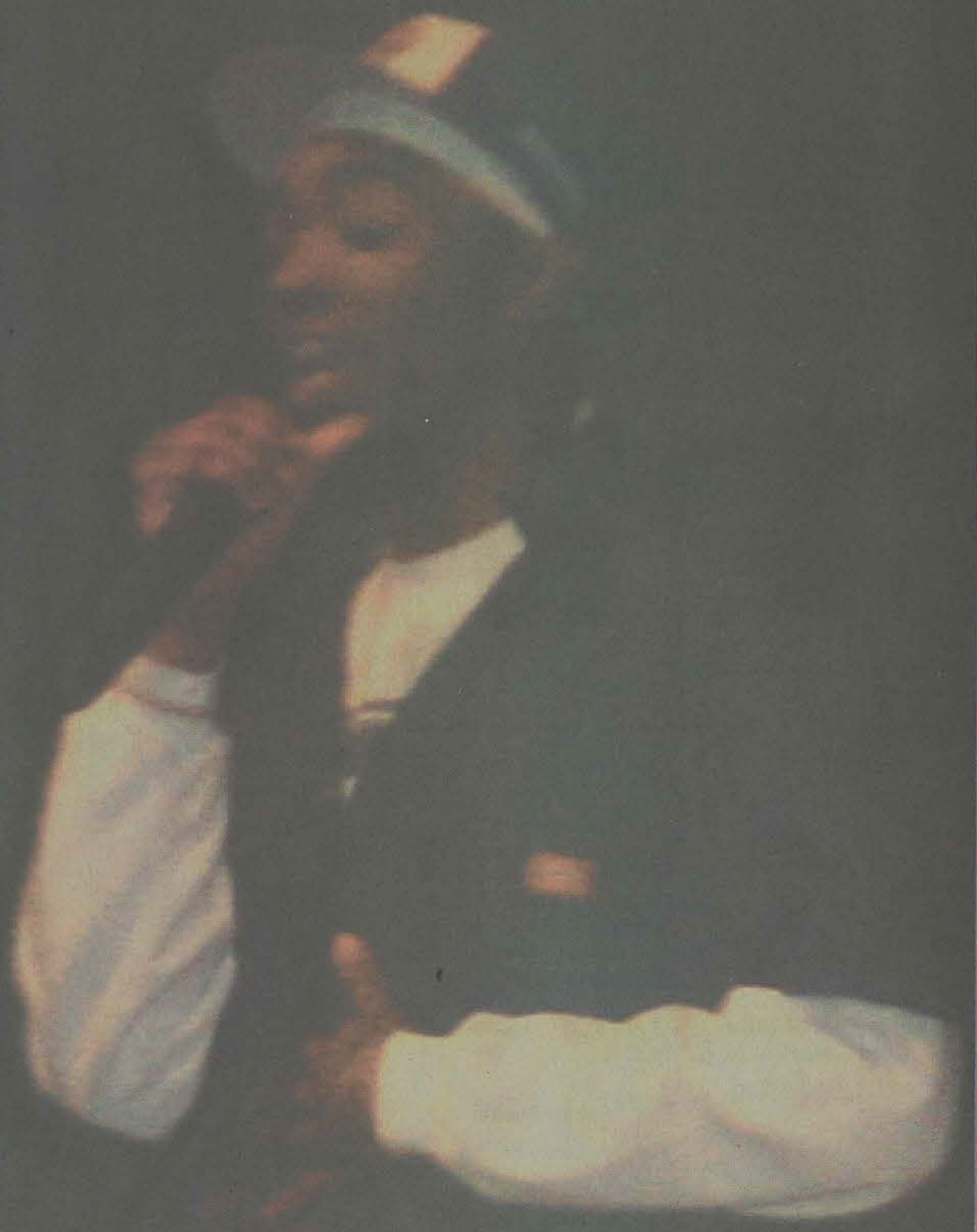

Literary Locus: Michael Crichton's *Prey*

Have you ever been too near a beehive, and been attacked as a result? It is not a pleasant experience, as I can attest to; you step warily around the beehive's location, and when you see a bee hovering just a bit too near you, you step even more warily... but if you see more bees coming near, you *run*.

Similar experiences are the order of the day in Michael Crichton's *Prey*. This, his latest book, is not one of his best; but it is an excellent book nonetheless, written with his typical attention to detail. It is also one of his most unnerving books, written with an atypical pessimistic tone.

The story opens simply enough; an innovative programmer who has been laid off for offending the wrong people at his job begins to suspect his wife of infidelity. When she is in a bad car accident, she asks him to look after her job; and when he does so, he is taken by helicopter out to the Nevada desert, where they discover a production facility for... nanites.

These nanites are extremely small robots, as reflected by another name, "nanobot". If created, they would have

much potential in the medical industry and the military; imagine being able to inject a stroke victim with nanites, who then would proceed to the damaged area of the brain and repair it. Theoretically, nanites are possible, but the extremely small size required (a few MOLECULES in size!) has made them almost impossible to manufacture thus far. The conventional method of manufacturing nanites is with lasers and a high-powered electron microscope; but this plant gets around the problem with the use of microbes. Yes, bacteria; the nanites are formed in a very unusual but innovative system, which would take too long to describe here but nonetheless is very unique in science fiction, as far as I know.

Crichton's protagonist proceeds to discover that his wife's coworkers were old colleagues of his, all of whom had worked with him at some point; and that the nanites had been programmed with a program he himself wrote, based upon insect activity, notably bees. And that a batch of nanites has gotten free, and has been literally attacking animals outside the factory...



It is a very unique story as far as I know; the storyline is also easily one of Crichton's best, even though it does not necessarily rank up there with books like *Jurassic Park* and *The Andromeda Strain*. No other story has used nanites as the opponents, as far as I know; generally nanites are the *deus ex machina*, used to save the day. Crichton's approach makes for a very interesting story, one that will keep you spellbound till the book is finished.

'Explorations in Color' opens in Gallery 303

The artwork speaks for itself, literally, and anyone who visits the exhibit will also recognize the relationship between colors and emotions. Schunemann's artwork will grab you because they are loud without making a sound.

Marianne Schunemann will be exhibiting her artwork at GSU's Gallery 303 in the Foy Fine Arts Building, Today through March 26. A closing reception will be held on March 26 from 7-9 p.m. The exhibition hours are Tuesday and Thursday 9 a.m.-3 p.m., and Friday 9 a.m.-2 p.m.

Depp's Secret is out: weak plot device

Up front, I don't typically like thrillers. And despite other good (and a couple of bad) elements, "Secret Window" is ultimately a thriller.

Really, I'd rather watch sitcoms. That's right, I'd rather sit through "Frasier" or reruns of "Seinfeld," or hell, even "Sanford and Son" or "The Mary Tyler Moore Show" than watch yet another thriller flick with music wrung with tension, and characters jumping back when, oh my God, they suddenly see a dead body. What the hell, camera zoom in, music sting, vomiting, discordant violin scraping and repetitive piano pounding, then some blunt killer-penned note to make the protagonist, and presumably the audience, stew in juice until the next shock, roughly five script pages later.

There are not a whole lot of ways to put that on the screen. Maybe there would be if people invested more time in cooking them up. "Secret Window" is better than most. It goes without saying that there's a point about two-thirds through the film where we learn something, something that realigns our view of the film's violence. Yes, "Secret Window" has one of those moments. It's not even a new moment. Most people will recognize the shock, the "something" of this film, when it happens. We've seen it before, and recently, too.

Me, I'm kind of proud that I figured it out ahead of time. Yes, dear reader, I called this one. About one-third through I put two and two, or more accurately twelve one-thirds, together and came up with four, and as the movie continued it became more and more obvious what was going to happen.

It was so obvious, to me at least, that I started to wonder if I was being purposely led around, if all the clues were false, but it never happened. That's right, I, who am occasionally left puzzling through elementary Scooby-Doo episodes, who has been thwarted, once anyway, by "Blue's Clues," successfully called the ending to "Secret Window." You, my friend, owe me a drink.

Freed from the rigors of being filled with tension about the outcome, I was left to admire the skill with which the

film was put together. There are really some nice bits in there. I mean, when the camera isn't spinning and zooming in on screwdrivers lodged in heads, I did catch pieces of artistry.

Near the end, in what I'm going to call the "Redrum Scene," the spooky word scrawled everywhere is hinted at and shown in fragments, in the corners of the screen, so you can't read it but know it's there, just before the big, camera-spinning, orchestra-renting reveal.

Despite my early guessing of the secret of "Secret Window," or perhaps because of it, I actually liked the movie. It's one of those films that works on a different level once you know the secret, a better level, and probably stands up to repeated viewings. But damn it, the ending is one we've all seen before, in a different context. I think that it's still a good ending, or can be, but I don't like to think that more films might use it. When film makers get a slick new toy, you have to set strict limits or they play with it everywhere, like a two-year-old with a new rattle.

Twice is enough, you hear me Hollywood? I don't want to walk into the film version of the "Mary Tyler Moore Show" and end up watching this ending for the hundredth time. I'm afraid that would be a terrible "Durden" to bear.

Jolie and Hawke's thrills in 'Lives'

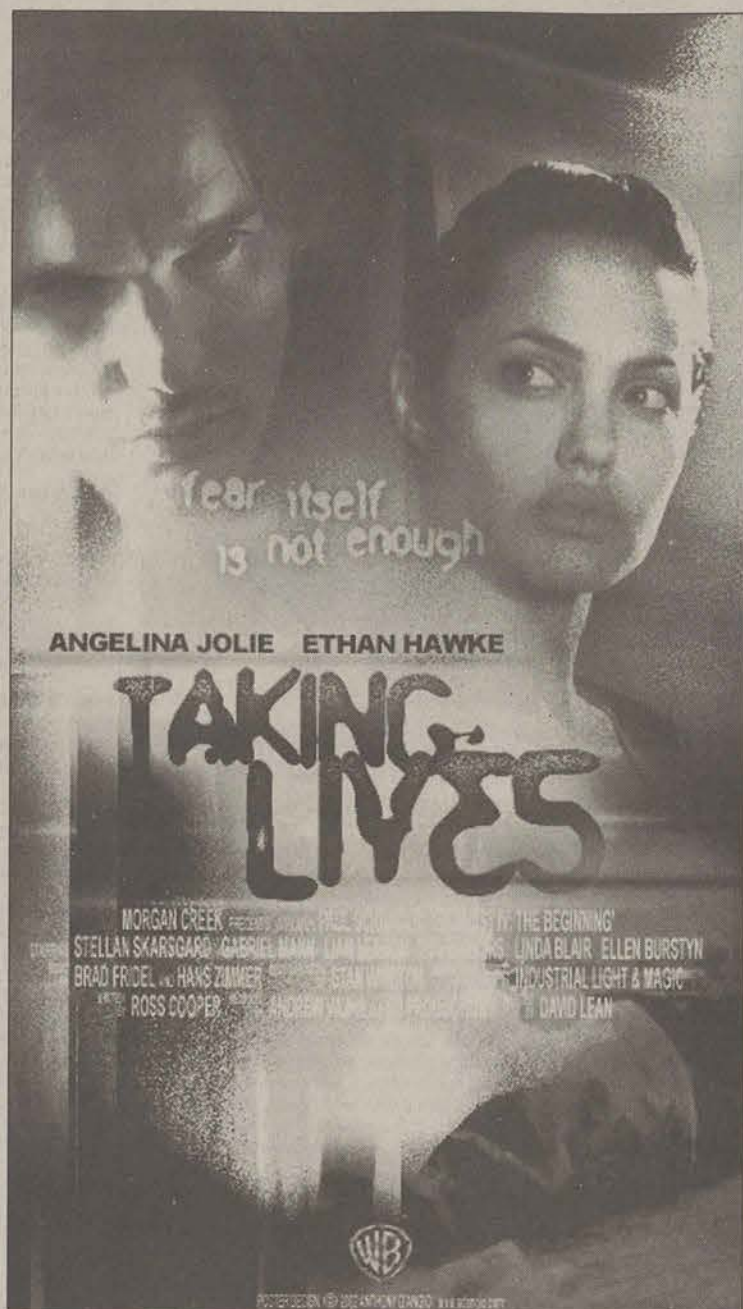
In this tale FBI agent Illeana Scott (Jolie) is a profiler looking for a killer who murders and then takes over his victim's identities, hence the title of the film.

What she doesn't count on is falling for the person she must protect and use as bait to catch the killer (Hawke) that is stalking the city.

The film was a welcome change in pace from the norm that is being put forth in this year's box office. Where as many films this year have been mundane, overly hype, and quite trite, this film began on a strong footing and ended equally strong. Its story is clear, concrete, and interesting. The acting is amazing. The cinematography and direction is easily the year's best thus far. What "Taking Lives" does to the audience is reminiscent of that feeling of fear and uttermost uneasiness that "Silence of the Lambs" brought to theaters.

Jolie stands out in this film. She had fallen into the normal post Oscar issue as many have. She was making one bad film after another. Each of her films was filled with promise, but each and everyone seemed to lack that something that Jolie brings to the screen. (Tomb Raider: need there be anymore said?) Finally in this film she executes a very complex character, as well a great story for the audience. She is not only beautiful, but she is a strong female character actor that makes the audience feel very safe, vulnerable and attracted to the actress all at the same time.

Hawke performance as the witness Jolie is assigned to protect is fantastic. He lives up to the hype of the trailers, and took the audience somewhere that they expected never to go. His character was simple in its construct, but it seemed as though Hawke hints at a very different character that lies beneath. Hawke, like Jolie, has had one bomb after another, but his luck might just be turning around if this film is any indication as to what can

happen with a great cast and script. He made the right choice.

"Unfaithful" star Olivier Martinez adds a French pompous attitude and sexuality to the film's cast. He plays an overly sexed and rude detective who is in constant competition with Jolie's character. He brings to his role finesse and agility that many foreign actors don't quite know how to recreate for the American cinema. He is a breathe of fresh air, his French accent and all. He delivers a powerhouse performance.

The concentration of the little things helps to make this film one of the year's best. The director has adapted the minuscule nature of an investigation and brought it to film with great precision. The director has allowed the characters to shine through the little moments in the film that many neglect when trying to piece it together. This could be a product of great editing, but the direction of the film helps breathe life into this already intense story.

Of course, with anything there is always room for improvement. This film was no different. Although the film weaved together a wonderful story of suspense and mayhem, there seem to be a scene that didn't quite go.

Granted there is a need for sex scenes when the time and the script calls for them. But those particular devices should be used sparingly. The sex scene in this film, albeit very sensual and "artistic," seemed extremely out of place and awkward. With that particular issue put to the side, this film has a lot going for it. From the opening sequence, to the last, there is one surprise after another.

Every guess as to how it's going to end would be wrong and usually is. There are so many twist and turns that by the end the audience is relieved and also extremely surprised. Hitchcock would be proud. Only he could have crated something that riveled this is great film.

City of brotherly love keeping it 'Real'

Producers for the MTV reality show and labor leaders negotiated a deal Tuesday to bring "The Real World" back to the city of Philadelphia, one week after Bunim/Murray Productions bolted amid a clash with the city's powerful unions.

The parties have been negotiating since Friday in Mayor John Street's City Hall office.

"I am pleased that season 15 of "The Real World" will be produced in Philadelphia as originally planned," Joey Carson, chief operating officer of Van Nuys, Calif.-based Bunim/

Murray Productions, said in a statement.

"The Real World" packed up March 16, three weeks after arriving, amid a dispute over its hiring of nonunion laborers to work on the building where the cast of seven strangers would be thrown together and have their lives videotaped.

Word of the pullout came less than a year after new labor rules were negotiated among the unions and city and state officials at the Pennsylvania Convention Center. The center saw repeat business drop as conventioners complained of high labor costs and cumbersome union regulations.

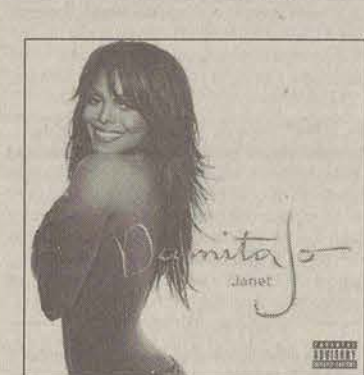

Announcement — Student Media Positions Selection 2004-2005

The Student Media Advisory Board of Georgia Southern University announces its selection process to choose student editors and managers of the 2003-2004 broadcast and editorial boards of the university's official student media (The George-Anne, Miscellany Magazine, Southern Reflector Magazine, and WVGS/FM). Students interested in applying for an elected position will be expected to present (1) a resume; (2) a letter of application explaining the candidate's qualifications and their plans or objectives for the media position sought; and (3) a signed waiver (included with this advertisement) which gives permission to the chairperson of the Student Media Advisory Board to validate the candidate's academic standing. Students may indicate the position(s) sought either in their letter of application or on the waiver form. However, a separate application packet (a resume, a letter of application and a signed waiver) should be submitted for each medium, if a student wishes to apply for more than one.

SELECTION AND TERM: The editorial and broadcast boards will be selected by members of the committee based on a majority of those voting, according to committee by-laws. The term of office for the editorial and broadcast boards shall extend through the end of the next spring semester.

QUALIFICATIONS: Specific qualifications for persons holding board positions are listed below. Prior experience may be considered in lieu of stated qualifications. The board positions for each medium are listed in ranking order.

THE GEORGE-ANNE

Editor in Chief — The editor should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. An editor should have served on the staff one year and should display capabilities required for the position. The editor is responsible for the preparation of a commentary section for each edition. The editor serves as the chief executive officer of the newspaper and is ultimately responsible for the total editorial content of each edition.

Managing Editor — The managing editor should have completed at least one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester on the staff. The managing editor should be familiar with basic journalistic practices such as layout, copy editing, and news and feature writing. The managing editor will be responsible for coordinating the editorial content in all sections of the newspaper, such as news, sports and features. The managing editor (with the assistance of the news editor) will be responsible for the preparation of the front page.

News Editor — The news editor should know basic news writing and should be familiar with news sources on campus. The news editor should demonstrate news judgment and should have served at least one semester on the staff of the paper. The news editor will be responsible for all news gathering operations of the newspaper. The news editor assists the managing editor in the preparation of the front page.

MISCELLANY

Editor — The editor should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. The editor should demonstrate both the artistic and the talent to create a quality publication which showcases the arts — literary, visual, and, to the extent practicable, performance arts — on behalf of the university's students, and to promote the arts in the university community through the staging of various arts-oriented events. The editor, in cooperation with an assistant editor, will conduct a juried selection of contributors for the magazine. The editor will be responsible for the total editorial content of the magazine.

SOUTHERN REFLECTOR

Editor — The editor should have completed two years of university work, at least one year at Georgia Southern. The editor should have served at least one year on the Reflector staff and should be familiar with magazine copy writing, magazine photojournalism, layout and design of pages, and staff management. The editor is responsible for all the editorial operations for each edition. The editor serves as the chief executive officer of the magazine and is ultimately responsible for the total content of each edition.

Art Director — The Art Director should have served at least one year on the Southern Reflector staff and should be knowledgeable in all aspects of magazine production, including but not limited to layout and design, computer graphics, and all photographic processes used by the Reflector. The Art Director will be responsible for the management of photographic assignments and photographic production work. In addition to these duties, the Art Director shall perform other duties as assigned by the current Editor.

Managing Editor — The managing editor should have completed one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester on the staff. The managing editor should be familiar with magazine production and university business procedures. The managing editor is responsible for promotional activities in support of the magazine, advertising operations, routine office management, and financial review, and distribution of the magazine. In addition to these duties, the Managing Editor shall perform other duties as assigned by the current Editor.

WVGS/FM

Station Manager — The station manager should have completed two years of college work, at least one year at Georgia Southern, and should have served at least one year on the staff of the station. The manager should display leadership qualities and should have a basic knowledge of Federal Communications Commission (FCC) rules and regulations, broadcast equipment, and budgetary matters.

Program Director — The program director should have completed at least one year of college work and should have served at least one semester on the staff of the station. The program director is responsible for reporting play-lists to trade journals, maintaining telephone and mail contacts with music companies, adding program materials to the station's computer system, and developing and implementing other programs.

Operations Manager — The operations manager should have completed at least one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester as a DJ (disc jockey) at the station. The operations manager is responsible for keeping WVGS in compliance with all Federal Commu-

nications Commission rules for noncommercial radio stations, producing PSAs (public service announcements), and producing quarterly issues lists. The individual who applies for this position should be well organized, skilled at using station equipment and facilities, and able to interact with other people effectively when enforcing compliance with FCC and station regulations.

DEADLINE: The deadline for the receipt of all applications for any of these positions is Friday, April 2, at 5 p.m. Applications should be sent to Bill Neville, chairperson, Student Advisory Media Board, in care of Box 8067, or delivered in person to Room 2022, Williams Center.

COMPENSATION: Payment rates for board members are pending final budget approval by the Student Activities Budget Committee and the Student Media Advisory Board.

INTERVIEW DATE: All candidates for board positions MUST APPEAR PERSONALLY for interviews as follows: for WVGS on Friday, April 9, with a nominating committee. WVGS candidates who are nominated must return Friday, April 16, for an interview with the full board. Candidates for the George-Anne, Miscellany Magazine, and Southern Reflector must appear Friday, April 16. All interviews will be held at 3:30 p.m. in Room 2007 of F.I. Williams Center (Upper Floor).

'Dead' ringer for 28 Days Later'

A strange epidemic is occurring: the dead are chasing the living, and eating them. The freshly dead then rise, and look to feed on the living, etc. A group of survivors take refuge in a nearby mall, and make attempts to survive in harsh new conditions.

Besides the very basic plot (mall+zombies=movie), this rendition has very little to do with the original version of "Dawn of the Dead." In Romero's vision, the zombies were not just psychotic hunters, tearing up the streets for a meal; they were more symbols, a comment on such things as commercialism, racism, and other themes. In Gunn/Snyder's take, the zombies have one purpose; to kill. There are attempts at the very beginning of the movie to raise some flags on some different themes, such as nationalism and post 9/11 paranoia, but are quickly dropped to pay more attention to more shooting zombies in the head.

Also, no ultimate cause was discovered in the original, whereas in the remake there is constant elusion to it being a virus. Which, unfortunately, equates it with attempting to be 28 Days Later American Version. Had they made strides to build a wall between the two movies, it would have more legitimacy. Gunn apparently decided to take the easy way out, and went with the disease theme.

The acting, though no awards will be given, was good for what it's worth; however, some characters had difficulty maintaining their personality traits.

One character does a complete about-face midway in the movie, from psychotic loner to blind follower, for no reason at all.

The cinematography was fine, with some really well done overhead shots of a local suburb at the beginning of the film.

A couple of wide shots of the city as it's being demolished are nice as well, showing the chaos that is happening around the central characters.

Supposedly, about five minutes of gore and violence was cut out of the movie. I can only imagine what was cut, because the movie that made it was actually pretty gory, considering.

Universal is kind of known for cutting movies to hell and then dumping them (House of 1000 Corpses), so to see this level of violence was a little surprising. Head shots, eaten bodies, rotting corpses, it's all in. If you're an old-school horror movie aficionado, then go and see it at least for that, and also for the brief cameos of some of the original's stars.

Anyway, go check it out if you're a horror fan; if you've never seen the original, make sure you see that first, then try and keep the idea that this is not going to be anywhere near the level of that classic, but is a decent side-story-ish kind of 'remake.'

"We put on the show as a form of entertainment and as a way for more people to find out about Delta Sigma Pi," Johnson said.

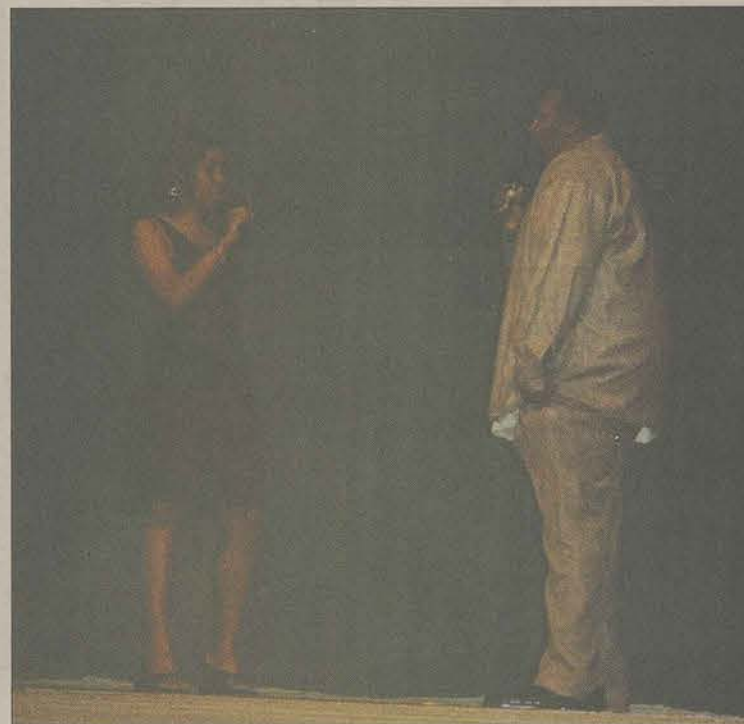
Lawson and Johnson coordinated the show last year and decided that they wanted it to be an annual event for the fraternity.
