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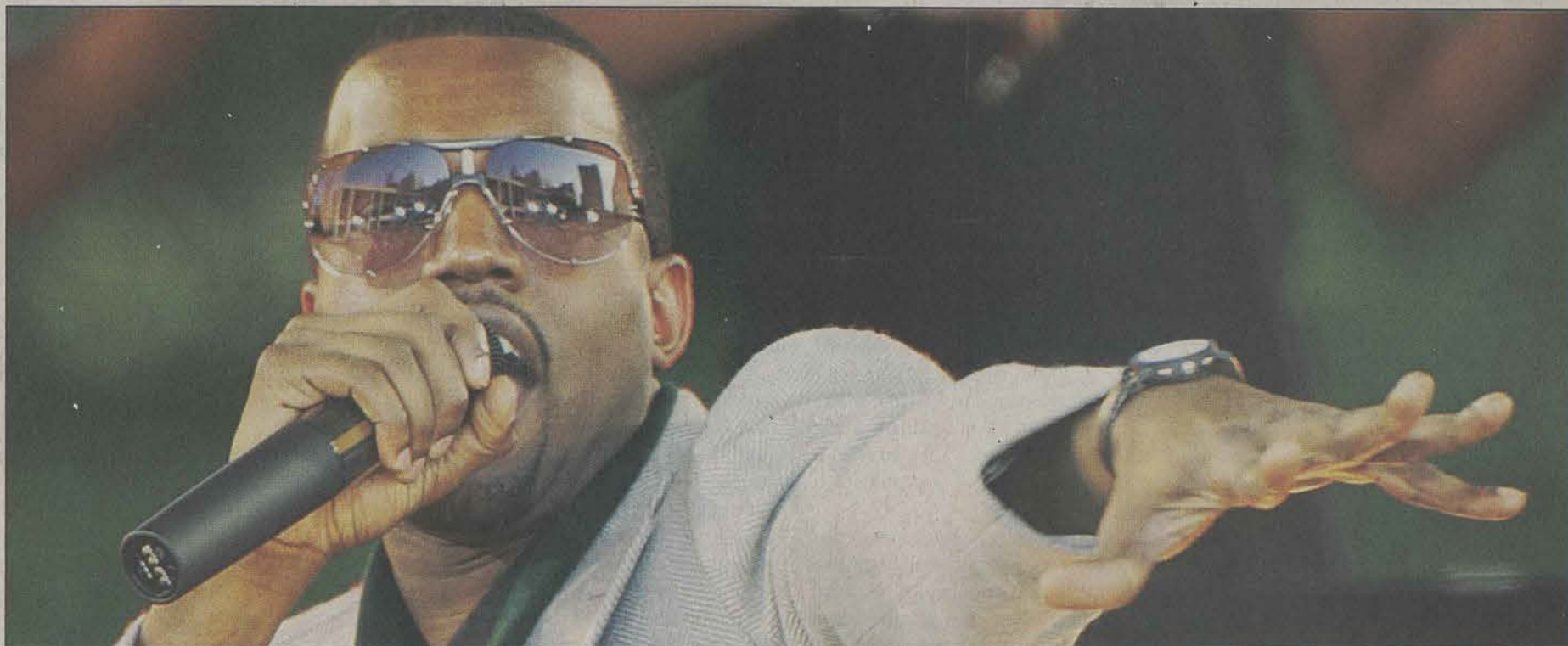

## Kanye Southbound

West to headline Nov. 19 concert at Paulson Stadium  
Fantasia, Common and Keyshia Cole to be featured

Grammy award winner Kanye West is set to rock Paulson Stadium Nov. 19.

A press release, posted Sept. 14 on Roc-A-Fella Records' Web site, announced the performance as well as 47 others included in West's "Touch the Sky" tour.

West's three-month tour steps off Oct. 11 in Miami and, according

to the Web site, will feature special guests Fantasia, Keyshia Cole and Common.

The Statesboro showing will be the second big-name act to visit GSU in the last year. In April, the band 3 Doors Down drew 7,500 fans to the 18,000-seat stadium.

While MTV News, Rolling Stone magazine and VH1 are all reporting that Statesboro will be included in West's tour, GSU officials aren't yet confirming the performance.

Stephen Ward, the school's spokesman, said Sunday contracts for the show have not yet been signed. He said the concert would be a partnership between Eagle Entertainment, Student Government and the university.

Attendees at the 3 Doors Down concert, with headliners Breaking Benjamin and Silver Tide, paid \$20 per ticket for students and \$30 for outsiders. Ticket prices for the Kanye West concert were not yet available Sunday night.

Students greeted the news of West's performance with jubilation.

"I think his appeal is universal — all types and groups will be there," said student Jamaal Shepard. "I'm pretty sure he'll draw a much larger crowd. He touches a huge crowd. His music is listened to by a larger group of people — much larger than 3 Doors Down."

In 2004, West was nominated for 10 Grammys for his multi-platinum debut album, "The College Dropout." He walked away with three Grammys

including "Best Rap Song" for his controversial hit "Jesus Walks."

Fantasia Barrino, the 2004 American Idol winner, released her first album, "Free Yourself," in Nov. 2004. It debuted at number eight on the Billboard music charts selling 240,000 copies in its first week. Just two months after its release, it sold over one million copies and went platinum.

Common debuted in 1992 with the single "Take It EZ." He issued his first album under his new name in 1997.

Since then, Common raised his profile with several notable guest spots over the next couple of years; he appeared on Pete Rock's "Soul Survivor," plus two watermark albums of the new progressive hip-hop movement, Mos Def and Talib Kweli's "Black Star" and the Roots' "Things Fall Apart."

Keyshia Cole is a relative newcomer compared to Fantasia and Common. She has recently made waves with a successful single, "I see **CONCERT**, page 5

## Statesboro: Georgia Southern Symphony will perform with renowned violinist Kelemen

Sept. 27 concert to benefit Hurricane Katrina victims

The Statesboro-Georgia Southern Symphony will open its 2005-2006 season with the Masterworks I Concert, which will feature world-renowned violinist Barnabas Kelemen.

The winner of the Gold Medal at the 2002 International Violin Competition of Indianapolis, Kelemen

will appear with the Symphony on Tuesday, Sept. 27, at 8 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center (PAC).

The performance has been dubbed "The Concert For Katrina." The Symphony will donate \$2.50 from every ticket sold to the relief effort for the victims of Hurricane Katrina.

Kelemen has established himself as one of the leading violinists of his generation.

With a repertoire than spans from early baroque to contemporary music, he performs on a 1683 Ex-Gingold Stradivari violin and Tourte bow, which are on loan to him for winning the Indianapolis violin competition.

A native of Hungary, Kelemen makes regular appearances as a concerto soloist, recitalist and chamber musician at many of the world's major musical venues and festivals. He has performed with numerous orchestras and toured extensively throughout Europe, North America and South America as well as in parts of Africa and Asia.

## Wind knocked out of their wings

Eagles fall on the road against Wofford, 21-17

SPARTANBURG, S.C. — Heading into Saturday's game against Wofford (2-1), head coach Mike Sewak and the Eagles were looking to rebound after a tough loss at home one week ago against McNeese State. Wofford had other plans though, outscoring the Eagles 14-3 in the second half on their way to a 21-17 victory.

"Our expectations are high, we don't expect to just score 17 points," Sewak said.

The Terriers practically beat the Eagles at their own game, racking up 354 yards rushing on the night. The 300-plus yards rushing was the most allowed by a GSU defense since Nov. 4, 2000, a span of 59 games.

After winning the coin toss and deferring until the second half, the GSU defense forced Wofford to punt after three plays resulted in only six yards.

The Eagles would take advantage of their great field position and strong running by the offense and move the ball 32 yards in four plays, with the latter being an 11-yard touchdown

run by Lyon Jefferson, his first career rushing touchdown.

On Wofford's second possession of the game, they were able to use over five minutes of game clock thanks to a 12-play drive that ended in a four-yard, Michael Hobbs touchdown run, tying the game 7-7.

GSU had a chance to put additional points on the scoreboard in the first quarter after Dedrick Bynum blocked a Wofford punt. The Eagles recovered the ball at the opponent's 32-yard line and worked down to the

five-yard line before a fumble ended the drive four plays later.

Wofford appeared to be on their way to taking the lead following the mishap, but a holding call against them stalled the drive, and on fourth and four, a Jason Collier pass into the end zone was ruled incomplete.

The Eagles appeared back on track as they took the ball and marched 78 yards downfield. The drive was highlighted by a 28-yard reception by Raja Andrews which gave the Eagles first and goal from the four-yard line. The

first half scoring was capped off three plays later when Jayson Foster slipped into the end zone from one-yard out giving the Eagles a one touchdown lead at the half.

The Eagles came out after the half looking to extend the lead to two touchdowns but on the second play, GSU suffered another fumble. Wofford would capitalize on this mistake and rush the ball three straight times finally finding the end zone on a one-yard, Josh Collier run.

## SGA inducts new members

*Discuss Eagle Village parking and campus contributions*

Student Government Association met last Wednesday with Mary Woods, assistant director of the Ronald E. McNair Program, voted in new SGA senators, and also discussed committee reports on adjusted GPAs, raising money for Katrina victims and the still incomplete Eagle Village parking lot.

It was announced that the Eagle Village parking lot was once again given the 10-day finishing date.

"Eagle Village's parking lot is not able to be paved due to wetness," said VP of Auxiliary Affairs Ashley Scruggs. "They invested in \$40,000 worth of cement block to move it along."

University Housing has allowed students to park on half of the new parking lot since last Saturday.

President Shri Davis praised campus for their efforts to raise money for victims of Hurricane Katrina. She said the dunking booth that was set up as a fundraiser last Saturday was a success.

"We raised a lot of money and all of it will go to the Katrina victims," she said.

Davis mentioned that there will be a SGA clothing drive for Katrina victims on September 22 in the Russell Union from 8 a.m. to 5 p.m.

Kate Daniel, vice president of finance, informed the senate that the One Million Challenge will be

accepting donations of any kind that can benefit Katrina victims, other than clothing, until the end of September. Every organization on campus was asked to raise 2,500 cans in order to meet the one million mark.

One outstanding topic of the meeting was the question of doing away with adjusted GPA. Davis asked the SGA senators what they thought about doing away with the adjusted GPA after the fall semester of 2006 since it usually confuses students and does not average into the cumulative GPA.

Many of the senators wanted to keep it because they would rather send their adjusted averages to their parents. It will be discussed again at the next meeting.

Mary Woods spoke on opportunities the McNair Program offers to students. Both SGA President Davis and VP of Auxiliary Affairs Ashley Scruggs were McNair Scholars.

"The McNair Program helps students to get prepared for grad school mostly," said Woods. "It also helps with the preparation of entrance exams and research that comes with an internship."

This summer, the McNair Program has 18 spots available and several requirements.

Students must be a first generation college student, at 150 percent poverty level salary income, or in a professoriate. The student must also be underrepresented in their Ph.D field and already have 60 credit hours completed.

"We are looking for the top-notch students who want a Ph.D and to give back to the community," said Woods.

During pass the gavel, senators take turns making announcements, and 'Dare to Declare' was announced for Sept. 29. It is a time when undeclared students are encouraged to find a major that fits their interests and skills.

Twelve new senators were voted into SGA, including freshman seats filled by James Martin, Kelsey Grubbs, Brittani Ford, Crystal Mulin and Tim Davis; a graduate seat filled by Moniquea Stanley; an IT seat filled by Maria Gates; education seats filled by Haley Athan and Nicole Nagy; CLASS seats filled by Clay Turner, Leah Lewis, and Clarissa Crawford.

## Adults can relive teen testing angst

1 TALLAHASSEE, Fla. — Think you're as smart as your teenager?

Beginning Wednesday, you can find out. State officials will put an old edition of the Florida Comprehensive Assessment Test online so people can see what it's like to be in 10th grade.

If you don't know much about history, don't know much biology, you might still do well. The test measures ability in reading and math. The questions were from the 2004 exam, and most likely won't be seen on any test again any time soon.

State education officials said Friday the test will be on the department's Web site. People can download or print the test and take it like students would, then get the answer key to see what they got right and wrong. "It will satisfy curiosity, probably, more than anything else," said Education Commissioner John Winn.

## Man breaks 'couch potato' record

2 NEW YORK — Couch potato, thy name is Suresh. Suresh Joachim broke the Guinness world record for the longest time spent watching TV. He finished Friday with 69 hours and 48 minutes.

After passing the previous record of 50 hours and 7 minutes Thursday, Joachim continued until shortly after 7 a.m. Friday morning (EDT).

Joachim did his TV viewing in the lobby of WABC-TV as part of the "Guinness World Record Breaker Week" on the syndicated "Live With Regis and Kelly."

Sitting on a brown leather couch, he watched nothing but ABC shows.

"I'm going to be a little tired of watching TV after this," Joachim told The Associated Press by phone during a brief break.

Rules for the couch potato honor, as stipulated by Guinness,



allow for a 5-minute break every hour and a 15-minute break every 8 hours. The viewer must otherwise be constantly looking at the screen.

The hardest part, Joachim said on "Regis and Kelly," was "I couldn't watch the people" — the many, waving passers-by on the street outside the ABC studio.

Joachim, who lives in Toronto but hails from Sri Lanka, now holds more than 16 Guinness records, including the longest duration balancing on one foot (76 hours, 40 minutes) and bowling for 100 hours. He does it, he says, to raise awareness of suffering children.

## Sky-diving grandmother, 85, keeps promise

3 KEARNEY, Neb. — Keeping a promise to her grandson that she would parachute when she turns 85, Thelma Tillery did just that.

"When you step out on that little step, man, that's when it really hits you," Tillery said after successfully landing in Kearney, Nebraska.

She jumped tandem-style at a Kearney Municipal Airport sky-diving center, Kearney Hub newspaper reported.

"Everything worked, and I hit the ground running," Tillery said. "And that's about as good as you can get, I guess."

So good, in fact, she recommends the experience.

"Anyone who is curious about it and would like to do it ... should go ahead and do it," she said. "I'd do it again — not tomorrow — but it's not something I would hesitate to do again."

## Afghanistan holds landmark elections amid fears of violence

KABUL, Afghanistan — Afghans went to the polls Sunday to elect a new legislature, hoping to bolster a fragile democracy after a quarter-century of war and sideline the Taliban militants who fought to undermine the vote.

"Today is a magnificent day for Afghanistan," said Ali Safar, 62, who was standing in line to vote in the capital, Kabul. "We want dignity, we want stability and peace. Thirty years of war and poverty is enough."

Some 12.4 million Afghans were registered to vote at more than 6,000 polling stations, guarded by some 100,000 Afghan police and soldiers and 30,000 foreign troops.

The Taliban called for a boycott of the elections, but said they would not attack civilians heading to the polls. A wave of assaults in the 48 hours leading up to the vote left nine militants and three policemen dead.

Security forces said they thwarted four rebel bombings, including an attempt to blow up a massive dam.

## Plans advancing for world's first face transplant

CLEVELAND — In the next few weeks, five men and seven women will secretly visit the Cleveland Clinic to interview for the chance to have a radical operation that's never been tried anywhere in the world.

They will smile, raise their eyebrows, close their eyes, open their mouths. Dr. Maria Siemionow will study their cheekbones, lips and noses. She will ask what they hope to gain and what they most fear.

Then she will ask, "Are you afraid that you will look like another person?"

The vote was seen as the last formal step toward democracy on a path set out after a U.S.-led force drove the Taliban from power in 2001, when they refused to hand over al-Qaida leader Osama bin Laden following the Sept. 11 attacks.

Presidential elections last October saw Hamid Karzai affirmed as the nation's leader.

Many people hoped the legislative polls would marginalize the insurgents and end a spiral of violence that started in 1979 when Soviet troops invaded, before a devastating civil war and the oppressive rule of the hard-line Taliban.

Top U.N. envoy Jean Arnault said militants had failed to disrupt preparations for the polls.

Because whoever she chooses will endure the ultimate identity crisis.

Siemionow wants to attempt a face transplant.

This is no extreme TV makeover. It is a medical frontier being explored by a doctor who wants the public to understand what she is trying to do.

It is this: to give people horribly disfigured by burns, accidents or other tragedies a chance at a new life. Today's best treatments still leave many of them with freakish, scar-tissue masks that don't look or move like natural skin.

Her critics say the operation is way too risky for something that is not a

matter of life or death.

Ultimately, it comes to this: a hospital, doctor and patient willing to try it.

The first two are now in place. The third is expected to be shortly.

Siemionow assembled a large team and worked with LifeBanc, the organ procurement agency she expects will help obtain a face.

She wants a clear-cut first case. No children because risks are too great. No cancer patients because anti-rejection drugs raise the risk of recurrence. "Someone's got to push the envelope," he said. "In retrospect, we'll know whether it should be done."

## Fulton jail hundreds over proposed limit

ATLANTA — The Fulton County Jail on Friday was more than 800 inmates over a proposed federal agreement to ease overcrowding, with no immediate solution to fix the problem in sight. The jail and two annexes held 3,087 inmates, and 74 inmates were housed in leased cells at the Alpharetta City Jail. A proposed consent agreement calls for a maximum of 2,250 in the main jail and 300 in the two annexes.

## Two dead in Chicago train derailment

CHICAGO — A commuter train derailed on Chicago's South Side, killing at least two people and injuring more than 80, some of them critically.

The double-decker Metra train was traveling Saturday from Joliet to Chicago when the locomotive and its five cars jumped the tracks about 5 miles south of downtown, authorities said.

Both victims were women, a 22-year-old who died on the train and a 30-year-old pronounced dead later at a hospital.

## Gunmen kill member of Iraqi parliament

BAGHDAD, Iraq — Insurgents killed a Kurdish member of the Iraqi parliament, his brother and the driver of his car and wounded a second lawmaker in an ambush on their convoy north of Baghdad, police and officials said Sunday.

Faris Nasir Hussein, a member of the Patriotic Union of Kurdistan party, was killed in the attack Saturday night, along with his brother and their driver.

## Healthy volunteers needed for Streptococcal Prevention In Non-pregnant Women (SPIN) Study

Group B Streptococcus is the most common cause of life-threatening infections in newborns. In pregnant women, GBS can cause bladder and womb infections. The most prevalent diseases caused by GBS in non-pregnant women are blood infections and pneumonia. GBS also causes illness in the elderly and individuals with other diseases, such as diabetes and liver disease.

Dr. Daron Ferris and his colleagues at the Medical College of Georgia are testing the effectiveness of a vaccine to prevent GBS type III bacteria in the reproductive tract. Participants must be:

- Women age 18-40
- Not pregnant or nursing
- Sexually active in the last four months
- More than one year since tetanus immunization

In addition to receiving a free physical and pelvic exam during enrollment, qualified participants will be compensated for their time. All study visits will take place at Medical College of Georgia Student Health Services.

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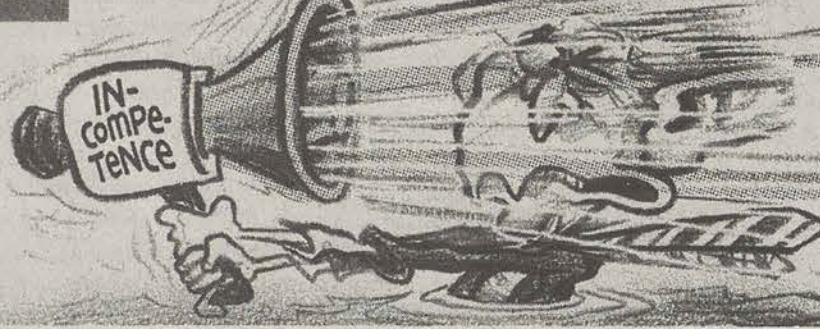

# The Sierra Club: round two

Due to the overwhelming response to my Aug. 25 column, "The Sierra Club is not your friend," I felt it only necessary to offer a reply.

The environmentalists came out of the woodwork in full force and unleashed a laundry list of complaints. There were two George-Anne responses, a variety of e-mails and even a few Internet messages.

Most of the replies whined a bit, insulted The George-Anne, failed to provide evidence for claims (notice proof surrogates like "there is strong scientific evidence showing that..." in Jim Reichard's retort) and most significantly missed the point.

Each response portrayed my column as an attempt to undermine environmental action; an analysis that fails to grasp the central theme.

My column was a credo to Republicans, not a condemnation of the environmental community.

I have little problem with true environmentalism. But the focus was on this particular environmental organization and moreover the "Republicans" who think the Sierra Club offers the best way to take up environmental concerns.

Travis Tarver, the founder of the Georgia Southern University Sierra Club, said in an e-mail, "I started the Sierra Club Chapter in an effort to inform normal people about the crimes that are being committed against the world we live in."

That is a highly superficial justification. Declaring that the Sierra Club is a non-partisan organization focused only on environmental action reeks of ignorance.

The Sierra Club uses "environmental concerns" as a smokescreen for their political agenda.

They have a long record of being openly liberal by financially backing extremely liberal candidates. During the 2004 election alone, the Sierra Club contributed \$243,548 to John Kerry's campaign while giving \$0 to George W. Bush.

They donated another \$882,521 during the 2004 cycle to Democratic candidates such as Tom Daschle (\$2,500), Denise Majette (\$3,500), Barack Obama (\$8,030), Nancy Pelosi (\$1,500) and countless others.

The notion that someone would claim to be a Republican while supporting and cultivating an organization that pumps more than \$1 million per election cycle into the campaign war chests of Democratic candidates is paradoxical.

I understand that some people, including Republicans, have serious concerns for the environment and I encourage each and every one of them to do something about it.

But it is dangerously shallow to blindly join a club that hides a deep political agenda with notions of environmental concern.

Wake up and smell the patchouli.

See how the money is spent. Look at some of the non-environmental issues they support that I cited in the first Sierra Club column; the things that fly in the face of economic conservatism.

And after that, if a Republican can honestly feel comfortable about being a part of the Sierra Club, then I beg them to, at the very least, stop identifying themselves as such.

You can be a Republican and you can be a member of the Sierra Club, but you cannot be both. And that was the point of my column.

LOS ANGELES — A trio of past Emmy favorites grabbed trophies at Sunday's ceremony, with Brad Garrett and Doris Roberts of "Everybody Loves Raymond" and William Shatner of "Boston Legal" receiving best supporting actor honors.

Garrett received his third Emmy for the CBS sitcom, which wrapped after nine seasons, and Shatner received his second Emmy for the character of egotistical lawyer Denny Crane.

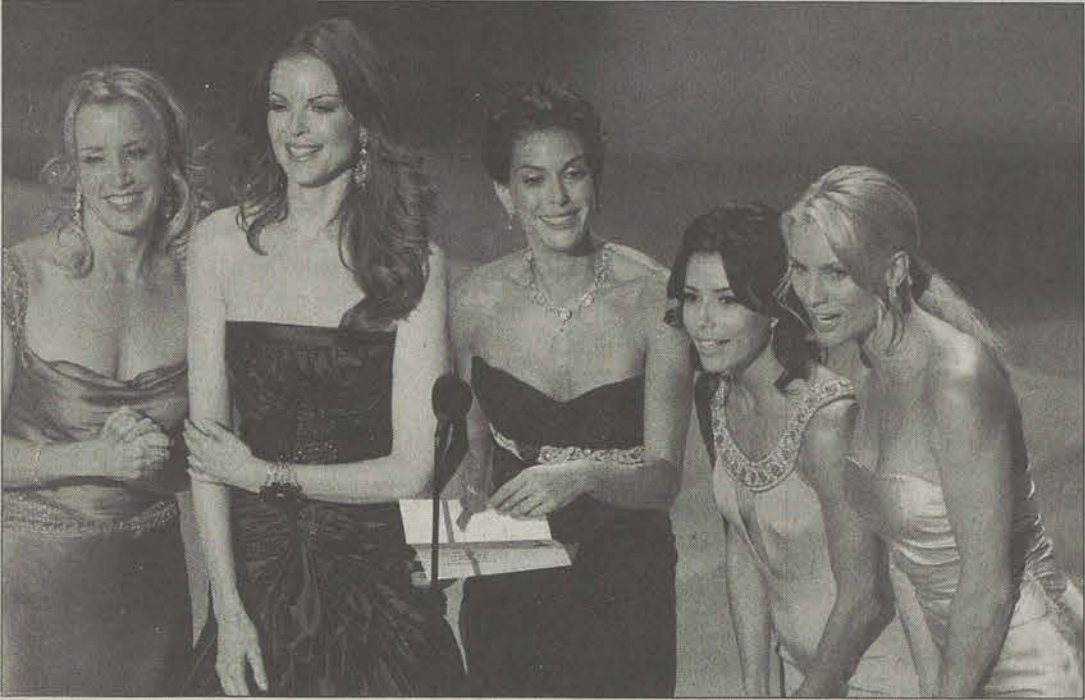
Shatner received his first Emmy for playing Crane in 2004 when he guest starred on "The Practice," the precursor to "Boston Legal."

Blythe Danner was named best supporting actress in a drama for Showtime's "Huff."

The ceremony included a tribute to late-night king Johnny Carson, the "Tonight" show host who died this year, with David Letterman remembering the man who entertained America and was mentor to so many comedians.

For their supporting acting work in a miniseries or a movie, Paul Newman was honored for "Empire Falls" and Jane Alexander for "Warm Springs," both on HBO.

Hugh Jackman was honored as best individual performance in a variety or music program for his work as host of

the 58th annual Tony Awards.

"The Daily Show with Jon Stewart" repeated as best variety, music or comedy series and again won for writing.

"The Amazing Race" was named outstanding reality-competition program for the third time.

"Desperate Housewives" and "Lost" were among the front-runners

as the TV industry celebrated a year that brought viewers and buzz back to the broadcast networks.

Awards in 27 categories were being presented.

When nominations were announced in July, HBO led with 93 bids. CBS was second with 59 nominations, followed by NBC with 54, ABC with 51 and Fox with 49.

Acting awards for guest actors on comedy and drama series were given at the Sept. 11 creative arts ceremony.

The winners were Amanda Plummer, "Law & Order: Special Victims Unit"; Ray Liotta, "ER"; Kathryn Joosten, "Desperate Housewives"; and Bobby Cannavale, "Will & Grace."

Should Have Cheated," which is listed at number twelve on the Billboard Top R&B/Hip-Hop Albums list.

Three weeks ago, his new album "Late Registration" debuted at number one, selling 860,000 copies.

Although he has two albums in the "Billboard Top 100," West has most recently been known not for the words he sings, but for the politically charged messages he's been spewing.

During an off-script statement at a Sept. 2 Hurricane Katrina telethon, West declared "George Bush doesn't care about black people."

The comments earned the artist heavy media coverage. NBC, which was airing "A Concert for Hurricane Relief" telethon, edited the critique from its west coast airing.

A week after the statement, West told an audience during the taping of MTV2's \$2 Bill Concert series, that

he didn't regret his criticism of the president.

"I wasn't trying to particularly diss anybody like that," he said. "People are like, 'Yo, aren't you scared that something's going to happen to you?'"

I was like, 'I can think of a lot worse things that could happen to me, like how about not eating for five days? Or how about not knowing where my f---ing family is?' Everybody's always concerned about the self."

Students said Sunday that they weren't concerned about the controversial messages West might deliver.

"It's going to be a little crazy," said senior Jason Reid. "I'm not exactly sure what to expect."

"I don't think the school will have to worry about what he says reflecting badly on the school as much as it would reflect poorly on him."

If the contract is finalized in the coming weeks, school officials indicated ticket prices and showtimes would be made available at the time of announcement.

Tickets for West's Greenville, SC performance Oct. 15 were selling on Ticketmaster.com for \$30-40.

West's Statesboro show is preceded by a Nov. 17 concert in Atlanta at the Gwinnett Center and a show in Greensboro, NC on Nov. 18.

The Eagles next drive ended in a punt after four consecutive carries by Brandon Andrews and a 4-yard run by Raja Andrews resulted in fourth and two.

Once Wofford was back in possession of the ball, they continued to utilize their ground attack, going 80 yards in 8 plays to take their first lead of the game 21-14.

Jonathan Dudley would provide the Eagles with a field goal after the offense was able to move down to the Wofford 20-yard line midway through the fourth quarter. The drive was highlighted by an impressive 53-yard run by Jayson Foster who finished the day with 126 yards on 15 carries.

The GSU defense then came

back onto the field and made three consecutive stops to force Wofford to punt. A personal foul by the defense gave Wofford a first down and additional time to run the clock. The defense regrouped and made key stops to give the offense a chance to score again though.

After an interception by A.J. Bryant, the Eagles took over at their own 11-yard line. It appeared as though the Eagles were on track for a game winning drive until a fumble by Jermaine Austin was recovered by Brian Ford.

The Eagles had one additional chance to win the game but time ran out on the Eagles at midfield leaving fans and players shaking their heads in disbelief.

"We've got to go back and look at the film and just go back to the drawing board," A.J. Bryant said.

The Eagles next match up is Saturday at 7:00 against Chattanooga at Paulson Stadium.

## Volleyball completes play in LIU Invitational

The Georgia Southern volleyball team was defeated three games to one against Long Island in the final match of the Long Island Invitational Saturday in Brooklyn, N.Y.

GSU (7-5) fought back and forth with Long Island (5-8) losing game one 25-30 and winning game two 30-27. The Eagles fell behind early in game 3, and eventually fell short, 23-30. Georgia Southern was unable to capitalize on 14 service errors by Long Island during the match and the Eagles were defeated in game four 27-30.

Senior Iulia Porumbescu led the team in kills, 18, and also in digs, 17, as she recorded her tenth double-double on the season. Senior Natalia Galantini totaled 26 assists and was one dig short of a double-double with nine. For her play during the tournament, Galantini was named to the All-Tournament team.

For the third consecutive match, GSU recorded eight team blocks, led by senior Cristie Mitchell, five blocks, and junior's Jennifer Charles and Jennifer Schenk, who each recorded four.

Saturday morning, GSU lost to Bowling Green in the Eagles second match of the LIU Invitational, three games to none.

In each of the three games, Georgia Southern (7-4) held a lead over Bowling Green (5-5) but could not find a way to capitalize on the advantage. The Eagles were swept in the match, losing game one 25-30, game two 28-30, and finally, game three 26-30.

The Eagles out dug the Falcons 53 to 48 led by senior Natalia Galantini who had 13 and also out blocked Bowling Green eight to three led by Schenk's four. The Falcons, however, managed to out kill GSU 51 to 44. The Eagles finished the match with a .143 hitting percentage.

On Friday, GSU defeated Weber State three games to one in the Eagles first match of the Invitational.

Porumbescu (Bucharest, Romania) led the Eagles with her ninth double-double on the season, recording 30 kills and 13 digs. Porumbescu, who finished the night with a .491 hitting percentage, recorded 30-plus kills for the second time in the 2005 season.

"We started the match ready to play," head coach Kerry Messersmith said, "And we never lost that intensity. We played well both offensively and defensively tonight and defeated a good opponent in Weber State. I was very excited to watch the match tonight and hope to see this play carry throughout the season."

## Golf Team Finishes Gopher Invitational

"We came out and played today the way that I wanted us to play all weekend," head coach Larry Mays said.

Piracy has probably existed since early man first took to the waters, beginning during the time of Romans, some suspect.

But when Columbus' discovery opened the western hemisphere for exploration, Spain naturally led the way, and Cortez's conquest of the Aztecs in Mexico and Pizarro's conquest of the Incas in Peru began the practice of "treasure fleets" which transported the vast wealth of the new world back to Spain. Control of the sea lanes now became a matter of vital national interests.

At this time England was a relatively poor and weak country. Her kings and queens were involved in a centuries-long struggle with Parliament over control of the country's treasury. Parliament was reluctant to raise taxes for a powerful navy, which would answer to the monarch rather than to Parliament.

But as an island nation, England had an extensive private fleet, and the monarchs found in it a solution to their dilemma. When at war with another country, the king or queen would issue "letters of marque" which commissioned these private vessels to seek out and attack the shipping of the enemy country. These privately commissioned ships became known as "privateers".

Privateers were "licensed" to confiscate the cargo of the enemy vessel and divide the profits among the crew.

Piracy in the Americas flourished in the 17th and 18th centuries. Most American pirates started out as privateers, hired by local merchants and commissioned by one of the colonies to attack the shipping of England's enemies.

## Famous pirates

**WILLIAM KIDD** - was a privateersman hired by Lord Bellomont, Royal Governor of Massachusetts, to seek out and capture Blackbeard. Failing to capture Blackbeard, Kidd became a pirate himself - although he denied being one until his dying day. Returning to Boston in 1699, Kidd was arrested and sentenced to be hanged.

**EDWARD TEACH - BLACKBEARD**

- Ocracoke Inlet in North Carolina was his base of. Teach's jet black beard was the talk of two continents. In 1691, he and a sizeable crew landed at Luning Island in the Isles of Shoals off Portsmouth, New Hampshire. There he buried a large treasure of silver bars which has never been discovered.

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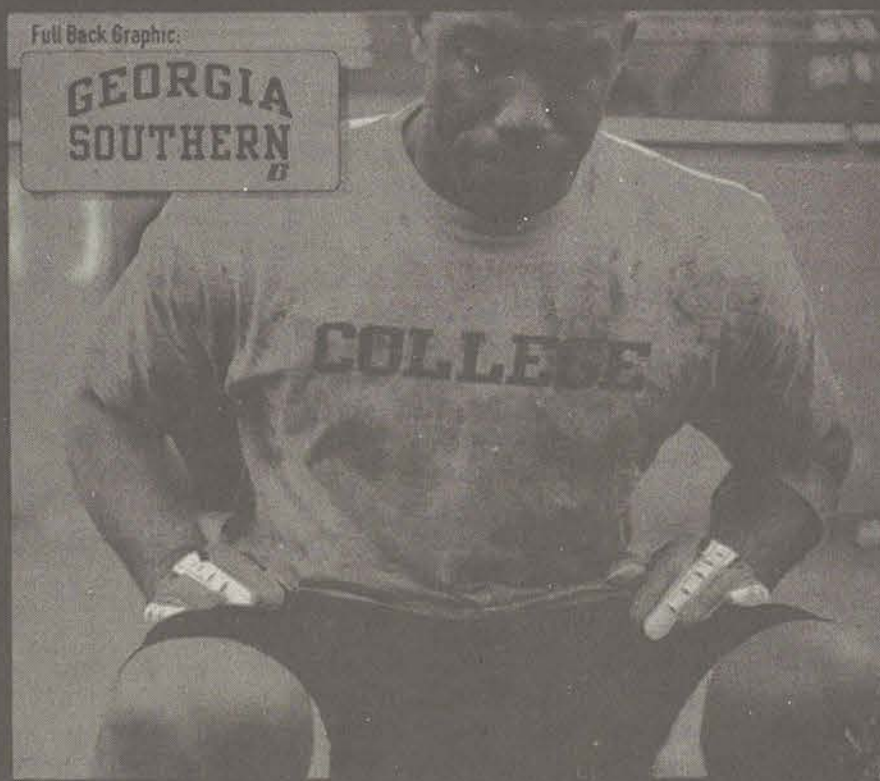
