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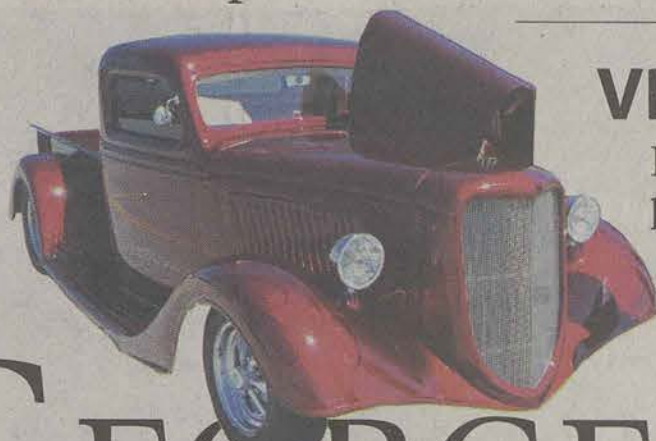

What has been your favorite project that you have worked on? Why?

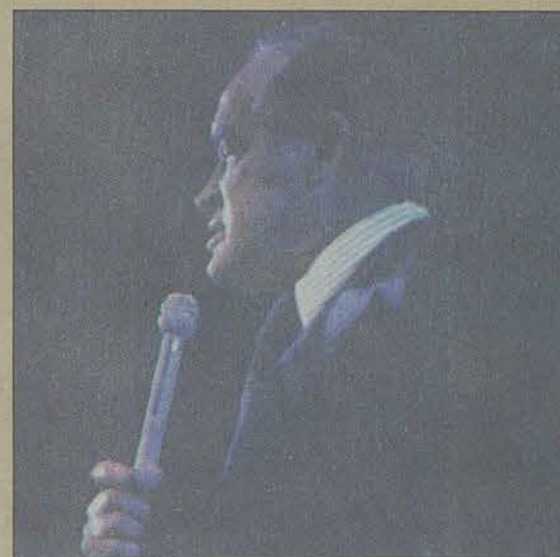
Probably The Chris Rock Show, I got a lot of ideas started from that show. We

Georgia Southern landscape architect wins statewide awards

Chuck Taylor, landscape architect at Georgia Southern for 10 years, was honored recently by the Georgia Chapter of the American Society of Landscape Architects (ASLA) for projects in two separate categories.

He received an award of merit in the Parks and Public Works category for "Creating a Pedestrian-friendly Campus," a project that was implemented at GSU. He also received an award in the Pro Bono category for design work he donated to Ogeechee Area Hospice.

"Chuck's pedestrian-friendly campus project has really improved the look and flow of Georgia Southern," said Ron Dennis, head of the campus Physical Plant. "We're proud of his contributions to the improvement of the University, and I commend him on this honor."

"Creating a pedestrian-friendly campus at Georgia Southern was important for the safety of the students, faculty and staff," said Taylor, "but it carried the added benefit of encouraging walking and bicycling, two activities that are instrumental in improving health and well-being."

Taylor took the lead in developing a master plan that eliminated dangerous cross traffic and moved parking and vehicular traffic to the perimeter of the campus. As the master plan was implemented, it was necessary to start a bus system (Southern Express) to shuttle students from off-campus sites and perimeter parking lots, identify bus stops, maintain emergency and service access,

preserve and protect the live oak and cedar trees along the routes, and add lamp posts, standard site furnishings, and border gardens to achieve a unified look for the campus.

These are Taylor's third and fourth GA ASLA awards. In 2002 he won a tri-state award for the design of the Center for Wildlife Education, and another award for Triangle Park in downtown Statesboro in 2004.

Students remember friend after fatal car accident

Georgia Southern student Anthony Ravn Ringgold, 19, passed away earlier this month as a result of injuries sustained in a car crash. He was a freshman majoring in pre-business at GSU.

Funeral and memorial services were held last week at Berean Christian Church in Stone Mountain, Ga.

Ringgold had friends from all over the state, and he made a positive impact on the lives of people around him.

"I met Anthony back at Columbia middle school, I have known him for six years," said Quintavious Johnson, a student at Georgia Perimeter.

"Anthony was a very positive person. The one thing that made Anthony special to me was his heart," said Johnson. "He was always there for you, even when he didn't know you, you could be sitting at the bus stop and he would come and be like 'pull my finger,' and you couldn't do anything but laugh. I just want Anthony to know I miss him."

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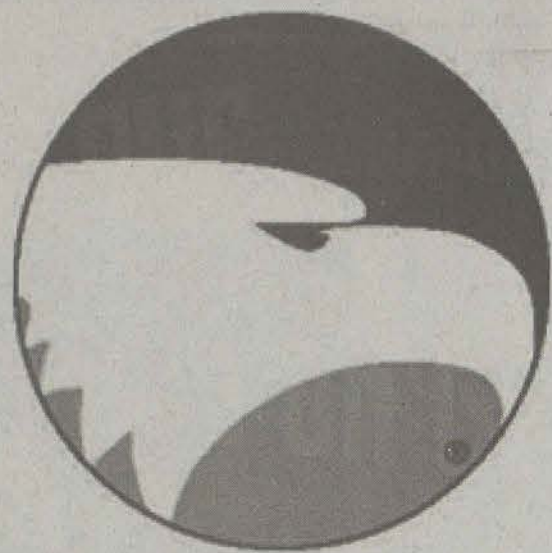

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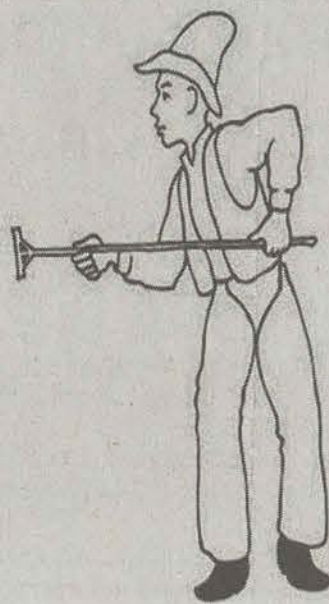

'Ultimate' fun with intramural frisbee

Campus Recreation & Intramurals (CRI) soars further into the spring season this week as Intramural Ultimate Frisbee begins Monday, Mar. 26 at the RAC Multiplex Fields.

Ultimate Frisbee is not only a club sport, but a fun activity that is rapidly gaining popularity amongst intramural participants at Georgia Southern.

"We had about 15 teams register last year, and we've significantly exceeded that number this spring," said graduate assistant Jim Baker.

"The club team really helps get the season started. They participate on different teams throughout the intramural season to promote Ultimate Frisbee and teach others how to play."

As with other intramural sports, there are several different divisions to participate in.

The divisions include men's, women's, co-rec, fraternity and sorority and

on-campus residence halls.

Other classifications within divisions include A, B and C competition levels. Not only does CRI allow you to choose your league, but you can also decide how hard you would like to play.

For those new to ultimate frisbee, here is a basic breakdown of the game.

Each game consists of two 20-minute halves with a running clock. Play starts at the beginning of each period of play and after each goal with a throw-off.

Whenever a goal is scored, the teams switch their field direction and the team that scored throws-off.

The throw-off consists of one player on the throwing team throwing the disc toward the opposite goal line to begin play.

A change of possession occurs when a pass is not completed. A disc is out-of-bounds when it first contacts an illegal area or contacts anything which is out-of-bounds.

"Ultimate Frisbee is a sport that is unique from any other," said Intramural Director Sarah Fain. "A lot of people have not been exposed to it yet, and this is a great opportunity to look at something new. The weather is great and it could be really fun to do something 'out-of-the-norm' with your friends."

Ultimate Frisbee Club member Kyle Burcher cannot wait for the season to begin and encourages anyone to come out and watch.

"Ultimate Frisbee is a great way to get outdoors, exercise and hang out with your friends all at the same time," said Burcher. "We always have a great time out there."

Games will be held Sundays through Thursdays from 6:00 p.m. to 11:00 p.m. at the RAC Multiplex Fields. Season schedules will be available on Thursday, Mar. 22 at 4:00 p.m.

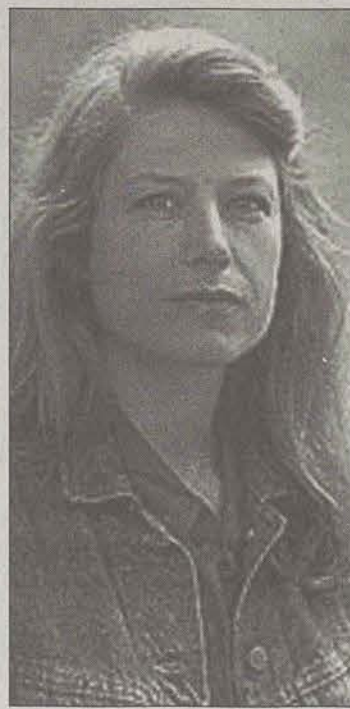
Her presentation which is free and open to the public is sponsored by the department of Writing and Linguistics and the Georgia Poetry Circuit.

Rosser's first book of poetry, "Bright Moves," was published in 1990 by Northeastern University Press and won the Morse Poetry Prize.

Her second book, "Misery Prefigured," won the Crab Orchard Award and was published by Southern Illinois University Press in 2001.

This fall her third book, "Foiled Again," will be published as the winner of The New Criterion Magazine Poetry Prize, an award given to a book that pays close attention to poetic form.

Rosser earned her Ph.D. in English Literature from the University of Pennsylvania and she teaches in the creative writing program of Ohio University in Athens, Ohio. She has been awarded fellow-

ships from the National Endowment for the Arts, the Ohio Arts Council, Yaddo, Breadloaf and the New Jersey State Council on the Arts.

She earned the Peter I.B. Lavan Award for Younger Poets from the Academy of American Poets, the Frederick Bock Prize, awarded by "Poetry" magazine and a Pushcart Prize.

Professors have travel opportunities in India

This summer, faculty from universities across the United States have the opportunity to attend a development seminar in the University of Hyderabad, in the city of Hyderabad, India.

"All faculty, including instructors can attend," said Karl Schmidt, an associate professor in the department of history from South Dakota State University.

"Those professors who are not tenured-track may attend as well," he added. Schmidt specializes in the history of India. He has conducted research, lived and traveled in India eight times since his first visit.

The University of Hyderabad is situated in 2,300 acres of land, featuring many trees and rolling hills.

The university is one of India's most attractive and best equipped campuses. It is comprised of eight schools, all at the graduate level, offering master and PhD degrees. All instruction at the university is English.

Established in 2000, the Faculty seminar on India focuses on broad

topics in Indian history, culture, economy, politics, higher education, religion and language. Seminar members will attend morning lectures given by specialists from both the University of Hyderabad and other nearby universities.

Also, one weekend trip within Andhra Pradesh will also be scheduled as part of the seminar.

Faculty who wish to attend this seminar must be willing to show how they would incorporate material about India into the courses they regularly teach, or demonstrate how experience would benefit and have an impact on their everyday work.

The seminar includes lodging and all meals on the university's campus.

The cost of the seminar is \$1,875. This fee covers all lectures, on campus meals and lodging for the two week seminar.

On campus, computers, the library, sports and health centers will be accessible as well. This fare does not include airfare, passport and visa costs and personal expenses.

Murphy to showcase mixed media paintings

Christopher Murphy will present his Master of Fine Arts thesis exhibition, *Reconstructing Paradigms of Expression*, in Gallery 33 West in downtown Statesboro from March 26 through April 14.

The exhibition is sponsored by the Betty Foy Sanders Department of Art. A reception for the artist will be held during Statesboro's First Friday event on April 6 from 5 p.m. to 8 p.m.

Mixed media paintings, which incorporate layers of paint that have been sanded and gouged and then collaged with letters, diagrams and drawings will grace the walls of the downtown gallery. As a thesis exhibition, these works are a culmination of Murphy's research. Through his painting, Murphy attempts to explore the existential journey we share collectively and reflects on what resides in the space between art and life.

Always interested in the visual arts, Murphy won several state art competitions in secondary

In 2003, Murphy relocated to Savannah and decided to enroll in the graduate program at Georgia Southern to gain the expertise needed to build a future as a visual artist.

"The pursuit of a MFA degree has given me the knowledge, experience and confidence to pursue goals as an artist that before I felt were impossible. As I work, aspects of my inner world are translated into the painting which, in turn, simultaneously communicates both my experience of it and my sharing of it; all that transpires in our society and in the world at large, however banal, potentially becomes input for my own creative process," he said.

Murphy's work is currently represented by Utonga Gallery in Mt. Pleasant, SC. He will be exhibiting in April at the Mason Murer Fine Arts Gallery in Atlanta, in an exhibition, *Fresh Blood*, featuring works of emerging artists.

Lobbyists build momentum for action on climate change

The fight against global warming is getting an extra push from lobbyists and lawmakers in a series of efforts aimed at spurring Congress to take decisive steps to reverse the negative trend of climate change.

Several senators have pledged to push for action in this session of Congress, while House Speaker Nancy Pelosi, D-Calif., has promised to have legislation on the floor by July 4.

On Monday, 65 large pension funds and companies called on Congress to pass legislation restricting carbon emissions by up to 90 percent of 1990 levels by 2050, adding their voices to the corporations advocating for federal regulation of polluting industries.

On Tuesday, Rep. Henry Waxman, D-Calif., introduced his Safe Climate Act, which calls for reducing carbon emissions to 80 percent of 1990 levels by 2050.

He officially announced the legislation, which would be the most aggressive approach to climate change to come out of the House, to several hundred activists outside the Capitol for a rally in honor of the first Climate Crisis Action Day.

Prominent lawmakers addressed

the rally, coordinated by the Alaska Wilderness League, and promised legislative action to raise standards on fuel emissions and to enact a permanent ban on drilling for oil in the Arctic National Wildlife Refuge.

Rep. Edward Markey, D-Mass., chairman of the House's new energy independence and global warming panel, said, "What a difference a day

makes," referring to Election Day 2006 as the day that Democrats gained control of the House and Senate and those seeking to control climate change regained a foothold in Congress. "This is an incredible moment in American political history... we can finally give people the leadership they have been waiting for on this issue."

Sens. Bernie Sanders, I-Vt., and

John Kerry, D-Mass., authors of two bills on climate change, also spoke at the rally. "How far behind are we? Across the nation, companies are doing this. Communities are doing this," Kerry said. "There is money to be made, and jobs to be created in response to climate change, and that's the message we need to take with us."

Gore continues urge for bold action on global warming

Democratic California Sen. Barbara Boxer refereed a blistering verbal assault on Al Gore by the leading Republican skeptic on global warming Wednesday as the former vice president returned to Capitol Hill to call for immediate congressional action to save the planet.

Gore, whose documentary film "An

Inconvenient Truth" recently won an Academy Award, had a heated exchange with Sen. James Inhofe, R-Okla., who tried to paint the Tennessee Democrat as an overzealous hypocrite when Gore ducked a question about whether he would sign a pledge to have his household cut greenhouse gas emissions.

Bill offers temporary legal status to undocumented immigrants

Bipartisan legislation to be unveiled Thursday in the House of Representatives would offer temporary legal status to millions of undocumented immigrants but would require them to leave the country before they could be eligible for permanent residency and U.S. citizenship.

The bill by Reps. Luis Gutierrez, D-Ill., and Jeff Flake, R-Ariz., is the first major immigration legislation to be introduced in the current session of Congress, as lawmakers address the status of more than 11 million immigrants who are in the country illegally.

Key al-Sadr aide released by U.S.

The U.S. military on Wednesday released a key aide to anti-American Shiite cleric Muqtada al-Sadr, a sure sign that U.S. officials are working hard to keep al-Sadr's support for the Baghdad security plan.

Sheik Ahmed al-Sheybani, who'd

been in American custody more than two years, was escorted to Prime Minister Nouri al-Maliki's office by U.S. commander Gen. David Petraeus and U.S. Ambassador Zalmay Khalilzad, a sign of the importance attached to his release.

Repair plan decision expected soon

Shuttle managers are expected to decide Wednesday on a repair plan for shuttle Atlantis' fuel tank, which was

damaged during a recent hailstorm.

The work likely will bump the launch to mid-May.

Clinton insider joins Hillary's campaign

Bob Nash, a longtime adviser to former President Bill Clinton and vice chairman of Chicago-based ShoreBank Corp., will join Sen. Hillary Clinton's presidential quest as deputy campaign manager.

Nash, 59, served as White House personnel director in the Clinton administration and was an economic adviser to Bill Clinton when Clinton was the Arkansas governor.

As one of two deputy campaign managers, Nash said he expects to draw on his contacts with the thousands of people he hired during the Clinton years to widen the senator's circle of supporters.

"A lot of people are still out there and very interested in helping another Clinton to become president," Nash said in an interview.

Nash is expected to raise money for the campaign, help with management issues and work to turn out the vote in

the South, as well as in Illinois, Ohio and Michigan.

He said he is also interested in reaching out to rural voters, a constituency he got to know as undersecretary of agriculture under President Clinton.

During the past two presidential elections, rural voters gravitated away from Democrats and toward Republicans in increasing numbers.

"People tend to forget rural America," Nash said. "That's the kind of thing

that can be turned around."

Nash will be leaving his position at ShoreBank, a community development and environmental holding company.

There he chaired the board of directors for ShoreBank's nonprofit affiliates in Chicago, Cleveland and Detroit, which provide people with access to capital and training to create small businesses, particularly in downtrodden neighborhoods in need of revitalization.

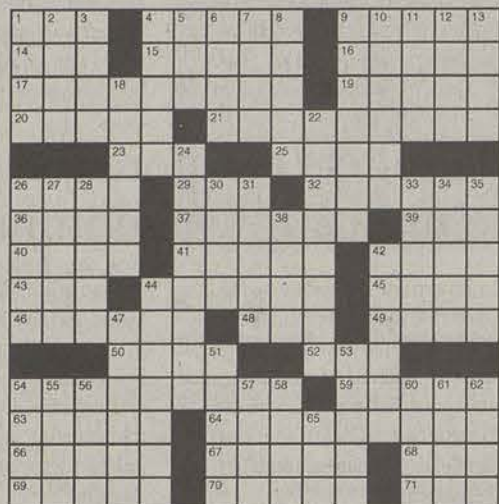

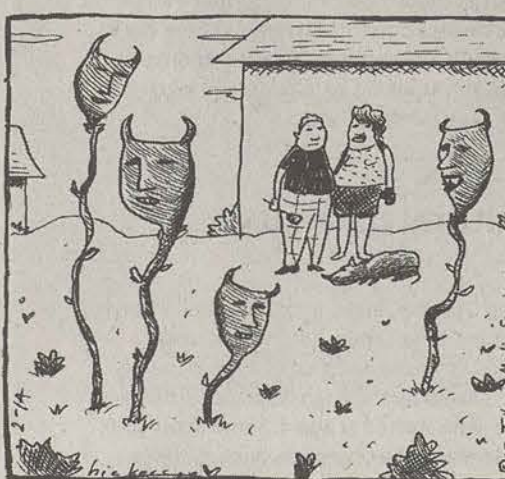

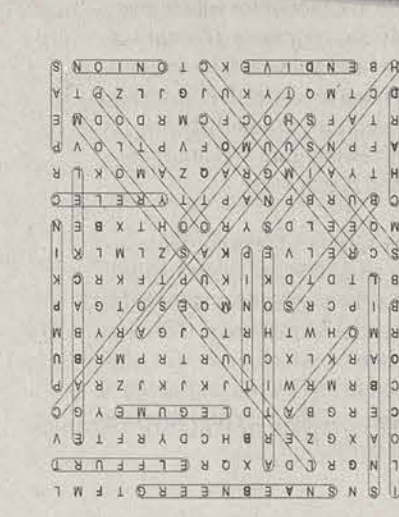

Geological Society meeting in Savannah from March 29 to 30

The 56th annual meeting of the Southeastern Section of the Geological Society of America (GSA) will take place on Thursday and Friday, March 29 and 30, at the Hyatt Regency Savannah on West Bay Street in Savannah, Ga.

The topics of discussion will include coastal development, saltwater intrusion, changes in sea level and a variety of other environmental issues that are relevant to Georgia, South Carolina and Florida.

More than 700 scientists from eight states will attend the meeting, which is being hosted by the Department of Geology and Geography and the Applied Coastal Research Laboratory at Georgia Southern.

The "Sea Level in the Southeast: Past, Present and Future" session will address a number of specific geographic areas as well as a new methodology for tracking sea level changes. Thursday, March 29, from 1:20 p.m. until 5 p.m.

The "Keynote Address: Global Barrier Islands in a Time of Rising Sea Levels," by Orrin Pilkey, the James B. Duke Professor of Earth Science Emeritus in the Division of Earth and Ocean Sciences in the Nicholas School of the Environment at Duke University, will be Thursday, March 29 from 6:30 p.m. until 7:30 p.m. in Ballroom ABC.

Dub Taylor to visit campus

What started out as an itch to quench a nagging curiosity has turned into a full time occupation, or "obsession" as he calls it, and the possibility for greater things for Brewton-Parker College Instructor Mark Stokes and Georgia Southern student James Kicklighter.

Stokes, a drama and film studies instructor, and Kicklighter, a pre-communication arts major, are in post-production of a groundbreaking documentary about Walter Clarence "Dub Taylor," a character actor from Augusta, Georgia. Taylor is credited with acting in more than 200 films and television shows, and was most well known for his portrayal as Michael J. Pollard's double-crossing father in "Bonnie & Clyde."

However, most people who've seen Taylor on film never remember his name after the credits roll. The well-respected character actor, with an active, six-decade career, never played a lead role in a major motion picture.

"He pops up in everything," Stokes said.

"I had never heard of him before Mark brought this project to me in May of last year," explained Kicklighter. "But you know, there are so many talented actors and actresses in movies past and present that seem to have small, insignificant parts upon first viewing. When we look at them in retrospect, we realize that their role was the part that made the movie work."

Taylor's last role was a cameo in the 1994 blockbuster, "Maverick," starring Jodie Foster and Mel Gibson.

Taylor's recurrence in popular films without gaining notoriety among the average American moviegoer is what fascinated Stokes in the first place. Former Georgia State Representative Roger Byrd, a producer on the film, first brought

the man to his attention.

"Roger is the biggest film buff in the world," Stokes said. "Like most people, I had no idea who he was talking about, and then he showed me a picture of him and I was like, 'Oh, that guy.' In fact, that's what everyone says about him when they see him: 'Oh, that guy.' And that's going to be the name of the film: That Guy," Stokes said.

The much buzzed feature "That Guy: The Legacy of Dub Taylor" will premiere in Taylor's hometown of Augusta, Georgia on April 14, 2007 at the Morris Museum of Art. This film has taken Stokes and Assistant Director and Executive Producer James Kicklighter big places, interviewing Taylor's friends and co-workers, including director David Zucker ("Airplane," "The Naked Gun," "Scary

Movie 4"), Don Collier ("The High Chaparral," "Little House on the Prairie"), Dixie Carter ("Desperate Housewives," "Designing Women"), the Grammy-winning Riders in the Sky ("Monsters, Inc," "Toy Story 2," "Cars"), Cheryl Rogers-Barnett (daughter of Roy Rogers), novelist Bill Gulick ("The Hallelujah Trail," "Snake River Country"), Emmy Award Winning Stunt Coordinator and Grandson of Dub Taylor, Matt Taylor ("24," "Déjà Vu," "Kill Bill: Vol. 2"), son of Dub Taylor, Buck Taylor ("Gunsmoke," "The Alamo," "Comanche Moon"), among many others. Additionally, the project has already received affirmation from several in the film industry, including Peter Fonda ("3:10 to Yuma," "Wild Hogs," "Ghost Rider") and Bill Cosby ("The Cosby Show"), with assistance

from Academy Award winner Dana Adam Shapiro ("Murderball"), Christa Maerker ("Die Schweizermacher"), an award-winning German documentary filmmaker, also serves as Supervising Producer for the project.

Another unique feature of this film is that the feature-length documentary is counted as the first in-depth look at a man who most in the industry knew and respected, but was content to stay out of the limelight.

"Dub didn't want awards; that wasn't his goal. He just wanted to make enough money to support his family and his hobbies; hunting and fishing," Stokes said. "His family has been very supportive of the film, and his son, Buck, and grandchildren, Matt and Cooper, have been interviewed for the film."

The managing editor for news (with the assistance of the news editor) will be responsible for the preparation of the front page. The managing editor for news is responsible for the overall day-to-day operations and office management of the newspaper, its subordinate divisions (advertising, marketing and production), and all companion publications or related media. The managing editor for news serves as the chief operations officer for the newspaper.

Managing Editor for Operations -- The managing editor for operations should have completed at least one year at Georgia Southern and should have served at least one semester on a student publications staff. The managing editor for operations should be familiar with basic journalistic practices such as newsgathering and reporting practices, news and feature writing, copy editing and proofreading, photojournalism, web design, layout and design and media law and ethics. The managing editor for operations will be responsible for coordinating the editorial content on the website gadaily.com, such as news, sports, features, companion publications or related media and other duties as assigned by the executive editor. The managing editor for operations will work with all entities of student media to determine web coverage and content.

News Editor -- The news editor should know basic news writing and should be familiar with news sources on campus. The news editor should demonstrate news judgment and should have served at least one semester on the staff of the paper. The news editor will be responsible for all newsgathering and reporting operations of the newspaper, including recruiting reporters, providing training in the basics of newsgathering and writing, working in cooperation with the managing editors on staffing the news, features, sports, photography and related departments, maintaining an assignment calendar for the benefit of all departments of the newspaper, and other duties as assigned. The news editor assists the managing editor for news in the preparation of the front page for each edition and coordinates with the managing editor for operations on any online content.

Constitutional showdown

President Bush and the Democratic-controlled Congress careened closer to a full-blown legal showdown over the firing of federal prosecutors Wednesday as a House subcommittee voted subpoenas for top administration officials in defiance of the White House.

"After two months of stonewalling, shifting stories and misleading testimony, it is clear that we are still not getting the truth about the decision to fire these prosecutors and its cover-up," said Rep. Linda Sanchez, Democrat from California.

In response, an unyielding White House threatened to rescind its day-old proposal for top strategist Karl Rove and other officials to answer lawmakers' questions away from the glare of television lights and not under oath.

"If they issue subpoenas, yes, the offer is withdrawn," said presidential spokesman Tony Snow. Democrats "will have rejected the offer," he said.

Despite the rhetoric, Rep. John Conyers, chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, repeatedly suggested there was room for negotiations in a confrontation that has threatened Attorney General Alberto Gonzales' hold on his job and forced his chief of staff to resign.

"What we're voting on today is merely a backup," said the Michigan Democrat.

Still, it seemed likely the next act would be a separate vote Thursday in the Senate Judiciary Committee to approve a second set of subpoenas for Rove, former White House counsel Harriet Miers and William Kelley, who was Miers' deputy.

Senate Democrats, in particular, have been insistent on gaining testimony under oath, and Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., dismissed the idea that Rove would be allowed to answer questions on the White

House's terms. "Anyone who would take that deal isn't playing with a full deck," he said.

Republicans forced a delay in a vote on Senate subpoenas a week ago, and it was not clear whether any of the GOP members of the panel were now prepared to support them.

Sen. Arlen Specter of Pennsylvania is the senior Republican on the panel, and Democrats were hoping he would side with them.

The clash comes less than 100 days after the new Democratic-controlled Congress took power and pledged to confront Bush aggressively.

220 gay couples in New Jersey seek marriage rights through civil unions

State officials announced Tuesday that some 220 civil unions were performed in the month since New Jersey began recognizing same-sex couples' right to marriage benefits, a figure far below what gay activists had anticipated.

"It appears that same-sex couples are waiting for the real thing," said Steven Goldstein, head of Garden State Equality. "We happen to think it makes sense to fight tooth and nail for marriage equality, but also to register for a civil union to afford yourself the protection, even if it's less than full equality."

So far, the state has received 219 license applications from municipal registrars since the law went into effect on Feb. 19. Of those, 13 were in Bergen County and two were in Passaic County. Morris County had 15; Hudson County had 19.

Local registrars have 30 days to send in the paperwork, which causes a reporting lag.

"These numbers reflect only the paperwork we've received so far, so there are likely more civil unions that have been performed and we just haven't gotten the notices yet," Health Department spokesman Tom Slater said.

The trickle of civil union registrants contrasts sharply with the 1,700 couples who registered in the first month the state offered domestic partnerships two years ago. Domestic partnerships grant only a handful of the hundreds of benefits of marriage.

Why, then, did gay couples flood local registrars then, and not now?

In 2004, there was a sense of tremendous breakthrough. But by last year, when the state Supreme Court was poised to rule on a lawsuit by seven same-sex couples seeking the right to marry, many court watchers, on both sides, expected the panel would rule for marriage.

In the end, the state Supreme Court, in *Lewis v. Harris*, held unanimously that same-sex couples were entitled to all of the state's 850 marital rights and protections. But the justices split 4-3 on whether that legal recognition should be called "marriage." The majority ruled that the decision rested with the Legislature. And instead of opting for marriage, lawmakers chose civil unions.

"The sense of second-class citi-

zenship was a lot stronger this time around," said David Buckel, the Lambda Legal attorney who argued the case before the court. "And then when lots of problems cropped up with civil unions, people who were already hesitant to embrace a relationship stamped as inferior decided not to go through with it, because what was the point?"

Indeed, he and others maintain that recent experience has only underscored just how inadequate "separate but equal" is.

In the past month, Goldstein said, his organization has received complaints from 20 "civil-unioned" couples who have encountered resistance from employers, hospitals, and insurers that have refused to extend marriage benefits despite the couples' legal status.

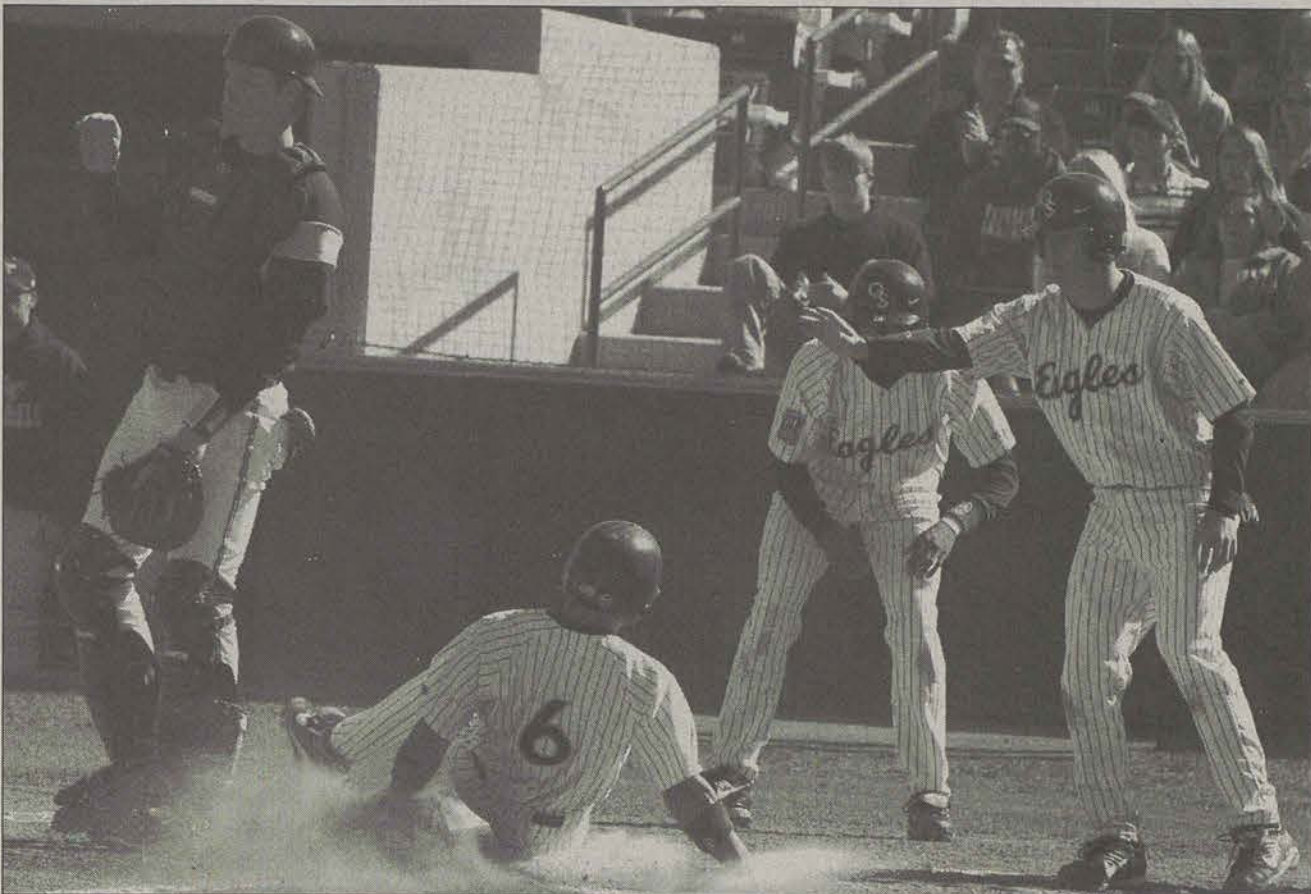

Eagles begin conference play against Furman on Friday night

After a long and successful non-conference campaign, the Georgia Southern baseball team hopes to take advantage when they open conference play this weekend against SoCon rival Furman.

The Eagles are coming off a three game win streak against Lipscomb University where the team had an average of 23 hits a game ending up with a .384 average.

"It was very important to complete the sweep. This will keep the team positive heading into this week of practice and preparing for the home conference opener next weekend," said pitcher Aaron Eubanks.

The Eagles lead the Paladins 41-25 all time, going 1-2 against Furman last season.

Leading the way for GSU has been a slew of offensive players along with some good

pitching from sophomore Drew Murray. Murray will start at least one game against Furman, which bodes well for the Eagles because he has been nearly unhittable. In his last outing, Murray tossed all nine innings, giving up one run while striking out five in GSU's 9-1 victory over Lipscomb. He did not have one walk after throwing 102 pitches.

"I was working ahead in the count, pounding the zone and trying to get easy outs. Lately I've been working on staying on top of my fastball, trying to get it on a downward plane more where the hitters pound it into the ground," said Murray who recorded only four flyball outs. "It's huge to get run support and know you're pitching with a lead. You can go at the batters more instead of pitching around them."

The offensive power the Eagles show has been the leading force of winning games. The Eagles, as a team, are batting .319.

As for the Paladins, it's been quite a transitional year. The Paladins ended last year's season 32-23 (.584) but have started this season with a measly 4-14 (.222) record.

Although the record may not show it, Furman is equipped with power hitters. The team is led by Conner Lind who is batting .382 at the plate and leads the team in hits and runs. His presence on the field has allowed the team to feel more confident playing on the field.

"He's a true leader," said Furman Head Coach Ron Smith, "He has taken the team, and even with our record, has made them play better because they feel confident in their abilities."

The Eagles are currently 11-1 at home, with the only loss coming from Kennesaw State during the Eagle Invitational.

Softball

The Eagles struggled as they continued their long road trip, losing five of six over the break. The losing streak was snapped in the most recent game, a win over Minnesota, 3-1. Women's Tennis

The Eagles opened up conference play with two big wins over Appalachian State 6-1 and Wofford 4-3. They then lost a tight match against Elon, 4-3.

In fact, you're more likely to see him when we're on the road sitting in a corner with all the student trainers than with his teammates."

Smith remembered Oden's official visit to OSU as a high school senior. As part of the trip, Oden insisted on meeting the dean of the business school.

Smith noticed that Oden was carrying around a thick notebook with all sorts of color-coded tabs on the side. When he went into the meeting with the dean, the notebook was tucked under his arm. "I asked the dean what took them so long," Smith said. "He told me that Greg opened up that notebook and had pages and pages of questions he had written down, and he asked every one of them."

Don't party too hard. That was the lesson that many St. Patrick's Day celebrators learned last weekend. There were an astonishing 127 arrests made by the Savannah-Chatham Metropolitan Police Department between 9 p.m. Friday and 9 p.m. Saturday.

Sgt. Mike Wilson gave insight on how to stay out of sticky situations and keep out of handcuffs. "First, I would say be 21 years old." Underage drinking is a serious issue and a few of the arrests made last weekend were for minors making that mistake.

The Savannah-Chatham Metropoli-

tan Police Department website provides a whole page on how to stay out of trouble on St. Patrick's Day. The first is to park in designated areas.

There are also strict guidelines on alcohol, with only 16 oz. amounts allowed and with drinking cups must be made out of either plastic, styro-foam, or paper. The webpage also provides a map of where the parade will be (Festival Area) and also where it is illegal to park.

"Public urination was the biggest problem and called for the most arrests," said Wilson. "People should just find the closest Porter-potty." Wilson also said that another reason people were being arrested was for the use of illegal drugs and public fighting.

Simply moving out of the way during the busy day will save you an arrest said Wilson.

"When an officer asks you to move don't just stand there, move out of the way." This is not a very complex thing to do, but it would help the police officer keep others safe and you out of jail.

This year was one of the busiest St. Patrick's days in a decade. The new police chief has taken measures to keep visitors safe, but a good knowledge of the rules is your best bet.

Brush up on the laws before you go, or else you end up like one unfortunate individual and learn that it's against the law to take a swim in the Savannah River.

This party game for Xbox 360 is set in space and combines futuristic arcade action, mini-games, tournament modes, and custom tailored games with online features such as multiplayer and customizable tournaments.

Players are able to create their own unique tournaments that can be shared on Xbox Live, while building achievement points.

Gamers can also use tournament cards that are either won or given out to defeat their opponents in rank, select the next mini-game to be played, or choose their next destination planet. The game offers a variety of 40 mini games that a wide audience can play.

Players battle new tournaments on seven different planets by competing in games such as the Collision Collision, Turbine Jumper, and Super Slam Dunk which is a advanced slam dunk shootout played in low gravity where players try to steal the ball from their challengers to score a slam dunk.

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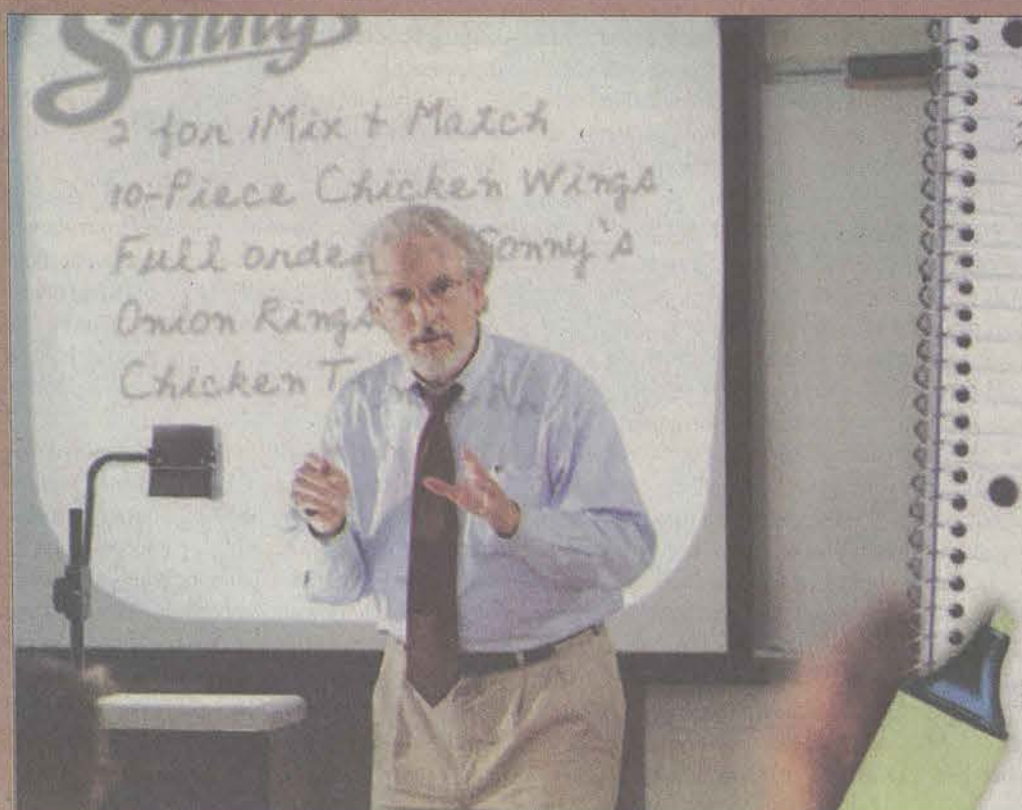


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
