Students' alcohol consumption rising

Study shows emerging trend that university students are abusing alcohol, drugs more

From Monday morning until Wednesday afternoon, Georgia Southern student's thoughts are focused on school, classes and

But by Thursday, that eagerness turns into excitement as the weekend approaches, promising memories of laughter, good times and sometimes,

According to a recently released study by Columbia University, the number of students taking part in binge drinking and substance abuse has seen a steady increase from the mid 1990s.

Alcohol abuse, the widest form of abuse, has not had a large growth in the number of students who drink, but instead the amount they drink has increased.

Patrick Kropp, a bartender at Gnat's Landing recognizes this trend. "Some people come in and want to drink, others just want a beer and then get back to studying,"

he said. Kropp said he has not seen the increase over the past several years at GSU.

Other universities have noticed the trend as well. Students are drinking to become intoxicated as fast as they possibly can," said University of Kentucky administrator Victor

Along with alcohol, drug use has become more accepted and viewed as the norm for campuses. Drug abuse is on the rise with statistics claiming the use of illicit drugs increased by six percent since 1993.

According to "USA Today", marijuana and cocaine are showing a sign of a comeback as cocaine use has doubled among the percentage of college students who have used it.

Senior Joseph Stokes thinks that the drug use problem starts with the individual. "Everybody is curious but it's up to the user to be responsible about their decisions," he said.

oral contraceptive costs

Until recently, getting lowcost birth control was relatively easy. Now, women who get their oral contraceptive birth control prescriptions filled through college health centers are seeing cost increase for the pills almost

double. The change is happening at colleges and universities nation wide, including here at Georgia

Southern. The increase follows a change in a Medicaid rebate law that has reduced incentives for drug companies to give large discounts on drugs sold to universities, according to a recent AP report. The reason for this discount is because most who are on "the Pill" tend to

stay on the same prescription for years at a time.

"Little by little, they [Congress] have chipped away at the program," said Curtis Hames, health services chief of staff at GSU.

Congress passed a bill in 2005 that said for companies to participate in Medicaid, they must pay more. Prices for oral contraceptives are doubling and tripling at universities throughout the United States.

This has some health officials worried that students who fill their prescriptions through the campus health care centers will shift to less preventative birth control methods or stop using birth control all together. Many women who fill birth control prescriptions through the






MIT professor to present math lecture

A noted mathematician from the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) will deliver the 2007 Distinguished Lecture in Mathematics at Georgia Southern.

Gilbert Strang will present the lecture on Thursday, April 19, at 6 p.m. in the College of Information Technology Building room 1004.

"Teaching and Learning Computational Science and Engineering" is the title of Strang's lecture, which is free and open to the public.

The lecture will be preceded by a reception with refreshments starting at 5:30 p.m.

Strang is known not only as a professor of mathematics at MIT, but also as a fellow of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences and an honorary fellow of Balliol College.

His research interests include linear algebra, numerical analysis, partial differential equations, wavelets and filter banks, applied mathematics and engineering mathematics.

Strang has earned numerous honors, including the Distinguished University Teacher award from the Northeastern Section of the Mathematical Association of America in

2006 and the von Neumann Prize Medal of the U.S. Association of Computational Mechanics in 2005.

Strang has also published six textbooks and served as an editor for 20 mathematics journals.

In addition, he has chaired the U.S. National Committee on Mathematics and served as president of the Society for Industrial and Applied Mathematics.

The Distinguished Lecture in Mathematics at GSU is an annual event sponsored by the Allen E. Paulson College of Science and Technology and the department of Mathematical Sciences.

GSU's Atlanta office moved to a new, bigger location in Alpharetta.

With more than one-third of its students coming from the Greater Atlanta area and with more than one-fourth of its alumni living there, Georgia Southern has solid connections to the city.

In fact, those connections have expanded to the point that the university's Atlanta Regional Development Office has outgrown its former space in Lenox Pointe.

The office has moved to a new location at 3775 Mansell Road in Alpharetta.

"With nearly 15,000 alumni in Atlanta and the surrounding 21-county area, there's a definite need for us to have a presence there," said Frank Hook, director of Alumni Relations. "With a larger space, we'll be able to focus more on our alumni needs and activities in the Atlanta area. This office will be our hub for students seeking admissions information and a center for development needs and special events planning for the Atlanta area."

The previous location was staffed by alumni and development representatives. At the new Mansell Road location, a representative from GSU's admissions staff will be added.

Susan Davies, director of Admis-

sions, echoed Hook's comments. "One-third of our student enrollment-more than 5,600 studentscomes from the 21 counties of the Atlanta area, and that number goes up each year. With an admissions representative in Alpharetta, the university can respond in a more timely way to inquiries from students and parents in and around that area."

GSU personnel serving in the Alpharetta office will be George Freeman, director of Atlanta Regional Development; and Angelia Huggins, associate director of Atlanta Regional Development.

The admissions representative has not yet been appointed.

Freeman joined GSU earlier this year. A graduate of Harding University, he has served as director of development for non-profits in Arkansas, Texas, and Oregon. He also served as director of development at Auburn University, spearheading the university's \$169 million campaign.





Son slain in war, dad re-enlists

Father and son, Paco and Paquito, watched the television when a Girls Gone Wild commercial came on.

"I can't stand that ..." Paco said to his son. "Look at these college guys, having the time of their life with daddy's money."

Paquito probably knew a lecture was coming on. He was 17, just a few weeks beyond throwing his mortarboard into the air at the Eastern Hills High School graduation, wondering what would happen next.

Paco went on, because this is sometimes what fathers do, talk to the televisions when they're really talking to their sons.

"I went to college as a more mature man," he continued. "I had already learned about discipline and responsibility. Would I have learned it eventually anyway? Probably. But where I got

mine was in the military."

the subject changed as soon as the commercial did.

Francisco T. Martinez, Paco to those who know him, has relived that conversation countless times the past two years. It is on a constant loop in his brain, over and over — the words, the tone, the certainty in his fatherly

This is the part of grief that the psychiatrists never talk about. They say there is disbelief, yearning, anger, depression and acceptance. Never guilt, though.

But Paquito is buried in the national cemetery in Dallas, his last living 'act in the uniform of the U.S. Army, trying to bring peace to a divided neighborhood in Ramadi, Iraq.

Martinez can't help but think about that night's conversation, as it plays and replays in his mind.

He has forced himself to look Paquito never said a word, and at photos of Paquito wounded on a stretcher, read the autopsy report and pondered the motives of the man who killed him. He has tried to blame someone — President Bush, himself, the sniper.

> And he has considered the notion of service to one's country, met with themen who fought alongside Paquito, and ultimately, concluded that he wanted to be where his son was when he died — in uniform.

> Last summer, Martinez joined the Air Force Reserve, not for country, but for young men and women like Paquito.

"I may not be able to end the war or end the atrocities such as Haditha or Abu Ghraib, but if I can positively influence one of those 20-year-old kids and help him, maybe somebody else is going to come home safe," he said.

San Francisco officials and civil rights groups challenge gay marriage ban

San Francisco city officials and civil rights groups Monday urged the California Supreme Court to invalidate the state's ban on gay marriage, arguing that it violates the constitutional rights of same-sex couples.

In legal briefs filed with justices, the various groups representing same-sex couples seek to overturn a divided state appeals court ruling last year that upheld California laws prohibiting gay marriage. The state Supreme Court agreed in December to review the case, and is expected to hear arguments on the issue in the coming months.

The San Francisco-based 1st rerasaid. District Court of Appeal, in a 2-1 ruling, determined that it is up to the Legislature or voters to legalize gay marriage, not judges. The legal arguments filed Monday criticized that approach, arguing that courts must intervene when constitutional rights

"We are asking the California Supreme Court not only to assert the rights of equality and privacy uniquely enshrined in our state Constitution, but to reassert the judiciary's rightful role in interpreting it, something the appellate court failed to do," San Francisco City Attorney Dennis Her-

The legal battle over same-sex marriage dates back three years, when San Francisco Mayor Gavin Newsom allowed thousands of gay couples to wed before the Supreme Court put a halt to the wedding licenses. But the Supreme Court invited a legal challenge to the state law, prompting lawsuits by San Francisco and advocates for same-sex couples who say they should be treated the same as heterosexual couples.

A San Francisco judge initially declared the law limiting marriage to a man and woman unconstitutional, but that ruling was overturned by the appeals court.

The company's board accepted a revised \$34-dollar-a-share proposal from real estate magnate Sam Zell to take the company private in a complex, \$8.2 billion deal.

In addition, the Tribune said it intends to sell the Chicago Cubs.



university do so because it is convenient and less expensive.

Costs of birth control will go up at the GSU Health Center, but not for at least a couple of months.

"We have enough of a supply to sustain until June or July," said Carol Turknett, head nurse at the center. The cost will then increase significantly. She also said that the health center was appalled to learn about the change and hopes that lobbying efforts of the ACHA will make a difference.

An estimated 39 percent of collegeaged women used oral contraceptives according to the American College Health Association (ACHA). Now

that costs have gone up, this means that the number will probably drop drastically or stay the same, with women on birth control changing with whom they fill their prescriptions. Even those who switch to generic prescriptions will see an increase in cost.

Medicare and Medicaid have made an exemption list and some have said that universities should have been at the top of the list. The ACHA has submitted a proposal for college health care centers to be added.

Until then, Turknett suggests that students make changes in their lifestyles and cut back on some activities that they can do without, like going to the movies and going out to dinner to save money. She also said that involving significant others to share the responsibility of paying for birth control would help.



The managing editor for news is responsible for the overall day-to-day operations and office management of the newspaper, its subordinate divisions (advertising, marketing and production), and all companion publications or related media. The managing editor for news serves as the chief operations officer for the newspaper.



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

Football team holds first scrimmage, Hatcher impressed with offense

The Georgia Southern football team had its first scrimmage of the spring training, Saturday morning at the GSU practice fields, drawing a crowd of about 200 spectators.

The Eagles warmed up with some drills before hitting the field for the scrimmage at 10:30 a.m. In a brief session prior to the scrimmage, the

place kicking unit went 7-of-8 on PATs, and 2-of-5

on field goal attempts. First year head coach Chris Hatcher talked about the offensive-defensive effort in the season's first full-tackle scrimmage.

"We had some good intensity," said Hatcher. "We had a lot of guys make some plays, especially on the offensive side. Defensively, we've got to do a better job of tackling, but it was the first day that we really have gone to the ground. We're hustling and we're working hard. We're only day five with a whole new scheme and a whole new staff. I think we're in pretty good shape right now

at this point in spring." Coach Hatcher was impressed with the offensive effort. The Eagles rotated four quarterbacks into the scheme after each drive. In drives starting from 30 or more yards out, the offense gained 169 yards on 19-of-34 pass attempts.

One of the offensive highlights of the day was

when junior quarterback Travis Clark hit junior wide receiver Michael McIntosh after rolling out on the right side to make the diving catch.


"I'm really impressed with the guys," added Hatcher. "We've got some great play makers and then our offensive line is pretty good. And when you've got a good offensive line, you can do a lot of things. And then you can only do what your quarterback can handle. And right now, Travis Clark has a good command of our offense. So that's enabled us to do a little more than I anticipated this early in the spring."

On the ground, the Eagles gained 113 yards on 25 carries, including a two-yard TD run by junior running back Sean Gray.

"When we come out here to scrimmage we're not really calling plays to score," said Hatcher. "We're calling plays to see what different guys can do so that we can get a good evaluation, so when spring is over, there is no doubt in our mind what each one of these boys can play."

Coach Hatcher discussed some areas of progress and improvement:

"There's no question about it, today. We've got a group of guys that have picked up a system faster than previous stops I've been at. Defensively, we've just got to pick up the intensity and that's something that's concerning right now. But we've got to get a little bit better on that side of the ball."

Webb ready for next level

His graduation from Georgia Southern will be held in May -- the same month that he will turn 23 years old. From that point forward, the world of sports will change for former Eau Gallie High standout Adam Webb.

For the past four years after an initial redshirt season, Webb has played goalie for GSU's soccer team. He posted seven shutouts in the fall as the Eagles recorded a 10-6-3 record. Webb's 15 career shutouts are a school record.

It was a successful season for a team that underwent a coaching change just before the start of the season. Webb liked his lone season playing for Kevin Kennedy, who had the label of interim coach removed after the season.

"Wewere willing to work, and he was willing to listen," said Webb, who allowed an average of 1.23 goals a game. "He understands the game really well and how to manage players and their strong points of play. He molded us well and fast and into a system."

Webb is eager to discover other systems and other styles of play. In January, he was evaluated by Major League Soccer.

"It was like an NFL Combine," the 5-foot-11, 190-pound Webb said. "The coaches rate you on a 1 to 5 scale and then, if they're interested, they can have you try out for them. They said I was above average and definitely coachable to play at the next level."

"It was good to hear from coaches that I can play," Webb said. "I'm not going to get a swelled head about it, but it's good to be recognized as a decent player. It's something I'd like to pursue, even it doesn't pay that well. It's more passion for the sport."

American goalkeepers are respected around the world, but it takes time to establish that

"It takes real good connections to go to Europe or some other country to play soccer," Webb said. "I don't have those connections. But it would be worth it to travel around to other parts of this (United States) country."

The MLS evaluators told Webb that he needs to work on his communication with the teammates in front of him. That didn't come as a surprise since it takes the savvy of a veteran to break down a match as it unfolds on the pitch.

"I did a better job of that this past season," Webb said. "Coach (Kennedy) harped on that and it came naturally as we played more matches. It's not something that your teammates will talk about. For most of the team, it's a given. They'll give you a quick nod or a thumb's up if you warn them about a guy who's not marked or someone moving into a 5-yard area that's open."

The game was scoreless through the first three innings until Brian McCann hit a tworun homer in the top of the fourth to give the Braves an early 2-0 lead.

Philadelphia did not get on the board until the bottom of the fifth, when Jimmy Rollins hit a solo home run off of Smoltz. The Phillies scored again in the next inning. Wes Helms doubled to center field to drive in Pat Burrell to tie the score at 2.

The very next batter, Aaron Rowland, gave the Phillies the lead, 3-2, when he hit a pop up to center field that bounced off Braves second Philadelphia.

The score remained 3-2 in Philadelphia's favor until the top of the eighth, when Renteria hit his first homer of the night. This was a solo shot to deep center off Myers to tie

Renteria's homer in the 10th gave the Braves the first win of the season by a final


"If we seek perfection in an imperfect world we will never be satisfied, and inevitably we will pass down this fixation to others. This is a warped view of beauty."
