If you snooze you lose

New attendance policy to go into effect beginning this summer

If you plan on taking classes in the upcoming semesters, you better double check your alarm clock and map out your way to classes before hand.

Starting this summer semester, if you miss the first day, you will be dropped from the class and others who are waiting to join will get your seat.

Some believe this may be an effective way in implementing a policy for those who are waiting to enroll into a class, but others are not so enthusiastic about this new attendance policy.

"I think it's another nonsense rule in an attempt to tame the students," said junior Daniel White.

"They should have it more organized for students that are actually signed up, because I've signed up for some classes and not been on the role."

According to White, he has tried to sign up for classes that were full, but always showed up to the class, and never had any problems obtaining a seat.

Many students think this new policy may be enforced but still may not solve the problem, since the university may drop students from classes who need the class, or may have a bad or unlucky first day.

"I don't think it will be beneficial because a lot of weird things happen your first day," said senior Terrance

Eppe. "You may get lost, or the role may not get around to you."

Although some students are wary of the changes being made, some teachers think it will help eliminate the students who are too lazy to drop and wait until the last minute before they are charged for the class.

"I have few students who may wait a week and never show and then drop," said Dharma Adhikari, a journalism professor at GSU. "I always have students who want to get into my class, but the University is growing and it is a matter of staffing and time."

In some of the upper level major classes, professors do not experience an attendance problem on the first day. Adrian Gardiner, an Information

Systems Professor at GSU, is one of them.

"For my classes, which are senior classes, the students are generally locked into the course," Gardiner explained. "So attendance problems are pretty rare."

Gardiner added that a section may be full in his department, but occasionally they have extra spaces for students with special circumstances.

The new attendance policy has certain emergency exemptions, but for those who get lost or wake up late, this policy will not be in his or her favor.

Are campus crosswalks a danger to GSU students?

For many students, walking from apartment complexes onto campus during the day is a relaxing time. A time that can be used to reflect upon the day's activities and clear their minds, but for others it is a fight for safety.

More and more students on campus are complaining about crosswalk safety and the need for more crosswalks at areas with heavy traffic and many pedestrians.

But crosswalk safety can be an enigma, not all students know the laws or the proper procedures at crosswalk sites.

According to peds.org, a member-based pedestrian advocacy group based out of Atlanta, Georgia Legislature changed the crosswalk law in 1995. Drivers approaching crosswalks with pedestrians in them must stop and stay stopped, not just yield to them.

This is where the danger can begin. Drivers who are not paying close enough attention to the road can fail to see a pedestrian or biker.

But on the other hand, pedestrians sometimes use the "right of way" law to their advantage, walking

in front of traffic and expecting the cars to stop for them.

Brian Dekle, a senior psychology major was hit on his bicycle while on campus attempting to ride on a crosswalk last year.

A car pulled out and hit him sideways on Forest Drive near the Newton Building.

"In my opinion, campus crosswalks and bike lanes are not safe. Some of my friends and I have been hit by cars multiple times, and I was not at fault," he said.

According to Dekle, who rides his bike most everywhere on campus, most people in cars on campus do not yield to pedestrians or bikers unless they are at a stoplight and have to come to a complete stop.

Ken Brown, head of Public Safety at Georgia Southern, sees the problem in a different way.

"The crosswalks need to be more visible to everyone... there have been requests for more signage," he said.

Brown also said that the public safety officials do not have too many incidents involving crosswalks, but have had problems in the past with pedestrians who have gotten hit.

Enrollment key to GSU's success

The school we now call Georgia Southern has undergone many changes in the past century from name changes, to athletics, to building projects, but one thing about the school has not changed. For 100 years the school has been focused and excited about increasing the number of students educated on campus.

First chartered in 1906, and by 1908 the number of students enrolled at First District A&M was just 98, significantly less than the 16,000 currently enrolled now.

Twenty years later, in May of 1928, the college graduated 82 students from the now Georgia Normal College, according to an article published in the George-Anne on May 26, 1928.

"This has been the most successful year in the history of the college," the article said.

In the following years, the schools attendance grew as the college focused on increasing enrollment and improving student life.

The school's first mass graduation happened in May 2000 where, according to Assistant Registrar Velma Burden, approximately "1400 or 1500 [graduated] the first year."

While not the largest graduation this school has seen, this semester will see the graduation of approximately 2,000 students. The graduates will walk across the field next Saturday, May 5 to receive their diplomas. This number, Burden, is only a little higher than last year's.

Cleared for graduation?

Graduation will be held Saturday May 5 at Paulson stadium at 9 a.m. or in the Hanner Field House in case of rain with varying times. Graduation is fast approaching. There are a lot of things that soon to be graduates need to get done before graduation.

All the information needed for graduation should be covered in the commencement brochure they should have received in the mail. It is also available online at <http://students.georgiasouthern.edu/registrar/graduation.htm>. If you have any questions not covered in the brochure call the registrar office at 912-681-0070.

But here a few things to make sure you get done, one, if you haven't already, make sure you have been cleared for graduation. This involves completing a graduation clearance

form, submitting and hearing back from the school. You will be able to pick up your graduation attire at the RAC Thursday, May 3 from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. and Friday May 4 from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. If you have not made a reservation you should pick it up on Friday.

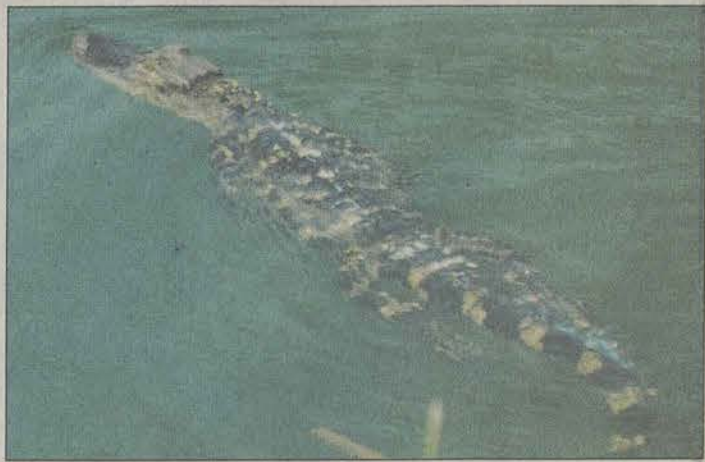
For the day of the ceremony remember to make sure you have looked over where your college is lining up and arrive at least an hour early because that is when the processions will form at 8 a.m. at gate 1, which is near the scoreboard. The tassel goes on the right side.

The brochure suggests you wear dark flat shoes, dark dresses or dark pants. Only approved academic attire may be worn so no special scarves or anything like that unless it has been approved by the school. Cell phones should be silenced and don't disrupt the ceremony in anyway, getting up to take pictures and so on.

You might want to inform family and friends who are planning to attend the ceremony that parking at Paulson is limited, but there will be a shuttle for designated parking lots on campus. It is suggested that they too arrive early around 8 a.m. to make sure they get there in time. "We would encourage people to not all try to park at the stadium," said Michael Deal, Georgia Southern's Registrar. Maps of parking areas are include in the brochure.

Check the rain plan in the brochure for more information. If it is going to be rained in to Hanner Field house the school radio station as well as other radio station will broadcast that and northland cable channels 2 and 97.

Last but not least make sure you pass all your classes so you get that diploma in the mail and don't have to go back and take summer classes unless that is what you were planning on.

Campus welcomes new 'SB' coffee shop

Students, faculty and staff that frequent the Nessmith-Lane Continuing Education Building will no longer go hungry.

Starting Tuesday,

May 1, Georgia Southern catering will offer a new food service unit, a Seattle's Best Coffee kiosk.

The unit will cater to staff members who work in the building, who often have trouble finding anything to eat, as well as patrons of the Performing Arts Center and people who attend the many conferences that go on in the facility.

"The Nessmith-Lane is almost like the 'faculty union'...it will be a quiet reprieve for coffee goers who are passing through or just needing a place to recharge," said Joseph Cason, manager of catering services.

Seattle's Best Coffee is based out of Seattle, Washington and originally opened in 1968.

The company became part of Starbucks Corporation in 2003. It had before been one of Starbucks major competitors.

The coffee Seattle's Best offers is much milder in taste than Starbucks. The kiosk will offer regular, decaffeinated and flavored coffee. It will also offer flavor shots for the coffee. Chocolate-tinis will also be offered.

For those who do not just want a drink, the coffee stand will sell fresh Otis Spunkmeyer cookies, along with bagels, muffins and potato chips.

Staff members that work in the Nessmith-Lane Building are look-

ing forward to the new addition.

"We are excited about it coming here and being in the building, we expect the traffic flow to increase and for people to become more aware of what we do here," said Margaret Lee Jones, administrative specialist for operations.

Near the kiosk will be bistro tables with cushioned chairs to relax in or check E-mail, because the building is now wireless.

There will also be two large water fountains in the kiosk area.

Operating hours will be Monday through Friday from 8:30 a.m. to 2:30 p.m.

These classes are designed to incorporate a state of mental well being with physical fitness.

CRI also offers a resource center in the Fitness and Wellness Center, located on the second level of the RAC.

Students get ahead with EIP program

Perspective first year students on the deferred enrollment list can plan to attend Georgia Southern through the Eagle Incentive Program (EIP).

The requirements for a student to enroll in GSU are GPA score of at least 2.0 and SAT score of 1000. As the University becomes more established, it will become harder for students to be accepted.

Christopher Caplinger, academic director in the first year experience (FYE) office said, "EIP allows students that would have gotten into GSU before the new requirements were set, a

chance to not only enroll but get ahead of other freshmen students."

EIP was started in 2004. During that year, EIP had a return rate of 95 percent for the fall semester. Ninety percent returned in 2005 and 98 percent in 2006. In order to return in the fall, students have to retain a 2.0 GPA.

Students enrolled in this program have to take seven credit hours during the summer term B.

During the term, they are required to fill their seven credit hours with English 1101 and a one credit hour class GSU 1210. Students can then choose one more class, Business 1105, Economics 2105, Geography 1130, or

Math 1111.

Logistic major Xazier Pitts said, "Being a part of this program gave me a chance to get used to the campus. I met lots of people and had an opportunity to get a head start on my classes."

While it is an opportunity to get ahead, students should be aware of the rigorous schedule that comes with the program.

"Taking seven hours during the summer is like taking 21 hours during the fall or spring semester," said Caplinger. "I would not suggest students work while in the program. It would be too demanding."

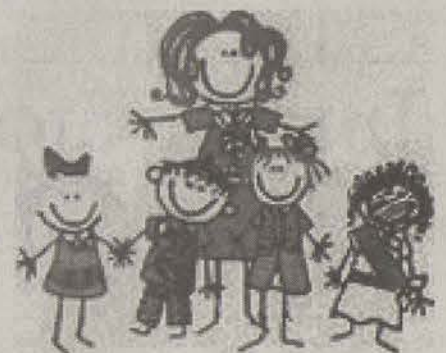

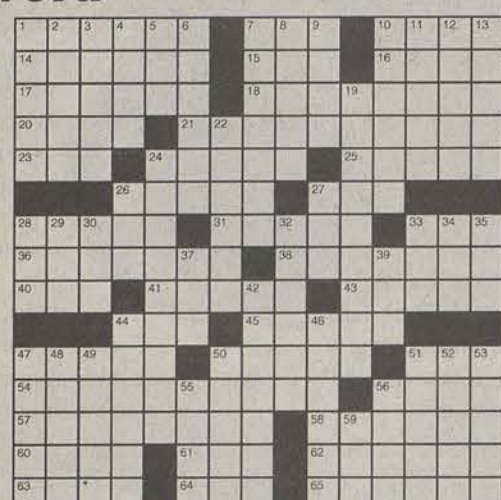

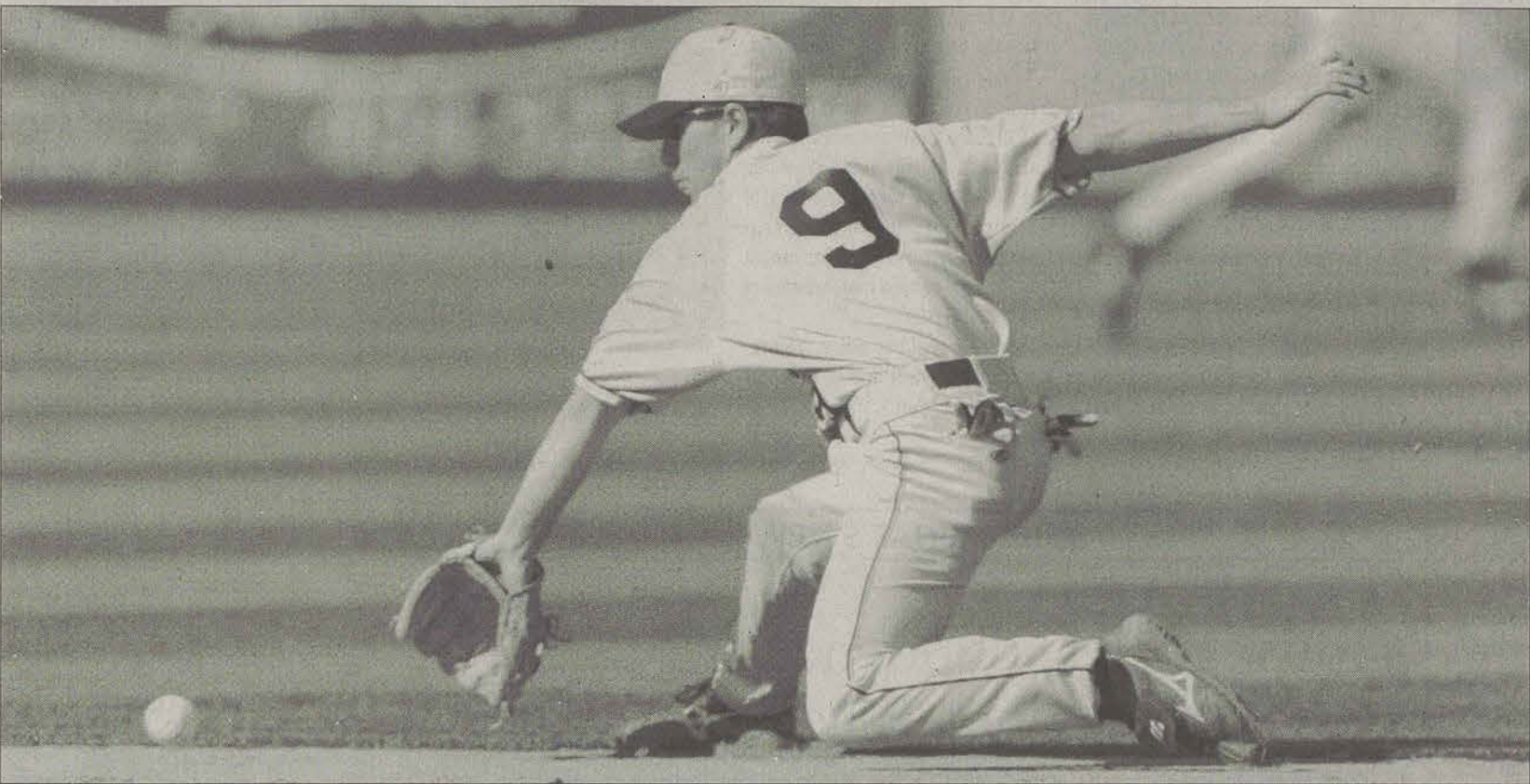

Eagles compete sweep of Georgia State Panthers

Matt Miller hit a home run and drove in four runs to allow Georgia Southern to come back from an early deficit to score 11 unanswered runs during the middle innings and defeat Georgia State 13-9 Wednesday afternoon at J.I. Clements Stadium. The Eagles (24-22 overall) completed the two-game sweep of their in-state rival.

The Panthers (20-22) jumped on the board quickly in the first inning. Charlie Pelt hit his second home run of the series, and 10th this season, a 2-run shot to right field on John Ducey's 3-2 pitch with one out. Luke Gordon followed with a triple to centerfield. The infield was pulled in when Matt Van Horn hit a sharp grounder that went off Ducey's glove to second baseman Jeremy Beckham.

His throw home to Griffin Benedict easily got Gordon out at the plate. Ducey got a strikeout to end the inning.

Chris Shehan knocked the first of his two doubles in the game to start the second inning. Will Southwell lined a single to centerfield. Shehan held up at third but scored the Eagles' first run when Eric Suttle bobbled the ball. Brian Pierce hit a grounder that went through the legs of shortstop Chase Childers, allowing Southwell to tie the game.

Georgia State plated four runs in the fourth inning. Dusty Bennett lined a 2-run single. Suttle hit a RBI single then two batters later a threw an error on a potential double play ball allowing another run to score, giving the Panthers a 6-2 lead. But from there it was all GSU. Some clutch two-out hitting during the Eagles' half of the frame tied the game. A single from Southwell, and Pierce and Beckham getting hit by a pitch loaded the bases.

Relief pitcher Joel Reeves (2-1) got the second out of the inning. Matt Miller lined a 2-run double down the right field line. Jeremiah Parker delivered a single to left

field that tied the game.

Shehan led off the fifth hitting his second double, number 14 this season for the sophomore third baseman. He eventually scored on Pierce's single with two outs that bounced over the head of third baseman Bradley Logan.

The Eagles broke the game open in the sixth, scoring six times. Mike Economos doubled down the left field line to start the inning. Miller greeted Robert Hasenfelt by taking his first pitch over the right field fence. Parker scored when the Eagles hit into a double play. A wild pitch brought home the fourth run of the inning. A single from David Richardson then walk to Pierce and Beckham reaching on an error loaded the bases. Economos delivered a 2-run single to centerfield extending the lead to 13-6.

Georgia State scored three times in the ninth. Pinch-hitter Kevin Dooley hit a two-out double that scored two Panthers.

Miller finished 2-for-5 with four RBI and two runs, including his second

home run this year and team-leading 16th double. Economos finished 2-for-2 with two RBI while Shehan added two hits and scored twice.

Richardson went 2-for-5 when six different Eagles turned in a multi-hit effort. Southwell tied his personal-high with three hits and scored three runs. Parker added three hits and two RBI as the Eagles banged out 16 hits in the game.

David Cogswell picked up the win in relief, improving to 2-0. He gave up two hits in 2.1 scoreless innings. Ducey was charged for four runs on six hits in 3.1 innings, striking out four. Kyle Kamppi and Blake Nation threw 1.1 and 1.0 scoreless innings of relief, respectively.

Starter Brandon McCreery allowed five runs on five hits in 3.1 innings. Reeves suffered the loss after giving up three runs on five hits in 1.2 innings.

Jean-Michel Rochon-Salvas had three hits while four other Panthers had two hits a piece.

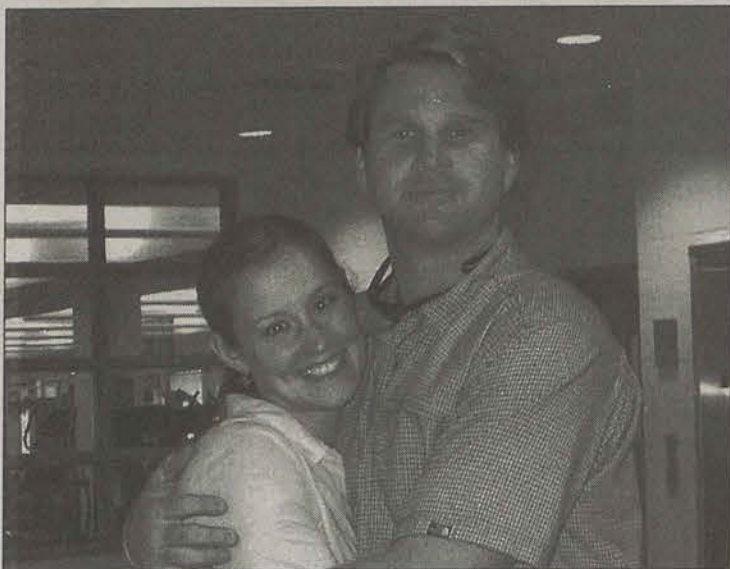
Women's Basketball

House ready to vote on Iraq funding

It may look like an exercise in futility for Democrats: Congress will vote again this week to start withdrawing U.S. forces from Iraq, only to get knocked down by President Bush's promised veto as soon as the legislation reaches his desk.

But it's also a historic confrontation over the Iraq war between the Democratic-led Congress and a determined president. Bush has cast but one veto as president, against expanding stem-cell research. He'll cast his second to sustain his war policy in Iraq.

Democrats don't have the two-thirds majorities needed in the House

of Representatives and the Senate to override his veto, though the House is expected to try next week. But Democrats say they have the wind of public opinion behind them, and they'll keep pushing Bush to wind down the war until they prevail.

This week the withdrawal debate is attached to a \$124 billion measure that mainly funds the wars in Iraq and Afghanistan through September. The bill now calls for a withdrawal of U.S. forces to start no later than Oct. 1, and by July 1 if Iraq's government fails to meet certain benchmarks of political progress.

It sets a goal, but not a requirement, that the withdrawal be complete by next April 1.

House panel subpoenas RNC documents, Rice

As Republicans protested, Rep. Henry Waxman's panel cast a party-line vote to subpoena Secretary of State Condoleezza Rice to testify on prewar intelligence. Waxman said the highly unusual step was necessary because Rice won't appear voluntarily. "The secretary of state is giving us no choice," he said.

The panel's Democratic majority also voted to compel the Repub-

lican National Committee to provide documents and testimony about the possible use of RNC e-mail accounts by administration officials to skirt compliance with the Presidential Records Act, which requires all official government e-mail records to be preserved. The investigation also will examine the possible improper use of government agency resources for election purposes

Federal authorities arrest mail bomb suspect

Federal authorities early Wednesday arrested a local man believed to be "The Bishop," an elusive mail-bomb suspect who has spent the past two years making threats against investment firms across the United States. John P. Tomkins, 42, was charged

with one count of mailing a threatening communication with intent to extort and one count of possession of an unregistered destructive device.

Tomkins was taken into custody without incident in Dubuque, Iowa.

\$4 a gallon? Not as unlikely as you think

The last time gasoline prices approached \$3 a gallon nationwide, hurricanes had ripped apart the Gulf Coast oil infrastructure and world oil supplies were stressed.

Today, oil supplies aren't pinched, but rusty U.S. refineries aren't producing enough gasoline to meet demand, which is driving up pump prices ahead of summer's peak driving season, and some fear \$4 a gallon gas looms soon.

To be sure, experts disagree. Some think today's high gasoline prices, a nationwide average of about \$2.85 a gallon, are near their peak. Others warn that we haven't seen anything yet.

One potential disruption of the United States oil industry is a threatened union strike May 9 at four Belgian refineries.

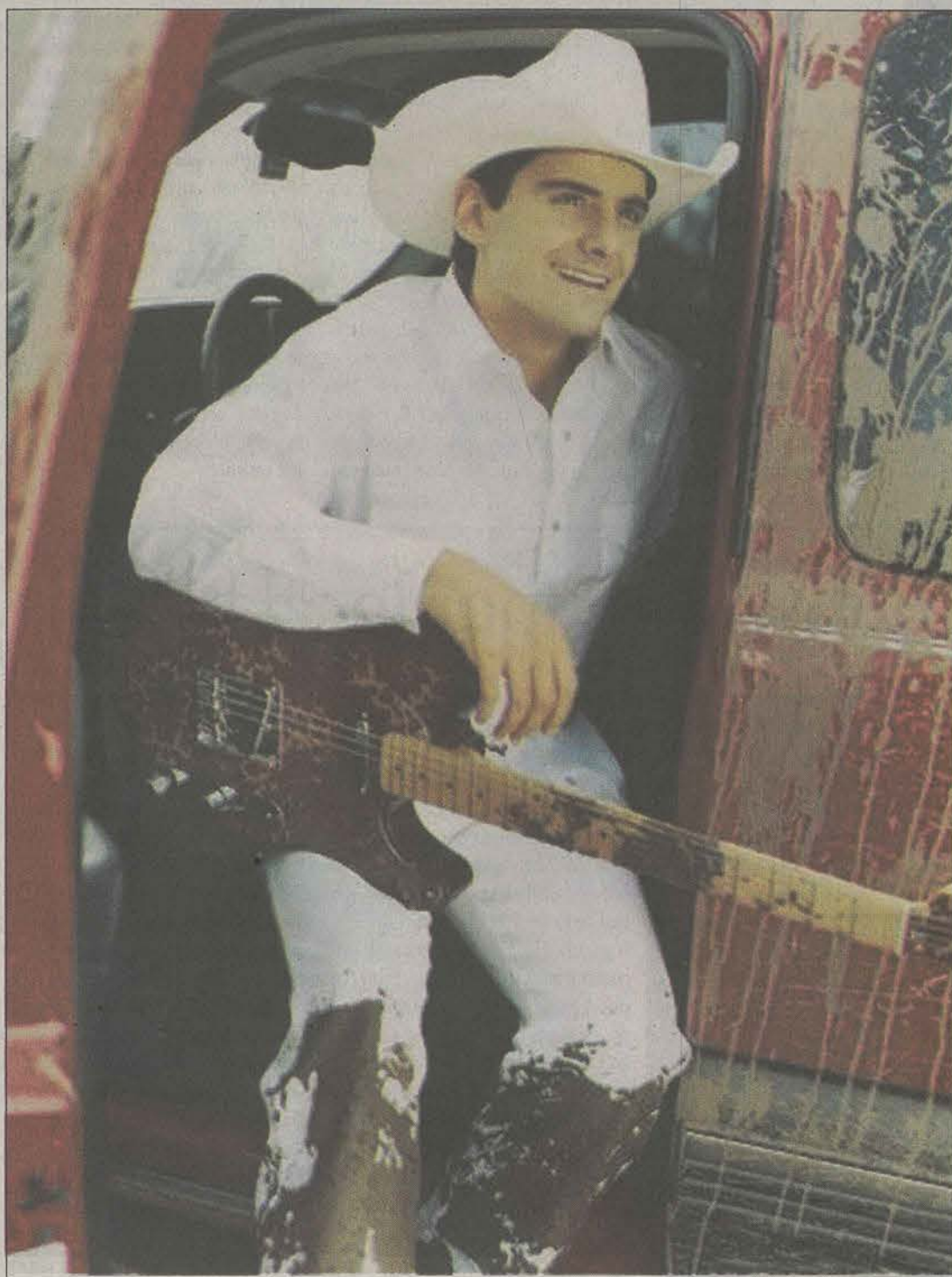

They just played the Taste of Chaos Tour with The Used, 30 Seconds To Mars and Saosin.

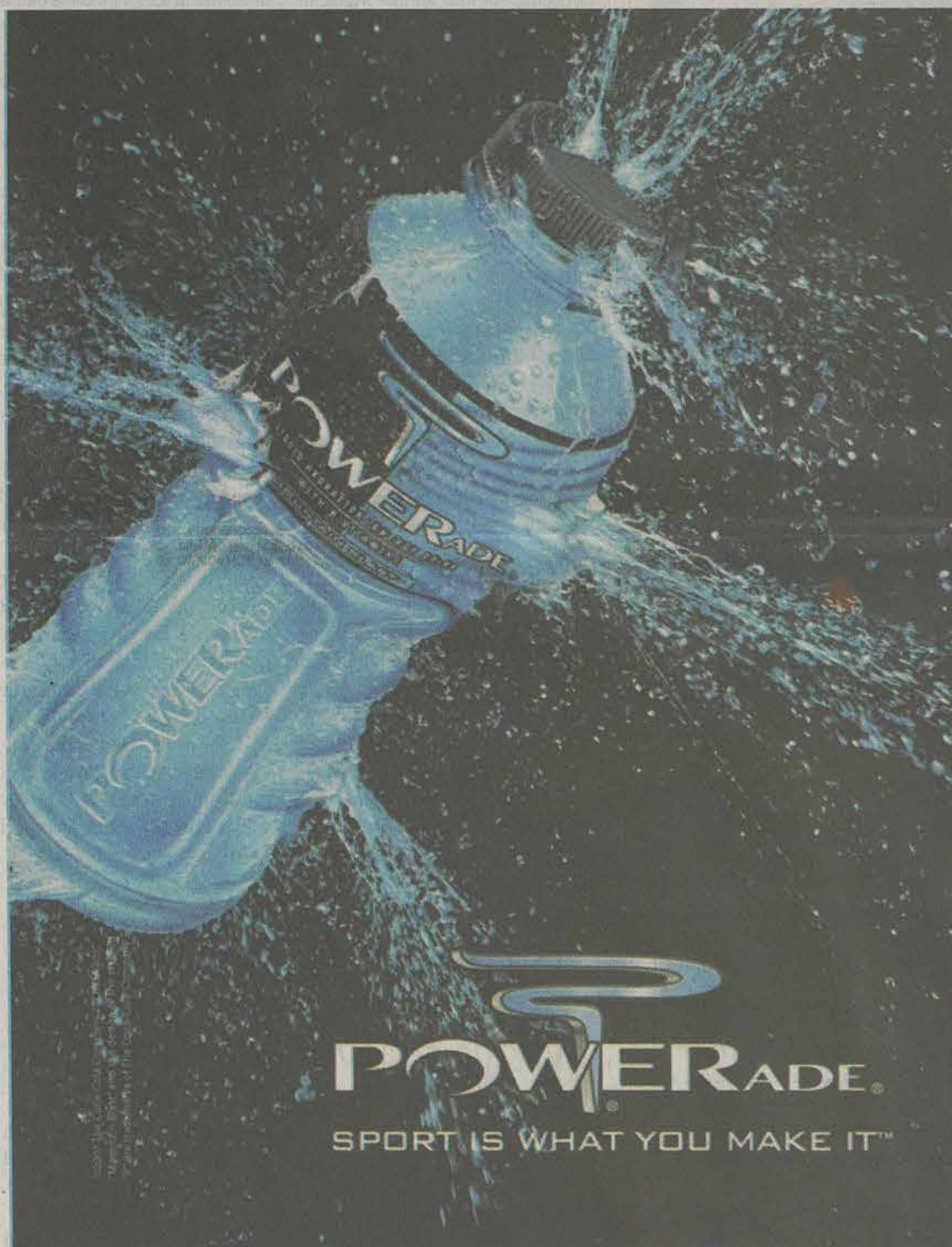

JUDGES CAST THEIR 'LOT' FOR FOX

The first round of judges on Fox's summer reality series "On the Lot" include a "Star Wars" star and a trio of blockbuster directors.

This Week : The final frontier - Earth like planet discovered

"Space: the final frontier." These fated words hail the beginning of nearly every Star Trek episode aired. In the series the various crew and captains explore space, discovering new worlds and alien life.

However, reality has always been starkly different from the fantasies presented in the television shows.

A large problem is that much of the universe is so far away that, with current technology, it would

take thousands of years to reach most of locations.

In addition to this, popular theories always stated that the chances of there being a planet with the mass of earth, water and close enough to a sun so that the water would be in a liquid state were slim. So slim that many scientists thought that Earth was a freak accident.

However, a recent discovery at the European Southern Observatory may put many of those doubts and debates to rest and settle the matter of possible other Earth like

planets. Only 20 light years away, this recently discovered planet, Gliese 581, has a diameter of only 1.5 times the size of our own.

In addition, the mass of the planet is estimated to be five times Earth's. All of this combined, it means that the planet has a gravitational pull of two times our own.

In addition to this, scientists are estimating that this new planet has water and that the temperature

ranges from 0 to 40 degrees Celsius on 581.

What does that mean exactly? Converting to Fahrenheit, that's 32 to 104 degrees. Water's freezing point is 32 degrees Fahrenheit. That means there's a possibility of liquid water on 581, which means there's a high possibility of life.

The discovery of this planet means much more than just another planet like ours, but possible alien life. The details are still yet to be truly determined, but the chance is high and the hope is there.

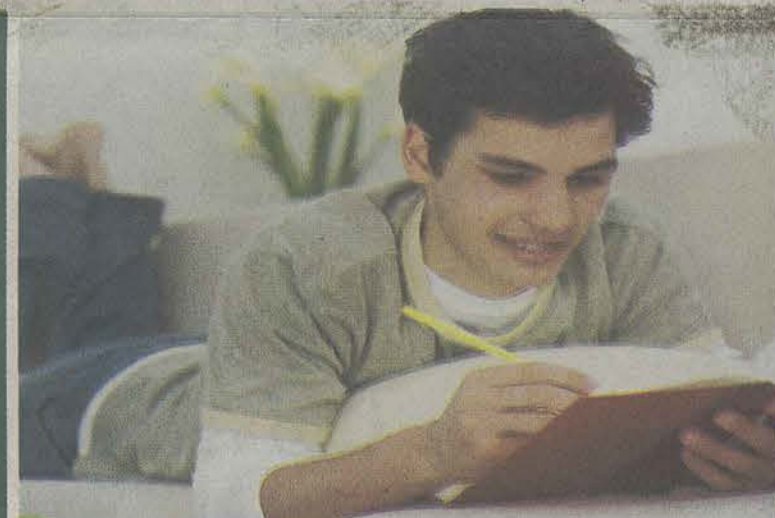
