Emergency text messaging service comes to GSU

Campus security has always been a priority at Georgia Southern, but in the wake of shootings at Virginia Tech, the campus as a whole has made a step in the direction towards tighter safety.

"We have realized that an email system was not adequate," said Ken Brown of Public Safety.

One of the more integral parts of the entire safety movement is the Emergency Messaging System, an effort to contact students immediately in case of a crisis. The system sends out a mass text message to any registered cell phone or PDA.

"It's a good to use current technology," said sophomore Mark Cameron.

However, students are not automatically signed up for the system, as it has normal text message charges for every phone that receives the message. Students have the chance to sign up for the system in My Georgia Southern.

This will allow students easy access to sign up for the service without having to integrate a new sign up system.

Generally students on campus have received the EMS well, supporting it and being willing to pay the small text message fee for their own safety.

If an emergency does happen on campus, the emergency messaging system will send out a text message to all campus community members who opt on. The message will contain official instructions from university officials.

"It's about time considering we've already had two school shootings this past semester, one in VT and the other in Canada," said senior John Saunders.

Even though the campus has been active in trying to help make itself safer, there will always be the ever present danger.

Right now, only GSU students are able to opt into the emergency system, but starting in the fall, faculty members will also be able to receive the messages. Check out <http://news.georgiasouthern.edu/emergencysystem> for more information about the system.

These art camps are offered to elementary, middle and high school students and the fee for each camp is \$125 per person.

For middle and high school students who are interested in a more technological side of things, the annual Eagle Cyber Camp is set for July 16 through July 20.

This camp is a web development and computer animation camp, held at the College of Information Technology.

Campers will learn how to build their own functional personal Web sites and post them from a safe location on the University Web sever.

"We want the students to enjoy themselves while learning computer applications that they haven't learned anywhere else," Program Manager J. Marie Lutz said.

The fee for the camp is \$295 per person.

Another camp offered to children in the area is the Eco-Adventure Camp, which is through the Wildlife Center at GSU. The camp is limited to 25 campers and will take place later this month.

World travelers and history buffs are invited to sign up for a 12-day tour of England sponsored by Georgia Southern University's College of Education.

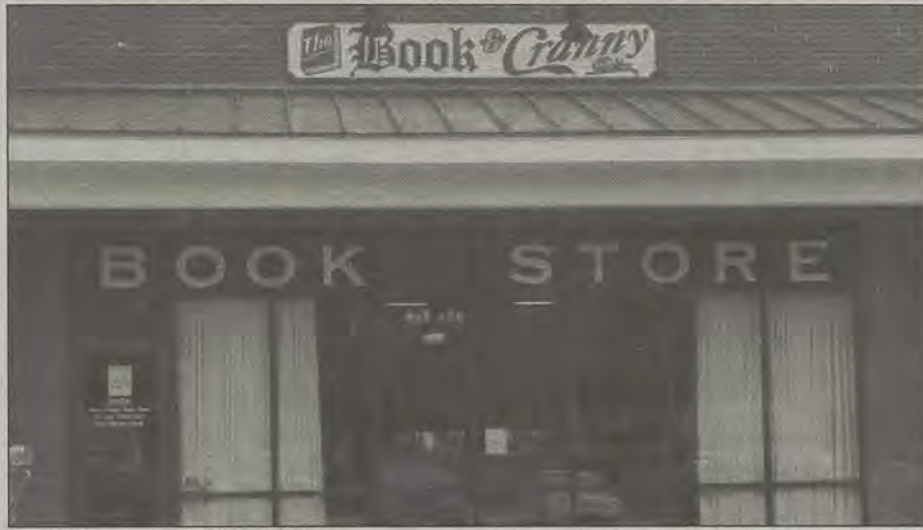
Scheduled for June 2008, the trip will feature stops in London, the Cotswolds, Derby, Sheffield and Stratford-Upon-Avon.

Professor conducts research on cruise ship

Daniel Gleason just boarded the Nancy Foster and made sure he had everything he needed to make the most of what he hopes will be nine glorious days on the Atlantic Ocean.

But Gleason is not your typical tourist, but then again, the Nancy Foster is not your typical cruise ship.

An associate professor in the Department of Biology at Georgia Southern, Gleason has a special interest in marine life. For the past six years, he's been conducting research at Gray's Reef National Marine Sanctuary off the Georgia coast.

Meanwhile, the Nancy Foster is part of the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA) fleet.

The Nancy Foster is preparing to transport Gleason and 13 other scientists to Gray's Reef and several adjacent reefs for a research expedition. The ship and its human cargo departed from River Street in Savannah June 12 and will return on June 21.

"Gray's Reef is a great place for marine biologists to gain new knowledge," Gleason said. "Compared to tropical coral reefs, we know very little about what species are there, how these species might respond to human-induced damage, or how they might change over time.

"Our hope is that our research will fill in some of these knowledge gaps and allow the National Marine Sanctuary Program to better manage the

resource for compatible uses such as sport fishing and scuba diving."

This will be Gleason's fifth cruise aboard the Nancy Foster, which began its career as a torpedo test craft for the Navy.

Gray's Reef is located between Savannah and Brunswick, about 17.5 nautical miles east of Sapelo Island.

Submerged some 60 feet beneath the surface, the reef contains many places for invertebrates to grab hold, and for fish to hide.

For this reason, Gray's Reef has become a preferred destination for scientists like Gleason. He will be joined on the cruise by GSU graduate student Leslie Bates, plus alumni Hampton Harbin, Rob Ruzicka and Stephanie Schopmeyer.

In addition to Gray's Reef, the scientists will explore several nearby reefs, including J-Reef, the R-2 Tower and Snapper Banks, all of which are familiar locations to local fishermen and divers.

Once the Nancy Foster arrives in the appropriate waters, Gleason and company will use scuba gear to make three or four dives each day.

"Our research is resulting in a Web-based field guide that is being used by sport divers, scientists and educational groups," Gleason said. "During this cruise, we will continue to fill in as many gaps as possible by targeting species where we lack either photographs or specimens.

In addition, the scientists will continue sampling small invertebrates by suspending buffer pads.

In the future, the store plans to have local and regional authors do signings of their books. Campbell also plans to have book clubs come to the store for meetings.

The Book and Cranny is located in the Woodland Square shopping center, right across from Georgia Southern University.

What to Do About Rising Gas Prices

With gasoline prices at their highest point in recent years, the knee-jerk response of many is to call for the government to "do something" to force prices lower. But no matter what the price of gasoline is, such calls are wrong. All market fluctuations in the price of gasoline, up or down, are a good thing—and none of the government's business.

When customers' demand for gasoline increases relative to the supply, the sellers of gasoline raise their prices. As the producers and owners of gasoline, this is their right—and we should be glad that they exercise it. Not only do price increases encourage future production, but without such price increases, we would very quickly see shortages as customer demand for cheap gasoline far outstripped the available supply. Thanks to price increases, we can ensure our continued access to gasoline to the extent we are willing to pay for it—i.e., to the extent we value it. Most of us are willing to pay \$3 a gallon for a 15-mile office commute—but might not be for a 15-mile drive to our pet's beauty salon, and so our personal consumption voluntarily decreases as prices increase.

A higher price means that firms will only purchase oil or gasoline to the extent that they can make profitable use of it at those prices. Since nearly every product we use involves oil at some stage of production, we all gain vast benefits from oil being directed toward its most profitable uses.

There is no moral or economic justification for any politician or consumer to declare market prices "too

high," and to use the government to coerce lower prices. To do so violates both the rights of gasoline producers and their productive customers to set voluntary prices—and, in doing so, causes destructive shortages. When shortages exist, how much gasoline one is able to get depends not on one's willingness to pay a mutually agreeable price, but on one's political pull to secure rations, or on whether one has time on one's hands to wait in endless lines (as in the 1970s).

There is only one sense in which we are entitled to tell the government to "do something" about gasoline prices: insofar as these prices are made artificially high by the government's many regulations on oil and gasoline production.

Consider oil refining regulations. Various state governments impose the absurd mandate that companies refine nearly 60 different "blends" of gasoline—despite the fact that cars using today's standard unleaded gasoline, even with the overall increase in driving, pollute very little by historical standards. Additionally, endless red tape and "environmental impact studies" forced by regulators hostile to industrial development, make new construction dramatically less profitable. According to the American Petroleum Institute, "the refining industry has spent over \$47 billion over the last decade to comply with environmental and fuels regulations—expenditures that generally yield little or no return on investment."

To impose huge costs on oil companies and their customers in the name of preserving untouched nature is unconscionable.

What should the government do about gasoline prices? Get its hands out of the market—and keep them off.

Security directives could allow U.S. dictatorship

George W. Bush signed two Presidential Directives last month allowing him and his predecessors to become dictator in the case of a "catastrophic emergency" to ensure "continuity of government."

The documents, under the guise of National Security and Homeland Security Presidential Directives NSPD 51 and HSPD 20, state that, "Catastrophic Emergency" means any incident, regardless of location, that results in extraordinary levels of mass casualties, damage, or disruption severely affecting the U.S. population, infrastructure, environment, economy, or government functions." But the meaning of "extraordinary" is left to the discretion of the President.

The documents also say, "The President shall lead the activities of the Federal Government for ensuring constitutional government." Although, constitutional government is far from ensured when "cooperative effort among the executive, legislative, and judicial branches" is "coordinated by the President" because the system of checks and balances is no longer in effect.

It comes as no surprise that the directives were barely mentioned by the established media when one considers its track record and that it is composed of only six corporations—General Electric, Time Warner, News Corporation, The Walt Disney Company, Viacom, and Vivendi Universal. The "Big Six" underreported the significance of the Patriot Act and the Military Commissions Act of 2006, Mr. Bush's other crimes against the constitution. These corporations acted like cheerleaders in the time leading up to Iraqi occupation, before all three excuses for war turned out to be false.

NSPD 51 and HSPD 20 have been conveniently kept under wraps because the establishment media cares more for profit than for truth. If this were not the case, they might place more emphasis on the connection between Vice President Cheney and Halliburton, the oilfield services company raking in billions from the Iraqi occupation. The "Big Six" might report that in January of 2006, the Department of Homeland Security awarded a \$385 million contingency contract to a Halliburton subsidiary, KBR, for the construction of detention facilities in the case of, "an emergency influx of immigrants, or to support the rapid development of new programs." But the corporate media continue to suppress important news.

After Rosie O'Donnell questioned the explanations for why World Trade Center 7 collapsed, the media attacked her character instead of addressing her question. It was a valid question since WTC 7, a steel-frame 47 story skyscraper that was not hit by a plane, but collapsed in under 7 seconds at 5:20pm, was not even mentioned in the 9/11 Commission Report. She said the fear of terrorism is being used to control the American people.

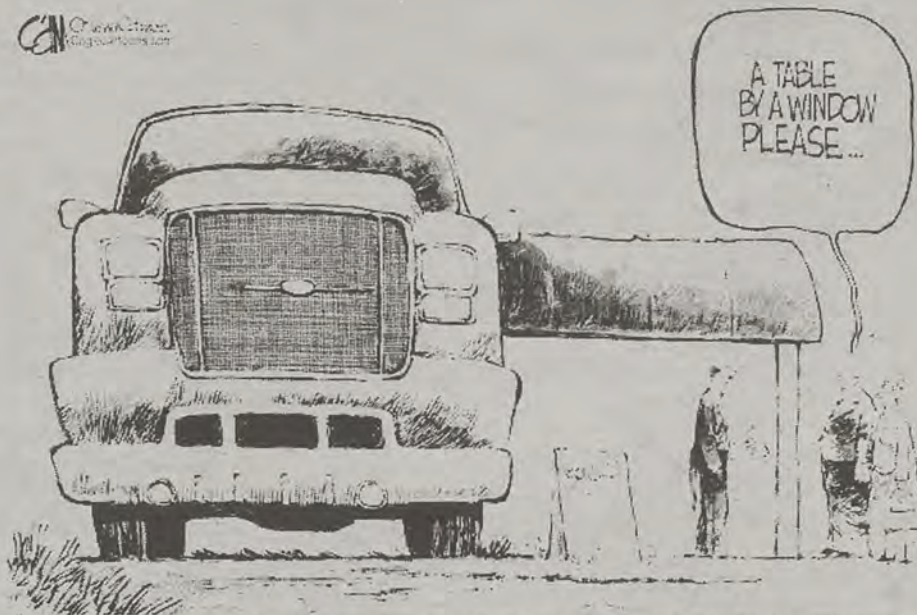

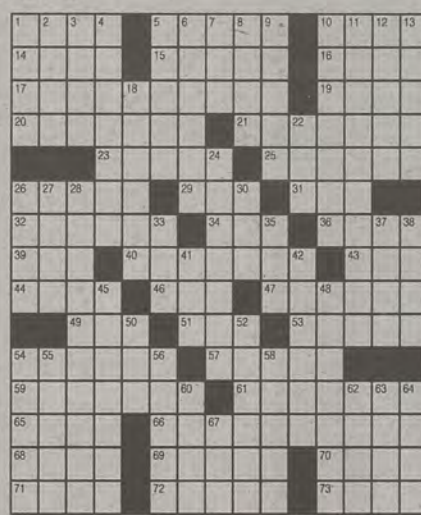

Bush lobbies Senate GOP on immigration bill

President Bush met with divided Senate Republicans on Tuesday in a bid to salvage his imperiled immigration initiative, but the Senate's Democratic leader says he wants assurance of adequate GOP support before he returns the stalled measure to the Senate floor.

Bush received a warm reception during the closed luncheon just across the hall from the Senate chamber, according to participants, but it was unclear if he converted any Republicans now opposed to the legislation. The bill would legalize nearly 12 million undocumented immigrants.

"Some members there believed that we need to move a comprehensive bill; some don't," Bush said in a brief appearance before a throng of reporters, acknowledging that immigration is a "highly emotional issue." But he called on senators and other Americans to get behind the measure, saying, "The status quo is unacceptable."

Senate Majority Leader Harry Reid, D-Nev., yanked the bill last week after Republicans blocked two procedural motions to begin winding down debate and proceed to a final vote.

Reid accused Republicans of attempting to kill the bill through a barrage of amendments. GOP leaders in turn, charged that Reid was trying to choke off legitimate efforts to make the bill more palatable.

After the president's appearance in the Capitol, Reid signaled a hard line and said he

must be convinced that Republicans "have their own act together" before he brings the bill back up for a debate.

Saying that most of the Senate's 48 Republicans oppose the bill, Reid said GOP leaders must show that they can produce 25 Republican votes on behalf of the measure before he moves it forward.

Democrats hold a slim 50-vote majority; there are also two independents.

"The question is, do the Republicans support

their president's immigration bill?" Reid asked. "At this stage, it's a resounding no."

A bipartisan group of senators who produced the bill met later Tuesday to discuss a package of amendments that they hoped would break the deadlock and persuade Reid to reopen debate.

Several leaders of the group, known as the "grand bargainers," expressed optimism that they were closing in on agreement and could get the bill back onto the floor before Congress leaves for its Fourth of July recess.

Venezuela's president Hugo Chavez met with his mentor for six hours on Tuesday, and told reporters afterward that Fidel Castro is recovering well.

Chavez is on a working visit to Cuba, and on Wednesday appeared in Old Havana with acting president Raul Castro at a dedication ceremony to one of the leaders of Venezuela's fight for independence from Spain.

Russia is preparing to help North Korea transfer its previously-frozen \$25 million from a Macau bank, to encourage the communist state to honor its nuclear commitments, a Finance Ministry source said Wednesday.

Stem cell study flawed, results unaffected, journal finds

Nature Magazine has concluded that a controversial University of Minnesota stem-cell study had flaws when it was published five years ago, but that the errors didn't affect the underlying conclusions, which drew headlines around the world.

The study, which found that adult stem cells may be as useful as embryonic stem cells in treating disease, had been under scrutiny since last year because of questions raised about its accuracy.

On Wednesday, the prestigious medical journal said it had conducted its own review of the study, and that in spite of some flawed data, the findings still hold up.

It also published a correction by the study's

lead author, Dr. Catherine Verfaillie, who has described the flaws as "honest mistakes."

Tim Mulcahy, the university's vice president for research, said the journal's review should "close the loop" on the controversy about the study.

"Their reviews are highly respected for how thorough they are," he said. Last year, a university inquiry also found that the study was flawed, but said it didn't have the expertise to conclude if the mistakes were significant.

In a news release Wednesday, Nature said: "The retraction of Figure 1 does not negate the central findings of the paper that cells isolated in the manner described are self renewing and multipotent."

The questions about the data were first raised by a competing journal, New Scientist,

which reported in February that Verfaillie and her colleagues had published the same data twice, in separate medical journals, and labeled it differently.

The university is reviewing two other studies published by Verfaillie and her colleagues, which also were questioned by New Scientist, Mulcahy said. He said Verfaillie, who ran the university's stem cell institute for eight years, has acknowledged that there were errors in those studies as well.

Verfaillie, who is internationally known, now heads stem cell research at Catholic University in her native Belgium, although she remains a part-time faculty member at the University of Minnesota.

Verfaillie could not be reached for comment Wednesday.

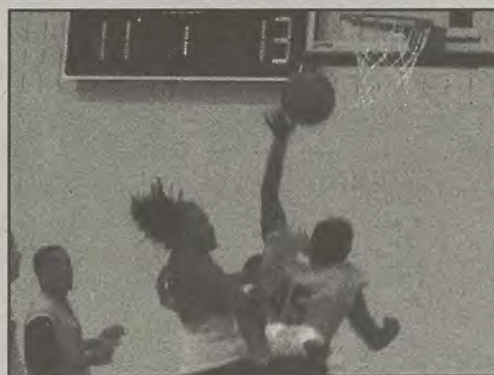

After an the overtime loss in the regular season, the Made Men did not image that revenge would come in the form of a championship as the #1 seed Made Men play against the #2 seed team 413 in the intramural finals.

The game between the Made Men and team 413 is set for tip-off at 7:00 P.M. tonight at the RAC. It should be a very close match-up as the two teams are very evenly matched. However, Greg Downs on team 413 disagrees.

"Personally I guarantee at least 50 points from myself," Downs said optimistically.

Battisto is the first Georgia Southern relief pitcher to earn All-SoCon honors in the past 10 years.

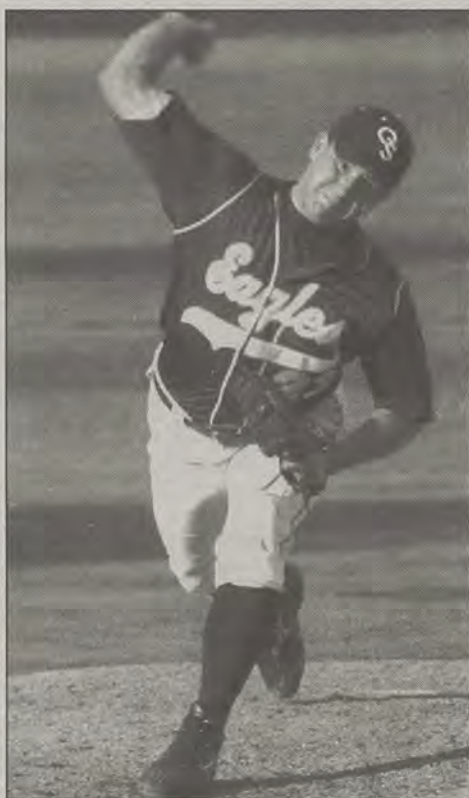

"Benjamin Franklin: In Search of a Better World" is based on the major exhibition of the same name that was on display at the National Constitution Center in Philadelphia, Pa., through April 2006.

The original exhibition coincided with the 300th anniversary of Franklin's birth.

Information Services Librarian JoEllen Broome made the proposal to the ALA on behalf of the Henderson Library.

"We are very proud of JoEllen Broome for writing the excellent proposal to bring the exhibition to Georgia Southern," Mitchell said.

Covering 1,000 square feet, the traveling exhibition features six sections of colorful, freestanding photo panels that incorporate representations of artifacts from the original exhibition.

The content is arranged in thematic sections that focus on Franklin as a youngster in Boston, his family and personal life, and the years in which he built his business as Philadelphia's premier printer.

The exhibition also looks at Franklin's commitment to public service, his interest in medicine and public health, and his work in science and philosophy.

Finally, the exhibition will examine Franklin's contributions to the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution and other major historical documents.

"We want school kids and our own undergraduates to visit this entertaining, informative exhibi-

tion where scientific achievement is highlighted," Mitchell said. "The exhibit will demonstrate that science is for everyone, that it is a rewarding pursuit and that it has been part of our history from the earliest days of our nation."

"All aspects of science – the diligence, the sweat, the fun and the financial rewards – may be found by observing what this early celebrity scientist accomplished."

The programs associated with the exhibition during its stop at Georgia Southern will include a series of lectures by members of the University faculty.

The opening lecture will be presented by Johnathan O'Neill, a Constitutional historian in the Department of History. He will discuss Franklin's efforts to win France's support during the American Revolution and his work during the Constitutional Convention of 1787.

Printing Management Professor Donald J. Armel will present an overview of major breakthroughs in the printing industry and talk about Franklin's early contributions to printing.

Department of Physics Chair Mark Edwards will discuss the physics of electricity and the debt owed to Franklin, who is associated with the beginning of the understanding of electromagnetic phenomena.

School of Economic Development Professor John H. Brown will lecture on the entrepreneurial spirit that led to Franklin's personal wealth and his impact on banking and insurance.

Also, Elaine McDuffie, the children's librarian at the Statesboro Regional Public Library, will host a workshop in which middle and high school students will make their own kites.
