BE ERECTED SOON

The contract for the erection of a new \$200,000 stadium to be erected on the northeast section of the campus has been let and work will begin immediately. The stadium will be completed for the opening football game next fall with the University of Southern California on October 6.

The Darby Construction Company will begin work on the stadium Monday morning. This huge amphitheatre will seat 60,000 people with a possible seating capacity of 100,000 more on portable bleachers that can be placed in the opening of the horse-shoe shaped structure.

The opening game with the University of Southern California will be in the form of a dedication of the new field which will be named later. This game will be broadcast over the N.B.C. network by none other than "Bill" Munday through our own station S.G.T.C. Many notables are expected
