READING MAXIMUM A FULL MAN

"How much reading do the students do", is a question that all college accrediting associations generally ask an applicant. A recent study made here reveals some sad facts if the students answered the questions correctly.

The study shows that the members of the sub-freshman class read more than do students of the higher classes. The average time spent on newspaper reading daily for the sub-freshman class was forty minutes. The freshman class averaged thirty minutes a day, the sophomores thirty-five, the juniors thirty, and the seniors only twenty-five minutes each day.

Of course the matter that is being read should be taken into account but even the habit of reading is worth something if only the "funnies" are read.

There is an education in newspapers if the student will go into them as they should. A college student should spend at least one hour each day reading newspapers, magazines, or a worthwhile books not including parallels, text-books etc.
