## NEW GYMNASIUM TO BE READY IN DECEMBER

The new gymnasium, well under way, is expected to be completed by December in time for basketball. The new gym along with the other features will seat 600 people so architects stated here today.

The outside measurement of the new building is seventy-seven by one hundred feet, the building will contain 127 windows and five double doors that enter from the outside. There will be a balcony on each side with a capacity of about three hundred people to the side. The balcony will be thirteen feet wide on each side and running the entire length of the building. The basketball court will measure 51 by 100 feet and will be 22 feet high. There will be eight rooms on the floor line, four rooms in the basement and four rooms on the second story. The basement rooms will be used for classes and band rehearsals. There will be lockers and showers for both boys and girls.
