App Update LECTURE MONKEY

According to the official website of developer, JU Consulting, Lecture Monkey is a comprehensive recording app that allows students to use their phone's microphone to record lectures in high quality, without using up tons of memory.

While recording the lecture, you can point your camera at any presentation material and the app will automatically take a picture of it. Also other users of the app who are recording in your general vicinity can add comments and annotations which will be incorporated into the final product.

Friday the 13th is my luckiest day.

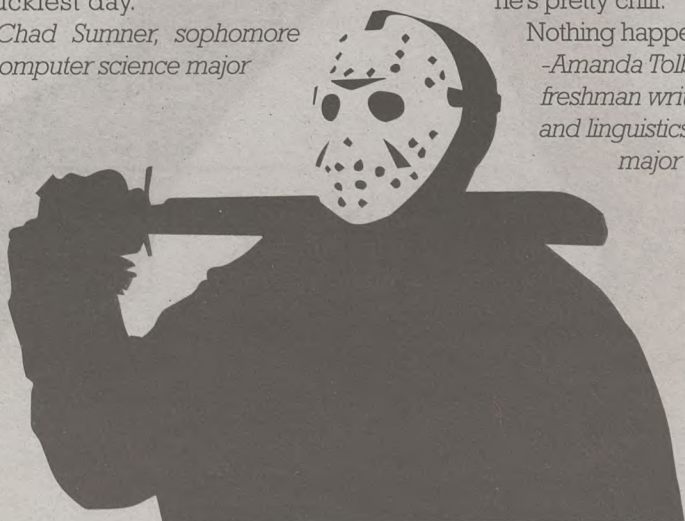

GREEK LIFE Integration at GSU

Georgia Southern University Greek Life is considered a major part of the campus and student body. Information about each council and the specific fraternities/sororities that it consists of is often considered easily accessible and somewhat common knowledge. However, that can't be said when it comes to the NPHC, and what some may refer to as the "Divine Nine."

Overall, 35 chapters make up the Greek community at the university. Each one of the fraternities and sororities that make up the Greek community are a part of a national council.

Specifically, they have the Interfraternity Council (IFC), the Multicultural Greek Council (MGC), the Panhellenic Association (PHA) and the National Pan-Hellenic Council (NPHC).

On GSU's campus only

six of the Divine Nine are housed, which are:

- Alpha Phi Alpha
- Alpha Kappa Alpha
- Kappa Alpha Psi
- Omega Psi Phi
- Phi Beta Sigma
- Zeta Phi Beta

Compared to other councils and their fraternities and sororities, little to nothing is known about them because of tradition and protocol. The fraternities and sororities that are members of the NPHC are all considered historically African American organizations that were founded in times of socioeconomic strife.

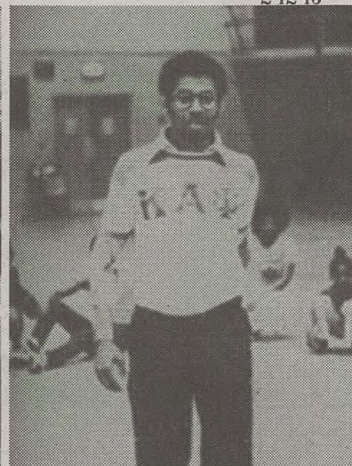
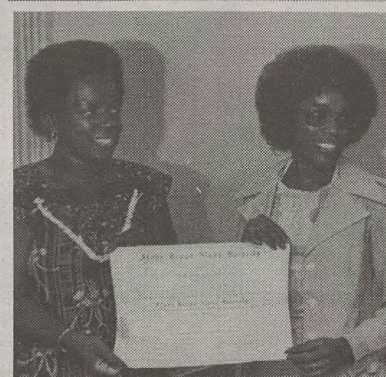
F. Erik Brooks, author of "Pursuing A Promise: A History of African Americans at Georgia Southern University," states that historically here at Georgia Southern African

American Greeks came to the realization that "if they could...study together and pull their resources it would show others that African Americans could actually compete in college," during a time where very few African Americans were attending higher institutions of learning.

There are quite apparent differences between the NPHC greeks and the other greek organizations on campus. The main distinction most students are familiar with is how they don't actually know much about the inner-workings of any NPHC chapter. "It is the secretiveness of rush...and you never know what new members [they] are bringing into the organization," Nycole Key, President of the Epsilon Xi chapter of Zeta Phi Beta Inc. said.

Nycole confirms that it is "primarily true" that the reason NPHC greeks are more secretive is because in the early days of their organizations they would have to meet and congregate behind closed doors for safety reasons.

"It is a private personal thing, and it helps teach new members discretion and what goes on inside the chapter should stay inside the chapter...teaches people what

information needs to be public and what needs to be private within a chapter," Key said.

Jerry Jones, the current NPHC Vice President of Alpha Phi Alpha Inc., states that there are many difference between the NPHC and their other greek counterparts. "Each of our organizations were founded in a time where segregation was very prevalent...[currently] you do have to be a member of the NAACP and [specifically for Alpha Phi Alpha] you do have to be registered to vote [for membership]," Jones said.

He explains that the

reasoning behind this is because with Alpha in particular, one of their biggest national programs is called A Voteless People is A Hopeless People, and he argues that they can't make a change in the community unless they have the power to vote.

"People should care because we are a part of history...we bring diversity, and we demonstrate community service, team work, and most importantly networking," Key said.

GSU REACTS TO CHAPEL HILL SHOOTING

Three Muslim students were shot to death in their apartment near Chapel Hill, North Carolina, Tuesday night. The victims were newlyweds Deah Barakat, 23, and Yusor Mohammad, 21, and Mohammad's sister Razan Abu-Salha, 19.

Craig Stephen Hicks, 46, was arrested for the crime Wednesday morning after turning himself in and has been charged with three accounts of first-degree murder.

The victims were all Muslims of Arab-descent, and pictures of the women on social media sites show them wearing hijab, the Islamic headscarf. As the hashtag #ChapelHillShooting

began to trend on Twitter Tuesday night, users wondered why media outlets had not yet reported on what they perceived to be a hate crime.

On what is believed to be Hicks' personal Facebook page, he refers to himself as an "anti-theist" and shared his dislike of religion, as well as

pictures of his loaded handgun.

In a 911 call from the scene, the caller describes walking by the apartment when she heard women screaming and three gunshots. CNN reported that sources confirmed that all three victims were shot in the head.

Chapel Hill police announced Wednesday that they believe the murders were a result of a dispute over parking. However, Mohammad Abu-Salha, the father of two of the victims, told the Raleigh News Observer that the murders were a hate crime.

"It was execution style, a bullet in every head," Abu-Salha said.

"This was not a dispute over a parking space; this was a hate crime. This man had picked on my daughter and her husband a couple of times before, and he talked with them with his gun in his belt. And they were uncomfortable with him, but they did not know he would go this far."

"It's so freaking sad to hear people saying we should 'kill Jews' or 'Kill Palestinians.' As if that's going to solve anything SMH"

Deah Barakat, one of the victims, tweeted this on January 28, 2015

"That's a lot for a parking space. And that's also a lot for not liking somebody's religion. There's a lot of things I don't like, but I don't go around - there are other things you can do. You can protest, you can speak out against it, it's awful. I think it's just sad. There's not an excuse to shoot someone for any reason. That's the beauty of living in this country. You can be a religion or you can not be a religion and we're free to do that, so if this is in fact a hate crime, it's really upsetting."

"First of all, I feel so sorry about the loss of these brilliant students. Through the news, I read they are students who went to medical school for dentistry, and I feel so sorry for the families as well. I think that a lot of people, especially Muslim families and students in the country will start to worry about their lives, because they might not feel safe after these events. And I think that the government or the police have to take legal actions toward these kind of hate crimes."

- Ahmed Bekhet, graduate student (Masters of Public Administration) said.

"My thoughts and prayers are with the families and friends of these young people who lost their lives so tragically. I understand there's an ongoing investigation and this murder may or may not be a hate crime, and I urge caution until more information is known."

- Youssef Salhi, Arabic lecturer said.

"It is very disturbing. I was very disturbed to find out that they were basically killed execution-style and that shows a very disturbing picture that the people have of hatred against Muslims, and I think we should give a balanced picture in the media because if people don't have the right image, then they can make wrong decisions, and the results are horrific. I think that the police mentioned initially that this was about a dispute over parking - I don't think a dispute over parking would go this far into an execution-style killing of people. I think it should be looked not only as a hate crime but probably should be called terrorism."

GSU REACTS TO STATE OF THE UNION

President Barack Obama's 2015 State of the Union address brought up a lot of very interesting issues, some relatable to university students and a few less relatable. Found to be one of the most significant issues was the topic of free community college during the first two years, for anyone.

Many feel that America has been stagnant and almost unconcerned with the lack of advances within our educational systems. Schools have been struggling to keep students across the country interested and concerns continue to rise about the nation's spot on the global leader's list of the

youth's educational standards; however, Obama is pushing to make higher levels of education readily more available to everyone, which to a lot of citizens appears to be a step in the right direction.

With that in mind, would people already in college go somewhere revered as 'less' of an education if it were free? A poll was issued and asked 71 people five direct questions regarding the topic.

done that," David Dodd, junior electrical engineering major said.

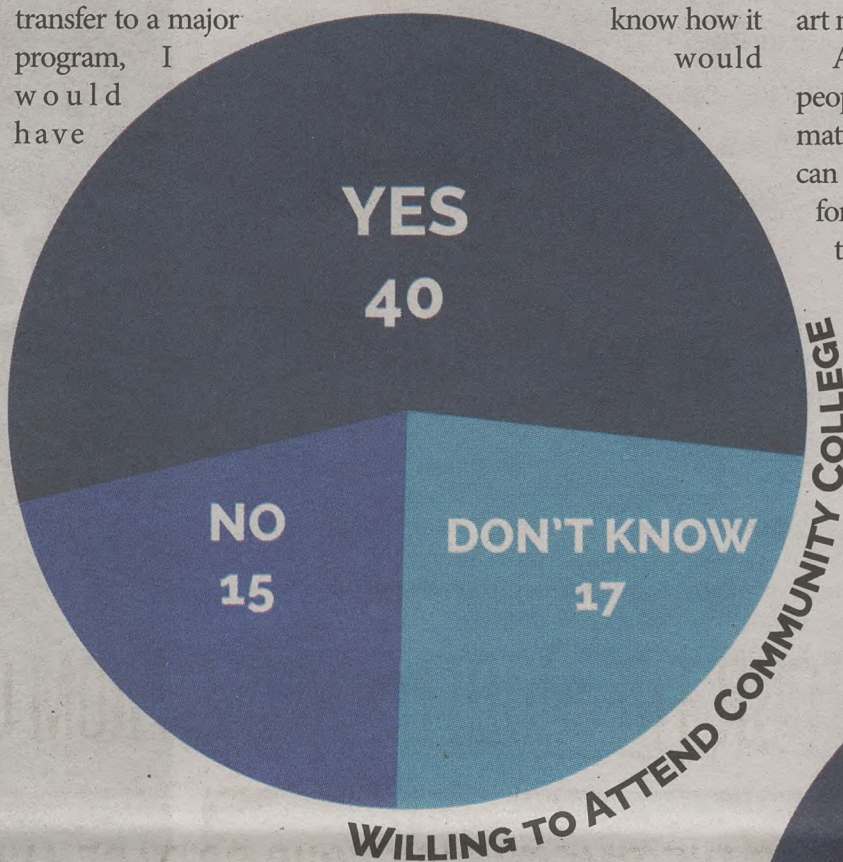

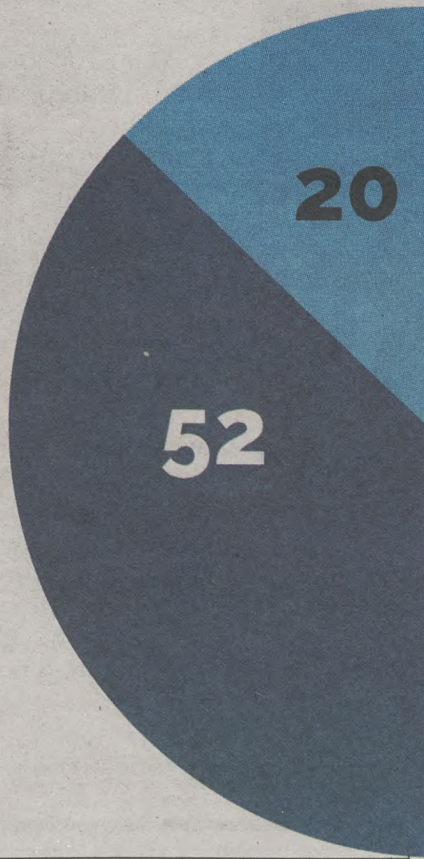
At the end of the day, most people realize that it doesn't matter where you go, if you can further develop yourself for free, people are going to take that opportunity.

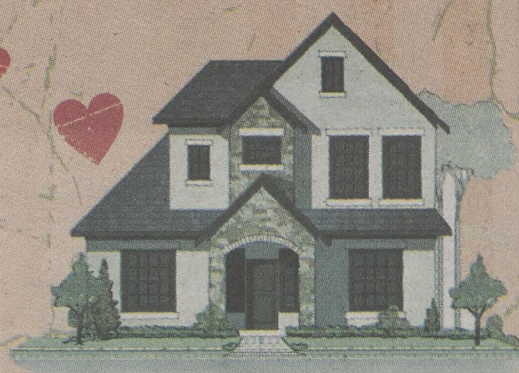

Jesup Drive-In is open Thursday through Sunday, with gates opening at 7 p.m. Patrons should get there early since there are only two screens and lot space is limited.

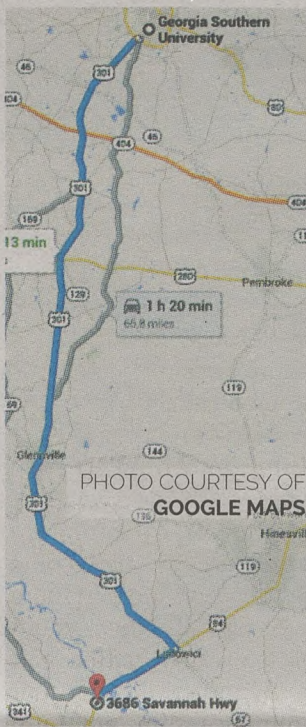
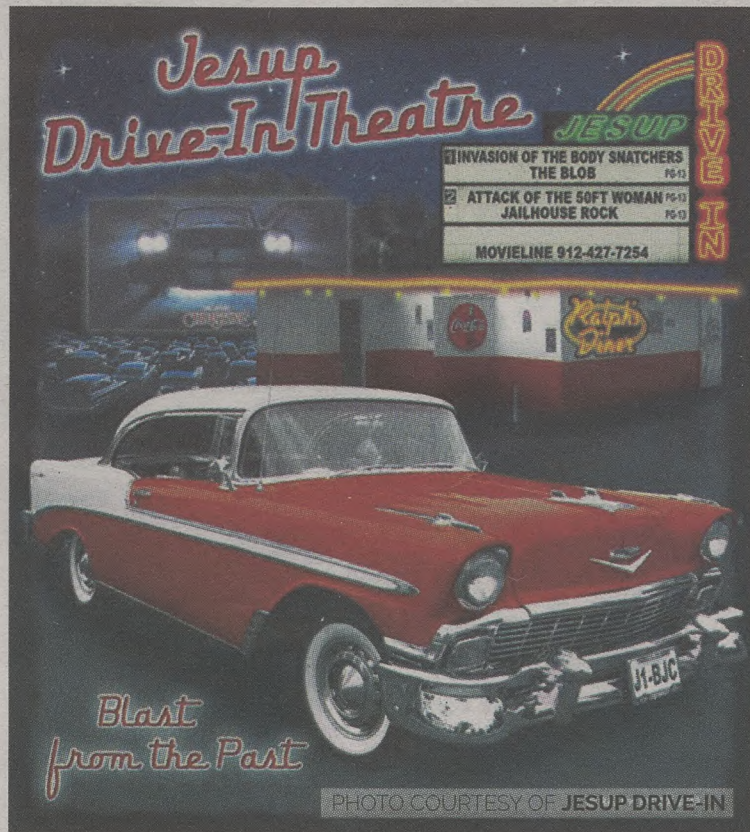

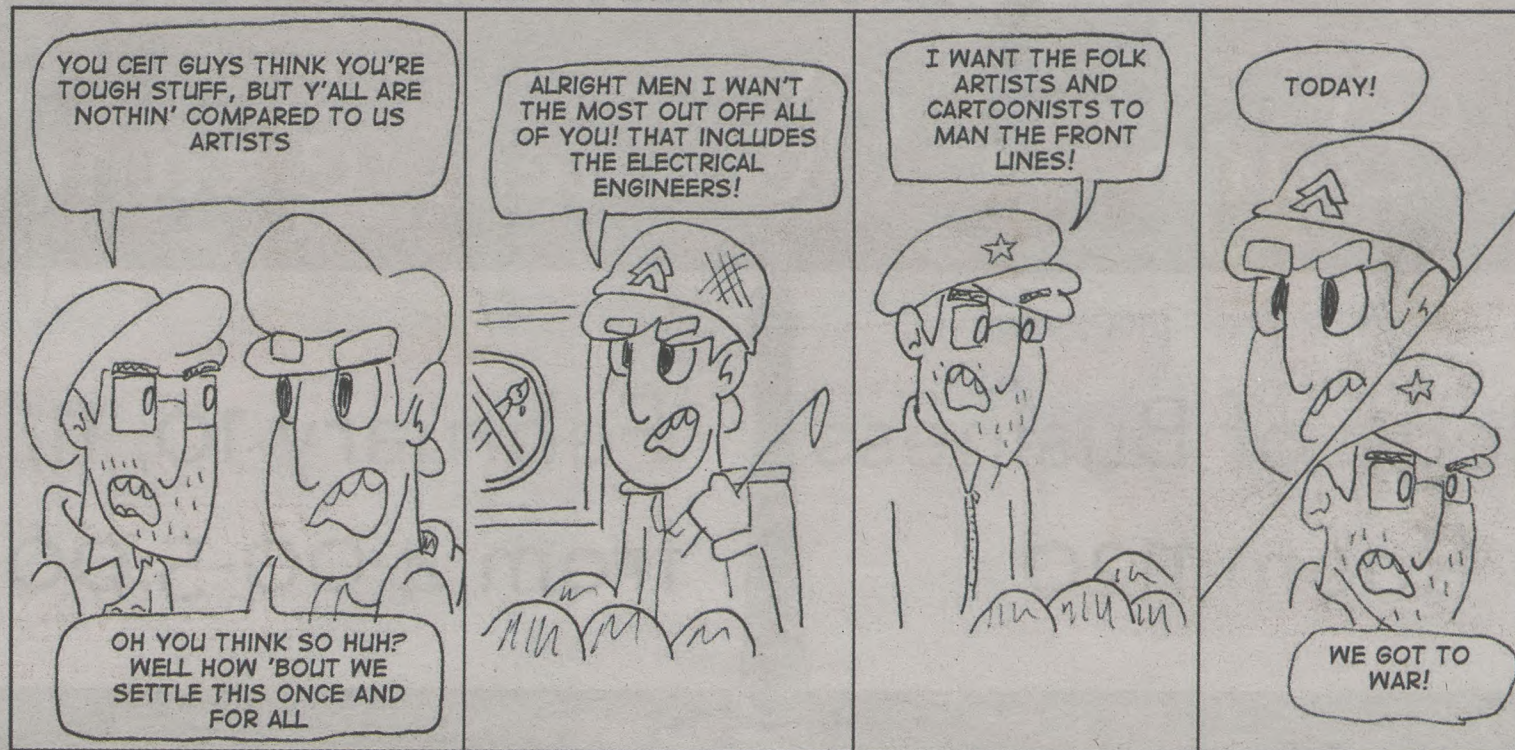

I learned something about aggregate-content websites today, and what happened next will blow your mind.

Technology is becoming increasingly prudent for use in the classroom, with websites and required software popping up like Starbucks. In most cases, they're convenient and straight-forward, serving as tools to help further your personal and professional goals. Savvy advertisers and marketers have caught onto the trend in the past few years, and have released nothing short of a vile plague upon the masses. A plague called "Clickbait," and one easy trick will help them attract millions of users.

Websites like Buzzfeed, Gawker and the Huffington Post are the worst offenders, carefully crafting headlines that grab user's attentions. Articles posed as lists or quizzes appealing to various demographics are easy to make and easy to digest. They're cute, fun, interesting;

call them whatever you like. But the downside is that, while interesting, cute, or fun, none of them are particularly 'useful.' Learning what breed of dog you most resemble won't help you get a job any more than comparing yourself to a cocktail will help you study for your Biology exam. It's mindless entertainment, a rabbit hole that's all too easy to throw yourself into. And when you do, you've pissed away the hours accomplishing what amounts to absolutely nothing. You've moved nowhere. You're stagnant.

Compelling captions aren't the only invention of Clickbait. Sites like Reddit and Pinterest are constantly flooded with content that amounts to nothing of value. It's not news, thought-provoking discussion, profound expressions of art; it's superficial garbage, and consuming too much of it is just as bad as consuming too much grease or sugar.

All these websites and their aggregated bullshit have formed an unofficial coalition of sorts, a collection of 'hobbies' that have the rare, counter-productive gift of taking as much of your time as they can, and giving nothing back. You will not get into grad school browsing Tumblr, learn an instrument pouring over Reddit comments or master a second language taking Buzzfeed quizzes.

The content managers of these sites have it down to a science. The mental process of curiosity is one of mankind's greatest motivators,

one psychologists and neuroscientists still struggle to fully comprehend. But advertisers and marketing companies don't need full comprehension to take advantage of the human mind's need to learn more once curiosity has been piqued.

For example, an experiment by BI Norwegian Business school conducted just last year found that article headlines crafted as questions or featuring the second-person (as if to speak directly to you) attracted 150-175 percent more page views, a valuable commodity among advertisers. They craft their articles around current popular events, or even resort to framing them in such a way that anyone would believe they were talking specifically about them (14 Things Only College Students Will Understand: We drink lots of coffee!!!!!!), a tactic no better than that employed by those television mediums who claim they can speak to the dead. They're grabbing at straws and sweeping generalizations, and hoping that people will take the bait. More often than not, they do, and marketing teams reel in valuable personal data to sell to advertisers.

I'm not saying that all these websites are inherently evil, or even that all the content they create falls under these categories, but they're becoming a problem. More people are shying away from hobbies and activities that require any amount of mental effort, instead turning to slogging through clickbait-

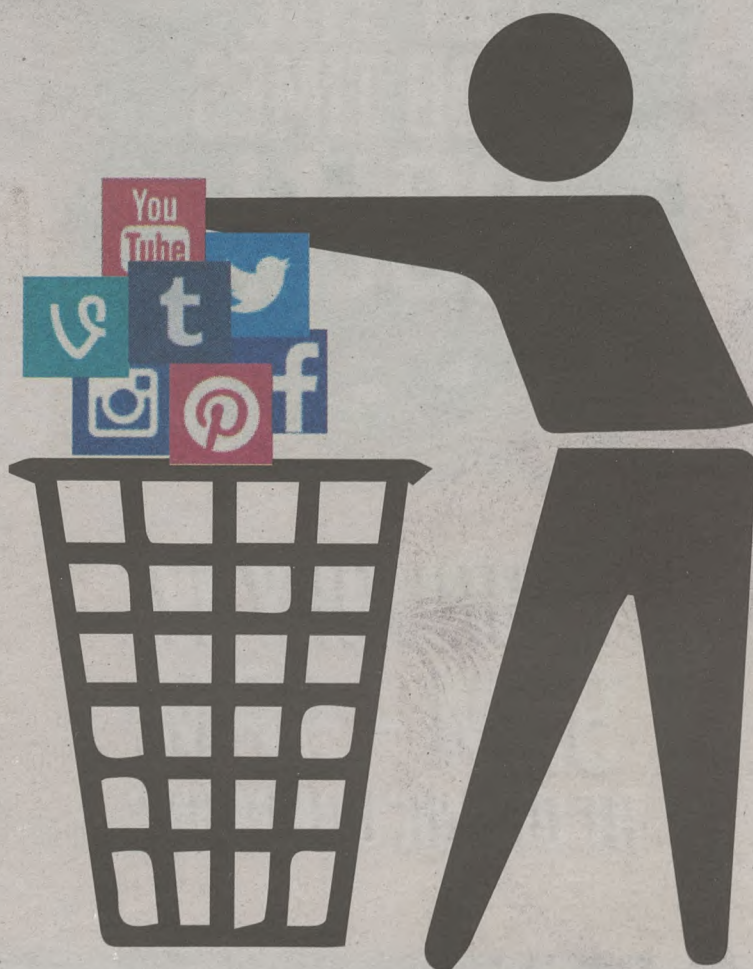
esque content. It's easy, it's convenient, it's 'funny' (a stretch, considering most laughs elicited are nothing more than a harsh breath through your nose), and in fact, very reminiscent of the abuse of recreational drugs.

Consider this: you're content to sit on your sofa or bed and take whatever content/drug you come across. You lose motivation to try anything new. You lose your ambition. You're spending every waking moment of free time hunched in front of laptop, giggling about the comparison

between you and the flavors of cupcakes. Clearly, you're more of a chocolate than a red velvet.

Reddit, Buzzfeed and Tumblr have become capable of the same dangers associated with gambling and drug abuse. They can dull the mind in the same way penny slots or heroin do. That's a sobering, and terrifying, thought. I'm as big a proponent for the Internet as anyone, but make sure you're not spending too much time on these kinds of sites, browsing this kind of content...

Because you won't believe what happens next.

AND SO IT BEGINS...

America's Pastime begins on college campuses all across the country tomorrow, and Georgia Southern is no different. The baseball team opens up their season with a three-game series against Bethune-Cookman at J.I. Clements Stadium.

The Eagles are returning from one of the most successful seasons in program history. Last year's team won the Southern Conference and made some noise in the NCAA Regionals, shutting out No. 5 National seed, and legitimate title contender Florida State in the Tallahassee Regional.

But that was then, and this is now. GSU plays its inaugural season in the Sun Belt this year, and head Coach Rodney Hennon is looking forward to the opportunity. But conference play is still a month away.

"Right now our focus is on Bethune-Cookman," Hennon said.

There are some key players returning for the Eagles this year, but there are also some major holes to fill.

LHP Sam Howard, who pitched a two-hit complete game shutout against the Seminoles in the NCAA Regionals, was drafted by the Colorado Rockies in the third round of the MLB draft.

The Southern Conference Pitcher of the Year, RHP Josh Wirsu, was picked up in the 30th

round by the St. Louis Cardinals.

Redshirt sophomore RHP Evan Challenger will start tomorrow's game. It will be the first time he has pitched in a real game since the 2013 season. Challenger was out all of last year with an elbow injury that required Tommy John surgery.

"He's come back strong from that. [He] feels good and had a really good fall and has looked good in preseason scrimmages," Hennon said.

Sophomore RHP Adam Kelly will start Saturday's game. Kelly pitched two innings last season before coming down with mononucleosis and missed the rest of the season.

True freshman Connor Simmons will be on the mound in Sunday's matinee.

Pitching is what this team has to worry most about right now. Only two players on this

year's squad, juniors Ryan Frederick and Jason Richman, threw more than 25 innings last year.

Pitchers who didn't see a lot of innings last year will be tested early. Players like

the nation, and was the anchor in the bullpen. He posted a stout 1.20 ERA and was named Southern Conference Tournament Most Outstanding Player for his Madison Bumgarner-like run through the postseason tournament.

Richman allowed a single run in 13.1 innings pitched and threw in all six games.

Frederick walked-on the team last year and with the disciplinary issues of then-starter Will Middour, found himself in a starting role for the Eagles. Frederick appeared in 24 games and finished with a 4-1 record and 3.88 ERA.

With so much to figure out on the mound, Georgia Southern does at least have some core offensive players returning. Five starting seniors return for the Eagles.

Senior OF's Aaron Mizell and Kody Adams both hit over .300 last season and have

gap-to-gap power. Mizell led the team in homeruns with 13 and RBI with 53. He has quick, strong hands and his bat stays in the zone a long time which, despite his 5-foot-10, 160 lbs. frame, gives him power.

Adams and Mizell were both named preseason All-Sun Belt by College Sports Madness.

They will likely be joined in the outfield by fellow senior Hunter Thomas.

"That's probably our most experienced area," Hennon said. "Those are guys along with Chase and Dalton Busby that you can kind of build around...take some of the pressure off the guys that are playing for the first time."

Senior backstop Chase Griffin has been in the lineup since day one at Georgia Southern, and is returning for his final season for the Eagles.

Hennon has high hopes for Griffin this season based on his performance in fall scrimmages. Griffin is excellent defensively and has a strong arm from behind the plate, throwing out 17 runners last year. He is a leader and Hennon said that it is comforting to have a guy like Griffin on his team.

For its non-conference schedule, Georgia Southern will play Georgia Tech on Tuesday at home, West Virginia next weekend at home, Georgia, Mercer, Citadel, Jacksonville, College of Charleston, Kennesaw State and Clemson.

sophomore LHP Byron Yelverton and freshman RHP Matt Geiger are going to see a lot of innings.

"The biggest thing with those guys is you just got to get them out there. Get them out there and give them a chance to compete," Hennon said.

Richman appeared in 47 games last year, the most in

NEW YEAR, NEW TEAM

Only 19 players on the 2014 Southern Conference Champion's 35-man roster are back on this year's roster.

That means a lot of new faces. Head coach Rodney Hennon recognized the problems that arise from a team that hasn't faced any adversity together, but he knows the time will come.

"I think that's kind of a process that's ongoing. I like where we're at now, at this stage. But every year is different. Every team is different," Hennon said. "You go through the ups and downs of a season...and that's when

you find out where your teams are. We haven't played a game yet so this team hasn't had a chance to experience any of that yet. But that will start beginning Friday."

The most notable absence from last year's lineup, offensively at least, is Garrett Chapman. Chapman transferred to the College of Charleston in the offseason.

Chapman primarily played third base for the Eagles and was the team's best hitter. He ended the year with a .341 average, eight home runs and 32 RBI.

Hennon didn't give a reason for the transfer.

The rest of the offensive lineup looks pretty good,

with most of the big bats returning. The Eagles will rely on some of those new faces, or players with minimal experience, to fill in the gaps left from last season.

Matt McCall led the team with nine saves last year while eating up 66.2 innings. He graduated, leaving the closer spot open. Junior college transfer Chris Brown is slated to fill in that spot.

"Chris Brown is a guy that will have a key role down in the bullpen, late in the games," Hennon said. Brown transferred from Chattahoochee Valley where he threw 24 innings and struck out 33 batters while posting a 1.12 ERA last season.

Ten of the 19 new players are JuCo transfers.

Adding established players is nothing new to college baseball, but the quantity in which they are coming to GSU is. Last season, seven junior college players transferred to Georgia Southern. Of those seven, two were drafted and three will be starters this year.

"We're going to try to get the best players to fill our needs every year," Hennon said. "It kind of varies year to year. We're not going to be tied down to going one direction or another."

Many times, like last year with pitcher's Josh Wirsu and Eric Alonzo, junior college

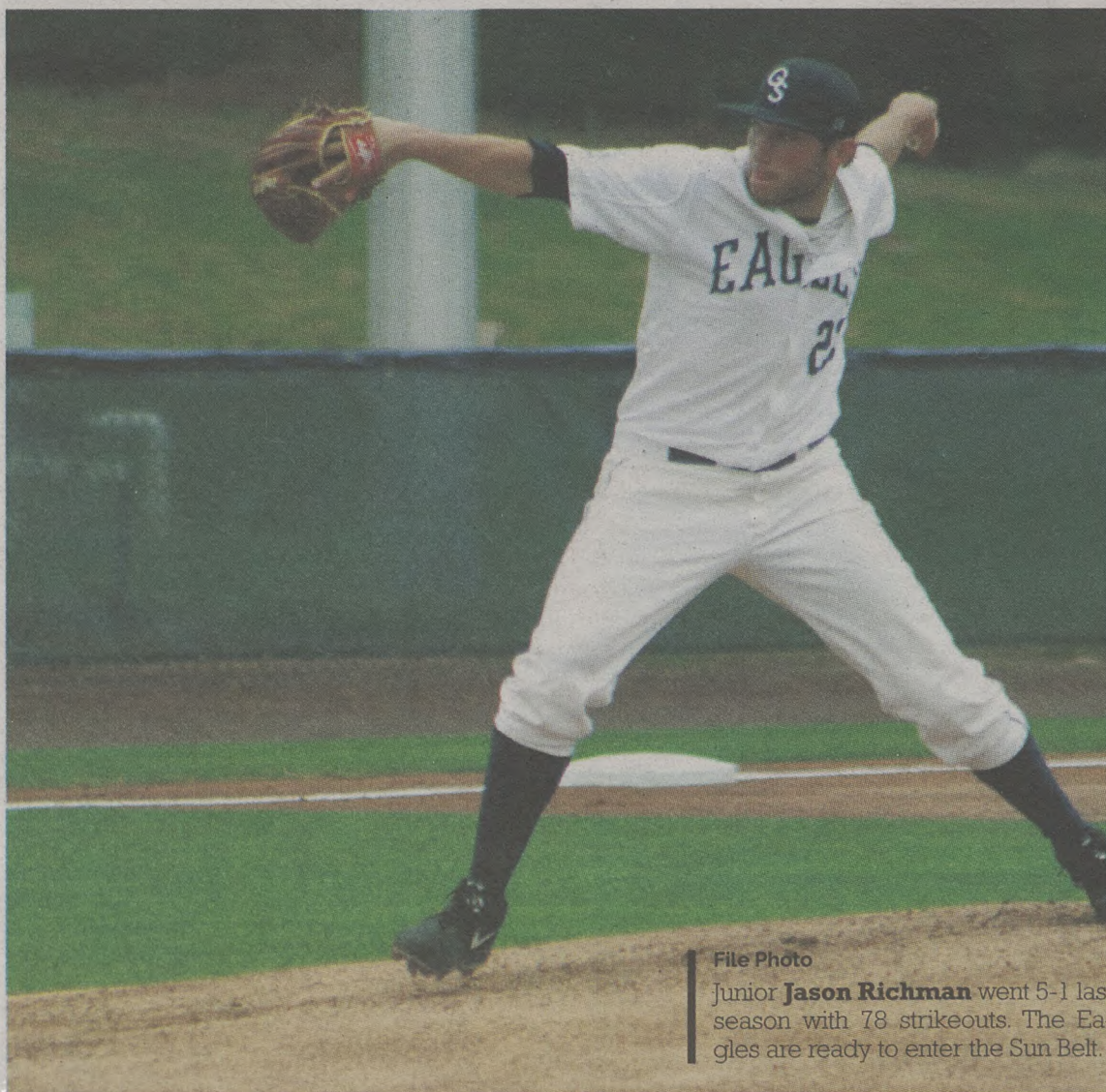
players will transfer to a big school their junior year after establishing themselves at junior colleges. This move increases their odds of exposure and getting drafted.

Bringing in new players every season is tough for those on the team already. But it's hard to argue with a conference championship. However, Hennon doesn't see it as a trend that will continue, necessarily.

Hennon said, "If you look at our signing class that will come in this coming year and start in August, it's predominantly high school guys."

6 WHAT HAS BEEN THE HIGHLIGHT OF THE SEASON?

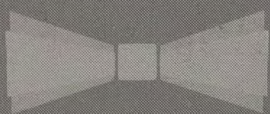
