The Freshman and Sophomore game is to be played soon. Both teams ~~evidently~~ shall meet their match.

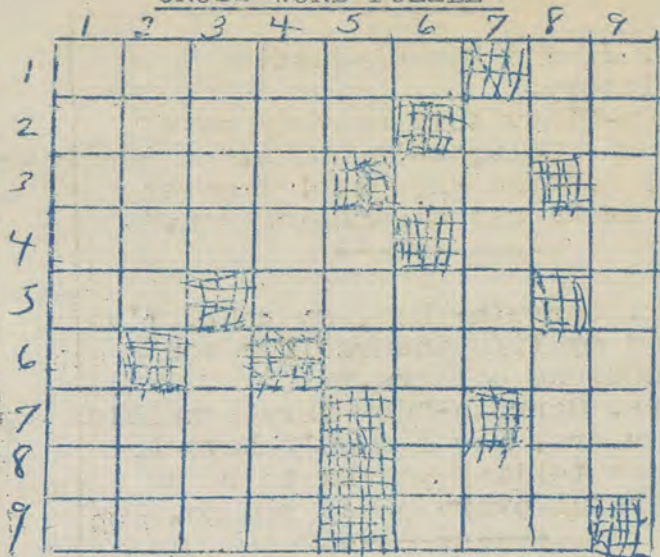
### SOCIETY OF MISSIONARY INQUIRY HAS PICNIC.
