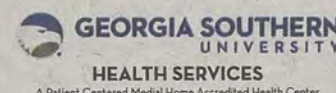
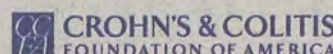

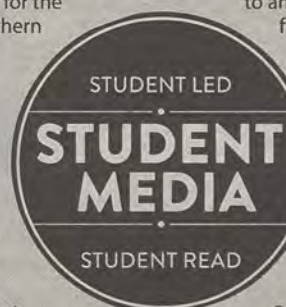

Fort Hood shooting could have been prevented with guns

It seemed like déjà vu all over.

Flipping on the news the night of April 3 brought back memories of the first shooting at Fort Hood, Texas, back in November of 2009. That, of course, would be the shootings committed by Nidal Hassan, a psychiatrist in the United States Army. Hassan was convicted last year of killing 13 people as well as injuring over 30 more.

A very similar incident happened last Wednesday at the same exact base. Army Specialist Ivan Lopez allegedly opened fire on his fellow soldiers, killing 3 and injuring 16 before taking his own life. The motive for this

shooting, as of now, is unclear. A lot of people that are not familiar with the military culture ask how on earth this could happen on a military installation. As Marine Corps veteran, I believe what made this shooting possible is that military installations are somewhat of a gun-free zone. In my experience, all of the troops' weapons are accounted for at the base armories. The only people on base, for the most part, that are allowed to have guns are the Military Police. That's it. You take into account on how big some installations are and that can be a scary thought. Fort Stewart, for example, expands across approximately 280,000 acres.

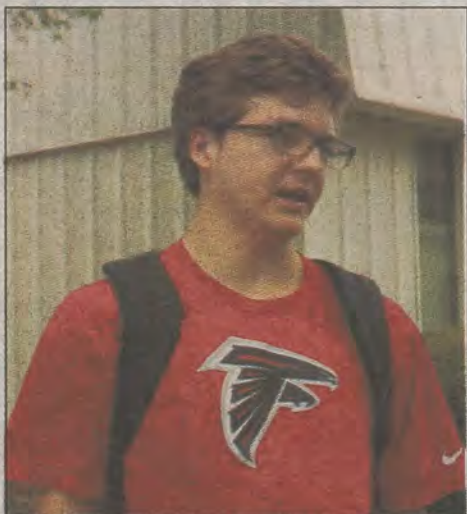

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Sexual harassment complaints made

Lorne Wolfe on administrative leave since October 2013

All quotations and excerpts from documents and records are presented exactly as they appear, with the exception of vulgarity, in the documents and records obtained by The George-Anne from the Office of Legal Affairs.

Lorne Wolfe, Ph.D., three-time Georgia Southern University professor of the year, was put on administrative leave on Oct. 31, 2013 and is still on leave "until due process proceedings" are completed, according to documents obtained from the Office of Legal Affairs.

University officials have not confirmed why Wolfe is on leave.

According to the documents, Wolfe, who is a tenured professor in the biology department, is on leave with pay and benefits.

On Oct. 16, 2013, a graduate student filed a Sexual Harassment Complaint to the GSU Department of Diversity Services claiming that Wolfe made the student feel uncomfortable while in the shared break room of the Biological Sciences Building. The George-Anne acquired a copy of the complaint that had names redacted by the Office of Legal Affairs.

The student spilled coffee down his or her shirt, and Wolfe came into the break room and said, "It's ok, you can dry your breasts off in front of me." Wolfe then took a seat and again told the student to dry off in front of him, and when the student gave him a look that his comments were not welcome, Wolfe said, "Well f--- you, then," according to the complaint.

After the alleged incident, the student no longer felt comfortable in the break room because Wolfe's office is close in proximity.

"I have never been so offended in such a short amount of time. I was not able to complete any work this day because I was distraught about the incident," according to the complaint.

In his most recent post-tenure review on Feb. 9, 2012, completed by Steve Vives, Ph.D., biology department chair, Wolfe was given an overall ranking of "meritorious" and was said to have exceeded expectations.

According to the review, Wolfe "has a very

strong record overall and is seen by his peers as a valued colleague."

Wolfe was the recipient of the GSU Professor of the Year award in 2004, 2011 and 2013. It is awarded based on an initial student vote that is then evaluated by the department head and a blind review by Gamma Beta Phi. A professor must have worked full-time at GSU for at least three years to be eligible for the award.

FORMAL COMPLAINTS

According to records received from the Office of Legal Affairs, over the last five years, four other formal complaints were made about Wolfe.

- On June 3, 2013, Gary Gawel, director of diversity services, contacted a student through email "about sexual innuendos/jokes made by Dr. Wolfe," according to the email. The student agreed to talk with Gawel but wanted to make sure that his or her name did not get around to others in the biology department or "get back to Dr. Wolfe at all," according to the email.

- On May 3, 2013, a student emailed Vives, biology department chair, complaining about email interactions with Wolfe. "I still have the email because I have been so torn on what to do, but honestly, I am fed up with the rudeness from him," according to the email.

- On May 8, 2012, a student complaint was sent to Vives. The complaint was about disrespectful communication when a student asked for Wolfe's help. The student was trying to find another faculty member, according to the complaint, and Wolfe responded with phrases similar to, "I don't know where the f---ing faculty are and I don't know where all the g--damn staff are located." The email read that the wording was not exact, but the student took offense and reported the behavior.

- On April 15, 2012, a complaint was sent to the Department of Diversity Services about an email from Wolfe to a student. According to the complaint, Wolfe sent an email to a student that read, "Bring your lingerie, I hear you have a lot." According to the hand-

written complaint, Wolfe's environmental biology class was very informal, and he made a point to read student emails in class. The complaint also claimed that Wolfe was friendly with the girls in class.

UNIVERSITY POLICY

According to the GSU Policy Prohibiting Sexual Harassment, "sexual harassment is defined as

unwelcome conduct of a sexual nature. Such conduct may include sexual advances, requests for sexual favors, or other verbal or physical conduct of a sexual nature."

In accordance to the policy, GSU conducts investigations of all complaints of sexual harassment and will take the appropriate action when finding that sexual harassment has occurred.

University President Brooks Keel, Ph.D., said that he is made aware of all complaints and becomes involved on a case-by-case basis.

"At the original reporting level, it becomes a police issue if it's an assault; it becomes a judicial issue if it involves a student; it becomes a human resources issue if it involves a staff member; and it is a provost and academic affairs issue if it involves a faculty member," Keel said.

"So depending on who it is and the circumstances, one of the other vice presidents would certainly be involved in it, but I am always notified in [sexual harassment] situations and kept apprised of the progress that's being made on that particular case, and all [sexual harassment] cases would be treated the same," Keel said.

Members of the Board of Regents and all individuals employed by the University System of Georgia must participate in Ethics Policy training and must certify compliance on a periodic basis, according to USG Board of Regents General Policies.

Wolfe was placed on leave before the deadline to complete the mandatory sexual harassment policy training in 2013, however in 2012, he did complete the training with a score of 100 percent.

COULD NOT COMMENT

- Andrew Coffman, Lorne Wolfe's lawyer and partner at Parks, Chesin & Walbert, P.C., said he could not offer comment.

- Lorne Wolfe, Ph.D., Georgia Southern University biology professor, said he could not comment on the case, per his lawyer's suggestion.

- Steve Vives, Ph.D., biology department chair, said he could not comment on personnel matters or how the department handles student complaints.

- Martha Abell, Ph.D., then-interim dean for the College of Sciences and Mathematics, said she could not comment on personnel matters or how the college handles student complaints. Abell is currently the dean of COSM.

- Jean Bartels, Ph.D., provost and vice president for academic affairs, said she could not offer any comment on the story.

- Brooks Keel, Ph.D., university president, could not comment on the specifics of the situation.

- Gary Gawel, director of the Department of Diversity Services, said due to the nature of his position within the university he could not comment on the situation.

- Paul Michaud, associate vice president for Human Resources, could not comment on the case.

- Maura Copeland, associate vice president for Legal Affairs, was unable to comment on the story due to her role at the university.

- Student information was removed from all complaints by the Office of Legal Affairs, which said was done in accordance to the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA).

NEGATIVE STUDENT EVALUATIONS POSITIVE

SUMMER 2013, ENVIRONMENTAL BIOLOGY:

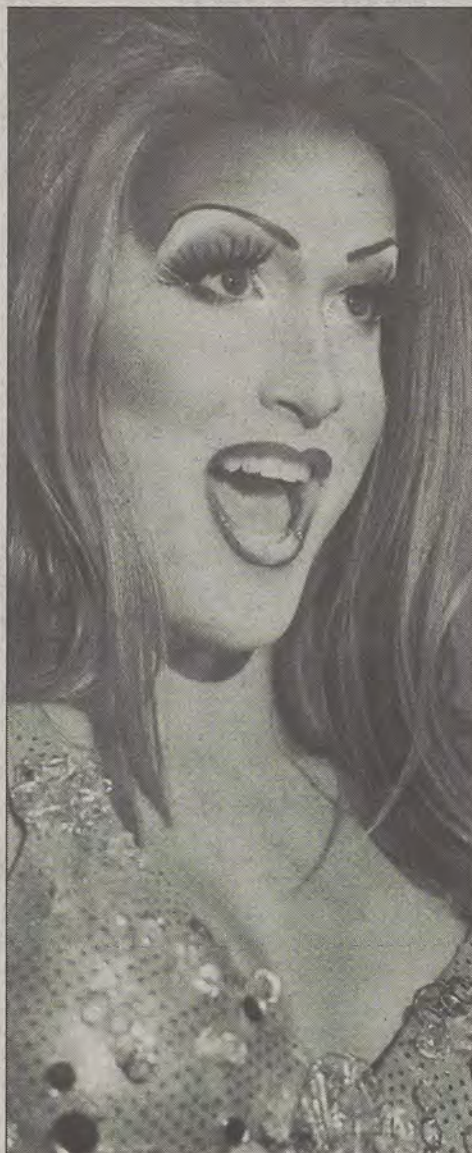

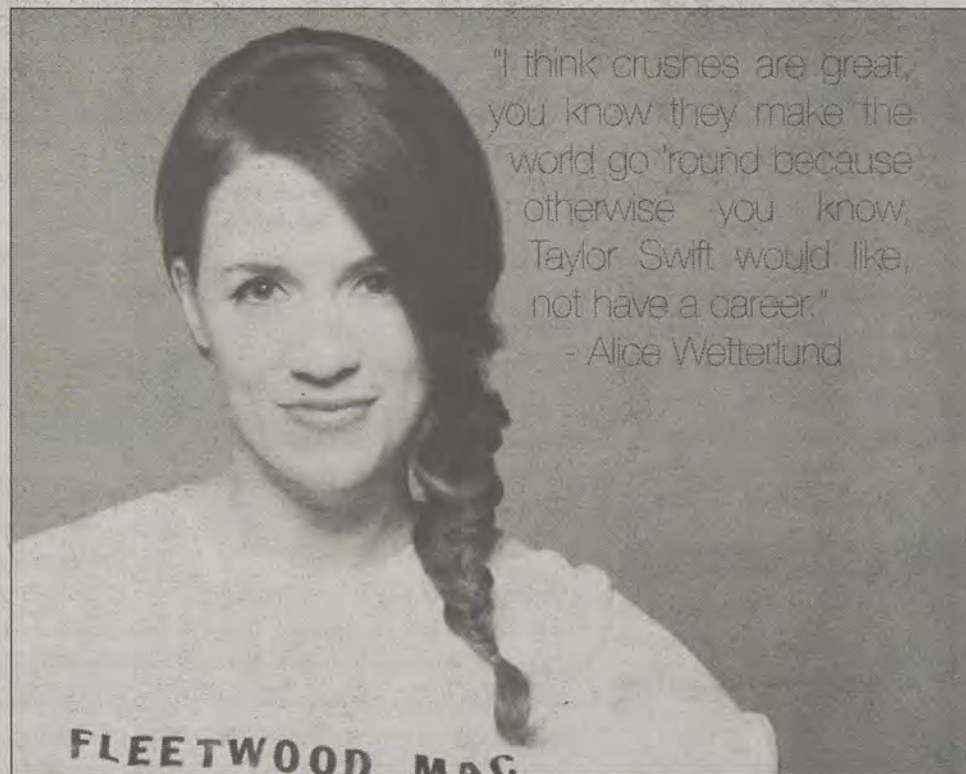

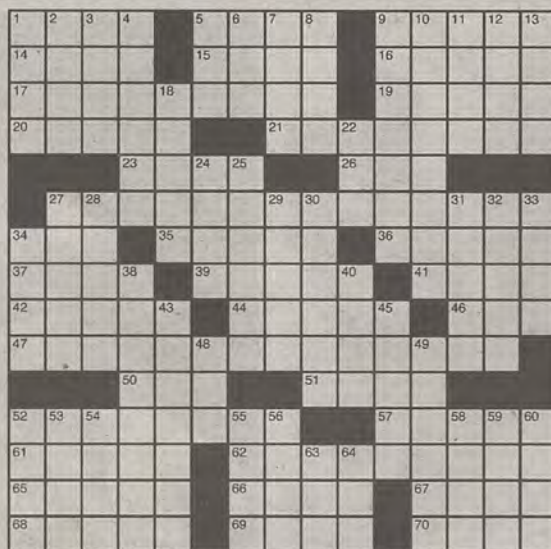

After sweeping three consecutive conference series the Georgia Southern University softball team will have to show the Sun Belt Conference who the real GSU is tomorrow.

Georgia State University has always been an in-state rival, but starting next season they will also be a conference rival. Having something to prove, the Eagles need to bring the precision and focus they showed last weekend against Appalachian State University to shut down the Panthers.

The Eagles do have a big advantage over the Panthers, and that is that they have more time to

rest and no traveling time. While the Eagles will be practicing and preparing, the Panthers have to travel for a game at the Georgia Institute of Technology on Tuesday, then they have to travel to Statesboro for the game on Wednesday.

If the Panthers are capable of keeping their energy up, then this could be a close game for the Eagles. When looking at players behind the plate collectively, these two teams line up quite well; both teams have a very well-rounded lineup. But in the field, is a different story.

This season the Eagles have committed 22 errors as a whole, while the Panthers have committed 44, doubling the Eagle's mistakes. It will be crucial for the Eagles to capitalize on these mistakes during this game if they want the victory.

If both teams produce behind the plate, then it will be up to the players in the field to either prevent or capitalize on mistakes.

The Eagles have the same upper hand in the circle as well. The Panthers top pitcher doubles the amount of errors senior pitcher Sarah Purvis has this season. A quick look at both of these teams' stats and it is clear that both of these teams are capable of posting high numbers, but the Eagles lack of errors and consistency in the field and behind the plate is why they are ranked first in the SoCon and the Panthers are ranked sixth in the Sun Belt.

Riding a three-game winning streak over the weekend, Georgia Southern University baseball travels to Atlanta to take on The Georgia Institute of Technology for one game.

In the first matchup between the teams earlier this year GSU won by a score of 4-3 with sophomore Jason Richman and senior Matt McCall combining for five scoreless innings pitched with five strikeouts.

Georgia Tech is on a hot streak,

winning the team's last four games by an average of three runs.

Both teams are similar in that they dominate at home, but struggle on the road which could be detrimental for the Eagles.

The Yellow Jackets are 19-13 overall with 15 of their wins coming at home. The Eagles on the other hand are 7-6 on the road, bringing their road record above .500 for the first time in three weeks.

Georgia Tech has only four batters that are currently hitting above .300, and as a team the Yellow Jackets are hitting .278. Senior middle infielder Mott Hyde leads

the team in home runs with two and RBIs with 22.

Pitching-wise the Yellow Jackets have been led by redshirt junior Matthew Grimes as he tops the team with a 4-1 record in five starts and a 3.21 ERA.

As a team they have a 3.30 ERA and allow opponents to hit .253 and the strong point of the pitching staff is the relief pitching.

GSU junior outfielder Aaron Mizell has nine home runs on the year, which almost totals the entire GT team that comes in with 10.

The Eagles have slowly declined in run production and as a result

the batting average has also declined, but they still hit a solid .308. Four Eagles also have more RBIs than Georgia Tech's leading run producer.

Two pitchers to watch for on GSU for this game will be Richman leading the team with five wins and a team-low 1.39 ERA in 24 appearances.

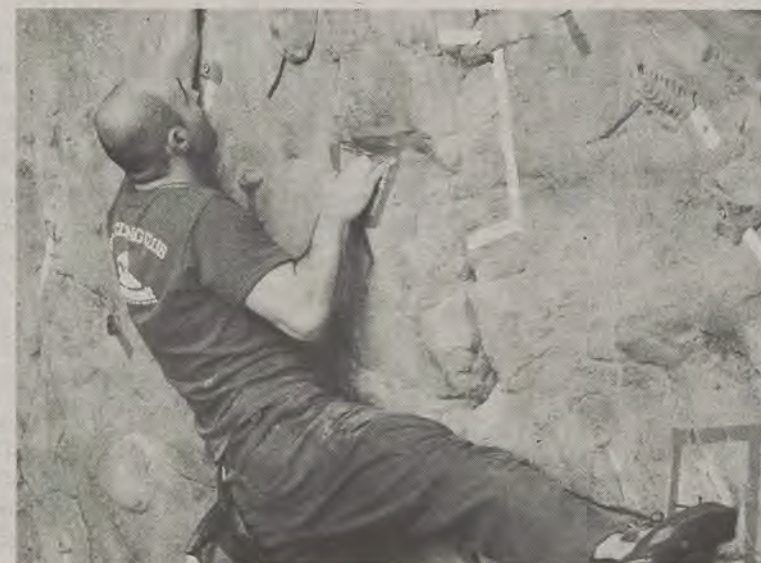

The prizes awarded at this competition are one of its biggest pulls. Southern Adventures gets donations from companies they have formed

The Mason Rudolph Championship tournament was held at Vanderbilt's Legends South Course this past weekend and Georgia Southern University's men's golf team finished in fifth place.

To be expected, the field for this tournament was very difficult. It included No. 1-ranked University of Alabama, No. 17-ranked Florida State University and No. 19-ranked Vanderbilt University by Golf World/Nike Coaches Poll as well as three other top-50 teams. Alabama finished first in the tournament with an 847 followed by Vanderbilt, Mercer University and University of

Louisville.

"Basically we played a solid field. We finished fifth, played pretty well, we didn't have our best stuff this week, but we played solid and came out with a top five finish, which is always something you're looking to do," Head Coach Larry Mays said. "If you play in a good field and finish in the top five, it's kind of like preparing for moving on at regionals later on in the year."

After round one, the Eagles were in the sixth place position with junior Charlie Martin leading the team and tying for second with a score of 62. Martin produced the same score in round two and with the efforts of the whole team, the Eagles moved into fifth place.

"Charlie played great. He played really good the first two days and played solid [Sunday] with some

really tough hole locations out there the last two days especially," Mays said. "Between the weather conditions and the hole location it was a tough tournament."

In the final round of the tournament, the Eagles maintained their fifth place position. Martin also maintained his role as the lead Eagle in the tournament and posted a score of 73 on the day to end in fourth place overall.

"Our next tournament starts our post season. It will be our last SoCon championship with the athletic department moving to the Sun Belt conference next year. This is the last one we'll have a chance to win so that's something we'll be looking forward to," Mays said.

The SoCon Championships will begin on April 20 in Pinehurst, N.C.
