



## DRUNK? STRAIGHT TO JAIL NO MORE

Due to a recent law change, underage citizens may not have to worry about getting caught by police for the possession and consumption of alcohol. Senate Bill 160, which went into effect July 1, now instructs police to issue a citation to offenders of underage drinking, rather than making an arrest. The citation still carries a fine of \$300 and up to six months of jail time. The law change effects police departments statewide.

Previously, the law allowed police officers to arrest offenders and have them booked at their discretion. The new law no longer offers this as an option. However, despite the change, inhabitants of Statesboro may not recognize a difference. According to Officer Justin Samples, who works public relations for Statesboro Police Department, the police here have almost

always practiced a method of "cite and release."

"We did this even before the law changed," says Samples. "...if we saw an underage person in possession of alcohol, either in consumption of it or just by having a beer in their hand, and that was it, we would cite and release."

However, police can arrest an offender for a number of other issues regarding alcohol. Disorderly conduct, public drunkenness and driving under the influence are all crimes that an officer can decide to arrest an offender of underage drinking for. Additionally, an officer can, at their discretion, arrest an offender if it is believed the offender could be a danger to themselves or to others.

"It's about the totality of the circumstances," says Samples. "What is the situation, where are they, what time, how the weather is like, how intoxicated are they, do they

have friends with them that can get them where they need to go... there's a whole bunch of things taken into account to make sure we get them somewhere safe.

Shenanigans, a University Plaza bar, will move to only allowing 21-year-olds and up in its establishment after a City Council meeting decision made this Tuesday.

Shenanigans' liquor license was also suspended for three days, beginning Thursday Oct. 8.

The decision comes after Shenanigans was cited for alleged alcohol violations for the second and third times, September 10 and September 19 respectively.

"When we are talking about four underage persons being served on two occasions...

in a very short time span, I believe action needs to be taken one way or another," Major Rob Bryan of the Statesboro Police Department (SPD) said.

S P D conducted an operation in

September with underage volunteers to help with alcohol compliance checks. The volunteers were compensated for their time and were asked to visit 33 bars and retailers in an attempt to purchase alcohol.

The volunteers, three 18-year-olds and one 19-year old, carried devices that recorded their experience at the establishments, such as standing in line, getting their IDs checked, receiving wristbands and standing in line for drinks.

At Shenanigans specifically, SPD found through recordings that the underage volunteers would receive the underage wristband but would still receive drinks when ordered from the bar.

An 18-year-old freshman that spoke at the City Council meeting said that she was banded on her right hand and, being right-handed, used that same hand for the entire transaction. She flagged down the bartender, paid and received her drink with her right hand but the wristband was never acknowledged. She was also never asked to show ID by a bartender.

Michael Classens, lawyer for Shenanigans owner Jason Franklin, said "As I understand the allegation here, there is no allegation that Mr. Franklin [the owner] himself committed a violation but rather this is the vicarious or derivative whereas the establishment knowingly permitted someone in their employ to commit the violation."

# New bike racks to be built on-campus

The Center for Sustainability has granted funding for new bike racks to be constructed at Hendricks Hall and the College of Engineering building.

After the construction, Hendricks Hall will have a 22 bike parking capacity, while the College of Engineering building will have a 44 bike parking capacity.

There will be a total of four new bike racks that students will be able to use.

"We expect that the installation of new bike parking facilities will encourage more biking and less driving to and around campus for students, faculty and staff. Although

it will benefit the students, the construction will benefit the environment," Lissa Leege, Center for Sustainability director, said.

Although it will benefit the students, the construction will also benefit the environment.

"This decreases vehicle congestion around campus, limits fossil fuel use and pollution, and encourages a healthy lifestyle all at the same time," Leege said.

In addition, landscaping of native grasses will help mitigate additional rainwater runoff from the increased impervious area, according to Leege.

Chuck Taylor, Campus Landscape architect, submitted a proposal to the Center for Sustainability for a grant to be able to

fund the construction of the bike racks, citing the need "to encourage and support the use of bicycles in transportation to, and around campus," in his proposal.

The Student Sustainability Fee Committee approved Taylor's project to install the bike racks.

The Center for Sustainability expects to spend a total of \$25,000 on the construction and all of the money will come from the sustainability fee.

"With the exception of the time and labor provided by the Department of Facilities to support the installation, student sustainability fees are the full funding source for the materials for this project," Leege said.

Last night the Student Government Association hosted a forum regarding police use of force. The forum featured six law enforcement officials from Georgia Southern's Office of Public Safety, Statesboro Police Department and the Bulloch County Sheriff's Office. **What are you guys doing to address the disconnect between police and civilians?**

"Transparency is a big part of it for us. That's why we're here tonight. We don't mind the questions we get tonight, because we want to have an open door- we don't have anything to hide. With everything that's going on in the media, I think it's important to keep this dialogue open. I want to make sure that you guys feel safe. I want you to feel comfortable talking to us at a football game or if you see us on campus. Ask what you need to ask. We're here to answer what we can, and help in any way we can."

**What is your perception of the Black Lives Matter movement?**







The Georgia Southern Eagles Men's Soccer team are readying themselves for a season to remember as they chase the golden prize of a Sun Belt Championship and a NCAA tournament berth. Led by their seniors Jack Falle, Matt Melton, Chase Park, Emmanuel Raji, Eric Dinka, and Dalton Churchwell, they whole heartedly believe they are the team to make Georgia Southern history as the first ever team to win a conference championship and get to the NCAA tournament.

After their intense practice Tuesday morning, they are convinced they have the leaders and an excellent supporting cast to complete a task never accomplished by Georgia Southern Men's soccer. After starting the season (2-4-1) they know they could have done better in the closer games, but know the tough opponents they played like South Carolina and South Florida, who are ranked 15th and 18th respectively in the NCAA, helped them become a stronger team in the long run.

"The season didn't start off the way we wanted it to, we're kind of a young team and people are playing different positions but we're starting to peak at the right moment starting conference and it will turn around for us," Falle said about the record.

"We played some tough opponents and unfortunately had more losses than wins, but it's prepared us for moments like this," Park said. "Non-conference games are important but winning our conference games is what it's all about."

Their first conference game is against Hartwick, the team they lost to in the finals of last year's conference championship game. "We're hungry, we're excited about it and getting three points is our main goal in every game we play no matter who it is," Melton said about their upcoming "revenge" game. "But Hartwick is a game with a little bite to it that we've been looking forward to all season."

Beating last year's champions would definitely put the Eagles in a great starting position to accomplish the goals they have set for themselves. "Those three points on Friday will be huge for our season to get the ball rolling. This is the best team we've had in years, we're not showing it right now but if you look inside our team we know this is the best opportunity we have" said Falle. He has confidence in the team's ability to secure a win on the road to start off their conference slate en route to their ultimate goal: the Sun Belt Championship. Their first conference game of the season will be this Friday, October 9th on the road at Hartwick at 7p.m.

The Georgia Southern Eagles' defense is playing intelligently with a relentless, "no-nonsense," demeanor. The Eagles' defense



"It's to play as hard as we can every down, during every series. We don't only want to play with great effort; we want to play with great intelligence as well."





**Q** What impresses you most about the defense so far this season?

**Q**

## Annual Georgia NAACP convention comes to GSU

Today, delegates from across Georgia will convene for the 73rd Annual Georgia NAACP Convention and Civil Rights Conference at Georgia Southern University.

Hosted by the Center for Africana Studies and the Georgia Southern Collegiate Chapter of the NAACP, the convention runs from Oct. 8-11 with most of its public sessions taking place in the Nessmith-Lane Conference Center.

"The main reason that the

convention is being hosted at Georgia Southern has to do with the fact that Francys Johnson, the president of the Georgia NAACP, is an alumnus of Georgia Southern and someone from this area. He has always had a strong affinity for the university and the community at large," Saba Jallow, director of the Center for Africana Studies, said.

"And more so through the leadership of Pearl Brown, Bulloch branch NAACP president, the students of the university chapter of the NAACP which have been very active and worked very diligently to make this happen

with the support of many of the university's faculty and staff." Opening at noon with a Faith and Values Luncheon, the convention, with the theme of "Towards a Just Society" features numerous workshops and sessions centered around the building blocks of a just society including high quality and accessible education, a sustainable economy, organized labor, lifelong health and wellness, a vibrant democracy with expansive voting rights, affordable housing and a fair criminal justice system.

"I think it's important for students to understand the

role that the NAACP has played historically, including racial relations and dealing with questions of injustice. For them to look around and see some of the issues around us in which the NAACP are relevant in terms of that same process and template that the NAACP has used to deal with questions throughout this country, particularly concerning disadvantaged communities," Jallow said.

The public sessions have dedicated seats to students and community members. Most are first come first serve while others require tickets or a reservation. Many professors

are offering extra credit for participating and conference staff will take up sign-in sheets for registered classes and send them back the professor for attendance verification.

Jallow said "This gives students an opportunity to meet some of the leaders in the NAACP locally, statewide and nationally and to commune with people who are experts in their fields as well as like-minded students, which creates a synergy of building leadership and at the same time continuing traditions".





