Soil-Water Conservation

The Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District, in order to be of greater service to cooperators has made two important steps recently. Over the past five or six years there has been a big demand for metal pipe to be placed in farm ponds. This pipe usually had to be ordered from Atlanta with much delay. Supervisors of the Ogeechee District, in regular session, voted to stock this pipe in Statesboro and Sylvania for immediate use by cooperators. We now have plenty of pond pipe available in Statesboro and Sylvania. Anyone desiring to use this pipe for their ponds should contact Paul Nesmith, local supervisor, or the Work Unit or District Office here in Statesboro.

The other decision by the Board of Supervisors affecting cooperators in the Ogeechee District was to acquire two motor graders from the Army at Fort Gordon. These motor graders will be used to build terraces, waterways, level gulches, down down old terraces, and construct "V" type drainage ditches. The Board of Supervisors expressed deep appreciation to Congressman Prince Preston and the Soil Conservation Service for helping them get this equipment. Output Of Electricity Increased
 Use of electric power . . . regarded by economists as an accurate barometer of a region's business and industrial progress . . . increased substantially during 1957 in the Georgia Power Company's service area, company officials reported.

Total consumption of electricity rose from a record 7.8 billion kilowatt-hours in 1956 to a new high of 8.7 billion in 1957, an increase of more than 11 per cent. New customers added during the year totaled 62,051, including 53,818 residences and 8,102 industrial and commercial concerns.

Of the 62,051 new customers, 38,200 resulted from the purchase by the Georgia Power Company of the proposed Electric Power and Light Company of Georgia.

Electric power consumption by industrial customers increased from 4.1 billion kilowatt-hours in 1956 to 5 billion in 1957, a gain of 19 per cent.

The maximum demand for electric power during the peak hour of 1957 reached 1,997,700 kilowatts, an increase of 15.6 per cent over the peak of 1956.

More than \$51,000,000 was spent by the company in 1957 for the construction of new electric facilities. In addition to this sum, the company invested over \$18,000,000 in acquiring the properties of Georgia Power and Light.

Completion of a fourth generating unit at Plant Yates added 125,000 kilowatts to the company's electric power capacity. At year's end work was in progress on a fifth unit of equal size, to be completed in 1958. Georgia Power's total generating capacity at the end of 1957 was 1,583,680 kilowatts.

Work was started during the year on construction of the 60,000 kilowatt Oliver Dam on the Chattahoochee river, above Columbus, and of a new generating unit of 75,000 kilowatts at Plant McManus, near Brunswick. The company also completed its first from Plant Yates to Bonaire, south of Macon.

More than \$3,200,000 was invested in new transmission lines and \$20,000,000 in distribution lines.

The company's total tax bill for the year was estimated at more than \$24,800,000, an increase of more than \$2,100,000 over 1956. The money goes to the support of public schools and other state and local services and to the federal government.

Mercer To Confer Three Degrees

Mercer University at Macon, Ga., will confer three honorary degrees at commencement exercises June 2, according to President George B. Connell.

The doctor of laws degree will be awarded to Dr. Josiah Crudup, president of Brenau College, and to Bela A. Lancaster, superintendent of LaGrange, Ga., schools.

The doctor of divinity degree will be awarded to the Rev. Harry V. Smith, executive secretary of the Georgia Baptist Foundation and Endowment Committee.

Dr. Crudup was head of the Mercer physics department for 18 years before he was appointed president of Brenau in 1945. While at Mercer he also served as executive secretary of the Alumni Association and was active in civic and religious work in Macon. He is a past president of the Macon Kiwanis Club and was lieutenant governor of Georgia Kiwanis.

He received the M. A. Degree from Mercer in 1923. As a student assistant in the physics department, he helped build the original radio station WMAZ in the tower of the Administration Building on the Mercer Campus. He is a member of Kappa Alpha fraternity.

Dr. Crudup holds the M. A. degree from Peabody College and the Ph. D. from the University of

Chicago, where he did research in X-rays and cosmic rays on a Rockefeller Fellowship.

In 1951 he was presented an award by Mercer for meritorious service in the field of alumni work. In addition to Mercer, he has taught at Alabama Agriculture School, Georgia State Women's College, Tift College and Peabody College.

Lancaster, an outstanding Georgia educational leader, has been superintendent of schools in LaGrange since 1927. He was graduated by Mercer in 1925, and continued straight through to receive the master of arts degree from the Baptist institution later the same year. He was honored by being elected Master Mercerian . . . Immediately after leaving Mercer, he was appointed principal of Cedartown High School, and in 1930 became superintendent of schools in Vidalia, a position he held until he went to LaGrange. He was president of the Georgia Education Association in 1947.

During his years at Mercer he was president of the sophomore class, the YMCA, SEA fraternity, and alternate captain of the football team. He has served two terms on the Mercer Board of trustees.

Active in both civic and religious activities, he has been president of the LaGrange Rotary Club, moderator of the Troup County Baptist Association and chairman of the board of deacons of the LaGrange First Baptist Church.
