# HERMAN TALMAGH Reports From WASHINGTON

## Electricity Consumption Increases

Consumption of electric energy in the Georgia Power Company's 57,000-square mile service area increased from a record 6 billion kilowatt-hours in 1957 to a new high of 8.9 billion kilowatt-hours in 1958.

Biggest increase in electric power sales, as shown by the estimated year-end totals, was recorded in the residential field, where the company's customers recorded a 10.55 per cent gain over the previous year. Commercial and industrial customers accounted for a 2.6 per cent gain.

Approximately 13,000 new customers were added during the year, including more than 10,000 residential customers and approximately 2,000 in the commercial and industrial fields.

The increased number and variety of electrical appliances used in Georgia homes was indicated by the fact that during 1958 the average Georgia Power residential customer used 3,874 kilowatt-hours of electricity.

The maximum demand for power during the peak hour of 1958 reached 2,139,500 kilowatts and was recorded on July 20. This was a 10.4 per cent increase over the peak hour's demand in 1957, which was attained on August 15.

Approximately \$53,700,000 was invested during the year in new electric facilities. The company completed a fifth generating unit at Plant Yates near Newnan, having a capacity of 125,000 kilowatts. Construction continued at Plant McManus near Brunswick, where a new 75,000 kilowatt generating unit is being added and at Jefferson. Plans also were initiated for a new 40,000 kilowatt hydroelectric project. Both are scheduled for operation in 1959.

Work was nearly completed on the eastern area of the company's new general service headquarters at Forest Park, near Atlanta. This project will cost approximately \$4,335,000. Plans also were initiated during 1958 for constructing a new general office building in Atlanta.

Approximately 557,700,000 was invested during the year in new electric facilities. The company's tax bill for the year was estimated at nearly \$27,000,000, or 20 per cent of its total revenue. The tax total was seven per cent higher than during 1957. The money goes to the support of public schools and other state and local services and to the federal government.

## Fescue Poisoning In New Area

Fescue foot is reported in the Journal of the American Veterinary Medical Association, from a climatic and soil type environment—muck soil pastures in Florida—which differs from those in the areas where this disease has been found previously. Previous reports of fescue poisoning in cattle have been from the Rocky Mountain area and mid-South.

Research at the College of Veterinary Medicine, Colorado State University, indicates that the poisonous substance resembles the causative agent in ergot poisoning.

As reported in Florida, the animals in better physical conditions were less severely affected by the lameness, and drying up of extremities such as the feet and tail, than were thin cattle.

Of 171 steers in the group of cattle turned out on muck soil, 18 died and 15 showed slight or severe lameness and lost the switch from the tail. Of 150 steers in good condition, only 15 developed a slight limp, although several lost the switch.

The less severely affected animals recovered and new cases stopped appearing within a few weeks, even though the animals were not moved off the pasture. This suggests, the report said, that fescue may be poisonous only at certain stages of growth or under certain weather conditions. A second possibility may be that the animals acquire resistance to the poisonous substance after exposure for a period of time. Further research is being conducted.

## How Liming Helps Yields On Acid Soil

(By Roy Powell, County Agent)

Most legumes, vegetables and field crops grow much better on well limed soil than on an acid soil. In many cases, liming the soil means the difference between success and failure. Under most conditions it makes it possible to grow a good crop instead of a poor one.

Liming materials supply readily available calcium and magnesium. By their use the availability of soil phosphorus and nitrogen is increased. As a result, plants on limed soil tend to have higher contents of these elements, all of which are essential to man and animals. Liming encourages the growth of legumes, which tend to be especially rich in protein, in calcium and phosphorus, and in the minor elements that are essential to animals.

Lime not only supplies calcium, but its influence on the availability of other mineral elements has far-reaching effects on crop growth and yield.

It has been clearly shown by experiments that soil phosphates are more available to plants in a pH range of 6.0-7.0 than below 6.0 or about 7.5. In cotton experiments, results have shown that 1 lb. of phosphate produced more cotton at a pH 6.0 than did two pounds at a pH 5.1.

Pasture research points out that one pound of phosphate produced more herbage at pH 6.1 than three pounds did at pH 5.2. In case of white clover pastures, 60 percent more forage was produced on lim-

## Warns Against Over Expansion

Commenting on the spring pig crop report for 1958, Secretary of Agriculture Beeson has expressed gratification that farmers have not over-expanded hog production and warned against overexpansion in the next 12 months.

The official Department of Agriculture report indicates that the 1958 spring pig crop was only 2 percent larger than that of a year earlier, but that farmers intend to have a fall crop 14 percent larger than last fall. Secretary Beeson urged farmers to review their production plans for the remainder of the 1958 fall pig crop and point out the possibilities of increasing the 1959 spring crop too much.

"Overexpansion leads to inefficient use of resources and low prices and incomes, as the experience of 1955 and several other years demonstrated," the secretary said. "Favorable hog prices can be maintained only if farmers produce products in the quantities and of the quality desired by the Nation's consumers."

## GA. Power's Tax Bill Is \$4,350,000

District and local managers of the Georgia Power Company are presenting to municipal and county government officials checks totalling approximately \$4,350,000 for the company's 1958 property taxes, according to W. Tom Martin, District Manager at Statesboro.

Of this amount, Mr. Martin reported \$2,245,500 goes into general county funds, \$1,718,700 to school districts, and \$394,800 to cities and towns.

The company already has paid more than \$225,000 in property taxes for the year 1958 making the total to be paid for this year \$5,275,000. This compares with \$4,840,486 paid for the year 1957.

Earlier in the year, municipal partnership tax payments totalling \$1,951,083 were paid by the company to the 381 cities, towns and communities in which the first three per cent franchise agreement was in effect. Under this agreement, the company pays each municipality in which it operates three per cent of its gross revenue from the sale of electricity for residential and commercial use.

These municipal partnership tax payments were based on 1957 electric revenue and were in addition to property tax payments. The Georgia Power Company official pointed out that approximately 20 per cent of the company's total revenue goes to pay taxes, including federal and state income taxes, municipal partnership taxes and others.

According to Mr. Martin, Bulloch County and municipalities of this county received \$18,243.38
