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Man Of Year In Service To Agriculture

R. L. Vansant, now division director for the Georgia State Department of Agriculture, is named Man of the Year in Service to Agriculture for Georgia by The Progressive Farmer in its January issue.

When he retired as state director of Farmers' Home Administration in September 1958, Mr. Vansant had been in professional ag-

 ricultural service for thirty-eight years. He served with the Agricultural Extension Service as county agent in Murray, Walker and Cobb counties for nearly fifteen years. In 1934 he became state director of the Resettlement Administration. This later became Farm Security Administration and since 1945 he has been Farmers' Home Administration.
 Called "one of the outstanding administrators in the field of agriculture today," Mr. Vansant has always tried to help family-type farmers reach and maintain a standard of living equal to that of other citizens. How well he succeeded is shown by what happened to Georgia farmers during his directorship of FHA: In 1949, average gross farm income of FHA borrowers was \$1,340, while average gross income of all Georgia farms was \$1,892. In 1957, average for all farms in the state was \$3,893.
 Most of the FHA borrowers, when they received loans, could not get credit from conventional sources. By 1957, average net worth of all Georgia FHA borrowers was \$9,433.
 One of the main factors contributing to these huge gains was Mr. Vansant's foresight in helping them get facilities and know how to balance farming operations.

1958 Cotton Crop

11 Million Bales
 Excessive rains during September have reduced this year's cotton-crop prospects in some areas, according to word received in the Bulloch Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Office. The expected cotton crop now stands at 11,975,000 bales, down 430,000 bales from a month ago. This is higher than the 10,964,000 bales produced in 1957, but less than the 1947-50 average of 14,136,000 bales.
 The indicated yield of 400 pounds per harvested acre in 1958 is a little less than estimated a month ago, but still 52 pounds above the previous high. The 1957 average was 288 pounds, and the 1947-50 average, 317 pounds.
 Cotton acreage for harvest, as estimated September 1, is 11,960,000 acres, compared with a national average of 17,534,528 acres allotted to farmers throughout the nation under the cotton production program. About 5 million acres of the 1958 national cotton allotment were "reserved" by farmers under the Soil Bank's Acreage Reserve Program.
