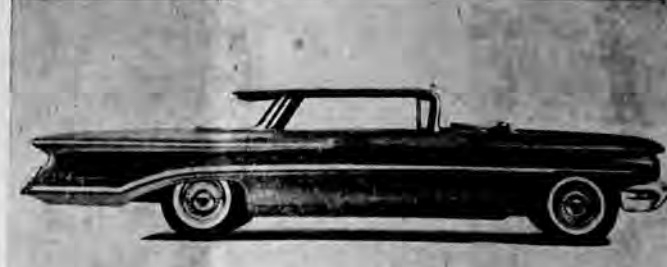
GSC Defeats Spring Hill, 86-59

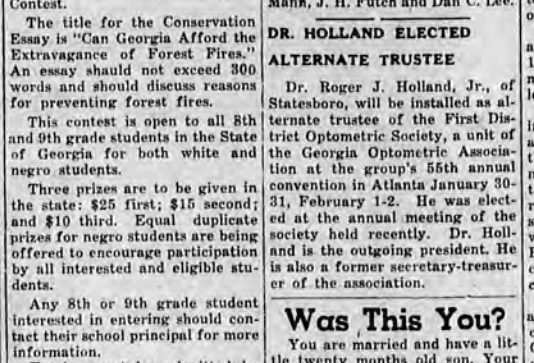

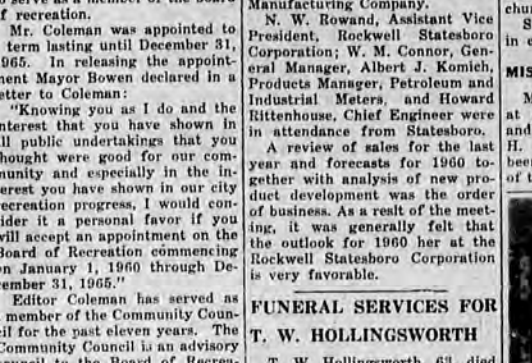

On Spending Money

The economic experts are predicting that 1960 will be a successful business year. This seems to indicate that earnings will be high again this year. Remember this, we suggest that the reader seriously consider saving a little money during 1960. No one knows exactly what the future holds. As far as 1960 is concerned, we rather think it will be a better year than 1959. That is our personal opinion, however, and we do not pose as an economic expert.

In Memory Of A Genius

On January 17, 1706, a man named Benjamin Franklin was born in Boston, Massachusetts. That man came as near being a universal genius as any man the United States has ever produced. The list of Franklin's activities shows how unusual his intellectual qualities were even at a time when science had not advanced to its present point. At the age of fifteen, Franklin was writing satirical articles for a Boston newspaper, and at seventeen he had already put into practice conclusions he had reached as a result of his keen observations. At the age of nineteen, he traveled to London on a mission from a friend to provide him with money for the purchase of equipment for a printing office. The promise was not kept, and Franklin had to find work for himself in England. The young American genius returned in England for a year and a half and remained in Philadelphia, where he soon opened a printing establishment of his own. At the age of twenty-three, he obtained control of the Pennsylvania Gazette, which he edited, and with which he began an amazing adult career. All his success, from that time forward, cannot possibly be extracted in this editorial. It is enough to say, however, that Franklin was the first American to win an international reputation, that he was an inventor of considerable fame, that he was a great author, a diplomat, an educator and a successful business man.

As Old As You Feel

The other day we saw a picture of a man diving off a bridge, several stories above an ice-cold river, and the picture revealed that the man was sixty-two years old. On the same day we read of an interview newsman had with Senator Jack Kennedy, who is running for President of the United States. Mr. Kennedy said that he did not think age should be the determining factor in the consideration of a candidate, although he admitted that he is—he is forty-two years old—was something of a handicap in his bid for the presidential nomination of the Democratic party. "A lot of men of seventy can't write a letter, so doesn't it really come down to what the quality is of the candidate," Kennedy said. We agree. Thomas Jefferson was only thirty-two years old when he wrote the Declaration of Independence. Some of history's greatest men and

leaders have been under forty, or even thirty, when they reached the zenith of their fame and power. And, the pleading that one is too young to be able, or that one must be so old before he is entrusted with responsibility, is the last refuge of the elderly. It is a defensive, negative view to which we do not subscribe. Just as we have always believed that marriages cannot be based upon age (and we have seen many happy marriages where the wife or husband was much older than the mate) we believe age is no proper criterion for judgment of ability, or qualification for positions of responsibility. Generally speaking, a person is only as old as he feels. Spirit, a sense of well-being, exercise and an adequate diet, are all important. Perhaps, however, a sense of well-being, or the "young as you feel" spirit, is the main thing. Think young, and remain active, and you will probably live longer.

LET'S TAKE A WALK

Perhaps there is no more frequent expression of desire than "let's take a walk." The children do it in order to explore the wonders of nature, discover unseen sights or out of plain curiosity. Youth does it out of excitement, to confer with the unseen but well-known gods of love that are about, particularly in the spring time when a young man's thoughts turn to fancy and love. The old do it because they like to gaze upon the effects of nature that slowly but certainly influenced their lives, that they may refresh the memories of their youth and relive the experiences that poured golden hours into the bosom of their hearts. It makes no difference which group, children, youth or the old, there is a great deal to be learned from a walk. A walk is a character test because it is the places they visit when on a walk that magnify their happy and sad memories of what they have been and the things of the past that either ruined or made happy the days they have lived. Burns, our first great detective, and Conan Doyle, the writer and detective, were among the first to discover that to return to the scene of his crime, whether to admire or retrace, was to know, but they always go back. Can there ever be a more wholesome group than a group of youngsters strolling down a road or through the woods, their pockets filled with flowers, then romp and sing with youth as it starts upward to the mountain top of success, rest again, then see two or three descend, then home be careful that no disaster overtakes us on the way down for these who are not concerned with the past but the heads of history and engrave their names on the hearts of men, while those who are content with the present go on to unmarked graves. When youth takes a walk it is the outgrowth of an unrestrained enthusiasm for living, in pursuit of more happiness, to pay court to the girl of his dreams or to laugh and play. Did you ever walk down a road, arms crossed behind their backs in meditation, with the drab past, only the gold of future, the end of the rainbow, tomorrow. They do not as yet suffer from life's sorrows, only the pimple of uncertainty. If the love man had remained in his cave and discovered all the things of civilization would have been different.

When old people take a walk it is to refresh their memory, muse over the past, compile experiences and philosophize on the future and to either compose their thoughts on paper, advise the young or point out some material thing that the carefree youth are not concerned with. Testing Cotton Seed Important (By Roy Powell, County Agent)

Georgia farmers who have saved their own cotton seed for planting next spring should have a germination test made on these seeds before using them for planting purposes.

Due to the large amount of rain this fall, many of the cotton seed which have been saved in Georgia are going to be unfit for planting. The only way farmers can be assured of getting a stand with their own seed next spring is to have the seed tested and adjust their planting rate according to the germination of their seed.

Farmers may have their seed tested free by mailing a sample to the State Seed Laboratory, Georgia Department of Agriculture, 19 Hunter St., S.W., Atlanta 3, Ga. In taking a sample from seed that has been stored in bags, farmers should take a handful of seed from near the center of every third or fourth bag, mix the seed together well and then send about a one pound coffee can full of seed laboratory.

In taking a sample from seed in bulk, farmers should take a handful of seed from seven or eight uniformly distributed places of the lot, mix the different samples together and send about a one pound coffee can full to the seed laboratory.

All seed samples sent to the laboratory for testing should include the name of the kind and variety, lot number and the name and full address of the sender. The name and address of the sender should be on the inside and outside of the package.

Recent research at the Southern Piedmont Experiment Station at Watkinsville, Ga., shows how cotton benefits from irrigation. For the last three years the average yield on irrigated plots of cotton has averaged 1500 pounds of seed cotton. A ten year average at Watkinsville, 1949 through 1958, shows that an average of 5.6 in. of water was added each year and that the average increase in production for cotton under irrigation was 84.2 pounds per bushel.

It is also another difference in bog raising in Georgia. Three years ago there were few confinement feeding floors in the state. In 1959 there were approximately 1,000 such feeding floors and the size of each unit seems to be increasing.

BETTER SILAGE Almost 10 per cent more dry matter can be recovered in silage made from finely chopped and bruised forage than from coarser cut forage. That's what recent experiments of USDA's Agricultural Research Center, Beltsville, Md., show.

The scientists who made the tests felt the better quality silage produced by bruising was due to rupture of a high percentage of plant cells. This caused the fermentation to be more rapid and
