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Georgia Southern pumps \$493 million into local economy

GSU has an economic impact of nearly a half billion dollars on Southeast Georgia, according to a study conducted by Phyllis Isley in the University's Bureau of Business Research and Economic Development (BBRED).

According to the study, the university pumped \$493,269,907 into the economy in Fiscal Year 2003-04. The study measured the impact of GSU in a nine-county region of Southeast Georgia, including: Bulloch, Bryan, Candler, Chatham, Effingham, Emanuel, Evans, Jenkins and Screven Counties.

"This report presents a systematic analysis of the total economic impact of GSU on the nine-county region," said Isley. "We divided the analysis into four components: the impact of non-personnel operating expenses; the impact of

salaries and payroll; the impact of expenditures by students; and the impact of major construction projects."

The university spent \$130 million in non-personnel operating expenses, including everything from expenditures for printing and publications to electricity, gasoline, tractors and office furniture.

Salaries for faculty, staff and support services as well as payments to consultants and casual labor were \$80 million. The 15,704 students at Georgia Southern spent an estimated \$104 million and Georgia Southern spent \$15 million dollars on construction. The total direct expenditures totaled \$329.3 million.

Miller turns on Democrats, calls Kerry weak and wobbly

NEW YORK - Hailed by Republicans as "the conscience of the Democratic Party," Georgia Sen. Zell Miller asserted Wednesday that Senate colleague John Kerry's indecisiveness would encourage terrorists and weaken the country's defenses.

"George Bush wants to grab terrorists by the throat and not let them go to get a better grip," the Georgia senator said. "From John Kerry, they get a 'yes-no-maybe' bowl of mush that can only encourage our enemies and confuse our friends."

To a den of cheering Republicans, Miller delivered the keynote GOP

address, a resounding denunciation of Kerry and the Democratic Party to which he has belonged for half a century. He enthusiastically endorsed President Bush's re-election.

"I have knocked on the door of this man's soul and found someone home, a God-fearing man with a good heart and a spine of tempered steel," Miller said. "The man I trust to protect my most precious possession: my family."

The partisan crowd went wild, holding up signs saying "We love Zell" and "It's Zell Miller Time," when he said "No pair has been more wrong, more loudly, more often than the two senators from Massachusetts, Ted Kennedy and John Kerry."

Vice President Dick Cheney followed Miller to the podium and said, "I'm sure glad Zell Miller is on our side."

Still, Miller said he has no plans to become a Republican - he's not seeking re-election - and his vote for Bush will be his first for a Republican in 52 years as a voter.

Miller gave the Democratic keynote address 12 years earlier in the same Madison Square Garden, and his colleagues seethed in anger - calling him a turncoat and organizing protests at his office.

Miller, meanwhile, was scathing in his criticism of fellow Democrat Kerry. He said no one had been "more wrong, more loudly, more often."

"For more than 20 years, on every one of the great issues of freedom and security, John Kerry has been more wrong, more weak and more wobbly than any other national figure," Miller said. "As a war protester, Kerry blamed our military. As a senator, he voted to weaken our military."

Miller, D-Ga., said Kerry had voted to cut key weapon systems. "This is a man who wants to be the commander in chief of our U.S. armed forces? U.S. forces armed with what? Spitballs?" Miller said.

In those remarks, Miller ignored the cuts in military spending that Vice President Dick Cheney pushed as defense secretary under the first President Bush. Cheney canceled the Navy F-14D Tomcat fighter and sent

Georgia eyes Frances while preparing for Florida evacuees

Still a possible target for Hurricane Frances, coastal Georgia kept close watch on the massive storm Wednesday while also bracing for a potential flood of evacuees from Florida.

Though forecasts Wednesday showed the powerful Category 4 hurricane appeared to be headed for Florida, there's still the possibility that Frances could make landfall in Georgia or South Carolina.

Local officials in coastal Georgia planned to decide Friday whether to order any evacuations, keeping in mind that fleeing Floridians could clog highway escape routes as they did when Hurricane Floyd threatened the coast in 1999.

"Right now, our primary concern would have to be evacuees from Florida," said Lisa Ray, spokeswoman for the Georgia Emergency Management Agency. "We would not evacuate just because Florida is ... But we'd want to give Georgia folks a chance to get out before we're flooded with Florida folks."

Gov. Sonny Perdue declared a state of emergency for the entire state through midnight Monday as a precautionary measure to prepare for possible damage or flooding, and to prevent price gouging of evacuees needing gas, food, lodging and other supplies. In addition to kicking in strict gouging protections, the emergency order allows state resources to be used to assist local governments to protect public health and safety and to minimize property damage.

Ray said emergency officials and the Red Cross were considering opening shelters in southern Georgia to help deal with any influx of Florida evacuees.

With only 100 miles of coastline, Georgia hasn't suffered a direct hit from a major hurricane since 1898.

Still, the menacing strength of Frances coupled with the damage wrought by Hurricane Charley in Florida last month has even normally stoic coastal Georgians spooked by the oncoming storm.

"The people here are paying this one a little more attention than they normally would," said Tybee Island

University of Pittsburgh to offer same-sex benefits

PITTSBURGH - The University of Pittsburgh has agreed to offer health benefits to same-sex partners, ending eight years of legal wrangling by the issue.

The state-affiliated university's decision to offer benefits to same-sex partners was included in an eight-page, memo to employees on Wednesday. University spokesman Robert Hill confirmed that the school had decided to extend the benefits.

The decision resolves a 1996 lawsuit stemming from a complaint filed by former Pitt employee Deborah Henson with the Pittsburgh Commission on Human Relations alleging that the school violated the city's 1990 gay-rights law barring discrimination based on sexual orientation. Six other peoples later joined her in the pending class-action lawsuit.

In 2000, Pitt won an injunction from Allegheny County Judge Robert Gallo to bar the commission from hearing the lawsuit on the basis that the city law exceeded the scope of the state's Human Relations Act. The school also noted that a state law exempts public universities from local laws that mandate that health benefits be extended to domestic partners.

Witold Walczak, litigation director for the American Civil Liberties Union, which represented the employees, hailed the school's decision.

"This is a marvelous day not only for university employees but for the school itself and human rights generally," Walczak said.

Prosecutors reportedly to drop Kobe charge

EAGLE, Colo. - Attorneys in the Kobe Bryant case hastily assembled behind closed doors in the courtroom Wednesday amid reports prosecutors will drop the rape charges against the NBA star. The prosecution will drop the case as early as Thursday, according to media outlets including MSNBC, ABC and Court TV, all citing unidentified sources.

Federal judge orders halt to sale of Indian oil lands in Oklahoma

WASHINGTON - A federal judge has ordered the Interior Department to temporarily halt its auction of Indian lands in Oklahoma, some of which come with rights for oil drilling.

U.S. District Judge Royce Lamberth signed the restraining order late Tuesday at the request of lawyers in the multibillion-dollar lawsuit by American Indians against the Interior Department.

"In no way are we saying that individuals don't have the right to sell their land," said Keith Harper, a lawyer for the Indians. "The problem is that it is not at all clear that they have given knowing consent to the sale, or that they would get fair market value."

The department had planned to start opening bids Wednesday for the 26 parcels of land totaling about 2,000 acres in the oil-rich region around Anadarko, Okla. It was once a hunting ground for numerous tribes such as the Kiowa, Comanche, Apache, Wichita and Caddo. The parcels range in size from about two to 160 acres.

Dan DuBray, an Interior Department spokesman said the auction involved Indians who had asked the department to sell their lands. He said the judge's order would affect all further sales. "It's been a practice of the Department for 30 years," he said.

China showcases space program in rare visit to top-secret launch center

JIUQUAN, China - Rising space power China provided a rare peek into its top-secret launch center Wednesday, capitalizing on its recent success in orbit to promote the military-funded project as a lure for foreign investment and a key to growing prosperity.

A police car with flashing lights led busloads of international journalists across northwestern China's vast Gobi Desert to the Jiuquan space center, past armored patrol vehicles and a sign, in English: "Foreigners are not allowed to enter without permission."

It was the first time China let foreigners enter, though officials forbade photographs of the command-and-control center with its rows of computer screens or the mammoth assembly hall where workers built the spacecraft that lifted China's first astronaut into orbit last October.

For the secrecy-conscious national government, Jiuquan houses treasures to be guarded closely. But to local officials, Jiuquan is a blue-ribbon brand name just waiting to be marketed far and wide.

"No matter what products are named after Jiuquan, they will sell," said Hao Yuan, assistant to the governor of Gansu province, where part of the space center is located.

Militants release seven hostages

BAGHDAD, Iraq - Militants released seven foreign hostages Wednesday after their employer paid \$500,000 ransom, while France mustered support from Muslims at home and abroad to push for the release of two French journalists still held captive in Iraq.

The U.S. military, meanwhile, said a U.S. airstrike late Wednesday hit a suspected safehouse used by followers of Jordanian militant Abu Musab al-Zarqawi in Fallujah. Witnesses said 17 people, including three children, were killed and six wounded. U.S. forces have bombed numerous targets in the city, which is a center of Sunni Muslim insurgents.

Earlier in the day, gunmen fired at a convoy carrying Ahmad Chalabi, a prominent Iraqi politician and one-time U.S. ally, wounding two of his bodyguards just hours before he joined other officials for the swearing-in ceremony of Iraq's new transitional assembly.

The first meeting of the National Council, which is to act as a watchdog body over the interim government and help shepherd Iraq toward January elections, was marred by a nearby mortar barrage that wounded one person, the U.S. military said.

Newly discovered virus suspected in two SIDS cases

MILWAUKEE - A virus recently discovered in Japan is suspected in two "crib deaths" in Wisconsin, raising new questions about how many of these mysterious tragedies might be caused by germs.

The cases mark the first time the virus has been identified in the United States. Whether it killed the babies is not clear, but both were sick before they died and had signs of disease in their lungs.

Sudden infant death syndrome - also called "crib death" for the devastating way it is usually discovered - is a catch-all term for unexplained deaths in children less than a year old. About 2,200 occur each year in the United States, mostly involving babies between 2 and 4 months old.

Brain or breathing abnormalities, genetic mutations and birth defects are possible causes. The risk rises if babies live with smokers, are put to sleep on their stomachs, or are bundled in too many clothes or covers.

Infections also have long been implicated. However, many SIDS victims are not tested for viruses that might be the culprit.

Attackers wrapped with suicide bomb belts seize school in southern Russia

BESLAN, Russia - Armed militants with explosives strapped to their bodies stormed a Russian school in a region bordering Chechnya on Wednesday, corralling hundreds of hostages - many of them children - into a gymnasium and threatening to blow up the building if surrounding Russian troops attacked. At least two people were killed, including a school parent.

Camouflage-clad special forces carrying assault rifles encircled Middle School No. 1 in the North Ossetian town of Beslan. Earlier Beslan, a little girl in a flowered dress fled the school holding a soldier's hand; officials said about a dozen other people managed to escape by hiding in a boiler room.

A militant sniper took position on a top floor of the three-story school, and hours into the standoff Russian security officials used a phone number they were given and began negotiations with the hostage-takers - widely believed linked to Chechen rebels suspected in a string of deadly attacks that appeared connected with last Sunday's presidential election in the war-ravaged republic.

More than 1,000 people, including many distraught parents, crowded outside police cordons demanding information and accusing the government of failing to protect their children.

Salt City Splash plans canine pool party

HUTCHINSON, KS. - Ted Nelson, aquatics director of the Hutchinson Recreation Commission, said the Salt City Splash pool will be specially prepared for an upcoming event.

On Sept. 7, the day after the aquatic center closes to the public until next summer, dogs will be allowed to enjoy both the beach-like entry of the 50-meter pool and the shallow water play area from 4 to 8 p.m.

The \$5-per-dog charge will help benefit the recreation commission as well as construction of Hutchinson's new animal shelter.

Owners will be able to wade in the water with their dogs to help ease any fears, but they must stay in knee-deep water because the chlorine level in the pool has been lowered, causing it not to meet minimum health standards for humans.

Toys in the water, as well as sunbathing on the edge, also will be allowed.

To prevent what Nelson terms "mass chaos in the pools," there will be alternating sessions for small to medium-size dogs and large dogs.

Cash-strapped York receives donation- of toilet paper

YORK, PA - York, a city struggling with its finances, has received a most practical gift.

An anonymous donor dropped off a case of toilet paper at City Hall on Sunday. The gesture was in response to a recent comment made by York Councilman Wm. Lee Smallwood, who wondered how the cash-strapped city would close

a \$25 million deficit in the police and fire pensions.

"We can't even afford toilet paper," Smallwood said.

"What do you think we are going to do with it - decorate the trees? Of course we will use it, given all the (stuff) we have to put up with," Brenner said.

Smallwood said it was comforting the public is paying attention to the city's problems. "They are just trying to help out," he said.

Zell-out: Miller's party betrayal

Last night, U.S. Senator Zell Miller of Georgia spoke at the Republican National Convention. The problem: He's a Democrat.

Using some of the most stinging rhetoric possible, Miller talked of Bush as if he were a God, turning his back on fellow Democratic Senator John Kerry as if he were the lame duck in office.

Miller's embarrassment of the party didn't start last night. It has been a long-running thing for him to side with conservative Republicans on just about every issue.

It's hard to think that the former Governor who gave Georgia HOPE is now supporting the man who is spreading hopelessness throughout the world; that the man who was behind former Senator Max Cleland in the 2002 elections is now supporting the party who launched the biggest smear campaign in history, calling Cleland, a Vietnam veteran who lost both legs and one arm, a supporter of terrorists.

During the convention, many of the delegates chanted "flip-flop, flip-flop," referring to Kerry and the image that has been cast upon him by the Republican Party regarding his

policy decisions and voting record.

The irony in the chant is too real. While the delegates chant "flip-flop," they were watching one flip-flop—Miller—speak highly about another—Bush. Miller's flipping and flopping is evident in his party loyalty, or lack thereof. Calling himself a Democrat and then acting like a Republican is about as flippish as it gets.

And what about Bush? Check this out: The U.S. is attacked by Afghanistan, so Bush instigates a war with Iraq on the basis of "weapons of mass destruction." When there is a plethora of evidence that the weapons in Iraq do not exist, he decides that they're probably still there because they were decades ago, and then goes to war anyway without the support of any of his allies except for one.

The truth is, the Republicans are cowards. They didn't win the election in 2000, and they're scared it will happen again, but this time in a way that the messed up system won't help them prevail. 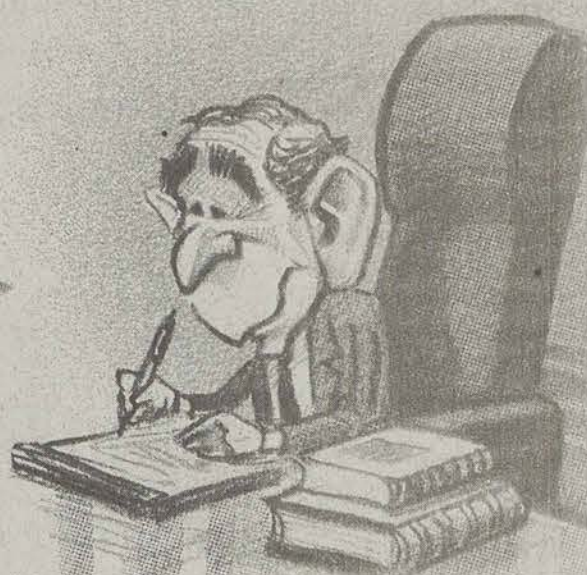

Consider the powerful preaching of the Pope on his historic trips to Poland, or the simple, silent passion of Rosa Parks who moved millions by moving herself to the front of a bus. Admittedly, great passion is risky and exhausting and in short supply in our world. Without it, however, all your efforts will be third-rate at best.

When my students ask me how they might develop this passion, I reply with the Socratic dictum: "Know Thyself." Discovering who and what you are will nurture the energy of passion, which is intensely personal.

PREPARATION

I use this term instead of ability or talent because these imply some restrictions. Not

everyone has the ability to hit a baseball well or the talent to sing beautifully. But anyone and everyone can be prepared for their endeavors. How to prepare calls upon previous education, specialized knowledge, and openness to new knowledge, new people and new ideas. Being prepared means you know what you are doing.

Being prepared also enables you to take advantage of all options and unexpected opportunities because it means that you are actively searching for your goal. You won't get a job unless you look for one. You won't find a spouse if you don't date. Once you are fully prepared, then you can "just do it." Otherwise your efforts will just swoosh back in your face like a boomerang.

SELF-CONFIDENCE

The Gospels tell you not to hide your light under a bushel. As the Apostle Luke discussed the matter, "...when your eye is sound (vision) your whole body is full of light." If you are really good at what you do, if your passionate vision has been made real through proper preparation, you will have the confidence to show (not flaunt) your accomplishments. You will not feel evaluation by others. Self-confidence enables you to persevere through early failures, or rejections, mistakes and misfortunes to become better, to achieve success. In this regard, you will remember Paul Hamm's stirring Olympic achievement.

LUCK

Hamm's Olympic fate is also illustrative of the role of luck. We won't all have good luck. The changing face of fortune must keep you ever alert. Good luck makes things easy. Making your own luck by being prepared is a worthy American ideal. But triumphing over bad luck is certainly the highest mark of excellence anyone attains in the service of a vision. That is how you fulfill your quest.

ETHICS

Whether informed by religion or other systems of belief, one must have a code to light the way while searching the darkness. As a young college student, much of your ethical character is developing. You will benefit from your further understanding of your role in helping others and in contributing to families, groups, and communities.

Finally, remember this: the quest is your very own and it is a life-long journey. It is about being as much of yourself as you can possibly dare. May your cup runneth over.

Prosecutors drop Kobe Bryant case; NBA star apologizes to accuser

EAGLE, Colo. - The criminal case against Kobe Bryant case collapsed Wednesday as prosecutors said they had no choice but to drop the sexual assault charge because the NBA star's accuser no longer wanted to participate.

Bryant, whose trial had been days from opening arguments, responded with an apology to the woman who had accused him and whose civil suit for damages is still pending.

"Although I truly believe this encounter between us was consensual, I recognize now that she did not and does not view this incident the same way I did," Bryant said. "I now understand how she feels that she did not consent to this encounter."

With the parents of the 20-year-old alleged victim looking on, District Judge Terry Ruckriegle threw out the case under a deal that means no charges will be refiled. Neither Bryant nor his accuser was in the courtroom.

The dismissal marks a stunning turn in the high-profile case against one of the NBA's brightest young stars. For months, prosecutors had insisted they had a strong enough case to win a conviction beyond a reasonable doubt.

Instead, prosecutors backed away just days before opening statements were scheduled to begin on Tuesday. Jury selection was scheduled to wrap up this week.

District Attorney Mark Hurlbert told Ruckriegle the woman did not want to testify or otherwise participate in the trial.

Outside the courthouse, Hurlbert said the decision to drop the case "is not based upon a lack of belief in the victim - she is an extremely credible and an extremely brave young woman."

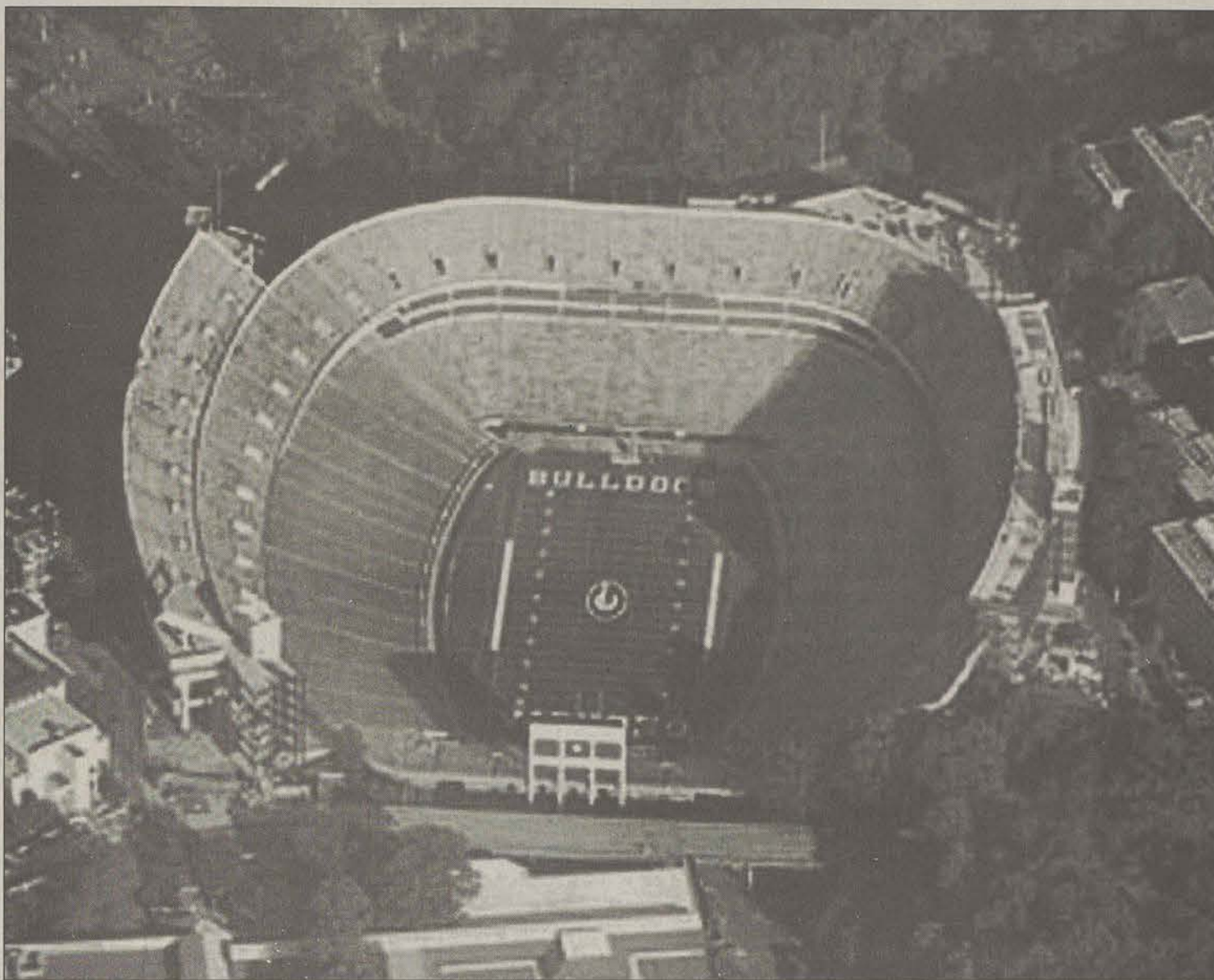
"Our belief in her has not wavered over the past year. ... Ultimately, we respect her decision 100 percent," Hurlbert said.

Bryant said the civil case

The Georgia Southern football season kicks off this Saturday at Sanford Stadium against the Georgia Bulldogs.

Serena wears 'superhero' outfit en route to latest victory

Williams, Mauresmo through to third round at U.S. Open

NEW YORK - Wearing what she described as her "micro-mini" outfit, third-seeded Serena Williams advanced to the third round of the U.S. Open on Wednesday with a 6-4, 6-3 victory over Lindsay Lee-Waters.

"I have another surprise for the next match," she said.

Second-seeded Amelie Mauresmo almost got surprised, dropping the first set to Julia Vakulenko. But Mauresmo recovered to win the match 3-6, 6-2, 6-2.

Mauresmo overcame 34 unforced errors and 10 double faults and finished the match with her fourth ace.

"I started very slow in the first set," said Mauresmo, who won the silver medal at Athens. "I'm looking forward to improve my game because I am not satisfied now."

Gustavo Kuerten, the former French Open champion who was seeded No. 20, was a first-round loser, beaten by Kristian Pless 6-4, 3-6, 6-1, 7-6 (4). Kuerten was done in by 40 unforced errors.

Earlier, fourth-seeded Lleyton Hewitt began his Open with an efficient 6-1, 7-5, 6-4 victory over Wayne Ferreira in the 57th and final Grand Slam tournament for the veteran South African.

Hewitt prevailed comfortably and when it was over, Ferreira, 32, confirmed that he's done with tournament tennis.

"I've been doing this a long time," he said. "It's difficult to get up and train as hard as I'd like to. It's time for me to move on and do something else."

Ferreira made 43 unforced errors and never had a break-point opportunity against Hewitt, the 2001 champion who arrived at the Open coming off two straight championships and has won four events this year.

Just as Hewitt was finishing off Ferreira, Mark Philippoussis was forced to retire in the fifth set against Nikolay Davydenko when his body betrayed him again.

Holding fast to NL East championship: Braves win 7-2 to sweep Phillies in short series

PHILADELPHIA - The Phillies thought they would be the team to finally overtake Atlanta in the NL East. Instead, a six-week slide has left them wondering what went wrong.

Andruw Jones and Chipper Jones each hit a solo homer, and Jaret Wright pitched six strong innings to lead the Braves over Philadelphia 7-2 Wednesday night.

"We've got guys who come in every day expecting to win," Wright said. "Whatever happened the night before, you don't see it carry over around here. ... I don't know if I've ever seen something like this where everybody's prepared to win."

The Braves swept the two-game series and hold a 13 1/2-game lead over the third-place Phillies in the NL East. It seems hard to believe now that they were tied for first in

the division after splitting a two-game series July 19-20.

The Braves have won nine of 10. Philadelphia has lost 19 of 25.

"We just had to pick it up and start playing good baseball and we did," Andruw Jones said.

With a brand new ballpark and a \$93 million payroll that included a new All-Star closer, a revamped bullpen and a promising starting rotation, the Phillies were favorites to finally unseat Atlanta in the NL East.

Instead, for the thirteenth straight year, the Phillies and everyone else are looking up at the Braves.

"It's difficult to take," Phillies catcher Mike Lieberthal said. "Obviously, they're playing a lot better. Baseball is about streaks. They've had a great month. We haven't."

No Gary Sheffield, Greg Maddux or Javy Lopez? No problem for the Braves, who continue to take other team's bar-

gain-basement scraps and transform them into valuable contributors.

The latest example is Wright (14-6), who won his third straight start and improved to 12-1 since May 27. Wright walked none, struck out five and improved to 3-0 this year against the Phillies.

"I just tried to stay healthy all year," Wright said. "My arm feels good and I'm going to try and keep it going."

Wright also helped himself in the second inning, waiting on a hanging curveball from Vicente Padilla (5-7) and ripping an RBI single to left for a 2-0 lead. Rafael Furcal followed with a sacrifice fly.

Wright pitched out of his only serious jam with a 5-2 lead in the sixth. After allowing consecutive singles to Jason Michaels and Bobby Abreu to open the inning, Wright struck out Jim Thome, David Bell reached on a fielder's choice and Placido Polanco

also struck out looking to end the rally.

"He could have really gotten himself in trouble, but he made the pitches all night to get himself out of trouble," catcher Johnny Estrada said.

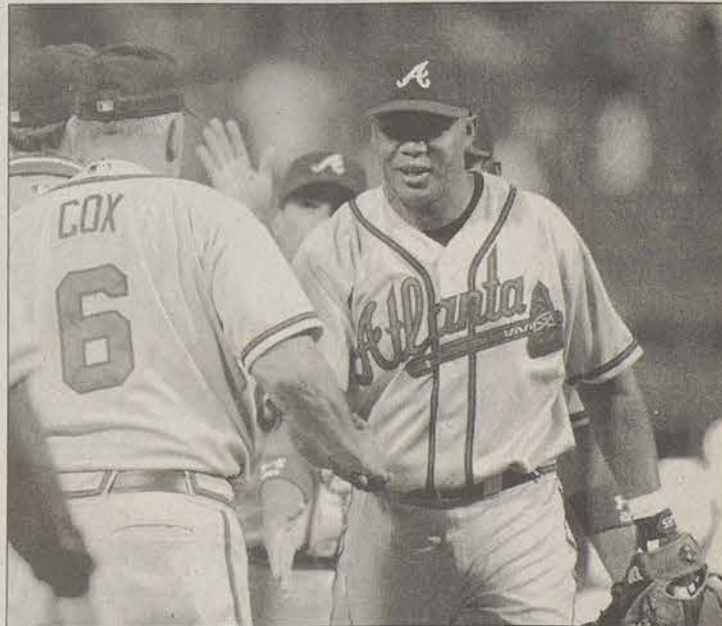
Most of the fans filed out after that, with some screaming for top prospect Gavin Floyd, who makes his big league debut Friday. The novelty of the new park has worn off - there were several large patches of blue seats throughout the stadium in what was expected back in April to be a standing-room only crowd.

One even yelled, "Smarty Jones forever!"

Padilla allowed nine hits and five runs in five innings for the Phillies.

"When everything goes right, he's unbelievable, but every time something goes wrong, his focus just leaves,"

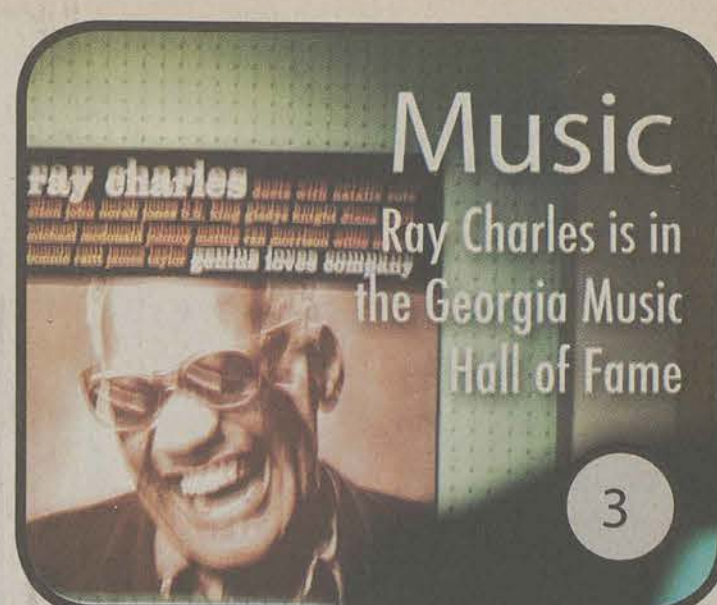

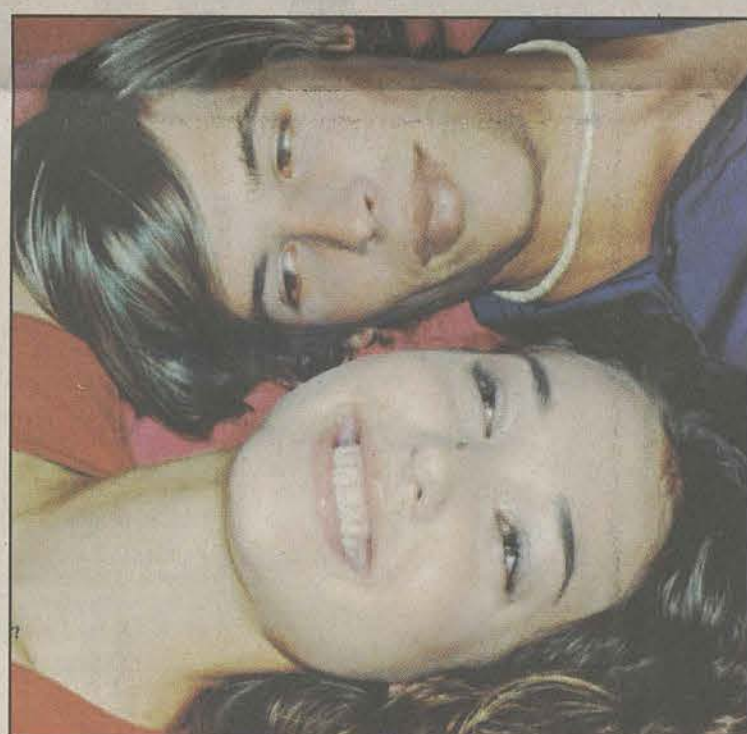

Georgia town adopts Hogzilla legend as its festival theme

ALAPAHA, Ga. - With the local legend of Hogzilla—the half-ton wild hog with nine-inch tusks—spreading worldwide through the Internet, residents of this tiny south Georgia town have decided to feature the prodigious porker in their annual festival.

Ken Holyoak, who runs a fish farm and hunting plantation about 3 miles northwest of town, said one of his hunting guides shot the 12-foot-long hog in June, but few actually saw it before it was buried on the property. Besides the few witnesses, his only proof is a photo showing the guide with the beast dangling from a strap.

Organizers of Alapaha's annual festival have even gotten caught up in the Hogzilla craze. They have decided the theme of this year's festival will center around the legendary creature.

"We're going hog wild," said Darrell Jernigan of Jernigan's Farm Supply, a gathering place for local farmers that also sells boots, hunting gear and building supplies.

Residents say feral hogs—domestic hogs that escape and learn to live off the land—have been a nuisance to farmers for years in the Alapaha area. They live in the swamps along the Alapaha River, which runs through Holyoak's plantation.

Holyoak said the hogs on his land may grow larger than normal because they sneak out at night and feast on some of his high-powered fish food. His son shot a 695-pound hog last fall.

"Some say it's like fishing," Moore said. "The more you tell the story, the bigger the fish gets and the more you tell the story about Hogzilla, the bigger the hog gets."

Suspect Zero earns a zero

A nondescript title such as "Suspect Zero" is fitting for Director E. Elias Merhige's psychological thriller, a muddle of fractured images and nebulous motivations that aspires to dramatic weight it does not possess.

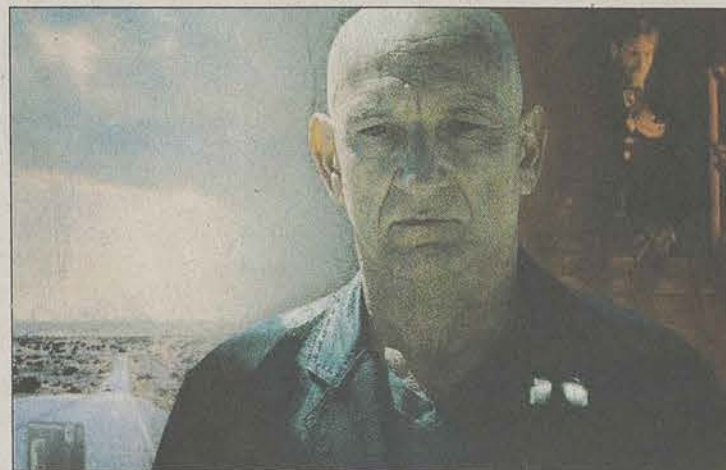
The premise a serial killer preying on serial killers is fresh on the surface, but Zak Penn and Billy Ray's script veers from that notion to wallow in its titular theme of a protean, virtually untraceable suspect.

Merhige then all but abandons any pretense of a script for minutes at a time to fling disjointed montages such as victims' faces, lidless eyes, abductions of children conveyed through abandoned playthings such as a suddenly vacant swing or a basketball rolling idly away.

The visual barrages often make afterthoughts of Merhige's principal players: Aaron Eckhart and Carrie-Anne Moss as FBI agents, Ben Kingsley as a shadowy manipulator battling them.

While Merhige made fine and appropriate use of his German Expressionist influences in his acclaimed "Shadow of the Vampire," similar representations feel self-indulgent in "Suspect Zero."

Some of the imagery is quite striking, yet it collectively comes off as a heavy-handed exercise in visualizing diseased minds. The movie tries to delve so deeply into the subconscious that it forgets to come up for air.

Eckhart plays Thomas Mackelway, an FBI agent disgraced by his failure on a previous serial-murder case. Paired with former partner Fran Kulok (Moss), Mackelway is thrust into a new case in which the gruesome slayings take on personal meaning.

A mental patient named Benjamin O'Ryan (Kingsley) is quickly revealed as the killer, but his motives are cloudy. A refugee from a government experiment in extrasensory perception, he possesses strange powers to foretell his victims' and Mackelway's move-

ments, and seems to be leaving bodies like bread crumbs as a puzzle for the agent to unravel.

Seemingly doing the authorities a favor by ridding society of other mass murderers, O'Ryan leads Mackelway into his obsession about "suspect zero" a "random killing machine that never leaves a clue."

Mackelway begins to suspect that O'Ryan is pursuing a murderer responsible for killing an unthinkable number of vanished people. Yet his bureau colleagues lean toward an easier solution: O'Ryan himself is the killer they seek.

The story intrigues early on, promising fresh twists, suspense and surprises in the tired subgenre of grisly serial-killer tales. In the end, "Suspect Zero" fails to deliver much new, providing mainly mood and atmosphere without substance.

MTV's VMAs rock the house

Fashion was the biggest attraction of the night.

MIAMI - The MTV Awards show on Sunday featured typical frenetic energy and sexy style, and a few musical surprises, but it was mostly a kinder, gentler version of past shows. There was no Madonna and Britney Spears kiss and certainly no wardrobe malfunctions.

Usher showed as much skin as anybody, preening in front of the camera barechested as simulated raindrops fell on his chiseled body during the opening performance of "Burn." And the sometimes raunchy comedian Dave Chappelle even kept it relatively clean despite teasing that he wouldn't.

There may have been plenty of sex appeal on show in Miami: cleavage was the main fashion trend for women, cool colors for men but little shock appeal on hand.

MTV was ready, though, using a several-second tape delay for the first time. The audio delay, used for years, was in heavy use during the hip-hop medley, which featured Lil Jon, Petey Pablo and Fat Joe.

The change of scenery for the awards, typically held in New York or Los Angeles, helped raise the decadence level at the celebrity-soaked affair, held at the downtown American Airlines Arena.

OutKast's vivid "Hey Ya!" perhaps best described as the old Ed Sullivan show on acid won four awards, including video of the year. Jay-Z's "99 Problems," the most nominated video with six, also won four. That gritty black-and-white video depicts the singer's own killing as a metaphor for his much-ballyhooed retirement.

"I felt like I was trying to push the envelope," Jay-Z, dressed in a dapper white suit and hat, said as he accepted an award, also known as a moonman after the channel's logo for best rap video. "That was my punishment and this is my reward."

Usher won his first moonman as he

took best male video for "Yeah!"

As usual, the awards were an afterthought to explosive performances and surprise cameos.

Alicia Keys gave a dramatic, soulful spin of her hit "If I Ain't Got You," and was buoyed by Stevie Wonder on harmonica. Moments later, she joined Wonder and Lenny Kravitz as they sang a classic Wonder hit, "Higher Ground." Keys also appeared on stage to honor the late Ray Charles, who died in June.

The daughters of Democratic presidential candidate John Kerry and President Bush made an appearance. The Bush daughters were on videotape to urge people to vote. Even the Rev. Al Sharpton made an appearance connected to voting, not for the election though, but for the Viewer's Choice Award.

Acclaimed rap newcomer Kanye West staged a dramatic version of "Jesus Walks," then instead of using a Chaka Khan sample for his hit "Through the Wire," brought the R&B veteran onstage to sing the real thing.

In a strange stunt, Flaming Lips singer Wayne Coyne appeared on stage enclosed in a big plastic ball pushed by fans on the arena floor. But perhaps the most surreal and bizarre performance came from the Polyphonic Spree, the twenty-something member rock choir that performed in multicolored, choir-like robes. They looked like members of a lost cult from the 1970s.

There also was an appearance by uber-twins Mary Kate and Ashley Olsen. Mary Kate, who recently was treated for an eating disorder, alluded to her ordeal before introducing Jessica Simpson.

"Thank you to everyone—you have been very supportive for the last couple of months," said Mary Kate.

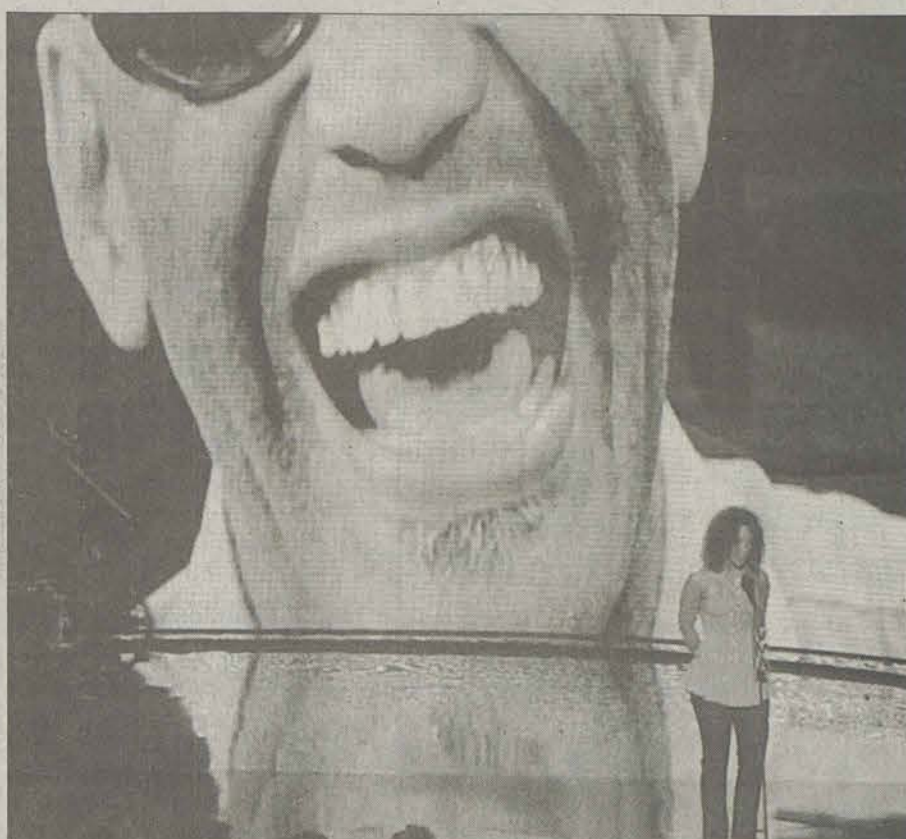
It was one of the few subdued moments during the lavish night.

The biggest entrance, of course, came from P. Diddy. Dressed in a white suit and with a Mohawk haircut,

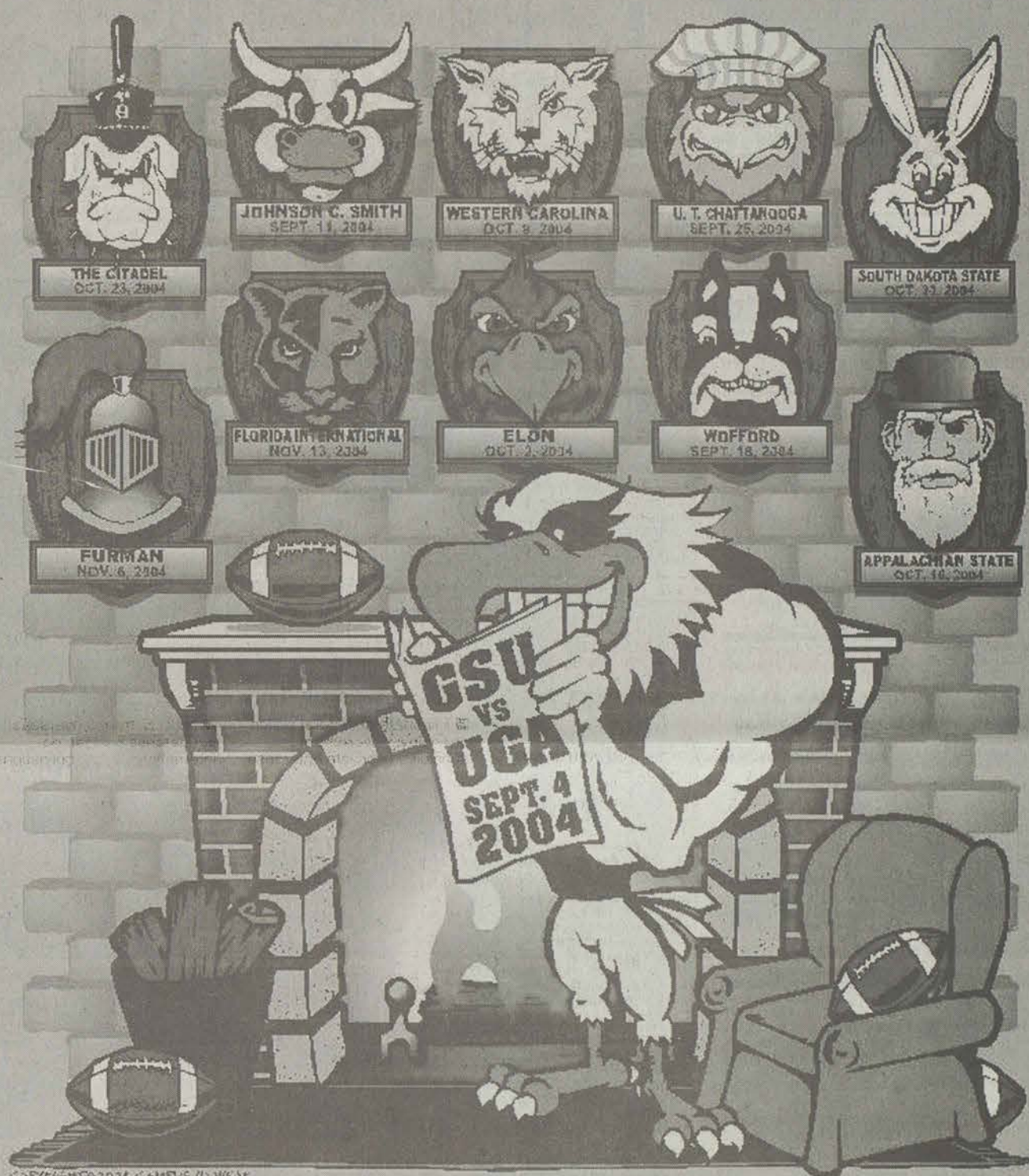
he arrived in a towering yacht along with Ma\$e, Naomi Campbell and Bruce Willis.

The scene outside the arena was frenzied before the show. Performers such as Ashlee Simpson and Jadakiss rocked an energetic crowd while stars walked the red carpet, showing off their fashions—or lack thereof. Lil' Kim looked anything but, as she almost busted out of the skimpy top of her flowing dress.

The show, held a day before the Republican convention was to kick off in New York City, ended on a patriotic note, as red, white and blue balloons fell from the rafters and fans held "vote" signs during OutKast's closing performance.

Musical legends receive tribute at Georgia Music Hall of Fame

ATLANTA (AP) — The late Ray Charles and Bill Lowery will be honored by the Georgia Music Hall of Fame Sept. 18 during a ceremony when the hall also will induct four new members.

The ceremony will be a tribute to famed singer Charles and music publisher and entrepreneur Lowery, both of whom died this year. Both were members of the first group to be inducted into the Hall of Fame in 1979.

"Georgia has a rich music heritage and an event like this brings that history and our great talent into the spotlight," said Greg Torre, director of the Georgia Department of Economic Development's office of film, video and music.

A group that includes radio pioneer Hugh Jarrett, keyboardist Chuck Leavell, composer Mary Lou Williams and opera singer Mattiwillda Dobbs

will receive the GEORGY Award for their contributions to Georgia's music heritage.

Jarrett started in the music industry in the 1950s with a group known as the Jordanaires, the back up group for Elvis Presley. He was inducted into the Gospel Music Hall of Fame in 1999.

Leavell was recognized primarily for his work as piano player for the Rolling Stones.

Williams, who was involved in jazz for seven decades, wrote for Louis Armstrong in the 1920s. After Williams died in 1981, "Soul on Soul," an online exhibit of jazz musicians, was created in her remembrance.

Dobbs made her debut in 1953 as the first black artist to sing at La Scala in Milan, Italy, performing as Elvira in Rossini's "L'italiana in Algeri."

This is the 26th year the Georgia Music Hall of Fame has honored musicians.

Every jump comes with about 30 minutes of on-the-ground training that runs over the ways not to get hurt or even killed on your first skydiving experience.

It's safety first for the Moreiro's. But their precautions are not without warrant.

Even the United States Parachute Association — the skydiving industry's advocate — openly admits there are dangers attached to skydiving.

But, according to their website, most deaths — and there were 25 last year — result not from bad luck or malfunctioning equipment, but instead are caused by more-experienced skydivers who took unsafe risks.

For those who attempt skydiving in Statesboro, there won't be much room for life-risking daredevil antics. Instead, first timers are encouraged to

jump tandem, with an instructor on their back. Moreiro said this style of jump is best for first-timers.

"You can just enjoy the ride, and the instructor does all the work," said Moreiro. "Tandem skydiving was created for all the people who were interested in skydiving, but didn't want all the training."

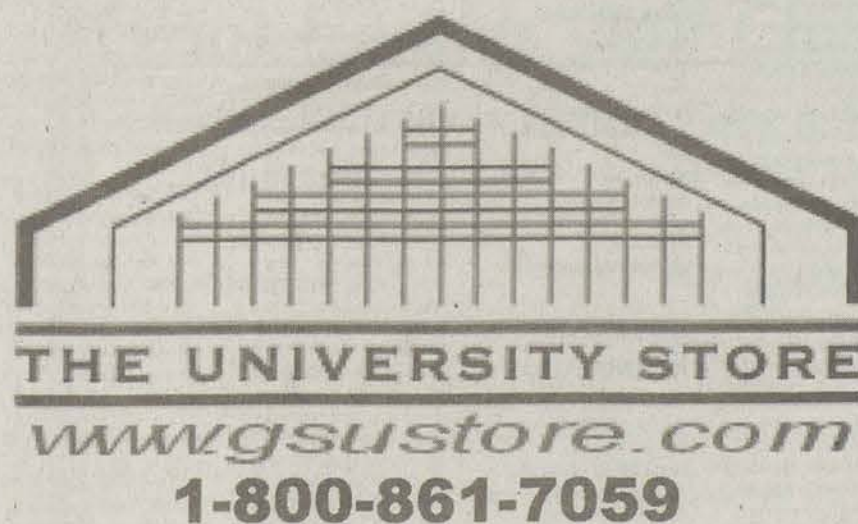
Training for a tandem jump takes about 30 minutes, opposed to 6-7 hours for a single-person jump.

Vic and his wife are both skydivers. They met while on a jump. He's the head instructor, and Laurel is a videographer and photographer who records the jump and landing for customers.

Vic thinks of skydiving as a culture. It's a philosophy he wants to sell to locals, including college students.

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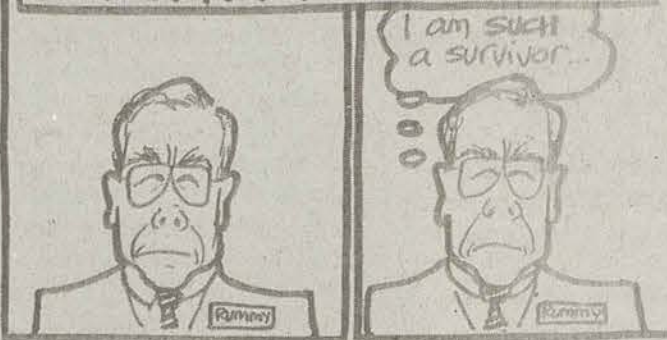
