Soil - Water Conservation
By E. T. ("Red") Mulla

As time moves on and our population increases food for wildlife will naturally decrease due to the increased pressure on the land. To avoid this sequence of our valuable wildlife, especially our game birds such as quail, more emphasis will need to be put on growing wildlife food. Cooperator of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District are providing for this in their conservation farm plans.

There are several ways in which to increase wildlife food and cover without interfering with regular farming operations and without sacrificing valuable crop land. Proper use of each acre of land will naturally find odd-shaped areas in fence corners, woodland borders and areas where the growing of commercial crops cannot be economically done. These areas need to be put to use. They are usually lost to crop production because our modern machinery will not permit operations so close to fences. Another place in which wildlife food has been harvested and broken this land (usually about one-eighth acre in size) and planted a solid patch of bicolor. Soil-Water Conservation

By E. T. "Red" Mullis

Cooperators of the Ogeechee River Soil Conservation District in Bulloch have come to accept one very important factor in soil conservation.

This key to successful parallel terraces is sodded waterways.

Complete terrace and water disposal systems serve several important purposes. First of all they keep valuable top soil and fertilizer from washing away. They slow down the water long enough for more of it to soak into the ground. And last, but not necessarily least, they conduct the excess water safely down the hill to natural water courses without damage to the land in the form of gullies.

This excess water (during heavy rains) makes sodded waterways necessary. Terraces cannot be run down the hill, so they must dump surplus water into natural depressions or "draws" in the field. The draws then must be sodded to prevent a gully forming. In some cases natural draws are not present and a waterway must be "made," and then sodded.

In order for a waterway which receives an enormous amount of water from terraces at times) to be successful, it must have a tough or protective "skin." S. B. Deal in the Citico community solved the soil problem as well as any one I've seen. His parallel terraces emptied into a natural draw coming up from the head of a branch. He planted balsa grass and lespedeza on this area and fertilized well. A fine dense sod was formed so fast that no damage was ever noticed in the waterway.

The secret in Mr. Deal's success was fertilizer. Many people will plant grass in their waterways, but it seems too few will give it the necessary fertilizer and lime to maintain a healthy, dense sod, annual application of fertilizer should be applied.

Each committee turned in its findings and recommendations to the local Farm Bureau office, which it has compiled for release. The first to be released in the series is the report of the peanut committee which follows.

We have made progress in peanut yields in Bulloch County. 1955 845 tons per acre, 1956 988 tons per acre, 1957 977 tons per acre, 1958 1197 tons per acre, 1959 1207 tons per acre.

In five years, approximately 400 lbs. increase in acre yield. We feel that the farmers in Bulloch County can improve on these yields and that a goal for 1961 of 1500 lbs. per acre is not excessive and is attainable.

Extensive tours will be made of the plant and the first local employee was hired. Now approximately 300 employees are on the local payroll and the once empty building contains several million dollars worth of equipment, materials and supplies.
