# Most All Accidents Can Be Some Scenes In Connection With Rockwell Statesboro Corporation Open House

## Prevented Says Candou

(From Bulloch County Health Department)

Accidents cause more deaths in the world today than any single illness except cancer and heart disease, and they take a greater toll in young lives than any war the world has yet known.

"Accidents will happen," many people say. However, Dr. M. A. Candou, director-general of the World Health Organization, has said that accidents do not just "happen" but every one of them is the outcome of a chain of causes and most of them can be prevented.

"Accidents Need Not Happen" was the theme for World Health Day on April 7, and was sponsored in Georgia by the Georgia Department of Health.

"There is evidence that the majority of accidents happen in situations which are generally thought to be safe," Dr. Candou said. "About half of all accidents happen in the home, and children are the principal victims. Two-fifths of all fatal accidents to children between one and four years of age take place in or around the home. Prominent causes are burns and poisoning which, even if not fatal, are generally serious. Yet almost all could be avoided by a little extra vigilance and a few simple precautions."

Education is the only vaccine against accidents, according to Henry C. Lee, director of accident prevention, Georgia Department of Public Health. Dangers which are hidden from view, and which he draws its first breath, he pointed out, and education, both physical and mental, is the best way to prevent the murderous affliction we call accidents.

Mr. Stead said, the result of unnecessary risks taken either because of faulty judgment, or what is worse, because of physical fitness or simple ignorance.

Risks are the greatest threat to health, Mr. Stead said. "The kitchen, the stairs or the bedroom of a modern home hold more dangers than the fastest car or plane, the steepest mountain, or a ship in a storm."

"Simple things like a table of aspirin left lying on a tub, a kettle of boiling water, a forgotten sharp tool, will make more cripples and kill more people this year than polo and tuberculosis together."

"Bites and poisonings are not the only risks to be guarded against. The greatest enemy of family safety is negligence, accompanied by untidiness and dirt," Mr. Stead continued. "A properly maintained insect plague in the window-it is in details such as these that the life of a child may depend," he cautioned.

### New Building To Honor Carruth

The Board of Regents authorized official naming of the Arts and Industry Building and the new women's dormitory at Georgia Southern College at their monthly meeting in Atlanta on Wednesday, February 15.

The Arts and Industry Building, which will open soon, has been named the Joseph A. Carruth Building and the new women's residence hall will be named Mamie Veazey Hall.

Carruth, a professor of education at GSC for nineteen years, was described by Dr. Shelby Monroe, associate professor of education at Georgia Southern, as a gentleman and scholar with a keen interest in the students.

Dr. Monroe added that "GSC hasn't had a mind like his since he left."

A native of Mississippi, Dr. Carruth received his A.S. degree from Millsapp College in Mississippi and his M. A. and Ph. D. from the University of Tennessee. He also taught at East Texas College.

Mamie Veazey Hall, has been named after Georgia Southern's first dean of women. Miss Veazey began her career at GSC in the summer of 1929, joining the regular faculty in 1930. She was on the staff of the college when she retired in 1952 after almost twenty-three years of service to the school.

After her retirement, Miss Veazey made her home in Statesboro and later moved to Chattanooga, Tenn., where she died in 1955.

Miss Veazey was a graduate of Lafayette College in Alabama, where she received her A. B. degree. The Carruth Building, located between the Arts and Industry Center and the warehouse, provides facilities for industrial arts and education majors.

Veazey Hall, which will house senior women should be completed by the fall quarter, 1961. It will house 160 women and will increase women's housing accommodations at GSC to approximately 640.

With these two buildings nearly ready for use, Georgia Southern has been authorized to begin construction soon on two additional residence halls, one for men and another for women.

### In-Service Grants Are Awarded

Mrs. Virginia Bowers, mental health consultant, Community Mental Health Service, Georgia Department of Public Health, of Atlanta, has received a \$500 in-service training grant from the Southern Regional Education Board under its program in mental health training and research.

She will study consultation and planning as a guide in developing a similar program in Georgia at state departments of health in Texas, Alabama and New Mexico.

Also receiving an in-service training grant of \$150 is Dr. Sheldon B. Cohen, Director, Psychiatric Outpatient Clinic, Grady Memorial Hospital, Atlanta.

He visited the District of Columbia General Hospital Clinic, the Mental Health Study Center, and the Community Services Division of the Public Health Service, in Washington, D. C., to gain background information and advice on the reorganization of the psychiatric clinic at Grady Hospital.

Individual grants up to \$600 are available to any employee of a mental health outpatient clinic, mental health center, state commission or division of mental health in any of the fifteen states supporting the SREB's mental health program.

Purpose of the grants is to give mental health personnel a chance to observe and study new or different methods of operation in other states, to help them improve their own program.

Applications for grants are now being accepted by SREB. There is no deadline for applications, since they will be acted upon as they are received. Persons interested in the grants should write to Southern Regional Education Board, 130 Sixth Street, N. W., Atlanta 13, Ga.
