Meter Operation Changed

Approximately 120 days ago the City requested traffic engineers to make recommendations as to the type of parking meters to be used to replace the old, worn out meters that had been in use for more than fourteen years.

The survey was completed the engineers recommended that all parking meters be changed to register hours instead of minutes.

After a thorough trial, it was felt by the majority of the city that a return to the use of pennies and nickels for registering time in minutes and hours would be more acceptable to the citizens of Statesboro and the surrounding area.

The new meters were purchased from the own Statesboro Rockwell Corporation, who are very successful in converting them, without charge to the city, to receive pennies and nickels for registering time in minutes and hours.
