AN OPEN LETTER FROM E. W. "BUDDY" BARNES, CANDIDATE FOR CITY COUNCILMAN

MY FELLOW CITIZENS: Since I know it will be impossible for me to see each of you in the short time between today and the election day, Friday, December 1, I am using this means to tell you a few facts about my background and ideas.

I think most of you know me since I moved here with my parents, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Barnes, when I was four years old. I graduated from Statesboro High School in 1942 and have been engaged in business with Barnes Funeral Home since that time, with the exception of two years which I spent in college. I also own and operate the Western Auto Associate Store in Statesboro.

Before proceeding further, I would like to say that I have no personal quarrel with my opponent, neither am I active in the other two races during this election.

One of the questions that I have been asked is why do I want to be a City Councilman. I would like to try to answer this by saying that I feel, because of my activities in many of the civic organizations of this city, I have learned something of the administration of our government. I also feel that we have a definite need in the community for our young people to be heard and their influence used.

Statesboro, at this time, is one of the most outstanding cities of its size in the nation. Since I plan to spend the rest of my life in this community, I feel that I owe something in return and have always desired to contribute in any way that I can toward the growth of Statesboro and the protection of a wholesome environment for all of our citizens.

We have been fortunate in our city to have many of our young citizens return here to live after their graduation from school or release from military service. I think that the citizens should be represented by a young councilman in the government and I feel that I am qualified to provide this representation.

Another question asked quite frequently is what do I intend to do when I get in office. This is a fair question and I will answer it in this manner. No one city officer has the right to make promises of what he can or will do for an individual or the city. A councilman has only one vote and any decision to do anything must be passed by a majority of the councilman. About the only promise a councilman can make and will be held to is to use his best judgment in the exercise of his office in any decision he has to make regarding the city's affairs and to constantly be alert for ideas that will make the city prosper and grow and present these ideas to the other members of the city's government for discussion and approval or disapproval. This I intend to do.

No government can effectively serve the community without the cooperation of the citizens, and the only way this cooperation can be received is to allow the citizens to know what is being done to further the interest of the community.

One of the first suggestions I will make after I am in office is that after each council meeting, a report be issued to both the Bulloch Times and the Bulloch Herald and to WWSN. I feel that if this is done, the citizens will have a better understanding about what progress is being made and what actions are being taken to solve the many problems that arise. I think this release of news to the public would also be beneficial to the mayor and council because it would allow every citizen to become acquainted with the affairs of the city. In this way, any citizen who is interested in any particular problem could contact a member of the city council and express his or her opinion and offer suggestions. In other words, it would provide a better way for the citizens to cooperate with the city officials in managing the city's affairs and to help the city prosper.

I feel that another means of improving the city government relationship with the community would be to invite prospective sellers to bid on the merchandise or products used by the city. Of course, I would prefer consideration be given to our local merchants and distributors. I think the bids received should be made public in a report such as I mentioned a moment ago. Also, on those small items that are used every day which would be impractical to receive bids for, I would suggest that the business be put on a revolving basis so that each merchant or dealer would receive his or her pro rata share of the purchases made.

If I am elected, I will be available to discuss your problems and receive your suggestions and ideas, and in turn, submit them to the other members of the council.

I have had some people ask me if I am backed or endorsed by any party or organized group. I state emphatically that I am not. I am an individual running for an office that I would like very much to hold. I am obligated to no one and shall not be obligated to anyone except the voters of Statesboro when I take office. I will not be influenced by or personal relationships to apply pressure to me and lead me against what I think is best for the city, nor influence any decision I might have to make in regard to the affairs of the city.

I have already talked with many of you personally, and before election time, I would like to see each of you and personally ask you to vote for me. But since there are approximately 2,500 registered voters, it will be impossible for me to see every one before the election. If you happen to be one who visits, please don't feel offended or feel that I don't want your vote and influence. I am asking everyone now, and I ask my friends to help by talking to their neighbors and friends.

In conclusion, I would like to say that I fully realize that no one man can accomplish all the things that need to be done in Statesboro, and it is my purpose to encourage the progress made in the past, however, my desire is to use what we have accomplished and with your help and cooperation continue ahead so as to make Statesboro a better place in which to live.

**Soil Test**  
Would you like to have the guesswork taken out of lime and fertilizer requirements?  
If you will use a soil test your guesswork will be gone. This soil analysis gives the farmer an inventory of the fertility level of a given farm field.  
This soil test will tell you just what you have in the soil such as phosphorus, potassium, and how acid the soil is. By providing information on these three important elements of the soil you have basic information needed for making lime and fertilizer recommendations.

There are other items that must be considered in making recommendations in addition to the basic three in lime recommendations you must know the pH of the soil, the oil texture, the crop to be grown, and the past liming history.

For fertilizer recommendations the fertility level of the soil must be known, the crop to be grown, and the desired per acre level and crop use.

I mention these technical items to you in order to stress the importance of correctly filling out the information on the form. In 1962, it will be just as important to set the Georgia crop with plants grown on the farm because of the spread of black shank, angular leaf spot and virus diseases, all of which are frequently brought onto the farm on tobacco plants.
