From The Bulloch Times Thursday, February 14, 1952

The best methods of frying chicken and baking pigs were shown by the Denmark Farm Bureau Tuesday night by Mrs. J. H. Hinton, home economics teacher from Brookside. W. W. Jones, the Denmark president, stated that eating was the big part of living, and that such programs fitted in nice for the men and women.
