

THERE IS NO more flagrant example of how the politically-contrived race issue has distorted our national sense of values than what is happening on Okinawa.

Just outside the big United States air base at Kadena on the part of the Merican defenses in the flagrant ear of American defenses in the Far East there has aprung up one of the Vilest and most notorious areas of organized vice the world has ever seen. It is a complex of 16 so-called "recreation" villages known as the "Koza Area" in which more than 5500 hars and at least 15,000 "hostesses" cater to the basest of human desires. An article written several years ago for Harpers Magazine by a former Marine officer stationed there reported a resulting veneroal disease rate running as high as 16 per cent.

THIS DEPLORABLE situation of the highest authorities, but not for the reason one might imagine. The complaints are not that young Americans are being corrupted on Okinawa but rather that they are indulging in depravity on a segregated basis.

Through the operation of voluntary preference, specific sections of the "Koza Area" have come to be patronized exclusively by white and colored service personnel. 
