Students get the chance to play with their food

On November 4, Georgia Southern will be having an event called "Sculpt for the Hungry." The event will take place at the Russell Union Rotunda and will run from 11 a.m. until 2 p.m.

Janna Pennington, coordinator of service learning in the Office of Student Leadership and Civic Engagement, is in charge of the event.

"We currently have 36 organiza-

tions signed up to participate," said Pennington.

"Sculpt for the Hungry" is part of Homecoming Week's lineup of activities.

"Organizations bring in canned goods and other items," said Pennington.

"Judging will be based on originality, creativity, use of homecoming theme, and Georgia Southern spirit," said Pennington.

All teams participating receive 25 points. The first place winner receives

five points, second place receives three points, and third place receives one point.

According to Georgia Southern's Website, a maximum of ten people can work on the sculpture for each organization. At all times during the competition, at least one person must remain with the sculpture.

Each team will be assigned a space, and each team must stay within the designated space assigned to them.

Construction of the sculptures cannot start before 11 a.m., but

materials can be brought in prior to starting time.

Sculptures cannot reference alcohol, drugs, or sex.

Foods can only be used for building the sculpture if the food is an unopened canned good. Clothing may also be used in building the sculpture, as well as toiletries. To use toiletries such as shampoo, soap, and toilet paper to build the sculpture, the products must be still be in the package.

There's a new idol on campus from Monday night's annual GSU Idol competition which took place at 7 p.m. in the Russell Union Ballroom.

This is a competition that comes around every year during Homecoming week as a fundraiser for the United Way of Bulloch County.

With the partnership of Georgia Southern, this year's competition raised \$1100 as of Monday afternoon, and hoped to break the \$2000 mark after the show, hoping to sell \$800 worth of tickets at the door.

The money was raised through contestant entry fees, which were \$15, tickets sold by SGA senators for five dollars, and tickets sold at the door for seven dollars.

"This is a great fundraiser for the United Way of Bulloch County," said Sam Gaston, the Vice President of Academic Affairs.

Georgia Southern's Student Government Association is making no profit from this fundraiser as all the proceeds are going strictly to the United Way.

contestant Brittany Abraham.

There were nine contestants competing in three rounds, judged both by judges and the audience.

The first round was songs from the 80s and five contestants were chosen by the judges to advance to the second round.

In the second round, the song theme was music from the 90s and three finalists, two from popular vote and one wild card contestant, were chosen by the audience to advance to the third and final round.

The third round theme was music from today and a winner was chosen by the judges.

Callie Stilwell, senator of the College of Graduate Studies in GSU's Student Government Association, has played a very vital role in making this fundraiser a reality. She put together the event and helped put together the opening dance performed by the contestants.

"She has been a great help for this fundraiser. She has done all the planning and work for the event. We could not have done this without her," said Gaston.

James Kicklighter, SGA publicity officer, was also a tremendous help with advertising, promotions, and publicity, Gaston said.

STRANGE BUT TRUE

Police questioned in sodomy case

A Brooklyn grand jury will decide whether to indict the four police officers accused by a 24-year-old man of sodomizing him with a police radio on a subway platform near Prospect Park, the district attorney's office said Monday.

The NYPD says it has two witnesses who refute Michael Mineo's claim that he was violated at the Prospect Park station during an Oct. 15 confrontation that started when police saw him smoking marijuana.

But Mineo's lawyers say he has his own set of witnesses to back him up.

Mineo was admitted to Brooklyn Hospital Center last week, shortly after his accusation was revealed, complaining of pain and blood in his urine.

The officers, all on the force less than seven years and all assigned to the 71st Precinct, remain on full duty and still have their guns and shields.

The radio in question belongs to one of the four cops, Officer Alex Cruz. Tests performed on the radio found no forensic evidence it was used to sodomize Mineo, police sources said Monday.

New president will face challenges

The race for the White House has come down to this: a final sprint toward a prize that doesn't seem like such a prize anymore.

The \$10 trillion national debt that Barack Obama or John McCain will inherit is only the tip of the iceberg.

The next president will wrestle with volatile markets, faltering consumer confidence, spreading unemployment, the worst economic climate since Franklin Roosevelt took office in 1933. He'll also have to cope with two wars, a strained military, frayed alliances and an emboldened Russia.

Even after surviving two years on the stump and shelling out hundreds of millions of dollars on consultants, attack ads and charter flights, who would want this job?

"There's no president in recent history that's had so many crises to deal with. ... This president's going to have his hands full," said Leon Panetta, chief of staff to the last Democratic president, Bill Clinton.

"The one good thing about the next presidency is, there's no place to go but up." The knottiest problems facing the next president come in many flavors.

There are long-term, costly and politically tricky problems like climate change.

Or Medicare, which went into deficit this year, triggering a five-year-old law that will require the president to tell Congress how he wants to stabilize the trust fund.

Long-term, the health program for seniors could consume trillions of dollars more if it isn't changed.

There are urgent, already identified problems: wars in Iraq and Afghanistan, the fight against terrorists, the banking crisis, the volatile stock market, rising unemployment, shrinking economic output, shrunken U.S. influence and growing anti-Americanism abroad.

There are chronic problems both candidates avoided, like illegal immigration, and those they did address that have no easy solution, such as rising health care costs and legions of uninsured Americans, for instance.

And there are the unknown unknowns, the bolt-from-the-blue crises that test a new president's mettle, as Obama's running mate, Joe Biden, predicted.

"They're going to have to deal with it simultaneously. I don't think they really have an option," said George Edwards, chair of presidential studies at Texas A&M's Bush School of Government and Public Service, and editor of Presidential Studies Quarterly.

Drug companies get relief from Supreme Court

Supreme Court conservatives on Monday sounded sympathetic to a drug company's pleas for protection from state court lawsuits.

In the highest profile business case of the year, several justices appeared ready to declare that federal regulations preempted certain state lawsuits. That would be a major victory for the drug company, Wyeth, as well as many other businesses seeking to fend off expensive state-by-state legal challenges.

"The name of this game is balancing benefits and costs," Justice Antonin Scalia said, "and if you simply eliminate drugs which people have real desperate need for ... you're not benefiting the public."

Chief Justice John Roberts joined Scalia in raising questions helpful to Wyeth's cause, as did, albeit less vehemently, Justice Samuel Alito. The three justices have previously combined to restrict lawsuits in other cases and could form the core of a majority favoring Wyeth in the new case.

"I envision a scheme under which manufacturers who are worried about jury liability of the magnitude that occurred in this case saying, 'Gee, why should we take chances?'" Alito said, suggesting that drug availability might suffer as a result.

The case is called *Wyeth v. Levine*. Wyeth is a Wisconsin-based pharmaceutical company that posted \$22 billion in revenues last year.

Levine is Diana Levine, a 63-year-old Vermont resident and former professional musician. Her right hand and forearm were amputated eight years ago after she contracted gangrene following an injection of a Wyeth anti-nausea drug called Phenergan.

Levine sat quietly in the courtroom during the hour-long oral argument Monday, dressed in a half-sleeved purple dress that revealed what remained of her arm. It ends right below her elbow.

"The drug manufacturer was negligent in its warning," Levine's attorney, David C. Frederick, told reporters after oral arguments, "and the results are here for all to see."

The French culture's influence is especially evident in the U.S. given that many Americans have Chinese manufactured cars, Seaman said.

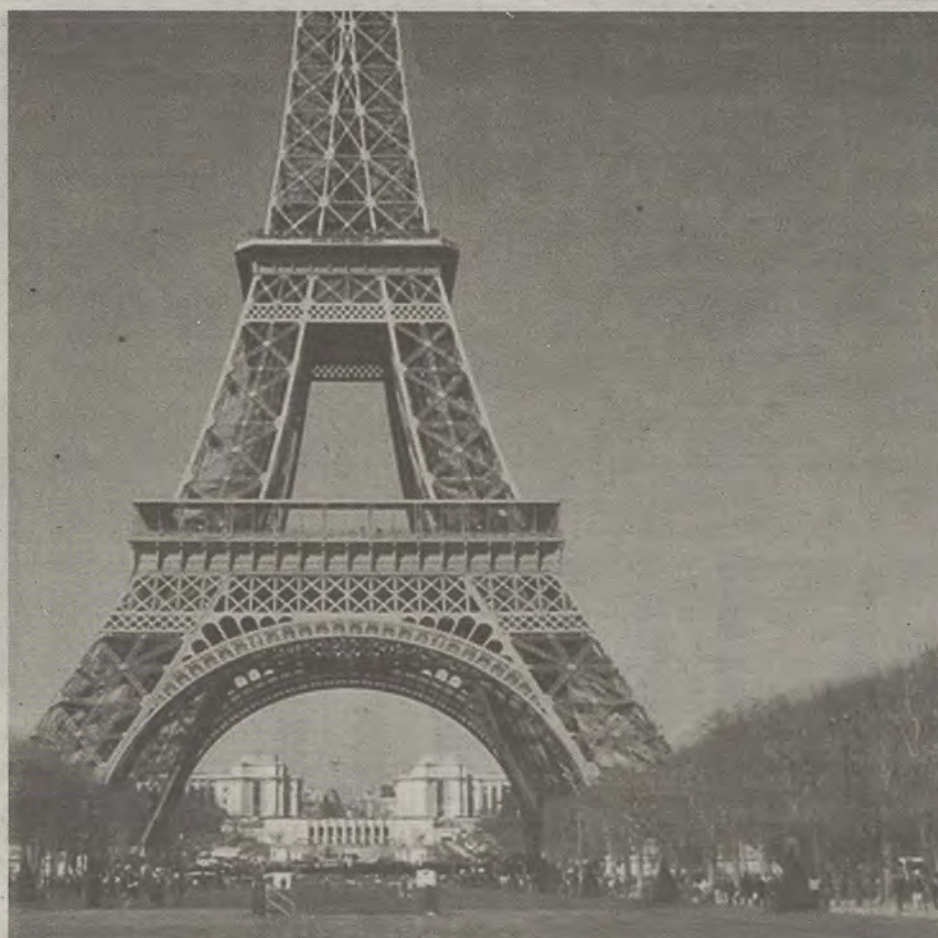

Holocaust exhibits open at GSU Museum

History highlighted through photos, personal accounts

The Georgia Southern University Museum opened an exhibit for Anne Frank on Sunday, November 2. "Anne Frank: A History for Today" recounts the history of events of the Holocaust through the eyes of Anne Frank and her family. It archives the history with photographs, stories, and quotes.

The photographic exhibit is somewhat of a timeline. It features 55 panels displaying these photographs and accounts.

It begins with the birth of Anne Frank and shows that her family was like any ordinary family, with hopes and dreams. It goes on to examine the Nazis rise to power and the Frank family's experience as the persecution of political opponents and Jews increases.

Most of the exhibit is about the time after the Nazis invaded and the family was forced into hiding.

It depicts the anxious time they experienced and gives a very graphic overview of how they lived for those two years. It ends with the war's end into today, highlighting racism and hatred that continue to challenge us.

Along with the chronicled photographic exhibit is an artist's representation of "Anne Frank's Secret Hiding Space" that kept the Frank family alive during Nazi occupation. The artist asks viewers to "imagine themselves" living quietly and secretly, as the Franks did, in the space they recreated for display.

Also featured is "Witness to the Holocaust: WWII Veteran William A. Scott at

Buchenwald". It displays the liberation of Buchenwald through the camera of photojournalist William A. Scott. The photos, alongside with quoted accounts by Scott, graphically depict the hatred he witnessed.

The exhibit encourages people to be aware of the decisions that political leaders made that affected and persecuted those of the past, and how these events still affect us today. It is meant to evoke contemplation about prejudice and discrimination, and to consider the value of tolerance and positive attitudes towards diversity.

In response to the exhibit, the Statewide Art Contest displays art by middle school and high school students. The contest encourages students to learn about the Holocaust and the causes and effects. Five pictures by talented young artists hang in the exhibit, representing their interpretations.

Anne Frank's desire was to be a famous writer, and her fear was that she would never get the chance because of the unfortunate hate and beliefs of political leaders of the time.

Her dream came true when her father published her diary following her death, and she continues to be a legend that we honor to this day. Her story allows us to see through eyes of those who experienced what we can only imagine, and to feel what she and her family felt during the times of war.

The goal of the exhibit is to continue the awareness of intolerance and prejudice and confront them positively.

The exhibit will be on display until December 3 in the Georgia Southern University Museum located on Sweetheart Circle.

Doo-Dah to be performed at Hanner

All the outfits are checked on Monday, October 27 in case of any wardrobe malfunctions.

Tickets went on sale on October 29 and cost five dollars. Tickets can be bought either at the Office of Student Activities, which is located in the back of the Russell Union, or at the door.

The tickets are not the traditional stamp or paper ticket, but rather are glow sticks that will be "cracked" inside Hanner.

"We would like people not to crack the glow sticks before the show," said Freeman.

With a goal of over 2000 people and the cost of five dollars per ticket, that should be approximately \$10,000 raised for the Office of Student Activities.

The money raised will go to toward two purposes. One is for the prize money for the winners of the competitions and the other will help support the cost of other Homecoming activities, like the Homecoming Dance and the Eagle Rally.

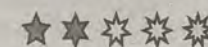

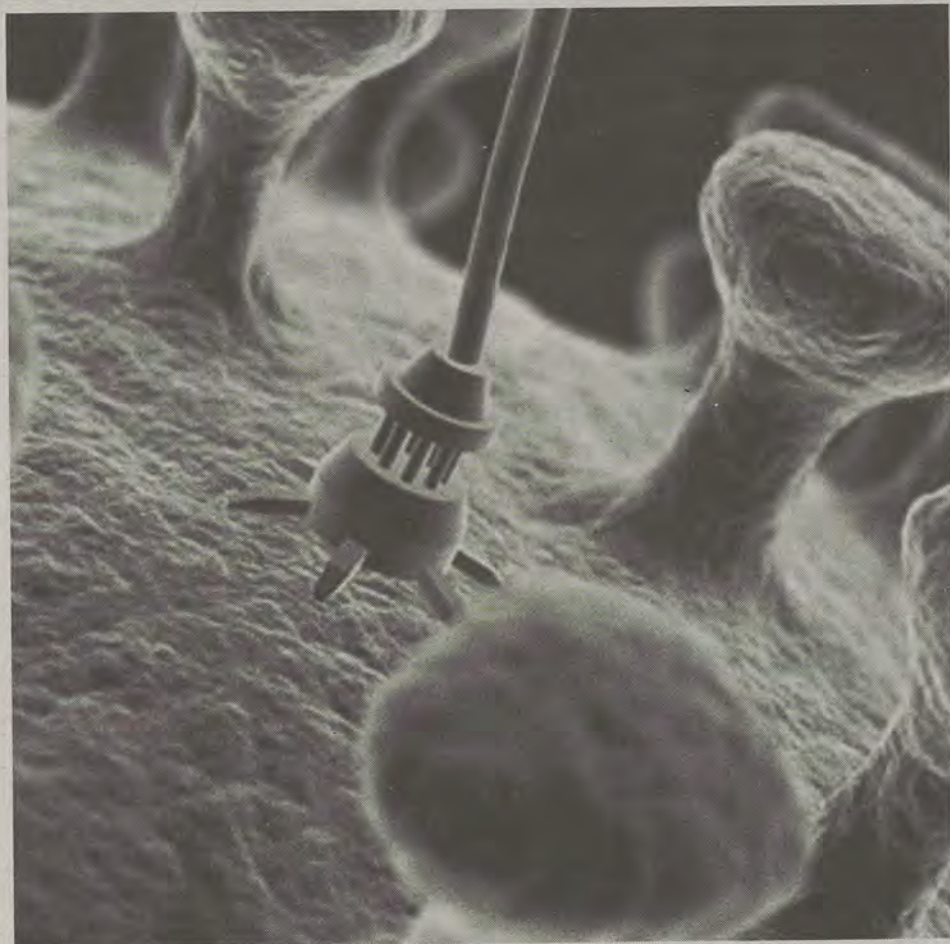

GSU Partners with Nanotechnology Center

A new partnership will create unique learning opportunities for Georgia Southern University students and faculty.

The Department of Mechanical and Electrical Engineering Technology has recently established a partnership with the National Nanotechnology Manufacturing Center (NNMC) that will help expand GSU's research capabilities.

The NNMC, a not-for-profit organization funded by state and federal grants, located in Swainsboro, Ga., provides facilities and mentoring for companies involved in nanotechnology research and product creation.

The center hopes to bring nanotechnology manufacturers to the area. The organization's nanotechnology equipment is used primarily to develop the processes for nano-electrical circuits.

Nanotechnology involves manipulating materials on a very small (molecular) scale; a process that could lead to new developments in science and medicine.

Assistant professors Hung-Ming Cheng and Frank Goforth, of the Department of Mechanical and Electrical Engineering Technology, have become a resource for the NNMC due to their familiarity with the equipment the organization uses.

"We [are] a resource to answer questions about mechanical and electrical issues that come up," said Goforth.

When NNMC relocates companies to the area, Goforth believes that opportunities for student learning as well as jobs for graduating students could be available due to the proximity

of the NNMC.

Goforth said that the nanotechnology industry is a very broad field and other than engineering technology students, chemistry and biology students could also benefit from this partnership.

Chemistry professor Dontarie Stallings has also been involved with the NNMC, using their atomic force microscope for his research.

"Dr. Stallings was driving to Alabama to use an atomic force microscope one weekend a month," said Goforth in reference to the great resource the center provides to professors as well.

Stallings believes the instrumentation the NNMC has will allow professors at GSU to push research forward.

"By networking we are able to accomplish more things collectively," Stallings said.

Stallings thinks that the NNMC will be a valuable resource for preparing GSU students for graduate studies. He hopes to see the partnership become an opportunity for students to get involved and learn about the equipment at the center.

"I want to not just send our students to the best schools, but [for] them to be the best students when they get there. This collaboration puts us on the path to reach these goals," Stallings said.

He expects the partnership to expand as more faculty members see what the NNMC has to offer.

Goforth shares the same optimism about the future implications of this partnership.

"In the future, I am confident that we will have companies in the Southeast Georgia area [due to the NNMC] that will hire our graduates and employee interns," Goforth said.

Eagles win another overtime thriller in record-setting fashion

It took a program-record three overtimes, but Georgia Southern outlasted The Citadel 44-41 Saturday afternoon (Nov. 1) at Johnson Hagood Stadium. The Eagles improved to 5-4 overall and 3-3 in the SoCon while the Bulldogs fell to 3-6, 1-5.

The two previous longest games both went double-overtime (a loss in 2006 to Appalachian State and a loss last year at Elon). Georgia Southern has now played seven overtime games in its last 21 contests, including a record four this season alone (3-1).

That win also marked the 250th in Georgia Southern program history (250-92-1 in 27 years).

"I really thought that early on our defense played outstanding and of course in overtime they were worn out. The bad thing was that offensively we couldn't ever get in any rhythm and that really hurt us. We had opportunities to score, put points on the board and get us a comfortable win very early on but could not do it," said head coach Chris Hatcher.

"To Citadel's credit I think they are one of the best coached teams in the SoCon. They came out in a defense they hadn't run all year and so it took us a little while to adjust."

In the second OT, Henton and Raja Andrews connected on the first play for a 25-yard score. That reception was the 10th in the game by the senior wide receiver, not only a career-high total but one that also broke the program's single-game record. The Citadel scored when Blanchard found Taylor Cornett for a 2-yard score, tying the game at 38-all.

The turnover bug hit GS again on the ensuing drive as Henton fumbled in Citadel territory, however, was able to escape without any harm when a bad snap led to Keeler's missed field goal from 37 yards.

GSU converted on 4th-and-inches late in the first quarter but was flagged for holding.

That brought on the punt team. Charlie Edwards received a clean snap, but Mel Capers blocked his third punt of the year, and The Citadel eventually recovered on the Eagles 11. An 8-yard tackle for a loss, holding penalty and two incomplete passes forced a field goal attempt from 45 yards but Dakota Walker broke through the line for his first career blocked kick.

Andrews started the second half with a career-long 66 yard kickoff return, down to the 19. Henton took over and three rushes later scored from a yard out as the Eagles took a 21-16 lead.

"We got down early in the game and, of course, there was no panic. Nine points isn't anything to us right now. All in all you have

to be proud of this team. They keep fighting through adversity each and every week, and they just find a way to win," said Hatcher. "It's always nice to win big but if you know you're going to win those close ones it builds a lot of confidence and you can't say enough about the character of our team."

Andrews now holds the Georgia Southern single-game (10), season (46 and counting) and career (109 and counting) receptions record.

He finished with 102 yards in the game, the fourth time this season and career he reached the century mark. Andrews now holds sole possession of both the season and career records in that category as well. Those 102 yards push his season total to 677, setting another season record for most reception yards

(Chris Johnson had 673 in 2000).

Andrews' two touchdown receptions tied a career-high. He is now tied for eighth-most TD receptions in a season (4) and holds sixth place all-time (8).

Henton completed 21-of-35 passes for 261 yards and a career-high three touchdowns passes. That yardage marked the fourth time this year the sophomore quarterback threw for at least 200 yards in a game, tying him with Tracy Ham (1984) for most 200-yard games in a season.

He also added 43 yards on the ground and scored a TD.

Urbano matched a personal-high scoring twice while gaining 37 yards on eight carries. McIntosh caught a career-high four passes totaling 71 yards.

Chris Covington paced the defense with a game-high 12 tackles, including 3.0 for a loss. Quentin Taylor registered nine tackles. Walker turned in another solid all-around performance with eight tackles, 5.0 tackles for a loss, two sacks, two forced fumbles and one blocked kick. Walker now leads the Southern Conference with 7.0 sacks and 14.5 tackles for a loss.

The Eagles were able to win their second straight and third of their last four despite going 0-for-8 on third down conversions. The Eagles rolled up 350 yards of offense compared to The Citadel's 497.

Roberts caught nine passes for 165 yards (fourth-highest total in Bulldog history) and Scott Flanagan recorded eight receptions totaling 105 yards. Asheton Jordan recorded 118 yards on the ground.

Defensively Terrence Reese and Kevin McCaskill had nine tackles apiece.

The Eagles travel back to Paulson Stadium next Saturday (Nov. 8) for the regular season home finale against Samford. Kickoff, which also highlights Homecoming Weekend festivities, is slated for 12 p.m.
