





Editorials

Georgia's future

Most all of the members of the Georgia Legislature agree that Governor Marvin Griffin made a very able presentation of his administration's accomplishments during the last two years and his recommendations for the future.

The accomplishments of the administration during the last two years are a matter of record. He called attention to them however. There are the buildings constructed and the money spent on education, including \$687,291.00 here at Georgia Teachers College on a classroom and science building, there is the improvements in health facilities, highway construction, improvements at Milledgeville hospital, Gracewood, and other state institutions, increased forestry facilities, the State Port Authority, the new fish hatchery near Dawson, the new state farm market in Atlanta and the improvement of those at Cordele, Tifton and Thomasville, the new building for the State Department of Public Safety, the new armories for the National Guardall these and others he reviewed in his message to the joint session in the House of Representatives in Atlanta on January 15.

For the other half of his administration he recommends "holding the line" in both the revenue structure and in state spending under the terms of the present appropriations act.

He says there should be no new taxes levied, but added there should be no reduction in the present revenue structure, which neans there will be no reduction in taxes.

He outlined two approaches to greater highway safety-education and enforcement, including an ncrease in the strength of the State Highway Patrol.

He says that financing the Minimum Foundation Program for education has first priority during his administration "ahead of all other suggestions no matter how worthy."

He recommends that residential or business lots on Jekvll Island should be leased or sold in fee simple. He believes the wisest course the State could follow is to sell it if the approximate cost could be recouped.

He promised that "as long as I am your Governor there will be no breakdown in the pattern of segregation in this State."

It was an optimistic speech and it makes Georgia's future look good. Let's hope that the people to whom we have entrusted that future think of those they represent first and themselves last.

A wise choice


Most of the friends of State Senator Everett Williams know that he might have been the Senate floor leader in the Georgia General Assembly, now in session.







The vaccine supplied to state and local health departments is regulated by federal law. The age limit at present is set at six

by this law. As such, only Congress can change the age limits. This may occur during the present session of Congress. 3. In the meantime, how may adults get the vaccine? All adults, regardless of age, can obtain the vaccine through their family doctors. The vac-cine is now commercially available and may be obtained through the family doctor. Of course, there is a nominal fee for this vaccine and for giving it. This fee varies slightly from community to community.
