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Only 10 per cent of small fry have polio shots

This week Dr. Hubert U. King, medical director of the Bulloch County Health Department and the Bulloch County chapter of the National Foundation for Infantile Paralysis, addressed an open letter to the parents of children in this county. The full text of the letter is as follows: "An extremely serious situation exists in Bulloch County today."

"Only a little better than 10 per cent of our youngsters eligible to receive the Polio Vaccine have been completely immunized with three shots to date."

"What accounts for this situation? How can we explain the apparent lack of interest on the part of parents who just a few short years ago were praying for some reliable protection against the ravages of this disease?"

"It is difficult to explain. Surely the public has been well informed by the press and radio as to the importance of the Salk Polio Vaccine. Doctors, scientists, teachers, pool workers, and many others have recommended the vaccine and have worked to promote the vaccination program. The use of the vaccine for two years has proved its effectiveness beyond the shadow of a doubt. Yet this apparent apathy remains!"

"Perhaps some of this seeming apathy is not apathy at all but rather, fear. Fear which stems from the unfortunate experience with a small batch of the vaccine in the spring of 1955 early in the program. As regrettable as this incident was, it has resulted in one of the most rigidly controlled and carefully fully produced vaccines on the market today. Some of the country's leading medical experts serve as advisors on control and production of the vaccine to the U. S. Public Health Service which is directly responsible for its production and distribution. As a result, no similar accident has occurred, and over 15 million children have received polio vaccine."

"The Bulloch County Health Department is currently immunizing school children in the county. However, some schools will not be reached until near the end of school which coincides with the beginning of the polio season. So in order to obtain full effect from the vaccine and be fully protected against polio, parents are urged not to wait until the public health nurses visit your child's school—especially if the recommended time between shots has already elapsed. The time to begin protecting for this summer—is now!"

"The Health Department and Bulloch County polio chapter stress upon your serious attention to this matter. In addition, your full support of the 1957 'March of Dimes' is earnestly needed to combat the fight against polio—a fight which is far from over. Your support of this 'March of Dimes' will make possible continued research, medical care and rehabilitation of polio patients, and reduction of this disease from one of our most devastating diseases to one of minor importance. Your action in securing polio shots and support of this drive will ensure a happy future to thousands of Americans who will be spared this crippling disease, and to other thousands not so fortunate who will mean the return to a normal and happy life free of braces, crutches, and wheelchairs."

"Please stop and think—act and give!"

Questions being asked

The following information is presented in order to answer some of the more frequent questions asked about the Salk Polio Vaccine and the vaccination program:

1. Who is eligible to receive the Salk Polio Vaccine?
Under the state and local health department program, only those between six months and through nineteen years of age are eligible. In addition, expectant mothers (any age) are eligible.

2. If there is a surplus of polio vaccine, why can't adults receive it through the health department?
The vaccine supplied to the state and local health departments is regulated by federal law. The age limit present is set at six months through 19 years of age by this law. As such, only Congress can change the age limits. This may occur during the present session of Congress.

3. In the meantime, how may adults get the vaccine?
All adults, regardless of age, can obtain the vaccine through their family doctors. The vaccine is in the commercially available and may be obtained through the family doctor. Of course, there is a nominal fee for this vaccine and giving it. This fee varies slightly from community to community.

4. How many shots are necessary?
There are two shots given about a month apart to start. These give some—but not complete—protection or immunity. Full protection can only be expected after the third shot which is given about six to seven months after the second.
