**EGGS PER HEN IN 1947 AND IN 1955**

In 1947, average production per hen in Georgia was one of the lowest in the nation—114 per bird, states H. W. Bennett, poultryman for the Agricultural Extension Service. In 1955 the average production per hen was 192 eggs.

**Farm Bureau County-wide anti-rabies campaign is now on**

A county-wide campaign to eradicate rabies is being planned by the county health department, Jack Welch, health engineer, explained at the Farm Bureau meetings last week.

The present plans call for a vaccination program on dogs to start May 6 and for three days all the veterinarians are to be out in the various communities to vaccinate the dogs. The numerous places and hour they are to be present were given to the Ogeechee, Warnock and Sunkhole chapters Tuesday, Wednesday and Thursday nights respectively. Mr. Welch pointed out that rabies, mad-dog or hydrophobia, is one of dogs' biggest enemies. The live-vaccine virus now being used will protect the dogs for over three years. There is no cure for the disease.

Humans can get it also, Mrs. Thelma Aaron, county health nurse, stated. By protecting dogs, people can be protected. The disease is passed on by humans by dogs biting, or bitten by a dog, see your doctor or health department at once, she urged. Time is important.

Dr. T. R. Powell, a local veterinarian, also went with the group to the meetings last week. He declared that all warm-blooded animals may get rabies, although it is primarily a dog disease.

Dr. Powell urged that dogs suspected of being mad not be killed unless absolutely necessary. Capture them if possible, and notify authorities, and keep the animal confined in a pen for seven days. Hundreds of non-rabid dogs are killed needlessly every year. If you must kill the dog, try not to destroy the head. The health department will want this for examination. Call them when the animal has been destroyed.

Mr. Welch showed a motion picture on how rabies works and methods of controlling it. Dr. Powell stated that the program to eradicate rabies in the county is in connection with the operation of motel business; to undertake and carry on any business transaction or operation in connection with the motel business, carried on by motel operators and generally to institute, enter into, assist, promote, and participate in any such business or operation.
