

we are now operating continues to provide blood and blood derivatives to us without charge for the products. It stands to meet largescale needs for blood occasioned by disaster or emergency-we've been blessed here, being free of disaster since 1930 when the big tornado hit us. But it doesn't mean that it may not strike tomorrow.
