This particular situation has to do with the control under which cotton ginners and cotton buyers find themselves. We are all familiar with the controls under which the cotton farmer, together with the tobacco farmer the neanut farmer and farmers of all kinds have had to operate. But ginners and the buyers are under was news to us.

The news was released by the local Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office-whose call letters are A.S.C. (many still call it the Triple A). Many of you did not read it we're sure, because our headline indicated that it was of special interest to the ginners and buyers.


