1958 outlook for livestock

Georgia dairymen can expect their cash income from dairying to show some improvement in 1958, primarily due to larger volume rather than better prices.

If a smaller 1958 crop is produced, prices next fall should average better than last fall. Large storage stocks now on hand will hold down prices for the first six months of 1958.

BULLOCK COUNTY SOIL NEEDS MORE FERTILIZER

Bulloch County soils need more fertilizer and lime according to Roy Powell, county agent. This is in combination with more efficient feed plants such as Coastal Bermuda and recommended hybrid corn will help raise the farm income of Bulloch County.

Mr. Powell further stated that Bulloch County farmers should have their soils tested in order to determine the amount and kind of fertilizer to use.

Extension Service agronomists pointed out at the county-wide short course in 1958, farmers should use the most efficient means of cutting costs of production. Recommended hybrid corn will produce more corn per acre with the same amount of fertilizer. Lime is important in pasture and corn production.

Weed control methods including use of such chemicals as 2, 4-D will make for more efficient pasture production.

Plans are for local community meetings and result demonstrations to carry this information to all parts of Bulloch County.

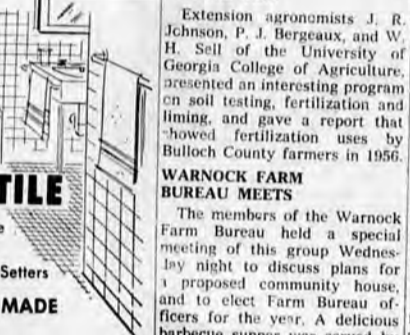
