1. We noted and discussed the Judge's comments on alleged speed traps in other counties. The Grand Jury is cognizant of the fact that it is the responsibility of each of us individually to discuss and discourage this practice as well as possible.

2. The Grand Jury received reports from Miss Sarah Hall, director, Bulloch County Department of Public Welfare; Mr. Henry McCormick, administrator, and Mr. Hoke S. Brunson, chairman of Board of Bulloch County Hospital; Mr. H. P. Womack, superintendent Bulloch County School. The Grand Jury feels, according to these reports, that these conditions in our county are in excellent condition and they express appreciation to them for these reports.

3. We wish to thank Mr. Edgar Wynn, chairman County Commissioners, for the delicious luncheon at the Bulloch County Public Works Camp. The Grand Jury commends Warden Fields for the clean and sanitary condition of the camp.

4. We recommend and urge immediate installation of a laboratory and better lighting system in the Grand Jury room of the courthouse.

5. We recommend that Mrs. Minnie Lee Johnson be paid the usual fee for services rendered during this session.

6. We recommend that these presentments be published in the county paper at the usual cost.

7. We wish to thank Judge J. L. Renfro for his able and inspiring charge to us and extend our appreciation to the Solicitor General, Walton Usher, for his guidance and assistance in presenting matters for our consideration. We wish to thank our Bailiff, Mose Sowell, for his efficient assistance.
