








Editorials

Let's re-elect Congressman Prince Preston

It seems only yesterday when the campaign to re-elect Congressman Prince Preston was launched.

And suddenly it's that time again. If there existed any doubt about Mr. Preston's political maturity at the beginning of the last election campaign events in our national Congress since should have swent it away. His statue among his fellow congressmen and the national leaders have grown and it reflects in what he has accomplished for the people in the First District.

The part he played in behalf of the farmers of the South in correcting the shameful and confusing manner in which Secretary of Agriculture Benson and his assistants handled the Soil Bank for 1958 and the subsequent provision for all who wished might "sign up." cannot be assailed, but deserves commendation.

His "Oh Brother" exasperation with the President of the United States over the President's inaccessability at moments of urgency over the matter of air safety points up his strength as a congressional leader. One doesn't 'Oh Brother" the President except from a position of strength based on knowledge of the issue.

These are among the big things for which Mr. Preston deserves support.

Bill Bates, political editor of the Atlanta Constitution, told members of the Statesboro Rotary Club here last week that the citizens of Georgia must assume part of the blame for corruption in local, state and national govern-

He accused us of "looking the other way" when evidence of wrong-doing in our government turns up and charged us to assume our duty to promote a rigid code for good government.

And he's right. He pin pointed our tendency to look up the business of politics as "a dirty business" and our wanting no part of it.

He urged citizens to select good men in their communities and convince them that they should become candidates for government offices.

All the things Mr. Bates said are right. And his listeners agreed with him.

But our voting record in Bulloch County leaves a lot to be desired. On the 1954 election only 4.946 citizens voted. 10.056 citizens should have voted-there were that many on the registration list.

Another election is in the making. If we are to have good government we must tighten up our intreperation of "political integrity." We must make it our duty to learn all we can about how the candidates stand. And vote!


Brain trophies
