



That whenever any form of Government becomes destructive of these ends, it is the tht of the People to alter or to abolish ing its foundation on such principles and organizing its powers in such form, as to them shall seem most likely to effect their Safety and Happiness. Prudence, in-deed, will dictate that Governments long blished should not be changed for light and traisient causes; and according-ly all experience hath shewn, that mankind are more disposed to suffer, whil evils are sufferable, than to right them-selves by abolishing the forms to which they are accustomed. But when a long train of abuses and usurpations, pur suing invariably the same object evince a design to reduce them under absolute Despotism, it is their right, it is their duty, to throw off such Government, and o provide new Guards for their future security. Such has been the patient suf-ferance of these Colonies; and such is now the necessity which constrains them to alter their former systems of Govern-ment. The history of the present King of Great Britain is a history of repeated injuries and usurpations, all having in direct object the establishment of an absolute Tyranny over these States. To

They maintained throw as mere abstract doctrine is within the free speech pro-tection of the First Amendment' and that the Smith Act, to be consistent with the First Amendment, "must be taken as pro-scribing only the sort of advo-cacy which incites to illegal action."

The Court sought to develop The Court sought to develop the idea that there are two or more forms of advocacy of violent overthrow of the Government, one or some of which are not unlawful. Such a thesis, according to the Senate Internal Security Subcommittee in its 1957 annual report seeks to lead the country "further down the garden path to the condown the garden path to the con-clusion that advocacy of action which does not succeed in pro-ducing the action advocated is not unlawful."



Ammonium nitrate, on the other hand, almost unknown to Georgia farmers in 1945, is rapidly gaining in popularity. In 1957, 55,729 tons were bought by Georgita farmers compared to only 3,431 tons in 1945. The amount used in 1957 was a 55 per cent increase over that used in 1956.





In view of the very limited use of these trains by the traveling public and the fact that mail and express will receive equal or better handling, we sincerely hope that the public's sense of fair play will permit sympathetic understanding of our plight and earnestly request your co-operation in our efforts to discontinue these trains and eliminate this unnecessary loss.







