Rockwell executive from Germany here

Henning Rehder, executive assistant to the president of Rockwell Manufacturing Company's L.L.O. Werks (Works), has recently completed a week's visit to the local plant. From Statesboro, the last manufacturing plant on his itinerary, Mr. Rehder returned to Pittsburgh and from there departs for Hamburg, Germany.

Preston trying to locate Civil War Vet widows

Congressman Prince Preston of this week the Veterans Administration has requested his assistance in trying to locate an estimated 1,500 widows of Confederate veterans believed to be entitled to federal pensions.

The request was made by the Administrator of Veterans Affairs who told Congressman Preston of V.A.'s problem in trying to identify the widows, who for the first time are eligible for V.A. pensions under recently signed Public Law 85-425.

The new law also provides pensions for the two living Confederate veterans, Walter W. Williams of Franklin, Texas, and John Salling of Slant, Virginia. Both men have been contacted by V.A. field representatives and assisted in filing their claims.

The widows, however, present another problem, Preston explained. Only those Southern states which pay similar benefits have partial rolls of Confederate beneficiaries.

The United States has no official records of these beneficiaries and, since the benefits are not automatic, the widows will have to fill out application forms which may be obtained in person or by letter from any V.A. office.

The two Confederate veterans are eligible for the same pension benefits as would Federal and Union counterparts, \$101.59 a month, or \$135.45 if physically disabled or blind. Widows under 70 are entitled to \$40 a month over 70 to \$65 a month. If the widow was married to the veteran during the Civil War service, she is entitled to \$75 a month.

"I hope the few surviving widows of our honored Confederate dead will take advantage of the Federal pension recently provided," Preston stated.

"A letter to the Veterans Administration in Washington or a visit to any local V.A. office will enable any Confederate widow to obtain the application forms, the First District Representative stated.

Preston's sputnik was not made by Russians

Congressman Prince P. Preston says he has discovered the miniature Sputnik he recently bought from the Russian exhibit at the Brussels World's Fair was made in Switzerland, not Russia.

The "Swiss Made" engraving on the base of the spurious sputnik had been chiseled off by the Russians but the Georgia Congressman consulted an expert who used acid to bring out the tell-tale words.

"Every item for sale at the souvenir counter was represented as being of Russian manufacture," the First District representative said.

"Claiming credit for manufacturing another country's product," Mr. Preston said, "typifies the fraud and deception practiced by the Russians on their exhibit in Brussels which has received wider acclaim by Europeans than has the American exhibit."

"This should serve to inform the Europeans that all they see in the Russian exhibit may not be authentic or genuine," Mr. Preston said. "Since this deception has not been discovered, it can be assumed that there are many other deceptions practiced in the Russian exhibit."

"I charge that the Russians are deliberately attempting to deceive the visitors to the Fair with the false picture presented by their exhibit. This is not surprising, however, in the light of their criminal behavior in the case of nations."

The toy is a replica of the Russian Sputnik I. The satellite itself is a silver ball about two inches in diameter to which is attached four golden antennas. Inside the base of the souvenir is a spring-wound mechanism which emits the Sputnik-identifying sounds of beep, beep, beep!
