When Bulloch County can draw farmers from the entire southeast Georgia to inspect the third place winner in the Georgia Grazing and Feed Production Contest you know it has something.

On Thursday of last week more than 140 people, including farmers and farm leaders gathered at the home place of the Banks Brothers, Osborne, Henry, Edwin and Bernard, to inspect their contest-winning farm and their designation as "Master Forage Producers."

Farm Safety Week

There's one coming event which every farm family in this country should welcome with enthusiasm. It's Farm Safety Week, to be observed during the July 20-26 period.

Farmers face all the common hazards of modern living. In addition, in the pursuit of their calling, they encounter special accident hazards all their own.

For example, take tractors and other mechanized farm equipment. These machines are absolutely essential to successful modern farming. The machinery engineers never lose sight of the safety factor. New safety devices are incorporated in the designs as soon as they are proven.

Youngsters are permitted to operate machines—and every so often a tragic and totally unnecessary death or maiming results. Farmers drive unlighted or inadequately lighted equipment on public roads at night—and the immutable law of averages says that this practice must end in disaster at frequent intervals.

Mechanically-minded farmers sometimes get ideas for making changes in their equipment, or in adding accessories of their own design and construction. More often than not, this creates new dangers to the operator. It's a rare farmer indeed who has the engineering knowledge, the skill, and the facilities to improve on what the factory has done.

During Farm Safety Week, authorities will deal with all manner of farm hazards and show how they can be eliminated or minimized. It's an opportunity that agricultural America can't afford to miss.

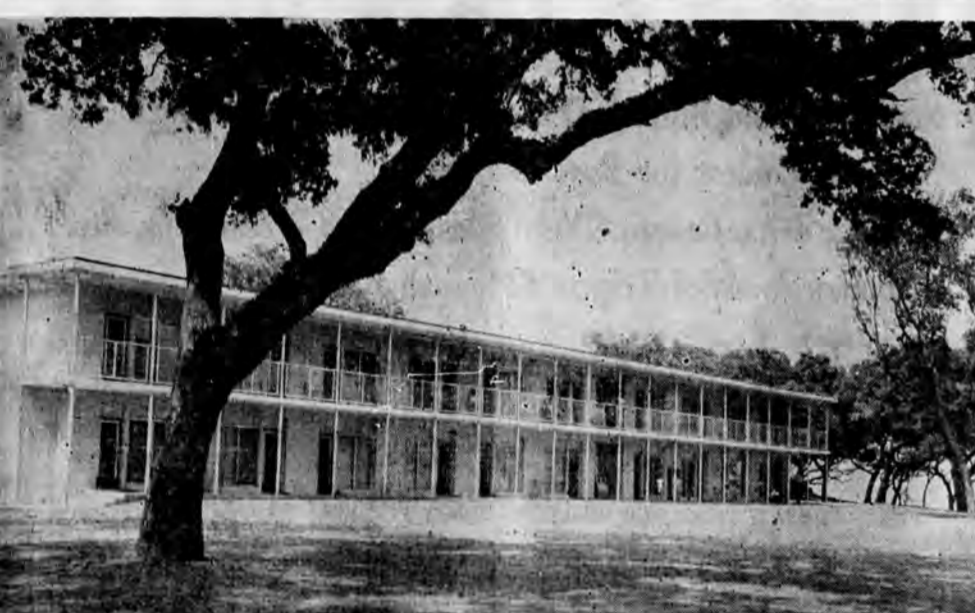

U. S. Highway 301 is carrying more traffic on its way north and south through Statesboro and Bulloch County than U. S. Highway 17 is carrying through Savannah and more than U. S. 80 is carrying through Statesboro east and west.

According to figures furnished the Bulloch County 301 Association by Ray A. Flint, State Highway planning engineer for Georgia, and revealed at a meeting of the local group held at Mrs. Bryant's kitchen on Tuesday morning of this week, U. S. 301 was the number one route in the county every month of 1956, through June.

The highway count of automobiles was made on U. S. 301, two miles east of Statesboro; on U. S. 17, 0.8 miles southwest of Midway and on U. S. 80, 6.2 miles northwest of Statesboro.

The count of traffic on U. S. 301 is as follows: January, 5,291 cars; February, 5,120; March, 5,538; April, 5,557; May, 4,759; June, 5,805.

The count on U. S. 17 is as follows: January, 4,600; February, 4,169; March, 4,376; April, 4,571; May, 4,084; June, 4,572.

The count on U. S. 80 was as follows: January, 2,421; February, 2,409; March, 2,527; April, 2,645; May, 2,597; June, 2,481.

Mr. Flint in his letter reporting these figures stated that these figures are the average twenty-four hour count of cars at the locations given.

### U.S. postage rates to go up on August 1

D. Reppard ReLoach, postmaster of the Statesboro post office, announced today that he already has on hand a complete supply of stamps, post cards and stamped envelopes to comply with the new postage rates which go into effect on August 1.

Mr. DeLoach explained that the new rates are as follows: First class mail, formerly requiring three cents per ounce, on August 1, will require four cents per ounce.

Postal cards, formerly costing two cents will be three cents each.

Air Mail, formerly six cents per ounce will be seven cents per ounce after August 1.

Picture post cards, formerly two cents per ounce, will require three cents per ounce after August 1.

All unsealed greeting cards, such as Christmas cards which carry no written message will be three cents instead of the old rate of two cents.

Old supplies of two and six cent stamps, two and four cent cards and three and six cent envelopes may be used after August 1 by adding a one cent stamp.
