



Editorials

Will there ever be a letup?

R. P. (Bob) Mikell, judge of Bulloch County's Ordinary's Court told a group of citizens, who are interested in doing something about the mental health problem of our people, that in 1957 nineteen people from Bulloch County were committed to Milledgeville Hospital for mental treatment. So far in 1958, fifteen have been committed.

The Bulloch County Mental Health Association last week made a drive to raise funds to help pay for a proposed mental health clinic to be set up in this county at a cost of \$10,500. Bulloch's share of the cost would be \$3,000. The state of Georgia would provide \$5,000 and the other \$2,500 would be provided by the citizens of Emanuel, Effingham, Candler and Evans Counties, the amount based upon the population of each contributing county.

Mr. Johnson Black, president of the local Mental Health Association says there are no statistics available to indicate the need for a mental health program in Bulloch County. But at the group's meeting on Wednesday night, July 23. Dr. Helen Deal did illustrate how the program of the Mental Health Association could be helpful. Miss Maude White told of occasions when it became neces sary to refer students for medical attention in Augusta or Savannah because of emotional problems.

The Mental Health Association was formed with the purpose of combating the national billion dollar problem of mental health on a localized level. If enough funds are secured and the clinic established it is expected to be directed by Dr. Kathryn Lovett. The clinic, in addition to providing treatment, will attempt to educate the public on mental illness.
